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






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Lucky escape as house fire rages

Families were awoken from their beds and evacuated in an estate in Kilcock in the early hours of Tuesday last, after a large fire broke out in a vacant property.

The significant blaze started in Highfield Park at around midnight and firefighters from Maynooth and Leixlip Fire Stations rushed to the scene.

Firefighters initially believed an occupant was in the property, but it was quickly confirmed to be vacant.

Gardaí began a forensic investigation yesterday into the fire which caused extensive damage to the roof and upper floors of the property.

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Kildare woman fundraising to get nephew (4) to Poland for life-saving operation

A County Kildare woman is fundraising to get her sick young nephew to Poland for potentially life-saving brain operation.

Little Luke Cross, 4, is the only child in Ireland to be diagnosed with Aromatic Amino Acid Decarboxylase Deficiency (AADC), which is similar to Parkinson's Disease in adults and causes issues with motor development in the absence of treatment.

There are roughly 150 children worldwide with the same condition as Luke, and on average three children sadly pass away each year as a result of the condition.

Luke's aunt Laura Styles, from Maganey near Athy, is raising funds for his treatment abroad in Poland.

She told the Kildare Post that Luke was diagnosed with AADC at just five months old.

"Luke is on 21 doses of meds per day. He can't walk, talk or eat orally. Luke is one in 55 million. There are roughly 150 children world-wide, Luke is the only one in Ireland. His condition is life threatening, on average three children a year sadly lose their battle to this neurogenetic condition. Last year 10 children passed away, but a break-through in medicine has finally become available in Poland," explained

The treatment in Poland would involve a brain operation where a vector is implanted into a targeted part of the brain which will help regenerate neurotransmitters he is missing. It is understood that five children have thus far benefited from the therapy and are making good progress, an improvement reported in muscle tone as well as a decrease in long-term medication.

"The surgery itself is still in trials so the government won't



fund the surgery but it is Luke's only hope. It is a non-profit cost at €70,000. So far I have raised just over €3,700 which is great but I have a long way to go to meet the target needed. I will be hosting numerous charity events, one is a pub quiz and raffle on October 5 at Thomas Davis GAA Club in Dublin and a football tournament in Tallaght Leisure Centre on October 26," said Laura.

She has previously held a cream pie challenge for Luke and all monies raised went toward the AADC research trust, which is the sole charity that fund research into Luke's condition. In addition to the fundraising page, Laura has also started a new campaign to raise money for Luke to go to Poland called #uniconechallenge.

"The idea is to get an ice $cream \, cone \, with \, ice \, cream \, in \, it \,$ and take a selfie of the cone on your forehead, post it, nominate friends and donate to Luke's JustGiving page," explained Laura.

However, last week Luke was rushed to hospital after he developed a viral infection and he was later transferred to ICU for non-invasive ventilation (bipap). But Luke

understood to now be back in a day ward and his aunt Laura has described him as "a fighter" who is battling every day against his condition.

Damage was also caused to the roof and upstairs floor neighbouring property while smoke damage was also caused to the adjacent homes.

Kildare Fire Service said that units from Maynooth and Leixlip responded to the incident and spent nearly four hours at the scene.

Firefighters returned to the again yesterday scene morning after material being examined by investigating gardaí suddenly reignited.

A Garda spokesman told the Kildare Post yesterday afternoon: "The house was unoccupied at the time and no injuries occurred.

A technical examination will take place.

"Enquiries are ongoing," added the spokesperson.

Call for halt to big housing projects until after review

Mayor of Kildare, Councillor Suzanne Doyle has called for all large-scale housing developments to stop until a review by the Government is carried out.

Strategic Housing Developments (SHDs) were introduced in 2017 to allow applications for housing developments of 100 units or more to be made directly to An Bord Pleanála (ABP) rather than to the relevant local authority.

The Government said the purpose of the SHDs was to trigger increased housing supply through greater streamlining efficiencies in the planning system.

Cllr Doyle recently facilitated local public consultation on a plan for 375 new homes in the Magee Barracks site in Kildare



Town. The politician called for a county-wide report on Strategic Housing Development applications be produced for councillors with information on "numbers of units compared to the typical numbers this land was zoned to accommodate.

She requested Housing Minister Eoghan Murphy to suspend all Strategic Housing Development considerations until such time as the review is complete.

Cllr Doyle will raise the issue at the next meeting of

Kildare County Council in Naas next week.

The 375 homes planned for Kildare town were due to be discussed at the Kildare-Newbridge Municipal District on

Wednesday.

A decision by An Bord Pleanala is due by the end of November.

A review is currently underway on the operation and effectiveness of the SHDs. A Review Group is due to report back to Minister Eoghan by the end of this month.

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Sex offender must inform gardaí of new address

A convicted sex offender who fled his home in Newbridge following a protest has until the end of this week to officially inform gardaí of his new address.

Former soldier Noel Ryan, who is aged in his late 60s, and with an address given in court as 2671 Dara Park, Newbridge, was sentenced to six years in prison in April 2016 on 63 counts of indecent assault on three women. The final 18 months of the sentence were suspended.

Under the Sex Offenders Act (2001), Ryan is obliged to notify gardaí of any new address within seven days.

If the offender fails to comply with the requirements, he or she is committing an offence and can be arrested and charged.

If convicted, the offender can receive a fine or be imprisoned.

Newbridge gardaí said no arrests were made after the public demonstration in Dara Park on Thursday evening, September 12, featuring up to 60 people.

Gardaí said no arrests were made and the crowd eventually left the area

The father of five was released at the end of August and was seen in Newbridge some time later.

The victims waived their anonymity at the time of the 2016 court case so that Ryan would be named.

Some of the victims lived a number of houses away from Ryan in Dara Park at the time of the crimes.

One woman said the abuse started when she was just seven years old and went on for three years in the 1980s.

Under the Sex Offenders Act, gardaí are not allowed to disclose details relating to names, addresses, or $convictions\, of\, convicted\, sex\, of fenders$ as this information may increase the risk of reoffending due to the stress caused to the offender, make the management of that risk more difficult or may cause unnecessary concern to the public.

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Kildare Village erects signs about CCTV reading number plates of shoppers' cars

Kildare Village has erected public signs informing shoppers that CCTV cameras record registration numbers of vehicles for marketing purposes.

The luxury shopping destination, which welcomed over two million visitors last year, is fully complying with GDPR regulations by disclosing its use of the Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology.

ANPR cameras are also in use by Garda cars to detect if vehicles are taxed and insured or if the driver has a valid driving licence.

The fact that details of vehicles entering Kildare Village are being read by cameras may come as a surprise to many shoppers.

Under GDPR rules, images of people or their property captured on cameras is classified as personal data.

All businesses are obliged by the legislation to notify people that they are taking their personal data. The most effective way of doing so is by prominently displaying signs within the area captured by CCTV — at the entrance to the area as well as within.

Kildare Village said it uses surveillance technologies, such as CCTV (Closed Circuit Television) and Head Count Technology, for guest safety reasons.

A statement on their website said: "These technologies may automatically capture your image data and vehicle registration data when you enter or as you are walking around our villages.

"We collect information about the number of visitors in our villages which helps us to understand visitor journeys and implement enhanced guest safety measures."

Under the strict GDPR rules, signs erected by businesses should be clearly visible and readable and state the purpose of its use and who to contact if there are any queries.

Signs should be an appropriate size in relation to its context. If the sign needs to be seen by a car driver it should be bigger, and if it is in a shop then a small sign would be more suitable.

All staff should know what to do and who to contact if a member of the public enquiries about the CCTV system.

Any signs in a public area must show the organisation or authority responsible for the systems.

Kildare Village is home to over 100 brands such as Louise Kennedy, Armani, Brooks Brothers, Anya Hindmarch, Mulberry and Hugo Boss.Kildare Village is one of the Collection of nine The Bicester Village Shopping Collection Villages by Value Retail.

In August, Rose of Tralee contestants visited Kildare Village as part of a tour of the county.

A spokesperson for Kildare Village did not reply to a request for a comment at the time of going to press.

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
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Negotiations between Kildare Chilling and farmers expected to end today

An agreement between Kildare Chilling and local beef farmers to suspend protesting and slaughtering to allow for negotiations to take place ends this evening.

It remains to be seen if those negotiations will yield any result, but at the time of going to press no deal had been agreed.

Kildare beef farmers are not happy with a proposed deal worked out nationally last Sunday afternoon between farming representatives and the meat industry. They resumed protesting outside the Kildare Chilling premises in Kildare town almost as soon as the proposals were announced.

The main points from the proposed deal were that farmers would get an additional eight cents per kilogram on animals from quality assured farms up to 30 months of age, and also eight cents for those between

30 and 36 months.

However these additional payments would be over and above a base price which is currently between €3.45 and €3.50, depending on the factory. And farmers fear the base price can be adjusted as often as weekly. In a matter of weeks, the eight cent increase could be wiped out, they believe.

The base price for cattle has fallen from €4.20 to €3.50 per kilogram in the space of a

At a time when Teagasc estimates that €4.17 per kg is the minimum breakeven cost, many farmers are considering getting out of beef and going into dairy, where margins are considered to be better.

John Dallon of Beef Plan Movement is arguing instead for a guaranteed floor for the base price, possibly of about €3.70 per kilogram, below which that price will never drop. "And we could hope that the prices would recover over time after that," he said.

He said that farmers felt they had to continue their protest, "because if they don't stay the price could fall to $\epsilon 3$ a kilo".

Complicating the situation was a constant reminder from the Competition Authority that the negotiating parties could not discuss prices.

Meanwhile, at Kildare Chilling the protests which started on Sunday afternoon have been suspended for the first three days of this week in agreement with the company whose management have agreed not to kill any cattle during that period.

This is to allow for ongoing negotiations between farmers and Kildare Chilling.

As per usual, in order to prevent layoffs at the factory, Kildare Chilling will continue to slaughter sheep.

Farmers say they are losing between €150 and €200 per animal, and even before the prices started dropping last year were making as little as €20 per head.

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Kildare people to join climate change protest

Buses are due to leave Newbridge, Naas and North Kildare this Friday with Kildare campaigners set to join a national protest blaming the government for inaction on climate change.

Niamh Cowdell, who is leader with No Planet B youth and a member of Extinction Rebellion says there are currently 22 people scheduled to set out on a bus, which is leaving Naas at 11 o'clock from outside the Mercy Convent on Friday.

"The group is made up of members of No Planet B, Extinction Rebellion and concerned members of the public," said Niamh.

No Planet B is a group of young Naas eco warriors aged 8 to 11 years of age, who attend the Mercy Convent School in Naas. In June, they staged a presentation at Naas Library attended by councillors, Vincent P Martin, Anne Breen, Bill Clear, Carmel Kelly and Fintan Brett.

The message at the heart of their presentation was that there is no alternative to the planet we live on, and there is no planet B, or plan B.

The group also took part in the previous climate change national protest last March. It's understood there is also two buses traveling from Newbridge and there will also be a strong representation from Maynooth at the national climate strike.

Niamh explained the protestors will assemble at the Quays in Dublin before making their way to government buildings where the climate strike protest is due to be held from 1pm to 2pm.

"We want to protest to get the government to reach its target of reducing greenhouse gases to 0% net by 2030," she said.



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

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

She noted: "No volunteer here is receiving a salary, neither do the seven directors, it's all totally unpaid work. The centre is open on weekdays from 10am-2pm. 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Bid to stop rent hikes in Athy, Monasterevin and Kildangan

Athy councillors have agreed to write to the Government to urgently designate Athy and Monasterevin as rent pressure zones as tenants face soaring rents.

Cllr Mark Wall tabled a motion at this month's area meeting which was held on Monday at Aras Chill Dara in Naas.

The meeting heard that, to date, rent pressure zones have been declared in areas where the Rental Tenancies Board determine that the rents are above the national rent level and have experienced rental inflation in the excess of 7% in four of the last six quarters.

"Athy and Monasterevin are the only areas that are not rent pressure zones," Cllr Wall said. "This is causing a rental crisis in Castledermot, Athy and Monasterevin. The landlords are increasing the rents from €600 to €1,500 for a three bedroom house and €1,200 for a two bed apartment. We are at Newbridge and Kildare prices and there is a shortage of rental properties."

All councillors agreed to write to the Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government asking him to declare the Athy Municipal District and the surrounding areas, including Kildangan, as rent pressure zones as these areas are currently excluded

Cllr Brian Dooley claimed that landlords in Athy are "sitting on their properties".

in Kildare.

"A lot of landlords in Athy are not letting out their properties because it is no longer viable with the rising property prices," he said. "They can make as much in a year in property price

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Rent Pressure Zones (RPZs) are designated areas where rents cannot be increased by more than 4% per annum

increases than in rent. They are sitting on their properties."

Meanwhile Cllr Wall is also

calling on the Minister for Housing to adjust HAP thresholds for the Athy to include the nearby town of

Monasterevin.

"The Athy Municipal District and the town of Monasterevin are now

surrounded by areas that have been designated rent pressure zones," Cllr Wall said.

"This is now causing rents in these areas to soar, impacting on families who are now having to spend significantly more to get a decent home. HAP levels are not keeping up with these increases."

Cllr Aoife Breslin agreed that rents are at crisis point in Athy with rental prices too high to cover HAP, leaving people priced out of the rental market.

"People are coming into my office delighted that they got a house but not realising that HAP won't cover the rent at €1,200 a month.

"They don't understand that they won't be able to rent it."

All members agreed that it would be of local interest to write to the Minister on the matter.

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€85,000 allocated for works at Corbally Cross in Athgarvan

Proposed roadworks at Corbally Cross in Athgarvan are scheduled to commence in October.

Locals who have to travel through the junction have expressed concern following recent road traffic accidents.
It is understood taht Kildare

County Council applied for funding for the works to the Department of Transport last November under the Low Cost Safety Improvement Scheme.

Deputy Martin Heydon,

who has raised concerns about safety at the cross, said that €85,000 was made available by the Department to Kildare County Council for safety improvements at the junction and that works will begin in October.

"The works will involve

significantly improving visibility at the junction for motorists who approach from both sides. The road surface at the junction will also be appropriately marked up to heighten awareness of the junction for approaching motorists.

"The combined works of improving visibility and road markings will definitely create a much safer junction than currently exists.

"We would like to thank the landowners involved for helping make this process become a reality," he added.





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
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New public access defibrillator for Maynooth

A new public access defibrillator has been installed at Carton Retail Park Maynooth by Maynooth Community First Responders (CFR), providing 24-hour public access to this life-saving piece of equipment.

The AED (Automated External Defibrillator) is located on the external walkway between the two main entrances to Tesco in the busy retail park and will ensure that anyone who suffers a cardiac arrest has early access to defibrillation.

Five thousand people die each year from cardiac arrest in Ireland. For every minute that passes after a cardiac arrest, the chances of recovery are reduced by 7% to 10%. Having early access to CPR and an AED are crucial steps in the cardiac chain of survival, according to the Pre-Hospital Emergency Care Council (PHECC).

According to Chairperson of Maynooth CFR, Réada Cronin, AEDs are a vital piece of equipment for the town.

"We are delighted to have installed this public access

AED. We wouldn't have been able to do it without support from Keith Brady, Regional Centre Manager, and his team, so we are very grateful to them. Maynooth has a population of 14,500, with a further 13,000 students and while there are a number of AEDs around the town, not all are available on a 24-hour basis

"We are currently working on a list of the locations of AEDs in Maynooth so people can familiarise themselves with their nearest one and we hope that this will be available soon."

Keith Brady, Tesco Regional Centre Manager, said: "The volunteers at Maynooth Community First Responders carry out fantastic work and we are delighted to be able to work alongside the team by installing this 24-hour external AED, which will be available to every member of our community in a cardiac emergency."

There have been some incidences of theft and damage of public access AEDs around the country, although it is not commonplace. For that

reason, Maynooth CFR are also asking everyone to please respect all life-saving equipment.

We don't want anyone to be afraid to use an AED if it's needed," said Réada, "but they are expensive to install and replace and could mean the difference between life and death for someone in cardiac arrest so it's essential that the AED is available when such an emergency arises. It's so disappointing when we see other First Responder groups commenting that an AED has been stolen or damaged and we hope that everyone will understand how important it is."

Maynooth CFR is a group of 18 volunteers, trained and certified by CFR Ireland to provide life-saving assistance in cases of heart attack, cardiac arrest, stroke and choking, working alongside the National Ambulance Service. The aim is to be on the scene within 10 minutes, providing life-saving assistance while waiting for the ambulance to arrive.

The group was established in May 2018 and went live



with the National Ambulance Service in May

2019.
They began on a weekend-only basis, but expanded that to 24/7 this summer.

They have received 22 calls since May and expect that to increase in the winter months. Maynooth CFR is entirely voluntary. For more information follow them on Facebook @maynoothcfr.

How to use an AED

An AED can be used by anyone, even if you have never used one before. If someone has collapsed and is unresponsive, check for breathing by looking, listening and feeling.

If they are not breathing call 999/112 and send someone for the nearest AED while you begin CPR. That is the only chance of survival for someone in

cardiac arrest.

The AED has two switches

– a green On/Off and an orange Charge/Shock button. Once switched on it will talk you through what to do, including placing pads on the patient's chest.

You cannot deliver a shock to someone who doesn't require one – the AED will analyse the patient and will tell you if a shock is required. Continue CPR as required.



LENTIL AND BACON SOUP

Now that the weather has taken a more autumnal turn, it is time to reach into the storecupboard for pulses to make hearty soups. This one is one of my favourites. It is quick and easy and makes you feel safe and nourished which is what a soup should do.


METHOD

Cut the trimmed bacon into 2cm pieces. Put the rapeseed oil in a large saucepan set over a low-medium heat and add the bacon, onion, carrot and celery.

Cook gently for 10 minutes, until soft and sweet. Stir in the garlic and cook for 5 minutes more.

Add the red lentils, followed by the tinned tomatoes and stock. Bring to the boil then reduce the heat slightly. Cover with a lid and leave the soup to simmer for 25-30 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the lentils are very soft and the soup has thickened.

If it looks too thick or starts to catch on the base, add a little water. Season to taste, remembering the bacon and stock are already quite salty. At this stage you can liquidise the soup, if you like, or leave it chunky.

"Many people come into the pharmacy to purchase medications, prescribed and otherwise. I encourage my staff to observe the clients, and to recognise if someone is in trouble or stressed out.

The ability to recognise that tension or pain in the face is key – sometimes people just come in because they don't know what they need, or whom to ask, or maybe are just experiencing loneliness. In an era that society purports to erase mental health stigma, I encourage all my staff to be compassionate, and to give a personalised service".

Indeed, Anita's personal life experiences may be the reason she has such a compassionate nature. In 1995, when she was aged 20, her mother and brother died in a house fire, leaving three younger siblings, all aged under 9 years.

Married to Noel for 30 years, the couple have three children, now aged from 18 to vears, and grandchildren.

Supporting her siblings and rearing a family were demanding years for Anita but she wouldn't have had it any other way.

"Now, I feel it's 'my time' and since joining Mangan's Pharmacy, I've taken on many roles and helped Mangan's to connect with the





Metallics: the big trend in wedding confectionery for 2020

Metallics and simpler wedding cakes are becoming the popular choice of wedding couples and likely to be a big trend in 2020. Nicola Arcari of Baker Baker states that three tier cakes are still the norm and iced in ivory, white or cream.

"But metallics, like gold, bronze or silver are in huge demand," she said. "Basically, couples are choosing simpler, more stylish cakes, which I believe is down to budget. The flowers or details are made from very fine edible rice paper, then painted with edible gold, etc. When choosing a metallic colour, couples often want an ornate, 'regal' look to the cake, or finished with bright, bold flowers and classic looking swags.

"There have been more

requests this year for sugar crystals on metallic, handpainted cakes with brush embroidery (painted using coloured buttercream) and ruffles using sugarpaste/fondant. Black or grey fondant cakes are very popular with vibrant fresh flowers".

Nicola continued: "We don't have a natural selection of vibrant coloured flowers here, so I'm regularly creating elaborate flowers for wedding cakes, very often requested in a bold violet shade, or cerisse pink, even blue is quite popular."

Cakes are generally made in sponge tiers, with butter cream icing and often simply dressed up with greenery and cones or natural textiles. These give a 'rustic' look.

"I've also been asked to have 'toppers' on the cake. These can be themed with the couple's own lifestyle,

Another couple chose to recreate their favourite dogs, a pair of black Scottie dogs, as the toppers.

One thing that has changed dramatically, according to Nicola, are the flavours.

"After Harry and Meghan

had a lemon with elderflower flavoured cake, the orders for that are flying in. I'm frequently asked to produce almond and orange sponge or a praline chocolate cake. It's all about the flavour!"

Fruit cake was ousted a few years back by the growing popularity of biscuit cake but that in turn, is now on the decline.

"Couples usually opt for

the smallest tier to be in fruit," said Nicola.

"Also 'drip' cakes are becoming very popular. Sponge is very much the most popular cake filling but definitely, metallic will be the big craze in wedding confectionery for 2020".





Margot offers one to one counselling for 'occasion anxiety' such as a wedding or big family event, and indeed support therapy for all anxieties.


"I provide support when people need it" she said "In getting support from me, they can then support others, either their partner or parent or stressed out bridesmaids!



Electric ELVES inaugural training programme at Nissan Academy Naas



The Other Side of the Coin



Saturday 7 September saw the last Senior All Ireland handball singles played in the glass alley in Croke Park.

The alley will shortly be demolished and all future games played in the completed state of the art complex just around the corner.

For Ballymore Eustace Handball Club, it was a night to remember, with Gary Bolger claiming the national Golden Masters B (050s) title when he defeated Tyrone's Finbarr Fullen, 15-21, 21-9, 21-14. But a further cause for the Kildare club to celebrate was the inclusion of Tom O'Rourke among the game's legendary senior singles winners.

Speaking after the event, O'Rourke said: "I was absolutely chuffed to be $included \, with \, the \, some \, of \, the \,$ biggest names in handball sport – the likes of Paddy Reilly and Ollie Harrold, Kilkenny; Tony Ryan, Tipperary and Packie Ryan of Dublin. There was also Tom Sheridan (Meath), Dick Lyng (Wexford) and of course, Eoin Kennedy (Dublin) who defeated Robbie McCarthy (Westmeath) on the night.

"But sadly, there were two former greats I'd loved to have standing with us on Saturday night—the late Ducksie Walsh of Kilkenny and the late Joey Maher of Louth, legends the pair of them."

With an impressive scoresheet at juvenile and underage competition, O'Rourke claimed 15 All

Ireland titles during his career, including 7 senior singles titles and two doubles, and two 'Top Ace' titles (1979 and 1984).

The late Ducksie was his nemesis, having beaten O'Rourke in three national finals; a fourth title he contested agains Paddy Reilly of Kilkeeny, but O'Rourke was forced to withdraw owing to injury.

O'Rourke's first senior single softball title came in 1979 against Packie Ryan, 21-11, 21-11. It was an historic occasion, being the first and only time a Kildare player secured the softball title.

That occasion is still remembered in his home village of Ballymore Eustace when local sporting, community and business interests united to host a welcome home party for the newly crowned champion. He was duly led through the

village on a white horse, flanked by John Browne and Matt Purcell, two local renowned handball players. Hardball was the main sport played in Ballymore so a win in softball was an added bonus.

A huge banner reading "Tom is King" was the backdrop for the podium where Tom was proudly lauded and the celebrations ran for weeks.

1984 was the year O'Rourke dominated the senior singles court, when he won a trio of the top titles: All Ireland senior singles softball title; the Centenary Open singles title and the world singles title – all three being played in the soon to be demolished glass alley at Croke Park. Handball was 'glamorised' for a few years as the handball championships were broadcast on RTÉ's 'Top Ace' programme.

O'Rourke twice claimed All Ireland doubles' championship, with fellow club member, Mickey Dowling and Padraig McCormack, Kildare. representing O'Rourke states with pride that one of his greatest achievements in handball was coaching Ballymore's PJ McGrath to an All Ireland U16 title.

On the coaching side, O'Rourke has enjoyed success with several GAA football teams in his native Ballymore Eustace, having managed an underage team from U14 championship title up to minor success and he was part of Jarlath Gilroy's management team which defeated Nobber to claim the Leinster title in 2010 (amidst the infamous snow debacle).

O'Rourke has served on Kildare County Board for years, at least 8 on the CCC


but recently moved over to the Hearing Committee.

"I was delighted and deeply honoured to be among the history of former handball greats hosted at the glass alley at Croke Park" he said "And to see clubman Gary Bolger take a national title for Kildare and the club on the night. Congratulations to Gary, his Da Jim would have been so proud".

Bolger defeated Willie

Burke of Tipperary 21-6 18-21 21-12 in Ballymore on August 14 and then his Tyrone opponent, Finbarr Fullen, 15-21, 21-9, 21-14 with an impressive comeback having lost the first set.


"It was a fitting end to a great season for Ballymore Handball Club, which has been having a great run recently" concluded O'Rourke.


