

JOGGER'S CAR STOLEN

Warning to Curragh users to be vigilant while exercising

The theft of a car while its owner was jogging in the Curragh has been condemned as "heartless".

Gardaí in Newbridge have launched an investigation after cruel thieves took the vehicle on Thursday morning of last week.

Joggers have also been strongly advised to be cautious where they park their cars.

It is understood that the vehicle — a blue Audi saloon car with a 151 D registration numberplate — was stolen between 7.45am and 8.05am on Thursday morning last.

The owner of the vehicle was out for a jog around the Curragh Plains at the time and returned some time later to find the vehicle was stolen. This is despite the fact that she was still in possession of the car keys.

The vehicle has not yet been recovered, a garda spokesperson confirmed.

The theft has been condemned by the

owner of a a well-known Kildare running club.

Brendan McLoughlin of Brendan's Running Club yesterday said: "This is absolutely terrible. You often hear about valuables taken from cars of joggers and walkers in the Curragh but to take the actual car is a new low."

He added: "I hope incidents like this don't discourage people from getting out and taking exercise and enjoying the wonderful amenity of the Curragh plains."

Brendan also said that people should become more vigilant in recreational areas and park their cars in well-lit and busy places if possible.

In recent months there has been a surge in the number of so-called "keyless car thefts" reported in Ireland, with many makes of vehicles stolen by thieves using relay devices which copy radio signal being emitted from electronic car keys.

Motorists are advised to install a tracking system on their vehicles as a measure against such thefts.

Inside this week Homeowners hit with hefty hike in property tax

Kildare County Council has voted to increase its Local Property Tax (LPT) by 7.5% on the base rate in 2020.

Following extensive debate at last Monday's monthly meeting, the council finally opted for the rise, after motions various were submitted to introduce increases by 5% and 10%.

What does this mean for Kildare home owners? For example, a property owner in €200,001-€250,000 bracket, paid €405 on the standard base rate, and will now pay €435.38 in 2020.

A home owner in the €250,000 to €300,000 house

price band, close to the average in the county, paid a base rate of €495. For 2020, this home owner will pay €532.13, an increase of €37.13.

Owners of a house valued between €350,000-400,000 paid €675 at the base rate this will go up to €725.63, a rise of €50.63.

September 24 was the last time they passed a resolution not to vary the base rate of local property tax for 2019.

In 2015 and 2016, Kildare County Council reduced the local property tax by 7.5% but since 2017, it has voted not to vary the base rate of LPT.

Monday's council meeting, there was an initial proposal by Cllr Padraig McĒvoy (Ind), supported by Cllr Ivan Keatley (FG), Cllr

Rob Power (FF), Cllr Vincent Martin (Greens) and others to increase the base rate by 10%, but Cllr Ide Cussen (Ind) proposed the full 15% reduction.

Cllr Fiona McLoughlin Healy proposed not to vary the charge. Cllr Mark Wall (Labour) said they had agreed to a 5% increase, as did his party colleague, Cllr Ciara Galvin.

A debate took place on the issue and the council adjourned for a short while to facilitate private party discussions.

When the meeting resumed, Cllr McEvoy and others withdrew the 10% rise proposal and Cllr Keatley's proposal of a 7.5% rise won the day with 19 voting for it, 5 against and 13 abstaining.

The vote was taken not by a roll call vote, councillors supporting the motions were asked to stand up.

A proposal by Cllr Cussen for a 15% reduction was defeated.

A proposal not to change the rate from last year was defeated 19-14 with five abstentions.

The council retained €3,251,075 of the LPT to fund projects in the municipal districts for this year.

The public had until August 9 last to make submissions to Kildare County Council on whether to raise or lower its local property tax (LPT) in the county.

Some 27 submissions were received on the issue.



Charity box stolen from shop



Council to build over 70 Traveller housing units

The Traveller community have been disproportionately affected by the national housing shortage, according to officials

Kildare County Council has agreed to build 73 new housing units for the Traveller community over the next five years.

Following consultation and submissions from three groups, councillors agreed the plan at their monthly meeting on Monday in the light of an increase in the number of Travellers in the county since 2015.

The council said Traveller specific units will include eight units at Tankardsgarden, Newbridge, in 2020; five in Naas in 2021; five in Athy in 2022 plus five

more in 2023 and five in Celbridge in 2023. The survey indicated that there was strong support among Travellers for the development of temporary sites that could be used by families living on the road and awaiting an offer of permanent accommodation.

But they were against the idea of transient sites and "uncomfortable with families that they did not know coming into the area."

There were 225 Traveller households in 2015 and 302 in 2018 — an increase of 34% with the number of individuals up 26%, increasing from 813 to 1026.

The plan said this year's

figures indicate an increase in roadside families since last year and a steady decline in the number in private rented houses over the past four years, in line with declining availability all over the county.

The report said these figures echo the views and experiences voiced by Traveller families during the consultation process as they described difficulty in accessing private rented accommodation and increasing instances of living in roadside caravans due to a lack of accommodation availability.

The council said it had a target of creating 76 units in

the 2014 plan, including 55 standard houses and 21 traveller specific sites.

It delivered 58 houses, three above target, and 13 traveller specific accommodation units, a shortfall of 38% in this area. It said it delivered 93% of its target, "against a backdrop of the worst housing crisis in modern Irish history" where "the Traveller community have been disproportionately affected by the national housing shortage".

During the period of the 2014-2018 Traveller Accommodation Programme in Kildare, the number of Travellers families on the roadside fell from 23 to 15.

Those in Traveller specific



accommodation rose from 25 to 31 and the numbers in standard housing doubled from 56 to 112.

Those in rented accommodation fell from 106

to 80 but the numbers of the Traveller community homeless rose from zero in 2014 to 19 in 2018, when a survey was done in November of that year.



Final farewell for tragic Kilteel man Daniel

yesterday bid a final farewell to a young man from Kilteel who died tragically in County Cavan at the weekend. Daniel Grimes (26) from Kilteel

lost his life after the car in which he was travelling with two others entered a canal at Ballyheady Bridge on the Ballinamore to Ballyconnell road on Saturday evening last.

Daniel's remains reposed at his home on Tuesday evening and the removal to Terenure College Chapel took place yesterday afternoon.

A funeral service took place afterwards in the Victorian Chapel at Mount Jerome, Harold's Cross.

A GoFundMe campaign — set up to help friends of Daniel living abroad to get home for his funeral — had raised several thousands of euro.

According to the page, the fund was earmarked towards paying for the cost of international

Any excess donations are going to a nominated charity.

Touched lives

The page added: "Dan has touched a countless amount of people's lives and it's important to bring as many of us together as possible to give him the send off he deserves."

Two other young men survived the tragedy on Saturday evening. The vehicle was recovered

from the river on Sunday, while the surrounding area was closed off by Gardaí investigating the fatality.

The scene is a number of kilometres from the Ballinamore to Ballyconnell road and not ordinarily used by traffic.

It is believed the laneway was constructed for access during restoration works on the canal.

Investigation

Gardaí said in a statement: "Gardaí in Cavan are investigating an incident this evening Saturday, September 21, on the Ballinamore Ballyconnell Rd, Co Cavan.

Gardaí and emergency services attended the scene following reports that a car had entered the

Heavy garda presence expected on roads for Day Without Death campaign

The European Day Without A Road Death Project, EDWARD, takes place today across Kildare, Ireland and Europe.

This aim is to have a day without fatalities on Europe's roads.

There is expected to be a heavier than usual garda presence on the roads network in County Kildare.

An Garda Síochána will be supporting the campaign and are calling on road users to sign up to an online pledge to improve road behaviours.

Transport Minister Shane Ross TD offered his support for Project EDWARD and encouraged everyone to get behind this year's event.

He said it's an opportunity for road users across Europe to work together to aim for one day where there is no loss of life.

Organised by TISPOL, the European Traffic Police Network, Project EDWARD seeks to bring together everyone with an interest in reducing the number of people killed on our roads.

Project EDWARD has taken place on a single day over the past four years.

The campaign has the support of 28 European countries, as well as European Commission and an increasing number of partners from the public and private sectors.

Raising awareness

A TISPOL spokesperson commented: "A day without a road death is of course the vision we should strive for every day.

"But we have seen that Project EDWARD is a simple yet highly effective awareness-raiser, whether or not we achieve zero deaths on the day itself.

"Casualty reduction must remain a priority for all national governments. There were some excellent reductions in road deaths and serious injuries in the first decade of this century, but they have largely stalled in the past five years.

"It is therefore vital that we re-focus our attention on the efforts needed to bring about significant and long-lasting reductions.

"We believe strongly in the value of setting targets, and we believe that the support from all industry sectors and from individuals can make a massive difference in reducing the number of people killed and seriously injured on our roads.

'We need to make clear that a zero figure is very unlikely. But if we aim for zero and end up with a daily tally far below the European average of 70 fatalities, Project then EDWARD will have succeeded, and will add further weight to the real value of casualty reduction targets. So we urge drivers, riders, pedestrians, cyclists and other road users can pause for a moment on 19 Sentember to reflect on one simple question: What can I do for road safety today?"





Some 61 families currently in emergency accommodation in County Kildare

Over 60 families are currently in emergency accommodation in Kildare due to homelessness, Kildare County Council has confirmed.

Following an information request from Cllr Aidan Farrelly (Social Democrats), the Council said at its monthly meeting on Monday last that there were 61 households with dependents in emergency accommodation. Just 10 of those families are in accommodation with their own front door.

In a report to members, Annette Aspell, director of Services, Housing and Corporate Services, said that just over half (32) of those households were in emergency accommodation for up to six months, with a further 15 there for between 6-12 months.

Another 11 families were there for between 12 and 18

months, while one family was between a year and a half and two years in that situation.

Two were so affected for between 24-30 months. The 61 households are made up of 94 adults and 136 dependents.

The 10 households with dependents in "own front door" emergency accommodation comprised 17 adults and 36 dependents.

Ms Aspell said that homelessness is a standing item on the agenda for the Housing Strategic Policy Committee and monthly reports are provided to the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government, and are published on their website.

Cllr Farrelly, who thanked Ms Aspell and her team, claimed the Council Housing Strategic Policy Committee was currently not sitting.

He said the housing crisis continues to worsen month by month.

"Since the election the vast majority of people contacting


me do so with a housing query. They do so because they are under threat of eviction — they and their families are at risk of, or have become homeless.

Cllr Farrelly said 27% of these children have been in emergency accommodation between 12 and 30 months. "Two and a half years in a child's life... spent in a hub or hotel room.

"Our Minister for Housing Eoghan Murphy managed to put a positive spin on these by claiming that there's fewer children in emergency accommodation today than this time last year.

Cllr Farrelly said that they had also learned that there are 61 vacant homes in the county, many of which require considerable works in order to be allocated.

He suggested that the work needed to be done on these houses quickly and that those children who are living in emergency accommodation must be prioritised for allocation.



Army officers agree to new deal

The association representing officer grades in the Defence Forces has voted to accept the Public Service Pay Commission proposals aimed at addressing acute staff shortages.

The Representative Association of Commissioned Officers (RACO), voted in favour of the €10 million package of allowances at its annual conference in the Killashee Hotel in Naas.

However RACO General Secretary Conor King said that if any other group had been treated so badly, it would have taken industrial action.

Commandant King said the decision to accept the proposals by around a two thirds majority had been taken after a lot of "robust" debate

He said RACO was placing its faith in the Government to meet the deadlines in the implentation plan "Strengthening Our Defence Forces".

Commandant King said the fact that RACO was unwilling to take industrial action, and would never let the State down, should not be exploited.

He said that what members were seeing in the Defence Forces was a "permanent form of industrial action" — whereby people were voting with their feet and leaving the jobs they loved never to return.

He said the proof of the pudding would be in the month to month figures indicating the strength of the Defence Forces, adding that those figures are currently "going south".



Athy junction and N81 noted among Ireland's worst accident blackspots

Recent research by Gamma Location Intelligence has identified Ireland's worst accident blackspots, and among them is a junction in Athy town and two areas on the N81, one on the Kildare Wicklow border and another near Rathvilly, Co Carlow.

Whilst an area on the N59 to Galway, east of Kylemore Lough, recorded an incredible 1131 incidents, and a junction in Enniscorthy town reported 588 incidents, Athy town was listed in the top 20 with 115 accidents at the Duke Street and Leinster Street junction in Athy. The report was compiled from TII statistics from 2015 to 2017, just under three years in total.

Commenting, Cllr Mark Wall said: "I have being concerned about this road over a period of time and have raised it continuously at Council level. I am glad to report that following representations, we were informed at our recent area meeting that TII are to carry out and fund a number of safety audits right along these streets, including a resurfacing programme due to start in the coming months".

He continued:
"Unfortunately there have being a number of accidents on this road including fatalities and I welcome the safety surveys from TII and urge them to carry them out urgently"

The N81 featured in a second list of road segments reporting with a high number accidents recorded. Poulaphouca Bridge, which borders the Kildare and Wicklow borders is a notorious blackspot. The Gamma report cites 76 accidents on the stretch of road near the bridge on the N81, 1.8km north of junction with R411, just east of Kildare

border.

The second area on the N81 is north of Rathvilly, Co Carlow, at the Yellowford Cross Roads, with 46 incidents recorded. Five collisions were cited for Exit 5 along the M50.

The N81 Action Group met with Minister for Transport, Shane Ross, TD in August 2018, along with farming and community groups after the Dept of Transport announced the deferment of the N81 upgrade.

Minister Ross told the groups and local representatives attendance that the N81 did not have a higher average of accidents, and this was, he claimed, verified by Transport Infrastructure Ireland (T11). Cllr Gerry O'Neill, Chair of the N81 Action Group was surprised at the Minister's claim, as previous statistics from Kildare County Council and traffic studies showed stretches of road along the N81 had a higher level or collisions, and single vehicle incidents.

At the time, Cllr O'Neill stated all the prep work, engineering and traffic research for the upgrade of the N81 over the previous 9-10 years contradicted the Minister's findings, and were

a waste of resources.

The report provides location-based insights to insurance companies and local authorities, and incorporates data from the TII's own data, based on vehicle numbers using the road segment, its length and the number of road accidents (injury collisions) recorded. It further takes in contributory factors such as fog, weather conditions, road works, etc.





Kildare cyclists warned not to travel alone via popular West Wicklow route

An experienced cyclist from the UK was badly shaken after an incident on Monday, September 16, as he was cycling via the Sally Gap towards Ballymore Eustace to visit friends. Mike Amiss had arrived from Dublin Port that day and set off on his journey via the scenic West Wicklow route.

Around 4pm, as he cycled in thick fog along the Sally Gap, he noticed a car travelling slowly behind him for up to two minutes.

"At first I thought it was just the driver being careful, as it is a windy road and there was heavy fog. But then the car appeared to overtake me but pulled alongside me, dangerously close and then the passenger door was swiftly pushed open.

"There is no doubt in my mind the intention was to knock me off my bike. But miraculously, I held onto the bike. I quickly jumped off and got a good look at the car, and rang the emergency number and reported the car reg and vehicle description."

Mr Amiss, who has cycled across the world, is currently in County Cork and hoping to head North next, "when the weather improves!"

"I can't say for sure if their intention was to knock me off my bicycle and steal the bike; it's a Giant Defy model, and would cost me £4,000 sterling to replace it. I was seriously worried they would turn around and come back again. There appeared to be two to three people in the vehicle."

Last month, Dublin Live reported a similar incident, in which a cyclist claimed he was deliberately knocked off his bike on August 24, also at the Sally Gap. The bike was then stolen, a Trek valued at €2,000 and the cyclist left stranded. Subsequently, solo cyclists taking the Sally Gap route across the Wicklow mountains have been warned to be vigilant, and dissuaded from

cycling alone.

Dublin Cycling shared a post on Twitter on June 19, of another cyclist who claimed he was attacked by three men in a white Ford transit van. His attackers he claimed tried to steal his bike and phone. "Don't go up the Sally Gap or via Kippure or Laragh way on your own," he wrote, "as they are targeting that road because they know cyclists are using good carbon bikes".

Sinead Burke of Ballymore Eustace, a friend of Mr Amiss,




File Photo of a Garda checkpoint at the Sally Gap: Several incidents involving cyclists have been reported to Gardai in recent

stated: "As we are very close to the Sally Gap and Wicklow Mountains, it is common for me and my friends to direct overseas visitors to the area as a must-see beauty spot. It appears that this route is becoming increasingly unsafe — not to mention the fact that someone could get seriously injured or killed. In this context, I have informed a number of cycling groups so

they can be vigilant (including Ballymore Mountain Peddlers and Blessington's Reservoir Cogs)."

Gardaí confirmed they received reports of an incident involving a cyclist on the Sally Gap on September 16 albeit no complaint was made. Gardaí are investigating the theft of a bicycle that took place on August 24, also at the Sally Gap junction

BREXIT BLUES!

Murdoch argues we need to work with Britain, as we are very similar to our British counterparts

We are all sick to our teeth and watching the ongoing saga of Brexit. Although it is the British economy, the British Parliament and the British people embroiled in a mightly tangle, it certainly will have a serious impact for the Republic of Ireland.

If a hard Brexit crashes in on us, it means that Ireland have to undertake to look after the border because Britain are loud and clearly stating that they will not do anything except walk away like a 'soldier's goodbye'.

This would be an expensive and time consuming exercise for Ireland as well a training and security issue. Our army is not prepared, our special Garda force is not prepared and our customs are not prepared as it has been over twenty years since the Good Friday Agreement. It was never anticipated that this would ever happen again and it is ridiculous from a commercial point of view that they Britain should do this.

Although Britain would maintain that an open border is not an issue, it still is in contravention of us being part of the European Union. If Britain is crashing out, or about to crash out, or may never crash out, or take their time crashing out, there is negative sentiment creeping in leaving aside the obvious commercial issues.

Farmers will hurt

Farming is going to hurt. The price of sterling is going down to next to nothing (although exports from Britain would appear to be cheaper for them than imports to Ireland). In early 2017, the British economy began to produce at a high rate of inventory for stock

piling. A lot of Irish companies who are dealing in Britain and importing did the same thing. They are actually mainland using UK companies to do this. This will mean, of course, that as soon as Brexit happens and no more will need to be produced for the foreseeable future. This is going to have a big effect on employment, especially in Britain, and in warehousing in Ireland. This will hurt transportation as well.

The agriculture sector is already reeling over the beef crisis and the fall in the value of sterling. To put tariffs on export or import products for food supplies will have an immediate short term negative impact.

No amount of statistics can work out the true loss to the economy as there are different and variable schools of thoughts. However, the negative sentiment is creeping into people's minds and we are either greed based or fear based. We have gone

through the greed up to the middle of last year and with house prices slipping back, it means that the negative impact is settling in. This means that savings will commence and after that, consumer growth will slow down. Then you have a loss of employment from the high level it is at at the moment.

Work with Britain!

To avoid all this we should be working hard with our British counter parts, even with Boris Johnson, who is flip flopping. We must make sure that our interests are best protected, and our export market, which is substantial in the UK. We need to get back in there and get stuck in and realise that Europe, although we are an important part of it, could leave us out in the cold as we are a small player in an island nation and we are not too dissimilar to our British counterparts.

The blues may lift but it will take time.

The Other Side of the Coin

The Treatment of Repetitive Strain Injuries

Sharing the ancient wisdom that is Chinese medicine



Repetitive strain is now today a very common injury among the workforce, it manifests over a period of time and goes unnoticed but gradually increases with intensity of pain until the joint can no longer function properly.

Rest and seeking out the services of a Traditional Chinese Medical (TCM) practitioner is the way to go if you want to get rid of this debilitating and chronic injury.

Most of us who do manual labour—and make no mistake, computer work is manual labour—we take our hands for granted.

What is RSI?

RSI is actually an umbrella term for several cumulative trauma disorders caused by overuse of the hand and arm, RSI can prove particularly difficult for medical professionals to treat. RSI can affect the fingers, wrists, forearms, upper arms, shoulder, and neck.

The "repetitive" or "cumulative" tag means that the motion, when done in isolation, isn't severe enough to cause damage. But when done repeatedly, without sufficient recovery time, it fatigues muscles and tears soft tissues, causing swelling and pain, and it leads to conditions like carpal tunnel syndrome, tennis and golfer's



elbow, tendonitis, and Blackberry and Nintendo thumb, ohh and lets not forget iphone thumb.

Proper Positions

Because people are continually becoming more and more reliant on computers these days, here is some useful information regarding good hand position.

Learn and maintain a neutral position, with your middle knuckle and the centre of your wrist in a straight line. Your fingers should curve slightly, but your wrists should stay straight. If you sit in a relaxed position and let your hands gently drop to your sides, they will naturally fall into a neutral position.

Now, maintaining this position, bring your hands to the keyboard.

As you type, keep your wrists straight and let your hands float over the keys while you move your arms to position your fingers. Let your elbows relax by your sides instead of "winging" outward.

Do not rest your wrists as

you type, and do not stretch your fingers or twist your hands to reach keys—move your entire hand.

Get up every now and then and clasp your hands together (palms facing outwards) and push your hands out in front of you stretching your fingers and wrists.

Do this a few times throughout the day to get the blood flowing back into those areas and this will also loosen out the joints.

Treatments

Some Western doctors say that RSI is irreversible, that is only because they do not have access to the age-old wisdom from China that is Acupuncture!

I regularly treat this condition in my clinics, the most common one's being tennis elbow, golfers elbow and carpel tunnel syndrome.

Tennis elbow usually affects the manual labour worker more whereas carpal tunnel the person on a computer. In the case of

carpal tunnel syndrome (inflammation at the wrist) Western doctors usually recommend an operation to widen the carpal tunnel, this is a quite drastic approach for a problem that can be quite easily resolved with a course of acupuncture.

I have seen over the years many people who have had this operation and the carpal tunnel syndrome slowly returned several months or so after the procedure.

I see this problem quite often and it really does respond very well to acupuncture treatment, but the big question as always is; "how many treatments do I need"?

Well this all depends on the severity of the problem and how long the person has been suffering, but in saying all that there should be quite good improvements after 5-6 treatments, enough to encourage the patient to continue with the treatment until a complete cure is achieved.

METHOD

- Place the chicken in a large saucepan with the onions, carrots, celery, parsley, bay leaf, peppercorns, and enough water to cover. Bring slowly to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer until the chicken is cooked – about 20 minutes. Remove the chicken from the pan and leave to cool, then dice and set aside.
- · Strain the cooking liquid into a saucepan and boil until reduced to 600ml/1 pint. Add the cream, return to the boil and then whisk in the roux a little at a time to form a thick sauce.
- · Blanch the broccoli in boiling salted water until just tender, then drain and refresh under cold water.
- Stir the diced chicken and broccoli into the sauce and season to taste with salt and pepper. Pour this mix into an ovenproof dish.
- Melt the butter and mix with the cheese and the breadcrumbs. Spread over the chicken mixture and bake in an oven preheated to 180°c/350°F/gas mark 4 for 20 minutes until brown and bubbling.





Emotional farewell for parish priest of **Ballymore Eustace**

An emotional mass for Monsignor John Wilson took place on Saturday night as members of both churches in the parish of Ballymore Eustace and Hollywood turned out to acknowledge contribution he has made during his ten years service as parish priest.

Assisted by Fr Jimmy Prendiville, there were several presentations and many tributes made to Monsignor John, who was somewhat taken aback at the level of support and attendance on the night. With a full host of altar boys and girls and the choir in full voice, both the Parish Pastoral Council of the Church of the Immaculate Conception and representatives from St John's Church of Ireland made special presentations

to Monsignor John. Gus Kavanagh of the Pastoral Council was first to address the attendance and stated this was a special evening, "an occasion to sav 'Cheerio', rather than goodbye to our lovely parish priest, Monsignor John Wilson".

He added: "He came to us from Athy ten years ago and we'd like to thank Bishop Eamon for sending him to us.

He is kind and finds time to talk to all parishioners from the youngest to the oldest among us." Gus also acknowledged Monsignor's rapport with Scoil Mhuire, and noted there was no less than three principals of Scoil Mhuire present for the mass-Mairead O'Flynn, Alan Hobbins and recently appointed principal, Peter Roche.

Fr Prendiville was next up on the pulpit and his 'tribute' had the congregation in stitches! "I'm a little hoarse, having been shouting for 'the other side' in the recent All Ireland football finals, seeing as Monsignor John is a Dub!"

Fr Prendiville noted the Monsignor was the third parish priest he worked with, and he found the latter to be "always a gentleman, always helpful, worked with sincerity and noted for his gentleness. The altar servers used to love serving with him, as it seems he parted with more fivers and tenners. A Hollywood child recently said to me 'Why can't we swap and you go to Ballymore!' The honesty of a child....I wish him all the best - he is not retiring, just stepping back from parish duties so I wish Monsignor John every blessing for the future".

Grania Glancy spoke with Monsignor warmth of Wilson's support and ecumenical services with St John's Church of Ireland.

"You've always supported us and been the best promoter of our fundraising events. As I live close to the church, I often come over for 10am mass. I feel part of this church as much as I do with COI."

Grania then described the bond Monsignor has with the school children at Scoil Mhuire, and how the altar servers love serving with him.

"I sincerely hope you get to spend time doing the things you enjoy in your retirement" added Grania "As you've done a wonderful job here in Ballymore Eustace with both churches". Grania's granddaughter Dowling then presented a gift to Monsignor Wilson from St John's.

Maureen **Evans** and Martina Byrne of the Pastoral Council added further tributes to the above, endorsing the Monsignor's quiet but consistent support in parish matters and his kindness and support to grieving families. It was further noted he traveled to visit parishioners in nursing homes, near and far, in hospital, etc.

Sean Horan presented Monsignor with a painting by Martin Gale of a mare in foal, as the Monsignor has a love of racing and Mrs Eithne Daly, as Ballymore's oldest citizen, made a second presentation. Monsignor was then called on to address the congregation

Monsignor Wilson thanked primarily the regular church goers and mass attendees, the altar servers and noted it was lovely to see some present on the night, especially those who've gone on to secondary level. To parents, he added:

"Thank you for your confidence in letting your children serve with me. They're fun and quickly figure out the difference

between serving at funerals and weddings!

"If children have had a good grounding in church beliefs, should they lose their way in later life, the foundations given by parents and church will help them find their way back.....'

Monsignor noted his 10 years service in this parish was his longest stint as parish priest, having served two years in Dundrum, then as secretary to an Archbishop, with some years in Rome; two to three years in Greystones before going to Athy and then finally to Ballymore Eustace for the last 10 years.

"I don't believe I've ever had a disagreement with a parishioner in my ten years here" concluded Monsignor Wilson "but thank you all, mass goers, altar servers and all those on the Pastoral Council".

A reception was hosted in Resource Centre the afterwards, with a packed hall. Sadly, earlier today, Monsignor officiated at the funeral mass of the late Mrs Kathleen Boland, who was in her 101st year, and it was her wish that the Monsignor would host her funeral mass. God bless to Kathleen and best wishes to Monsignor John in his 'retirement'.

Plant your boundary foundations or tree planting — at the same times as the foundations of your house begin!



Landscap design plans can be drawn up with your architect or engineer

I'm not sure if it's that the councils are granting more planning permissions or that confidence is good but more people seem to be building their own houses, as we have receiving more than our fair share of customers coming to us with their plans for new houses and wanting to get our advice.

Some of these we have worked with the architect and/or the engineer to put the garden and landscape together for elements planning purposes. For the straightforward planning applications, this isn't usually necessary.

Future homebuilders are then looking for advice on how the schedule should run, account taking into seasonality of planting, our advice is always the same: don't worry about lawns or beds or even stonework until the house is built.

The two key things that we advise you do at the earliest possible stage is plant a boundary hedge and invest in some trees. Depending on your budget, go for the most mature ones you can afford -you won't regret this piece of advice, I promise!

When the house is built (we have seen it so many times) and sits on the site with no cover or maturity to help it sit into the landscape nicely. When you have built a house, funds tend to be getting tight towards the end especially when that new kitchen has cost more than you had anticipated, those tiles that pushed you over budget and then when it comes to landscaping you have to wait to get what you need.

That is when you will be thankful that you planted those handful of trees that now give the space some maturity, help the house sit in this position nicely and not

stick out as unfinished.

The boundary hedging marks your site, gives you just that—a boundary which says "this is our home". The benefit of putting it in before building starts is that it has the extra time to grow and mature; even better if you've planted early, should the build take longer than anticipated.

The trees or hedging will grow nicely in that time and I'm sure you have much more to spend the money you can save there!

Hedging plants

Hedging plants are another thing we get asked about on a very regular basis, what hedge gives privacy but doesn't need much maintenance and won't cost a fortune.

To be honest all those things are contradictory because if a hedge gives you the best privacy at the least cost then its fast growing so will need more cutting to keep it at the height you are looking for.

The cheapest evergreen option is usually common laurel, its grows fast, gives great privacy but the cons are that it can grow very wide, taking up space in your garden and does need twice annually cutting to keep it in

Portuguese laurel is easier to maintain but doesn't grow as fast so tends to be more expensive the first day.

Beech hedging is one of my favourites, it is the least expensive of the household hedges but it is very slow growing, semi-deciduous and you need some patience with it but if you are starting a build process getting that in at the very early stages is a great idea.

This will give you a real head start but don't forget it will lose most of its leaves the first year and then unless you are in a windy or wet site, in which case chose something hardier, it will retain a good percentage of its copper leaves through subsequent autumn/winters.

Once the hedging and trees are planted then you can get on with the house itself the lawns and planting will all come when the builders have completely finished and then you can look at all the lovely stone materials, water features and beautiful planting


