IDA SECURE MASSIVE NEWBRIDGE SITE & IDA Ireland

The IDA has confirmed the purchase of a 211 acre site just outside Newbridge, near the new Lidl distribution centre and the Pfizer facility, in a move that is believed will lead to the creation of hundreds of jobs for south Kildare.

It is understood that the sale was facilitated

by NAMA and could be developed into a business park, or for a single large foreign multinational manufacturer, similar in scale to the Intel facility outside Leixlip.

Local TDs Fiona O'Loughlin and Martin Heydon welcomed the €10 million site purchase by the IDA, and each stated the sale of the site at Littleconnell, Newbridge could be a significant boost for the county.

IDA secure 211 acre site near Newbridge

Sale seen as significant boost to South Kildare economy

The IDA has bought a huge 211 acre site at Littleconnell just outside Newbridge, near the new Lidl distribution centre and the Pfizer facility.

It is understood that the sale was facilitated by NAMA and could be developed into a business park or for a single large multinational manufacturer, similar in scale to the Intel facility outside Leixlip. Either way, it is expected that the €10 million spent buying the site will bring hundreds of jobs to the

Local TD Fiona O'Loughlin (FF) said she had heard of a large American firm who might be interested in establishing themselves in the county, and she warmly welcomed the news, saying it would be great for Newbridge and all of Kildare.

The IDA has not indicated if it had a potential enterprise in mind for the site, and at the time going to press, had not responded to an inquiry from the Kildare Post.

Significantly, the €10 million paid by the IDA is more than the entirety of what the IDA spent on all similar land purchases in each of the previous two years.

The enhancement of the nearby motorway and other upgrades to the Naas to Newbridge road was considered key to the attractiveness and development of the site, allowing the IDA to bring potential clients "directly

from the plane". That's according to Deputy Martin Heydon, who has also welcomed the news as "a significant jobs hugely opportunity for Newbridge and South Kildare".

The FG deputy pointed to investment of €110m in the M7 road widening and the €30m Barrow Abstraction Scheme saying it had made the area "an even more attractive location for large multi-national employers".

Deputy O'Loughlin said she believed that rates paid by whatever is established at the site should be kept and spent locally.

Both TDs saw the news as a further impetus for the construction of a second bridge for Newbridge, and the further development of other facilities such as schools and better public


Kildare Fire Service crew members recently took part in a Rescue Organisation Ireland training exercise at Casement Aerodrome hosted by the Irish Air Corps.

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Shock as Kildare golf club closes suddenly

Dunmurry Springs Golf Club near Kildare town, which featured on RTE business makeover programme At Your Service, closed its gates on Tuesday after its debt was sold by its bank to a vulture fund.

Owner Simon Holohan said he made the decision to shut the facility "with enormous sadness."

He confirmed in a statement to members that the club's loan and credit facilities were sold last week by AIB to a vulture fund.

He added: "Without a banking

facility we are unable to continue to employ staff and maintain the course."

Dunmurry Springs Golf Club opened to players in 2005 but had five staff and 200 members up to its

An EGM called by members of the golf club was due to be held last evening [Wednesday] in the club house.

When Dunmurry Springs was first opened in 2005, the course was awarded the accolade of one of the top-10 new courses in Europe by the US magazine 'The Golfer'.

The golf club featured on the At Your Service business makeover programme fronted by hoteliers Francis and John Brennan in May 2018.

The programme heard that the family of owner and general manager Mr Holohan had built a golf course on their farming land over a decade ago after farming in the area since the 17th Century.

Viewers heard thAt the Brennans were brought in to help increase revenues at the facility by getting tenants to rent vacant units.

Mr Holohan said in his statement to members that despite hIS and his team's consistent and tireless work to maintain and

sustain Dunmurry Springs, "the last 12-24 months have been particularly difficult and we have now been given no option but to close."

He added: "I would like to thank our staff who have gone above and beyond to keep Dunmurry Springs going over the years.

"We will meet all our commitments to our staff and we will ensure they are given their full entitlement at what is a very difficult time for them.

"I would also like to say thank you to all our loyal members who have stuck with us over the years and particularly to those members who have worked hard in recent months to help turn things around."

The facility is likely to be sold in 2020 and may re-open under new management, Mr Holohan said.

Construction begins this week on tech hub for Co Kildare

Construction has commenced this week which will see the development of an exciting new tech space for Naas and Co Kildare. The Mid-East Regional Innovation Think Space (MERITS) in Naas, will provide a dynamic space for over 100 technology workers when works are completed in November of next year.

The hub was the successful recipient of nearly €2m funding under Enterprise Ireland's Regional Enterprise Development Fund and is a key objective under the Mid-East Regional Enterprise Plan 2020.

Welcoming the start of the construction phase, Labour's Emmet Stagg stated that the Mid East Regional Innovation Think Space (MERITS) is a project to cluster Irish International new-technology companies. "It will provide workspace technology entrepreneurs and technology businesses specifically those involved in the digital economy, internationally traded services and high-tech manufacturing and will work closely with Maynooth Works which is University's Business Maynooth Incubator Unit. MERITS will provide mentorship and support and through its provision, companies of all sizes will

Mr Stagg stated that work on the project is expected to be completed by November next year.

Chief Executive of Kildare County Council, Peter Carey, praised the vision of everyone involved in getting the project to this point.

"On behalf of Kildare County Council, we are really proud and excited to be driving such an ambitious project for the county and the region. MERITS is one of a number of innovative workspaces that we are developing in partnership with our key stakeholders around the county and

the Mid-East region. MERITS is a purpose built co-working space that will be aimed at tech entrepreneurs and those involved in the digital economy. The hub will work closely with Maynooth University and MaynoothWorks, the Local Enterprise Office and Enterprise Ireland in providing the necessary supports that will allow entrepreneurs and start-ups to scale up".

"Kildare County Council recently conducted a commuter survey which highlighted to us the real ambition of our outbound commuters to relocate and work in the county. As a local authority, we want to meet their needs in this respect and are actively working on the development of additional hubs in the county such as an equine tech hub in Kildare town and a food innovation hub in Athy," added Mr Carey.



HAP scheme delays need to be addressed — TD

It's taking up to nine weeks to process some applications for Housing Assistance Payments (HAP) in Co Kildare, a TD has claimed.

Social Democrats co-leader Catherine Murphy, who raised the issue in the Dáil on Thursday, October 7, called on the Minister for Housing to intervene in the issue.

Dep Murphy said: "The delay in processing applications now averages nine weeks. Kildare County Council is now processing applications made in August. This means that anyone who had found accommodation has to come up with the deposit, the one month's rent in advance, the October rent and now the November rent is due.

"If that was totalled up for most parts of the country, it would amount to between $\epsilon 6,000$ and $\epsilon 8,000$.

"The HAP scheme is paid to people who cannot pay the rent so it does not take a genius to figure out that this is a real problem and people are borrowing money, if they can do that."

HAP is a form of social housing support provided by local authorities. Under HAP, local authorities can provide housing assistance to households with a long-term housing need, including many long-term Rent Supplement recipients.

A spokesperson for Kildare Co Council said: "The current processing time for Housing Assistance Payment applications is 8-9 weeks, this time frame is due to the volume of applications being received."

Tánaiste Simon Coveney, who was a former Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government, replied in the Dáil to Murphy that the HAP scheme was introduced because it provided more security of tenure for tenants and also more security and consistency for landlords as they were dealing with local authorities for payments rather than directly with tenants.

He added: "Last year, 17,926 people moved into HAP.

"It is a big part of social housing supports right now.

"We will see an extra 10,000 social housing units coming into the stock of social housing this year."

The Cork South Central TD added: "And over time we will see less reliance on the private rental market to accommodate people who cannot afford to find accommodation themselves."





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

The Other Side of the Coin

Acupuncture for Restless Legs

Sharing the ancient wisdom that is Chinese medicine



Restless Legs Syndrome is often thought of as an inexplicable movement of the legs at night.

In fact, it is a neurological disorder characterised primarily by unpleasant sensations, particularly below the knees, that result in the movements.

There are many different descriptions of the sensations, among them are: a crawling feeling; a creeping inside the calves; aches and pains in the legs; or pins and needles, a prickly feeling.

These sensations are accompanied by an urge, often irresistible, to move the legs in order to provide relief from the discomfort.

In other words, the distressing feelings include within them a sense that movement will alleviate them; movement usually does help. Since the restless legs condition occurs most often during inactivity, particularly at night, the best relief-getting up and walking around-disrupts sleep. But,

Age Factors

Restless Legs Syndrome mainly occurs past age 50, and affects about 10% of those in that age group; it is particularly common in women.

Poor circulation in the legs-which may result from history of smoking, diabetes, lack of exercise, stress and other factors-contributes to the development of the condition.

Nutritional deficiency, particularly lack of iron, is known to exacerbate the disorder. The syndrome may also occur temporarily during late pregnancy, possibly as the result of reduced circulation in the legs and lower levels of folic acid.

Eating healthily and especially the eating of nutrient rich organic foods will help. Also aerobic type



exercise 3-4 times per week will help the circulation in the legs. related to deficiency.

In traditional Chinese medicine (TCM) the excessive movements of the legs are interpreted as being a manifestation of "internal wind," a condition that is related to liver blood deficiency.

Disturbance of sleep, a common aspect of the disorder, may also implicate deficiency of the heart. The limitation of the movements to the legs, are said to be influenced by the liver-kidney system, suggests

a deficiency of those two organs.

The liver-kidney system is said to deteriorate with aging and to be responsible for many of the disorders that arise with aging, so this relationship may also explain the prevalence of the disease among the elderly.

Please note do not get alarmed when a Chinese medical practitioner talks about deficiency of the kidney or any other organ, this does not mean there is a problem in that actual organ function, we are only talking about a deficiency in the subtle energy of the organ, just enough to cause restless legs or some other disorder.

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

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In season: Mushrooms

N our modern world you can get practically any Lfood at any time of the year, but it is best to eat in season to be in harmony with nature and to support your system the most effectively.

If you look at autumn for xample, it is amazing how more nurturing foods become naturally available, to help ground and calm you and get your immune system ready for the winter. Root vegetables of all colours, wild berries and the variety of mushrooms for me mean autumn cooking.

Mushrooms are especially beneficial for your health;

but only if they are organic, as they detoxify the soils. They have been the object of scientific research for many years and are considered to have valuable immune-building and anti-cancer properties. Some of these phytonutrients beta-D-glucans, fucogalactans, APO (2-amino-3H-phenoxazin-3-one), p-tolyl-hydrazine and

The Japanese varieties are especially valued, but contrary to public belief, the common button-type mushrooms have recently been shown to surpass some



of their more exotic mushroom counterparts (like shiitake or maitake) in terms of immune system benefits. Several recent studies placed button mushrooms at the top of the list with respect to regulation of unwanted inflammation.

Along with extracts from oyster, shiikate, maitake, and white button mushrooms, extracts from crimini

Hedging prices over the last couple of years have been edging up slowly but we really do see the difference this year, most especially with availability. The most obvious of these is the Portuguese Laurel, which is going to be scarce.

We have already sold out of our own stock, and the demand is very high, so this results in us having to bring more stock in and thus, we have to pay the market prices, which are generally higher than what we would set ourselves.

Laurel and beech are also in high demand and the prices have edged up a little too. They are, equally, our most popular hedges, yet very different — beech being slow growing and deciduous (although it does hold on to some of those copper leaves in the autumn and winter); it takes up very little room and is, after the real native hedging like whitethorn, the most cost effective hedging for a residential garden. However, you need a little patience.

Laurel is evergreen, fast growing and relatively

instantaneous, but it needs more maintenance and can get very wide, it is more expensive than beech but you will need less of them as they are wider and denser plants, especially when we start looking at our more mature hedging sizes. When looking at, say, five to six foot plants you will still need three beech plants to the metre — but you could usually get away with only one of the laurel at the same size.

Don't discount, however, lots of other options and varieties available for your garden, including some widely used options like Photinia Red Robin, Portuguese laurel, Grisselinia, Privet and Yew, which are all available in rootballed options.

Alternatively, hornbeam, whitethorn, blackthorn, as well as Viburnum opulus or rosa rugosa as a mixed native hedge, which can be beautiful in its naturalness, are all available bare-root and, to be honest, as cheap as chips—but they are not really suitable options for town and city gardens.

The reason some of the

options are bare-root and some rootballed is because evergreen plants don't survive well as bare-roots. You may see options available in small sizes, but I stopped selling most evergreen hedging plants bare-root some years ago as the success rates at these sizes can be hit and miss.

If the sizes are small enough, then it can be a cheaper option and we do have some of these like smaller box hedging.

Hedging comes in such a wide range of sizes these days from the smaller two to three feet options (smaller again for things like the box hedging for which 8-10 inches is a normal enough size) through to some amazing plants for screening and privacy and instant maturity at eight to ten feet tall.

These more mature sizes of hedging are where we have really made our name and in which we now specialise.

We always hold a range of hedging up to eight feet tall and would usually have several options bigger than that again, providing instant cover, privacy and screening when you need it.

Let there be Light

Statement Lighting makes a real impact and in this week's column I wanted to share with you some information on choosing the right lighting for your home, whilst showcasing some of our stunning statement lighting to watch out for in 2019/2020. A key component for any room, good lighting can enhance your interior space. Lighting to consider is general lighting, accent lighting, task lighting, and lighting. atmospheric Lighting should be chosen to suit a rooms function, avoid glare and create the right mood.

General Lighting

General Lighting should turn a darkened room into daylight at the flick of a switch and is considered the main source of lighting in any room. General lighting can be provided by ceiling fixtures, chandeliers, recessed down lighters or wall lights. Recessed directional down lighters can also be installed in the ceiling and directed to emphasise a specific wall feature.

For a dining room, you could consider a large ceiling pendant or decorative chandelier as the focal point of the dining room. Suspended over the dining room table, it serves as a decorative style element that enhances the beauty of the room. When used in conjunction with a dimmer it can create a soft and glowing atmosphere similar to that achieved by using candlelight. A chandelier over a dining table provides task lighting for the table and accent lighting for a centrepiece.

Accent Lighting

This is for highlighting pictures, bookshelves, wardrobes, mirrors and any other area that needs a bit of extra illumination. For example wall lights can be used to highlight a sideboard or console table. Care should be taken to select wall lights that compliment your ceiling pendant.

Atmospheric Lighting

Atmospheric Lighting is the term used to create the perfect ambience and can also be referred to as mood lighting as it can be easily adjustable depending on the mood required for the room. Wall lights work well in formal dining rooms and hallways. Wall lights can provide both upward and downward lighting. Wall lights should be mounted at a reasonable and comfortable height. Below the level of the top of the room's doorway is a good position as it takes into account a person of average

height

Task Lighting

This is the term used for lighting which illuminates a specific individual workstation e.g. reading, cooking, studying etc.

Reading requires lighting that comes from behind the readers shoulder. This can be done by placing a floor lamp at the right or left of a chair. The bottom of the shade should be located at eye level to avoid a glare.

Studying requires a desk light that is positioned to minimise shadows, veiling reflections and glare. A desk typically would illuminated from the left hand side (for a right handed person) so that there are no distracting shadows or veiling reflections. The eye should be protected from the lamp with the use of a shade.

Supplemental lighting is very important for your kitchen, particularly for work areas e.g. Sink, oven, and counter top. Recessed down-lighters work well here as do fluorescent tubes installed under the cabinets to reflect onto work surface. Down lighters can also be used inside glass cabinets to highlight collection of glassware etc. Picture lights are used to highlight paintings or photo galleries.

Some areas of the home require further attention. Bathroom lighting can be limited due to the many regulations concerning the type of lighting that can be used. The main priority in the bathroom should be safety. The bathroom needs plenty of even, shadow free lighting for putting on make-up, shaving etc. In small en-suites mirrored lights will suffice to illuminate the entire room, but in larger bathrooms a ceiling light or down lighter will also be required.



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

Banbridge ease past Naas in All-Ireland League Division 1B game

Naas travelled to Banbridge last Saturday for their latest Energia All-Ireland League Division 1B game. As has been the theme this winter, the game was played in appalling conditions, with driving rain and an icy breeze making life difficult for both players and spectators.

The story of the game is easily told. With open, runnning rugby not on the cards with the weather, both teams did not have to commit many players to the rucks, thus enabling them to have ample numbers in defence, meaning space and scoring chances were at a premium. A try in these conditions would be a huge score and Banbridge struck for one after just nine minutes.

After winning a penalty on

half-way they kicked for the corner. From the subsequent line-out they went through a series of phases and when Adam Doherty was stopped just short of the line, Ryan Hughes was on hand to pick up and dive over for the opening score. Doherty converted and Banbridge led 7-O.

Naas enjoyed the better of the exchanges for the remainder of the half but only had a Peter Osborne penalty on 30 minutes to show for this dominance. This was awarded for dangerous play by Matthew Laird who led with his forearm into a ruck, which saw him receive a yellow card. From straight on the front of the posts, Osborne made no mistake.

However, it could have been a whole lot better for Naas, as they spurned some decent opportunites to score. On 14 minutes, they turned down a chance of a kick at goal and dispatched the penalty into touch. From the line-out they set up a driving maul but somehow contrived to lose the ball and Banbridge were

able to clear. Then on 30 minutes, Banbridge were again penalised—this time for hands in a ruck—giving Naas a free play. From this Bryan Croke put in a great crossfield kick that Fionn Higgins just failed to gather with a try looking likely. They went back for the penalty and Naas elected to take a scrum which was collapsed.

To their dismay, referee Paul Haycock deemed Naas to be a fault for this giving Banbridge a penalty. In addition, Peter Osborne was just short with a difficult penalty attempt on 24 minutes, all of which meant that Naas trailed 7-3 at the interval.

If anything conditions got worse in the second half and the lack of floodlights meant that visibility was not the greatest, leading to a very stop/start game. Naas lost Fionn Higgins early on to a yellow card but survived the ten minutes of this without conceding, but on 60 minutes Swindlehurst Ben also received a card for a high Doherty tackle, which



punished by successfully kicking the penalty to increase the lead for the home side to 10-3.

However, Naas still have a losing bonus point in their grasp but this was snatched from them on 74 mintues. Despite playing with 14 men—Robin Sinton was the latest player to receive a yellow card, for another high tackle—Banbridge went on the attack

and Adam Doherty launched a high up and under. The ball appeared to be knocked backwards by Naas and then cleared, but the referee saw it differently. Winning their fifth hurling championship this year, Greene admits that everything is going in the right direction for Naas; it's taken a while and it hasn't happened overnight."

"It's been twenty years of hard-work. We've a great structure at juvenile level and that was put in place years' ago by Denis Hanley and John Holmes," says Greene.

"The structure that these two men put in place brought mentor and player alike through it and that "structure is still in place."


Travelling all over the country to play games, Greene knows that their structure is beginning to bear fruit. "It hasn't just happened this year or last year, it's been twenty years in the making."
