



KK1 and KK2 officially launched in city

The National Transport Authority (NTA) and Kilkenny County Council (KCC) have formally launched the KK1 and KK2 bus routes.

The two routes, operated by City Direct and fully funded by the NTA, have seen a volume of nearly 10,000 passengers since the service first began on 18 December 2019, and has received a hugely positive reaction among residents.

With the introduction of Kilkenny's first urban-style bus route, commuters, students, families, visitors, and the elderly are now able to avail of a transport option that covers the entirety of the city centre over the course of 64

stops in total. Routes KK1 and KK2 also provide Kilkenny residents with an environmentally-friendly alternative to personal car use.

Route KK1 runs from Loughboy Retail Park to the N77 Roundabout and serves Upper Patrick Street, MacDonagh Junction, and Castlecomer Road. Route KK2 runs from Purcellsinch to St Luke's Hospital with stops at Dublin Road, Newpark Shopping Centre, MacDonagh Station, Nowlan Park, and Loreto. The routes through the city centre, serving Parliament Street, Market Yard, and John Street Upper. Each route operates every 30 minutes Monday to

Saturday. Services on Sunday operate by the hour, with services every half hour. Late night services operate on Friday and Saturday nights For the first three months, a promotional Leap fare of €1 is in place and passengers are encouraged to visit the pop-up shop at 76/77 John Street.

Brain injury charity needs place to meet

A charity providing community support to 52 people in Kilkenny with an acquired brain injury has no where to hold weekly meetings.

Acquired Brain Injury Ireland helps those who have been released from hospital following falls, road traffic accidents, strokes, assaults and brain infections.

"The need for a clubhouse somewhere in the city to allow the charity to carry out group meetings and rehabilitation programmes is essential,"
Evelyn Norton, service manager with Acquired Brain

Injury Ireland said.

"A day resource service is first and foremost a community where people with a brain injury are encouraged to develop new relationships and interests and to build creatively on their strengths and capabilities," she said.

"In this space, we can provide a client-centred approach, combining a range of cognitive, social, educational creative and rehabilitative activities in a supportive environment.

"The idea of a clubhouse or

meeting place is to enhance self-esteem, independence, community involvement and personal growth.

"It is a place for people to congregate, to be accepted and to work together towards the common goal of re-integration into the community," Ms Norton said.

"At present we have no accommodation for a clubhouse type service which



meetings with a capacity for 10 to 15 people to carry out group meetings and rehabilitation programmes.

sustain a brain injury up to 19,000 per year in Ireland," she pointed out. We provide specialised individualised rehabilitation programmes for people in their homes and communities.

Programmes are developed with the person, their family and acquire brain injury clinical team, supported by a community rehabilitation assistant with goals focused on return to social, educational, domestic or leisure activities.

Lidl Iaunch One Good Club Youth Mental Health and Wellbeing

Lidl Ireland have launched One Good Club, a five-step youth mental health awareness programme for local clubs, developed in partnership with the Ladies Gaelic Football Association (LGFA) and Jigsaw-the National Centre for Youth Mental Health.

The Lidl One Good Club programme aims to increase awareness and knowledge of mental health across the LGFA community. The new initiative offers clubs the opportunity to support all members and engage in activities that can promote their health and wellbeing.

The programme is championed by four One Good Club Ambassadors – Dublin's Carla Rowe, three-time senior

All-Ireland and three-time All-Star award winner; Galway's Nicola Ward, 2019 All-Star award winner; Waterford's Caoimhe McGrath, Division 2 winner in 2019 and Donegal's Emer Gallagher, Full Back on the Ulster Championship winning team in 2019.

The One Good Club programme forms part of Lidl's €2.1 million investment in the fifth year of partnership with the LGFA.

The five-step programme was developed using the '5 a Day for your Mental Health', an evidence-informed framework, made up of simple actions aimed at boosting your mental health and wellbeing. The steps include 'Connect', 'Be Active', 'Take Notice', 'Give' and 'Keep Learning'.

Lidl are calling on clubs across the country to sign up to the first round of

the programme commencing on April 6 over a period of 10 weeks. Participating clubs are encouraged to undertake activities from one of the five a day each fortnight and to capture the moments and share them on social media using the hashtag #OneGoodClub.

Clubs that complete all five steps in the programme will receive official Lidl One Good Club accreditation, as well as gear and kit for their club. Painting Finishes Explained

Choosing the perfect paint finish for your home can be a little daunting so this week I thought I would explain the different paint finishes to suit different surfaces in your home e.g. a door frame, radiator etc. to help demystify the decision process.

FOR YOUR INTERIOR **WALLS AND CEILINGS**

Let's start with walls as there are the largest surface that you will paint. Emulsion is the main paint used for interior walls and ceilings, but you also need to be aware of the finish you would like to achieve.

Sheen major consideration for all surfaces as sheen has a direct impact on how shade looks. Different sheen levels enhance or hide imperfections dependent on the sheen level you opt for. Sheen levels can vary from enhanced matt to soft sheen depending on your required finish. Today matt finishes are still trending with many homeowners as it helps to hide imperfections in the walls and has great depth of colour. As paint colour changes in natural and artificial light and according to the time of time always test your paint colour in your room to ensure you are happy with the colour.

For high traffic areas such as a hallway or kitchen a 3%-7% soft sheen is a



preferable sheen level as it is easier to clean and more forgiving. However, if you just love the look of a matt finish then you could consider a more durable stain-resistant finish like ceramic matt which gives a flat matt finish that is silky smooth yet washable.

Bathrooms tend to require a higher sheen level as flat matt finishes may show water marks and stain easier. You will find some paints on the market today that are resistant moisture and mould resistant, so these are options to consider for a busy bathroom. Semigloss paint stands up the best to water and cleaning and therefore ifs a good choice for childrens bedroom and bathrooms provided there are no imperfections on your walls.

To create a fun feature wall

in a childs bedroom or consider playroom chalkboard paint or magnetic paint to create fun surfaces for playtime.

EXTERIOR WALLS

For exterior walls you need to ensure you use an appropriate exterior masonry paint to ensure it can combat the demands of our Irish weather. Opt for a paint that is mildew and mould resistant and resists dirt pick-up. Ensure you treat any algal growth or mould prior before you paint your exterior walls.

WOOD SURFACES

For wood surfaces you can not use an emulsion paint as it will chip off. Instead you need to use either an eggshell,



Other surfaces that would require a specific wood finish are doors, architraves, skirting, wood paneling and kitchen cabinets. Eggshell tends to have a discreet low sheen to create a calm classical look. Whilst a gloss finish can have a sheen value of 90% which can add an energy to a space.

RADIATORS

When painting your radiators, you may wish to paint them in a contrasting colour to your walls or in the same colour. An Emulsion paint cannot be applied here, but you can opt for an eggshell, satin or gloss finish depending again on the sheen level you like. Gloss paint can be a good choice as it is exceptionally hard wearing and easy to clean. Gloss paints can have a 80-90 % sheen level, whilst an eggshell water based alkyd for metal can have 25% sheen.

FLOOR SURFACES

If you want to update your existing flooring there are a few paint finishes to consider such as oil based paints or water based floor paints. Oil based paints tend to be more durable but have a longer dryer time.

FURNITURE

Today we are all very conscious of environment and upcycling and repurposing items is experiencing major growth as people experiment with creative paint finishes. As mentioned earlier eggshell, satin and gloss finishes can be used on all wood surfaces, but you might also like to try some alternative specialist paint finish depending on the look and style you want to

achieve. Some of the trending paint finishes today to create specialist effects include finishes, chalky paint metallic detail, distressed finish, stenciling and spray paint finishes.

Mismatched furniture can be unified by using one paint colour to create a cohesive scheme.

Alternatively, if you love to embrace bold colours then a splash of bright colour on a statement piece of furniture can brighten a room and create a stunning focal point.

TOP TIP

Primers can make or break your decorating project. Make sure to use the relevant primer for your paint finish to achieve a hard-wearing finish.

Don't let landform development erode your Leaving Cert points

he Leaving Cert Geography course by its very natures is broad in content and depth and can be a daunting exam for

This week I will be giving notes & tips on landform development in Ireland. The topic of landscape development will be this week's topic on the REVISE.ie column. The table right (FIG 1) shows how frequently the topic has appeared as 20 marks part a's & 30 mark questions.

Students have a degree of choice when it comes to landform development. Students will always be offered a choice when it comes to answering this type of a question as we can see from the 2017 papers, question 3B. This 30 mark question should be given between 12 to 15 minutes time in the exam but no longer.

Examine the impact of the processes of erosion on the formation of one fluvial landform, coastal landform or glacial landform that you have studied. (30 marks)

This question seems very wordy but in essence students are simply being asked to discuss the role of erosion in the making of a feature of erosion in either a river environment, coastal environment or glaciated environment. Students will have a choice in terms of what environment they chose and a choice in selecting a suitable feature of erosion from that environment.

MARKING SCHEME

Process of erosion named will earn 2 marks – students should name a process of erosion (E.g. hydraulic action) that is active in the formation of the erosional feature they selected. This process would then be explained.

A named landform of erosion will get 2 marks – students should name the feature of erosion & its environment that they intend to talk about.

Examination of all other points will get $13 \times SRP$'s

Credit 2nd process of erosion named for 1 x SRP from examination. All further references to processes of erosion require examination. – This means that if students should name a further process of erosion they will earn marks. All other processes will have

to be explained in order to gain marks.

Credit 1 x SRP for example from examination – if students can give a named example of a feature of erosion from a suitable environment they will gain these marks. This is not tied to Ireland.

Focus of question is on the impact of the processes of erosion on the formation of one landform.

Explanation of processes of deposition o marks – students must stick to the question asked. Some student's believe that by using a meander in the river environment that it will cut down on the amount of information they have to learn. However a meander is formed by both erosion & deposition meaning that it would be hard to speak about its creation in detail as SRP's on

deposition may not be relevant.

Credit a relevant labelled diagram for 1 x SRP. Diagram without labelling 0 marks – A suitable diagram can be useful to gain marks but also as an aid to help you explain how the feature is created.

Creditamaxof2xSRP'sifmerely a description of landform with no reference to formation – again reading the question here is very important. Students must explain how a feature is made & not just give a description of what the feature looks like.

Students need to study & be aware of all three environments and need to be aware of all the different features of erosion & deposition. Students should be able to identify them in pictures and on maps. Today's notes will look at the sea cliff as a feature of erosion in the marine environment.

PROCESSES OF EROSION

These are the ways in which erosion happens in the marine or coastal environment. First up is hydraulic action - this force on the coastline is greatest during storms. Compressed air can create tiny explosions in the cracks. This air is forced into the crack by incoming waves. Abrasion occurs when sediment carried by waves are hurled against the coastline, breaking it away, while attrition happens when material carried by the waves crash & knock into each other, rounding and smoothing them. Solution is a process of erosion caused by the chemical reaction between sea and rocks.


SEA CLIFF

A cliff is a steep, sometimes vertical, rock face found along the coastline. Examples include the Cliffs of Moher in count Clare. A cliff develops when a notch is formed by the processes of erosion near the high water mark. The notch gets bigger until the overhanging rock collapses - and a cliff is formed. As the cliff retreats inland, a wave-cut platform and a wave-built terrace are formed.

A wave cut platform is a flat surface in front of the cliff. It acts as a brake to slow down wave action thus preventing further erosion. A wave built terrace is created from loose material that falls from the cliff and gathers at the end of the wave cut terrace.

It slows down incoming waves thus reducing further erosion. Eventually this will make the cliff inactive.

An inactive cliff often has vegetation growing from it. Softer boulder clay cliffs are the most impacted by erosion. For more make your way to www.REVISE.ie!

Your second six months of financial targets for 2020

s promised last week, my final instalment of things to do in the second half of 2020.

And, the goal of having something to do each month is to create triggers that remind you about what you should consider doing in a particular month. ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, my father was diagnosed with an illness last year, which meant we had to alter his property to accommodate him. He's due to pay his property tax this month and I'm wondering will the alterations made change the amount he has to pay i.e. will he end up paying more?

A: You'll only ever end up paying more if the improvements made, add to the value of a property, and they bring it into another band. If they don't, then the LPT amount remains the same.

However, in your Dad's instance, because he was forced to make changes to his property, to make it suitable to his new situation, rather $than \,paying \,the \,same \,or \,more$ LPT, he may not have to pay anything at all.

If the cost of carrying out the work was greater than 25% of the value of his property, before any adaptions were made, he will be exempt from paying the

So, if for example his property was valued at €150,000 before any changes, and the cost of work is equal to or greater than €37,500, he will be able to secure an exemption from paying LPT.

And this exemption will remain in place until the property is either sold or your Dad no longer occupies it as his main residence.

If the cost of work is less than 25% of the value of his property, but it increases the value, he may qualify for a reduction when declaring what the market value of his property is.

He can reduce the value by €50,000. And whilst this won't eliminate the cost of his LPT altogether, it could reduce his annual cost by c.

Tanya did brilliantly on her weight loss but it was her ability to kick her behavioural addiction to her 12-can-a-day habit of Coca Cola - first came the caffeine withdrawals, then headaches, then jitters, then cravings.

In fairness to Tanya she has pushed through and substituted her cravings with distraction and water. It worked.

If you have a fizzy drink habit that offers little nutritionally then it's time to take the plunge like Tanya and move away from the risks of diabetes.



Top Tips

Managing temper tantrums

- * Keep how you react in a certain situation the same once you have found a positive system that works
- * We all learn by repetition. You will have to repeat what you do many times before your child begins to understand this is how you react and how we should react generally.
- * Prevention is better than cure: Know your toddler. While it is important for each child to face challenges, know your child's limits look for and be aware of triggers.
- * Create diversions. Distraction is a parent's most used tool!
- * Choose your battles -Ignore minor issues
- * Say No and mean it. Don't reward the tantrum because you don't like seeing your child upset.
- * Don't worry about embarrassment – Know that any parent that sees you with a toddler having a tantrum will empathise because we have all been there
- * Finally, parents need to remember that we are not infallible. We will make mistakes, but we will learn from them too. And once we can display a positive reaction to any situation, our children will learn this skill too.

Learning through play

CHILDREN learn through play. It's their language. As they roll around on the ground, play pretend games or paint and draw, they test their physical strength, they set up problems and they find solutions; "Teddy has a broken leg, we must find ways of making teddy better". As they talk, move and have fun, children are constantly learning. Their imaginations are expanding and they are learning how to relate with others.

When a child feels understood and appreciated by their parent during play, their negative behaviour decreases, their confidence increases and this in turn makes them better able to make and keep friends. The most important first step when playing with your child is to follow their lead. Let yourself be guided by their ideas and imagination but

still get involved yourself. You'll find that when you sit back and follow your child's lead, you give them the chance to use their imagination and express themselves through play. Once we, as parents, are interested and attentive to our child's play, they become much more involved and interested, which supports their creativity. By dedicating short, regular and specific times to play with your child, you are providing an opportunity for the $development\,of\,their\,confidence$ and communication skills. It is also a lot of fun, which is an important part of building a strong and healthy relationship with them.

Some useful things to bear in mind when playing with your

* Let your child lead the play.

You may have to be a witch one day, a Gruffalo the next so just roll with

* Let them change the game and for younger children let them change the rules - they need to feel ownership of it

* Listen and respect their activity. Try to avoid testing questions such as 'what is this?' What colour, shape, size etc. is this?'

* Be attentive and help with the game without taking over

* Play regularly with your child so they know you have this special time together

* Allow for experimenting and mistakes

* Appreciate and encourage your child's efforts

* Don't compete with young children; this can discourage them from wanting to play with you

* Young children need to win more than they lose

As well as toys that you can buy such as sets of animals, toy people, cars, blocks etc., remember that paper and paint, water and sand, mud, pots and pans, pegs, wooden spoons, wooden blocks, old clothes to dress up, boxes of all sizes and shapes give children hours of fun.

Let your hair down, have fun with your child and you will understand exactly why Einstein described play as 'the highest form of research'.

Take sunshine vitamin D for your health

S we slowly struggle our way through _winter and sunny spring afternoons are only a dream yet, we need to think of supplementing with some "sunshine vitamin", namely vitamin D. Its deficiency is a well-known risk factor for rickets, and some evidence suggests it may increase susceptibility to autoimmune diseases such as multiple sclerosis (MS). rheumatoid arthritis and type 1 diabetes, as well as

certain cancers and even dementia.

Vitamin D deficiency is a growing epidemic across the world and is contributing to many chronic debilitating

Vitamin D is actually a "pro-hormone," which your body produces from cholesterol. Because it is a pro-hormone, it influences your entire body's multiple repair and maintenance functions. We have about 25.000 genes in our body. When you consider the fact



In Ireland, studies have shown that children (and adults) in Ireland have low levels of vitamin D which can results in weak bones

that vitamin D has been shown to influence nearly 3,000 of them, the bigger picture of its true impact on your health can be easily understood.

 $Just\,one\,example\,of\,an$ important gene that vitamin Dup-regulates is your ability to fight infections. It produces over 200 $antimic robial \, peptides, the \,$ most important of which is

cathelicidin, a naturally occurring broad-spectrum antibiotic. This is one of the explanations for why it's so effective against colds and influenza. Vitamin D also modulates (balances) your immune response; it can prevent an overreaction in the form of inflammation, which can lead to a variety of allergies, asthma and autoimmune disorders, such as Crohn's disease.

Vitamin D receptors have been identified throughout the human body, and that includes your brain. One study found that people with the lowest levels of vitamin D were 11 times more prone to be depressed than those who had normal levels. Vitamin D deficiency has previously been implicated in both psychiatric and neurological disorders. Researchers believe that optimal vitamin D levels may enhance the amount of important chemicals in your brain and protect brain cells; improves your brain's detoxification process and remove mercury by radically increasing an intracellular antioxidant; called glutathione. All these wonderful properties play part in the prevention of dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

In the summertime it is easy to get adequate Vitamin D, once you expose 40% of your body. In winter months – and let's be honest most months in Ireland, we need to supplement. But reaping the health benefits of vitamin D is dose dependent, meaning you need to make sure your levels are within therapeutic range to benefit. And this range is far higher than previously thought and way higher than the recommended daily allowance established. Based on the most recent research, the current recommendation is 35 IU of vitamin D per pound of body weight. Therefore, for a child weighing 40 pounds, the recommended average dose would be 1,400 IU daily, and for a 170-pound adult, the dose would be nearly 6,000 IU. It is best to get your GP or practitioner to check your levels regularly, especially if you have any health conditions.

Olive trees ideal to thrive in Irish climate

So many varieties and different looks for your garden

One of my favourite trees to use in designs are olive trees, they have never lost their appeal and their classic look makes them so easy to use but with their different types, you can create lots of different looks.

Our climate is perfect for growing olive trees as they are hardy to around -15C and can be grown in Ireland without a fleece to this temperature. In fact, they need at least three months of the year at a cold temperature to flower and in turn fruit. They don't mind the wind and can tolerate some drought so they are the perfect tree for gardens where low maintenance is a priority.

CHOOSE AN OLD, 'GNARLY'

They are slow growing and reasonably compact so are ideal for a small garden or on a terrace and their evergreen green-grey foliage is a great lift to a garden. Being drought

resistant they are great in pots too but do need a good fertiliser to help them create the energy to flower.

Now you have been sold on the olive tree it is time to decide which shape and size you would like, the options are numerous; from old trees with large really wide old trunks so big that it isn't possible to get your arms right around them. They are amazingly mature looking and we have these available up to 4metres tall but still with a relatively compact head so these work nice in a large planter surrounded by low growing lavender. We also have the same kind of size tree but slightly more gnarly with a higher root bulb and a real quirkinesses to them, they give great maturity and character to a garden.

The next options is a medium sized tree so a good sized stem but not as 'trunky' as the two above but the heads on these tend to be wider and looser and give

really depth of foliage, great for lining along a smaller garden and giving texture without too much height, so not blocking light. I was in a garden this morning that we planted last Autumn, a city garden that we used Olives as the main tree foliage against a dark grey pained background and lit from underneath they create a stunning look and can then be under planted with pops of contrasting colours of blues and whites or go a bit bolder with some real pops of colour.

POTTED SMALLER TREES

Another option is smaller trees that work well at a door or entrance or in a smaller pot, the heads on these tend to be pruned tightly to create a small ball shape but will grow and loosen if you allow them. The last option is the bonsai or Niwaki cloud pruned trees and these really do need to be seen to be appreciated. Several stems come from the base and have cloud pruned foliage all the way up, they are a work of art

and a stunning specimen in your garden.

FEED THEM!

Your olive trees will benefit from a good feed which is high in potassium, phosphate & magnesium which will enrich the soil and encourage good growth and flowering, use in May and then again in October and water in well. If the winter has been a harsh one then a fast release fertiliser like a simple tomato food will have themlooking good as new and replacing any lost leaves. They need good watering in the summer months to keep them in their optimum health and especially if they are pot grown.

Like most evergreen trees, olives do well if pruned well although avoid pruning until the last of the Spring frosts and don't leave to late in the year either as this could leave the tree exposed to early frosty mornings. Pruning increases that chances of fruiting and in a good summer and the right

conditions you may get Olives but as we don't get quite enough summer heat you will need to pick them in September/October before the first frosts.



Without the financial assistance of the Arts Council many festivals and activites in Kilkenny could not go ahead.

Kilkenny Arts Festival, the Watergate Theatre, Barnstorm Theatre Company, KCAT in Callan and many more receive annual grants.

And more people in more diverse communities across the country will benefit from investment of €80 million in the arts this year, the Arts Council has

said

The state agency for funding and developing the arts said money it invests under its new plan would help break down barriers to accessing the arts and improve the pay and conditions of the artists.

Arts Council Chair Prof Kevin Rafter said the Council is working to improve the pay and conditions of artists as well as ensuring everyone has the unique personal experience that comes from the arts.

Increased public funding allows

the Arts Council to assist artists at every stage of their careers while removing barriers that prevent people engaging with and participating in the arts such their socio-economic background, location, ethnicity or through lack of accommodation.

The Council wants to strengthen key arts infrastructure and organisations in their ability to develop and create great work for a wider public and put in place measures alongside awards, schemes and bursaries to improve conditions of artists.

The Council said it would invest €36.8 million through its Strategic Funding programme, including grants to sustain and develop the arts through key organisations. Some €14 million will be invested through in projects and programmes, including Arts Grant Funding, Project Awards, Open Call, and grants for hundreds of productions, touring and festivals.

I love using apple cider vinegar whenever I can. It has to be Long Meadow's version with Mother for me. I find it great for joints and general well-being. I take it every day diluted in water. The McKeever grow the apples in the orchard behind their house in Armagh.

They make the most wonderful cider, juices this vinegar. Find stockists at www.longmeadowcider.com

The fresh herbs are a must, so try to grow some in pots to have whenever you need



4 free-range chicken breasts 100ml rapeseed or olive oil Juice of a lemon 3 tbsp apple cider vinegar 3 cloves garlic pressed Handful fresh basil chopped Handful fresh parsley chopped 1 tsp fresh rosemary chopped 1 tsp fresh thyme chopped 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp ground black pepper

METHOD

Whisk together all ingredients except the chicken to make a marinade. Poke the chicken all over with a fork so it can absorb the marinade. Place the chicken in a dish, or zip-top bag and cover completely with the marinade. Let it marinate for up to 4 hours, with a minimum of 30 minutes. Heat the grill to a medium heat and brush with oil to prevent sticking. Place chicken on the grill and cook 4-6 minutes per side, depending on thickness. Let rest for 5 minutes, then serve hot.

This recipe is great for dinner with potatoes and vegetables or with salad and good bread. It also works with couscous and roasted vegetables.







MY first glimpse of BMW's latest 3 Series was a preproduction model to demonstrate what the finished car would probably look like. Such models never end up being the finished article as many tweaks and turns are made to the exterior and interior before full production models roll off the line and find their way to showrooms.

But this preproduction model was drop-dead gorgeous in every respect, both outside and in. Since then, changes have been made to make it even more attractive.

This is the seventh generation of the 'globally successful ambassador for driving pleasure in a premium midsize car', to quote BMW.

It benefits from significantly enhanced sporting prowess, a new language, extensive refinements to its premium ambience and what the brand call 'trailblazing driver assistance, operation control connectivity technology'.

Exterior highlights include a modern design with precise lines and contoured surfaces, with sporty proportions, a large BMW kidney grille with single surround for the two elements, a new interpretation

of the LED twin headlights, sporty T-shaped air intakes, and a twin-pipe exhaust system.

The car comes with wider front and rear tracks, a longer wheelbase, lower weight (up to -55kg); body rigidity has been increased by up to 50pc, has new shock absorber technology, and M Sport differential (optional).

The cabin is upmarket and inviting. And snug. The layout is beautiful and the cockpit driver-focused. The use of high class with very precise materials workmanship is very evident throughout. Newly designed leather seats hold you in nicely and the driver's has power adjustments.

There's more front shoulder and $elbow\,room, it \'s\,easy\,to\,get\,in\,and\,out$ of the rear as doors open wide, and there's now greater legroom there. But very tall people find it difficult to sit comfortably in the rear and there's very little room in the middle seat and there's a high tunnel to contend with.

Features include a new sports leather steering wheel, a new panel of buttons for light functions, new design for the gear selector and the control panel around it which includes the iDrive Controller knob that is easy to use for media, communications, navigation, maps



etc. The colourful navigation takes up the whole central console screen and you can also see your directions displayed on the instrument panel in front of vou.

Other highlights include a larger Head-Up Display, a digital key.

The car has an expanded range of services from Connected and Connected Drive. Buttons can be used to call up menus or to select menuitems and settings. Some functions of the iDrive can be operated with the touchpad of the controller.

Remote software upgrades keeps the car up-to-date and you can access the car and start up the engine via your smartphone using the Digital Kev.

LED interior lights are standard, ambient lighting with a welcome light carpet comes as an option. Six speakers are also standard but there's an optional Harman Kardon surround sound system with 16 speakers. Two USB ports and Bluetooth interface are provided but a wireless charging area is an option.

The spec also includes the instrument cluster with screen size up from 2.7 to 5.7 inches and Control Display with screen diagonal up from 6.5 to 8.8 inches. You can opt the BMW Live Cockpit Professional which comes with a fully digital 1.3-inch instrument cluster and 10.25-inch Control Display.

Boot capacity is 480 litres and there's a storage area below the boot floor as the car is fitted with run flat

Inside, you sit low in the car which makes for a more exciting drive. There's plenty of oomph in the engine and you'll just want to keep on driving. A small crib, though, is the thickness of the steering wheel. However, it gives great feedback to the driver when on the road.

New powertrains have higher output, greater pulling power and improved efficiency. Six engine variants are offered, four-cylinder petrol models, four-cylinder diesels, plus six-cylinder diesel unit with outputs ranging from 150hp to 265hp.

My car was the ultra-sporty 320d M Sport saloon with 190hp and matched to an eight-speed Steptronic transmission, max torque is 400 Nm, 0-100km/h takes 7.1 sec, top speed is 240km/h; combined fuel consumption is around 4.7-4.4 L/100kms, Annual Road Tax is €200.

The dynamics are noticeably sharper due to the upgraded chassis technology, damper new technology, the stiffer body structure and suspension mountings, wider tracks (front and rear), the car's weight loss, low centre of gravity and even 50:50 weight distribution. There are five driving modes to choose from.

An array of driver assistance systems paves the way to automated driving. Some come as standard, but others are optional extras and the car can park itself with the Parking

Assistant system.
While the 320d M Sport is priced at €49,213, my car came with a big amount of extra options and packs which took the car as tested, to €59,286.82. Prices include VAT and







Glory days as titles 1,2,3 come to Kilkenny

What a weekend of club hurling as three Kilkenny sides hit the jackpot in Croker Park and take home titles, writes **Ashling Dalton**



Shamrocks from Ballyhale won their eight All-Ireland club senior hurling championship title on Sun

ilkenny clubs have enjoyed their fair share of success in the All-Ireland club series over the last two decades and beyond.

However, none more so than the men who come from the South, Shamrocks from Ballyhale.

Has any other club held such a monopoly over the competition? The answer is a resounding no.

You only have to look at Shamrocks current haul of titles

STAND PROUDLY

They stand proudly at the top of the hurling Roll of Honour with a whopping eight titles, having contested nine finals.

That is a remarkable strike rate by any standard.

Birr of Offaly and Portumna of Galway are next in the honours list with four titles each.

Nobody, really, has come close to the flying southerners.

It can also be argued that no other club boasts as many All-Ireland winning captains with their county.

Ballyhale have a total of six senior winners within their ranks.

Liam Fennelly has the honour of being captain of Kilkenny twice in glory years in 1983 and 1992. He is the only man to have lifted the old and new MacCarthy Cups.

His brother, Ger captained Kilkenny to victory in 1979.

In the Brian Cody era, fans have seen Henry Shefflin (2007), James 'Cha' Fitzpatrick (2008), Michael Fennelly (2009) and Joey Holden (2015) lead Kilkenny to MacCarthy Cup wins.

LED BRILLIANTLY

Michael Fennelly was looking to add to his impressive CV by captaining Ballyhale to their eight title. He did!

Sunday's success was the first time Shamrocks put wins back-to-back.

Fennelly led the team brilliantly, and was an inspiring force in the heart of the defence. What a warrior. What a man.

He has pushed his battered and bruised body beyond all reasonable limits, and he is still a force.

In the opposite corner in the final on Sunday in Croke Park were Tipperary champions, Borris-Ileigh. It was the first time the senior club championship produced a Kilkenny versus Tipperary final.

Borris-Ileigh won the club championship in 1987, so they were looking to bridge a huge gap.

They had swept all before them in Munster before seeing off last year's losing finalists, St Thomas (Galway). Led by the gifted Brendan Maher, they had proven themselves to be good, very

Ballyhale had lost midfielder Conor Phelan to a crucial ligament injury before the semi-final against Slaughtneil (Derry).

On the plus side, the long striking Richie Reid used his holiday leave from duty with the Irish Army in the Lebanon cleverly and was available for the semi-final and final.

Good and bad news for manager Henry Shefflin and his selectors, Richie O'Neill, Patrick Phelan and Tommy Shefflin (trainer).

There was a change in the midfield pairing for the final. Patrick Mullen came on in place of Conor Walsh.

HUGE NUMBERS

Sunday was a crisp and clear day in Croke Park. There was an usual feel having the All-Ireland club finals so early in the year, but fans turned out in huge numbers and the attendance swelled to nearly 26.000.

Usually we would be looking to St Patrick's Day in March for these finals.

One of the big talking points surrounding the game were the potential clashes

between Brendan Maher and TJ Reid, and Paddy Stapleton against Colin Fennelly.

Whoever won these battles could decide the outcome, serious talk suggested.

Jerry Kelly scored the first point of the day for Borris-Ileigh. There was definite nervousness on Ballyhale's side as bad deliveries were going straight into Brendan Maher's hands.

TJ Reid managed to settle the nerves with a point. However, Borris-Ileigh were not here to play the understudy.

Full-forward Kelly shot three points in-a-row to energise his team. Patrick Mullen added to Ballyhale's tally with a point.

A BIT SLOPPY




