

Katie's excellence is recognised at ceremony in UCC

A Kilkenny student recently received a prestigious award at a ceremony held in University College Cork (UCC).

Crisis Café – a calming port in stormy weather

t's stormy times as we enter the unknown and we need to be mindful of one another. Mental ill-health affects us all at some stage in our lives and it is important to remember that and be kind to those in distress.

On Tuesday, I was at the launch of the Feasibility Study for an Out of Hours Crisis Café in Kilkenny. Commissioned by Lifelinkk, it's a study undertaken by Workhouse Union and financed by Kilkenny LEADER Partnership.

The Crisis Café Kilkenny Feasibility Study explores aspects of developing a self-referral, non-clinical out of hours services and support for people presenting with a mental health crisis in Kilkenny.

What defines a Crisis? According to the feasibility study, a mental health crisis is $described \ as \ feeling \ unable \ to \ cope$ or control a situation. In times of crisis, people need empathy, support, social interaction, a warm welcome and help.

MENTAL HEALTH

Deputy Malcolm Noonan, attended the launch in the capacity of his first official engagement as our new TD. He was delighted to officially launch the publication, especially with his back history in helping with mental health initiatives.

As one of the founding members of Lifelinkk, Noonan said "with this virus, we need to be mindful that self-isolation is going to be challenging on our mental health. We have to watch out for each other over the next couple of months and be careful of all the noise that is out there." Why did the idea of the Crisis

Café come from? The motivation to explore the crisis café model was in response to the high demand on current services, the inadequate out of hours support and the negative experiences encountered by people accessing mental health supports through A&E.

Dr Mike Watts who came up with the idea of the crisis café said at the launch, "I want this Café to become a port in stormy weather. I hope Kilkenny will eventually become like Finland and Norway where no medication is used for mental health".

In addition to the speakers, there was also moments of music and poetry. According to Trish Finnegan of Lifelinkk "it is also important when launching something as serious as the report to lighten the event a little, so we included the music and the poetry to lift the spirits and remind ourselves that life is for living.

Through collaboration we can make the lives of those who are struggling a little better.

Car owners warned over 'white gold' theft incidents

Gardaí in Kilkenny have warned that motorists are being targeted by thieves seeking the palladium in their vehicles' catalytic converters, with three stolen here in recent weeks.

Palladium, known as 'white gold' due to its value as a precious metal, is used in cars' exhausts to convert gases into less harmful gases. However, thieves are taking their time with their crime as they jack up cars and remove the converters.

"There has been a sharp

rise in the UK and Ireland over the last 12 months of Catalytic converter theft from cars," report gardaí.

They are warning people to be vigilant for suspicious activity around parked vehicles. The advice is to park in a well lit area in a conspicuous manner, and speak to garages about having a theft deterrent cover fitted.

Local kids are tops at VEX IQ Robotics competition

Around 400 primary school children from across the region descended on Institute of Technology Carlow last Friday to participate in the VEX IQ Robotics competition.

Bhride Scoil Paulstown (pictured inset) were among the winners on the day, taking home prizes when they awarded second place in both the Team Alliance Challenge and the STEAM art competition.

Kilkenny was represented by two schools in the competition — Scoil Bhríde Paulstown and St John's Senior School. They joined schools from Carlow, Laois and Kildare on the day and prizes were awarded to five schools for the best robots and an accompanying STEAM poster competition.

ROBOTS

The budding engineers had been preparing for the competition since last October and spent months building and enabling their own robots to participate in the competition, which was organised by the Institute's Student Services and assisted by a team from the Faculty of Engineering, the Computing Services Department, Estates and the Sports Office.

IT Carlow's sports hall was a cacophony of air horns, chanting, clapping, cheering and lively commentary as the various schools took to the 'arena' at their allocated times.

The participants were required to operate their robot, using both driver control and the autonomous programme they had written.

sessions, the schools enjoyed a fun science demonstration and tour of the campus and enjoyed meeting academic staff from various faculties.

"Hosting the VEX IQ Robots competition at IT Carlow during Engineers Week was appropriate as we want to create a passion for STEM and a new generation of innovators" said David Denieffe, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, Institute of Technology Carlow.

Ossory Youth calling for mentors

A lot of us have heard about the "One Good adult"-it has been shown that the presence of one good adult in a young person's life has a positive influence on their mental health.

Be it a parent, mentor, teacher, football coach or school bus driver, we all have a role in supporting the young people around us. As part of the Mentoring Programme that run in Ossory Youth we have seen first-hand the impact the 'One Good Adult' can have on a young person's life.

When a young person is struggling to cope with an issue, what can we do to help? That was the question Ossory Youth asked ourselves in 2012 when we were finding that more and more young people were looking for an individual and supportive space to work things out.

As an organisation Ossory Youth felt that they wanted to provide another individual support that is different to the traditional counselling route for young people. Mentoring as an approach has been widely used in youth organisations across the globe to give young people a chance to develop a relationship with an adult, separate from parents and teachers, a person who is simply just there to listen and offer friendly and supportive advice.

Since setting up the mentoring programme it has provided much needed support and guidance to over thirty young people on a one to one basis. This support was only possible by the dedication and

commitment of adult volunteers throughout the years, who gave up an hour a week to provide a friendly listening ear to a young person trying to keep up with modern adolescent life.

At Ossory Youth the organisation witnessed young people grow in confidence and self-belief over the years thanks to having someone to help them realise they always had the ability, it just needed to come to the surface. Many young people have went on to join groups in Ossory or elsewhere when the mentoring has finished. Ossory Youth are looking to increase the panel of mentors available.

"We are getting to the stage where we have a waiting list of young people seeking one to one support and we aren't able to provide it straight away," said Eilis Walklett, co-ordinator of the programme.

"We would like to be able to offer the mentoring at the time when it's needed. That's why we are making a fresh appeal to people in Kilkenny to try out volunteering as mentors for young people.

"We are inviting adults of all ages to contact us if they think they might like to try volunteering, even if they're not sure what's involved. We will talk it through with them without any commitment."

Visiting restrictions in place at St Luke's

Visiting restrictions are in place at St Luke's Hospital in Kilkenny to help prevent the spread of infection.

The Ireland East Hospital Group (IEHG) have put in place visitor restrictions at all IEHG Hospitals until further notice as a precautionary measure in order to protect the safety of patients/staff and to help prevent the spread of infection. Children in particular should not visit patients in hospitals.

"We regret any distress or inconvenience these measures will cause to patients and their relatives," said an IEHG statement.

Exceptions to the ban include: Parents visiting children in hospital; partner visiting a maternity patient in the maternity unit; people visiting patients at end-of-life; specific nominated carer/family member assisting with care of confused patients (such as dementia); immediate

family members visiting patients in ICU/CCU. Exemptions are limited to one person per patient only (except where wheelchair and other support for a relative visiting may be needed).

The ban on visitors also applies to patients attending the Emergency Department. The hospital group is appealing to members of the public to co-operate with these necessary restrictions. Patients may use their mobile phone to keep in contact with families during their stay in

hospital while the visiting ban is in place.

"We understand that visiting restrictions may be upsetting for patients and their families, however, our priority is to protect all patients in our hospitals who are vulnerable to infection," said the IEHG.

"We would like to thank members of the public for their co-operation."



St Patrick's Day is probably going to be a little quieter this year, with fears of catching coronavirus leading to the cancellation of the annual parade in Kilkenny, and other towns and cities, as well as other social events.

It's a good reason to stay at home and cook a nice dinner to mark our national day.

Bacon and cabbage really is the traditional Irish dinner and perfect for our national holiday.

Chef Tom Comerford at the Kilkenny Ormonde Hotel has generously shared his take on the traditional dinner with us. Thanks to his top kitchen tips and flavours your St Patrick's Day dinner is sure to be a winner!

TOM COMERFORD'S BACON AND CABBAGE

INGREDIENTS

2kg bacon loin 1 carrot 2 celery sticks 1 whole leek 1 teasp. peppercorns 1kg finely sliced cabbage 2 tablesp. Irish butter

TOPPING

2 tablespoon of wholegrain mustard

2 tablespoon of brown sugar Knob of butter

MUSTARD SAUCE

50g butter 25g flour 250ml of cooking liquid 75ml cream



1 tablesp. English mustard Chopped parsley to finish.

CREAMED POTATOES

12 large rooster potato 200 g kerrygold butter 25 ml cream

METHOD

Place bacon in a large saucepan, add the chopped vegetables and peppercorns. Cover with cold water, bring to boil and simmer gently for approximately 25 minutes per kg.

When cooked, remove the joint, keeping your liquid. Remove rind then score the fat, place it on a roasting tray, spread with mustard sugar and butter. Put into a preheated oven at 180C.

To make the sauce, melt the butter, add the flour and mustard and cook for two minutes. Whisk in the 250mls of bacon cooking liquid and cream, bring to boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for four minutes, taste for seasoning then add parsley

to finish.

To cook the cabbage, place it in a saucepan and cover with the remainder of the cooking liquid. Bring to boil, reduce and simmer for three or four minutes. Drain well toss with knob of butter, salt and pepper.

Cook the potatoes in salted water.

When fully cooked, drain and pass through a potato ricer, if you have one, or mash.

Add in softened butter and hot cream, season with salt and pepper.

TRADITIONAL DINNER THE AMERICAN WAY!

Anyone who has been in the USA for St Patrick's Day might have been surprised to be offered corned beef and cabbage as the 'traditional' national dish of the Irish.

Tasty as it is, it's not bacon and cabbage, so did 'bacon and cabbage' get lost in translation when Irish people immigrated?

The reason for the menu change is said to date back many, many years, to a time of mass Irish immigration to the USA.

The first generation of Irish-Americans were in search of the comforting taste of home bacon and cabbage. But immigrants were too poor to afford the high price of pork and bacon, then a relatively more expensive meat. Instead, they turned to the cheapest cut of meat available: beef brisket. New York was a melting pot for immigrants from around the world, and the Irish picked up cooking traditions that they blended with their own.

Rather than boil the beef, the Irish adopted brining from Eastern Europeans, which is a way of salt-curing meat. And the corn? Well, 'corned' has

And the corn? Well, 'corned' has nothing to do with corn but instead refers to the corn-sized salt crystals used during the brining process. The corned beef was paired with the cabbage and a new culinary tradition was born.



Invisible Man is well worth seeing




hen I first told people I was going to write a review of this week's new release, 'The Invisible Man,' I was met, rather expectedly, with the jokes. Amongst them, one person beamed 'you should write 'I couldn't see anyone there!', laughing like he had pulled a joke out of the Billy Connolly catalogue. So firstly, I want to assure you I won't be taking that route. So, if you are looking for a pun or two, you won't be able to see any he... - dammit, let's move on.

dammit, let's move on.

'The Invisible Man' is a continuation of Hollywood's new found love for reboots, with the classic novel by HG Wells first brought to the big screen back in 1933, and this time we have Australian director Leigh Whannell taking the reins to give it a more modern touch.

Whanell, who is attached to previous horror/thriller block-



busters such as Saw and Insidious as a writer, is well experienced in the genre, and from minute one, you know the film is in very good hands

The film tells the story of

Cecilia, played by Elisabeth Moss.

We are thrown straight into her unhappy world in an opening sequence that absolutely sets the tone for what is to come in terms of sheer tension.

Cecilia has drugged her boyfriend Adrian (Oliver Jackson Cohen) into a deep sleep in the early hours of the morning, and immediately sets about the process of getting the hell out of there.

Which wouldn't be too difficult in a normal house, but a normal house it is not.

She has to tread a gadget world obstacle course featuring security alarms, passwords and cameras in what I can only describe is a setting you would see in a Mission Impossible meets 24 type of film.

Because it turns out, her boyfriend is a genius millionaire scientist/control freak who has taken every precaution in an attempt to keep her in his clutches.

After narrowly making her escape thanks to her sister Emily, Cecilia finally has some sort of freedom, but matters soon take a

very strange turn. Shortly afterwards she is delivered the news that Adrian has killed himself by his lawyer brother, and that he has also left \$5 million of his vast fortune to her. So hey, it's not all bad.

Except it is; it's very bad.
Just when Cecilia believes her

life is becoming a little bit rosier, events begin to spiral out of control in quite sinister ways. The oven suddenly goes on fire, her blanket is tossed around her bedroom, and she too ends up drugged. Adrian still very much has a pulse, and through his scientific and technical wizardy, he's only gone and made himself invisible in a bid to make his ex's life a living hell, with very tricks more brutal than the last.

A new tinder account and going back on the market would have been less hassle, but, what do I know?

Now on paper, it all sounds a bit over the top, and in the hands of a lesser film maker I may have headed for the exit early.

But this film delivers, for two reasons.

Firstly, Whanell's direction is flawless. He burrows into the quite effective horror trope of less is more, not resorting at all to endless jump scares that we see too often nowadays.

His camera work excels in making the viewer completely uneasy throughout. There is one sequence where the camera is simply moving slowly from left to right while Cecila wanders the house alone during the night. Whanell plays with the audience superbly. He knows he has us in the palm of his hand. Where is Adrian? What will he do next?

Now in a role that requires the lead to portray terror, paranoia, rejection and abuse, Elisabeth Moss is outstanding.

This is a film with very strong themes; in some quarters it has been called the first big film of the #metoo movement in its representation of domestic abuse, and there is certainly symbols of that at different stages, with Moss carrying the flame in fine fashion as she attempts to defeat her own predator.


She is utterly convincing in her despair as her world begins to fall apart from all angles, including one horrifying turn of events that will have your jaw almost touching the floor - you have been warned. She shows all her acting props that were also on display in the hugely popular Handmaid's Tale series.

So, if you're a weirdo like myself and enjoy being disturbed and uncomfortable for two hours or so, then 'The Invisible Man' will be money well spent.


Hey, we might even get a sequel, although, given the film's climax, 'I canny see that' happening.

Save money by making your mortgage green

INCE December '19, two banks, AIB and BOI have launched green mortgage products, and they are mortgages which offer lower interest rates, if a properties energy ratings are an A3 or better.

The reasoning behind the product is to encourage people to become more energy efficient by rewarding them with a lower interest rate.

A BER (building energy rating) rating is an indication of what the energy performance of your home is. And the calculation is based on the energy used to heat your home, water, ventilation and lighting, levels of carbon dioxide emissions from your home, number of people living in the property etc.

The rating goes from A to G, with A1 being the best rating you can get, and G rated houses having the worst energy

efficient rating.
One of the institutions who are offering this discount is Bank of Ireland, and if you qualify, you can reduce any fixed rate product between one and ten years by 0.2%, but it only applies to people who are buying or building a property for themselves, and those buying a property for investment. In both instances the mortgage has to be drawn down by the June 30 next.

It doesn't apply to existing mortgage holders, unless they are borrowing additional monies which will be used specifically to achieve a BER rating of A3 or better. The 0.2% discount is only granted on the new monies borrowed, and not on any existing mortgages secure on the property.

The discount only lasts for as long as the fixed rate chosen i.e. after the fixed rate period expires, you revert to what their variable or fixed rates are, without any further discount applying.


So, what does this discount mean in Euros' and cents.

 $BOI's \, current \, standard \, 5 \, year \, fixed$ rate is 3%, which means you can turn it into 2.80%.

If you borrowed, for example €300,000 over a 25 year term, rather than paying €1,422.63 per month, you'll pay €1,391.62, which is a saving of €31.01. And over 5 years, the saving amounts to €1,860.60.

Before I tell you more about AIB's green mortgage and how you get your properties energy rating assessed and what it will cost, I want to make quick reference to BOI's offering for first time buyers, because it's very good, and I say that for three reasons.

First off, if they are buying a new

property, under regulations that came into effect in November last year, the energy rating of a new build has to be A2. So, if they were choosing a fixed rate, they can request that their mortgage is set up as a green one and avail of that 0.2% discount.

 $My\,second\,reason\,is\,when\,people$ are saving for their 10% contribution, if $they \, \bar{save\ into}\ BOI's\ mortgage\ saver$ account, and save continuously for 6 months' at a minimum rate of €250 per month and a maximum of €2.500, and have €5,000 in this account when they come to drawdown their mortgage, they will be awarded a bonus payment of €2,000.

FTB's are always asking me if there is a particular account, they could save into so they could get a decent return, and my answer is always no, not if they want to save into capital guaranteed accounts which is the type of account they should save into. But with this account and the bonus payment it gives, you're effectively getting a guaranteed return of 45%, because if you wanted to turn €5,000 into €7,000, that's the net return you'd need to

And finally, if a, FTB uses BOI for their mortgage, they will qualify for

their 3% cashback offer. 2% on drawdown and 1% in 5 years' time.

From a monetary perspective, what these three offerings mean to a, FTB borrowing €300,000 over a 25 year term, with the first 5 years' fixed is as

Mortgage repayment reduced by green discount (0.2%) = €1,860.60

Mortgage saver, bonus payment =

Cash back = €9,000.

Total = €12,860.60

The only drawback to the above is you have to use BOI for your mortgage, but if you were going to anyway, then I would certainly take advantage of these bonus payments and monthly repayment discounts.

Okay, back to green mortgage's and AIB's offering.
They are offering a discount of

o.10% but it only applies to their 5 year fixed offering. Which means if you wanted to avail of AIB's green mortgage discount, you have to choose a 5 year fixed rate and the rate they'll will offer you is 2.45%, which is excellent by the

This offering doesn't just apply to first time buyers, any existing client of AIB's can avail of it provided their primary residence has a BER energy rating between A1 and B3 and they have more than 5 years' left on their existing mortgage.

The process of moving to this green 2.45% fixed rate is very simple. You need to complete and sign a mortgage amendment form and return it to AIB along with a copy of your BER certificate, that's it.

If you don't know what your properties energy rating is, the first thing you need to do is go to the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland's website www.seai.ie who have a list of BER assessors in your area. Contact a couple of them, and get a quote, because there is no set fee. I'd expect it's going to cost you somewhere between €150 and €300. The type and size of your property influences the cost. The SEAI also provide a grant of €50 which can be used towards the cost for homeowners who are applying for it for the first time.

If, for example, your property has an energy rating D, is it worth the investment of improving it to an A. And the answer is yes, even with no impact on reducing mortgage repayments, because according to the SEAI, you would reduce energy bills on a typical 3-bed semi-detached property by €1,500 every year.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your auestions ...

Q. Liam, every month I still get a payment into my account which is Mortgage TRS. I use it to help with my repayments. I'm not sure how long I will continue to get this for. Any ideas?

A. You're going to have to plan on making your repayments without the assistance of this payment because it will stop at the end of this year.

The payment was actually due to finish at the end of 2017 but was extended for a further three years. In order to qualify for this

continued payment, you would have to have taken out a mortgage which was used to buy your primary residence between the January 1 in 2004 and December 31 in 2012.

And if you bought a property (your family home) for the first time between 2004 and 2008, you'd also qualify for this payment until the end of the year as well.

The amount you're in receipt of will depend on when you bought your property and whether you were a first or second time buyer. If you bought between 2004 and 2008, your mortgage interest relief is calculated at 30% of the amount of interest you'll pay this year. So, for example let's, assume the amount of interest you pay this year is €2,500, you will get 30% of this i.e. €750 and €62.50 will be either credited to your account each month or your $mortgage\, repayments\, are$ reduced by this amount.

If you're a first time buyer and took out a mortgage between January '04 and December '12, relief is calculated at 20% up to a ceiling of €2,500 if you're single and €5,000 if you're married. Which means the maximum you are allowed receive each month is €41.67 for a singe person and €83.33 for a couple who are married or in a civil partnership.

THOUGHT it's worth putting on the science hat and looking at Positive Psychology this week. Positive Psychology is the branch of psychology that looks at wellbeing.

It has a focus on studying the strengths that enable individuals and communities to thrive.
Underlying beliefs are that people want to lead meaningful and fulfilling lives, to cultivate what is best within themselves, and to enhance their experiences of love, work, rest and play.

Some of my formal training as a

Some of my formal training as clinical psychologist was focused on deficits, disorders and when things go seriously wrong where there is harm or hurt to self and others.

What a contrast. I believe for change to happen we need to embrace strengths, resilience and resources. Additionally I believe we need to be scientific in this endeavour.

So I am happy to be called the Positive Psychologist based on the science.

Drawing on an evidence-based psychology allows us to more confidently use these tools to get the desired outcome of a life filled with meaning and engagement.

Let's look at some of the key areas that you can use to make change straight away.

The Power of Connection

You don't have to look that far. It's not about new people it's about connecting with the people around you. With family, friends, colleagues and neighbours. At home, work, school or in your local community.

In Ireland we are blessed with GAA, soccer, rugby sporting, church and civil society groups who all seek help and support.
They are all made up with people.
Think of these as the cornerstones of your life and invest time in developing them.

Building these connections will help support and enrich you every day. The bottom line is that relationships are the most important overall contributor to happiness. People with strong and broad social relationships are happier, healthier and live longer. Close relationships with family and friends provide love, meaning.

Discover a physical activity you enjoy and that suits your level of mobility and fitness

support and increase our feelings of self-worth.

So taking action to strengthen your relationships and create new connections is essential for happiness.

The Power of Activity

Be active, there is really strong evidence for physical exercise. The old adage 'healthy body healthy mind is true. Go for a walk or run. Step outside. Cycle. Play a game. Garden. Dance. Exercising makes you feel good.



This is a great opportunity to walk, develop friendships, give, learn and help cure and control cystic fibrosis.


These steps to positivity and wellbeing are about how we interact with the outside world

Talking to your children about coronavirus

IF you keep checking your phone for the latest coronavirus updates, chances are your kids have noticed. Parents should be ready to answer kids' questions about coronavirus. If they don't seem interested or don't ask a lot of questions, that's OK too. Just follow their lead. Here's how to help kids understand the news about coronavirus.

1. Choose the Right Time to Talk

Try to avoid distractions. Is there a time each day when you check in with your child and ask how their day is going? Maybe it's on the way to music practice or after childcare pickup. If it's a time when you and your child can focus, use it to talk about coronavirus. But try not to have the conversation too late in the day. You don't want your

kids lying awake at night feeling afraid.

2. Find Out What Your Child **Already Knows**

Ask questions geared to your child's age level. For older kids, you might ask, "Are people in school talking about coronavirus? What are they saying?" For younger children, you could say, "Have you heard grownups talking about a new sickness that's going around?" This gives you a chance to learn how much kids know — and to find out if they're hearing the wrong information.

Let your child guide the conversation. Be prepared for kids to ask questions, but don't offer information before they ask. It's better to have a series of shorter

talks over time than to overwhelm your child with information.

3. Offer Comfort — and Honesty

Focus on helping your child feel safe, but be truthful. Don't offer more detail than your child is interested in. For example, if kids ask about school closings, address their questions. But if the topic doesn't come up, there's no need to raise it unless it happens.

If your child asks about $something \, and \, you \, don't \, know \, the$ answer, say so. Use the question as a chance to find out together. Check www.hse.ie for up-to-date, reliable information about coronavirus. That way, you have the facts and kids don't see headlines about deaths and other scarv information.

Speak calmly and reassuringly. Explain that most people who get sick feel like they have a cold or the flu. Kids pick up on it when parents worry. So when you talk about coronavirus and the news, use a calm voice and try not to seem

Give kids space to share their fears. It's natural for kids to worry, 'Could I be next? Could that happen to me?" Let your child know that kids don't seem to get as sick as adults. Let them know they can always come to you for answers or to talk about what scares them.

Know when they need guidance. Be aware of how your kids get news and information, especially older kids who go online. Point them to age-appropriate content so they don't end up finding news shows or outlets that scare them or have incorrect information.

4. Help Kids Feel in Control

Give your child specific things they can do to feel in control. Teach kids that getting lots of sleep and washing their hands well and often can help them stay strong and well. Explain that regular hand washing also helps stop viruses from $spreading \, to \, others. \, Be \, a \, good \, role$ model and let your kids see you washing your hands often!

Talk about all the things that are happening to keep people safe and

healthy. Young kids might be reassured to know that hospitals and doctors are prepared to treat $\,$ people who get sick. Older kids might be comforted to know that scientists are working to develop a vaccine. These talks also prepare kids for changes in their normal routine if schools or childcare services close in the future.

Put news stories in context. If they ask, explain that death from the virus is still rare, despite what they might hear. For older kids, watch the news with your kids so you can filter what they hear.

Kids and teens often worry more about family and friends than themselves. For example, if kids hear that older people are more likely to be seriously ill, they might worry about their grandparents. Letting them call or Skype with older relatives can help them feel reassured about loved

Let your kids know that it's normal to feel stressed out at times. Everyone does. Recognising these feelings and knowing that stressful times pass and life gets back to normal can help children build resilience.


Importance of switching off

immune system repairs and heals your body while sleeping, especially during deep sleep, between the hours of 11pm to 3am.





POTTER GIG

Mark Campden, a potter whose ceramics are distinctive for the skill of his brushwork decoration and rich in an imagery inspired by nature, will be showcasing his designs at Generation, an exhibition of objects and textiles designed and created using inherited traditions of creativity and innovation.

creativity and innovation.

The exhibition, which will open at the National Design & Craft Gallery in Kilkenny invites us to consider the unique perspective of a group of Irish-based designer-makers who are custodians of craft traditions, continuing and/or reinventing the work begun by previous generations of their families.

Working in the traditional majolica technique, Mark's pieces are first formed in earthenware clay and covered with a white tin glaze while the surface of his work then becomes a canvas for meticulous hand-painted decoration.

INFLUENCE

The influence of his father, renowned potter Edgar Campden, is evident in Mark's own practice, which incorporates the majolica tradition from the Middle East, while Mark's mother Doreen is also an accomplished sculptor and ceramic artist.

Mark will join seven other designer-makers for Generation, all of whom believe that tradition is not static; it is in constant movement.

The exhibition traces ways in which their cultural legacy is defined, or sometimes redefined, as they navigate contemporary studio practices and workshops. Each is inspired by the craft tradition of earlier generations.

Curated by Frances McDonald and Muireann Charleton, Generation explores how generational relationships and personal histories have encouraged an added sense of responsibility, influenced aesthetic considerations and helped shape overall narratives, focusing on the idea that making matters, the exhibition reminds us that within any medium, the importance of making and respect for tradition remains at the heart of these family enterprises.

The Mai all set to fly to Watergate Theatre

Marina Carr's engrossing drama, The Mai, comes to the Watergate Theatre on Saturday, April 18 as part of a nine-venue national tour presented by Decadent Theatre Company. Andrew Flynn directs.

The Mai is an epic tale of three generations of an Irish family inspired by love but shattered by inescapable reality.

Set in the Midlands in the 1970s, it is both wildly funny and humorously tragic.

The play centres on a formidable 40-year-old woman, a teacher known as The Mai, whose husband Robert, a musician, has always felt stifled by her ideals of perfection.

After 17 years he leaves her, whereupon she sets about decorating a dream house in the hope that he will one day return.

From her fairy tale castle on the banks of the legendary Owl Lake, The Mai waits for him by the window. The play opens on the day of Robert's unexpected return after a four-year absence.

Throughout the Mai and Robert's troubled reunion appears the memorable characters that comprise three generations of her family.

They are her two sisters meddling in the affairs of her three daughters with comical tenacity.

Towering above them is the irreverent matriarch, Grandma Fraochlan. She presides over all with her 'ancient and fantastical memory', reminding them that the past is looming over the present.

Until Decadent's 2018 production, The Mai had not had a major outing for more than 25 years.

"I first came across Marina Carr and The Mai in 1994 when I was in college and saw the Abbey production," said artistic director Andrew Flynn.

"I was just blown away by it - I



hadn't seen anything before that threw open a door on 1970s Irish society and the Irish family," he said.

"Through these wonderful characters Marina disputed the notion that family break down wasn't possible. Instead she showed what was actually happening, and how troubled marriages got brushed under the carpet.

"It's a brilliant play because it's grey, not black and white," he added.

This new tour is a revival of Decadent's critically acclaimed 2018 production which the Irish Independent praised as a bang-up revival, bristling with comic energy that feels innovative and fresh today full of depth and passion, The Mai is one of the best Irish plays of the contemporary period.

After seeing the performance in Galway, playwright Marina Carr said: "Iloved the set, the lighting, the music, Andrew's direction, and the beautiful cast. I feel very grateful. It's wonderful to see new life breathed into it.



Tickets are priced at €42 each and are selling fast.









Electric avenue

Peugeot launches electrified range

PEUGEOT Ireland has launched a number of cars under its extensive electrification programme which includes hybrid, plug-in hybrid and the brand's first fully electric car.

Peugeot took a large cohort of motoring journalists to BrookLodge Hotel at Aughrim, Co Wicklow to test drive the new 208, 2008 SUV, together with the new e-208, 3008 Hybrid4 (AWD) and 508 Hybrid range. It proved a busy two days of motoring.

First up was the stylish 208 which we drove from Peugeot HQ at Gowan House on the Naas Road in Dublin to our hotel in Macreddin Village and returned to Dublin in the new 508.

In between we fitted in a local loop from the hotel to Aughrim in the hybrids and the new e-208, the brand's first electric car. It retails from €27,334, inclusive of SEAI grant and VRT relief, and comes with a 100KW (136hp) electric unit with 50kWh battery developing 260Nm of torque for instant response. It can do 0-100km/h in 8.1 secs and has a range of 340kms. The battery is guaranteed for 8 years or 160,000 for up to 70pc retention certifiable by the Peugeot dealer network. The has the same interior and boot space as the petrol and

diesel versions as the batteries are under the floor. The e-208 is the only electric car in its segment which includes Polo, Yaris, Fiesta, i20, Micra and Clio.

The new 2008 really impressed. It is one of the most stylish cars on the road as well as being extremely spacious. Prices start at €23,900 for the 1.2 PureTech 100bhp. There are also 130bhp/155bhp petrols; the diesel is a 1.5 BlueHDi 100bhp from €25,900. The brand's excellent Grip Control is offered and Peugeot have kept a spare wheel in all their passenger cars, except for EV models. An electrified 2008 is due in April with a range of 320kms WLTP.

Built on Peugeot's EMP2 platform which is designed for both ICE and electrified powertrains, means boot volumes of the 208 and 2008 are the same as the ICE versions (487 litres for the 508 and 530 litres for the SW). New driving modes are a Zero Emission 100pc electric mode; an exhilarating Sport mode; a Hybrid mode; and Comfort mode.

The Hybrid4 version of the 3008 and 508 ranges have passed stringent certifications tests under the new WLTP protocol and qualify for the newly calculated grant thresholds now applicable; under new rules, plug-in hybrids must now emit less than 50g/km Co2 and

travel more than 50km in all-electric model to qualify for the €5,000 SEAI grant and €2,500 VRT relief schemes. The 3008 2.0 180hhp automatic is from €42,250, the PHEV 225hp is from €37,995. The 508 2.0 180hp is from €38,100 and the PHEV 225hp is €38,900. Both include SEAI and VRT grants and rebates.

The SUV 3008 Hybrid4 300hp AWD model, available in the top of the range GT Line and GT trims, achieves 29g/km Co2 (1.3 L/100kms) and a 59km range in 100pc electric mode. It combines a 200hp PureTech petrol engine with two electric motors and can do from 0-100km/h in 5.9 secs. The battery capacity is 13.2kWh for a 100pc electric range. A full charge takes 1h45 when using a Wallbox. AWD mode provides improved traction on roads or difficult terrain.

In April, it will be joined by a 225bhp 2WD Hybrid version combining a 180hp petrol engine with a 110hp (80kW) electric motor located at the front of the car coupled to the e-EAT8 8-speed automatic gearbox.

The 508 fastback achieves 29g Co₂/km and 54km in all-electric mode.

The new 508 Hybrid and SW estate Hybrid combine a 180hp petrol engine with a 110hp (80kW) electric motor for a combined power of 225hp. Charging also takes 1h45 with a

Wallbox (optional 6.6 kW charger, 32A).

An eBoxer LCV will arrive mid this year and an ePartner/eRifter will follow next year.

By 2023, 100pc of the Peugeot passenger car and light commercial vehicles range will offer an electrified version.

Commenting on the brand's performance, Colin Sheridan, Peugeot's Sales & Marketing Director said: "Yesterday we were at 81.6pc of the market, today we're operating at 100pc."

Speaking on electric car sales and the confusion among the general public concerning them, he said: "The Government needs to give us clarity re the extension of both EV and PHEV grants going forward; on how it intends to treat the taxation on cars when the full WLTP regime comes into force at the end of this year because we will need to make decisions on model allocations."

He also said that the last Budget, which removed SEAI grants to companies for electric cars, has proved counter productive and quoted sales figures for electric cars year-to-date of just + 100 units (1,084 vs 984 / +10.16pc) to 20/02/2020 which he said should have been higher.

I've attended quite a few car launches both at home and abroad but none like the recent one held by Peugeot.

Five new cars at the same time or 6 if a hatchback and estate are considered different models. They were; the all-new 208 and e-208, all new 2008, 3008 Hybrid and 508 / 508 SW Hybrid. Incidentally, the 3008 Hybrid is the most powerful car Peugeot has ever released with 300hp available via 4wd. (Pity this wasn't around for the sensuous RCZ model). $The \, introduction \, of their \, first$ all-electric car in the e-208 is possibly the most significant and commences in earnest the electrification of the Peugeot range. (They don't consider the earlier iOn their first BEV as it was a multishare with Mitsubishi and Citroen). Following imminently is another all electric offering, the new e-2008.

The 208 hits the forecourts armed with possibly the best skin on a small car in years. It really is stunning looking and

arguably their best-looking small car since the iconic 205. You have the option of the all-electric e-208 version as well. In electric or ICE form there are two metallic colours available that are a no-cost option/choice, the two best colours in my book too, which is refreshingly clever and customer friendly from Peugeot.

The new 2008 loses the curves and gets a load of new creases. It's a much meatier and more purposeful looking car now. Big grilles are the current fashion and the 2008 has a sizeable one. Peugeot has resisted making it enormous thankfully. The 2008 and 208 benefit from a new 3d i-Cockpit. The principle being the most important driver information is in the foreground. I recall Honda doing this before, but Peugeot's is much more realistic.

The 3008 hybrid adds another version to the hugely successful 3008 range. The 3008 was a bit of a game changer for Peugeot and attracted a lot of new conquest buyers. Now with 2wd and 4wd hybrid offerings



they hope to attract a lot more.

Is there a car enthusiast that doesn't adore the 508 - easily one of the most striking cars to hit the road in a while? The SW version maintains

that ethos as well. And, you've guessed it, there is a carbon-correct, hybrid version of both now. The hybrid route Peugeot have chosen for the 3008 and 508 is a plug-in hybrid with all

electric range in the 3008 being 50kms or 40kms in the 508. Peugeot, with their carbon reduction obsession, has led to most of their cars attracting the lowest car tax rates. I drove all the cars and as expected the Peugeot penchant for comfort is ever present. Looks is fast becoming their next penchant.
