# Why hasn't UL president met the whistleblowers?

UL president Dr Des Fitzgerald, like his predecessor, Don Barry has not met the whistleblowers from the finance department



WHEN Des Fitzgerald took over as president of UL in May of last year, he did so full of enthusiasm. Many hoped that the long-running saga of two whistleblowers suspended from the finance department could finally be put to bed.

He started like a man who meant business, quickly meeting numerous staff and students, along with plenty of others outside the university.

In November he lifted the  $suspensions\, of\, the\, employees$ known as Persons B and C. However, a facilitation process aimed at finding new roles at UL for the two  $employees\,has\,ended\,without$ agreement. They have now been instructed to return to their old jobs, even though these positions have long since been filled. Given all that has gone on for over three

years, it is understandable that B and C would dread going to back to the finance department. And they do.

What is baffling is why Dr Fitzgerald has never met the two employees to hear their side of the story. Previous UL president Don Barry also failed to meet them. Was it legal advice? We may never know. But we do know that a sorry saga is still running.

## FG Senator placed largest order on Oireachtas printer

NEW FIGURES have revealed that Limerick senator Maria Byrne placed the single largest order at the publicly funded Oireachtas printing facility, at a cost of more than €1,000, writes Jess Casey.

Ms Byrne, who has been selected to run for Fine Gael in Limerick City in the next General Election, ordered 44,000 A4 colour newsletters at a cost of €1,100 from the facility, according to figures released to the Irish Examiner under the Freedom of Information Act. Ms Byrne told the

newspaper she strongly believes in keeping "as wide a constituency as possible" informed of her work. "It is a vital part of participative democracy."

Speaking to the Leader, Ms Byrne added: "I have a big constituency and I keep in touch with the people in Limerick. I like to get any messages out there and certainly I do it through different means." She uses print, social media and newsletters, she added. "It's important to get the message out there and people expect you to tell them what's going on in the area as well."

## Fire service sees increase in 'ambulance assist' calls

CREWS from Limerick Fire and Rescue service are being deployed to assist ambulance personnel, more than five times a week, new figures have revealed.

Figures obtained under the Freedom of Information Act show crews from fire stations across the city and county provided assistance to the National Ambulance Service on 115 separate occasions between January 1, 2018 and May 31, 2018. The nature of the 'assist calls' has not been disclosed but it

The nature of the 'assist calls' has not been disclosed but is likely the majority relate to road traffic accidents.

According to Limerick City and County Council, there were 180 such calls during 2017; 167 in 2016 and 164 in 2015.

The local authority says no monies were received in relation to the attendance of fire crews at the calls.

# Boy, 14, accused of having stolen gun

**Shotgun:** Weapon and ammo hidden behind fireplace

THE teenage son of a convicted murderer has been refused bail after he appeared in court charged with serious firearms

The now 16-year-old, who can't be named for legal reasons, is accused of suspicious possession of a sawn-off double-barrelled Beretta shotgun and a quantity of ammunition on February 9, 2017.

The weapon, which had been stolen from a house in Dublin two years earlier, was found hidden behind the fireplace of a vacant house in Ballinacurra Weston. The property was owned by Limerick City and County Council.

It is alleged that when questioned at the time, the defendant told gardai he had the gun for his own protection but would not elaborate any further.

Opposing bail, Detective Garda Barry Moylan said the defendant, who was 14 at the time of the alleged offence, was arrested in recent days after gardai encountered him "by chance".

He said gardai believe the teenager left the

jurisdiction sometime last summer – before he could be charged – and that a European Arrest Warrant was issued earlier this year.

"He has actively sought to evade the charges," he said.

The detective told Judge Marian O'Leary that gardai have concerns the youth will return to the UK and will not stand trial if released.

Inspector Paul Reidy said a file was prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions following the seizure and that she has directed that the matter proceed on indictment at the circuit court.

Solicitor Sarah Ryan said while there is a "complex family dynamic" her client's mother would ensure he attends court.

"He's a good child, he respects me," the woman told the court.

Being questioned by Insp Reidy, the woman said she did not know where in the UK her son had been living and that she did not know how long he was back in Ireland before his arrest.

Refusing bail, Judge O'Leary said she was concerned by aspects of the woman's evidence.

She said she was satisfied the youth "is a flight risk" and that it would not be appropriate to release him.

The 16-year-old was remanded to Oberstown Children Detention Campus in Dublin pending the completion of the book of evidence.

# Five-bed close to **UL requests €36K** in rent upfront for academic year

A FIVE-bedroom home, advertising itself as close to the University of Limerick, is requesting €36,000 in rent upfront for the college year ahead.

The Castletroy property, which is currently listed on Daft.ie, states that all rent from this September until May 2019 must be paid in advance per room.

The total rent for a single room is set at €6,500, with €7,500 requested for the ensuite bedroom, according to the listing.

A security deposit of €500 is also required from each future tenant.

This is the first case this year of a property requesting all rent upfront for the year ahead that has been brought to the attention of UL Student Life, the UL student representative body, according to president Ciara Jo

"From a student perspective this would not be welcomed," Ms Hanlon said.

"This method of payment would put increased financial pressures on students and could be a deterrent (or) obstacle for them accessing third level education here in UL," she added.

UL Student Life is to consult with Threshold, the national housing charity, in regards to this property, she added.

The house is advertised as being within walking distance to Hurlers Pub, Castletroy Shopping Centre, banks, schools and of course, (the) University of Limerick."

"Fair usage bills included. They are electricity, gas, bins and internet."

"All mod cons, one shower ensuite. Electric shower in main bathroom and ensuite. gas fired central heating."

The listing states it will not respond to requests to rent for the first semester only.

The listing attracted attention online, with one person on social media saying: "I've carried out work in houses after students lived there. Some of the worst work I've ever had to carry out."

"Obviously not all are the same but a big majority are," the person added.

Another person on social media responded, saying: "Not every student is like that, it's not fair to paint them all with the (one) brush."

"I've known plenty who take very good care of the house they're staying in," they

### Alcoholic lay on road pretending he was knocked down

A CHRONIC alcoholic who lay in the middle of the road pretending he had been knocked down has admitted trying to steal the car after the driver went to get help.

Gordon Ryan, aged 57, who has an address at McGarry House, Alphonsus Street, was prosecuted under the Road Traffic Act relating to an incident which happened at Church Street, Johnsgate, on March 5, last.

After the defendant entered a guilty plea, Sergeant Donal Cronin confirmed the incident, which happened at around 12.40pm, was captured on CCTV.

"It is the most ridiculous and implausible event you will see," he told Judge Marian O'Leary.

He told Limerick District Court that Ryan, who has a large number of previous convictions, slowly lay on the ground directly behind the car as the female driver reversed into a parking space.

After the woman, who believed she had been involved in an accident, left the scene to get assistance, the defendant then "popped up" and got into the driver's seat of the car.

Sgt Cronin said while he did not drive off, he took possession of the vehicle "for a short period of time" and revved the engine.

Solicitor Sarah Ryan said her client was forcibly removed from the car by a "very well built butcher" who returned to the car with the woman a short time after Ryan got in.

She said the defendant was "playing the eejit" and that he "more than met his match" on the day.

Ms Ryan said that her client was anxious that the CCTV footage of the incident be shown in court to show how foolish and stupid he had been.

"It doesn't do him any favours," she stated.

While the video footage was not shown in court, Judge O'Leary described what happened as a "nasty offence".

She said it was a shocking ordeal for the woman who believed she had knocked someone down.

Noting an undertaking from Ms Ryan that no (civil) action is to be taken against the woman or the butcher, Judge O'Leary adjourned the matter to facilitate the preparation of a victim impact statement.

# 356 children waiting at UHL 'inexcusable'

**Decrease:** Waiting lists shrink by 2.5% in local hospitals

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FIANNA FAIL's Willie O'Dea has said that the number of children waiting for appointments at University Hospital Limerick is a "damning indictment" of Minister for Health Simon Harris' record in office.

At the end of June, there were 365 children waiting for more than three months to see a consultant, 114 children waiting for more than six months, and three children waiting for more than a year for an outpatient appointment.

The UL Hospitals Group has told the Leader that appointments have been arranged for the three children.

According to new figures published by the National Treatment Purchase Fund, there has been a 1,112-patient drop in waiting lists across acute hospitals in Limerick.

In total, there were 42,529 patients waiting for treatment and appointments at University Hospital Limerick, Croom Orthopaedic Hospital and St John's Hospital in June - a 2.5% drop on May figures.

University Hospital Limerick was the only hospital to see a decrease in both inpatient and outpatient waiting lists. There were 2,725

inpatients and 30,907 outpatients on a waiting list at UHL.

Regarding the number of children on a waiting list, Deputy O'Dea described it as "simply inexcusable".

In a statement this Tuesday, the UL Hospitals Group said that since January this year, the number of paediatric outpatients waiting for more than six months at UHL has "reduced in absolute terms by 150 and now represents 14% of patients compared to 25% in January. We will continue to focus on improvements in wait times. All patients who are waiting are prioritised according to clinical need. UL Hospitals Group will continue to focus on seeing and treating those who have been waiting the longest.

# Wine bar fined for breaching smoking ban

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A WINE bar and restaurant in the city centre has been fined €2,500 for breaching the smoking ban.

Still or Sparkling Limited, which trades as the Copper Room, O'Connell Street, was prosecuted by the Health Service Executive for an offence which was detected on November 11, last.

Solicitor Barry Kelleher, representing the HSE, told Limerick District Court the charge,

under Section

(Tobacco)
Act 2002
was
brought
after two
Environmental

Health Officers visited the premises at around 7.30pm.

Judge Flann Brennan was told when they entered the premises three women (customers) were observed smoking under an enclosed space next to one of the alcoves which is located under the main road.

While the area is outdoors, one of EHOs said it was roofed and fully enclosed on three sides – meaning it was in breach of the regulations.

She added that it was not possible to make the area compliant.

Eight ashtrays were observed in the immediate area and Judge Brennan was told there was also signage indicating the area was the "designated smoking area" for customers.

While an ashtray was observed in another area at the rear of the wine bar,

nobody was observed smoking there on the night.

Judge Brennan was told there is a cigarette vending machine in the premises but that no sales were observed during the inspection.

The court was told that having informed staff of their presence, there was a general discussion in relation to what was described in court as the "history of non-compliance" at the Copper Room.

While just one offence was before the court, evidence

as outlined in relation to a number of other breaches

before and since last November's inspection. Solicitor

said there
has been a
dispute in
relation to the

relation to the designation of the alcove and that his client has engaged an engineer in recent months.

He told Judge Brennan the breach was "largely down to a misinterpretation" of the regulations and that the directors and management have introduced measures to ensure there will be no more smoking the area.

Imposing sentence, Judge Brennan said the only mitigating factor in the case was the company's guilty plea.

He said the non-compliance since was an aggravating factor which he had to consider.

He imposed a fine €2,500 and directed that the costs of the HSE, which totalled €3,700, also be paid.

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

## Frustration from the bench as delay to hear cases grows

A JUDGE has expressed her frustration at the growing delays in assigning dates to hear criminal cases which are listed before Limerick District Court.

Despite the availability of additional judges and the holding of a large number of 'special courts' over the past 18 months, contested matters are now being listed for dates during May 2019. "It's too long for people to be waiting," commented Judge Marian O'Leary during a recent court sitting. "It's an anxious time for people – to be coming before the court," she added.

Judge O'Leary, who presides over criminal sittings of the court in Limerick and in Kilmallock on an almost daily basis, also questioned why a large number of cases which were listed before a visiting judge earlier this month had not proceeded.

Many of the cases, she noted, had been listed for hearing months earlier.

In response, solicitor Ted McCarthy said there were no guarantees that cases will get on – for a variety of reasons. "Some days things proceed and, sometimes, the flush of time resolves issues. It's part and parcel of life," he said noting that a number of the defendants had pleaded guilty to the charges before the court.

One option Sergeant Donal Cronin suggested was the listing of additional cases on each court date. However, he accepted this could be problematic if each of the cases were to proceed.


It has also been suggested that

there would be merit in introducing some form of case management system – involving gardai, legal practitioners and Courts Service staff.

It was agreed by all parties that a meeting should be arranged in the near future although it was noted that some flexibility will be needed for any new system to work.

With the summer vacation starting later this week, it is unlikely a solution will be found before September.

# Wave of support for Ormston House as solution is sought

Funding: Fate of gallery space discussed as Council CEO says 'we are interested'

THE TWO Mayors of Limerick have pledged their support to Ormston House, whose seven-year existence in the city is now under threat with the building on the open market.

the building on the open market.

It comes after the board of directors informed The Leader that the gallery and cultural space was facing possible closure as it does not possess the funds to match the market price of the sale of a block of units on Patrick Street.

It is understood that the owner of the site is looking to sell units 9 to 11, which includes a commercial premises, for around €500,000.

Council CEO, Conn Murray told councillors at a full council meeting on Monday that the authority had tried to purchase the site, but that a possible deal was "taken away" and was then placed on the open market.

What went on sale, he added, was not the one block the council was

interested in, but three blocks.

"We are not interested in three blocks," he said. But the council, he stressed, was still interested in Ormston House.

"We haven't gone away. We are still interested," he declared, and he reminded councillors that it was the council that had made Ormston House available for creative and artistic purposes in the city in the first place.

There has been an outpouring of support for Ormston House and much discussion on its future, with a number of well-known and eminent individuals calling on Limerick City and County Council to purchase the site.

He added: "It can wait. It's not a priority. I'm not starving, you know?"

He said he has been waiting for an operation on his left knee for five years, and following a procedure in September, has been on Tramadol and Panadol to deal with the pain.

He has praised the staff at the hospital in Clonmel.

"The hospital here in Clonmel is one of the most excellent hospitals I have ever witnessed in my life with the way they function. They are highly efficient, extremely courteous and they get the job done," he said.

He said that he plans on putting his winnings in a trust fund.

The numbers on the EuroMillions draw were 2, 6, 15, 34, 44, with the two bonus numbers 4 and 5.

Meanwhile, the lucky person who won €111,271 in the Lotto draw of Saturday, July 14, the winning ticket for which was sold in the Gala store at Sheare Street, Kilmallock, has yet to make contact with Lottery HQ.



# Senator hits out at representation of females in politics

### €134k: The amount spent by parties on women in politics

SENATOR Maria Byrne has hit out at an article published in The Leader focusing on the lack of female Fianna Fail and Fine Gael TDs in

More than €134,000 was spent by political parties in promoting women in politics.

Last week's edition of The Leader quoted Social Democrats general election candidate Sarah Jane Hennelly, who criticised Fianna Fail and Fine Gael for spending large sums of money promoting women in politics, yet neither party having a female Limerick TD in

There have only been two female TDs to ever represent Limerick; Labour's Jan O'Sullivan, and Kathleen O'Callaghan, who represented Sinn Fein from 1921 to 1923.

In a public statement, Sen Byrne criticised the Leader headline "No female FF or FG voice despite spend", calling it "misleading and disingenuous as to how Limerick is represented at national politics".

Sen Maria Byrne is the only female senator

"I represent Limerick every day in the Oireachtas in Leinster House so our region, and the people I proudly serve, certainly have a voice when it comes to key discussions and decisions for Limerick.

"We have the most female members of any political party" SEN MARIA BYRNE

"So too for that matter, Limerick and the Fine Gael party – which have vastly improved the fortunes of the Mid-West region since 2011 and away from the dark depressing days - certainly have a female voice here in Limerick when it is called needed," Sen Byrne said last week.

She added: "I can't speak for any other party but Fine Gael in Limerick city is running a gender balanced ticket for the next General Election - myself and Senator Kieran O'Donnell. Fine Gael in Government has done more than any other party before it in terms of gender equality in politics. Fine Gael introduced gender quotas, cutting funding to political parties if they failed to run at least 30% women candidates at the election.

"We have the most female members of any political party and are committed to increasing that. More than half of the Fine Gael women who serve in the Dail are Government Ministers. Show me another party that can display such a predominant role when it comes to the advancing the role that women play in Irish politics at the highest level."

But teh former Mayor of Limerick felt that Fine Gael can do more to include women in politics, and is calling for a more balanced representation in the Dail.

Fine Gael spent €50,098 on promoting women in politics in 2017, more than any other party's expenditure.

So far, three women are to run for general election in Limerick; Sen Maria Byrne, Deputy Jan O'Sullivan and Sarah Jane Hennelly, all for the Limerick City constituency. The date for this election has vet to be announced.

# Ryan makes Man Booker longlist for £50,000 prize

ACCLAIMED Limerick-based author Donal Ryan has made the longlist for the prestigious Man Booker prize.

The Castletroy resident and University of Limerick creative writing lecturer is one of 13 authors in contention for the prize.

A former writer-in-residence on the creative writing programme at UL, the Nenagh native previously made the longlist in 2013 for his novel The Spinning Heart.

Three Irish authors are on the list for the £50,000 Man Booker prize, with Sally Rooney and Anna Burns also in contention.

Ryan's From a Low and Quiet Sea was a Guardian First Book award winner and charts the stories of a Syrian refugee, a crooked accountant and an angry young man with a broken heart.

Sales of the selected books can increase hugely with a nomination, while a win could increase sales by 1,000%, according to various estimates. Speaking on radio on Tuesday morning, a delighted Ryan said he hadn't contemplated winning the prize at this stage.

The award-winning author published his first novel in 2012 and has since been catapulted on to the best-sellers lists and into the world of literary prizes.

The longlist was chosen from 171 submissions – the highest number in the prize's 50-year history – published in the UK and Ireland between 1 October 2017 and 30 September 2018. The Man Booker Prize for Fiction, first awarded in

1969, is open to writers of any nationality, writing in English and published in the UK and Ireland.

This is the first year that novels actually published in Ireland are eligible for the prize, following a change in rules announced at the start of 2018 that "recognised the

special relationship between the UK and Irish publishing markets".

Chair of the 2018 judges, Kwame Anthony Appiah, said "every one of these books is wildly distinctive. It's been an exhilarating journey so far and we're looking forward to reading them again. But now we'll have thousands and thousands of people reading along with us."

A shortlist of six books will be announced on September 20, while the 2018 winner will then be announced on October 16 in a ceremony which will be broadcast by the BBC.

## Greenway from Castleconnell to Montpelier

Some €200,000 has been allocated by Limerick City and County Council for a tourism and leisure amenity in the north of the county.

The money will go towards the development of a greenway from Castleconnell to Montpelier.

A number of greenways in Limerick have been developed in recent years, but thus far, they have all been in the west of the county.

There are three kilometre greenways operating in Rathkeale and Abbeyfeale and a 4.5km greenway loop in Newcastle West.

"I'm delighted that Limerick City and County Council has approved €200,000 in funding for the greenway," said Mayor James Collins.

"The money will be allocated from a €2.3m fund to support rural communities in County Limerick.

"The greenway will add to Limerick's tourist offering, as well as offering healthy leisure options for local residents, who can cycle or walk along an area of natural beauty," he added.

The greenway will be almost 4kms long and is one of eight projects approved by the Council under the fund.

The others include: Patrickswell Village Renewal (€200,000)

Lough Gur tourism projects at Solstice Garden and Bouchiers Castle (€131,000)

Refurbishment works to the stone mansion in Kilmallock (€331,625)

Essential improvement works for Askeaton Pool and Leisure

(€92,736) Askeaton Urban Renewal works (€200,000)

The Barnagh Tunnel Project/Greenway Development along the Great Southern Trail (€400,000)

A regional athletics track in Newcastle West (€200,000).

# **Grants announced** for new LC subjects

### Education: Six Limerick schools set to recieve funding

SIX Limerick schools who are among the first schools in the country to offer Physical Education and Computer Science as Leaving Certificate subjects are set to receive grants to support the rollout of the

The Department of Education has now announced €450,000 in grants to 104 secondary schools around the country which will implement PE and Computer Science as exam subjects this September.

John The Baptist Community School in Hospital, Colaiste Mhuire in Askeaton, Coláiste Íde agus Iosaef in Abbeyfeale, Villiers Secondary School and Gaelcholáiste Luimnigh are among the first schools to offer PE for the Leaving Cert, with Coláiste Chiaráin in Croom among the first to offer Computer Science.

"We know how important it is to be physically active and engage in sports, not only for our physical health but also as a means to encourage team building, develop confidence and for our mental health," Education Minister Richard Bruton said.

"The introduction of Computer Science as a Leaving Certificate subject is part of our ambition to make Ireland a STEM leader among our European colleagues.

The experience of these two new subjects will inform both the national rollout of these subjects but also, the possibility of incorporating digital technology more widely in the assessment of other subjects.

The schools offering PE for the Leaving Cert will receive a grant towards the purchase of digital devices for use by students in completing the course assessment, as well for hardware required for

uploading of material.

A grant of €350 per digital device will be payable, with one device for every two students who takes up the subject in September 2018. A payment of €750 per school will also for the uploading hardware.

offering Computer Schools Science will receive a grant of €3,000 towards the purchase of digital connector devices.

Physical education as an exam subject focuses on both theory and practice, including a written assessment worth 50% of students'  $overall\,grade, plus\,a\,physical\,activity$ performance assessment.

Computer Science for Leaving Certificate will focus on the application of programming and computational thinking to the solution of problems, and the impact of computing technology.

A JUDGE has been urged to exercise leniency in the case of a Southill man who has admitted storing quantities of heroin, cocaine and Alprazolam at his home.

Timothy Casey, aged 40, who has an address at Bay 4, Clonlong halting site, O'Malley Park, pleaded guilty in May to three charges relating to a seizure on

drugs unit told Limerick Court Circuit that

heroin with a street value of around €1,800; cocaine worth €456 and 440 Alprazolam (Xanax) tablets worth €880 were recovered during pre-planned garda

operation. The cocaine was divided deals while the Alprazolam tablets were in blister packs. Other items including self-sealing bags and a weighing scales were also recovered during the

All of the contraband, he said, was found concealed in a boxing bag which was located in a shed near the mobile home where Casey lives with his wife and children.

Judge Tom O'Donnell was told the defendant made admissions at the scene and that he told gardai, during interview, that another unnamed man had called to his home a number of days earlier and asked him to store

the drugs.
"He admitted physically handling them and placing them in the boxing bag," said Kenny Kerins BL who added that his client had agreed to store the drugs without thinking consequences.

Mr Kerins said his client has not been in trouble with gardai since. He said while Casey has four previous convictions, he asked the court to note that none are for drugs offences.

Judge O'Donnell was told the defendant is heavily

shame on his family, he had learned a salutary lesson," said Mr Kerins.

After Judge O'Donnell questioned why the matter prosecuted given indictment the "relatively low value" of the drugs, John O'Sullivan BL, prosecuting, said it was a 'systems case".

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SOME 23,000 seats have been added to the Shannon to Stewart Airport, New York schedule for summer 2019, Norwegian Air International has announced.

This follows a strong performance in its inaugural year at Shannon Airport, with increased operations already announced for the winter season.

The increase in seats is a 28% increase on this summer's figures.

Welcoming the announcement, Shannon Airport managing director, Andrew Murphy said, "Getting Norwegian Air International on board in the first instance was a strong statement about Shannon's potential and this has most definitely been backed up by this latest increase.

"We will have nine services in all next summer, five to Stewart and four to Providence, Rhode Island, more than double what we had last year when Norwegian Air International commenced its Shannon operations with four services in total.

"This is a really strong statement about Shannon Airport and reaffirms its popularity for transatlantic services.

"There's a very strong traditional market out of Shannon to the east coast of the States and there's certainly a huge demand for services out of the US to Shannon. The Shannon brand resonates very well in the US." he said.

Shannon Group CEO, Matthew Thomas said the 23,000-seat increase will be a major boost for the airport in 2019.

There are currently six airlines flying to seven transatlantic destinations from Shannon Airport. Mr Thomas said that it has been Shannon's busiest summer in 17 years.

"It's not just summer season success as we have year-round services to the east coast of the US. This is proving to be a very positive year for Shannon."

# Education at risk of becoming 'elitist' luxury- Ó Ceallaigh

WITH education costs in Ireland now reaching almost €14,000, a Limerick councillor has expressed concern that low-income families do not have the same educational opportunities.

The Zurich Life Assurance 'Cost of Education 2018' revealed that putting just one child through school can easily run into tens of thousands of euro.

The report found that completing school up to second level costs on average €13,858.

Zurich also found that completing a third level education costs an additional €22,186.

"With a third of secondary school parents being forced to get into debt, it couldn't be clearer that the Irish education system is at risk of becoming an elitist and unaffordable luxury," Sinn Fein's Seighin Ó Ceallaigh said.

"From voluntary contributions to





school books, parents are paying extortionate prices for the fundamental basics of education."

"That's before they have to go on and fork out €3,000 per year just to attend third level education."

"We hope to see the end of parents being forced into paying so-called 'voluntary contributions', which many parents and children are pressured into paying."

LIMERICK GAA is to get a €150,000 "refundable loan" from the council to stage a major concert at the Gaelic Grounds.

The decision was welcomed as a coup for the city by the majority of councillors although a number of representatives warned it could set a precedent. But councillors were assured the money was a loan and payable by the end of the year.

Mayor of Limerick, Cllr James Collins, welcomed the decision of the council to provide a €150,000 refundable loan to the Gaelic Grounds, on behalf of Limerick GAA, to "facilitate the staging" of the Symphony for our World concert.

He said that the feedback

received from the recent discussion about a lack of concerts for Limerick since Bruce Springsteen played Thomond Park in 2013 was "this idea of a refundable contribution – whereby the Council could give a sum of money to help a promoter secure a major act.

"The Council would share in any upside, through a small premium percentage, and also be protected in the event of the concert not being profitable, as the money is invested as a refundable loan," he said.

"The idea was the sum made available by the Council to the National Geographic Concert would be recycled into this fund to promote other major concerts and events for the city," he added.

Estimates suggest the concert could be worth up to  $\epsilon 6m$  for the city. Mayor Collins said approval for the loan would "give confidence to international promoters that Limerick is a city where you can do business and pleasure".

# Ormston House needs to be retained

he side window of Ormston House has become legendary for those with an interest in Limerick's cultural scene.

In a city where a quality 'what's on guide' can be hard to come by, the Ormston House window on the Ellen Street side is pasted top to bottom with a smorgasbord of cultural postering inviting our citizens to partake in whatever takes their fancy.

The space within is even more important. Opened in 2011, Ormston House is located in a former retail unit and was created to act as a centrally located cultural space.

Since its inception it has become a thriving space, a hive of creative activity where local artists can interact and develop, a space where audiences can experience cutting edge exhibitions, talks or community engagement initiatives.

Now the building that is home to the Ormston House cultural space is up for sale with an asking price of €500,000.

The agents for the sale describe the space as a 'city centre investment property...located in an established retail location directly adjacent to the proposed Project Opera Development'.

The sale will also include the River Deep Mountain High retail unit located next door to the Ormston House culture space.

Despite the fact that the Ormston House sale states that tenants are not affected, there have been widespread concerns that the future of the gallery and cultural space is now in doubt.

The outpouring of support on social media for Ormston House over the past few days is testament to the work it has done over recent years.

The space is seen by many as an important cultural asset in the city centre

It is one of the rare on-street cultural institutions in a city that recently pitched to become a European City of Culture in 2020.

Ormston House was created at a time when economic woes created huge challenges for young artists. The cultural space and gallery found a home in one of the many retail units left empty as a result of the downturn. It replaced soulless consumerism with free thinking, creative magic.

In fact it could be argued that culture and the arts have played a pivotal role in helping Limerick overcome recession. When Minister Jimmy Deenihan naively commented that City of Culture in 2014 was a "rebranding opportunity", it was considered an insult to artists.

In hindsight our year as City of Culture did make a huge impact in

terms of how we perceive our city. It engaged people who previously weren't engaged. It helped us overcome negative perceptions and paved the way for a new economically sound city.

The many hundreds of artists, theatre makers, musicians, historians and producers deserve great credit for playing their role in the creation of the new Limerick we witness today.

Ormston House has been a crucial focal point for such work, a space where all of the above have gathered at some point to share ideas and thoughts.

Thankfully the bad days of recession are behind us. The boom is back. Perhaps we haven't learned our lessons from the recent past.

It's easy to see why the Ormston House building might be an attractive investment opportunity. It is on the doorstep of one of most significant urban development sites in the country.

The reaction to the Ormston House story on social media seems to be pointing a finger at City Hall. This isn't fair. Ormston House is a private Thankfully the bad days of recession are behind us. The boom is back. Perhaps we haven't learned our lessons from the recent past

building that has the right to be sold on the private market. The Chief Executive of the Council has in fact highlighted the fact that attempts were made to purchase the property.

If the wealth of cultural information wasn't blocking the view, the same postered window in Ormston House would reveal the Patrick Street HQ of the Council's Economic Development division as well as the Limerick Twenty Thirty company. Both of these Council-owned companies are in place to oversee the economic development of the city as well as the principles outlined in the Limerick 2030 Economic and Spatial Strategy.

A vision of this strategy states that: "The City Centre will be at the heart of this...an attractive magnet for retail, leisure, residential, commercial, educational and cultural growth. Growth will benefit all citizens across the City, County and Mid-West Region".

Note how culture is equally placed alongside education, residential and commercial in this blue sky vision. Yet how true are we to that vision?

There are some things that money can't buy. Ormston House, its team and its seven-year legacy of cultivating one of our city's most important and well-respected cultural institutions, cannot be allowed to wither under the frosty blanket of commercial greed.

The Council has expressed support for Ormston House. Let's hope this isn't purely lip service. Any suggestion that our Council should purchase the property to save the Ormston House cultural space might not necessarily be intelligent use of public funds.

Where the solution lies is anyone's

Where the solution lies is anyone's guess but one thing is certain - relocating the Ormston House cultural space won't work. Any attempts at relocation will undo seven years of graft and dilute the impact it has made in its Patrick Street home.

Either Ormston House is assisted in negotiating a suitable deal, allowing it to remain in its current home, or we witness the demise of a much-loved cultural institution.

The latter would be a travesty and one that undoes any confidence in Limerick's future as a truly liveable urban centre.



When the Limerick Leader reported on new plans for a solar farm in Foynes last week, it gained quite a reaction online.

"It's a beautiful area near Adare Manor but will be destroyed if they have their way!" wrote one commentator.

Another wrote: "Our landscape is being ruined between those horrible wind turbines and now acres of solar panels.

Sure, people may have legitimate fears about glare, the state of the vegetation underneath, house prices, and even health concerns about the electromagnetic field. 

# Job threat eases as US softens stance

**Aughinish:** Three months left to dodge sanctions

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THE THREAT to up to 1,000 jobs in Limerick has eased somewhat with an announcement that the US may consider dropping severe sanctions on a local plant.


Aughinish Alumina, which is owned by embattled Russian company UC Rusal, has been under threat since April, when the US Treasury Department announced harsh sanctions against its controlling owner Oleg Deripaska, along with a handful of other Russian oligarchs.

The company had been tasked with jumping through a number of hoops before the October 23 deadline, most notably the reorganisation of the ownership to ensure that Mr Deripaska reduced his majority share. That process is underway.

But now, US Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin has said that the department would be open to removing Rusal from the list of companies which were due to be hit by the sanctions.

According to a report in Reuters, Mr Mnuchin added that the objective of the punitive sanctions was "not to put Rusal out of business".

"If we can find an acceptable solution, that is our objective," said Mr Mnuchin. And since his comments, shares in the If we can find an acceptable solution, that is our objective steven mnuchin, us treasury



company rose 15 percent on the Hong Kong stock exchange.

The prospect of a softer approach by the US is good news for Askeaton's Aughinish Alumina, which found itself at the centre of the controversy as the largest alumina refinery in Europe.

There are 450 people employed on site, and another 500 working locally within its orbit, as contractors, suppliers and spin-off industry.

It is one of the biggest employers in County Limerick.

The sanctions list, announced in April, was a US attempt to punish Russia for "malign activity around the globe", including the country's activities in Crimea and Syria, its alleged involvement in a poisoning in the UK, and suspicions surrounding US election meddling.

Billionaire Russian businessmen were specifically targeted because they were seen to have 'benefited' from the regime.

And Aughinish owner Mr Deripaska is said to have close ties to the Russian president.

He has his shares in UC Rusal through his holding company EN+, but has made moves in the last two months to divest his interests in the company, to save it from the sanctions.

And a series of other steps have been taken within the company, too. Mr Deripaska and several other top managers and directors stepped down from the Rusal board. A new board of independent directors was elected last month.

AT THE young Commercial Bar, there are no ostentatious bright lights, no signs, and no major marketing drive, like most new bars would have in their infancy.

"When you find it, I hope you always know it's here. That's why it is up to me to look after who comes through the door," says Rocky, while petting his well-behaved labradoodle Gina, who is a bit of an icon for those who walk through the doors of The Commercial.

From day one, Rocky wanted to start off with 15 nice people, turn it into 30, then 60, and so on. "I didn't want to rely on social media, I wanted it to be word-of-mouth. I wanted it to sell itself."

And the results have been immensely positive for the Clancy Strand man, who has had an extensive portfolio of pub experience on his CV, having started at the Curragower Bar at 15, then becoming a promotion manager at Trinity Rooms, and then running the former Blind Pig bar on Thomas Street.

"The reaction in the first couple of months has been great. But you don't know where you are really at for the first two or three years, and hopefully we can keep that momentum going," explains Rocky, who has been responsible for transforming a disused former hotel building, which had closed down more than 10 years ago.

But Rocky is fond of its history, and so are the previous owners and customers who frequent at The Commercial, which opened its doors in late 2017. This new establishment is an ode to the olden days.

"The goal was always to bring it back to what it would have been like. I felt enough pubs through the boom had modernised and torn down the kind of pub I was into, which was very traditional. I basically wanted a local in the city. That was the goal from day one."

After managing The Blind Pig, he explains, the only way his new venture was going to work was if he purchased the site and invested in it.

And without his strong network of family, friends and his partner Erin Hartigan, none of this early success would have materialised, he says.

"I left myself no other choice. I am all in. You either sink or swim. There wasn't a fear. You know what it's like? You know when you go to throw a party, will people turn up? There was almost that element, but I was confident in the team that we had around," he enthuses, as Gina eyes his pint of Guinness.

Another feature that Rocky is embracing is an exhibit of local artwork in the pub. "Artists need their place to hang their stuff, and it's great that people can come in and they will see the paintings, and they will know to contact [us]. I feel that that's needed. It used to happen years ago, and I feel it should still happen in bars around. It's a public house at the end of the day."

And in the basement is the Record Room, a cosy music venue that has grown in popularity in recent months, showcasing original up-and-coming artists, comedians and even drag shows. He says it's important new artists are given a platform that is not always available in the city.

Rocky says he benefits from the large web of nightlife venues nearby, including the White House, Tom Collins', Jerry Flannery's, 101 and many more. "There's a circuit. If I was up here by myself, it would be a different kettle of fish. Busy makes busy. Without a doubt, there's more potential in the city for night time [venues]."

And Rocky, most of all, is blessed by his clientele, who are the main source of banter. And it is the Commercial's homely atmosphere that the delighted owner enjoys the most.

"When I used to go home after work, the first thing I do is put on music I like, light the fire and have a glass of wine in an environment that I like. So I suppose I was trying to do the same here."

# Magic multiple helps keep our emotions in check

here are many reasons put forward by people when I speak to them about their finances and ask them to explain a particular decision they made in the past, or why they are so much in debt, or why they haven't as much as they would like to have in savings etc.

They don't earn enough, or they don't have the financial knowledge, or their just bad with money are examples of excuses I hear all the time. And some, in fairness are reasonable and do play a role, but I have been around long enough and met enough people of all different income levels, to know one of the biggest factors that is preventing them from moving forward with their finances is a factor that is hard to identify, but it's there and its impact is as great, if not greater, than any other reasons you could come up with.

Before I tell you what it is, let me give you an example of how it works and its potential impact on your finances.

I carried out a financial review for a client about 12 months ago, and one of his objectives from the outset was to make sure he was saving enough, because he wanted to build up a fund that would support his three kids if they decided to go to college in the future.

We identified the amount he should be saving each month, and he followed through by setting up a new account.

Three weeks ago, I got a call from him to say he wanted to withdraw €3,000 from the account, because he wanted to buy a ride-on lawnmower.

The weather was great, and the ride-on was something he always wanted, and as he got older he would find it harder to cut his lawn with an

ordinary lawnmower.

I know where he lives and I know the size of his front and back lawns and there really is no need for a ride-on lawnmower, but he was coming up with reasons to validate his decision to raid the kids' education account. That is an example of how our emotions take over and interfere with our financial lives.

I can put together a great plan for anyone, but if it's just based on numbers alone, it may not work. You have to be cognisant that we all feel emotions, both good and bad, and how they play a pivotal role in the success of our finances, and some, if not recognised and dealt with, can hamper the things that are really important to us.

The emotions of envy, or feeling you deserve it, or both, took over the gentleman who called me, and he just wasn't thinking about the impact it could have on his kids in the future. He was thinking in the now, and it was clouding his judgement. It was going to be something he would regret doing in a month's time, when the excitement wore off, when the rain returned, and when he realised he had no use for it for eight months of the year, and it began to

gather dust in his garage.
So, the way we feel at one time or another can affect the decisions we make, and whilst they may last for only a short period of time, the impact they can have on our finances can be felt much later and for much longer.

The key to overcoming them, is to first recognise when they are happening or about to.

I believe one of the preventative measures people use who suffered from depression in the past, and don't want to Some of those emotions we need to be aware of include

again, is to recognise the signs and the thoughts they begin to feel, and to cut them off as fast as they can.

The same applies to your finances. We need to be aware of the emotional triggers that affect us and our ability to make good decisions about money. Once you know which ones affect you most, you can identify them and deal with them.

Some of those emotions we need to be aware of include anger, fear, envy, stress and happiness.

The key is to recognise when they happen, but that may not be enough in itself which is why I use a technique with some of my clients, which helps them when those self-destructive thoughts occur, and they have an urge to spurge.

I give them a number (it will vary from person to person), and they multiple the item they are thinking of buying by it, and that is the future value of what it will cost them.

So, if someone is buying an item for €3,000, their multiplying number might be 3.6, and what that means is if they spend that €3,000 now, they are taking €10,800 away from what they would have in 10 years' time.

This is a really good way to help people make a decision and something they can use and weigh up against, when they are looking at buying something.

I used it with the man who called me, and it put things into perspective for him, so he cancelled the withdrawal from the account, and bought a good petrol lawnmower for €400 instead. And, guess what - he's happy out.

P.S. I'm happy to share those multiplying numbers with you if you want them.

#### ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: I took out a mortgage (tracker) of €580,000, 11 years ago, and with nine years left, I owe about €219,000. I have recently received an inheritance which would allow me to clear it in full, but I'm not sure if that's the right thing to do or not.

A: Based on the original term and amount you borrowed, if your mortgage was to run for another nine years, the amount of interest left to pay is c. €12,688. So, this is the amount of interest vou have left to save.

If you did clear your mortgage, this is what your net return on a lump sum of €219,000 would be over the next nine years. It's only a net return of 5.8% over nine years which is 0.64% per year.

Can you get a better return for your money on deposit than what your mortgage is costing you? There are a number of low risk accounts available that could return at least 3% net per year, and if you invested the €219,000 rather than clearing your mortgage, and earned 3% each year for the next nine, you would have earned c. €67,785 in interest.

By investing your funds rather than clearing your mortgage you could earn 5.34 times more in interest earned than the interest saving you would achieve by clearing your mortgage.

## Tolerating uncertainty -Time to take an apple a day!



#### ASK THE DOC DR EDDIE MURPHY

Advice column with the Operation Transformation psychologist

HE inability to tolerate uncertainty tends to be a unique feature of people who experience generalised anxiety and excessive worrying.

This is an attitude many people have towards life. When one has this attitude, uncertainty, unpredictability, and doubt are seen as awful and unbearable experiences that must be avoided at all costs. People who hate uncertainty and need guarantees may:

\* Find it hard to make a decision or put a plan or solution in place, because they first need to know how it will work out.

You may think that worrying is a way of preparing yourself for the worst – getting you ready for anything that might happen. Worrying is seen as a way of attempting to predict life so that there are no nasty surprises. As such, worrying reduces your experience of uncertainty and unpredictability. And because worrying reduces your feelings of uncertainty, you will continue worrying and worrying and worrying. In other words, you keep worrying because you believe it is your only strategy for making things in life more certain and more predictable – it helps you believe that you have more control.

In reality, has your worrying made anything more certain or more predictable? By worrying, does it change the outcome of what will happen? Isn't life still as uncertain and unpredictable as it ever was? It is only your perception that you somehow have more control by worrying. But is this really true? In fact, all you have done is think of all the worst case scenarios and worked yourself up and made yourself feel really bad in the process. So, ask yourself, is it really worth it? Does having a 'fake' sense of certainty justify all the

negative consequences of worrying? If your answer is 'No', then there are two ways you can tackle your intolerance of uncertainty.

We can deal with uncertainty in two main ways. We can challenge our need for certainty by looking at the advantages and disadvantages of needing to be certain and

how it affects us. We can
explore other areas of
our lives in which we
do tolerate
uncertainty, or look at
how other people deal
with uncertainty,
such as friends or

characters in television

AN APPLE A DAY

The other way is to learn to tolerate uncertainty - to reduce our need for certainty. And we can do this, using the acronym: APPLE

programmes.

Tolerating Uncertainty with APPLE:

**ACKNOWLEDGE** - Notice and acknowledge the uncertainty as it comes to mind.

**PAUSE** - Don't react as you normally do. Don't react at all. Just pause, and breathe.


PULL BACK - Tell yourself this is just the worry talking, and this apparent need for certainty is not helpful and not necessary. It is only a thought or feeling. Don't believe everything you think! Thoughts are not statements of fact.

**LET GO** - Let go of the thought or feeling. It will pass. You don't have to respond to them. You might imagine them floating away in a bubble or cloud.

**EXPLORE** - Explore the present moment, because right now, in this moment, all is well. Notice your breathing, and the sensations of breathing. Notice the ground beneath you. Look around and notice what you see, what you hear, what you can touch, what you can smell. Right Now.

Then, SHIFT YOUR FOCUS OF ATTENTION to something else - on what you need to do, on what you were doing before you noticed the worry, or do something else - mindfully, with your full attention.

It's time to ditch persistent worrying, its time to take an apple

## Discovering real relief for migraines

The good news is that nutritional therapy based on functional medicine can help to identify the root of the problem and support your body getting back to balance. Knowing the timing of the attacks are helpful – is it around ovulation or period times? Is it after a night out or a Chinese take-away? 




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## Break free of emotional binge eating

O you tend to see a link between what you feel and what you eat? For example - at times when you feel strong emotions like stress, heartbreak, sadness and anxiety - are you more inclined to reach for food as a way of "dealing" with those emotions or as a way of feeling some comfort?

I know for me this used to be very true. I was an emotional eater. I would feel a strong emotion and feel bad and reach for the wrong foods, overeat and then start to feel the guilt. It's a vicious cycle that can be very hard to break. Recognising whether or not you are an emotional eater is the first step to helping break this cycle. After this there are a few things you can do to ensure you don't get caught up in the same old routine again. Take a

#### 1: BE AWARE OF YOUR HABITS

It may sound simple enough but this is a massive step to breaking through the barriers that are stopping you from overcoming your unhealthy habit. Journaling though a lot of work - can be a great

tool to kicking bad habits. When ever you feel a negative emotion, write it down. Be aware of it, what is causing it and understand why you are feeling it. That way if you do reach for the packet of biscuits or the bar of chocolate you are at least aware of the reason why. You can then ask yourself what "comfort" are you really getting from eating what you are eating, and go as far as to ask yourself will you actually feel better or worse afterwards. Being aware is half the battle.

If you do succumb to your emotions and indulge - don't dwell on it. Leave it in the past, don't allow yourself the flood of further negative emotions. Simply move on.

# Getting over a break up (part 1)

REAKUPS are fairly crap, there's no two ways about it. Even if you're the one instigating the split, breakups are one of the worst life experiences that we'll have to go through.

And the chances are pretty high that you'll have to experience one; studies have shown that by the time they reach their 30's, a high percentage of men will have endured three serious breakups.

Some breakups are obviously going to hurt way worse than others but a lot of that is down to the level of respect the person ending the relationship displays for their soon-to-be-exes sense of self worth during the breakup. What this

means is that the difference between fleeting hurt and months of heartache lies in whether your partner endorses you or delivers a character assassination on their

Breakups are much worse when people feel that they have been rejected for who they are as a person, rather than a declaration

that two people just aren't right for each other. When you feel that you've been rejected as a person by your former partner the effects on vour confidence and self worth are a lot more destructive and therefore will take a lot longer to bounce back from. Consider this the next time you're about to drop the mic on your partner.

Breakups are also another one of those things that women do better than men. While the initial stress of a split is likely just as bad for both parties, women burn hot and fast like an oil fire; they cry, they watch movies and drink wine with their friends, they post memes, they watch Ellen and then they get on with it. We guys on the other hand tend to bottle it up, drag it out, obsess over details, social media stalk and most of all, not talk about it. When sh\*t meets fan, we don't talk and this can trigger an actual condition called abandonment rage. Men are embarrassed to show their true feelings at the best of times but when it comes to breakups, we are more likely to engage in bravado, pretending that we don't care because we "never liked her anyway" or "she was a sh $^*$ t ride" rather than being honest and admitting how we feel inside, especially to other men.

Naturally, the worst kinds of breakups are the ones that involve cheating or infidelity. Cheating makes for a very bitter breakup because on top of the normal feelings of pain and rejection that come hand-in-hand with a split you also have feelings of betrayal and deep emotional hurt.

If you've ever been cheated on you can probably relate to the emotional hijack that occurs. You want to kill the person they cheated with, you want to punish your partner and get back at them for what they've done.

I've been there myself but this behaviour is of no benefit to anyone, especially you, and the

emotional baggage that it creates can damage your chances of having a happy relationship with someone else in the future.

I'm writing this because I've recently gone through a particularly painful breakup myself and I find writing about it helps a lot. Not sulking, social media stalking or fixating on the reasons things turned sour - writing. Putting my thoughts down on paper is cathartic and I find that writing about the positives of the relationship serves me better than listing what we both did wrong. I also speak to a counsellor every few weeks, which is something I always strongly advocate anyway but for me, with the breakup coming so close to the death of my dad, I don't think I'd have been able to get through the last couple of months without counselling. I've also had the support of my family and good friends which makes things easier but I'm aware of the reasons that men don't usually talk about their true feelings in these situations (you don't want people to think you're a misfortune and you don't want a slagging from your friends) so I find it a lot easier to thrash it out with a professional. I'm not going to pretend I'm over the whole thing and therefore, in a good position to give tips and advice on getting over a breakup, I'm not. But I've done the research and the reading so next week in Part 2 I'll share some of the best pieces of advice that I could give anyone going through a breakup.



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## St Gabriel's campaign to bridge funding gap for new facility

HE first Respite
House for children

St Gabriel's Children's Respite House, a special purpose-built facility, will be located in Mungret, on the outskirts of Limerick. This state-of-the-art, six-bedroom facility is being developed at a cost of €2,481,635, with €1m already donated by the JP McManus Foundation.

St. Gabriel's has now embarked on a major fund-raising campaign to raise a shortfall of over emillion for the facility, construction work on which will be completed in the autumn, with an opening scheduled for the spring of next year.

The fundraising campaign was launched last week at the Savoy Hotel and was attended by families with children who will benefit from the new facility.

Among those to address the event was Mary Quinlan, mother of 13 year old Maia Quinlan from Limerick – the

family that has generously allowed its personal story to be the case study for the campaign in order to articulate the great need for this new facility. Mary said, "at the moment, the only suitable respite facility in the country where Maia can go to is in Dublin and Maia is one of over 100 families across the region that needs this vital service."

Of Maia's needs, she said, "Maia is like a newborn baby in the body of a 13-year-old. She has quadriplegic cerebral palsy, so she is unable to use any of her limbs. She is unable to do anything for herself. We know Maia will be in really good hands at St. Gabriel's. This will be an absolute

#### Autism group aim for a goal of a more inclusive society

LIMERICK Autism Group (LAG) provides socially inclusive activities for people with autism and their families.

These activities include camps which take place five times a year with specifically designed weekly movement classes and support groups to aid the siblings of the children with autism.

with autism.
In June of this year, LAG and Parkway Retail Park teamed up to transform the retail centre to become Ireland's first autism-friendly retail park. They did this by adding autism-friendly initiatives to the retail park. These initiatives included installing autism friendly parking spaces, staffinside the shops that were trained in helping customers with autism. A sensory check out was also installed specifically set up for customers with autism to purchase their items.

LAG also helped to set up the Limerick Autism Camps, developed by a group of parents who believed there was a need for socially inclusive activities for children with autism in Limerick. The camps are "to provide a socially inclusive environment," said Keith Enright, Director and Founder of LAG, for children "to have fun and interact with their peers without the expense on their parents."

LAG was able to get

their feet off the ground with the help of BNest, the first dedicated Social **Enterprise Incubator** Programme in Ireland which caters to all types of organisations from non-profits to community enterprises to businesses with a social conscience. BNest offers a six-month peer programme at no cost to participating organisations and is dedicated to helping businesses that want to make a social impact. Keith was at the beginning of setting up LAG when he first came in contact with BNest. Keith took part in their six-month incubator programme at no cost and he was then able to make a name for his organisation and set up a small office due to the advice he received from BNest.

"They have been absolutely brilliant.
They held us back when we needed to be held back and pushed us forward when we needed to be pushed forward and they've made a lot of connections for us with companies in Limerick," Keith said about BNest's help in setting up Limerick Autism Group.



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## Is this Ford's best ever car?

Ford Focus: Ground up redesign for the fourth generation of the two decades old model

THE new generation Ford Focus goes on sale in Ford dealerships this month at a starting price of €24,900.

This is the fourth generation of famous nameplate first launched 20 years ago.

This mid-size family car is more stylish and more spacious than ever and Ford say it is the best car they've ever built.

Initially available in four grades-Zetec, ST-Line, Titanium and top specced Vignale - it will be joined by the Active variant in early 2019.

Petrol engines for the new car are a 1.0 (a claimed 4.8 L/200kms and 108g/km Co<sub>2</sub>) and a 1.5 EcoBoost; the diesel is a 1.5 with 120hp (a claimed 3.6 L/100kms fuel efficiency and 94g/km Co2). Transmissions are a 6-speed manual and Focus will launch a new 8-speed automatic transmission.

There will only be hatchback and wagon formats as Ford has decided to stop building sedan (saloon) versions of the Focus for Europe but they will continue to be sold in other markets, including

Connectivity includes FordPass Connect system which among other features allows the car to be a mobile WiFi 'hotspot' for up to ten devices at a time. Other options include the FordPass mobile app with which drivers can easily locate their car in sprawling shopping mall car parks, check fuel levels, remotely lock and unlock their car, and even start it remotely (where permitted by law).

The trend now towards petrol engines is also clear with the new Focus as Ford Ireland has ordered a 50:50 ratio for the car's launch here, against the 20pc petrol/80pc diesel sales of the outgoing vehicle.

We were back again last week in the South of France for the Focus launch getting to drive the 1.0125hp EcoBoost with 6-speed manual

transmission and the 1.5 petrol with 8-speed automatic transmission. The 1.5 petrol was my favourite and I believe will sell well in Ireland. We didn't get to drive the diesel on this occasion but will when we get the car on Irish roads.

The petrol engines proved very quiet on all types of roads we including mountainous routes with twists and turns as well as through towns and villages to prove how well the car handles. The steering is spot on, nicely direct, seats are very comfy, the suspension worked well even over a badly potholed country road we travelled on which was a great

test for a car, all with no compromise on comfort.

I loved the big Head-Up screen with speed, speed limit and sat nav directions all featuring. You can choose the information you wish to see there.

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## Prices to rise by €3k under new testing

## **Emissions:** Manufacturers to pass on cost of new test

IRISH motorists could face up to €3,000 increases when buying a new car under a new emissions system aimed at bringing about real driving conditions and fuel economy - unless the Government steps in to adjust the Road/VRT tax bands to take into account the higher (more accurate) figures, writes Trish Whelan.

Up to now we have had a NEDC regime for emissions but that's about to change with the Worldwide Harmonised Light Vehicle Test Procedure (WLTP) which has already pushed some prices up.

Put simply, unless our government adopts an EU recommendation that the change in assessing fuel efficiency and emissions in cars is 'cost neutral' to consumers, WLTP will have a huge impact on Irish buyers with the price going just one way - up!

Buyers will see increases

across all car brands.

All car manufacturers must provide their products' fuel economy and emissions figures under the WLTP by the end of August.

WLTP involves 'real world' motoring test conditions which will show higher consumption and emissions figures than the New European Driving Cycle (NEDC) system - the test used for decades which carmakers have learned to 'game' to achieve unrealistic results.

WLPT will particularly affect vehicles using older engine systems.

Here, and in some other countries, both the VRT and Road Tax use the emissions figures to calculate the amount of taxation built into the retail price of cars. But the real emissions provided under WLTP will be higher than the former NEDC system.

At the recent Ford Focus

launch, Ciaran McMahon, chairman and MD of Ford Ireland said he is hopeful that the Government will fix the tax bands accordingly as not doing so 'would be political suicide'.

He said, "It could halve the market here in 12 months so the Government can't sit back and do nothing." He pointed out that Ford Ireland's Kuga crossover price will rise by €1,000 under the new regime and that they have had to delete the 1.5L in the Mondeo range as it will be too costly to keep in the range. It's understood that some car makers have already delivered their options to the Government.

At the recent new CLS and A-Class launches, Ciaran Allen of Mercedes-Benz said these are the first of their models to be introduced under the new WLTP emissions testing procedure and that early indications are that petrols are faring worse than diesels and that SUVs are faring worse than

saloons in these more stringent tests.

"Manufacturers like ourselves are being cautious with production until we see what the results show up. Our plans have been to make one move and that would be to the full WLTP and omitting the NECD 2 which is the fist step towards WLTP."



#### New generation Combo ready to launch

OPEL has announced the fifth generation of its compact, multifunctional commercial vehicle, the Combo, writes Trish Whelan.

The new Combo cargo van comes in short and long versions, crew cab and roof hatch. The short version is 4.40 metres in length and the long version is 4.75 metres. Both come with cabins featuring two or three front seats, and a spacious five seater crew cab version.

Cargo space can accommodate two Euro pallets. Load volume is up to 4.4m3, a payload of up to 1,000kg, and a loading length of up to 3,440mm.

There are up to 19 assistance systems that make driving, manoeuvring, transporting goods or a crew easier, safer and more

Innovations include permanent rear view camera and numerous assistance systems, and the latest generation infotainment with 8-inch touchscreen to keep the operator connected. A unique feature in the segment is a sensor-based overload indicator that.

at a press of a button, allows the driver to make sure the vehicle is not overloaded.

The new Combo comes with passenger car comfort, heated steering wheel (unique in the segment) along with heated front seats and dual zone climate control.

It will have its world premiere at the IAA Commercial vehicles Show in Hannover on 19 September and sales are expected to start that month.

# Limerick hurlers in bid to end 11 year final absence

All Ireland SHC: Munster champions Cork a novel semi final foe

JUST an 18th ever All Ireland Senior Hurling Final appearance is the target for the Limerick hurlers this Sunday in Croke Park.

"You put your best foot forward and if it is good enough you get a result and if it's not, it's not," said Limerick manager John Kiely.

Limerick bid to end a run of three semi final defeats and reach a first final since 2007.

On Sunday, (3.30pm) Cork will be the 10th different opponent to provide semi final opposition for Limerick. It will be a 16th semi final since the first in 1911 and Limerick have won eight of the previous 15, albeit only winning once of the four

since the turn of the millennium.

If the sides finish level on Sunday, two periods of 10-minutes of extra time will be played. If the teams are still level after extra time, the game will go to

a replay on the August Bank

Holiday weekend. "A lot games take on a life of their own and no two games are the same so drawing comparisons from the first game and expectations for the second game, well there won't be any comparison because they are different games and maybe different players starting. There is a different prize at stake as well - that game was part of a round robin series and everybody was caught up in that bubble at the time but this is different and teams have had time to progress further - they have played a Munster final and won that and played extremely well to come from behind to win it against an extremely strong Clare team, who have now also landed in a semi final with Galway," outlined the

Limerick manager.

"Obviously, we were flagging a bit towards the end, but if we had a couple of extra days training, they might have been a bit sharper, but in

general, they've been really good."


He continued: "We would have had one of the lower budgets as it was. We halved that again by releasing the higher earners. We hope that we can pay it. Pat and the board are trying their best to get some money in and get some investment. Hopefully, we can get bigger crowds in the Markets Field. We're playing really well — obviously not getting the results, but we're entertaining anyway."

However, the last time the sides met, Tommy Barrett's men ran out 6-3 winners – the first time the Blues have scored six away from home in the top tier for well over 30 years. ## Limerick's Aaron Tier to represent Ireland

THIS week I caught up with Limerick man and Irish Paralympian, Aaron Tier, who has been selected for the Irish International Cerebral Palsy squad for the 2018 IFCPF European Championships in the Netherlands.

Aaron took me back to May 2011 when it all began as he joined the Irish Paralympic team as an emerging talented footballer via the Football Association of Ireland

"I was only 16 years old when I made my senior international debut for Ireland in the World Championships in Holland in 2011. From playing on the streets of Limerick to playing an international fixture in such quick succession, my focus was aimed to qualify for the 2012 London Paralympics. However a freak result against America in the World Championships

tarnished my dreams to represent my country in the 2012 games" admitted Tier.

Tier used that defeat to drive on to bigger and better things

"I used the heartbreak as fuel to better myself not only in sport but also from an educational point of view. I wasn't the brightest in school but was determined to further myself for the better. Since then I have represented my country on over 70 occasions to date in European and World Championships. Tier was rewarded for his self belief in 2016 when he represented Ireland in the Brazil Paralympics.

"CP football is uniquely different to traditional 11-a-side football as it is a 7-a-side game and players have a classification based on their physical attributes which impacts on how the coaches can use them or make changes in games" Tier

explained. "We begin the tournament on the July 25 against

Denmark and will face Germany, Northern Ireland and the Netherlands and all matches will take place on the KNVB Campus in Zeist"

Tier is an inspiration to others as he has had to battle throughout his life, to achieve his goals.


"As a person who was born with cerebral palsy I've learned that the only way to cope with having a physical disability is to adapt to each hurdle that is presented to me along the way. From facing many surgeries to being told I will never be able to walk, play sports, drive a car and even enrol in mainstream school. All I wanted to do was to go home and play football on the streets, which ultimately led to my international stardom through playing with Star Rovers FC" continued the Irish international

The community drop-in sessions that are provided by the FAI in Limerick to 'keep kids off the streets' are invaluable for players like

"It wasn't until I joined the international squad that my grades skyrocketed in an upward spiral thanks to the assistance and guidance from coaching staff at that tie. I went from failing subjects to achieving A1 grades. However, I just fell short on 5 CAO points for the college course I wanted to do. I just saw that as another obstacle I had to overcome. A year later I completed a FETAC course in order to achieve the points I needed at that time. I have subsequently gone on to complete a Bachelor of Arts and Sports Management at Limerick Institute Technology.

Tier is part of a 14 man squad who are coached by Paul Breen who believes they have a real chance of taking home a medal.

"We can build on last years sixth place finish at the World Championships. We're stronger for the experience and I think we can be confident that the team can kick on and compete"

# Goodwill is nothing without cold hard cash

This week, we here at the Limerick Leader received a letter from Sweden.

The land of IKEA, Volvo and Spotify is not normally the country we get letters from, but it was great to get it all the same.

The letter came from Limerick native Noel Sheehy.

Noel, like the rest of us, has some concerns about the future of Limerick FC as we know it.

Mr. Sheehy asked two questions.

1. Has there been any approach from Limerick FC to help them in their search of a buyer/investor?

2. Do you have any idea how much is the club available for?

To quickly answer both, no and it would be very hard to put a figure on the value of the club at this time

The letter showed once more the level of interest there is in Limerick FC.

We can see from our paper sales on weeks of big games and also through our website, just how many people have an interest in the goings on at the 'SuperBlues'.

The club have had a torrid few weeks, with part time football the only likely saving grace for the club as we know it.

Last week saw the possibility of

the players going on strike, while the optics of the PFAI and the FAI getting involved in your club is never a good thing for potential investors.

As Cork City and Dundalk have shown in recent times, investment in the league can lead to European cash windfalls. Both clubs seem to be heading in the right direction in terms of fan engagement, management of player wages and building links with their business communities.

Are these all things that Limerick FC could do? Sure they are. The last census has Limerick City and County's population at above 190,000.

There has to be enough people in that number who would be prepared to swap their hard earned cash to support the team.

The disconnect between the club and the community is growing on a weekly basis. The transient nature of sports fans means that with each passing week, Limerick are less and less likely to gain new fans.

The troubles Limerick FC have had on the pitch can be directly linked to the uncertain times the club have faced off the pitch.

It is hard to know if openly advertising that the club was for



sale was a good thing. Investors or buyers knew that if they bided their time they would 'pick up' the club for a cheaper price at the end of the season.

Inconsistent updating of the club's website and social media channels has also not helped the 'passing interest fan' from learning more about the team and when they are playing next.

The website has jumped wildly between the best updated site in the league, to going several weeks without a match report. This is just another example of how the club has lost touch with what really matters.

For Limerick FC to move forward the Markets Field needs to be an attractive match day experience for all, while also playing host to those more 'boisterous' supporters who add some colour and atmosphere.

Modern football is an entertainment business. Limerick FC struggled this season to engage with their potential new fans, while also allowed the opening part of the season to be dominated by a poor

playing surface.

Couple these items with the loss of some high profile signings and the off the field rumblings from last week and you see an organisation which is in need of a massive overhaul in ideas.

Goodwill is something that Limerick FC are always going to have. Limerick people would love nothing more than to have a soccer team in the city which played in Europe, however goodwill is nothing without cold hard cash.

That's what pays the bills.

For me there are many other questions that remain unanswered, largely because neither side have gone fully on the record on the particular issue of the yenue.

From a GAA point of view it is the latest in a long line of PR

disasters. What horrendous bad press at a time when the later stages of the All Irelands should dominate.

Someone in Croke Park needs to do a night course in PR. Between this Liam Miller game and Kildare's Newbridge saga, GAA officials need to learn lessons because they have been found wanting badly in terms of public relations. Surely they knew this latest dilemma was going to be made public and they should have been ready.

The last week of bad PR will leave a bad taste for quite some time, eroding any positive marketing.


