Ireland South MEP Ni Riada in bid for Irish Presidency

SINN Fein TD Maurice Quinlivan believes the upcoming Presidential election is "all to play for", after his party showed its hand for the October 26 contest.

Ireland South MEP Liadh Ni Riada, will represent Sinn Fein in the hope of becoming the country's 10th president.

She will face the sitting president Michael D Higgins,

alongside Independent candidates Sean Gallagher, Gavin Duffy and Senator Joan Freeman.

Despite the fact the current president – who lived his early childhood on the Ennis Road – is the favourite to secure re-election to Áras an Uachtaráin, Mr Quinlivan believes the contest is "winnable".

"She is a fantastic candidate, who has done very well since she has been elected to the European Parliament. She's shown her ability

to stand up for both Limerick and Ireland South in the parliament. I believe it's time we had a contest. We need to use this presidential campaign to talk about the type of Ireland we want going forward," he

told The Leader.

Above all, the Limerick TD says he hopes it is a "respectful campaign".

"I hope it's about Ireland and how Ireland can be better and the future vision for Ireland. I think Liadh will encapsulate that very well," he added. Ms Ni Riada grew up in west Cork, and is the daughter of musician Sean O Riada. She wants to be "a new President for a New Ireland."

"Ireland has radically changed

since the last Presidential election. We've become a more caring and inclusive society. A global inspiration when it comes to progressive social change," she said, "But we are only at the beginning of this new chapter. It's time for all of us – particularly our younger generation – to write our own story."

Ms Ni Riada took the second seat in the south in the European Parliament election in 2014 with 125,309 first preferences.

Casey secures presidential nod from Limerick council

Election: 'Dragon's Den' star closes in on challenging for highest office in the land

DRAGONS Den star Peter Casey has secured the nomination of Limerick City and County Council.

With Limerick the third council to nominate the businessman for a tilt at the highest office in the land, Mr Casey now needs just one more authority to nominate him to place him on the ballot paper.

Members in neighbouring Tipperary County Council met this Tuesday evening to finalise their nomination.

Back at County Hall in Dooradoyle, Mr Casey was the agreed candidate of both Fianna Fail and Fine Gael. Fianna Fail council leader Cllr Michael Collins proposed the entrepreneur, with Cllr Michael Sheahan of Fine Gael seconding the nomination.

"He is a very successful businessman who not only has been very successful but has also failed before, and come back stronger than ever. That is a huge achievement for any man," Cllr Collins said.

There was a contest, however, with Independent member John Loftus nominating journalist Gemma O'Doherty, a move seconded by Cllr John Gilligan.

But while she received three votes - from Cllrs Emmett O'Brien, Loftus and Gilligan - Mr Casey prevailed with 21 members backing him.

Sinn Fein abstained, as they will back their own candidate Liadh Ni Riada, as did the Solidarity party.

The only Labour councillor present, Cllr Elena Secas also did not pick a candidate, as her party will be backing the incumbent President Michael D Higgins.

Interestingly, metropolitan mayor Cllr Daniel Butler did not follow his Fine Gael colleagues, and chose to abstain in the vote.

He confirmed afterwards this is because he will be supporting President Higgins in the October 26 contest.

There were also a number of no shows from councillors at the meeting. Earlier this Tuesday, Mr Casey and Ms O'Doherty made their case before councillors, with any would-be presidential election candidate needing the backing of four local authorities.

They were joined by Marie Goretti Moylan, Sarah Louise Mulligan and John O'Hare.

Addressing councillors, Mr Casey said: "As a nation, we are punching well below our weight. We should be far more influential on the world stage then we are. That's the essence of my platform. We now have the technology to connect the dots to the Irish around the world. The slogan for my campaign is 'Why be a small country when we are already a great nation?'.

He pledged, if elected, he will give part of his presidential salary to charity each month in connection with each local authority if elected AS A NATION, WE ARE PUNCHING WELL BELOW OUR WEIGHT PETER CASEY

president. It would be up to that authority to decide where the

funding goes."

Runner-up Ms O'Doherty
provoked the ire of many, when she
suggested during her speech that
"Limerick is suffering from a serious
crime epidemic. I would love for this

city to shed this reputation."

Among those critical of the remark was former Education Minister Jan O'Sullivan, who tweeted: "Limerick crime figures now and in recent years are nowhere near top of the list. Much easier to have the reputation we deserve if people like [Gemma O'Doherty] stop peddling untruths."

Earlier this week, presidential candidate Kevin Sharkey pulled out of the race, while entrepreneurs Sean Gallagher and Gavin Duffy secured their four nominations.

They will be joined on the ballot by Senator Joan Freeman, Ms Ni Riada and sitting President Michael D Higgins.

Burglary suspect to stay out of city

A FILE will be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions following a burglary in the city centre last week, writes David Hurley.

Paul Foran, aged 36, who has an address at North Claughan Road, Garryowen, was released on bail after he appeared before Limerick District Court.

Garda John Sheehan told Judge Marian O'Leary the defendant replied "I'm sorry' after he was formally charged with burglary relating to an incident in the early hours of September 13.

Mr Foran was arrested at 5.10am – shortly after gardai were alerted to a break-in at the PC Repair Centre on William Street.

Sergeant John Moloney said there was no objection to bail subject to the defendant complying with certain conditions.

Mr Foran, who was granted legal aid, was ordered to stay out of the city centre except when attending court or the social welfare offices on Dominick Street.

The matter was adjourned to November for DPP's directions.

Authority clears O'Connell St as 'Car-Free Day' takes place

LIMERICK's main thoroughfare will be closed to traffic for much of this Saturday, as the city celebrates European Car-Free Day.

Vans will face bans, alongside other forms of motorised vehicles, from 8am to 3pm in O'Connell Street, from its junction with William Street to the intersection with Roches Street.

Meanwhile, parking will be prohibited between 8am and 5pm along this stretch of the street.

It's all for a day which highlights the necessity to leave your cars at home, and instead choose more environmentally friendly ways to commute.

In previous years, a cycle hub and information stand on the O'Connell Street-Bedford Row junction has been set up.

Meanwhile, a cycle will take place, and there will be a 'bike doctor' offering free consultation and basic repairs.

An Garda Siochana will offer bike safety information in conjunction with the Road Safety Authority.

Independent councillor Frankie Daly, who chairs the transport committee, has welcomed the initiative.

"I think it's a good thing. It

encourages people to get into the city centre, to shop, spend money and support business. It's good to incentivise this kind of thing once in a while," he said.

Cllr Daly added: "Cars can choke up the centre, particularly when people go away and dump them. There are people with disabilities. It goes against traffic. When people hog a thing for the day, it's not good news."

A Europe-wide initiative, Car-Free Day has been taking place in Ireland since the year 2000 in various cities including Galway,

Cork and Dublin alongside Limerick.

The day itself marks exactly 100 days until the end of the year and is the autumn equinox.

It's only the third time since 2001 that the event has fallen on a Saturday.



Ouinlivan calls for investment in drugs taskforce

A TD HAS called for more resources to be pumped into the local drugs taskforce in light of the shock expressed by a city community over drug addicts using holy water fonts to "clean syringes" at St John's Cathedral in the city.

It came as Garryowen resident John Nugent said that residents in the area are "concerned about issues affecting the Cathedral" and that "some addicts have used the holy water font at the entrance to clean needles".

the Nugent, Garryowen representative for Sinn Fein, said that one addict was removed from the Cathedral by gardai" recently.

"Older people often visit the Cathedral to light candles and find comfort there. They must be able to do this without fear," he said.

Parish priest, Fr Noel Kirwan said he was aware of the issue.

"How widespread or how often it

happens is another thing. But it does happen," Fr Kirwan said, noting that it also occurred during his time as parish priest in St Michael's, which is also in the

He explained that Mass-goers at St John's can fill bottles of holy water via a container in the cathedral, instead of using the water at the font.

Mr Nugent also said that he has been Mr Nugent also said that he has been informed by staff at nearby St John's Hospital that drug-users are "shooting up" in the hospital toilets, adding that they are passing through security.

A spokesperson for the UL Hospitals Group confirmed: "St John's Hospital is given and has contested An

aware of this issue and has contacted An Garda Síochána about this matter."

"It truly is a shame that a hospital that is regarded so fondly by Limerick people should be subjected to such behaviour. I would urge immediate extra security from both the Hospital and An Gardaí as doing nothing is simply not acceptable," Mr Nugent said.

Sinn Fein TD Maurice Quinlivan said he was also aware of the incidents at St John's Cathedral and the Hospital.

The TD said that more resources were required for agencies in the city in tackling the drugs problem.

"I am calling for extra resources in the area. The Drugs Taskforce is doing a fantastic job but they can't do it with the lack of funding. We need to look at it from the health way and to make sure that the

taskforce is funded properly. But we also need to make sure there are additional gardai for resources, just to make sure they are responding properly," said Deputy Quinlivan.





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Controversial plan for social housing gets green light

CONTROVERSIAL plans to build more than 40 social houses near the North Circular Road are set to proceed following a comprehensive vote in favour of the development at Limerick City Hall this

More than 100 new social houses were approved by councillors in Metropolitan District this week, with proposals to build developments on Lower Carey's Road, Kileely Road and in Rathbane passed unanimously.

However, the proposal to build 43 residential units on the green space to the left of the Condell Road was met with opposition from Fianna Fáil councillors.

Mayor of Limerick Cllr James Collins, Cllr Kieran O'Hanlon, Cllr Sean Lynch, Cllr Jerry O'Dea and Cllr Vivienne Crowley voted against the Clonmacken development at a meeting of the Metro District this week.

Moving to reject the proposals, Cllr Vivienne Crowley said that local residents feared the development would be repeat of the "the mistakes of the past" as it is a stand-alone, isolated unit, not served by a

Cllr Kieran O'Hanlon told the council he was "in favour of social integration, not social segregation."

"We need social housing but we shouldn't just have knee-jerk reactions and put 43 families in the middle of nowhere," he said. "Residents groups will accept a mix of social and affordable housing but we are not listening to the views of the people," he

However, there are "hundreds of private developments" planned for the area, according to Sinn Féin councillor Séighin Ó Ceallaigh. "It's not going to be 43 isolated houses," he said. "It seems the land is unsuitable for public development but it would be fine for private developers to come in." Labour councillor Joe Leddin also dismissed claims of 'social-segregation.'"I'm not going to sit here and be a hypocrite and oppose houses in a housing crisis," he

The motion to proceed with the development was carried by 14 votes to 6, following an amendment to reduce the development's 4-bed units to 3-beds.

Between 5pm and 9pm, there will be guided tours which will allow people to see what goes on behind the scenes at the garda station.

The tour will include a visit to the

Communications Room where all calls for the Limerick division are received and dispatched.

There will also be a chance to see the bank of TV monitors which relay footage from the network of CCTV cameras across the city.

The recently re-opened custody

suite will be included in the tour which will gave an insight into how prisoners are processed following their arrest.

Members of a number of specialist unit including the armed Regional Support Unit and the Dog Unit will also take part in the tour.

Cash stolen from youth who agreed to buy phone

GARDAI are warning people who buy second-hand products online to be cautious when meeting the seller in person.

It follows an incident during which a sum of money was stolen from a young man who arranged to meet another man who was selling a phone.

"The phone had been advertised on a website and a price and a meeting was arranged between the two," said crime prevention officer Sergeant Ber Leetch.

"At the time of the meeting the buyer of the phone was counting out the cash when the other male

grabbed the cash ran to a car and drove off," she added.

Sgt Leetch says buyers should be cautious and suspicious when dealing with people they don't know.

"Don't go alone, note the registration number of the car in which they arrive in. Ask to examine the item before you present any cash," she said.

Safe containing cash and passports stolen in burglary

A SAFE containing passports and cash was stolen during a burglary on the outskirts of the city at the weekend.

An investigation has been launched following the break-in at a house in Annacotty.

"For any safe to be effective it must be of a good enough quality to be bolted to a solid wall and well hidden within the home," said a garda spokesperson.

Gardai are also advising homeowners with CCTV cameras to keep the hard drive secure. "The hard drive should be kept in a separate area from the screen and ideally with a 'dummy' hard drive in place," said a spokesperson.

Appeal as unlocked cars are targeted by thieves

SEVERAL parked cars which were broken into in recent days were unlocked, gardai have revealed.

A laptop and a wallet were taken from two separate cars which were parked at the University of Limerick while a handbag and cash were taken from two other unlocked cars in the city centre.

"We are all very busy and we could easily press our car keys in the general direction of our cars as we walk away from them, assuming that they are locked but that isn't good

enough. You must see the lights flashing, hear the lock engage and pull the handle of the door to be very sure that your car is secure," said crime prevention officer Sergeant Ber Leetch.

Car owners are also being urged to make sure their cars are locked when parked outside their homes overnight.

Shop worker's phone stolen

GARDAI are urging retailers to ensure staff have somewhere

secure to store their personal property.

The appeal follows an incident during which a phone belonging to a member of staff was stolen from a premises in the city centre. "Staff members must be very careful of their personal property while at work. If lockers are provided, use them and lock them," said a garda spokesperson.

Delay of Monaleen School questioned

'Prefabs': No timeline for construction of building

THE DECISION to proceed with a new school building for Monaleen in one stage instead of two, as originally planned, has "hugely delayed" the project, according to Limerick's Labour representatives.

While movement on the new school building for Monaleen has been welcomed, the decision to proceed with the construction in one stage has delayed the project, according to former Education Minister and Limerick City TD Jan O'Sullivan and Labour councillor Elena Secas.

"When I initiated this badly needed new school building as Education Minister in the last

government, the intention was that construction would proceed in two stages but subsequently a decision was taken to do it in one stage which has delayed the project," Deputy O'Sullivan said.

"While I welcome that the service level agreement will be signed in the near future and that the ETB will shortly appoint a design team, we have yet to see a timeline for construction.

The school now has 13 full classrooms and seven smaller resource rooms in prefabs, according to Cllr Secas.

"This decision has hugely delayed the whole process," she said.

"We are now years later and nothing is happening there. We have more classrooms in prefabs at the moment then we have in the school."

"In terms of student numbers, the population increased has significantly in the last year in the Castletroy area. There is also a significant increase in student numbers," Cllr Secas said.

"It is clear for all to see that Monaleen School is not fit for purpose and I would seriously question the delay in the construction of the school."

"Phase one was ready to go and the project should not have been interfered with and should have proceeded as intended."

"This delay is unacceptable and I would urge the minister to progress construction as a matter of urgency," she added.

Man fined after arranging to sell cigarettes online

A MAN, who was selling his supply of cigarettes through Facebook as he intended to quit smoking, has been fined €2,500 following an undercover customs operation.

Nabil Ourabia, who has an address in the Watergate area, told Revenue Customs Service officers he was hoping to kick his smoking habit and wanted to make his money back after he arranged to sell 200 cigarettes for €60 in 2016, Limerick District Court heard.

Mr Ourabia was found to be attempting to sell cigarettes without excise duty at a potential loss to the exchequer of €354.74, State Solicitor Aileen Mee told the court.

In May 2016, officers observed a Facebook page advertising cigarettes for sale in Limerick City and arranged to meet Mr Ourabia in the Watergate area.

On the night in question, he was stopped

by officers, while holding the cigarettes in a paper bag. When asked if he was there to sell the cigarettes, Mr Ourabia said he was. When questioned, Mr Ourabia told the customs officers he did not know he was committing an offence, the court heard.

He told customs officers that the cigarettes had come from Lithuania or Algeria and that he did not pay excise duty on them. He told customs officers he was intending on quitting and that he wanted to make his money back. The sale of tobacco without excise duty carries a maximum fine of €5,000, the court heard.

Solicitor John Herbert said his client had no previous convictions and at the time he was unaware he was committing an offence. Mr Ourabia has part-time employment and supports his family, Mr Herbert said, requesting that the fine be mitigated to reflect these circumstances.

Judge Marian O'Leary imposed a €2,500 fine, giving Mr Ourabia ten months to pay.

Terminally-ill woman's High Court action adjourned to 2019

A TERMINALLY-ill Limerick woman's High Court action over the alleged misreading of her smear tests has been adjourned until late January.

Ruth Morrissey, of Schoolhouse Road, Monaleen, and her husband Paul are suing the HSE and two laboratories, Quest Diagnostics and MedLab Pathology over alleged failure to correctly interpret, report and diagnose smears carried out in 2009

Ms Morrissey was diagnosed with cervical cancer in 2014, and was told in early 2018 that the cancer had recurred and was terminal.

Lawyers for the Morrisseys asked the judge, Mr Justice Kevin Cross to

adjourn the case after receiving updated reports from defendants which included, they said, an "essay" in relation to the general cancer screening programme.

The reports include an expert opinion that the claimant's cancer had nothing to do with the previous smears. The court was told the case was meant to take four weeks, but it might take double that time.

Lawyers for the HSE and Quest Diagnostics did not oppose the adjournment application. MedLab said they wanted the case to be heard at the earliest possible opportunity, according to RTE News. The hearing will resume on January 29.

Elderly woman's handbag robbed

A YOUNG man who is accused of robbing a handbag from an elderly woman in broad daylight was apprehended thanks to the assistance of members of the public who witnessed the incident.

Shane Ryan-Casey, aged 26, of no fixed abode, was refused bail after gardai expressed concerns he would commit further offences and would not appear in court if released.

Detective Garda Paul Crowley of Roxboro Road station told Limerick District Court the accused man is a "volatile and dangerous individual with a history of violence".

Opposing a bail application, he said it will be alleged the defendant approached the 69-year-old as she was walking at St Nessans Road, Dooradoyle – near the Crescent Shopping Centre – at around 3pm September 12, last.

"He took hold of her handbag and ran (with the bag) across the road to Ballykeefe Estate," he told Judge Marian O'Leary.

A number of witnesses followed the culprit and gave a detailed

Solicitor Sarah Ryan said her client, who has addiction issues, was intoxicated when arrested and was declared unfit by a doctor and could not be questioned for several hours following his arrest

She told the court he was willing to abide by any conditions imposed on him if granted bail.

Detective Garda Crowley rejected this assertion saying he did not believe he would comply with any conditions.

Having formally refused bail under the provisions of the Bail Act, Judge O'Leary remanded the defendant in custody pending directions from the Director of Public Prosecutions...

A file is currently being prepared by investigating gardai and will be forwarded to the DPP in the coming weeks.



Rose to bloom once every two years in new format

Rose of Tralee: Limerick to be represented biannually from 2019

THERE will only be one Limerick Rose every two years from 2019, under a new revamped selection process for the Rose of Tralee.

The changes in the competition would see half of the regions showcasing a Rose each year, and have been made to "ensure that every Rose enjoys the ultimate positive experience".

Roses representing Kerry, Cork and Dublin will continue to be selected every year.

Every other centre would select a Rose biannually, and 32 Roses will be hosted in Tralee each year. It means that every Rose would reach the TV final and take part in the full schedule of events.

For a Rose, the festival entails a host of events, including parades, gala functions, the televised Rose selection nights, a Rose Tour and more.

The new move means that every Limerick Rose will make it as far as the televised final. Up until last year, Limerick had gone 10 years without being represented in the televised selection.

"Moving from the Regional Festival (staged from 2004 to 2015) to bringing all our Roses directly to the Rose of Tralee International Festival for the past three years has been generally very positively received," said the Executive Chair of the Rose of Tralee International Festival, Anthony O'Gara.

"There is one challenging aspect to the new format that does not sit well with any of us and that we want to address, the selection of 32 Roses from 66 for the TV Selection . Regardless of how sensitively we handle that, it is not in keeping with our ethos or our tradition," he said.

"Our focus is to celebrate and respect the passion and emotion, and indeed the time and financial investment that every Rose, her family and Rose Centre invest with us."

The festival has grown extensively since 2004, with 40 new Rose Centres and a rejuvenated Rose of Tralee brand.

Rose Centres are at the core of the Festival, organising the selection of each regional Rose.

\$300k UL study 'corrects gap in bowel screenings'

35,000: Number of papers examined by major research group

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PEOPLE with a family history of colorectal cancer or abnormal gastrointestinal tissue growths (polyps) should be screened, according to breakthrough research co-led by University of Limerick academics.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer deaths in Ireland, with 20 deaths and 60 diagnoses a week. On average, one in 25 people will develop the disease throughout their lifetime.

The research, published in the world-renowned journal Gastroenterology, makes 19 recommendations which guide the choice of screening tests and the frequency of which for those who have close relatives with colon cancer or precancerous growths.

Head of the graduate entry medical school (GEMS) at UL, Prof Des Leddin was the co-lead author on the paper, working alongside eight other universities in the United States and Canada.

"The guidelines will, we hope, reduce mortality from this common disease and ensure that screening resources are optimally used. The impact of this work, which was co-led by UL, will be global in reach and will affect screening for a large segment of the

opulation."

Prof Leddin said that between one in 10 and one in 20 people has a relative with colon cancer and one in two people may have a relative with pre-cancerous growths. He said that evidence-based guidelines have not previously been developed for this cohort of people.

"The purpose of this study was to correct this gap in cancer screening by carefully sifting through all of the evidence to draw up best practice guidelines for consumers and health care providers," he said.

A team of experts from nine universities examined 35,000 papers over a three-year period at a cost of US\$300,000.

In doing so, she urged the defendant "not to come before the court again.'

He said the couple were set upon by the group and knocked to the ground by the youths and that both sustained injuries.

Inspector Padraig Byrnes said the young woman sustained facial injuries including a broken nose and he submitted the incident was at the "higher end of the scale".

The teenage girl's handbag was stolen during the incident which was captured on CCTV.

Garda Finn told Judge Marian

O'Leary he had concerns Mr Corbett would not appear in court if granted bail and that he would engage in further criminality.

While a file is being prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions, it is anticipated the matter will proceed on indictment before the circuit court.

Solicitor John Herbert said his client, who has had difficulties with drug addiction in the past, was willing to abide by any conditions imposed by the court.

He said the father-of-one has an address where he can live and that there have been no further incidents

Having considered the garda objection, Judge O'Leary said she was refusing bail under Section 2 of the Bail Act. She said she was "making no finding" in relation to an objection under O'Callaghan's Rules.

The matter was adjourned pending DPP's directions.

Minister Flanagan also suggested the police could wear bodycams to film events from their perspective. In the interests of fairness and transparency, he says.

Which would be fine, if it weren't for the unfortunate frequency with which garda technology - like laptops and mobile phones - go missing when they're needed for an inquiry

The trojan efforts of members of the Roads Policing Unit are having an unexpected consequence which could have an effect on hundreds of prosecutions. As court lists continue to grow, motorists are being "left in limbo" for longer. And given their obligation to inform their insurance company of 'pending' matters, many are being penalised before the outcome is known.

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Act on these tips and you will save on your tax bi

his is the last in our series of tax relief articles, and I will share with you some more areas that may be relevant to you.

The articles over the past couple of weeks have obviously struck a chord given the amount of emails I've received from readers, who weren't 100% sure, or were aware of their entitlements.

And as I always say, it's no good having this information if you don't do anything with it, so the key to getting money back, is by following through and doing what you say you will do. Don't delay any further and make that submission on those areas that apply to you and get back that money that's rightfully yours.

PENSION

One of the best ways you can prevent the Government from getting their hands on your income before you do, is by making pension contributions. Amounts contributed to a pension fund are taken from gross income before it becomes liable to tax. So not only are you reducing the amount of tax you pay, you are contributing to your future income in retirement as well.

The amount of tax relief available will depend on your age. For example, if you are aged 40, you can claim 25% of your income up to a maximum limit of €115,000.

The amount you contribute goes up in bands with reference to your age by an additional 5% each time.

 $If you \, are \, not \, taking \, advantage \, of \, this \,$ relief, you are leaving money behind you each year, so review your current funding rate and increase them and contribute as much as you can.

TUITION FEES

It's that time of the year, when people are starting off or returning to third-level education. And if that person is you, or a child of yours, you are entitled to tax relief on the cost of qualifying fees i.e. tuition fees and the student contribution. No relief is available, however, for examination, registration or administration fees.

The relief is actually available to whoever is paying the fees and is available at 20% but is restricted to amounts over €3,000 and there is an upper limit of €7,000 per third level course. So, if qualifying costs amount to €5,500, you are entitled to tax relief on €2,500 which amounts to €500.

This relief also applies if you or your children are studying abroad, provided it's in an EU member state, and in an approved course.

There are an estimated 45,000 people in Ireland who suffer from Coeliac disease. As a result they have to purchase gluten-free food, which can be very expensive. If you suffer from this disease or if you have specific dietary requirements due to a medical condition, you can claim 20% tax relief on the cost incurred, which includes the cost of food purchased.

This cost over 12 months could be substantial, so it's worth your while making a claim if you haven't done so.

TAX ASSESSMENT STATUS

When it comes to how you wish to be assessed for tax, married couples or civil partners have three options to choose from. They can be assessed

individually, jointly or separately, with the joint assessment option usually being the most favourable one. With it, tax credits and standard cut off points can be allocated between each other.

Married/Civil partnerships couples, who are both working can earn up to €69,100 and pay tax at the lower rate of 20%, with the balance taxed at 40%. If their individual incomes are greater than €34,550, they are taking advantage of the standard rate tax band, so, for there to be any monetary gain for a couple being assessed on a joint basis, one has to be taxed at the higher rate and the other at the lower rate. One has unused tax credits due to their low income, or only if one of them is

If for example, a couple has one income at its €50,000, they would be €3,450 better off each year opting for joint assessment than if the income earning spouse continued to be assessed on an individual basis.

MAKING A CLAIM

There are a couple of ways, you can go about making a claim for the tax reliefs I referred to over the past couple of weeks. You can do it yourself on-line on the Revenue's myAccount service or if you are unsure if you are doing the right thing, or you don't have the time, you can use a number of on-line tax advisory companies, who will make the submission on your behalf and take a percentage of the amount refunded.

And finally, remember there is a $four-year\ time\ limit, so\ if\ you\ want\ to\ go$ back and claim for reliefs dating back to 2014, you have, to make a claim before December 31 2018.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, what is the best retirement? Some people say to stay away from a pension and save into a bank account, others say the opposite

A: The difference between saving into a regular savings account or into a pension is significant, with the pension route being so much better.

If you save into a pension, you will receive tax relief on your contribution, so those who pay tax at the higher rate, will get tax relief of 40% on any contribution they make e.g. they save €100, it only costs them €60.

Saving into a regular savings account on the other hand, comes from after tax income, so if you save €100, you probably had to pay tax of c. €35 (this will vary depending on your income) on your income before you netted down to €100.

If, over time, you choose the pension route and a friend of yours opts for the savings account, and you both save €200 per month, over, say, 30 years, you will end up with the same amount i.e. €72,000, but it will have cost you €43,200 to get there, and your friend €97,200.

Also, your savings are growing tax free within the fund and are not subject to DIRT tax, and you can take a percentage of your fund tax -free at retirement as well.

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Job cuts in Raheen as BD confirms unit closure

Reduction: Tech firm bosses hope to mitigate losses with relocations

UP to 30 jobs are to be lost in Raheen after it emerged BD is to close its manufacturing plant in the suburb.

Leader Business can reveal that the company – which earlier this summer announced 85 new jobs – is seeking to rationalise to just one outlet in Limerick.

As a result of this, the New Jersey headquartered firm will close its Raheen facility, and instead concentrate its activities in its research facility at the former Unigolf facility in

Workers there focus on software, hardware and systems engineering.

It's understood staff were called in last week to be told of the news that the Raheen site will close in September 2019.

There are 70 staff working in manufacturing in the firm, and it's understood while between 20 and 30 jobs will go, the other workers will

transfer across to Plassey.

Troy Kirkpatrick, company spokesperson for BD, confirmed the news, saying that the move has been made after one of the products manufactured in Limerick was discontinued.

"We did an assessment from a manufacturing perspective there, and it made more sense to move production to other BD facilities. What we have told employees is anyone whose position is potentially affected, we will try and find other work for them within BD," he said.

He insisted there will be a transitional period of 12 to 18 months.

"No-one has received notice, or has lost their jobs as of yet. We are just letting them know of plans in advance, and giving them ample time to look for other jobs. We are a large global company, we have manufacturing all over the world. One of the products made here was discontinued," he confirmed.

However, Mr Kirkpatrick pointed

out that over the last year BD had added 135 jobs in the Limerick area.

"There are 85 positions currently open," he added, "When you look at the net effect, worst case scenario, the company will still be up net nearly 200 jobs in the last two years."

Sinn Fein TD Maurice Quinlivan, who has expressed concern over an overreliance on American firms locally in recent weeks, said: "Obviously, you'd be worried about any job losses. Foreign Direct Investment is very important in Ireland, and very welcome in Limerick. But we cannot be totally reliant on it. We are subject to external shocks, and we might be getting two of them, with Brexit on one side, and Donald Trump and whatever he decides to do on the other side. We do need more focus on indigenous businesses."


Chamber boss joins criticism of delay

THE latest planning delay to a €10m rugby museum in the city centre is "unacceptable," the Chamber chief executive has said.

Dee Ryan, who heads up Limerick's top representative business organisation, has said given the "transformational" impact the JP McManus-backed project could have in the city, it should be prioritised.

"This latest planning delay for the International Rugby Experience is a blow. Limerick city centre has been crying out for a transformational investment like this for decades. Together with the €9m spending planned by Limerick City and County Council for the revitalisation of O'Connell Street, this world class project will be a game changer in the city centre," Ms Ryan said.

The reason it is before An Bord Pleanala is due to An Taisce, which believes the development as proposed

While highlighting many positive arguments for locating the museum in

the city centre, the appeal stated that the buildings chosen for demolition are "key elements in an historic streetscape, the most extensive of its type outside Dublin".

It is for this reason that An Bord Pleanala had written to interested parties, saying that it was unable to meet its decision deadline of September 11 last

Ms Ryan said: "I accept that the proposed development, which is located opposite the contemporary AIB bank on O'Connell street, is taking place in an area of architectural interest but these are not protected structures," she said, "A protected structure is a building that a planning authority considers to be of special interest and this building has no such designation."

"In that context, it is unacceptable that an appeal on these grounds would, summarily, be able to hold up the project, or worse," she concluded.







Positive reminder of what we have to fight for

o say Eanna Ní Lamhna is well got in the areas of conservation and the environment would be something of an understatement.

A former president of An Taisce, and the Tree Council of Ireland, she has also worked for the forerunner of the EPA, to say nothing of her qualifications in the field of biology, being Ireland's best known entomologist.

The Louth native is best known these days as a contributor to RTE Radio's nature show Mooney Goes Wild, where her brisk, no-nonsense tones entertain and inform on matters environmental each Monday.

So when invited to come on board as an ambassador for National Geographic's Symphony For Our World, she was quick to see the value the event could have in bolstering our sense of what is important in these days of environmental turmoil.

"The event is showing the world at its most beautiful," she tells The Leader this week, "vou see the beauty as if you went out there vourself. You're under the sea looking at fish,

you're in the air, up in the mountains. "Much of the time, you know, we're being old we're going to hell in a handcart, we

mustn't be throwing away rubbish, the bees are all dead, the animals are dying, the oceans are polluted, the world is over - it's a negative

Answering her own query, she explains, 'We should care, because we have a beautiful world, but we've never seen this beautiful world. We're always told, 'it used to be like

As she says, if we wanted to join their club and get their money, which we did, then we had to abide by their rules.

"There was some of us at the time who said, 'what are they doing in Brussels, can't they mind their own business'. But it wasn't their business, it was all of our business and since we didn't know what to do or how to do it, they showed us, bless their cotton socks."

Looking to the future, Eanna is unequivocal when it comes to what we should concentrate on when I try to nail her down to one single environmental initiative.

"I'd encourage people to plant more trees," she says, definitively, "the only way we're going to get carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere is by photosynthesis.

We have the least amount of trees in Europe, only 12% of our land, compared to 40% on mainland Europe. This is something we can control, it's not as if we can't plant more trees, so that, I think, is a no-brainer

Finding the harmony between beautiful sound and vision

Alan Owens speaks to Steven **Lemke**, technical director and production stage manager on National Geographic: Symphony For Our World, which will have its European premiere in the Gaelic Grounds on Saturday September 29

- Can you tell us about how you became involved in this show and what vour role is?

I was working for an orchestra in the States where I had been for 14 years as their technical director and recording engineer. I was sought out by Jason Michael Paul Entertainment as they were looking to expand their ability to produce visually oriented shows for orchestras. National Geographic: Symphony For Our World is the third show that I've worked on with them. The first two were based on video games. (Heroes: A Video Game Symphony and Legend of Zelda: Symphony of the Goddesses). We were touring Zelda and National Geographic approached us about developing a show with them. They were in the process of a major reorganisation, having just been bought by Fox, and so things got put on hold for a bit. Once we got the green light, things progressed along very quickly.

- Can you tell us about the show from your standpoint, what can audiences expect?

Symphony For Our World is a five movement work comprising Sea, Shore, Land, Mountains and Sky. It features some of the most breathtaking footage from National Geographic from over the years, paired with a score by Bleeding Fingers, which is Hans Zimmer's composition group. It was run as an uninterrupted television special on earth day, which is the same day we premiered the live concert in San Francisco. We added a three movement piece called Symbiosis and a couple of other short pieces to make a full concert and the result is what the audiences around the world are seeing now. We touch on the theme of our changing world and also some very endearing images from the animal kingdom as well. There are also some wonderful testimonials from

National Geographic explorers which help tie everything together.

From a production point of view, how much of an undertaking is this show what is the scale, how many are involved, what are the logistics etc?

Like any video symphonic concert, there is a lot going on. First of all, the orchestra is on click track for a couple of reasons. Number one, we only get one rehearsal together to get everything ready for the performance and number two, we need to keep everything locked to the video. Second, as we only have one day together in the venue, there are a lot of elements to coordinate. Aside from the orchestra rehearsal, there is lighting, video, cameras and music tech to sort out and make sure that everything is playing well together. I am usually going non-stop right up to the downbeat of rehearsal and right on through until we finish loading out after the show.

As far as the team, we travel very light. There is the executive producer, the conductor and myself. When we started doing these video shows, there were five or six people sitting at the tech table running things plus a sound engineer, a lighting designer and some cameramen. Technology has allowed me to figure out a way to trim that way down so that it is just the local sound and lighting crew doing their thing and only me backstage running the show, click track, video switching and camera operation. Sometimes people are

baffled by how I can do it all but it has taken a number of years to fine tune the process to where it works well. I travel with two large cases which contain all of my equipment and the screens, projectors, sound and lights are all locally sourced. It also keeps things cost effective to where you can tour a show like this. If you had to fly a bunch of people around for $every \ show, it \ couldn't$ sustain financially.

- Symphony for Our World pairs artistry with science; can you tell us about the challenge of setting music to the accompanying footage from a performance point of view?

The major section of the show was composed by Andrew Christie and Austin Fray of Bleeding Fingers Music. For Symbiosis, we chose music from Ravel's Daphnis and Chloe that we felt conveyed the feelings we were trying to evoke and we

used a piece by a modern composer, Jocelyn Morlock, a female composer from British Columbia. Her composition Oiseaux Bleus et Sauvages really fit with the lighthearted video about Joel Sartore's Photo Ark project. Our conductors, Kevin Zakresky and Kelly Corcoran, were very instrumental in choosing the music that worked best for the show. With all that being said, there are good and bad points about composing new music for a project like this vs. picking existing music. While composing allows you the freedom to craft the piece however you want to fit the mood and image, it is very expensive and time consuming, whereas when using existing pieces, you need to be more creative $matching\,the\,video\,content$ to fit the mood of the music and still tell your story in a way that makes sense visually. Our director, Ryan Hamlyn, had the job of piecing all of that together into a cohesive package that

told the story we wanted to convey. The other part of this equation is using technology. With the Bleeding Fingers music, there are a lot more $modern\,elements\,to\,the$ music which make use of modern synthesizers and very specific sounds. We use a different orchestra in every city we perform in and therefor the equipment can be different every time. In order to maintain continuity, $I\,have\,all\,of\,the\,synthesizer$ patches programmed on one of my computers so while the keyboardists are playing their own instrument, the actual sound is generated from my computer.

- How will the show configure in Limerick what will it look like? This show has the biggest screen in Europe - can you tell us more?

In a lot of cities, and particularly in Europe, the performance venues tend to be a bit smaller or absolutely huge. When we play smaller theaters, say 1500-2500 seats, we need to scale down the screen size to ensure that everyone can see the whole screen from every seat.

Playing a large outdoor venue like this with the largest LED screens Europe has to offer is just what this show calls for. We will have a 7m screen over the stage and iom screens on either side so the imaging is going to be spectacular! This kind of footage deserves to be shown on a grand scale and when you see the imagery of the beautiful majesty of our planet on a screen like that, it's amazing.

- This is the only Irish concert date and a European premiere, so why Limerick?

That would be the doing of Paul Boland at CWB. He and I go back a few years from when his team provided production services for the European tour of the Legend of Zelda concert. CWB was great to work with, total pros, and we got on quite well. They had me come over with my PTZ camera system to do a big event for CBS Sexton Street in 2016. It was their idea to bring this show over to the Gaelic Grounds for its European premiere and everything worked out so that we were able to do it.

Are you and the team looking forward to coming to Limerick?

I am absolutely looking forward to it. Ireland is one of my favourite places. I've been about five times now, mostly to Dublin, but this will be my second visit to Limerick. I'm actually coming over a few days early so I can explore the west coast a bit.





As the point of the evening is for theatres, galleries and cultural spaces to fling open their doors and give you a taste of Ireland's artistic scene, I suggest that you visit at least one place that you wouldn't normally go and see one event that you normally wouldn't consider. Limerick Printmakers have four hours of printmaking workshops from 5pm to 9pm. It's the perfect opportunity to get your hands covered in ink and take home what you create.

Hungarian horseback archer Zoltan Gere is doing two shows at King John's Castle at 5pm and 7pm. Catch that show, then head to Bedford Row, which will have hip-hop performances, dance classes and street animation from 5pm

Īn the county, I recommend **Sheila** Richardson's art workshop in the Draíocht Gallery in Adare at 7pm. Like all Culture Night events, it's free but you'll need to book your spot for this

Dublin's THEATREclub bring their acclaimed production of Heroin to Limerick City Build (the old Cahill May Roberts building) this Friday and Saturday. Winner of the Spirit of the Fringe award at the 2010 Dublin Fringe Festival, the three-hander play examines the devastation wrought on inner cities by addiction. I saw it in 2013

year apart. Doors at 8pm, tickets are



Coping with the stress of distress



ASK THE DOC

Advice column with the Operation Transformation psychologist

OST people dislike feeling uncomfortable. There are many different ways that we can feel uncomfortable...we can be hot, cold, tired, in pain, hungry, unwell, and the list could

But there is emotional discomfort, or what is often called distress. We may not like it, but experiencing uncomfortable emotions is a natural part of life. However, there is a difference between disliking unpleasant emotions and experiencing unpleasant emotions as unbearable and needing to get rid of them. Being intolerant of experiencing emotional $\stackrel{-}{\text{discomfort}}\stackrel{-}{\text{can}} \, \text{interfere} \, \text{with} \,$ living a fulfilling life, and can escalate any emotional discomfort we might be experiencing.

Think of a time when you felt sadness. Maybe it was after losing a loved one or losing your job. How did you respond to the situation? While some people may have no difficulty dealing with these events, they may trigger unpleasant feelings that make it impossible to cope and carry on with normal activities in others. For those of us who experience these unpleasant feelings and have difficulty coping, we are experiencing psychological distress.

No two people experience one event the exact same way. Psychological distress is a subjective experience. That is, the severity of psychological distress is dependent upon the situation and how we perceive it. For some they suggest psychological distress as a continuum with 'mental health' and 'mental illness' at opposing ends. I myself would have a broader view but let's go with this way of thinking for the moment.

CAUSES OF PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS

Traumatic experiences can come from many aspects of life. In fact I can't imagine a life where distress is not experienced

- * Cancer and other medical illness
 - * Bereavement
 - * Homelessness
 - * Divorce
- * Redundancy / Starting a new
 - * Being a victim of bullying
 - * Adverse school experiences
 - * Adverse work experiences
 - * Infertility, IVF
 - * Mental health difficulties

SYMPTOMS OF PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS

As we previously stated, psychological distress is a subjective experience. Just as no two people experience events in the same way, no two people manifest psychological distress in exactly same way. For example, suppose that you and your mother were in a car accident and both experienced psychological distress as a result. Yet while you experience sleep disturbances, fatigue, and sadness, your mother experiences anxiety related to driving and memory problems and avoids social activities.

5 STEPS TO MANAGING DISTRESS

STEP 1 RECOGNISE YOUR TRIGGERS You need to first have some awareness of the common things that trigger your distress. Being more aware of what ignites your distress. These triggers could be external, such as certain situations, events, people, cues in the environment, etc. Or these triggers could be internal, such as certain thoughts, memories, images, bodily sensations, etc. A good way to get in touch with your common triggers is to think of past examples of not being able to deal



with distress. That is, past times you used your old escape methods i.e., situational avoidance, reassurance seeking or checking, distraction and suppression, alcohol or drugs, binge eating, excessive sleep)

2. KNOW YOUR WARNING SIGNS In addition to being aware of common triggers of your distress, it is also useful to be aware of the warning signs that tell you that you are having trouble dealing with your distress, and hence need to focus on using your action plan. Warning signs are the feelings, thoughts, physical sensations, and behavioural urges or actions that signal you are feeling overwhelming distress.

3. COMMIT TO DROPPING ESCAPE

METHOD & DOING OPPOSITE ACTION Once you acknowledge your

distress, via being more aware of your triggers and warning signs, you are then in a better position to make a commitment to dropping your usual escape methods. The commitment you make might sound something like..." I will try to tolerate this distress, rather than using my old habit of drinking to dull the pain" or "I will stay with this feeling, rather than avoiding situations that make me feel this way" The main thing is making your actions a conscious choice, rather than an automatic habit

4. ACCEPTING DISTRESS


In essence, recognise and allow the emotion; watch the emotion by detaching from it, describing it and using imagery; be present focused on a task or your breath; and finally deal with the inevitable emotional comebacks.

5. IMPROVING DISTRESS TOLERANCE

Use all the distress improvement activities in your armoury. Some will be active e.g. walking in nature, swimming and others soothing e.g. talking with friends, having a cup of tea or reading. Essentially these that you have discovered work for you, the words of encouragement that can help you through the moment of distress, and aspects of problem solving that may be relevant when you do have some control over the situation distressing you.

Overtime distress will be there but you are less likely to be overwhelmed.

Top Tips

With Junior Cert results just out, talk of exams and pressure is rife. See below for some parenting notes on helping your child to manage both.

Be aware of your own emotions. Take time out to relax so when your child looks for support you are ready to listen objectively.

Avoid having too high expectations or being overly attentive. Who enjoys being quizzed to death?

Take time and spend it with your child. Reassure them that you are always there to support and encourage them, no matter what.

Your child is unique, so cannot be compared to their siblings or other children. Instead encourage them to consider their work in terms of their own path and towards achieving their own personal

Step back and let them organise their study themselves. By keeping the lines of communication open they will be more comfortable to ask for help when they

Encourage them to keep going. After all, failure is merely

Remind your child that nervousness and worry is common for every student. Consider and discuss ways to manage this in a way that works for them

Provide lots of fruits and vegetables and, low-sugar, low-caffeine foods.

Ensure that your child is sleeping well for about 6-8 hours. This helps increase their thinking and concentration

Encourage your child to keep exercising and not to give up hobbies or interests.

Minding yourself and your child: Seven key messages

HERE is so much information on parenting available through web-sites, blogs, books, radio and television programmes that it can sometimes be overwhelming and confusing. Sometimes, it's useful to go back to basics and remember what really counts. Below are seven simple messages on parenting that will provide a solid foundation for minding both yourself and your child. 1. PARENTS NEED GOOD SOCIAL

NETWORKS

Parenting is easier when you can talk with others or spend some time looking after yourself. It is important to share the good times and celebrate achievement; it is equally important to have a support system (friends/family/neighbours, local parent/toddler groups; local groups or clubs) in place during

GP, PHN or other trusted

the more difficult times. If you are really struggling, talk to your professional or friend to get some

2. THE PARENT-CHILD

RELATIONSHIP IS KEY. A strong, loving relationship with a parent or carer is the most important thing for a child. Remember it is never too early or late to start spending time together. Have a chat and find out what they would like to do, whether that is getting outside for a walk or cycle; getting involved in events such as park run together; reading together; watching a favourite film or simply making a cuppa and having a chat.

3. A POSITIVE PARENTING STYLE WORKS

Give your child positive attention, lots of affection and specific praise. Set routines, rules and boundaries and be consistent, no idle threats—children thrive with a routine. Try to remain calm and model positive ways (deep breathing, taking a walk) of dealing with powerful emotions such as anger or frustration. Be genuinely interested in what your child is saying, doing, thinking and feeling.

4 BABY SEE, BABY DO

Be the role model your children need. Children learn by watching their parents so try to model appropriate, respectful behaviour. Avoid talking negatively about others in front of your children. Avoid bad language. If your child talks to you about someone who has caused them harm, discuss this with them without assigning blame. Instead explore the reasons why they did what they did and the impact this had on the other person.

5. NAME IT AND TAME IT Communicating with your child is so important at every age. Parents and children who can talk to each other, share problems and address challenges together will have strong, healthy relationships. Be aware of your

own emotional. If your child is struggling with big emotions, help them to name and describe their feelings. This is the first step in being able to manage

6. BUY WELL, EAT WELL, BE WELL

Healthy food is important for all the family and is especially important for children's growth. Include them in planning the menu, shopping and cooking meals. Try to eat at least one meal as a family each day. This is a simple way for everyone to connect.

7. CHILD SAFETY IS KEY

Toddler proofing your home, using car seats, teaching road and water safety, learning basic first aid, supervising young children and knowing where older children are and who they are with all helps in terms of reducing child injury and harm. Antibiotics are the most over-prescribed medicine in the world – as a result, now we have many species that are resistant to even our most advanced drugs. What used to be a miracle cure in the early 20th century is rapidly becoming our enemy due to overuse.

In ancient times in Greece and India, moulds, herbal remedies and even warm soil have been used (in Russia) to

treat an infection, until Sir Alexander Fleming a $Scottish\,biologist, \overset{\smile}{defined}$ new horizons for modern antibiotics with the isolation of an enzyme from Penicillium notatum fungus in 1928.

Blaser also points out that, not only does the individual use of antibiotics cause permanent changes in the gut flora, but that infants

born to women given antibiotics during pregnancy, or the 30% of children delivered via Caesarean section, may be starting life with a significantly altered and insufficient level of friendly gut flora. This is a serious concern because lack of

diversity in friendly gut bacteria has been shown to contribute to a large number of diseases

complications. What is the

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Because progress is not linear

HEN it comes to training and body/fitness goals there is something very important each and every person needs to keep in mind - Progress Is Not Linear.

What do I mean by that? Well most people adopt a training regime and they expect their before and after pictures to show an improvement; they expect their running times to constantly get better; they expect to constantly be able to lift heavier, to swim faster, to feel fitter - constant progression and constant improvement. In fact, it's when they don't see these things, that they start to feel demotivated, start to give up on their practice routine.

But the truth of the matter is, your progress will never be constant. We have days and weeks and months and moments of "blips" along the way and for one reason or another, we will not and can not maintain the constant progression and improvement we expect.

Those "blips" are life happening and changing and moving every single day. The sooner you can see progress in its true form - the sooner you can start to be more at ease with yourself and your own journey. There is a constant practice you can keep through all of this though - you can track your progress. In "good weeks" and "bad weeks". Tracking your progress - or lack there of - is a great tool to help you understand your body better. Here are my favourite ways of tracking my own progress.

1: TAKE PICTURES

This is singly the best tool in my opinion for tracking progress. I always tell my clients to take photos following this criteria:

* Take photos in the same mirror

* Take photos at the same time each week

* Try to wear the same clothing in each snap

* Take photos from the front, from the back and from the side

* Picture progress does not lie.
You can clearly see changes as they happen and it can be such a motivational tool for people too.

2: TAKE MEASUREMENTS

Measurements are my next favourite way to track progress. Get

a measuring tape and take monthly measurements. My top areas for seeing results are:

* Waist – Place the tape over your belly button line

* Hips – Place the tape at the widest point of hips/bottom

* Chest – Place the tape over the nipple line

* Legs – Record each leg individually placing tape around widest point of the thigh

3: NOTE HOW YOU FEEL

Your body and how you feel in your skin will not lie. Notice your

moods, notice how your tummy feels, notice how your body feels. Sometimes that kind of progress is all you need. Feeling good is what we all strive for. Feeling good in your own skin is amazing. Are you feel like you have more energy? Are you feeling stronger?

Have you been lifting heavier?
Have you been running for longer?
Has that class you've been doing gotten easier?

Do you feel less stressed? Have you noticed more muscle definition? Little changes can lead to big progress.

4: NOTE HOW YOUR CLOTHES FEEL

Notice the changes in how your clothes feel on your body. Notice if they are looser or tighter. Notice how you feel wearing them.

5: STEP AWAY FROM THE SCALES

I feel so strongly about this point that I am going to say it again, try not to get caught up with weighing yourself. It's the single most de-motivating thing I find when working with clients. Weight really does not accurately reflect the changes that are and can be made following a food and fitness plan.





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One is the loneliest number: The fear of rejection (part 1)

there.... you meet someone you really like and things seem to be going

You've been chatting, messaging, snapping and flirting for weeks and you seem to have loads in common with them. They're good banter and they seem to like you too so you want to take things to the next level. You want to ask them out on a date. But what if it all goes horribly wrong? What if you've built yourself up to the point where you're brave enough to ask them out or even worse, make some kind of romantic gesture and then.... They say no! It can actually be pretty terrifying. There are so many questions running through your head. What if they say no? What if it ruins our friendship? What if they say yes but only out of pity? It takes a lot of balls to look at someone you have feelings for and ask them if they'll go out with you because of all those hypothetical answers I've just mentioned. But then again, what if they say yes?

I'm well aware of all the questions that run through your brain when you start to fancy someone because I have a massive fear of rejection. So much so that a girl will have to hold up a sign saying "I like you" before I'll make a move or, more commonly, make the first move themselves. I'm

getting a lot better at it but nonetheless; I'm very familiar with the doubts and the fear of rejection that comes with asking someone out. And it is real. They might say no. You might feel embarrassed. There's no point in dismissing that but there's also the potential that the person you like will return your feelings and overcoming the fear and the doubts will totally be worth it. So how do you do it? How do you overcome the doubts and the fear of being rejected and take that chance? I can't give you a magic spell or a hack but what I can give you are some tips and advice that I've studied myself.

GIVE YOURSELF A BREAK

Often the biggest thing standing in your way when it comes to the fear of rejection is you. Have you ever thought, "Well this person isn't going to say yes to me because nobody ever says yes to me"? If you have, you're not the only one

because this kind of thinking is very common, especially for people who struggle with low self-esteem. The biggest problem with this kind of thinking is that you become a self-fulfilling prophecy. If you never put yourself out there, then you'll never know if someone actually does like you and will say yes. Imagine the person you like is waiting for you to ask them out because they too are too nervous to make the first move. Then, if you don't ask them, they'll think that you don't feel the same way and what could have been a nice opportunity to be happy together is lost. The moral of the story is not to approach this situation thinking the worst. If you've been chatting to them for a while then you have some chance at least so even if it doesn't go the way you'd like, don't lock the door before you try to open

THE FEAR OF BEING VULNERABLE

A fear of rejection usually stems from a fear of vulnerability. If you asked your friend to buy you a burger after the nightclub and they told you where to go you'd probably laugh it off so the word "no" isn't that scary in itself. So, what makes it so scary when you want to ask a person you like to go for a drink with you? Vulnerability. It's not easy for anyone to bare his or her feelings to the world - especially if it's to someone you have actual

feelings for. It's not about someone not wanting to go for a drink, the fear lies in the fact that you put yourself out there, let someone know that you liked them, and got rejected. And it's a pretty awful

The only way to get past it is to take baby steps. When you're in the chatting/messaging phase, take small risks by being vulnerable in little ways. Like if they if they ask you what songs you like, tell the truth and tell them the reason instead of picking something that you think will make you seem cooler. You don't have to be too dramatic but a little honesty will help break down barriers and let get you get used to showing vulnerability to someone you like.

HAVE SOME CHILL

As in try not to fall too hard, too fast. When you ask someone to go out with you, start small. Think about the date itself and don't start thinking about the future beyond

the date. It's hard because your thoughts will gravitate towards the future if you really like the person. But in the interest of softening any potential rejection, try to focus on thing at a time. Why? Because you'll find it easier to deal with the idea that someone doesn't want to go for $a\,drink\,with\,you\,than\,the\,rejection$ of an entire relationship that you may have already built up in your mind. It's not easy but it does make things easier. In reality, you need to have realistic expectations when it comes to asking someone out. They might say yes to dinner or a drink but that's really all they're agreeing to so don't start thinking of baby names or pricing hotels for the $afters\,of\,your\,wedding.\,I'm\,not$ saying you should have no or low expectations, rather keep them reasonable so if the bubble bursts, the fallout is less severe.

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Duster is showroom ready

Dacia Duster: Second generation SUV is more robust, but keeps its same practical size

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THE second generation Dacia Duster goes on sale this week priced from €17,390 making it Ireland's most affordable SUV.

The first Duster was launched here in the midst of the financial crises but it struck a chord with many Irish motorists looking for an affordable new car with basic features and who didn't want to go the used car route.

In keeping with the upturn in the economy, and resulting higher buyer expectations, new Duster has become more upmarket gaining a few frills while still offering real value for money.

This is an all-new model as not one body panel has been carried over from the previous car.

At last week's launch, Paddy Magee, Country Operations Director of Renault Group Ireland said Duster started off in 2012 as a 'shockingly affordable' car but soon turned into a smart buy and has doubled sales expectations since launch. The model now accounts for 10,300 of Dacia's 20,000 sales.

"It gave dealers revenue when the country was just coming out of hard times," he added.

Half of all Dusters have been financed by Renault/Dacia's own bank.

The addition of a 1.6 SCe 115hp petrol engine for the first time is a real game changer for Dacia as it will attract more urban based customers. Up to this, the Blue dCi 115hp 1.5 diesel unit was the only option. Both use a manual gearbox and both are WTLP compliant.

Product Manager Jeremy Warnock said customers appreciated a no-nonsense car at a basic cost, and one with good residual values. "If you get the basic car right, and keep it affordable, they'll buy it. We've kept it affordable, but is now a more sophisticated car.

"We have a lot of happy

customers who bought the first Duster and who will be happy to trade it in for the new model which is better, more refined, and offers better performance," he said. Conquest sales are expected from other brands.

New trim names are Essential (from €17,390), Comfort (from €19,790) and Prestige (from €21,290). The entry model is just €500 more than the outgoing model and the price walk to the diesel is €1.200

Core features across the range include six airbags including new

full-length curtain ones, LED daytime running lights, height-adjustable front headrests and seat belts, ECO mode and Stop and Start, Automatic door lock, ABS and Emergency Brake Assist, Electronic Stability Control and Traction control, and Isofix points in the rear.

While looking more robust and imposing, the new Duster has the same compact dimensions as the previous car. Boot space is 445 litres but a new 4x4 diesel version due in Q1 2019 will have 376 litres.

A completely new interior

features new technologies never before seen on the Dacia range.

We got to drive the new Duster 2WD model on roads around Maynooth in Co Kildare and enjoyed the feel of the car on both country roads and on the nearby M4 motorway.

We also got to drive 'a borrowed from the UK' pre-production version of the 4x4 on a new, more difficult course at Carton House and were more than surprised by its off-road capabilities on difficult terrain. An excellent new feature is the multi-view camera which

consists of a camera at the front, on either side and at the rear. It allows you to view the ground area around each side of the car which is a great aid in off-road driving, as well as with parking the car. High ground clearance is 210m.

While new Duster has the same 3-star Euro NCAP safety rating as the previous model, with the bar rising considerably each year since the initial launch and the new safety features, the 3-star safety performance of this latest model is now actually far higher than the previous level.



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MITSUBISHI

Plug-in hybrid big on size, little on emmisions

A 2019 updated Mitsubishi Outlander Plug-In Hybrid EV (PHEV) SUV will be available for Irish customers from next month (October), writes Trish Whelan.

This is one of the first PHEV's to be officially rated in the new, more realistic real-world WLTP fuel consumption and emissions tests, achieving a change of just 5g/km from previous NEDC protocol and a maximum EV range of 45kms.

Specifications levels are: Intense, Instyle and S-Edition.

It comes with up to a 20pc reduction in price from the previous model. The entry level Intense starts from €39,900, Instyle is from €43,900, and S-Edition from €47,500 (includes VRT reduction and SEAI grant for private customers).

The new model is equipped with a high level of technology for all round safety, EV, and driver focused technology as well as an enhanced exterior design and a high quality, refined interior.

The new more powerful 2.4 hybrid (petrol/electric) is in Tax Band A1 of €170; the 2.2 DI-D 4WD 6-speed manual transmission diesel has €280 road tax; the automatic version has a similar engine size and road tax. The 0-100km/h trip is now 10.5 seconds.



MUNSTER Rugby winger Keith Earls has described Limerick's All-Ireland final win as 'incredible' after spending time with John Kiely's squad this year.

So how does the dynamic capped 70-time international hope to follow a hugely impressive 2017/2018 season.

"It (last season) was enjoyable, you try and repeat it hopefully and go a step further. The main thing for me is to keep enjoying it."





Murphy's comments came in a post match interview with BT Sport, following his side's defeat to Wasne

The former Ireland full back was referring to an incident in the game where Leicester's Will Spencer was sent off for a high tackle on Tommy Taylor. (If you have not seen same, I suggest you go and look at it now)

The tackle, which saw

Spencer's shoulder make contact with Taylor's head, was correctly adjudged to have been a red card.

However Murphy did not agree going as far as suggesting that he would start to pick players 'under five foot' to make it harder for them to be tackled.

Rugby, like all contact sports, is by virtue of the physical clashes, entertaining. The unique selling point of contact sports is just that, contact. The skills shown under the pressure of contact is what makes them stand out from others games. The thing is, contact sports can be played hard and fair at the same time. Something rugby is slower to realise than other games.

"I see the game becoming very, very different to the game I played and loved" continued Murphy. He is right there. The players are bigger, faster and stronger than when Murphy played. The ball is also in play longer than before, so there are more rucks, mauls and tackles than ever before. Therefore the need for player safety is even more paramount now.

The macho culture of 'smashing' players and getting in 'hits' is all well

and good, but the most important factor of any sport is player safety.

A week after Dominic Ryan, a former player for Geordan Murphy's Leicester Tigers, gave a harrowing account of his battle with concussion, his former manager seems to belittle a tackle which saw one player shoulder another in the head.

Rugby will continue to see player numbers decrease as long as the laws do not protect the participants from serious injury. After all, if they aren't any players around to play, then there will be not need for coaches to coach. Everyone is a loser then Mr Murphy.

Long may the confidence last from Croke Park All Ireland win


ONFIDENCE is everything in sport – it's simply one of the ingredients of success that can't be replaced

returns to postseason finale for the first time since 2013.


DeChambeau, who won both the Northern Trust and Dell
