Minister's frustration at lack of MS nurse

A GOVERNMENT minister has expressed "frustration" at the delay in recruiting a specialist nurse for the treatment of multiple sclerosis at University Hospital Limerick.

This comes after government senator Maria Byrne raised concerns in Seanad Eireann over a lack of a clinical specialist nurse in neurology.

In May last, The Leader reported that the UL Hospitals Group failed in its bid to secure HSE funding for the recruitment of two CNS positions for MS care, two years in a row.

At the time, spokesperson told this newspaper that it was making another submission for the 2019 estimates process.

In Leinster House Maria Byrne stated: "In response to my calls for an update on the recruitment of clinical nurse specialist post in neurology for UHL having first raised this issue with the HSE in April of this year, Minister [Jim] Daly has confirmed a job application for this position has now only been finalised by the UL Hospitals Group for submission to the HSE national recruitment service."

In response in the Seanad, the Minister of State for Mental Health and Older People said: "This is the frustration I share with the Senator so I will certainly take up the issue and in my role as Minister of State with help from the Minister and his office, will ensure that I do justice to her prioritising of it in the House and ensure attention goes back down the chain with regard to refocusing attention on this issue to ensure there is a timely conclusion to this recruitment process."

Man accused of conning pensioner out of €10k

Court: Frank Enright was remanded on bail until November 21

A LIMERICK man was granted bail after he appeared in court accused of defrauding more than €10,000 from an elderly woman.

Frank Enright, aged 56, of Churchfield, Limerick was arrested on Friday evening in connection with the alleged offences, which involve a lady in her seventies from the Ennis Road area of the city.

It is alleged he called to the woman's home under the pretence of carrying out contract work at the property.

After being questioned by gardai, the defendant was later charged with three counts of deception under Section 6 of the Criminal Justice Theft and Fraud Offences Act 2001.

The offences are alleged to have

occurred on dates during September.

Mr Enright made no reply to each of the three charges when they were put to him by Detective Garda Ronan O'Reilly at Henry Street garda station on Friday night.

He appeared at a special sitting of Limerick District Court on Saturday October 20.

There was no garda objection to bail and Judge Mary Cashin

remanded Mr Enright to appear before the court again on November

He was directed to sign-on between the hours of 9am and 9pm Monday to Friday at Henry Street Garda Station.

Mr Enright was also instructed by Judge Cashin to have no contact, direct or indirect, by any means or through any individual with the alleged injured party.

Novas sees €93k surplus following 'challenging' 2017

NOVAS homeless and drug outreach service had an operating surplus of more than €93,000 after spending over €9m in 2017, its annual financial report states.

Novas published its annual statement at its newly-launched headquarters on O'Connell Stree, Limerickt on Friday morning. Novas operates 29 different centres and services in Dublin, Cork, Kerry, Tipperary and, primarily, in Limerick.

Last year marked Novas' first full year

operating its temporary emergency provision services (Tep) in Limerick, after it teamed up with Limerick City and County Council to open a 14-bed homeless shelter on Lord Edward Street on December 2016.

This expanded to a 20-bed facility before Novas and the council opened an additional 10-bed Tep hostel in December 2017.

Last year there were 7,000 referrals to Tep

service accounting for 292 individual cases. Seventy-seven percent of these were male, the annual report stated.

Financial statements reveal that Novas had an turnover of €9,103,985, almost €500,000 more than the previous year. In total, there were administrative expenses amounting to €9,010,913, more than €800,000 more than in 2016.

In 2017, there was an operating surplus of €93,072, which was significantly less than the €427,807 surplus in 2016.

Launching the report and the new headquarters, Metropolitan Mayor Cllr Daniel Butler praised Novas, which has been operating out of Limerick since 2002.

Well done to Novas on an incredible, challenging year that you have come through, but you have done so with exemplary record, meeting the needs of many, many individuals and making a difference in many, many people's lives. You are to be commended on

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No reimbursement for 'wonder drug' is 'criminal', says Vicky

VICKY PHELAN has said it is "criminal" that the HSE does not reimburse a "wonder drug" for cervical cancer patients who positively respond to treatment.

The Annacotty woman, who exposed the CervicalCancer scandal in April this year, made the comments to The Leader before receiving a civic honour at Limerick County Hall last week.

She said that to qualify for pembrolizumab, a candidate must have a response rate of least 55%. Ms Phelan, who had a 75% response rate, said she was approached by a 25-year-old woman who had a 90% response rate, but must fund the drug herself.

The test for the drug costs €2,000. If successful, the drug must be taken once every three weeks at a cost of €8,500 per dose. Ms Phelan is after completing her 10th dose this week, she told The Leader.

"If somebody has the test done and pays for it themself, it cost about €2,000, to get the test done. If the result shows that they would actually respond to the drug, I think it's criminal that they don't then pay for the drug because they know it will work," she said.

At present, pembrolizumab is only licensed for three different cancers; melanoma, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, and non-small cell lung cancer. Ms Phelan said the HSE has given the green light for the drug to be reimbursed, but a full approval

process will take up to two years.

Ms Phelan previously said that she wanted to use her €2.5m High Court settlement to create a new researcher role who would assist terminally-ill patients to source clinical trials. \bar{She} said she has had a meeting with the CEOs of Irish Cancer Society and Clinical Trials Ireland, and both are drafting a job description for the new role.

"What I am looking for is

somebody will rotate between the hospitals. So, if someone goes into their oncologist and gets a terminal diagnosis, there is nobody for that person to go to if they want to look at clinical trials or alternative trials. It's someone like a researcher with a clinical nurse background in oncology, who would be able to go off and help this person to go off and do it," she explained.

Since the Scally report was

published and vindicated many claims made by Ms Phelan, she has built a relationship with Minister for Health Simon Harris, who is meeting with all affected women to implement Dr Scally's recommendations.

"We have actually built quite a relationship at this stage. I have great respect for him. I know he gets an awful bashing sometimes in the media, but I haven't got a bad word to say about him because he has been very fair to us. If there is something he can't do, he tells us."

Speaking at the civic reception, Ms Phelan warned politicians that legislation must be brought in to make people more accountable for issues such as the CervicalCheck controversy - "because, otherwise, we are going to have scandal after scandal after scandal and nothing

Gardai confirm DNA link to Gus Shanahan, 20

GARDAI investigating the whereabouts of Limerick man Aengus 'Gussie' Shanahan have confirmed that partial body remains discovered in 2001 belong to the man who has been missing for 18 years.

Gussie, aged 20, was first reported missing on February 11, 2000, was last seen at Old School House Lane, near **Barrington Street**, after spending some time at Coopers Bar, on Joseph Street.

In a statement this Tuesday afternoon, gardai said that they have linked the Ennis Road man's DNA to partial remains that were discovered by the **Bunratty Search and Rescue** Team at Quay Island, Bunratty, on October 28, 2001.

"Developments in DNA technologies have afforded a re-examination of the remains for comparison against samples submitted from relatives of missing persons. An Garda Siochana has been informed



that the remains belong to missing person, Aengus

Shanhan," gardai stated.
Investigating Gardaí at
Roxboro Road have carried out
extensive enquiries since Aengus was reported missing, including several media appeals for information and appeals made on Crimecall/Crimeline over the 18 years.

The Gardai at Roxboro Road have now commenced a complete review of the circumstances of the disappearance of Aengus Shanahan on the 11th February

Speaking at Roxboro Road Garda Station on Tuesday, Superintendent Eamon O'Neill said: "We continue to appeal for any information in relation to Aengus 'Gussie' Shanahan. Gussie was last seen on the 11th February 2000. He went to Coopers bar on St Joseph's Street, Limerick with some friends and left the bar on his own at approximately 10.30pm.

"He then walked onto Old School House Lane, which connects with Barrington

Street, where he was last seen. Gussie is described as 5ft 10ins, thin build, pale complexion and fair hair. Anyone who has any information is asked to contact Roxboro Road Garda Station on 061-214340, the Garda Confidential Line on 1800-666-111 or any Garda Station," he said in a statement



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City set to become rent pressure zone

Housing: Tenants' relief as rent rises to be limited to 4%

TENANTS in Limerick look set to finally get some relief, with the introduction of the Rent Pressure Zone to be confirmed shortly.

Rents in the city have reached an average of €920 per month over the last year, a huge rise of 17% year-on-year.

But the new rules, which are based on data from the Central Statistics Office, will mean rents on Limerick are limited to just four per cent per year.

There are two criteria an area must meet to qualify the rate of rent inflation must have been 7% or more in four of the last six quarters, and the average cost in the previous quarter must be above the national average.

Labour's housing spokesperson and local TD Jan O'Sullivan has given a cautious welcome to the proposals, but stressed they may not affect all parts of the city. "It should have happened

a long time ago," she said.

"I've been constantly critical of the actual way in the thing was designed in the first place. If you take City East, you have very high rents in Castletroy.

But Limerick City East also takes in Montpelier, and Murroe, and areas where you wouldn't have very high rents. So it's skewed," the Labour TD added.

She said a fairer policy one which her party has championed - is to have the same system throughout the country, rather than set

"It's something I've been lobbying for a long time, and I'd be absolutely delighted to welcome them if they do come in," Ms O'Sullivan said.

Gordon Kearney. Rooney's Auctioneers, says there is still an issue with supply in Limerick, as it is owner-occupiers buying property and moving in the city centre.

"The rental market is still my worry. We have seen a

dramatic rise in the number of new developments in Limerick when all the current schemes become active on the market we'll have 12 or 14 new developments in Limerick. That's a big change from two or three years ago," he said, "Buy to let investors are not buying."

Limerick lies only behind Galway and Dublin in terms of rental rates, statistics just out from the Residential Tenancies Board show.

The second highest rents in the second quarter of the year were in Cork city, where the monthly average was €1,123 (up 6.2% in 12 months).

The average rent in Galway city stood at €1,065, while the average Waterford city was €646.

In terms of property prices, a report earlier this summer claimed buying a home costs, on average more than €20,000 then it did this time last year.


The average asking price for a Limerick property now stands at €180,000.

Song: a medium to bring social change

Research: New collection of essays launched at UL

A GOOD song should "hold a mirror up to the world and get people thinking and talking about the real issues," according to singer-songwriter Steo Wall.

The Dubliner, who just released his critically acclaimed debut album Where I'm From, was speaking at the University of Limerick as a new collection of essays focusing on the power of music to bring social change

Edited by UL academics, 'Songs of Social Protest' features research on diverse singers and genres, from Damien Dempsey and Billie Holiday,

to rap, reggae and punk.

"A song is a very powerful thing, a piece of music has the power to transport you through time and space, take you right back to a time and a place and make you feel the very same emotions you felt 20 years ago," Mr Wall said.

"I think any song writer or artist worth their salt should reflect what goes on in society, the good the bad and the scary."

'Songs of Social Protest, edited by Aileen Dillane, Martin J. Power, Eoin Devereux and Amanda Haynes, has been heralded as a "tour-de-force" by international experts.

The collection, which runs to almost 700 pages, features 33

contributions from around the world.

The book is expected to be adopted worldwide in the teaching of music and song.

Speaking at the launch held at the new Glucksman Library, co-editor Dr. Aileen Dillane said: "Song is such a powerful medium, especially when it comes to calling out injustices. All cultures in this world have music and song. Singing is a primary mode of communication. Put that together with social and political protest and it's easy to see what a potent combination they make."

The book was launched by novelist Donal Ryan, who is also a teacher of creative writing at UL.

Cyclist was struck at pedestrian crossing

A MOTORIST who struck a cyclist at a pedestrian crossing late at night has avoided a driving ban, *writes* David Hurley.

Brian Curtin, aged 24, of Friarstown, Grange, Kilmallock pleaded guilty, at Limerick District Court, to careless driving relating to an incident which happened on January 9, 2018.

Sergeant Adrian Whelan said the cyclist was on a pedestrian crossing

at Childers Road, near the Kilmallock Road Roundabout at around 9.40pm on the night when he was struck.

The man, he added, sustained a broken leg as a result of being struck.

Judge Marian O'Leary was told Mr Curtin, who is in full time employment, has no previous convictions and was fully insured.

Imposing a \in 500 fine, the judge noted it was a dark night and that all

of the defendant's documentation was in order.

In the circumstances, she said she was exercising her judicial discretion and would not impose a disqualification.

A separate hit and run charge relating to the same incident was withdrawn by the State.

Mr Curtin will receive five penalty points on his driver's licence.



Attack on students: Woman before court

Parnell Street: Friends were making way home

A WOMAN told gardai she was "very sorry" after she was charged in connection with a late-night attack on a group of students.

Winifred O'Donoghue, aged 32, who has an address at St Brendan Street, St Mary's Park appeared before Limerick District Court charged with theft and robbery offences relating to an incident in the early hours of October 17, last.

Opposing bail, Garda Michael Dunphy said it will alleged the defendant was one of two women who attacked four students at Parnell Street as they were making their way home following a night out.

Judge Marian O'Leary was told a

male student was struck across the head with a glass bottle while a female student was "swung around" after her hair was grabbed.

Garda Dunphy said the incident happened at around 3am and that a taxi driver came to the assistance of the students and drove them home.

It is alleged a mobile phone belonging to one of the students was recovered from Ms O'Donoghue when she was arrested around an hour after gardai were alerted.

Garda Dunphy said the students were "extremely shaken" as a result of what happened and are seeking alternative accommodation as they no longer feel safe in the city.

He expressed concern the defendant would not appear in court if released and that she would not

abide by any bail conditions.

In her evidence, Ms O'Donoghue described the allegations as "lies" and "waffle".

She denied stealing the student's phone stating that she picked it up believing it was her own phone.

The defendant told solicitor Ted McCarthy she would "do anything the judge says" were she granted bail.

Having considered the matter, Judge O'Leary said she was refusing bail on the basis of the evidence before her.

Ms O'Donoghue was remanded in custody pending directions from the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Another woman has been arrested and questioned about the incident.

Criminal had mobile phone in prison cell

A YOUNG man who is serving a lengthy prison sentence for firearms offences has received a one month sentence for having a mobile phone in his cell, writes David Hurley.

Nathan Ring, aged 23, whose last address was at St Michael's Place, Ballinasloe, Galway is currently serving a four year sentence after he was convicted, in April 2016, of suspicious possession of an improvised shotgun and ammunition at McDonagh Avenue, Janesboro on September 12, 2014.

The defendant was brought before Limerick District after he was arrested and charged with possession of a mobile phone at Limerick Prison on June 9.

Solicitor Darach McCarthy said his client, who has a young child, had the device "in a desperate attempt to keep in touch with family".

He said Ring, whose family are originally from Ballinacurra Weston, accepts he should not have had the phone in prison but insisted his motivation was "not nefarious" and that he did not have it for any

sinister purpose

Judge Marian O'Leary was told the defendant was punished within the prison system and that he lost all of his privileges for 28 days after the phone was located and seized from him

Noting the length of Ring's current sentence and his scheduled release date next year, the judge said she would not add to the sentence.

She imposed a one month prison sentence, which is to be served concurrently to the firearms offence

Council 'should phase out plastic use by 2024'

LIMERICK City and County Council should stop using single use plastics by 2024.

That's according to City North local election candidate Kieran Walsh, who has pledged to make it an election issue in the months to come

in the months to come.

After nine years off the political scene after stepping down from politics following a stint as a Labour councillor, the Corbally man is back, and wearing the purple robes of the Social Democrats

"Local authorities need to become

industry leaders in this regard. It is very easy for local government to preach, but I am calling on them to practice what they preach by engaging with their suppliers to ensure that events run by Limerick City and County Council are single use plastic free," he said.

Mr Walsh says his proposal would seek to eliminate all single use plastic within council buildings and facilities by 2021 and encourage the elimination of single use plastic within its supply chain by 2024.

He suggests that the local authority could promote the initiative amongst rate payers and citizens alike.

"I feel that we are all beginning to

understand the damage we are causing," he told The Leader, "A 2017 report from eurostat shows that Ireland creates more disposable plastic waste than any other country, coming in at 61kg per person, per year. It is very upsetting to think that we are twice the European average of 31kg per person."

For his part, Mr Walsh is committing

For his part, Mr Walsh is committing to reduce his own single use plastic usage by sourcing biodegradable cable ties for his election campaign which culminates in polling day in May 2019.

"It is important that everyone plays their part and my election team are sourcing proper alternatives," he concluded.

Groups to receive shares in €23,000 for LGBTI support

SIX youth organisations in Limerick will receive funding to improve understanding and ability to engage with lesbian, gay, transgender, bisexual and intersex (LGBTI+) youngsters.

The organisations will receive a total of €23,000 in funding for these services, a move welcomed by Senator Maria Byrne.

She said: "This funding will help implement evidence-based

training, mentoring, coaching, Continuous Professional Development (CPD) initiatives and development of guidelines targeted at professional service providers and youth services.

"This training and guidance will include a particular focus on trans and gender-related issues," the Fine Gael senator added.

A number of organisations will share in this funding, including

the northside family resource centre in Ballynanty, which will get €3,770, and the Southill hub at the Southill Area Centre, which will win €3,440.

The Our Lady of Lourdes Local Education Committee will get €3,500 and the Goshh project, in Davis Street, will get €6,000.

"I'd like to commend my colleague, Minister for Children and Youth Affairs Katherine Zappone, for recently launching the world's first LGBTI+ National Youth Strategy," Ms Byrne said, "This funding now shows how serious both the minister and Fine Gael are in our mission to ensure that Ireland is the best country in which to grow up."

"I am delighted that hard work is already in motion we are on the road to making a real and positive difference to young lives," she concluded.

More than 1,200 over-75s treated on trolleys at UHL

AT LEAST 1,200 patients aged over 75 were treated on trolleys at University Hospital Limerick so far this year, a figure which has been described as "a disgrace".

According to figures released by the HSE to Fianna Fail, UHL had the highest rate of over-75s being treated on trolleys nationwide.

Between January and August, a total of 1,241 over-75s were treated on an emergency department trolley and on additional beds or trolleys in the wards at UHL.

University Hospital Galway had the second highest rate, with 1,142 on trolleys, followed by the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital with 1,002 patients on trolleys.

Nationally, there were 9,864 over-75s treated on a trolley, 12.6% of whom were at UHL, the figures show.

Fianna Fail TD Willie O'Dea said that he is "deeply worried" about the situation at UHL ahead of another winter period of overcrowding.

"It is a disgrace that University Hospital

Limerick had the worst record in the whole country with 1,241 people aged over 75 left on trolleys for longer than 24 hours out of a figure of 9,864 for the entire country.

"2018 is already far worse than last year, and I really do fear for the coming winter. I fully expect the total number for this year to exceed 1,800 for UHL – a shocking statistic in itself, but even worse when we consider that these are our parents, our aunts and uncles left lying, often in a very vulnerable state, on uncomfortable and unsuitable trolleys.

"The winter crisis is now a 10-month-of-the-year emergency. Minister [Simon] Harris has been absolutely woeful and negligent in his preparations for, and attempts at dealing with, this long term crisis.

"Older people are feeling the brunt of Minister Harris' and the Government's failure to prepare for the never ending trolley crisis. It's time the Government started to deliver," concluded Deputy O'Dea.

University Hospital Limerick and the HSE is currently in the process of selecting a contractor for the development of a 60-bed modular build, which will act as an interim measure to tackle overcrowding.

'Lá Buí' for equality for young teachers

Ballot:Union casts votes on current proposals to address salary scale issues

AS TEACHERS cast their ballots in a major union vote, the staff of Scoil Chríost Rí hosted a 'Lá Buí' (Yellow Day) to show they stand united against pay inequality among younger teachers.

Irish National Teachers' Organisation (INTO) members have until Friday, October 26 to have their say on current proposals to address the salary scale for post-2011 entrants to teaching, who were advised pay equality would be achieved this year.

However, the INTO believes current proposals under the Public Stability Service Agreement (PSSA) will only achieve pay equality for some cohorts.

"It is proposed that post-2011 entrants will only get a salary uplift while post-2017 entrants will get full pay restoration," INTO Scoil Chríost Rí representative Louise O'Kelly explained.

"Therefore, pay equality will not be achieved for all teachers."

"This was devastating news for post-2011 entrants who have already endured significantly lower pay

scales, lower job prospects and 'dip for dole'."


"The current proposals are leaving post-2011 entrants undervalued and disheartened."

"For example, those who graduated in 2012 are classified as Teacher B' and have incurred losses of approximately €30,000," she added. "Under current proposals they will incur future losses of €18,000. They will also earn less than those who graduate in the future."

The current proposals also make the temporary pension levy a permanent additional contribution, she added.

"No pay deal should be accepted until full pay equality is achieved. Post-2011 entrants were hit the hardest and will be the worst affected by this deal. All INTO members are advised to familiarise themselves with the proposals before voting."



• VICKY Phelan pulled no punches at her honorary civic reception at Limerick County Hall last week, calling on politicians to push for a legislation to make people accountable for scandals such as the CervicalCheck controversy. She was roundly supported by the politicians present and by the 60-something friends and family, who witnessed another powerful, signature Vicky Phelan speech. TD Maurice Quinlivan was present at the meeting. He can pitch the idea to the Dail floor within a matter of weeks. In the interim, all 44 councillors in Limerick city and county can pass a motion to seek support from all local authorities to propose a legislation to Minister for Justice or whomever in the Cabinet.

We have done it before, and we now have the bastion and paragon of unbridled free speech, that is Vicky Phelan, to be the face of that new law. It is vital that all elected representatives take up the baton she is wielding with such grace and honour.

 Spartacus reckons that there is an epidemic of people with bad backs, judging by the number of Thai Massage parlours that have popped up around the city. Casey was the agreed candidate of both Fianna Fail and Fine Gael at Limerick council level, with Cllr Michael Collins proposing and Cllr Michael Sheahan seconding.
Indeed Collins tweeted that he was "delighted to nominate" Casey and that it was "good for democracy". Asked by The Leader this week if he would have seconded the businessman had he known about his views on travellers, Cllr Michael Sheahan said "no, simple as that. It was a strange comment. I honestly believe his advisors might have told him to go at it like Donald Trump did. He has already received a lift in the polls as a result. I think he has gone right wing to try and give himself a boost. It's a popular view with people." The Green Party in Limerick called out each individual councillor on twitter that had backed Casey if they agreed with his comments - to zero response. In the meantime, Casey is showing a stronger standing in the polls, but with incumbent Michael D Higgins in an almost unbeatable pole position, it would take a Trumpian miracle to unseat him.

Amid all the focus on who will succeed Michael D Higgins following Friday's election, it is almost an afterthought that a referendum is also taking place. In a tag-on to the presidential poll, the electorate is being asked if they wish to remove the word 'blasphemous' from Article 40.6.1 of the Constitution.

There has been virtually no debate on the issue and yet with all the major parties calling for a Yes vote, plus Amnesty International Ireland and the Irish Council for Civil Liberties, it seems it will sail through as focus remains on the presidency

Council confirms funding to tackle 70 voids put in place

LIMERICK Council has secured funding to refurbish 70 'void' houses across the whole of the county.

It was announced at this week's home and social development strategic policy committee that the government has also approved funding to tackle nine derelict units.

The distinction between derelict units and voids, housing official Seamus Hayes said is that the former cost more than €30,000 to refurbish, the latter cost under this figure.

Labour councillor Joe Leddin asked: "Is it realistic to have no voids in 12 months time? I'm seeking an update on the unoccupied houses. I came across a situation last month that an apartment was unoccupied in 12 months, and it was not in a poor state at all. I cannot understand how this situation has occurred. It is not quite a 'hang up your coat' job, but it's

Mr Hayes said: "We keep applying for funding and pressing our case to government."

Independent councillor John

However, former mayor, Cllr Stephen Keary claimed councillors had initially been told there was no money available for voids.

It was only through his own personal communication with his party colleague, the Housing Minister Eoghan Murphy he found out the contrary, he told the meeting which took place this Monday in County Hall

Mr Hayes disputed this, saying when they receive funding they "like to shout about it".

But Cllr Leddin expressed concern that local authority builders were expected to keep the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government abreast of every small piece of each development.

Mr Hayes said: "For derelict units, more oversight is needed as there is more money involved."







From Osborne to Dolan's: City and county music scene since 1800 captured

"WHO DO THEY think they are - these culchies coming up showing the Dublin bands how it's done?"

That was how Limerick's seminal beat group Granny's Intentions were seen at one of their first gigs in Dublin in the mid-1960s. They were the Shannonside underdogs who could have been.

And in a way, that has been largely the story of many of Limerick's prominent acts in an industry that has spanned more than 200 years here.

Paddy Brennan is a music historian who has compressed the chronicle of Limerick's music history into more than 550 pages in, arguably, the most definitive look at Limerick's music scene since 1800.

The Corbally man, who set up the Limerick Rock 'n' Roll Club in 1979, has dedicated most of his life to the local music scene, and has delivered his magnum opus Limerick Music Throughout The Decades: The History of Limerick Music From 1800 - 2018, which goes on sale on October 30.

The book, which details the emergence of prodigious Limerick composer George Alexander Osborne in the early 19th century to the local bands in Dolan's, has received five-star reviews from President Michael D Higgins, trad icon Mick Moloney and broadcaster Lorcan Murray.

In an interview with The Leader ahead of the launch, Paddy said he believes Osborne, born in 1806, was possibly Limerick's first famous international act.

"He moved abroad and studied, and became great friends with Mozart and all the great classical composers at the time, held in high regard in the opera houses of Europe. He was up there with the greats, and no one had heard of him really."

Osborne's footprint on Limerick's music scene was followed by opera icon Catherine Hayes, who should

be "immortalised more than what she is", the author said.

The historical collection also includes stories of rivalry between the marching bands and the emerging big bands in the early part of the 20th century.

Limerick's first prominent rockers were Granny's Intentions, the psychedelic flower-pop group that were "within a whisker" of becoming famous. "But they will always be fondly remembered from the people who went to beat group clubs back in the 6os. The first name that would run off your tongue would be Granny's Intentions."

And before the Cranberries rose to global fame, Tuesday Blue was Limerick's most prominent act of the late 1980s. Though they were known across the United States, they were always "on the verge of a breakthrough", Paddy said.

Paddy's book will be launched by Mick Moloney, Castletroy-born and US-based Irish trad musician and scholar, on October 29 at Thomond Park. There will be a regular softback edition for €30, and 250 special hardback editions for €100, which will also include a double-CD of Limerick acts.

Time fast running out to access the HRI scheme

ccording to a survey carried out recently, 70% of us are planning on carrying out some repairs and renovations to our properties over the next 12 months.

And if you are one of those, you may need to act faster than you had originally planned if you want to qualify for a tax break on the work you are carrying out, because in 69 days, the Home Renovation Incentive Scheme (HRIS) will come to an end.

(HRIS) will come to an end.

The incentive, introduced in October 2013, provides tax relief for homeowners by way of an income tax credit at 13.5% on qualifying expenditure on the repair, renovation or improvement of works carried out on their home

The scheme will finish on December 31 2018. The only exception is if planning permission is required. If this is the case, planning permission must be in place by December 31, 2018, but you have until March 31, 2019 to complete and pay for the work.

The scheme basically provides a tax relief on work carried out on your property by a tax compliant contractor, and a tax credit at a rate of 13.5% is allowed on the cost on all qualifying expenditure over ϵ 5,000 (inclusive of VAT), up to a maximum of ϵ 30,000.

If, for example, you had work carried out that amounted to in total €10,000 which was broken down as follows: €6,000 (before VAT) to a HRI qualifying builder to convert your attic; €3,000 (before VAT) to a HRI qualifying carpenter for built-in wardrobes; €1,000 (before VAT) to a HRI qualifying painter for painting work; Your HRI tax credit would be €10,000 x 13.5% =

€1.350

And if you had more extensive works carried out on your property to the value of ϵ 30,000 or more, then your tax credit would amount to ϵ 4,050 (ϵ 30,000 x 13.5%) which is the maximum tax relief available.

The type of work carried out on your property that qualifies for HRI relief has to be subject to 13.5% VAT, which typically is work that would include the following: Painting and decorating; Rewiring; Tiling; Supply and fitting of kitchens; Extensions; Garages; Landscaping; Supply and fitting of solar panels; Conservatories; Plastering; Plumbing; Bathroom upgrades; Supply and fitting of windows and doors; Attic conversions; Driveways; Septic tank repair or replacement; Central heating system report or upgrade; Supply and fitting of built in wardrobes

So, the tax relief you can claim for effectively reduces the rate of VAT that would have otherwise applied to the works being carried out. Any work or costs incurred on your property that are subject to VAT at 23% are not covered, neither are items such as furniture, carpets etc. and if any work being carried out is grant-aided, then the qualifying expenditure will be reduced by three times the amount of the grant newment.

The tax credit given is offset against your income tax over the two years following the year in which the work is carried out. If you pay tax through the PAYE system, your HRI tax credit will be divided evenly across your pay dates for each of the two years that it is payable. And if you are a self-assessed tax payer, then it will be included in your

DID YOU KNOW?

A third of serious illness claims paid by insurer Irish Life in 2017, were made to people under 50 years of age. self-assessment over two years, half the tax credit each year.

To qualify for HRI you must ensure you engage a tax-compliant contractor who informs Revenue about the work and payments.

So, before work begins you should:

1. Tell the contractor that you will be applying for a tax credit under the HRI scheme for the work completed

2. Ask the contractor to confirm that they are participating in the scheme and will enter the details of the work on the HRI online system. What you should request from them at this stage is (a) their VAT number (any trader must be registered for VAT) and (b) a tax clearance certificate for the current year

3. The contractor will need from you, your property tax ID number which can be found on any correspondence relating to the local property tax (LPT)

4. Your contractor will enter this number on the Revenue's electronic HRI system along with an estimated cost of works, the name of person claiming the HRI i.e. you, a description of the works, estimated start and completion dates etc. in order to register your work for tax relief – you can log on to this system to check the work details have been entered and entered correctly

After the work begins and when it's completed:

After the work is carried out to your satisfaction, you will go online, the year after the qualifying work has been carried out and paid for, and confirm the work has been completed where you will give your tax details, and Revenue will then arrange for the tax relief to commence the following year.

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, what happens if I die without making a will?

A: If you die without making a will, you are said to die intestate and that means a legal act which came into being in 1965 (Succession Act) will determine who will inherit what.

For example, under this act, if you are married and have no children, your spouse will inherit everything.

If you are married with

If you are married with children, your spouse will get two-thirds of your estate and the remaining one-third is divided equally among your children. If one of your children has died, that share goes to his/her children.

If you have children, but no spouse, your estate is divided equally among your children. If you are single, with no children, and your parents are alive, your estate is divided equally between them, and if only one parent is alive, your estate is given entirely to them.

If you are single, no children, and no parents alive, your estate is divided equally between your brothers and sisters, and if one has passed away, their children will take their share.

If you are single and have no parents, brothers, sisters, nieces or nephews alive, your estate is divided between your next closest relatives. And finally, if you have no living relatives, your estate goes to the state.

So it is worth finding a dining table that is an ideal fit for your space and lifestyle.

Design house Neptune have some tips on choosing that perfect table.

Firstly think about ensuring that the table suits the size and shape of the room. For example, choose a large round or square-shaped table to complement a big open space. A long, banqueting-style table is better suited to a narrow space.

Consider placing your table so it follows the lines of the room and draws the eye along it.

In a compact space, such as a cottage kitchen or a studio flat, a round table may be the best option.



Not only does it make moving around easier, but it will also create breathing space, helping the room to feel less 'boxy' and more 'cute'.

Design brief with Browsers

A workspace that works on every level

Creative director of Browsers and interior designer Geri O'Toole Glynn first met Teresa at Geri's design studio in the centre of Limerick city.

Teresa was excited to be planning a new project and was hoping that Geri could help with the design and management process.

"Teresa performs much of her corporate role from home," says Geri, "so it was important that her new house had a suitable space to inspire and motivate her during her working hours. In saying that, we wanted to ensure that it didn't look out of place in a family home."

The room was initially an empty shell, and the first thing Geri noticed on entering was the blank wall facing her that was shouting for attention.

As storage was key to this productive space, Geri knew that a custom shelving unit would give the room immediate office credibility. A bold colour was inevitable; the high ceilings and light filled space allowed for something striking.

"Clients are often unsure about what colour scheme they want to commit to, so the best thing is to just get all the swatches out and take it from there! It didn't take much deliberation on Teresa's part-Hick's Blue from Little Greene Paints was an immediate winner."

The custom unit was built to the ceiling to enhance the room's height and to maximise storage space, while the majority of the shelving was left open to showcase Teresa's own items, creating a more personalised display.

No office would be

complete without a desk, and thankfully Teresa had no use for a clunky, wire-ridden desktop computer, using her work laptop instead.

"This meant the desk could be as minimal as possible," says Geri, "an important factor to consider so as not to take from the shelving as the main focus of the room."

Geri chose a modern iron and solid timber desk, juxtaposed by an elegant upholstered wing chair – an appropriate replacement for the typical bland office chair designs.

The swivel occasional chair that flanks the shelving is anything but bland; a rich mustard hue bordering on gold, giving the room a luxurious edge that corporate

offices usually lack.

Geri continues this theme in the accessories, enabling Teresa to change the colour scheme should she see fit.

Suitably subtle flooring and walls let the accent colours take charge, and the Neptune Browning pendant light and iron style side table reflect the clean lines of the minimalist desk.

For the finishing touches Geri commissioned a series of drawings from local artist Helena Grimes and adorned the shelves with a selection of ceramics, faux florals and ornaments from the Browsers collections.

Real communication is key



OMMUNICATION is an essential part of any healthy relationship. In the world of social media, I do wonder what children and adults are at in the context of 'real communication'. Good communication is a skill we can take for granted, it like common sense; the reality is both are not common.

Style of conflict

It isn't just about words; it's tone of voice, facial expressions, body language and even silence. $Unresolved\ repeated\ conflict\ is\ like$ rust - it can corrode something that was once fresh and strong. Just like rust, you cannot just leave it and hope it goes away: if you deal with conflict properly it can make a relationship stronger and more trusting.

Understanding your own individual way of arguing is a great start. There are four main types of unhelpful arguing responses/patterns: In an argument how do you normally respond? Circle the number that reflect your style.

Mostly 4's – Your response style is Freezing – feeling unable to respond because you are overwhelmed or frightened

The importance of Setting Boundaries

Healthy communication involves setting healthy boundaries. Setting boundaries is demonstrating to another person in a consistent and non-aggressive way that certain behaviours are acceptable or not acceptable. Healthy boundaries create strength in a relationship. Relationship boundaries often work best if done as a joint project as a couple. You can still set your own communication boundaries and manage your own behaviour, as setting a boundary may or may not cause another person to change their behaviour.

What it is not: Communicating a boundary is not about stubbornly digging your heels in, and it is not about making another person change their behaviour. It is not about criticism, blame, or judgement.

What it is: Boundaries are based on the understanding that everyone is an individual person, with their own needs, yet is still part of the relationship and the values they share. Boundaries are identifiable when you will not let another person jeopardise your sense of safety and wellbeing and you will not jeopardise theirs

Toxic Dump

This is important. If I got a €1 for every time I am asked how to change another person. Here's the thing; you can't change another person but by setting boundaries they might change, If they don't and its impacting on you then they are toxic. Toxic people are like energy vampires, its time to get them out of your life or reduce the "dose" literally!

Relationship

Communication in your relationship is like doing maintenance work - you want to



keep it up, and not wait until it has broken down or collapsed. Relationships are vitally important, and often, when a $problem\,occurs, it\,is\,about\,both$ parties: it is about 'us'. Unresolved conflict can damage relationships. In good relationships, couples work out a way of discussing difficulties so that the issues don't keep coming back.

Five Steps to Conflict resolution Think about something you repeatedly argue about. Sometimes it is good to start off with a little thing

Step 1: What is the issue or situation you are dealing with? Tip: Just pick one small issue. The best outcomes are achieved when you only deal with the problem at hand. Do not bring in other complaints as it gets too hard and often does not solve any problem.

Example: We can't agree on

who is taking out the rubbish bins..

Step 2: What is my point of view about the issue?

Example: I want to relax after

Step 3: What might be the other person's point of view about the situation?

Example: They don't like the smell of rubbish

Step 4: How is this impacting on both of you? [May be different to 2

Example: Even though the bins are overflowing, no one is taking

Step 5: If you were an observer of this situation, including both perspectives, what would you advise? 1. Yourself


Example: Structure time to relax as well as taking the bins out

2. The other person Example: Take bins out before $they\,smell\\$

3. Both of you together **Example:** Take bins out regardless of your personal concerns and/or make a roster to take the bins out

This is a problem solving situation so by listening, looking and thinking about the situation from a few angles, you both give and take. By observing and thinking in terms of 'we' and being flexible then communication can grow and be positive. When communication grows; it becomes $imbued \, with \, trust, respect \, and \,$ equality. All good nutrients to health communications.

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
Dealing with Osteoporosis

ctober 20th was dedicated to World Osteoporosis Day, raising global awareness of the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of osteoporosis and metabolic bone disease.

Building strong bones depends on your diet and lifestyle in the early years; your bone strength peaks at the age of 18, after that you can only maintain it. 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






























FIT4LIFE

Are you really being busy for the sake of it? Are you gaining anything from constantly running yourself ragged? I have learned to take a step back. To make sure there are times, moments and days where I can just "stand still". Sure it won't happen daily but making a little time for "nothing" is as important as getting it all done. 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Beware how you layer this winter

HOT AND COLD

Best advice is to keep colours tonal, so greys, blacks and whites work well together. Different tones and shades of each colour will also work well so if you're going for a green scheme then mix khakis and deeper greens to create some kind of depth to the outfit. The choice of pattern is also very important to a well-layered outfit. If you wear too many patterns or clashing patterns then your outfit isn't going to work. The best way to avoid this is to wear simple block colours. Think minimalist rather than boring. Having said that, patterns are a great way to make an outfit more exciting. If you're wearing more than one pattern then try to avoid jarring patterns – make one pattern the base that all others graduate from. The most complex pattern should be the top layer. Be sure to wear multiple items of clothing in the same pattern, as this will look cluttered and a bit odd.

If you work in an environment that specifies a professional dress code then you're going to need to know how to layer a formal outfit. Fortunately, it's fairly

straightforward. For example, to layer a suit, you should just wear it in the same way you normally would and just finish the look off with an overcoat. 



SUBARU'S big five-seater Forester SUV is the brand's best-seller in Ireland. It may not be the most stylish of SUVs with its rugged looks, particular with a dark exterior colour which turns it into a real toughie, but it is a truly excellent all-rounder both on- and off-road.

It is also a very practical car for a family's everyday use.

A 2018 upgrade ensures it keeps its status as one of the most capable and versatile SUVs in its class. Improvements are to do with safety, convenience, comfort and refinement.

Five models are offered, starting at €36,995 for the turbo-diesel 147hp 2.0D X, and €37,005 for the petrol 150hp 2.0i XE Lineartronic auto (198Nm of torque). A six-speed manual gearbox is fitted as standard to 2.0D models with Subaru's Lineartronic CVT automatic transmission available as an option (€3,000). 

TROUBLED Limerick FC are preparing for Bank Holiday Monday's crucial SSE Airtricity League Premier Division relegation play-off first leg with Finn Harps in Ballybofey.

The club faces an uncertain future off the field too as the High Court adjourned an application by the Revenue Commissioners to wind up Limerick FC on Monday.

Tommy Barrett's Limerick side face two games in three days this weekend as the Blues play their final Premier Division regular season fixture of the season against Waterford FC at the RSC this Friday, 7.45pm.

The game in Waterford is,

in effect, a 'dead rubber' from Limerick's point of view as the main focus will be on the two leg play-off with First Division high-flyers Harps at Finn Park on Monday.

The second leg of the relegation play-off will take place at the Markets Field on Friday, November 2.

While on-field matters will occupy Limerick face for the next week, off the pitch, Limerick are concerned about matters in the High Court.

On Monday, the Revenue's collector general has petitioned the High Court to have Munster Football Club Ltd, which trades under the name Limerick FC wound up and a liquidator appointed arising out of an alleged failure to pay a demand for unpaid taxes including PAYE

and PRSI.

The demand was made on the company, with a registered address at Kirby O'Sullivan Sports, Social & Business Park, Kilmallock Road, Bruff, in mid-September.

The matter was briefly mentioned before Mr Justice David Keane at the High Court on Monday.

Dermot Cahill, Bl, for the Collector General, told the court that the parties have agreed that the petition could be adjourned for three weeks.

The amount of money revenue seeks from the team in its demand was not mentioned in open court. The petition is expected to be dealt with on that date.

By then the club's senior men's team will have

completed all its fixtures.

Looking ahead to the upcoming relegation play-off Limerick FC manager Tommy Barrett insisted Finn Harps deserved to be favourites to win their upcoming play-off.

Barrett said: "I think

genuinely Finn Harps are favourites. They have the momentum. They have better resources for us.

"They have more experienced players. They got lads in on-loan. Up in the North West, they can pull from professional leagues, Derry play in the Ulster Senior League. We don't. We are missing that pyramid around here.

"There is a gap here for a U-23 league or a Reserve's League.

"I have seen Harps on vide this season. Will (Boland) went up to see them against Drogheda in the First Division play-off on Friday.

"They are well organised, well drilled. They lost 3-1 away to Dundalk, the only game they lost since June.

"They're a good side."

GAA must learn from Irish rugby's mistakes

his week, Brian Cody, the most successful hurling manager off all time issue the following words, "I am worried"

When Cody utters such words, it is time for everyone else to stand up and take notice.

Speaking to the Irish Independent, Cody added,

"Everybody talks about the club, the club, the club, and rightly so, but it's the club players who are being isolated. They are being denied the opportunity to enjoy playing the game when they need to play the game."

The Kilkenny manager, who is about to enter his 21st season in charge of the 'Cats' is fearful that the inter county players and indeed the inter county 'scene' is having a detrimental effect on the grass roots of the game he loves.

"How do you become a county player? - Cody continued.

"For me, you became a county player because you showed the kind of form with your club that merited you being given the opportunity. You were a real genuine leader with your club, you were consistent, you were always performing. That doesn't happen anymore because they [players] don't play [with their clubs].

The GAA is now staring down

the barrel of the county versus club dilemma which is something another governing body has faced in the past.

The GAA only need to look at the IRFU to see how not to treat


their grass roots.
The IRFU have gotten a lot right over the years and they continue to do so, however they too had a choice to make about their 'club' game and they decided to cut the clubs off from the top tier.

The rugby pathway for players is now through their schools and elite academies at the age of 18 and younger. Very few, if any, are recruited to the professional game through a club. (Neil Cronin being an exception of sorts, as he was in the professional set up once before)

The IRFU looked at the strength of the schools game in Dublin and decided that is where they would recruit from. It is easy for them. They have limitless numbers.

On the other hand, Munster, who need to make the most of their own crops, turned their back on the pathway which provided the basis of their most successful teams of 2006 and 2008 and instead decided to grow as much as they could in their own glasshouse.

Then, if needed, they head off



shopping in the stores of Leinster, England and South Africa. Buying in what they need, when it fact, if they had gotten their own back garden in order, they could have recruited from

home, for far cheaper.

Take the news this week that

Leinster scrum half Nick McCarthy is to join the province next season. I have nothing against the player, but surely Munster could produce their own scrum halves if the structures were right. If more emphasis was put on the club game. If the net of recruitment was thrown wider.

Comparing rugby to the GAA is slightly unfair too of course. Rugby is professional and money rules all, but the lesson to be learned is that in both sports, the clubs are the lifeblood of the top tier.

They are the umbilical cord to the life and soul of the game. The clubs, in both codes, produce the players that eventually become the professionals or in the case of the GAA, the intercounty

The GAA however cannot go shopping outside of their own glasshouse. All the more reason then to put the clubs first. The association needs to listen to the wise master that is Cody. If the man who has helped create the monster that is modern GAA is worried about it's negative effects, it is time for all to listen.
