Workers at restaurants did not have valid work permit

A COMPANY which employed a number of non-EU nationals without valid work permits has been fined €1,000. Bella Italia

Limited, which operates two restaurants, was prosecuted by the Minister for Business, Enterprise and Innovation relating to offences which were detected in May 2018. Antoinette Cahill, an

inspector with the Workplace Relations Commission, told Limerick District Court that having called to the company's registered address on May 8, 2018 it was established one employee had no work

permit while three others were working in excess oftheir permitted hours. She said contravention letters were sent to the company and that

legal proceedings were initiated as matters were not addressed for several months.

Solicitor Joseph Griffin said the company, which rectified matters last September, is a "very good employer" and was tardy and "naive in not acting" faster" in response to the WRC letters.

Judge Marian O'Leary, pictured, imposed separate fines totalling €1,000.

Parents of schoolgirl in court over street rubbish

THE parents of a schoolgirl were prosecuted under the Waste Management Act after they were connected to three bags of rubbish which were dumped at Todds Bow in the city centre.

Litter warden Paul McAnespie told Limerick District Court documentation from the girl's school was discovered in the bags which were found on November 16, last.

The defendants' details were later obtained from the school after it was contacted by the local authority. A notice requiring the parents to supply details of their

waste collection service was subsequently issued but not complied with. A fine was also not paid.

Judge Marian O'Leary fined each parent ${\color{black}{\in}} 200$ and she directed they each pay €293 towards the council's costs.

Man had cocaine worth €98,000 for sale or supply

A MAN who had a significant quantity of drugs at his home on the outskirts of the city will be sentenced in July, writes David Hurley.

When arraigned at Limerick Circuit Court (pictured), Dermot Calvert, 48, who has an address at Mossgrove Avenue, Caherdavin, pleaded guilty to having 13.98 grams of cocaine for the purpose of sale or supply.

The drugs, which had a street value of almost €98,000, were located in the front room of the defendant's home when it was searched by gardai as



intelligence-led operation on February 22, 2018. After being informed by John O'Sullivan BĽ,

prosecuting, that the guilty plea was acceptable to the State, Judge Tom O'Donnell agreed to adjourn the matter to July for sentencing. Because of the value of the

drugs seized, a mandatory sentence of ten years' imprisonment applies unless the sentencing judge rules there are specific and exceptional reasons not to impose such a sentence.

Mr Calvert was remanded on continuing bail.

Limerick is now a destination for FDI

Investment: 700 new jobs for city as companies expand

THE mayor of Limerick city and county says three recent jobs announcements has confirmed Limerick's status as a major destination for inward investment.

In just over 72 hours, three multinational companies – Edward Lifesciences, FundRock and Johnson & Johnson Vison Care confirmed they were to invest hundreds of millions of euro in Limerick over the coming years - creating around 700 jobs in the Castletroy area of the city.

"Limerick does have a lot going for it, it's a very positive time in Limerick, it's a very special time in Limerick and I feel very privileged to be mayor in the year that we have. There are a lot of building blocks and steps that have been taken and many people have been involved in turning around the economy of Limerick," said Cllr James Collins at the announcement of Johnson & Johnson's €100m expansions plans.

Pat Daly, director of service at Limerick City and County Council with responsibility for economic development and planning also welcomed the three announcements.

The growth our city and county is achieving, growth that is essential in the context of balanced regional development, didn't just happened overnight. It is as a result

of strategic planning that goes back to the launch of our Limerick 2030 Economic and Spatial Plan," he said.

"As a region we have much to offer in terms of foreign direct investment, not least an exceptionally skilled, educated, high-calibre workforce, competitive cost of living and doing business, access through an international airport at Shannon and the supply of high-quality office space coming on-stream," he added.

John Lynch, plant lead for Johnson & Johnson Vision Care, says the decision to expand the company's manufacturing operations in Limerick is a key milestone - 26 years after began its operations here.

"We believe that the new manufacturing roles being introduced in Limerick in 2019 will be foundational in helping us bring new, innovative contact lens products to our patients and customers around the world at

an industry-leading pace," he said. Martin Shanahan, ceo of IDA Ireland, says the three jobs announcements show how well Limerick and the wider region is able to compete with other major cities – particularly in Europe – for foreign direct investment.

"Limerick has proven to be competitive, these investors do not make these investment decisions lightly and the fact that they continue to reinvest in Limerick shows that they see that the offering is there," he said adding that there needs to be continued investment in infrastructure, housing and education to keep the momentum going.

In addition to the jobs being created by the three companies, hundreds of people will be employed during the construction phase.

announce FundRock's expansion.





Investment: Edwards Lifesciences announce €160m to be pumped into city plant

THE MEDICAL technology giant that is set to bring 600 jobs to Limerick by

is set to bring 600 jobs to Limerick by 2021 has made a commitment to invest in local GAA clubs, its CEO has announced.

Edwards Lifesciences announced on Friday that it was to increase its investment into a new manufacturing plant at the National Technology Park in Castletroy by \in 80m to \in 160m.

Edwards Lifesciences Corporation, which produces patient-focused technology for structural heart disease and critical care monitoring, is headquartered in California and is projecting the creation of around 600 jobs once the facility is opened in 2021.

Its chairperson Michael Mussallem said that, through its foundation, Edwards will be able to carry out some charitable work in Ireland. The chief said that it will support Croí, the heart and stroke charity, by providing free screenings to patients.

Mr Mussallem said that Edwards will always invest in scholarships for students "in need" at Limerick Institute of Technology and invest in local GAA clubs.

"It is kind of fun for us, and it is even more important that we have an aspiration that each of our employees actually gets involved. And each of those activities allows them to get involved in the community." Taoiseach Leo Varadkar was

Taoiseach Leo Varadkar was present at the launch last Friday, saying the development of the Limerick city region is a major part of the Government's Project Ireland 2040 plan.

"We are planning for the city to grow by 50 per cent over the next two decades through enhanced regional accessibility, improved international connectivity and a competitive, educated workforce. The fact that Edwards Lifesciences has chosen Limerick for this new permanent facility is a very positive endorsement of the region as a great place in which to live, work and invest.

"Lifesaving, cutting-edge technologies will be produced here, resulting in the creation of 600 highly skilled jobs. I wish the company and their new workforce the very best as they embark on this exciting new project," Taoiseach Varadkar said.

Edwards established operations in Ireland in 2018, and employs 50 people at a facility in the Shannon Freezone. The additional investment around its new facility includes the purchase of additional land, the construction of a larger facility to allow for possible future expansion and the integration of upgraded technology. Former mayor in fresh bid for seat on Council

FORMER mayor of Limerick Kevin Kiely has announced he is to run as an Independent candidate in City North.

The Farranshone man, who represented Fine Gael on the old City Council between 1985 and 1991, plus 2004 and 2014, has pledged to try to speed up the progress around Project Opera if returned next month. "Limerick still has a cancer in the middle of it in terms of the Opera Centre and all we are doing is listening every three or four weeks that this is happening and that is happening. But nothing has happened. I was over in Boston on numerous occasions, and an announcement would be made, and seven to eight months from that, you'd see a new 30-storey building," he told The Leader. "The Opera Centre people know it's a disaster, and we are suffering from a huge parking crisis in the city. If elected, I would close Arthur's Quay car park and build on it, put 2,000 car spaces underneath it, and give them to the people free of charge to come in and shop."

Mr Kiely decided against contesting the 2014 election on health grounds – but he vowed to be back. Now he is running in a seven-seater ward, which is seeing two high-profile retirees in the form of Cllrs Michael Hourigan and John Gilligan, plus the stepping down of Fianna Fail member Cllr Vivienne Crowley.

Asked how he rated his chances of a fifth council term, Mr Kiely said: "I have a proven track record. Anything I said I would do, I did it on the northside. I got people new roads, I resurfaced roads, new footpaths, houses all over the northside. I looked after families from the area. As mayor I was outspoken and never let the grass grow under my feet." Limerick goes to the polls May 24.

Family recalls tragic Roy Collins murder

Ten years on: 'People were so afraid of these gangs'

THE FATHER of murdered Limerick man Roy Collins has recalled the moment he found his son fighting for his life after he was shot this day 10 years ago.

The 35-year-old father-of-two was shot while he was working at Coin Castle Amusements arcade, in Roxboro on April 9, 2009.

The brutal murder occurred after Wayne Dundon, who is serving life for Roy's murder, sought revenge after he was jailed for threatening to kill another member of the Collins family in 2004.

Nathan Killeen and James Dillon are also serving lengthy prison sentences for the murder.

"A lady came running in saying that a fight was after happening in the casino. I ran in, looked in the door, looked over and seen Roy on his knees over in the corner. He was after being shot in the back. All I could do was go over and cradle him and get an ambulance," Roy's father said. "He was conscious. I looked down and seen a small pool of blood on the ground with a bullet in. I couldn't believe it. So I called the ambulance and the police and I held him and I cradled him. I tried to comfort him. I thought he was going to make it."

He said that after Roy was placed on a gurney when the ambulance arrived "he was worried and he could barely breathe at this stage, looking for his mother, telling everyone he loved them".

Roy's brother said that when he was with him on the way to the hospital, he was holding his hand.

He said that when they got into the hospital, Roy gave his brother a "thumbs up".

Speaking about their campaign to

seek justice for Roy, his brother said: "We couldn't sit back and see these people get away with it. There was a major campaign and it was tough.

"The only way to do this is heavy-handed, go in and be in their faces. And in fairness, they came down the following week, they sat outside their houses, they kicked in doors and that's when everything changed. That's when Limerick started to become what it is today. Limerick is a different place today compared to back then," Roy's brother told Live95 on Tuesday morning.

His father said: "It was a terrible cancer in Limerick at the time. People were so afraid of these gangs. I was amazed at the amount of people that turned up that day. The thousands of people that turned up to support us. Without that, we would still be here trying to get justice."

Garda patrol car rammed during pursuit

A MAN who is accused of deliberately ramming a garda patrol car during a high-speed pursuit is facing trial before the circuit court.

A book of evidence has been served on Jimmy Harty, 43, of Sycamore Drive, Newbridge, County Kildare, who faces a number of charges relating to an incident in the early hours of November 16, 2018.

In addition to charges of endangerment and criminal damage, he is also accused of dangerous driving at a number of different locations.

Opposing bail, Detective Garda Dean Landers

said it will be alleged that while on patrol at Childers at Road around 2.30am, he and number of colleagues encountered a high-powered Audi A3 car which was being driven by Mr

Harty. He said it will be alleged the defendant increased his

speed and attempted to avoid gardai resulting in a high speed pursuit taking place. He told Sergeant Donal

Cronin it will be alleged the Audi A3 entered the car park of Our Lady of Lourdes church where he reversed at the patrol car having first come to a complete stop.

The witness said two of his colleagues, who were armed, were approaching the car on foot when he reversed.

"He reversed at speed narrowly avoiding my colleagues. He hit the (patrol) car," he said adding it will be further alleged Mr Harty then fled from the car park by driving over a grassed area.

Judge Marian O'Leary was told the pursuit continued along Rosbrien Road, through Punch's Cross and onto Courtbrack Avenue where the Audi struck a roundabout and collided with an electricity pole.

The detective said a number of other people were in the car and that during the pursuit a plastic bag was thrown from the vehicle.

He said it will be alleged the bag, which was later recovered by gardai, contained a quantity of cocaine.

> Detective Garda Landers expressed concerns the

defendant would not appear in court if released and would continue to engage in criminality. Being

cross-examined by Mr Harty's barrister he accepted the defendant is not a flight risk but reiterated his belief he would appear in court. Having considered the objection, the judge said she was refusing bail.

She noted the book of evidence had been completed and a copy served on the defendant and that the DPP was consenting to the matter being sent forward to the present sittings of Limerick Circuit Court.

Given the current lists, the earliest date of any trial will be towards the end of this year.

"We must get into the habit of locking our doors when we step into our houses," she added.

Purse was stolen from trolley at supermarket

GARDAI are investigating the theft of a woman's handbag from her shopping trolley.

The incident happened at a large supermarket at lunchtime last Saturday.

"Her purse was in her shopping bag on her shopping trolly. After a time the lady discovered that her purse was missing," said Sergeant Ber Leetch.

"Her purse contained cash but also her debit and credit card and her driver's licence. All of these must now be cancelled and in the case of her driver's licence it must be reapplied for."



Sgt Leetch says shoppers need to be vigilant.

"It's not safe to leave your purse out of your sight and when you're shopping you are inclined to walk over to get a certain product and leave your trolley and purse behind you. Criminals only need a second, they are very quick and they look like you and I," she said.

Hammer 'wielded' during row at pub

Court: Suspect refused bail after garda objection

DOZENS of people were forced to flee from a pub in the city centre after a man wielding a hammer entered the premises, a court has heard.

Jeffrey Kelly, 27, of no fixed abode, was refused bail after he was brought before Limerick District Court having been charged in connection with an incident on April 3, last.

Opposing bail, Garda Mark O'Sullivan said it will be alleged the defendant and three other men entered the Old Quarter bar at Little Ellen Street at around 6.30pm.

He said Mr Kelly brandished a weapon - namely a hammer - during the incident and allegedly "tried to strike one of the other three men".

It is the garda case that the incident followed on from a dispute between the men which broke out on William Street a short time earlier.

"It's not known what that altercation was about," said Garda O'Sullivan.

Judge Marian O'Leary was told around 25 people were in the Old Quarter at the time and that many of them were having food.

The incident, Garda O'Sullivan said, lasted for "a good number of minutes" during which time customers "ran out in fear".

He told Sergeant Donal Cronin that CCTV from the premises has been obtained as part of the garda investigation and that a hammer was recovered from the pub.

Kelly, he alleged, was Mr

"brandishing a sweeping brush" at another man when he was arrested at Cecil Street a short time after the alarm was raised.

The court was told gardai were concerned the defendant would not attend court if released and that he would "commit further serious violent offences".

Solicitor Sarah Ryan said her client gave an explanation and "put a context" on the incident when questioned following his arrest.

She said Mr Kelly is engaging with the homeless services in Cork and would live in Cork if required to as a condition of bail.

Having considered the garda objection, Judge O'Leary refused bail. Investigations are ongoing and a file is to be prepared for the DPP.

Pupil, 14, has missed 91% of school days

A JUDGE has warned the parents of a teenage boy who refuses to go to school there will be consequences if significant progress is not made, writes David Hurley.

In addition to missing more than 90% of all school days since last September, the 14-year-old has attended, on occasions, without a uniform, school bag or lunch.

'The position is not good, it's an appalling picture overall, it's severe educational neglect," solicitor Kevin Sherry, representing Tulsa, told

Limerick District Court.

Mr Sherry confirmed there are significant supports in place and that the child and family agency is extremely concerned that progress is not being made.

Solicitor Ted McCarthy, representing the boy's father, said his client "does not want the young fella at home every day", but that he "just won't go to school"

Solicitor Sarah Ryan said the boy's mother is "making every effort" to ensure he attends school but that he refuses to co-operate. She added that the couple have two other children who are attending school without any difficulty.

Noting the Tusla report, Judge Marian O'Leary said the current situation "just can't continue".

She commented the boy's father is not leading by example and she warned she will not tolerate the current level of absenteeism.

The matter was adjourned to June for review.

UL's plans for Dunnes site a 'game changer'

Ambitious: City business people welcome multistorey complex

PLANS by the University of Limerick to build a massive, multi-storey complex following the announcement that it is to purchase the vacant Dunnes Stores site for $\in 8m$ has been described as a "game changer" for the city.

The plans, so far, will see a significant development constructed on the block Honan's Quay, Sarsfield Street and Liddy Street, next to Arthur's Quay Park.

The news of the purchase has received a warm reception from the people of Limerick, including politicians and pressure groups who had been campaigning for the site's revival for years, which had intensified in recent weeks.

in recent weeks. City businesswoman Helen O'Donnell said: "I think it's singularly the best thing that ever happened. It's hugely significant. It's a double whammy. It's a huge bonus to get that off the market, and then the university actually coming into it. It's going to be enormous."

Ms O'Donnell, whose Tidy Towns group has constantly raised their hopes for action on the site, believes UL will deliver a "spectacular site". The college is to turn the site into a

The college is to turn the site into a riverside campus.

"It will be a game changer, as we have so many other things happening. We have the Gardens International ready, Opera coming in, and now this big eyesore is being taken out. I think given their buildings on campus, they will do something spectacular," Ms O'Donnell added.

Dr Desmond Fitzgerald, UL president, said its city campus will aim to bring together law, business and entrepreneurship in technology and "create a hub for developing and supporting enterprises in the city".

Dr Fitzgerald announced last Friday evening that its governing authority came to an agreement to purchase the site for €8m in order to incorporate it into its city campus.

"It is fitting that UL's presence in the city will be on the waterfront mirroring our magnificent riverside campus just four kilometres away," Dr Des Fitzgerald said.

He said its city campus will aim to bring together law, business, and entrepreneurship in technology and "create a hub for developing and supporting enterprises in the city".

It is hoped that the development will be completed by 2022.

City trader James Ryan, of Centra O'Connell Street, said: "I hope this is



now the catalyst to drive further sites into action. These plans are great, but as a city centre stakeholder, I would be disappointed at the speed at which the plan is being implemented – let's hope 2019 is a year of action".

Fellow businessman Tony Connolly said the presence of students "will give a great buzz to the city". "You see very often in the evening if

"You see very often in the evening if I'm going home at 7pm or 8pm, you'd drive through the city and it looks deserted. Students can create atmosphere," he said.

Northside man 'forced to live in friend's back yard'

Housing crisis: Shane Reddan, 28, evicted from property as landlord was selling

A NORTHSIDE father-of-one has spoken of his hurt and pain after being reduced to living in a caravan in his friend's back yard.

Shane Reddan, 28, was evicted from his home in the Old Cork Road back in 2016 after his landlord decided to sell the property.

Since then, during spiralling rental prices, he has been unable to find accommodation for himself and his eight-year-old son Lee-Jay,

The Corpus Christi school student stays at Shane's sisters home, while the Kileely man remains in the caravan often without heat and electricity.

"I wasn't brought up in life to live in a trailer, or to be separated from my boy, to have a little child crying, wondering where I am and why I am not at home," he said. At Christmas time, he said, he felt

"lost". "I felt I didn't have a family. There was nobody in the house as my mate had gone on holidays. In the winter-time on the dark nights, you don't have anyone to talk to.

No neighbour to call into. You just feel cordoned off from everyone.

He claims despite regular calls to Limerick City and County Council where has been supported by Cllr Frankie Daly - the local authority has not been able to offer him a place to stay.

Shane said he would be willing to move into accommodation in the private market, so long as he has room for his little boy.

"I was looking at that option, and here's the situation I am left with: I have my own account on daft.ie, myhome.ie, and rent.ie. On those three sites, I have an email alert for any property worth up to €1,200. Within two years, I have received one email for a home in Ballingarry which is miles out," he said.

Shane has claimed the council have suggested he check into a homeless hostel.

But he said: "Every hostel in town is drug ridden. I don't want to be left in that situation".

"All I want is a house for me and my young fella so I can put him through school and give him the life I never had," he added.

Initially, Shane was living with no heat in the caravan in a hotel car park on the edge of the city, but it was only after his friend's intervention to allow him to move into his back garden that he was able to access an

electricity supply. Limerick City and County Council says it does not comment on individual cases.

But in a statement, they said they work with all current and potential tenants to access accommodation."

"People can also access the Rental Accommodation Scheme and the Housing Assistance Payment scheme. Limerick Council would encourage anyone who is homeless or with a threat of becoming homeless to contact our dedicated Limerick homeless action team for assistance".

They added: "A wide range of accommodation solutions are used for those who are experiencing homelessness including bed-and-breakfasts, hotels and hubs."

According to a public notice which was erected in recent days, it is proposed to demolish the existing detached prefabs and replace them with new single-storey prefabs of the exact same size and height.

The new prefabs, which will be used for the same purpose as the current prefabs, will be "clad in external timber sheeting and will incorporate a grass sedum roof and roof lighting".

head office in Dublin by early next month.

The timescale for the proposed works has not been disclosed publically and there is no indication as to how much the demolition and construction works will cost.

The public office has also been refurbished in recent years.

With so many ancient sites in Limerick city and county, one would be tempted to buy a metal detector and try and salvage something like the Ardagh Chalice.

But the onus is on the operator to ensure that a metal detector is used in accordance with the law. While it is illegal to use a metal detector anywhere to search for archaeological objects without the formal consent of the Minister for Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, it is an offence to even be in possession of a metal detecting device without the Minister's consent on the site of any monument or archaeological area protected under the National Monuments Acts. This also applies to areas which are subject to underwater heritage orders made under the National Monuments Acts. So think twice before you buy a metal detector for land, lakes or sea.

Sales of electric cars soar by 400% locally

SALES of electric cars have grown by more than 400% so far this year, new figures have revealed.

Official statistics released by the Society of the Irish Motor Industry (SIMI) show 40 electric vehicles were registered in Limerick during the first three months of the year compared to 7 during 2018.

There were 188 recorded sales

of petrol electric cars while 12 hybrid cars were registered.

The figures from SIMI show 536 new cars were registered in Limerick during March - down from 567during March 2018 and representing a year-on-year decrease of 5.47%. Cars manufactured by Ford

(334), Toyota (242), Hyundai (239), Volkswagen (220) and Nissan (200) are the five most popular brand of vehicle sold in Limerick so far in 2019.

A total of 2,322 new cars were registered by the end of March compared to 2,642 during the same period last year - representing a decline of 12.11%.

The five most popular model of new car in the first quarter of 2019 were: Nissan Qashqai (117), Ford Focus (103), Hyundai Tuscon (88), Ford Kuga (86) and Toyota Corolla

The latest statistics show sales of electric cars in Limerick have risen by more than 400% so

far in 2019.

Brian Cooke, director general designate of SIMI says the prospect of Brexit is having a significant impact on the sale of new cars in Limerick and across the country. "While current low volumes in the new car market have largely resulted from lower used car values for consumers' trade-ins due to the huge volume of used car imports from the UK due to the Brexit-driven Sterling exchange rate," he said.

Tributes paid 25 years from Rwandan horror

Tragedy "Not even time can heal" genocide survivor

A survivor of the Rwandan genocide has praised the support given to her in Limerick on the 25th anniversary of her tragic loss.

Chantal Mutesi came to live in Ireland following the horrific attacks which took the life of her husband, four brothers, a sister and her mother, among other members of her family and friends. Recalling her devastating experience of the genocide, she spoke of the pain which is still with her today. "Memories don't fade despite people

saying time is a healer, "she says. Mayor of Limerick City and County Cllr James Collins attended a commemoration and planted a tree at O'Brien Park, Dublin road in honour of the victims of the atrocity.

'We are here to mark the darkest period in your country's history, one

that your nation is thankfully putting behind it, in no small part thanks to the response and intervention from the likes of Bóthar, whom we are very proud of in Limerick," he said at the event, hosted by aid agency Bóthar, whose work is ongoing in Rwanda.

Chantal's compatriot Egwyge Roussard was also present at the time of the genocides, which saw one million people killed in an area the size of Munster in only 100

days. "I left Rwanda when I was five but it's my home country," said Egwyge, "and I have family there and I also lost some members of my family. I'm really glad to see how the Irish and Limerick people dedicated are to remember what happened in Rwanda." Chantal had a special

word of thanks for Bóthar, its supporters and the wider Irish public. "Really thank you for everything you have done for us for the families who are now able to send kids to school," she said.

Niamh Mulqueen, Bóthar's chief operating officer, said that despite the agency's 20-plus years of work in Rwanda, the stories of survivors still shock to the core.

"When we hear the stories we've heard today it can actually stop in your tracks. It really makes you think how cruel life can be. However, I think an important message to take away from today is to show the positivity that is in Rwanda now 25 years later, the hope that they have. I think the whole world could learn from them" she said

Marina plan gets the green light as local's appeal rejected

THE SON of Limerick Euro Millions winner Dolores McNamara has been given go-ahead for the multi-million euro revamp of the marina in Tipperary despite a local resident's concerns over the project.

Gary McNamara, who's mother won \in 115m in 2005, had sought planning had sought planning permission to restore the old harbour at the Lough Derg Marina, Ballina,

Tipperary. The plan, estimated to cost up to €2.5 million, will see the demolition of existing toilets, shop and an office, as well as the construction of a replacement structure at the marina.

However, Mr McNamara's plans were delayed following one local resident's concerns over the work, which she claimed were "unauthorised." She also claimed that the project could cause excessive light pollution.

She previously sought leave to appeal to An Bord Pleanala, claiming the plan to transform the development at Derg Marina was causing her "particular concern."

In her request to apply for leave to appeal, the local resident said her family had been living at the Derg Marina Village for almost 18 vears.

According to the resident, her first objection was submitted after she tried to engage positively with the applicant and Tipperary County Council over a five month period.

site was After the purchased in 2015, she alleged that substantial development work had been carried out, and had continued to be carried out on the site since 2016. according to the Irish Daily Mail.

other works. She had also claimed granting the project planning permission was also likely to result in light pollution as a result of 120 individual

lights. An Bord Pleanala has now refused the resident permission to appeal the decision of Tipperary County Council to grant retention planning permission to Lough Derg Marina Limited for the development of Ballina.

Derg Marina was bought by Mr McNamara, 40 and his wife, who have a variety of property interests across the region. The marina features more than 500 metres of water frontage.

Figure out your financial holy grail and go for it

was asked recently what I considered the holy grail of personal finance to be. And I thought it was a great way to ask a question that everyone would like the answer to.

There are many different answers, all of which depend on your personal circumstances and philosophy.

For some, money has no meaning, it doesn't impact how they live their lives, how happy they are and for others it's all consuming. It really depends on your point of

It really depends on your point of view, and mine and your financial holy grail (FHG) will be different to everyone else's, as it should be.

Some people have told me their FHG would be reaching a stage where they could leave their day job, because they have enough savings to cover them for a year or two. They haven't quite figured out what the long term grail is, but in the short to medium term, having enough to tell their current employer, thanks for the memories.

And others have said, if their income just covers their outgoings, that's fine with them. Doing work that's rewarding and impactful, which also allows them to live the lifestyle they want to, is their ultimate goal.

They don't want a 9 to 5 job, they don't want to be involved in mind numbing meetings every other day. Being able to have a particular lifestyle is their holy grail. And for some, that has meant making serious changes to where they live.

I have encountered more than one person who were able to work remotely and because of that, moved to another country, work 20 hours a week, but their standard of living increased despite them earning and working less. My holy grail would be having the ability to do whatever you want with

your time, free of money worries. A life where you can spend time with people you like, doing things that make

you happy. When you get in a position where you have saved enough and/or have enough passive income streams that cover your

passive income streams that cover your living expenses, then you have reached that stage, and whether you get up out of bed in the morning is your choice. And, of course, that's a big ask.

Something you could only dream about perhaps, or is it?

I meet and read about people who have reached this state all the time, all starting from a zero base. What they all had in common was that they took personal responsibility for their lives and their finances. They didn't leave it to chance, they made it happen. They were goal orientated, very hard working and consistent in what they did.

In the States there is a great programme called Shark Tank. And, one of the sharks is a guy called, Chris Sacca. In 2000, at the age of 25 he was already a millionaire, but then when the market crashed, he lost everything and ended up \$4 million in debt. But he turned things around and at the age of 42 reached his financial holy grail and retired from working altogether. He said he reached it two years later

He said he reached it two years later than he'd planned to.

Mr. Sacca had a plan, he knew what his number was, and he knew when he reached it, he would have time to explore the world, become a mentor, a philanthropist, appear on TV shows, do

whatever he wanted to. He'd have the freedom to create the life he wanted to, free of stress, just full of options.

And yes, he took risks, and yes, he probably got lucky along the way, but it doesn't matter, he made it happen. He wasn't financially free by accident at 42, he was very deliberate and focused which is why he worked 24/7.

It seems to me, that entrepreneurs like them are actively thinking about their holy grail number all the time. They think about it more than the everyday person who's going to work. So, like them, I would give some

So, like them, I would give some thought as to what your financial holy grail is.

It may be cutting back or changing jobs, earning an annual income of $\pounds 250,000$, giving up work altogether.

The sooner you figure out what that is, the easier and quicker it will be to put a plan in place. And if you want to achieve something in 10 years, don't wait nine years to make it happen, start now.

What's clear to me is that you have to become a different person you are today, starting with a different mindset.

You need to know what you want and how much that's going to cost, and what you are willing to do, to make that a reality. And unfortunately, I don't think whatever your FHG is, is going to come from saving a small part of your income, it's going to be nearly impossible.

So, you need to pivot and seek out opportunities that will make your FHG become a reality, but before you do anything, work backwards and think about what it is you want, and then put a number on that and a timeline in which you want to achieve it.

Warm welcome from local business to UL's city move

Education: Huge welcome from businesses in city at site takeover

THERE has been a warm welcome throughout Limerick's business community at news that one of the city's longest vacant sites has been bought.

It emerged on Friday that the University of Limerick (UL) has agreed to buy the vacant Dunnes Stores site on Sarsfield Street.

City businesswomen Helen O'Donnell said: "I think it's singularly the best thing which ever happened. It's hugely significant. It's a double whammy. It's a huge bonus to get that off the market, and then the university actually coming into it. It's going to be enormous."

Ms O'Donnell, whose Tidy Towns group has constantly raised their hopes for action on the site, believes UL will deliver a "spectacular site".

The college – which bought the building for $\in 8m$ – is turning the site into a riverside campus.

"It will be a game changer, as we have so many other things happening. We have the Gardens International ready, Opera coming in, and now this big eyesore is being taken out. I think given their buildings on campus, they will do



something spectacular," Ms O'Donnell added.

City trader James Ryan, of Centra O'Connell Street, said: "I hope this is now the catalyst to drive further sites into action. These plans are great, but as a city centre stakeholder, I would be disappointed at the speed at which the plan is being implemented – let's hope 2019 is a year of action".

Fellow businessman Tony Connolly said the presence of students "will give a great buzz to the city". The former Dunnes Stores site has lain idle since 2008 when the retail giant cut its retail offering in the city centre from three stores to just one "You see very often in the evening if I'm going home at 7pm or 8pm, you'd drive through the city and it looks deserted. Students can create atmosphere," he said.

The governing authority of UL sanctioned the purchase on Friday. Dr Desmond Fitzgerald, the college

Dr Desmond Fitzgerald, the college president said its city campus will aim to bring together law, business and entrepreneurship in technology and "create a hub for developing and supporting enterprises in the city."

High-profile role for software director

THE director of a software research centre at the University of Limerick has been elected president of a major global technology body.

Prof Brian Fitzgerald is now president of the International Association for Information Systems (AIS).

The first Irish person to take on the role, he will serve a three-year term.

Headquartered in Atlanta, AIS is a global professional association for individuals and organisations who lead the research, teaching, practice and study of information systems worldwide. It comprises almost 5,000 members globally and runs four international conferences annually.

Prof Fitzgerald maintains his role as head of University of Limerick headquartered, Lero, a research centre which harnesses software researchers from nine third level institutions including all of the Republic of Ireland's

Its work incorporates a wide range of software development from driverless cars and automation to artificial intelligence and cybersecurity. The concert begins at 7pm but I suggest that you get there just before 6:30pm to avail of the free wine and canapé reception. There's no reason why you should sit through the concert unfed. A Day In My Shoes

Owner The Soupermarket

Serving up a warm bowl of soup and a bit of a chat

What time do you get up? I get up at 4am on market days otherwise around 7.30am.

What is your normal breakfast?

Tea, tea and more tea.

Do you go for a walk or to the gym before/after the office? I try to take Ziggy for a walk on Knockfierna every day, weather permitting.

You arrive at the office at what time?

St Mary's Aid Kitchen, the Milk Market and other people's kitchens are my places of work and there is no fixed time. It depends on how busy I am. However I spend the early hours at home answering e-mails and preparing bespoke menus for clients.

What are your first duties? Putting the kettle on and checking emails.

How many cups of coffee/tea would you drink a day? I daren't count but I should buy shares in Barry's tea.

What is normal lunch - do you have a favourite place?

We change the menu every week at The Soupermarket in the Milk Market, so I like to use my daily lunch to try out different soup recipes everything from carrot, coriander and ginger to potato and thyme or fragrant Thai broths.

Do you have many meetings during the day?

Not really. I used to have a lot more face-to-face meetings when I began working in the food industry aged 17, cooking for the Duke of Devonshire on the Blackwater River. I then had my own restaurant, Lloyd's of Adare. Now, I run Anne Lloyd Catering, so, while I prefer to meet clients face to face to discuss their requirements, in reality I do a lot of it on the computer.

What time do you finish up at? Whenever I've got everything done. As well as The



Soupermarket at the Milk Market, I do bespoke catering for dinner parties, weddings, funerals, and other family events through Anne Lloyd Catering, so sometimes it's lunch time, and sometimes it's midnight before I finish.

Do you watch much TV?

No. I like a few programmes but don't follow soaps as I'd miss half of them and I'm not too good at recording things.

Do you read the newspapers? Yes I read the paper everyday.

What do you do to relax?

I play 'Words' on my I-pad and have the odd glass of wine. I spend time with my family and when time allows take a drive to Cashel or Dingle or wherever my nose leads me to eat decent food at reasonable prices. I like watching the rugby and hurling in the pub with friends.

Are you able to leave the office behind?

Absolutely not. There is always something going on in my mind like what soups I'm going to do for the Soupermarket or creating new recipes. We want everything to be as natural as possible. We only use local suppliers. So I'm always on the go - getting our potatoes from Cecil Gallagher in Ballysteen, our carrots, leeks, beetroot, parsnips and whatever is in season from my mate Colm Battles and his son Josh in Kildimo, and our herbs from the Quinns in the Milk Market. How sex abuse victims can become survivors, thrivers

HIS week I will answer a letter from a reader in his sixties who is just now coming to terms with the trauma of childhood sexual abuse.

DEAR DR EDDIE,

I am a 63-year-old man and I only started to come to terms with the trauma of my childhood in the past 14 months. I was sexually assaulted when I was 12 or 13 years old.

I am on my journey of recovery, having lost everything - property, money and two marriages, and a vulture fund is about to repossess my house... but I am turning the corner.

As part of my recovery I have written a book on my life. I needed to do it but it was tough.

Why am I writing to you.

I have just read your book, Becoming Your Real Self, and it has helped me big time. Thank you for writing it.

I have only found out in the past week that one of the people in authority who molested me was convicted recently.

It was a tough day for me coming face-to-face with him after all the years. But I also met four others who were abused, and the support and kindness and understanding they showed me overwhelmed me.

I fell apart and cried like never before. I am no longer alone.

I am writing to you and reaching out as part of my healing, to help me on the road to recovery and to help and encourage other victims and give them hope."

DEAR SEAN

Dr Eddie responds: Sean, this is such a powerful letter, and I very much appreciate and am humbled that you have sent this to me.

I rang you as well just to ensure that you were on the right track.

I am sorry you have been so scarred by adults in your life that should have cared for you.

Just so we are very clear — when it comes to childhood sexual abuse, no fault is ever on the part of you, the child.

Too often, the outcome of abuse is negative emotions such as guilt and shame, as the abuser used tactics of manipulation, threat and nower

As part of my recovery I have written a book on my life. I needed to do it but it was tough

In your letter, you say the word 'victim'. I encourage you to see yourself as a 'survivor'. With some good therapeutic input, I believe you can become a 'thriver'.

VICTIM

The victim sees themselves as damaged, hopeless and afraid to tell their story. The victim see the world through a lens that shows them they don't deserve nice things, that they are alone in a crowd.

They have feelings of low self-esteem and being unworthy; they are often confused and overwhelmed. Throughout their lives, they have hidden their stories.

Indeed, too often alcohol became the friend of those who were abused. It temporarily eases the pain, but has devastating lifelong consequences and impacts on individuals and families.

SURVIVOR

Sean, you have written to me and you are beginning to own your own story.

You are moving to the 'survivor' state.

The HSE 's National Counselling Service (NCS) is an excellent professional, confidential counselling and psychotherapy service, available free of charge in all regions of the country.

People can refer themselves directly by calling a freephone number — 1800 234 110. The mission of the NCS is "to listen to, value and understand those who have been abused in childhood and to assist clients to live more satisfying lives".

Just as you have done, journaling and writing is a powerful healing process.

Victims can become survivors and thrivers, where healing, health and hope exist PICTURE: FILE PHOTO VIA PIXABAY

Do what works for you. The survivor seeks help, deserves help, names what happened and grieves, sees themselves as wounded (not damaged) and commences the healing process.

The survivor in you, Sean, becomes hopeful, comes out of hiding. The survivor learns compassion for themselves and is not afraid to tell their story to safe people.

THRIVER

The potentiality of the thriver is

another level that I know you will move towards.

I know it won't feel like this now, but this is where I would see you in time — in a place where hope is in your heart, where you are whole, living in the present, proud of your healing, where you have faith in yourself, your decisions and life, where you are able to protect yourself from unsafe others, know your tripwires and go-to healing tools, where you can see and use humour, have healthy boundaries and create inner peace in your life.

Sean, now that you are in an open headspace, get the support that you deserve and commence the work of healing through therapy.

May healing, health and hope follow.





For general Communication for Tips with Teenagers.

Listen more than you speak

Remember that we are all given two ears and one mouth. This is to remind us that we should spend twice as much time listening as talking! This is especially important when talking to teenagers, who may tell us more if we are silent long enough to give them the opportunity.

Make time to spend together

Teenagers are often busy with school, friends and other interests, but you can have a conversation with them over breakfast and dinner. Offer to take them to or pick them up from places; this will provide other opportunities for conversations.

Give them privacy

Teenagers need their own space. For example, knock before you go into their room.

Keep up with their interests

Listen to their music, watch their television shows with them and turn up to their sports practice sessions. Continue to take an active interest in their life.

Be a loving parent

adolescence is a time when young people often struggle with their changing sense of identity and need to feel loved. Tell them often. Demonstrate your love using whatever physical contact they are comfortable with. Celebrate their achievements, forgive their mistakes, listen to them when they have a problem and show interest in how they plan to solve it.

Have fun

Make time for leisure and laughter as good feelings help to build good positive relationships.



How to keep in close contact with teens as they get older and prioritise time with their friends

OUR relationships with our children as they move into their teenage years can sometimes be challenging. The positive active communication we enjoyed with them when they were younger changes, and we can find ourselves not chatting with them freely and informally as often as we did when they were little. We may start to find ourselves falling into the habit of having brief yes and no conversations that can start to feel like an interrogation! This may happen as other commitments and activities such as work, afterschool study, external activities, time with friends and the inevitable screen time make it more difficult to set aside time within the home to just sit and chat as a family.

As our children get older and they start to prioritise time with their friends and activities outside the home over home life, we can find ourselves firing questions at them just to get a sense of how they are and what they are doing. For example, 'How was school today?' 'Where are you going?', 'Who's going with you?' or 'What are you going to be doing?'. This can give rise to the possibility that your teenager will not tell you things that their friends are doing or, more importantly, what they may be worried about. You may not know, if you lose the casual chats, what they care about, what they dislike or what they're thinking. You may not be that familiar with their friends and any issues arising within their peer groups.

When we chat informally at home we create opportunities to really share what is happening within the home and school on a weekly basis. Creating this space within your home needs to be prioritised and planned. Try making time to have meals together (device free for everyone in the family) so that there are better opportunities to communicate fully. If you don't make time to talk about the everyday normal activities your teenager is involved in, it will be much more difficult to start a conversation when issues arise such as experimenting with drugs/alcohol, peer pressure, worries about school, bullying etc.

When communication remains open it is natural to ask if something is wrong without your teenager fearing that you are judging them or wish to limit their movements and choices.

Making the most of your time together at meal times, limiting your phone use in their company, driving them to activities, having their friends over, planning family trips and holidays is very important in keeping the relationship connected. Try to keep special family traditions such as birthday or holiday celebrations going even when they are teenagers and even when they seem bored with your efforts. These are the things that keep you all together, working out issues and stresses in a supportive way by making time together as positive as possible. When issues arise it is important to reflect on possible misunderstandings and mistakes made, acknowledge them and move on to ensure that your parent/teenager relationship continues to grow and develop positively into adulthood.

Hay fever is nothing to sneeze at

HE weather is fairly changeable at the moment, but it is never too early to think about hay fever if you have to suffer every year. Start early, and you can reduce or even prevent symptoms "springing up".

There are plenty of over the counter drugs available to reduce the symptoms of hay fever, but their side effects can be numerous also and they only mask the underlying problem. Our

body use these signs to tell us there is something wrong. Simply suppressing them can lead to further complications down the line.

But why is it that some people are affected while others aren't? Well, genetics might play a part - but believe it or not, it is mainly down to what is in your gut. Over 70% of our immune cells reside in our digestive system and the gut microbes are responsible for the fine balance of the immune



According to the Irish Pharmacy Union, one in five people in Ireland suffer from hayfever

response. Hay fever, like any allergy, is an over-reaction of the body to a harmless substance. Suffering from any allergies means that it's time to get your gut-bugs in shape-the goal is diversity! Your gut flora in the first

year of life determines your immune system sensitivity for life. C-section birth and bottle-feeding result in differing set-up than natural alternatives. Antibiotics and other medications further interfere with the natural

flora; a single week of broad-spectrum antibiotics can reduce your diversity and set your balance out for over a year! Stress, bad dietary choices and alcohol are all play a part in interfering with the bowel flora and our immunity. Lack of Vitamin D3 so common in Ireland has been also linked to immune problems - so make sure you get your GP to test your levels and supplement with a good quality cod liver oil.

The best way to tackle hay fever therefore is to balance the immune system; supply the body with beneficial bacteria and create an environment for them in which they can colonise and work for our benefit. Several clinical trials have been conducted in the last decade using probiotics as treatment with mostly positive outcomes. Most of these studies supplemented

different strains for between 4 weeks to 6 months during hay fever season and found reduction in clinical signs as well as the need for medications. One study also looked at supplementing all year round, which reduced the overall episodes.

To build a great diversity of your gut flora you need to eat a good diversity of plants - mostly vegetables of all colours. Try to eat the rainbow – at least one vegetable from each colour every day and challenge yourself to eat a new type of vegetable or two every week. Onions, garlic, Jerusalem artichokes, raw chocolate and stewed apples are especially packed full of bacteria-boosting fibre, but it is the variety that matters. These supply nutrients for those beneficial bugs and within four weeks you can greatly improve their communities.



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Everything you need to know about hair transplants

'VE covered hair loss and hair restoration in this column many times over the years and I continue to do so because it's still the topic that I get the most questions and feedback about. Just a few weeks ago I looked at an alternative hair restoration treatment called Scalp Micro Pigmentation as it's available here in Limerick at Purebeau AO Aesthetic Clinic. However this time instead of looking at alternatives, I'm going to focus on the proverbial endgame of male pattern baldness - the hair transplant. In this guide, I'll look at how hair transplants work, the cost involved and the possible side effects.

Let me start by saying that I have not had a hair transplant nor am I currently considering one. But I will admit that if I did start to lose my hair then it's certainly the option I would go for. If you are currently losing your hair then vou're not alone. Male pattern baldness affects around a third of Irish men under 30, rising to nearly 80% of men over 70. Nowadays, more and more guys are turning to hair transplants to combat male pattern baldness with the numbers undergoing this procedure rising by 60% since 2014. This is thanks in large part to the growing number of celebrities and sports stars that

have had hair transplants to cover their receding hairlines in recent years. Wayne Rooney is probably the most well known in these parts as he publicly admitted to having had a hair transplant on Twitter in 2011, but the likes of David Beckham, Gary Barlow, Robbie Williams, Matthew McConaughey and most recently Manchester City star David Silva have all visibly defied the ageing process and grown more hair as they've gotten older. If you're considering joining this impressive crew then the bad news is that a hair transplant is both costly and painful and they really aren't for everyone. If its something you've thought about then read on for everything you'll need to know before you book that appointment and or flight.

TYPES OF HAIR TRANSPLANT A hair transplant involves transferring hair from an area unaffected by hair loss (the back of the head usually) to an area where the hair is thinning or gone. For

some, you might, unfortunately, be

too far gone but for those who are eligible, there are two different types of hair transplant: FUT and FUE. FUT (follicular unit transplantation) involves removing strips of tissue from the donor area and cutting these strips into individual follicular units. Small cuts are then made to the scalp in the host area for the follicular unit grafts to be placed into. Sounds pretty nasty and it kind of is, as you'll be left with large scars in the donor area. FUE (follicular unit extraction) is a more modern and humane approach to hair transplantation. For FUE, individual hair follicles are extracted directly from the donor area and then moved to the host area using a specialist surgical microneedle. FUE is the more commonly favoured methods as it leaves less obvious scarring. Whatever method you go for, the transplanted hair will usually fall out after 2 to 3 weeks. You should start to notice new growth in the host area after a few months and most people will see around 60% of new hair growth after 6 to 9 months. If you want a quick fix then buy a hat. Or a wig.

AT WHAT AGE SHOULD YOU HAVE A HAIR TRANSPLANT?

As mentioned, Wayne Rooney has become somewhat of a poster boy for hair transplants since his surgery in 2011. However, Wayne has famously needed multiple "top-ups" as his hair has continued to recede. This is due to the fact that Rooney had his first procedure at the age of 25, while he was still going bald. Now that he's in his mid-thirties, hopefully, Rooney has gone bald for the last time but on his wages, he can afford to make this mistake. Most people will only be able to afford one shot at this so if you're considering getting a hair transplant, then it's best to wait until your thirties when your hairline has settled.

WHAT ARE THE SIDE EFFECTS? For a few days after having the

For a few days after having the surgery, it's common to experience tight, achy and swollen scalp, some scabbing and you may find it hard to sleep for a while. Your head has to be upright because the hairs have to link up with your bloodstream, and as soon as the blood gets to the new hair it, in essence, glues it in. This can take up to 36 hours which means you essentially need to sleep in an upright position for three days after the procedure. As with any form of surgery, there's a small risk of excessive bleeding, infection or an allergic reaction, but your surgeon should be able to deal with these issues should they arise. There's also a risk that the transplant won't take but this is extremely rare.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

A hair transplant could cost as little as €1,000 or as much as €35, 000 depending on the extent of the hair loss, the procedure you choose and the quality and location of the clinic. To have a hair transplant done in Ireland or the UK you're probably starting at around €6,000 to fill in a hairline and going up in price the more you need done. If you're Wayne Rooney then that's a half days pay but if you're not, then that probably sounds like way too much. So many guys are no going abroad to have the procedure done at a fraction of the cost that the phrase "booking my flight to Turkey" has become a euphemism for having a hair transplant.

HOME OR AWAY?

If you're not put off by the cost of having your hair transplant done in Ireland then it probably the easiest and safest option. You are after all having a major surgical procedure that will alter your appearance for the rest of your life so do your due diligence and choose a surgeon that's right for you. Don't forget to consider things like aftercare and what options you have in the event something goes wrong. If cost is a major factor then you can do like many and head elsewhere for your hair transplant. As mentioned, Turkey is one of the most popular destinations. Be warned, it's common for patients to meet with a doctor for their consultation thinking he'll be performing the surgery, only for a nurse or technician to end up carrying out the procedure. Again, doing your research is even more vital if you are travelling overseas. With some of the upscale Turkish clinics, you can have your consultation and aftercare done in Dublin so if this is your chosen path then consider this option as even though it might cost you a little more, it's worth it for the peace of mind you'd have if something went wrong.

CARERS NETWORK IRELAND Caring for carers

RONAH Corcoran, Founder & Director of **Carers Network Ireland** spent many years caring for the most vulnerable. Ronah has worked in youth and homelessness services for the past 20 years, she is also a qualified holistic therapist.

Recently she decided to shift her focus to providing care to her peers. Carers Network Ireland (CNI) addresses increasing mental health issues in the care sector. by providing workshops, events, individual supports and by creating a supportive community.

Ronah explains why she set up CNI: "I noticed in the last few years an increase in mental health issues in the care sector and I thought that something should be done about it. I did some research and interviewed 170 care workers online and in person to see what supports they wanted and needed. From that then developed a programme and offered a six week pilot programme in Galway and we offer things like art therapy, yoga and online support forums and discussion boards, also links to mental health organisations and other wellness activities that were being held in





GAA: Naming rights deal for Limerick GAA and Third Level Institute

LIMERICK's opening game in their All-Ireland SHC title defence against Cork in the Munster SHC on May 19 looks set to be the first game in the newly named LIT Gaelic Grounds.

This week Limerick GAA revealed details of a new 10-year naming rights deal, which commences on May 1.

The Limerick GAA Headquarters on the Ennis Road is to be renamed the LIT Gaelic Grounds as part of a new 10-year partnership between the County Board and the Third Level Institute.

Limerick GAA will receive €300,000 - €30,000 per annum, as well as a host of partnership deals.

"This is a far deeper

relationship than a typical commercial one, and brings with it huge benefits that a conventional commercial relationship simply could not deliver. It is a win for all concerned and we look forward to working together for the benefit of all," stressed Limerick GAA chairman John Cregan.

Among the partnership deals will be a dedicated scholarship scheme for Limerick GAA club members to attend LIT; Limerick GAA internships and work experience for LIT students in sports coaching, event management, marketing and other areas; Use of LIT campus facilities by Limerick GAA teams and administration and use of the inter-county grounds as a 'Living Lab' for LIT students





ow do you solve a problem like the All-Ireland league? L That is the question facing the IRFU in the coming months.

Last Friday night, over two thousand people attended a first Division game between Young Munsters and Shannon.

A phenomenal crowd for a game you will agree, but were it not for the relegation threatened pair meeting in the penultimate round of games, would the crowd have been anywhere near that?

The All-Ireland league has suffered at the hands of the professional game and one wonders what type of future it has within the IRFU structure.

Last weekend several of Munster's 'A' players were flown to the USA for a friendly with the New England Free Jacks.

Not ideal, but people sometimes forget that those players are employees of Munster Rugby. They are not going to have the same loyalty to their club, when their bosses are telling them where to be and when.

The club game has been squeezed out of the limelight by the calendar of rugby which is filled with Lions, Ireland, Pro14, Champions Cup and B&I Cup fixtures.

Is there room for the AIL anymore? Is there a need for a 50,

yes 50, strong senior league across 5 divisions?

With seconds and U20 leagues failing to field teams on a consistent basis in Munster, coupled with underage teams amalgamating at the rate of knots, what can save the domestic game?

For me, there is one answer and it may not be too popular.

The answer lies in the past. The Munster clubs, if they wanted to, that is, should form their own league. A Munster Senior league for want of a better name.

The league would be made up of 10 sides from the province. They would play 18 games, as they do now. There would be no contracted players allowed play. Once a player signs with Munster or anyone else, they are immediately released from the club. They can of course return, should things not work out for them.

There could be a cup competition peppered throughout the season, as well as the existing Limerick and

Cork Charity Cups. The gates would not (should not) be lower than they already are and with more games against your traditional rivals, the players and supporters would surely regain that bond with their 'original' club.

Getting the IRFU to 'allow' same might be an issue, as would getting referees, but if this would the only show in town, governed by those who care, what is there to lose?



OLF'S first Major of the year, the US Masters, tees off at magnificent Augusta National Golf Club in Georgia this Thursday.

US PGA Tour. Woods is a 12/1 shot with the layers to regain the Green Jacket.

Popular Englishman Tommy Fleetwood is sure to have his share of backers this week at odds of 22/1.

World number 13-ranked player Fleetwood comes to Augusta playing extremely well after

recording top-five finishes at the Arnold Palmer Invitational and Players Championship in the past month

Fleetwood can go well this week. However, preference is for ultra-consistent 2013 US Open winner Justin Rose, (11/1), who lost out to Sergio Garcia in a play-off at the Masters two years ago.
