
In the intervening years illegal drugs - cannabis, ecstasy, cocaine and others have become the main release valve for many people, though alcohol remains popular.


What was supposed to be a fun weekend turned out to be a complete tragedy, and something really the organisers of such events can do little about.

What's your idea of a perfect day, or a perfect weekend in Limerick?

A morning spent going through the wonderful collections of artefacts related to Limerick's history that people have donated to Limerick Civic Trust for the new People's Museum of Limerick, followed by a packed lunch in a sunny People's Park right across the road, before an afternoon spent putting together an exhibition with the team in the museum building at No. 2 Pery Square. An ideal day would end with sushi for dinner at Taikichi, and a play at the Belltable.

What's your first Limerick memory?

Learning to swim in the river under the footbridge in Castleconnell. My grandfather was stationed in Castleconnell during the Emergency, and while he was working on building that bridge, he met a local girl and ended up staying!

What's your favourite local walk or view?

I love strolling around King's Island with friends and family - there is so much history packed into the web of streets there. From listening to a lunchtime concert in St Mary's Cathedral to climbing towers and turrets with my two small boys in King John's Castle, or taking a walking tour from The Bishop's Palace if I have visitors staying. Another favourite spot in King's Island is Fanning's Castle, the ruins of the last remaining of the fortified townhouses that once formed the streets of a very different Limerick, which is fascinating to imagine.

What do you think gives Limerick its unique identity?

It's true that Limerick is unique, and nowhere more so than in her streets. The tall townhouses and blocks that were planned by engineers from Italy and Ireland, and commissioned by tradespeople and merchants, have a very different flavour to other Georgian cities. They are the product of mixing entrepreneurship with hard work and ideas from abroad, and make for an eclectic and really interesting town.

Favourite local restaurant?

It was the Underdog on Thomas St before it closed recently! It is a real loss to the city to not have a dedicated veggie café, especially with the Old Fire Station café closing around the same time. I hope that another opens soon. In the meantime, chips from Donkey Ford's are always amazing!

How would you describe the people of Limerick?

Curious about its past, and ambitious for its future! There's been an enormous swell of goodwill and support for our experiment here in No 2 Pery Square. We're looking forward to opening the museum later in the summer, and telling some interesting stories about Limerick and its people.

How important do you think sports and the arts are to Limerick?

Limerick has a rich tradition of culture and it's one of the things I want to bring to life in the People's Museum over the next few years. One of our opening exhibitions is about Limerick's sporting heritage, and sport has found itself in the middle of wider political and social changes in the city at different times. The arts are critical to our city's past and future: they allow us to tell our stories, reflect on their meaning, and look at life afresh. We are looking forward to hosting artists of every type in No. 2 Pery Square from painters to musicians to theatrical performances.

If you could add one amenity to Limerick, what would it be?

There are no statues of real women in Limerick whatsoever. Not a single one (there are two of figurative women), even though there are so many extraordinary women who came from Limerick. We should be using our civic space to commemorate and celebrate the contributions of women like Kate O'Brien, Kathleen Clarke, Dolores O'Riordan, Catherine Hayes, Lola Montez, Dodo Reddan, Mary O'Donovan, or Mary Heath. Our young girls need to see themselves reflected in who is celebrated by the city.

What's the biggest challenge facing the city and county today?

Limerick has wonderful built heritage, which it struggles to maintain. The historic buildings which make up the fabric of our city are often difficult and complicated for people to buy or conserve. Schemes addressing this seem to be few and far between, and the result is a town centre that is empty after six o'clock in the evening. I would like to see joined-up communication between the different lists that deal with derelict housing, vacant housing, protected structures, and the inventory of architectural heritage. Wouldn't it be marvellous to see more families living in our beautiful townhouses?

LIMERICK man of the moment Greg O'Shea is set to make his return home today, Wednesday, August 7 for the first time since his Love Island success.

The 24-year-old Corbally man was voted winner of the series last week in a nail biting series finale which saw himself and Amber Gill walk away with £50k between them.

After more than a week of media commitments with Love Island producers and ITV, the Sevens player is returning home to a life which will definitely be a little different to how it was before.

However, those handling Greg's homecoming say life may be getting back to normal quite quickly for the Love Island winner, who competed on the show during his downtime from the Sevens team.

"He's a professional athlete, he's returning to his studies and preseason soon so those type of personal appearances won't be something we[']re pursuing because of the reputational challenges it poses," said David McHugh of Line Up Sports.

David added that due to time constraints, no formal appearance has been scheduled for Greg in his home city of Limerick, but is "totally open to doing something with the public soon.'

Ahead of landing in Shannon Airport this Wednesday morning, Greg spent time with Amber's family in Newcastle last week, with the couple seemingly inseparable in the wake of their win.

The two spent Amber's 22nd birthday together, with Greg sharing a photo of the pair on Instagram, captioned: "Massive happy birthday to this amazing woman, she really is a 10/10. So lucky to have met her and can't wait to get her to Ireland."

During Sunday night's Love Island Reunion show, Amber stunned viewers by revealing she'd move to Ireland for the relationship.

Host Caroline Flack grilled the new couple about living in separate countries, and asked how they would overcome the obstacle.

"It's not a problem at the moment as we're both so busy," Greg said, "plus, there are planes every hour it's really not a big thing for us."

"Yeah, it doesn't take long to get there, but I could always move to Ireland," Amber announced.

This Tuesday the couple were grilled further on their relationship, and were asked about their

"exclusively dating" tag. "We're exclusively dating, but we're not official yet," Amber explained on Loose Women. "You have to remember we only

met each other for the first time on July 15," added Greg, with Amber admitting that Greg "hasn't asked (her) yet" about going official.

Greg is set to return to the Irish Sevens team later this month for the preseason ahead of their Olympic qualifier next year.

Quinlivan slams July's ED overcrowding

UNIVERSITY Hospital Limerick has admitted that its 455 inpatient beds is not sufficient for the needs

of the Mid-West region. July 2019 was an especially busy month for the Emergency Department at University Hospital Limerick, due to a marked surge in presentations, and reductions in access to transitional care and home care package funding, which led to an increase in delayed discharges.

"It's regrettable that any patient experiences long waits in the ED, and UL Hospitals Group has apologised for the distress and inconvenience that such extended waiting times have caused for patients and their loved ones," said a hospital spokesman.

"Bed capacity at UHL remains considerably below that of comparable hospitals in Ireland. 455 inpatient beds is not sufficient for the needs of the Mid-West region," the spokesperson added.

Sinn Féin TD Maurice Quinlivan said figures from the INMO are yet more proof of the failed health policy of Fine Gael.

"To have 1,293 people on trolleys in one month in the summer, is truly shocking and it's a shameful indictment of this government and their failed policies. To put this number of 1,293 into context – in 2007 just 18 people were recorded on trolleys at University Hospital Limerick in the month of July."

Deputy Quinlivan claims it's hard to believe it has been 'allowed to get this bad'. "Since Fine Gael came to power in 2011, the number of people on trolleys at UHL in July has escalated from 238 to 1,293 – an outrageous increase of over 440%." He called on the Health Minister to visit UHL and sit down with elected representatives, nurses, staff and patients to hear their stories first hand and listen to constructive solutions.

JP checks progress of €10m rugby museum

Tourism: High hopes new attraction can draw 100,000

THE multi-million euro International Rugby Museum continues to take shape, with its benefactor JP McManus paying a visit to the site this week.

The businessman was present to witness the ongoing work at the junction of Cecil Street and O'Connell Street, the site of the ϵ_{10m} visitor attraction. It's expected to open in 2021.

Many passers-by wished Mr

McManus the best as along with Paul Foley, he watched workmen complete the demolition of the site.

It is understood that work on clearing the site will be complete in the next 10 days, at which time they can start building Limerick's latest visitor attraction which is expected to draw 100,000 visitors a year.

The reason this particular site was chosen is to "help bring life and regeneration" to the city centre.

And there is confidence the early targets of 100,000 visitors a year can be easily met. Event Communications London, which was involved in the Titanic visitor centre in Belfast along with the National Army Museum in London and Van Gogh Experience in Amsterdam has won the contract to work on the project.

It will be a family attraction that will last about 90 minutes with a number of digital galleries looking at moments in rugby, players, teams, history and great moments in rugby

There will be civic spaces and meeting rooms in the centre to allow local groups to run events.

Safety fear as kids jump from cliffs at Kilkee

YOUNGSTERS jumping from high off the cliffs at Kilkee are risking life and limb, and are being warned that they are taking great risks by their actions.

Teenagers are leaping from approximately 80-feet high into the sea at the Clare resort.

And local Fianna Fail councillor Cillian Murphy, said one miss-step, and they are risking "a

permanent life-changing injury at best, a funeral at worst." "One hundred people can do it, and 100 people can be fine. But it's the 101st who might have

the issue. I just think some parents don't realise what their kids are doing, and this is why we put the video up," said the councillor, who is the co-founder of Loop Head Tourism and a pub owner in the town.

He feels jumping from cliffs, to the sea bed, which can be racked with dangerous rocks underneath the water, is a new phenomenon with children previously going to designated spots to dive in the area.

"The reality is, one slip and they are dead or in a wheelchair for the rest of their lives or in a coma the rest of their lives. The rescue services would have to climb down and pick a body out of a water, putting their lives at risk too."

Cllr Murphy said that

younger children might copycat what older teens are doing on the cliff head, with their bodies not as able to cope with any damage caused.

"What do we do if we get a 11 or 12-year-old starting to do it and their bodies aren't able to cope with that stress. Look, it's just not a good thing," he added.

The message needs go out that jumping from the cliffs is an "uncool" thing to do, he said, "So kids look at it, and think: it's fine, I don't need to do

that." Cllr Murphy said leaping from such a height is "just human nature" for some people. "Some people

would drive a motorbike at 50 miles an

hour, and there can be another who would drive it at 150 miles per hour. There are people who enjoy the thrill, get the adrenaline rush. It's one of the problems here," he added.

Charlie Glynn, from the Kilrush lifeboat station, said the water is not particularly accessible if a rescue is needed.

He said the behaviour seen on video was "particularly dangerous", adding: "If you're jumping in straight after someone, the water and area beneath you can change so quickly so it's extremely dangerous. In Kilkee you are at the mercy of the Atlantic swell." There are designated diving spaces elsewhere in Kilkee.

Shop windows smashed by teen

Guilty: 17-year-old admits criminal damage

A TEENAGER has pleaded guilty to criminal damage charges relating to a crime rampage in the city centre earlier this year.

the city centre earlier this year. The 17-year-old, who cannot be named because of his age, has pleaded guilty to multiple charges relating to offences which took place on February 1.

Thousands of euro worth of damage was caused when several large shop windows at Cruises Street were damaged when they were struck and kicked.

The criminal damage charges before the court relate to three stores – Eason, Three and River Island

The defendant, who was 16 at

the time, has also pleaded to a number of charges relating to the theft of a number of different cars.

Those offences all occurred in Castletroy area of the city on dates in February.

While the defendant initially appeared before the Children's Court after he was charged, the Director of Public Prosecutions subsequently directed that the matter should proceed on indictment before the circuit court.

A book of evidence was completed and served on the defendant in recent days and he appeared before Limerick Circuit Court prior to the summer vacation.

After John O'Sullivan BL, prosecuting, confirmed the guilty pleas were acceptable to the State, barrister Liam Carroll pointed out that a probation report must be prepared before his client can be sentenced.

Judge Tom O'Donnell noted this and he formally requested that such a report be prepared.

Because of the defendant's age, the matter was adjourned to a vacation sitting of Limerick Circuit Court later this month.

In July there was a smaller Retro Cannonball event which brought classic cars to the stunning driving routes around Limerick, but now the super cars are ready to make an entrance once again. Thousands will line the roads from home and abroad to see the spectacle and enjoy this free family event in aid of the Irish Cancer Society.

Drugs and cash seized in raids

THREE woman and a man who were arrested following a significant drugs and cash seizure have been released without charge. Quantities of heroin,

Quantities of heroin, cocaine, cannabis and prescription tablets were seized during a number of searches last Friday which were carried out as part an ongoing operation targeting criminality in the Saint Mary's Park area.

A significant sum of cash and high-value jewellery were also recovered during the searches which involved members of the divisional drugs unit and the Criminal Assets Bureau (CAB).

A 23-year-old man and two women, aged 27 and 44, were arrested at the scene while a third woman – aged in her 20s – was arrested during a follow-up operation.

All four have since been released without charge and a file is to be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions.

In a public notice, the local authority says the works involve the upgrading of traffic signal apparatus and that delays can be expected – especially at peak times.

Footage of assault victim posted online

Facebook: Video of injured man was uploaded fo social media by culprit

A MAN who posted footage of another man on social media minutes after he attacked him at a laneway in the city centre has been jailed for two years.

Imposing sentence, Judge Tom O'Donnell said the recording and posting of the footage of the injured man on Facebook was an "alarming" aspect to the case.

Rafael Golek, 27, who has an address at Carrig Midhe, Corbally had pleaded guilty to assaulting the 66-year-old causing him harm on May 12, 2018.

During a sentencing hearing, Detective Garda Colum O'Shea said gardai only became aware of the assault after they were contacted by medical personnel at University Hospital Limerick.

The victim, he said, sustained a number of facial fractures as well as a swollen eye in the attack which happened at Ersons Lane, between Catherine Street and Anne Street in the early evening

The detective said the victim, a Polish national, had been approached by Mr Golek and another man from behind and that he was kicked and punched several times.

The victim told gardai he recognised Mr Golek and that after he was knocked to the ground both assailants began to insult him in Polish while recording the exchange

on a phone.

"It's part of the modern-day world, it was a very calculated decision – he wanted to share his suffering on Facebook," commented Judge O'Donnell.

Barrister David McHugh said his client had been approached by a woman earlier in the day and that she "poisoned his mind" towards the victim. He said based on information given to him, he sought out the victim and attacked him. "It was out of a mistaken sense of loyalty to his friend," he said adding he did not know if the information was true or false.

John O'Sullivan BL, prosecuting, said Mr Golek is facing extradition back to Poland when released from prison as he fled the country in 2012 midway through a prison sentence which he was serving at the time.

Imposing sentence, Judge O'Donnell said what happened was very nasty. "It was a gratuitous assault in broad daylight," he said adding the level of violence used and the injuries sustained were aggravating factors.

He imposed a two year prison sentence which he backdated to August 12, 2018.

Garda patrol car 'rammed' during high-speed pursuit

A MAN has admitted deliberately ramming a garda patrol car during a high-speed pursuit in the city last year, writes David Hurley.

When arraigned at Limerick Circuit Court, Jimmy Harty, 43, of Sycamore Drive, Newbridge, County Kildare, pleaded guilty to a number of charges relating to an incident which happened in the early hours of November 16, 2018.

The charges on the indictment include endangerment, criminal damage and dangerous driving.

damage and dangerous driving. After his client formally pleaded guilty, Mark Nicholas SC requested that a psychological assessment be carried out saying such a report "would not go astray" and would be of benefit to the court.

Previously, Limerick District Court was told it is the State case that while on patrol at Childers Road at around 2.30am, gardai encountered a high-powered Audi A3 car which was

being driven by Mr Harty.

Detective Garda Dean Landers said the defendant increased his speed when he saw gardai and that he attempted to avoid them resulting in a high speed pursuit taking place.

During the pursuit, the Audi A3

entered the car park of Our Lady of Lourdes church where the defendant reversed at the patrol car having first come to a complete stop.

During a bail application, the detective said two of his colleagues, who were armed, were approaching the car on foot when he reversed.

"He reversed at speed narrowly avoiding my colleagues. He hit the (patrol) car," he said adding it will be further alleged Mr Harty then fled from the car park by driving over a grassed area.

The pursuit continued along Rosbrien Road, through Punch's Cross and onto Courtbrack Avenue where the Audi came to a stop after it struck a roundabout and collided with an electricity pole.

Mr Harty, who was previously refused bail in the district court, has been remanded in continuing custody pending a sentencing hearing in December.

Bogus tradesman targets woman aged in her 80s

AN ELDERLY woman was duped out of €50 in cash by a bogus caller who approached her and offered to do some work in her garden.



According to gardai, the

incident happened at a house in Prospect this day last week (Wednesday).

"At around lunchtime, a male called to the house and a lady in her 80s answered the door. He offered to do some work in her garden, the lady agreed to this and he asked for €50 in payment. Unfortunately, the lady handed over the money before the work was done and the male ran off,"

said Sergeant Ber Leetch. 'When it comes to bogus callers the first rule is not to open your door unless you know the person who is outside. Then you won't have

to engage with a person who may be trying to take advantage of you. Never agree to let a random caller do work for you. Always use workers that have come recommended," she added.

Gardai issue warning as garden sheds are targeted

GARDAI are warning that a number of sheds and containers storing tools and gardening equipment have been broken into recently.

"Sometimes they were easy to get access to because the lock and bolt on the door wasn't of a good standard. When you're buying a new lock and bolt consider the value of the property that you're protecting and then pay approximately 10% of that value on a good quality locking device," said crime prevention officer Sergeant Ber Leetch who warned that opportunist thieves are always on the lookout for an open window or door.

Appeal to young men to use their brains not fists

GARDAI are urging people to be careful when out socialising at night.

The appeal follows a number of separate assaults in the city centre during which a number of young men sustained serious injuries.

Crime Prevention Office Sergeant Ber Leetch says gardai recently launched a 'Use your brains not your fist' campaign to tackle these type of assaults.

"The campaign informs the public generally about the consequences of assaulting another person - these are they



could lose their job, lose their ability to travel and even go to jail. It also reminds people of the potentially devastating physical and mental impact of assaults on a victim," she said.

Gardai say you should never attempt to reason with drunk or aggressive people and that you should walk away and look for help.

Charity:Culprit has raised money for good causes in jail

A RECOVERING drug addict who threatened a teenager after grabbing him by the throat has been jailed for three years.

Michael McCarthy, 30, of Kilmurray View Halting Site, Castletroy, had pleaded guilty to robbery relating to an incident in Castletroy in the early hours of October 2, last.

Garda John Sheahan told Limerick Circuit Court the 18-year-old victim was crossing the road near the Kilmurray Roundabout at around 4.15am when a car "suddenly stopped and pulled up" nearby.

The driver – Mr McCarthy – got out of the vehicle and ran towards him before grabbing him by the throat. A blonde woman who was also in the car threatened the teen who was fearful he would be assaulted.

While Mr McCarthy, who has more than 100 previous convictions, made "some admissions" following his arrest, he denied using any force towards the victim.

He was also disqualified from driving for ten years at the time.

Brian McInerney BL said his client was very intoxicated on the night and that the incident was spontaneous rather than pre-planned.

"Ît was not executed with any great degree of efficiency," he said, adding Mr McCarthy's memory of what happened is "patchy".

The barrister said his client is doing well in prison and has completed a number of

charity events while in custody. Imposing sentence, Judge O'Donnell said he was very impressed that he is making "very good use of his time" in prison and that he is now drug-free.

However, he said the way in which the victim was targeted was an aggravating factor as was his previous record.

"Opportunistic robbery of this nature are all too prevalent in society – people are entitled to be protected," he said.

He imposed a four-year prison sentence, suspending the final 12 months.

Mr McCarthy must engage with the Probation Service for 12 months following his release from prison.

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



Anger at overgrown home on southside

Community: Neighbour claims house left to ruin

NICK RABBITTS

A KENNEDY Park man is furious with the local authority, who he claims have let a house go to "rack and ruin" since purchasing it two years ago.

Number 15 Larch Court in the southside estate has become derelict since the sad death of its former occupant in 2017.

Tom Dillon, who has been living next door for two years, claims the council bought the property, but have not done anything with it.

"It's been left idle despite numerous emails to them. At the moment, it's overgrown. There are three-foot high weeds front and back.

There is a rear extension and a kitchen extension at the back. You can't even see the landing windows. It's constantly overflowing. The overflow pipe is constantly bursting which is causing the internal ceiling to collapse. The last time I heard, the council sent out assessors. They said because the ceiling had collapsed they are going to take down the whole back kitchen," Mr Dillon said.

No work was required when the previous owner left the home, Mr Dillon said.

"All you had to do is open up the $front\,door\,and\,hang\,up\,your\,coat.\,The$ who was in it kept it ladv immaculate," he told The Leader.

And, he claims the home has attracted mice.

"We haven't had any in the house, but we're afraid to open the downstairs and upstairs windows. The neighbour the other side has spotted mice running around. It's just a bloody eyesore," he added.

With tens of thousands on the housing waiting list, homeowner Mr Dillon says it is "ridiculous" that one unit is being left alone like this.

"It makes no sense, I feelvery angry. It's a shame to see it go down. Especially with the way the lady kept it. She was meticulous with the house, absolutely meticulous," he added.

The Leader has contacted City and County Council for comment but there was no reply at time of going to press.

Pipe bomb discovered inside wheelie bin

Custody: Suspect refuse bail following garda objection

A MAN who is charged in connection with the discovery of a pipe bomb at a house in the city earlier this year has been refused bail.

Anthony McNamara, 34, of Ballygrennan Close, Moyross faces a single charge, under the provisions of the Explosive Substances Act, in relation to the discovery of the

device on February 14, last. It is alleged the improvised device, which was subsequently found to be viable, was discovered in a wheelie bin outside the defendant's home at around 9.30am.

Opposing a bail application, Detective Garda Declan O'Halloran said the device, which was made safe

by a Defence Forces EOD team, consisted of a metal pipe which was sealed at each end and which had been filled with ballbearings and components from fireworks.

A number of homes in the Moyross area were evacuated as a precaution following the discovery of the pipe bomb in February.

During the bail application, Detective Garda O'Halloran told John O'Sullivan BL, prosecuting, it is a serious case and that he believes there is a strong case against the defendant.

He also expressed concerns that Mr McNamara would not comply with conditions if released on bail.

Earlier this year, the Director of Public Prosecutions directed that the matter should proceed on

indictment and the case came before Limerick Circuit Court before the summer vacation after a book of evidence was completed and served on Mr McNamara.

Eimear Carey, Barrister by solicitor John instructed Herbert, said her client was anxious to secure bail and that he was willing to abide by any conditions imposed by the court if released.

Having considered the garda objection and noting the provisions which are set out in the Bail Act, Judge Tom O'Donnell said he was refusing bail as he had some concerns.

The defendant was remanded in custody pending his appearance before the court again later in the year.

Stats show 262 are homeless in Limerick

The latest figures have shown that 262 people are currently homeless in Limerick. Figures for June 2019 show that there is still much work to be done in combating Ireland's homelessness crisis. current

of

The figure homeless people in Ireland is 10,172 people, which is a drop from 10.253 in June 2018 Seventy

five families in the Mid-West Region are currently without a home.

A total of 953 children in 437 families are currently homeless nationwide.

Focus Ireland said that any monthly drop in the numbers is "good news as it means less families, children and individuals are suffering the trauma of being homeless.'

However, the overall trend is up as there has been a 28% rise in the number homeless in the last two years from 7,941 in June 2017 to 10,172 last month.

"Policies such as rapid rehousing, Homeless HAP, linkages to local communities and the availability of child support workers have all worked well in Dublin," said Mike Allen, Director of Advocacy at Focus Ireland.

"Reviewing these policies and applying them outside the Dublin area will not only help hundreds of families it will avoid wasteful use of resources'

"Focus Ireland firmly believes that this balanced approach would allow the Government to take the decisions it has shied away from for several years. This includes actively building social housing, taxing those who hoard building land and better protecting the

rights of tenants facing

eviction.

"We also need the Government to set а cast-iron deadline that no family or individuals should be homeless for longer than six months and to put a

specific family homelessness strategy in place to deal more effectively with this deepening crisis."

With the Dail set to come back after it's summer recess winter and rapidly approaching, Allen has implored those in political office to act and be more proactive in combating the ever-evolving crisis.

"We must always remember that although homelessness is a problem that can be solved, it is wrecking and damaging the lives of over 10,000 people in our country."

"There is real danger that human stories get lost behind the numbers – in particular during the summer months when the politicians are on holidays and people are enjoying the good weather."

However, there is no holiday or break from the almost constant stress for the over 10,000 people who are homeless."

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

Counting beans -what's in your cup

UL: Studies zero in on the perfect cup of coffee

RYAN O'ROURKE

ALFRED Renyi once said, "a mathematician is a device for turning coffee into theorems", but for the mathematicians at the University of Limerick, the goal is to turn theorems into coffee, the perfect cup of coffee to be exact.

Billions of people around the world start every day with a cup of the black stuff, but few would ever take the time to think about the science behind the drink.

However, for a team of researchers at UL this is exactly what they have done, showing that mathematical models could help to brew the perfect cup of coffee.

Dr Kevin Moroney and Dr Ken O'Connell of UL's Bernal institute have just published research in a prominent international journal that looks at the maths behind brewing coffee.

Dr Moroney, the lead-author on the paper says that baristas and manufacturers should use the "modelling to target and ensure that you can, as much as possible, repeatedly get the quality coffee that you are looking for"

'When people are measuring the quality of coffee brews they measure two things - the strength of the coffee, and that is just the amount of soluble material in the drink - and then they measure the amount of material that has been extracted from the dry coffee.



Mathematical models could help to brew the perfect cup of coffee

A mathematician is a device for turning coffee into theorems ALFRÉD RÉNY.

"The problem with how they measure it is that it is just an average measurement - when they estimate the extraction level, they assume it is uniform across the whole coffee bed. So with this paper, what we are looking at is we were modelling the flow within the coffee bed to try and capture non-uniform extraction.

The end goal of the research is to create a mathematical set of equations to predict the quality of brewed coffee, based on the properties of coffee grounds, water used and brewing settings, Dr Moroney says.

This would, in turn, allow coffee manufacturers to develop machines that brew that elusive perfect cup of coffee.

Compound interest can make you a millionaire

ost people understand the concept of compound interest. At a basic level, it's where you get interest on your interest.

However, I would suggest the majority don't appreciate how powerful it is and are not taking advantage of something that doesn't discriminate and is available to everyone.

Warren Buffet knows all about CI and attributes his wealth to lucky genes and compound interest.

Others like him liken CI to making money in their sleep. They believe that they're waking up wealthier than they when they went to bed and it's all down to compound interest

And you don't have to earn big money for it to make an impact. That's just a myth. Believe me when I say, CI has the ability to turn people earning average incomes into millionaires.

CI can turn a modest amount into a massive one. When you add patience, perseverance, time and compound interest together, the result catapults your finances to another level.

Let me show you how this works in practice. If you saved €1,500 per month for 22 years, and your account earned an average annual return of 8%, in 22 years' time you'd have €1,000,000 sitting in your account.

What percentage of that amount would have been interest? That is, interest earned over and above the amount you put in? 63%. Incredible isn't it?

Your contribution was €396,000 and the interest earned was €686,350.

I appreciate saving €1,500 per month is a big ask for most people, but what if I told you if you saved €300 per month for nine years and then stopped and never contributed another cent, you'd end up with a fund amounting to €1,863,287.

CI has the ability to turn a total contribution of $\notin 28,800$ into $\notin 1.8m$, but the caveat is starting early and getting an annual return of 7%.

If, at age 19, you started saving ϵ 300 each month, stopped when you were 27, at 65 you'd have ϵ 1,863,287 sitting in your account. That's a return of 6,370%.

The lessons learned here are the importance of saving early and letting compound interest do the rest for you because it will add more to your account than you're ever likely to. In this instance, when that 19-year-old reaches 53, there will be c. ϵ 60,000 being added to their account every year in interest, and by the time they reach 60, ϵ 100,000 in interest will be added, all without them contributing a single cent of their own money.

Of course, what goes hand in hand with CI is risk. You're not going to see the impact of CI if your savings are earning 1% per year, which is about all you'll earn for money on deposit with banks at the moment.

For CI to take hold, you need to be earning 7% or 8% and you're not going to achieve that unless you introduce some element of risk to your savings.

When people think of risk, they instinctively think of losing money, which turns them off. But unless you take some, and the level of risk doesn't have to be great either, you are fighting a tough battle. It's like running a marathon with army boots on carrying a backpack full of rocks.

And there are so many accounts

Did you know, c. 40,000 homes in Ireland are still in negative equity. available that cater for everyone's risk profile. One client of mine was extremely risk adverse and wanted zero risk with any of her savings.

But when I pointed out to her that by leaving her money on deposit in a bank, she was actually losing money because when you factored in the interest rate she was earning, applied DIRT tax and accounted for inflation, she was earning

a negative amount and wasn't protecting her savings at all. When we looked at the opportunity lost by not investing in other accounts, and seeing what CI could do for her, it was that aha moment for her to do something about it.

She has introduced a small element of risk to her savings, an amount she is very comfortable with, and since she did, she hasn't looked back. She sleeps soundly knowing her savings now earn about 12 times more than they did.

You need to look beyond the short term and get comfortable with taking on a level of risk you are happy with, and when you do and let compounding get to work, the rewards you'll reap in the future are great. Compound interest won't make you a millionaire overnight. It can take years, even decades of hard work, sacrifice and patience before you see progress but if you have time on your side, what do you care?

I met one man recently who has a very comfortable standard of living and he knows the decisions he made when he was much younger i.e. saving and understanding CI, led directly to the situation he finds himself in today.

Stick with it and the hard work and consistency will pay off, he told me. That's great advice.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: The site where I am working is to close in 2020. At that stage I will be due roughly five years of the redundancy package, but I was made redundant previously in 2014 and want to know the implications of that. Will I get taxed highly on this as I was previously made redundant?

A: There are three exceptions used when calculating the amount of tax you are liable to pay, all of which reduce the rate of tax on an ex-gratia lump sum redundancy.

The first is a basic exemption which is €765 for every year of completed service plus €10,160. The second is an

additional €10,000 on top of the basic exemption amount, but this is based on you not having made any other claim in respect of a lump sum in the previous 10 tax years which rules you out.

The third is the Standard Capital Superannuation Benefit (SCSB) and can be used if it gives an amount greater than either basic or increased exemption. The formula for SCSB is arrived at taking your average annual earnings over the previous three years and multiplying it by the number of years' service and dividing by 15. So, your tax would be

calculated on either the Basic Exemption or the SCSB – whichever is higher.



Mungret St Paul's development vision

In 2017 MungretSt Paul's GAA Club purchased 16 acres of land adjacent to the club from Limerick City and County Council. Our goal was to meet the increasing training, playing and social needs of our club and community. After extensive consultation with our membership a plan was drawn up which we believed would meet our future needs. Our master plan consists of developing two new senior pitches; expanding our existing sand-based training area; an artificial training surface; expanding parking facilities; building a new clubhouse with dressing rooms, meeting rooms, shop, sports hall and bar and function room. Questions as landmark shop does not open



NICK RABBITTS

A LANDMARK northside shop did not open for business this Tuesday, prompting concern among members of the public.

'Closed until further notice' signs were erected at Ivan's store and delicatessen at the Caherdavin Cross on the Ennis Road, prompting more questions than answers.

While its future is uncertain, some locals are hoping the closure is being facilitated to allow renovations take place.

Attempts by Leader Business to contact the company were unsuccessful, so exactly what is happening with the shop is uncertain.

The popular store and bakery, formerly owned by the late Ivan Cremins, only re-opened in 2015 after it was closed at the start of the previous year.

Now housing a restaurant as well as the bakery producing the kind of cakes the business is famous for, many people in Caherdavin were left hoping it is just a temporary closure, not least for the 30 or so staff who work there.

Caherdavin-based Fine Gael councillor Olivia O'Sullivan said: "When Ivan's closed the last time, there was an outcry. It's an institution here. It's part of the community."

Meanwhile, northside activist and Fianna Fail local election candidate Pat O'Neill added: "It's a landmark. From the community's perspective, Ivan's has

been there for years. It has served the community well. It's synonymous with Caherdavin really. That cross is Caherdavin Cross, but it really became known as Ivan's Cross. That will tell you how the name became so linked with the area."

Green Party councillor Brian Leddin said: "It's a landmark establishment, only re-opened a few years ago which was positive. So we just hope that

everything is OK, and the closure is temporary." morning PICTURES: ADRIAN

Ivan's closed after 38 years trading on the northside in January 2014. But it re-opened under new management the following year after a €200,000 fit-out as a bakery, deli and cafe.

Previous owner Mr Cremin's son Christian is employed in the business, the lease for which was taken up by DK Walshe Restaurants.

Have your say on next food strategy

SENATOR Kieran O'Donnell has called on the people of Limerick to have their say on Ireland's next agri-food strategy. A consultation on Food Wise is

under way. The current strategy is in place up to 2025, with preparations already beginning on the new blueprint going to 2030.

Mr O'Donnell said input from farmers, food producers plus small to medium sized enterprises including retailers and restaurenteurs are important.

"The Food Wise 2025 progress report shows that Irish agri-food exports have increased by 73% since 2009. This is phenomenal growth in what has been a difficult decade for Ireland since the economic crash. Agri-food has been the backbone of Ireland's recovery, and farmers and food producers in Limerick have played their part in that," he explained.

added: "While Food Wise has been instrumental in providing a framework for the sustainable growth of the sector, like all strategic plans, it must evolve and respond to rapidly changing

There are also new and emerging opportunities for the sector, for example, in the bio-economy. While we are embarking on this policy process against a background of considerable change and uncertainty, for example in relation to Brexit and CAP reform, that uncertainty makes it more important than ever that we come together to agree a coherent plan for the sector to 2030."

Don't get a chance to really.




I always like to compare a treatment plan to somebody going to the gym.... to see any benefits it's not enough that you go just once.



Dress to impress: Tailor your suit

VEN though I've been out of the "rag trade" for nearly 18 months now, I'm still contacted by friends and social media followers regularly who are looking for fashion tips/style advice or in some cases, wanting to make a personal shopper appointment. The topic of most interest or concern always seems to be suiting.

Most guys would freely admit that they have no idea how to discern a proper fit or how to work with a tailor to ensure a perfect fit. It shouldn't come as a surprise until I starting selling suits for a living I really hadn't much of a clue about these things myself. Few young men ever have the need for a suit before they leave college, and even then, their suits are likely to be €150 student race day specials, with "tailoring" meaning hemming the trousers. Really, the truth is you don't know how much you don't know until you know. Šo, to all those friends and followers who want to know what they're doing when it comes to getting suiting right, here are the tailoring basics you need to know.

The first piece of advice I give everyone is to shop in actual men's suiting store. You'd think this would be obvious, but apparently, it's not. While the cheap and cheerful shiny blue three-piece will get the job done when you're a broke student, once you graduate and start $a dulting, the \, perception \, of \, your$ suiting game will change very dramatically. Cheap suits are very easy to spot. Elements such as frayed buttonholes, poor stitching, plastic buttons, polyester lining and glued interlining will very quickly reveal the fact that you purchased your suit in the same store that you picked up your skin tight neon pink tank top and ripped skinny jeans. The person $interviewing \,you \, for \, your \, grown-up$ job will see this. So will the people who invited you to the full wedding and paid for a place for you there. Having a 'zero f**ks given' attitude doesn't play as well once you leave college, trust me on this one.

In order to find quality men's suits, blazers and trousers, you need to start in a quality men's clothing store. Work with people who know men's fashion and are educated on how a suit should fit. A good suit salesman should care more about getting the look and fit perfect, than making you part with your hard-earned cash. Professionalism and attention to

detail lead to happy customers and repeat business. These are the qualities that define a good menswear store.

Fitting & Adjusting Your Suit

The first step in fitting a suit is trying on the jacket and trousers, ideally over a formal shirt (the one you wear to work - not a going out shirt or a polo/tee) and while wearing a pair of dress shoes. If you're heading to a menswear store to buy a suit, it's good to wear appropriate clothing that will ensure you end up with a perfect fit. If a dress shirt and shoes aren't accessible to you then the store will most likely be able to provide them for the purpose of the fitting (while hoping you'll also buy the shirt and shoes). It does help to bring the shoes you'll be wearing with the suit so that the pants can be adjusted to the precise length that's appropriate.

Off the rack, suits are measured by the wearer's chest and come in three different dimensions: short, regular and long. It's important to understand your basic measurement so that you have a starting point that will require the least amount of tailoring around your frame. If you don't already know this measurement then ask the salesperson to measure your chest and then try on the jacket that best matches this measurement as well as one size up and one size down to ensure you're starting with the right fit.

What To Look For THE JACKET

Your first impression will tell a lot when you try on a suit jacket. Is it pulling as you try to button it, indicating it's too small, or are you swimming in loose fabric? There are limits to how much a suit can be tailored to either let out or take in fabric along the seams, so try to get the jacket as close to the right size as possible. If your size isn't in stock then ask them to order it in. Don't settle for the wrong size because you like the colour/pattern/brand etc.

SHOULDERS

The edge of the padding in the shoulders of the jacket should not extend beyond your actual shoulders. If it does, then the jacket is too big.

CHE

You shouldn't feel any restriction of movement across your chest or back or any pulling from armpit to armpit. If you do then the jacket is too small and you need to go a size up. The chest section of the jacket should rest flat across your chest. If there are any balloons of fabric or bulges then the

jacket is either too large or needs to be adjusted.

NECK

The mirrors in the fitting room will need to assist you here. Look at how the fabric lies from the base of your neck down to your shoulder blades. There shouldn't be any rolls or bulges of fabric along the base of your neck. If there is, it needs to be tailored.

WAIST

Many off the rack suit jackets will not be tapered around the waist, so if this is something you want then it'll need to be adjusted by a tailor.

SLEEVES

The sleeves should break at the wrist and allow for a little bit of shirt cuff to show. As you get used to suit shopping, you'll become more familiar with your own tailoring specifics and find it easier to judge what needs to be adjusted. My personal preference is for the jacket to break above the wrist so that you can see my watch and or cufflinks.

The Trousers

The rise of a trouser is the distance between the waistband and the crotch. Different men are proportioned differently, so some will require a low rise and some will need high-waisted trousers. If you usually wear low-rise trousers and the trousers you're trying on are sitting above the navel, you're got problems. There's very little a tailor can do to adjust the rise, so if it's not right, it's probably best to pick a different suit.

WAIST

The waistband should fir comfortably but not tightly. If it's too tight, it will pull and stretch the fabric below it and look sloppy and ill-fitting.

SEAT

The seat should follow the contours of your own bum. You shouldn't get a wedgie nor should you look like your wearing an adult diaper. If it droops, get it taken in. If it's too tight, have it let out.

LENGTH

There are two things to consider when determining how to hem your trousers – length and cuff. Regarding length, my personal preference is for the trousers to break on the top of my shoes because I like to wear funky socks – but others prefer a full break or no break at all. It's a personal preference but please make sure that there's no bunching of fabric over the shoes. Regarding cuffs, if the trousers are pleated, then cuff them, if the trousers have a flat front, then don't.

Putting on a good suit is transformative. Your shoulders are broadened, your lines look longer and leaner and your waist looks trimmer. The key to all this getting the right suit and having it properly tailored. Some menswear stores will have their own in house tailor and will charge you for the extra work. Some will note the adjustments and send your newly acquired clothing out to a tailor for

you. In truth, if you really want to get the tailoring perfect then you should really take the bull by the horns and go to a tailor yourself. I have all my tailoring and alterations done by The Zipyard because they're excellent and because I know that the person taking the measurements will be looking after the alternations and not trying to work off someone else's pinning. The New 'all grown up' Mercedes-Benz A-Class Saloon, the entry level car in the brand's range, went on sale here in April and is rapidly establishing itself as a go-to premium car. Its launch is part of an 11-model introduction by the premium car-maker for 2019.

The model is available as a five-door hatch or as a saloon with a decent boot.

New Generation Compact Cars (NGCCs) like this account for 30pc of Mercedes-Benz overall sales, or almost one in three in Ireland. They have opened up Mercedes-Benz to an ever increasing younger customer base, attracting a body of owners some 13 years younger, on average, than those of earlier A-Class models. Female buyers now account for 58pc of A-Class sales.

This year, Mercedes-Benz sold more A-Class cars from January to April (400 units) than it did in any full year sales in the last 10 years.

This is really good looking car, viewed from every angle.

Numerous body changes give it a larger and a more energetic look, particularly evident in its more sloping bonnet and lower, more angular headlights. Better visibility, easier rear seat access, and a 29-litres larger luggage compartment (420 litres) are some of the design improvements, along with a more spacious interior boasting more front and rear headroom, shoulder room and elbowroom.

Interior styling in new Mercedes cars is now top notch.

Seats were really comfy and supported us well and looked very stylish in Artico leather/Dinamica microfibre upholstery with sporty red stitching. However, my tall front passenger felt his legroom was compromised somewhat by the straight across design of the bottom line of the dash.

That aside, the dash, as in the hatchback version, is a work of art. A new screen and control-and-display system stretches across half the dash and appears to 'float' in a visually threedimensional way. It's a very striking looking, and certainly appeals to the younger tech-savvy generation. All the info you need is contained in both screens encased in piano black shiny trim which can reflect your fingers when driving.

A huge plus, though, is the MBUX system. Using touch screen, touch pad and touch button technology, this system brings intelligent voice control, natural speech recognition and augmented reality features that assist the driver in many ways.

You say 'Hey Mercedes' and 'she' will ask you what you require - from 'turn up the heat' to playing your favourite music, or locating the nearest restaurant or petrol station. I found that, on the whole, it works very well if your demands are clear and concise. No fudging.

Trims are Style, Progressive and AMG; prices are from €31,400 to €38,500.

A first compact Crossover from Audi will arrive here in October in the form of a coupe-type version of the Q3, called the Q3 Sportback, writes Trish Whelan.

Limerick colleagues collide as club hurling hots up

GAA: County SHC returns after the four month inter-county break

INTER-COUNTY friends become club foes as the Limerick club hurling championship resumes this weekend after a four month break.

There are six games down for decision in the Bon Secours Hospital Limerick SHC with the headline fixture the clash of back-to-back champions Na Piarsaigh and recent winners Kilmallock – a repeat of the 2017 county final.

The sides have won eight of the last nine Daly Cup titles and meet on Thursday evening in the LIT Gaelic Grounds.

Now managed by former Tipperary hurling manager Michael Ryan, Na Piarsaigh will be able to call upon seven members of John Kiely's inter-county panel; Mike and Peter Casey, William O'Donoghue, Shane Dowling, Conor Boylan, David Dempsey and Kevin Downes. They also have three hurlers on Billy Lee's inter-county football panel this Summer; Ronan Lynch, Kieran Daly and Gordan Brown.

The Caherdavin men won one and lost one of their opening round games in April when they weren't able to call upon the services of Brown, Adrian Breen and Jerome Boylan among others.

Kilmallock, managed by former Limerick football manager John Brudair and coached by Fitzgibbon Cup winning manager Jamie Wall, were champions last in 2014. They had five on the county panel this Summer with Graeme Mulchay their leading light.

While the Thursday fixture may capture the imagination of the public the most important fixture could be Saturday's tie between Adare and Doon in Kilmallock.

2018 finalists Doon will be without injured county star Barry Murphy for the remainder of the championship but will be able to call upon Darragh O'Donovan, Richie English and Pat Ryan. This trio and others are also part of the Oola team that has won four games out of four in the Limerick SFC.

Saturday's opponents Adare are like Oola - unbeaten in the Limerick SFC. The Adare hurlers will be able to call upon Limerick captain Declan Hannon - their only inter-county panelist.

With most tipping Na Piarsaigh, Kilmallock and Patrickswell to fill three of the four places in the knockout stages, this Adare-Doon game could go a long way towards determining who else advances beyond the group phase.

The Ciaran Carey managed Patrickswell have the only 100% record in the championship and with Aaron Gillane, Cian Lynch and Diarmaid Byrnes in their ranks will be favoured to remain unbeaten against Barry Nash and his Liberties' colleagues.

In Group Two, all three teams have points on the board after the games back in April.

On Saturday, in Cappamore it's the Dan and Tom Morrissey led Ahane against Garryspillane.

On Sunday, table-toppers Monaleen play Knockainey in Claughaun and in Bruff, Murroe-Boher clash with Ballybrown.

'Sky is the limit' for Limerick Camogie

"I think the sky is the limit for them" said manager Declan Nash after Limerick played in the knockout stages of the All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship for the first time in 14 years.

I think our championship performances have been quite steady bar against a phenomenal Kilkenny outfit when they had six forwards on fire and today when our second half performance was a little flat," said the manager.

"I have been saying for the last few weeks that the more you are exposed to this environment and to that intensity, the more you are exposed to that level of pressure and to that level of cuteness from Tipperary, the more your adapt. These girls adapt on their feet, Tuesday, Thursday, Sunday week-in, week-out and have adapted massively this year and they is plenty more in this bunch," said Nash.

Nash spoke with media after addressing his panel of players in the Semple Stadium dressing room.

"I am hugely proud of the girls - that first half performance was probably the best that I have seen from this group of girls but it's just unfortunate that we weren't able to match it in the second half. It's probably one of the worst places in the world on a day like today with the result the way it has gone," he said of the losing dressing room.

"We just didn't get out of the blocks at all in the second half - one score in almost the complete second half tells its own story," he sighed.

Naming rights issue remains a thorny one

S a new rugby season comes more into focus with Munster's club and provincial sides all back in pre-season training for some time, the issue of the province potentially selling the naming rights to Thomond Park has raised its head once more.

There appears to be three different schools of thinking on the issue right now, one group vehemently opposed to the idea of selling the naming rights to the iconic venue, another in favour, pointing out to the financial benefits that any deal would have for a province which could do with the revenue, and a third camp which is undecided on the matter, appreciating where both of the other two schools of thought are coming from.

Speaking prior to the IRFU's AGM last month, union CEO Philip Browne indicated that Munster Rugby is still exploring the possibility of selling the naming rights for Thomond Park.

Browne admitted that it's much easier to sell naming rights for a new stadium than it is for a stadium that's already there. When the Limerick Leader spoke to industry sources on the matter some time back, they estimated that Munster could have made €750,000 per annum from any naming rights deal for Thomond Park at the height of the economic boom.

However, the estimated asking price is now said to be closer to €350,000 per annum as a result of the economic downturn.

Given that Limerick and the Munster region has seen something of an upturn in economic fortunes in more recent times, the asking price today for any potential company interested in acquiring the naming rights to the stadium could perhaps be closer to €500,000 per annum.

Munster could go the route of looking to sell the naming rights to the East or West Stands at the venue which would bring in some much-needed cash.

Munster did announce the sale of the naming rights to Musgrave Park, now Irish Independent Park, on a 10-year basis in 2014.

The ground at Ballyphehane was purchased by the Munster Branch of the IRFU in 1938 and opened two



Thomond Park Stadium which was redeveloped in 2008. Munster Rugby continues to look at the possibility of selling the naming rights to the venue. However, a section of Munster supporters is strongly opposed to the idea

years later. It has been home to the Dolphin and Sundays Well clubs since then.

The venue, aside from hosting hundreds of major representative, club and schools games, has staged some of Munster's most memorable fixtures, including a 3-3 draw with the All Blacks. Munster defeated Australia there three times. Just like Thomond Park, the Cork venue has a proud history.

Thomond Park is synonymous with Limerick and is a venue renowned all over the rugby world. Those who grew up in the show of the stadium and those who attended fixtures at the venue down through the decades hold a great fondness for it. The stadium means a lot to them.

Would retaining the name 'Thomond Park' in the title should the naming rights be sold at some stage in the future appease these supporters, eg the 'Joe Bloggs Thomond Park Stadium'? It may appease some, but certainly not all of them. On the flip side, the revenue from any deal would be welcomed by the province.

At their June AGM, Munster Rugby revealed that the province is on course to break even next year after announcing that the province expects to maintain its cash-flow deficit under €1million for the year ending June 30, 2019.

Despite having employed a consultant to explore selling the naming rights in 2016, Munster Rugby has not yet found naming rights partners.

It's more than 10 years now since the redeveloped stadium opened in November 2008. The sale of the naming rights still appears some way off

way off. Munster supporters will continue to watch any developments very closely.

Let's be honest, by challenging every decision, surely it lessens the chances of the referee actually accepting he was wrong if an error is made at some point. And, by focusing

so much on the referee, management surely can't be giving the necessary attention to what is most important – their team and

nd nOg.

indeed the opposition.

Of course an incorrect call from a referee is frustrating and can unfortunately have an impact on a game and indeed a season.

But what of the incorrect decisions by a player or member of management – we all make errors and taking ownership of those errors could be a good starting point rather than spending 60-minutes venting at the referee.

Some counties now have a 'silent sideline' initiative at some underage levels in Bord na nOg.

member of management from each team allowed issue instructions to the players and all other members of management, parents and supporters stay silent and let the players get on with the game.

Scores and positive play from both sides is encouraged and applauded. Criticism of players, referees and opponents is not tolerated.

I'm not suggesting a 'silent sideline' at adult level – albeit it could be an interesting experiment!

But the benefits for childen are wide-ranging and could be something to explore.
