What's your idea of a perfect day in Limerick?

A morning in the city's Granary Library (I'm part of a writing group which meets there regularly); a coffee in Hook and Ladder; a browse in our wonderful O'Mahonys bookshop on O'Connell St; chips in the Curragower.

What's your first Limerick memory?

Arriving for an interview at UL thirty years ago, parking my mother's mini outside Plassey House.

What's your favourite part of the county/city and why?

There are so many wonderful places but Castleconnell is among the most special. The rowing club there, (where my daughter is a member) is set on a truly stunning stretch of the river - beautiful views, amazing wildlife, a club full of dedicated volunteer coaches and keen, committed rowers.

What about a favourite local walk or view?

Best place for a bike ride: The riverside walk from Corbally to UL. Best place for a walk: Castleconnell (see above) and The Clare Clens

What do you think gives Limerick its unique identity?

The arts scene here is fantastic. Limerick's literary festival (aka The Kate O'Brien weekend) that's held every February has a real uniqueness and vibrance to it, cleverly showcasing the best of the city. UL's creative writing summer school now brings Limerick's creative culture to New York every June, reinforcing the cultural links between the two cities. The Belltable, The Lime Tree, Limerick City Gallery of Art, The Hunt Museum, Dolan's Warehouse, the University Concert Hall, the Irish Chamber Orchestra. We are lucky to have so many resources supporting theatre, art, music, culture and creativity on our doorstep.

Do you have a favourite local restaurant?

The Grove on Cecil St is a vegetarian

restaurant, which, established in 1982 has always been ahead of its time. Cheese and spinach tart may not sound like your cup of tea, but honestly, you've got to try it. For me it's the ultimate comfort food. And their salads are so delicious and healthy that I'm pretty sure eating them makes you immortal.

How would you describe the people of Limerick?

I'm originally from Dublin but I have always felt thoroughly welcome in this city. Limerick people have a brilliant low-key kind of humour that's different and darker and funnier than anywhere in the world. People here are decent and generous and kind too.

How important do you think sport is to Limerick?

I get a ripple of pride every time I pass the stunning Thomond Park, not far from where I live. Our university's sports arena and its running tracks and facilities makes UL a place where health and fitness can be an integrated part of every students' experience, accessible also by our local communities.

If you could add one amenity to Limerick what would it be?

Better, safer, wider, more joined-up bike paths so that we could all cycle safely and happily around the city.

What are the biggest challenges facing the city/county today?

Mental health provision and hospital overcrowding. Limerick is wonderful, but these problems continue to cast a long shadow, and desperately need to be addressed.

UHL 'at breaking point' with 1,400 on trolleys

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UNIVERSITY Hospital Limerick suffered one of the worst ever months for overcrowding in September, when more than 1,400 patients were forced to be treated on trolleys in the emergency department and the wards.

According to new figures published by the Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation this Tuesday, there were 1,405 patients on trolleys at UHL last month.

This was the worst ever September for overcrowding at UHL, and was a 57% increase on last September's figures when there were 894 patients on trolleys.

The lowest ever level of overcrowding for any September at UHL since records began in 2006 was in 2008 when there were just 72 patients on trolleys. The trolley count on Tuesday alone exceeded this level, and in fact matched the national overcrowding record of 81

natients.

The second most overcrowded hospital in the country last month was Cork University Hospital, which treated 936 patients on trolleys, according to the INMO.

"This is the highest number of patients on trolleys, a single hospital has seen in one month, since the INMO began their records.

"It is yet another dismal record set by this incompetent Fine Gael government. "These figures represent a 57% increase on the same month last year - an extraordinary increase in a hospital that was already severely overcrowded. I'm at a loss to understand how Minister Simon Harris has allowed it to escalate to this level," Deputy Quinlivan said in a statement this week.

The UL Hospitals Group has been urging members of the public to consider their care options before attending the emergency department.

O'Connell Street plan to start in summer

Vote: Controversial proposal endorsed by councillors

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WORKS on the multi-million euro revitalisation of O'Connell Street are likely to begin next summer following the decision of councillors to approve the project.

to approve the project.
Following a lengthy meeting on Monday, members of the Metropolitan District endorsed the plans which will see the installation of wider footpaths and additional pedestrian areas between Denmark Street and Cecil Street.

All on-street parking and loading bays will be removed to facilitate the construction of a bus lane and a cycle lane. A shared surface will also be a feature of the new public realm.

Following a heated debate, the plans were approved by 15 votes to three with Cllr James Collins, Cllr Jerry O''Dea and Cllr Abul Kalam Azad Talukder each voting against.

An amendment, proposed by Cllr Sharon Benson, to include a segregated cycle lane was unanimously passed while an amendment, proposed by Cllr Elena Secas to reduce the speed limit to 15km/h, was also passed subject to consultation with gardai and other stakeholders.

An amendment, proposed by Cllr Sean Hartigan, to permanently pedestrianise O'Connell

Street – between William
Street and Cecil Street
– was defeated by 11 votes
to five – after director of
service Kieran Lehane
advised that such an
amendment would
represent a "material
change" and could be open
to challenge.

Following Monday's meeting Joe Delaney, acting director of service

for capital investment, said work to finalise the detailed design will begin immediately and that he expects contractors will be sought by the local authority early next year.

"We must deliberate and engage with stakeholders in terms of the detailed design and we are happy to do that but we must also be cognisant that we need to get the scheme moving. The councillors have taken

their decision and we now need to see work on the ground and we would expect that the work will take approximately 18 months – begining in summer 2020," he said.

Dee Ryan, CEO of Limerick Chamber has welcomed the outcome of the vote saying the focus must now be on delivering the project "as quickly as possible for business".

"It's now almost October and the strategy is still not published," he added, "when questioned on it this week the Minister informed me that the new social inclusion strategy, Roadmap for Social Inclusion 2019-2025, is being finalised and that she expects that the new strategy will be

published shortly.

"Unfortunately, given the ongoing delays in publishing this document I am sceptical that it will in fact be published any time soon.

"Ireland's social inclusion strategies provide a strategic framework in which to tackle poverty and social exclusion. The current strategy, which covered the time period 2015-2017, identifies a wide range of targeted actions and interventions to achieve the

Government's

ambition for reducing and ultimately eliminating poverty.

"This is an important strategy, but the failure to publish it calls into question this government's

commitment to tackling poverty and social exclusion and assisting the most vulnerable in society," said O'Dea

"Furthermore, the failure to publish a new social inclusion plan underscores that this government is very good at announcements but poor on delivery. Minister Doherty needs to stop kicking the can down the road and publish the new Roadmap for Social Inclusion as a matter of urgency," he added.

fundamental aspiration of
Irish society and the
Programme for a Partnership
Government includes a firm
commitment to develop a
new Integrated Framework

Hospitals aim to resist infection

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A NEW hygiene programme aimed at tackling the spread of infection and antimicrobial resistance in hospitals, has been launched at University Hospital Limerick.

The programme, entitled Resist, was launched last week following a successful pilot by the UL Hospitals Group in the National Hand Hygiene Train and Trainer Programme.

A spokesperson for the UL Hospitals Group has said that the initiative is about a "fresh approach" to hand hygiene training to hospital staff.

This comes exactly one year after UHL released the details of an independent expert investigation into the deaths of 73 patients, which concluded that the CPE superbug was an "associative factor" in the deaths of eight patients.

Prior to this review, UHL has been one of the leading hospitals in detecting superbug-positive patients, and continues to monitor and manage outbreaks.

Barbara Slevin, who is the assistant director of nursing in infection prevention and control for CPE management, said cleaning your hands properly when delivering care to patients is the "most effective way to stop the spread of many common infections".

The Resist programme will help hospitals protect patients, the spokesperson added. In a statement this week, UL Hospitals Group CEO, Prof Colette Cowan said that the group is committed to reducing the spread of infection and is "delighted to playing its part".

"As we approach winter and the flu season, it is essential we do everything we can to stay well and to prevent infection."

New taskforce rolled out to combat city burglaries

Initiative: Sergeant and eight gardai set to focus on 'hotspots'

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A NEW crime taskforce has been established to combat the number of burglaries across the Limerick garda division.

The new taskforce, which has been approved by Chief Superintendent Gerard Roche includes a sergeant and eight gardai from a variety of different backgrounds.

"It's across the board, there are lads who were attached to crime offices and the uniformed sections so it's a mixture of both," said Detective Inspector Padraig Byrnes of Roxboro Road garda station.

Members of the new taskforce will operate independently of the regular garda units across different shifts and their role will be to prevent and investigate burglaries.

"You will have them operating

"You will have them operating across two units, they are not all going to be working at the same time they will be working opposite each other to provide maximum cover in relation to providing a rapid response to these burglaries and

also, part of the taskforce's remit will be to focus on the investigation of burglaries," added Det Insp Byrnes.

While members of the new taskforce will respond to reports of burglaries, their activities will be intelligence-led and will focus on areas and times identified by the gardai crime analysis service as being 'hotspots' for burglaries – particularly given the arrival of winter and the shorter evenings.

"We are getting all the trends based on the analysis of the last three years. Over the last three years in the run into this time of the year burglaries have increased and it also coincides with the return to college, so a lot of our burglaries in recent years have seen hotspots out around the Castletroy area which are normally associated with student accommodation and students returning to college," said Det Insp Byrnes who will oversee the taskforce with his counterpart at Henry Street – Detective Inspector Ronan McDonagh.

While a number of serial offenders have already been identified by the

taskforce, Chief Superintendent Roche says gardai will still need help from members of the public.

"We would appeal to people to assist us by reporting any suspicious people or activity in their areas so that we can respond as quickly as possible. Prevention is also a key part to this. I would ask that people remain vigilant, keep your doors, windows, and vehicle secured at all times" he said

secured at all times," he said.

According to the latest reported crime offences published by the Central Statistics Officer, there were 402 burglary-related offences across the Limerick garda division during the first six months of 2019.

The figures, which have been published under reservation, compare to 501 during the same period in 2018 and 421 in 2017.

According to the CSO, there were 436 reported burglaries between July and December of last year.

The launch of the crime task force is an expansion of Operation Disruption which was rolled out for a short time in the Henry Street and Roxboro Road garda districts a number of years ago.

'Unsightly' trees removed from Republican graves

THE battle to have 'unsightly' trees removed from the Republican Plot at Mt St Lawrence Cemetery has finally been won after a 20-year struggle, according to the Limerick Republican Graves Committee.

"Limerick Republican Graves Committee have, for the last 20 years, been trying without success to have the trees in the plot removed because they had become unsightly and were dislodging the memorial plaques," said Desmond Long, chairman of the committee. "Limerick City Council

"Limerick City Council refused permission and gave as an excuse that they were of 'historical interest'. There was no basis in fact for that story as they were not part of the original plan when the plot was opened for those killed in the cause of Irish freedom on March 7, 1921," he added. However, Mr Long now

However, Mr Long now confirms that the trees have been removed from the plot which is the final resting place of 19 fallen heroes killed during the War of Independence.

"I am happy to report that

the Limerick County Council had the unsightly trees removed last Tuesday. On inspection of the plot, we realised that a considerable amount of repair work will have to be carried out so that this grave site will be a fitting resting place for all those who have made the ultimate sacrifice in the pursuit of Irish Freedom," Mr Long said.

Future of Youth Hub in doubt

CONCERN has been expressed at the proposed closure of 'The Factory' Youth Hub run by Limerick Youth Services in Galvone.

"I have had numerous concerned citizens and organisations in touch with me who are both shocked and angry at the potential closure of The Factory Youth facility in Galvone," deputy Willie O'Dea said this week.

"A huge amount of good work goes on there that literally keeps children and youths off the street and it would be a real shame if this facility was allowed to close."

His colleague Cllr Catherine Slattery said: "I think closing The Factory at the Galvone Industrial Estate on the Southside is a big mistake, as not only will five people lose their positions at The Factory and be deployed elsewhere in the City, but numerous sporting clubs in the Southside and surrounding areas will also lose an indoor sports facility. This indoor sports facility provides soccer tournaments, blitz's, soccer training to youths and clubs in the area."

High alert locally as Lorenzo approaches

Hurricane: Forecasters and State agencies monitor path of violent storm

LIMERICK is set to feel the impact of ex-hurricane Lorenzo as it passes close to or over Ireland this Thursday and Friday.

While forecasters have not confirmed the exact trajectory of the hurricane, Met Éireann is expected to issue orange – and possibly red – weather warnings this Wednesday.


The National Directorate for Fire

The National Directorate for Fire and Emergency management (NDFEM) has been monitoring the track of Hurricane Lorenzo since the weekend and the National Emergency Co-ordination Group met in Dublin on Tuesday evening.

"We have contacted all local authorities, requesting that they monitor Met Éireann's forecasts, and prepare for storm impacts by activating crisis management and local co-ordination arrangements," stated Minister Eoghan Murphy, whose department oversees the NECG.

The Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government is also liasing with the Department of Transport, An Garda Siochána, ESB Networks, the Office of Public Works and Irish Water.

While there were no specific warnings in place for Limerick at the time of going to press, Met Éireann had issued a weather advisory for Ireland.

"There it a high probability that Storm Lorenzo will track close to or over Ireland later on Thursday and early Friday, giving high seas, severe winds and heavy rain," it stated. Limerick City and County Council has placed its staff on standby and it's understood measures to prevent flooding will be implemented once the path and timeline of Lorenzo becomes clearer.

A number of schools across Limerick city and county have informed parents of potential closures on Thursday or Friday.

Limerick Bishop urges young people to say 'no' more often

BISHOP of Limerick, Brendan Leahy, has said society must create a culture where it is right for young people to say 'no' if they are to deal with the many challenges today, including climate change and addiction.

"We need to ultimately promote a culture where it is ok to say 'no'," said Bishop Leahy in his homily at the Legion of Mary Mass in Knock, "it's what we are learning with our new consciousness of environmental issues – we need to say 'no' in areas of our lifestyle if we want to protect our common home.

"But we need to create a culture across the board where it is right to say no – no to drugs, no to sexual openness, no to excess alcohol," he added, "no to excess. No to abandon and social freedom.

"And no to those who bully, online or offline. No to just, without thinking, going along with whatever others are saying is the right way of

thinking.

"If we do that, we will help reduce the anxiety factor for young people."

"Saying no at the right time is empowering," he continued, "it strengthens resolve, builds character, defies wrong. But today, it seems so hard for young people to say no and we must help build that resolve."

Bishop Leahy said that, sadly, an increasing number of people suffering from anxieties of all types is a feature of our times.

"While there are many great vibrant young people, we have to recognise there are too many living abnormal degrees of anxiety. There are many causes," he said.

"There's a competitive culture that is promoted in social media in terms of 'likes' and 'shares' and 'friends'. There's fear of the future in terms of environment.

"There is an insecurity among young people and we must ask how much of it is because they have not had the anchor of a solid reference point in their lives that in the past was so readily available but today is not so much because of their parents' busy lives," he said.

"We have people of all ages and social classes suffering from addictions of all sorts, there are so many young people with anxiety

issues. "It's not as if we can't notice them," he said, "they are there."

Gardai brief colleagues on phones

GARDAI from Limerick who have been using smartphones as part of a pilot initiative over the past two years have briefed some of their colleagues ahead of the expansion of the scheme, writes David Hurley.

As part of the briefing, which took place in a 'live' scenario on the outskirts of the city the array of functions that the devices can perform were explained to and demonstrated to gardai from around the country.

"These devices will enable members to have all the information they could ever require at their fingertips at the roadside, ensuring greater time out of the station and in the community," said a garda spokesperson.

No price change for houses in the city

Housing: City prices at a year-long standstill

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LATEST figures show the average three-bed semi in Limerick city has remained unchanged in the past year, averaging at around €200,000.

Meanwhile, according to the national survey carried out by Real Estate Alliance (REA), prices in the county have risen by 3.1% in the same time period.

However, homes across the entire county have remained static over the past three months.

The survey concentrates on the actual sale price of Ireland's typical stock home, the three-bed semi, giving an up-to-date picture of the second-hand property market in towns and cities countrywide to the close of last week.

"We are seeing similar conditions to the previous quarter," said Michael O'Connor of REA O'Connor Murphy.

"New developments are under construction in Limerick, which may level off prices more over the coming months," he added, "the number of properties on the market currently appears lower."




This three-bedroom semi-detached in Richmond Park, Corbally, features in this week's property section

"Three-bed semis in the county are still slower on the market, however, we do see an increase in buyers coming to these areas due to better value for money with the accessibility of the suburban towns also being a factor."

The market for three-bed semi-detached houses was unchanged over the past three months, with properties in county Limerick on the market for eight weeks and averaging €165,000..

The average semi-detached house nationally now costs €235,009, the Q3 REA Average House Price Survey has found – a drop of 0.43% on the Q2 2019 figure of €236,028 – while the price of a three-bedroom semi in Dublin fell by an average of €4,500 in the past three months.

Dad ordered to stay away from school

Barring order: Man charged following incident

A MAN who is facing domestic violence charges has been ordered to stay away from the school which his young son attends.

The 47-year-old, who can't be named for legal reasons, is accused of breaching the terms of a three-year barring order which was granted to his former partner earlier this year.

The alleged breach relates to an incident which happened in the vicinity of a primary school in the city last month.

In her evidence, the defendant's former partner said he approached her outside the school shortly after she had collected their son.

She told Judge Mary Cashin she is

living in fear of him, that staff her son's creche are "no longer comfortable" collecting him from the school because of what happened.

At Limerick District Court, the man denied the allegations saying he did not breach the order and that he did not put his former partner in foor.

He said he has appealed the decision of the family law courts to grant the barring order and that he intends contesting the charges against him.

The man also confirmed that he has started the process to secure court-approved access to his son.

Despite a garda objection to a bail application, Judge Cashin said she was willing to release the defendant subject to his compliance with a number of conditions.

The defendant, who is unemployed, was ordered to stay away from the school which his son attends and the address where his former partner lives.

He must obey a nightly curfew and sign on three times a week at a garda station in the city.

The man, who has no permanent address, has supplied his phone number to gardai and must be contactable 24 hours a day.

Adjourning the matter to later this month, Judge Cashin warned the man she was concerned about his attitude.

"You are arrogant, you have a certain view of things," she said warning his bail could be revoked if he breaches any of the conditions.



Dropped bank card was 'tapped' after it was found

A CONTACTLESS bank card which was dropped in the forecourt of a garage in the city was 'tapped' several times after it was picked up by another person.

Gardai were alerted after a young lady reported there had been a number of tapped transactions on her bank card which she had not done herself.

Tapping is where purchases for less than €30 euro are completed by tapping the card against an electronic device without the need for a PIN code.

Having viewed CCTV, gardai later established the card-owner had dropped

Another person who entered the garage a short time later can be see on the footage picking up the card which they proceeded

"Take your time to put your card away correctly and securely before you leave a retail premises," said Sergeant Ber Leetch.

Bail:Gardai express grave concerns during objection

 $A\,MAN\,who\,is\,accused\,of\,stabbing\,his\,flat mate$ at an apartment in the city centre earlier this year is not currently fit to be tried, a court has

Jean Louis Fancony, 35, of no fixed abode faces three charges arising from the incident at Riverpoint, Bishop's Quay on July 22, last.

The French national is charged under the provisions of the Non Fatal Offences Against the Person Act with assaulting another man shortly before 4pm

He is also accused of producing an article, capable of inflicting serious injury, during a $dispute \, and \, with \, possession \, of \, a \, 12\text{-inch} \, bread$ knife at Dock Road, Limerick a short time after the alleged stabbing occurred.

The victim – who is aged in his mid 20s suffered life-changing injuries after he was stabbed several times in the abdomen and

Seeking bail on behalf of his client, solicitor Tom Kiely said Mr Fancony has been in prison since he was first brought before the court when he should be a hospital setting.

A number of medical and psychiatric reports were submitted to the court and it was accepted by gardai, that the defendant is suffering from a mental disorder and was experiencing an "acute psychotic episode"

He is unfit to be tried as matters stand SOLICITOR TOM KIELY

when arrested.

Judge Mary Cashin was told that following his arrest the defendant was seen by a doctor and referred to the psychiatric services for assessment.

However, the HSE declined to admit Mr Fancony to unit 5B on a number of occasions and he remains on a waiting list for admission to the Central Mental Hospital.

Detective Garda Colum O'Shea said gardai believe the defendant represents a "significant flight risk" and he expressed "grave concerns" as to his potential behaviour if released given the concerns surrounding his mental health.

Mr Kiely told Limerick District Court his client is "not capable of acting in his own best interests" but that prison is not where he should be.

He said his the 35-year-old has surrendered his passport to gardai and that his parents were willing to travel to Ireland to live with him if he is released.

He added that his client is "entitled to the $presumption\, of innocence "and\, he\, submitted$ the objection, in the context of the Bail Act,

"Mental illness is not one (a factor) the court can take into consideration," he said.

Inspector Padraig Sutton disagreed saying the primary concern of gardai was the safety of Mr Fancony and members of the public.

Noting the seriousness of the offence and the concerns of gardai, Judge Cashin refused bail and remanded Mr Fancony in custody until later this month.

She reiterated a previous direction that he receive all necessary medical attention while in custody.

Charity hope to bank Wellness **Vault facility**

A LIMERICK charity dedicated to helping people with acquired brain injuries is to open a wellness centre at its base in William Street.

Headway moved into the former AIB, which closed in 2011, after completing the purchase in late

Now, thanks to a fundraising drive which saw 50 staff members of Holmes O'Malley Sexton solicitors take part in the Great Limerick Run, the centre is set to open in the coming months.

Some 30 service users also joined the fundraising effort in May, with the cheque presentation this week. As a nod to its previous life as a bank, the new facility will be known as the 'Wellness Vault', and

will feature all manner of holistic therapies, relaxation areas, and pictures, says rehabilitative service manager Rella Galvin.

It will be located where the old bank vaults actually were situated.

"This is essential, absolutely essential. It's so important. When people are in hospital, the focus is on the physical rehabilitation, whereas the mental health and the life-changing alterations that come about as a result of brain injury is massive. That period of adjustment is so important. To have that calmness, that space to reflect and try and adjust to everything that's come about for them since their acquired brain injury."

Rella said the charity is hoping to raise €17,000 for the project.

So far, thanks to the exploits of lawyers and Headway service users

possible to have the work done by January.



"I've been down there the last two nights and people are just baffled and bewildered and numbed by the whole thing. These lads were taken in their prime."

It's understood the accident happened after the car struck a steel barrier before hitting a stone wall and bursting into flames.

"If you have ideas, I'd be


only too happy to facilitate them," he added.

Anti-War conference in Limerick and march in Shannon

AN anti-war conference called 'NoWar2019 Pathways to Peace' will be held this weekend at the South Court Hotel.

The conference, organised by World Beyond War, will take place on Saturday from 9am.

On Sunday, a rally will take place near Shannon Airport on to demand an end to the airport's use by the U.S. military. The rally at Shannon Airport comes in the aftermath of an incident involving an American military plane at Shannon Airport in August that shut down the airport for four hours in August.

Critics argue that the American usage of Shannon Airport is a violation of Irish neutrality, and Edward Horgan, chairperson and founder of Veterans For Peace Ireland is among them.

Horgan told The Leader: "We fully support the restoration of

Shannon as a genuine civilian airport and are convinced that the reputation and future of the airport has, and is being seriously damaged by US Military and CIA misuse of the airport."

The conference is the annual gathering of a global organisation called World BEYOND War.

Among the participants at the conference include MEP Clare Daly, Nobel Peace Laureate Mairead (Corrigan) Maguire, presenter and producer of of RTÉ Global Affairs series What in the World, Peadar King, U.S. Veterans For Peace facing prosecution for entering Shannon Airport, Tarak Kauff and Ken Mayers and Co-Founder of World BEYOND War, David Swanson.

The conference will include panel discussions on topics such as nonviolent activism, Irish neutrality, sanctions and refugees, closing bases, and outlawing the arms trade.

The organisers say: "At

#NoWar2019, meet with Irish and international activists, organisers, and educators to learn about the impact of U.S. militarism in Ireland – and how we can work together to stop the U.S. war machine.

²That's why we're concluding the conference with a rally and tour at Shannon Airport," the statement read.

They helpfully pointed to a printer sitting by the agent and offered to email the document so it could be printed off. The answer was simple: Computer says

A return visit on Saturday – this time with correct documentation in hand – yielded a 90 minute wait, with nowhere to sit down.

With the clock ticking down to the centre's 2pm closing time, they were at the front of the queue, only to be told at 1:50pm that he couldn't be seen.

Owner slates lack of support for Frank McCourt Museum

Una Heaton: I reached out to everyone, but got nothing

"I've given my heart and soul to this and I just want empathy, not sympathy," Una Heaton told The Leader following her announcement that the Frank McCourt Museum on Hartstonge Street would close on October 30.

The decision to close, announced on social media, was due, Ms Heaton said, to no longer being able to afford the rent, rates or insurance.

Ms Heaton's husband John - who had given her the building in 2011 to launch the museum - had to put it on the market in 2017 and it was bought by Ger Enright, who was praised for being as supportive as he could in the past two years.

She did not have such kind words for the local authority, however, accusing it of failing to support something that was attracting tourists to Limerick as well as celebrating one of its most famous sons.

"I've been asking the Council for help for as long as I've been in business and in nearly ten years I've got a grand total of $\epsilon_{1,300}$ from them spread over a few projects.

"Before we had to sell it, I had a 40 foot high banner saying 'save our building'. I'll be putting up a 12 foot one now saying 'Museum closed'.

"I reached out and wrote to

"I reached out and wrote to everyone, I knocked on every door and got nothing, and now we're losing an iconic building and museum. If I get anyone coming up from the council now saying 'is there anything they can do', I'll scream."

The only grants Ms Heaton says she received, included $\epsilon_{3,500}$ from the enterprise board which had to be paid back within a certain time frame and two separate grants of ϵ_{500} and ϵ_{300} from the arts council for two projects she undertook in the museum.

The process for procuring public funding is notoriously arduous and competitive, which Ms Heaton says she recognised and for that reason had engaged a professional consultant from Dublin to manage the process for her.

"I had a catalogue with a thorough profile of the museum, what it would do in the future, how it would help attract tourism, detailed its projects and so on.

"That went out to all the powers that be, but I never got anything back." Neither, she claims, did she receive any feedback.

In response to Ms Heaton's comments Limerick City and County Council said it regretted to hear the "privately-owned and operated Frank McCourt Museum is due to close".

It said it had worked in

partnership with the museum to promote and support events when opportunities arose, like Culture Nights and the Diaspora Fund and had recently made a financial contribution to an event tying in with Limerick Jazz Festival.

The Council spokesperson said, "Cultural and Arts organisations have a number of funding schemes open to them as sources of funding including Creative Ireland, Grants Under the Arts Act, and Festival & Events etc. These are competitive open calls, which are independently judged.

"A large number of the necklace of museums dotted around the city and county have applied for and received funding through this avenue."

The council said Frank McCourt "will always have a presence in Limerick".

"His papers have been donated to the Special Collection in UL's Glucksman Library and the position of Chair of Creative Writing at the university also commemorates his name and achievements and association with Limerick."

The spokesperson added, "Limerick City and County Council would be delighted to accept a selection of the Frank McCourt collection on behalf of the people of Limerick if it was offered by the owners.

"Unfortunately, Limerick City and County Council is not in the position to buy the collection or licence the rights to use the name." This suggestion was not welcomed by Ms Heaton who told the Leader, "I'm going to return the personal items which are the ashes and the cap and gown in which Frank had his honorary doctorate bestowed on him and I'm also returning the rosary beads to Ellen (Frank's widow). But I'm going to publicly auction the

Ms Heaton said another museum had offered to take some of the items, but only, they said, to store them.

"I felt that was an insult," said Ms Heaton, "I wouldn't hand over anything, let Ellen do it if she wishes.

"To me, the memory of Frank is in the school, so I couldn't, in my heart, hand over personal items to someone who would put them in storage. What is the point of that?"

All will be revealed in her memoir, she promised, which is to be titled 'I'll be Frank' and which will be complete next autumn.

"Itried so hard, I gave it all I had and the McCourt family have been brilliant, Frank's brothers and Ellen too.

"I reckon Frank is probably up in heaven now saying, "That's Limerick!'.

"I haven't slept since I made the decision, I'm wrecked, and it's so frustrating. I never did it for praise, I did it for love of Frank, and for his old school, to celebrate what he had done. To me, reading between the lines, the council's attitude is shocking and I won't be afraid to say it."

All that glitters: Is buying gold a good investment?

SHOULD I investing old is a question I'mfrequently asked, particularly with interest rates being so low, and because there has been a lot of talk about gold of With some commentators espousing it as an excellent investment, I thought it was worth looking into it further for you.

If you invested in gold over the past three years, your return wasn't great with gains of just over 1% per year, but since the start of the year, gold has rebounded with incredibly impressive returns. At the start of the year, it was priced at €1,173 an ounce, and now it's currently trading at just under €1,376, which is a 17.3% gain.

Gold is now trading at its highest point since April 2013 and the consensus amongst investment analysts, is that it could continue to rise, if (a) market volatility persists, and (b) fear grips the markets making them think we're about to enter a global recession. Typically, there are two types of people who invest in gold and their reasons couldn't be more diametrically opposed.

The first are those who speculate on how it will perform, hoping it will rise in value over a relatively short period of time. They recognise this is a high risk strategy on their part, but are okay with approach, because understand that with high risk comes high reward. And there is some comfort that their investment won't be wiped out either because gold will always hold value in the long run.

And then there are those who always hold gold in their investment or pension portfolio as a hedge against inflation, and insurance against markets taking a nose-dive.

The principal reason behind gold rising in value, is demand from investors as is the case with any investment, but gold is slightly different because demand for it, isn't primarily driven by the companies' price to earning ratio, revenue growth, dividend payments or how much debt the company has etc.


DEMAND FOR GOLD IS PRIMARILY

Gold thrives on the fear of inflation, fear of war, fear of economic uncertainty, fear of banks failing, fear of trade wars, and when you see what's happening between the United States and China, it's a big reason why individual investors and countries are now beginning to invest heavily in gold. Central Banks, mainly those in emerging markets, bought 224.4 tons of gold in O2 of this year.

Another reason gold has increased in value in recent times is down to lower interest rates. Central Banks are keeping borrowing rates down hoping to stimulate economies but when you have lots of money circulating and not enough goods and services that can accommodate all this cheap money, prices rise which can lead to inflation and impacting the value of currencies, all of which lead to gold increasing in

WHAT COULD LEAD TO GOLD DECREASING

The biggest threat is if we enter a global recession, because when that happens, people spend less, and that's a problem for the value of gold, because

people in China and India in particular reduce their jewellery purchases.

So, if you wanted to invest in gold, you could do so in a number of different ways, and they are as follows.

GOLD UNIT LINKED FUNDS

This method gives you the opportunity to gain exposure to movements in the price of gold. It does this by investing in an Exchange Traded Certificate (ETC), which aims to track the spot price of gold in US dollars.

A good example of this type of fund is Zurich Life's gold fund. It has grown in value by 21.90% in the past year and has averaged +5.5% each year for the past 5.

Another fund with similar returns is the Black Rock Merrill Lynch Gold & General Fund. It has returned +20.55% from the end of June '18 to end of June

PHYSICALLY BUY GOLD

You can do this via a company like Goldcore. And it's quite easy to do, you first have to set up a trading account with them, and once payment is made, you can choose to have them store the gold for you, or they will forward the physical gold directly to you which take the form of coins or bars weighing one once each or gold sovereigns which weigh 0.2354 ounces.

PURCHASE GOLD VIA EXCHANGE TRADED FUNDS (ETF'S)

Gold ETFs have been rising in popularity because of their ease of purchase and ease of trade, along with not having to physical store gold and or having to worry about them being

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, I want to financially help my mother who is 71. Is there a smarter way I can give her money each year, other than what the annual gift exemption is?

A. Yes, there is, and it's made by way of what's called a Deed of Covenant. Making a payment by this method, you and your mother will end up with more money, and I'll explain why shortly, but there are some things you need to know first about a DOC. First off, payments are restricted to 5% of the total income of the person making the payment. And the amount you give to your mother must have the ability to last for six years (it can't be a once off payment) which I guess is influenced by your financial situation and your ability to continue making the payment and your mum's $\,$ age. The DOC has to be a written agreement between you and your mother, and is witnessed by a third party.

The financial benefit for you is that you get tax relief on the amount given at the difference between the standard and higher tax rate

So, if you give your mum for example, €5,000, when all the paperwork is completed, by doing so, along with giving her maybe much needed funds, you'll have reduced your income tax bill by €1,000 in the process.

Thursday (Oct 3) **The Alternative**, at the

Belltable this Thursday, is set in a universe where Ireland never won independence from the United Kingdom, resulting in less freedom to make our own destiny, far less John Charles McQuaid and not a peep of the most dividing issue on this island - the battle between Nordie Tayto and Free Stayto. The play is set on the eve of a national referendum to decide whether Ireland should remain part of the UK, with the Irish-born UK Prime Minister debating the leader of the separatist Irish Parliamentary Party. The play was the winner of Fishamble's A Play For Ireland competition, selected from a giant stack of almost 400 submitted scripts, all aiming to capture the Irish zeitgeist. Working together to prevent suicides

UICIDE is like a tsunami whose dreaded wave overwhelms all. Every life lost represents someone's partner, child, parent, friend or colleague.

For each suicide, figures show approximately 135 people suffer intense grief or are otherwise affected. That's almost 80,000 people per year in Ireland impacted by this loss. A Croke Park full of grief.

Suicidal behaviour includes suicide, and also encompasses suicidal ideation and suicide attempts. For every suicide, 25 people make a suicide attempt and many more have serious thoughts of suicide. Suicide is the result of a convergence of genetic, psychological, social and cultural and other risk factors, sometimes combined with experiences of trauma and loss.

Preventing suicide is often possible and you are a key player in its prevention! You can make a difference — as a member of society, as a child, as a parent, as a friend, as a colleague or as a neighbour. There are many things that you can do daily to prevent suicidal behaviour. You can raise awareness about the issue, educate yourself and others about the causes of suicide and warning signs $for \, suicide, show \, compassion \, and \,$ care for those who are in distress in your community, advocate for timely services for those with mental health issues, question the stigma associated with suicide, suicidal behaviour and mental health problems and share your own experiences.

TOGETHERNESS AND WORK

It takes work to prevent suicide. The positive benefits of this work are infinite and sustainable and can have a massive impact. The work can affect not only those in distress but also their loved ones,

The involvement of people with lived experience of suicide is critical and we need to provide ways to support these valuable voices

those working in the area and also society as a whole.

Joining together is critical to preventing suicide. Preventing suicide requires the efforts of many. It takes family, friends, co-workers, community members, educators, religious leaders, healthcare professionals, political

officials and governments.

A good place to start is your HSE local suicide support office where they provide excellent free resources, including two evidenced based trainings: 'SafeTalk' and 'Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training or ASSIST. Details at www.hse.ie.

Everyone can make a contribution in preventing suicide. Suicidal behaviour is universal, it knows no boundaries so it affects everyone. The tens of thousands of people affected each year by suicidal behaviour have exclusive insight and unique voices. Their experiences are invaluable for informing suicide prevention measures and influencing the provision of supports for suicidal people and those around them. The involvement of people with lived experience of suicide is

SUICIDE MYTHS & FACTS

People who talk about suicide don't die by suicide.

People with suicidal thoughts are absolutely intent on dying.

Suicide happens without

Once a person thinks of suicide they will have those thoughts forever.

An improvement after a crisis means the suicide risk is over.

You are either the suicidal type or you're not.

Most people who die by suicide have given definite warning signs of their intention. Some of these signs are direct, others are more subtle.

Most people who think of suicide have mixed feelings about living and dying. Many don't really want to die but they don't want to live the way they are living and may not be able to see an alternative other than suicide.

People thinking of suicide may talk or act in ways that indicate they are thinking of taking their

Suicidal thoughts may return, but they are not permanent. In some people, they may never return if they get the support they

Some suicides happen when

things seem to be getting better, because the person now has the energy and will to turn despairing thoughts into self-destructive action.

Suicide happens in all groups in society.

Anyone can turn to suicide as a way of coping with obvious or perceived stress.

WHAT TO SAY TO SOMEONE WHO IS

- 1. Let the person know you are concerned about them.
 - 2. Ask about suicide.
 - 3. Listen and understand.
 - 4. Take all threats seriously.

Talking to a friend or family member about their thoughts and feelings on suicide can be extremely difficult. It is hard to hear that a family member or friend is thinking of ending their life. But it is important to check if your loved one is experiencing suicidal thoughts and if they have a plan as to how they will end their

If you're unsure, the best way to find out is to ask if they are thinking about suicide. Allowing someone to express their feelings in a safe space can give them a sense of relief and may help them to see that they have other options. It is important that you accept that your loved one needs help to stay alive and that you support them in finding the help they need straight

STEPS THAT WILL SAVE A LIFE

Remove potential means of suicide; such as medications, firearms, and so on.

Don't leave them alone. It is important to keep them safe. This will mean staying with them or organising for someone else to stay with them until they get help.

Don't promise confidentiality. Be honest and say that you cannot agree to keep this confidential because the most important thing is for them to stay safe while they get help to deal with the issues that are leading to their thoughts of

It may be helpful to agree together who you can tell.

Get professional help; Where possible, support them to tell someone else such as their family doctor (GP), or A+E in out of hours times.

Do everything you can to get the help they need. Your loved one is going to need help and support from others, not just you.

Think about who else can help such as other family members, friends, work colleagues or professional help.

We are all connected like links of a chain—you are the most important link in suicide prevention because you know the person best.

Probiotic (good) bacteria living in your gut outnumber our own cells by 10 to 1 because they are so important for our health. These microscopic soldiers help to fight off pathogenic (bad) bacteria and fungi, and at the same time, balance other components of the

immune system and help to other immune supporting nutrients. Nature gave you great diversity, but as always, man made chemicals interfere with the fine ecology you are supposed to have inside.

Lactobacilli Bifidobacteria species by taking probiotic capsules for a couple of month at each changing of season and especially when someone has to take antibiotics. Home made yoghurt, kefir and raw sauerkraut are just some examples where you could top-up your gut flora, although their taste might

not be everyone's cup of tea. Fear not, there is good diversity available in your health store in capsule form! Just look for a great The microscopic variety of strains creatures in your gut for best results.

Daily intake human cells over 10 of a great variety to 1 and rule your of fruits and immune system vegetables are needed, not only for their exceptional nutrient supply, but because they feed your beneficial bacteria with soluble fiber, helping them colonize your system. The greater the variety of plant foods, the more diverse your gut flora will be and the healthier you will be. Have a piece of different fruit and few different vegetables every day for both lunch and dinner. Disguise vegetables if needed by making smoothies, soups, pasta sauces, stews, lasagna and falafel balls.

Add different herbs and spices to your meals; these also support you gut

flora

immunity. Most fresh and dried herbs spices have the ability to slap around and tidy up your gut flora; reducing

the bad guys and supporting the good ones. They also make those scary vegetables and fish taste so much better, and jazz up any boring salad. Fresh herbs can be blended with olive oil and salt to make fresh pesto to add to pasta, top meat, chicken or omelets, or use as salad dressing with some raw apple cider or balsamic vinegar. This pesto will keep for days in the fridge, take a couple of teaspoons a day and swap the herbs around or combine them for best results.



October is for breast cancer awareness

APPY October everyone! While October is best known for being the month of . Halloween, it is more importantly, Breast Cancer Awareness Month, a cause close to my heart.

Throughout my hairdressing career, I have been passionate about helping women and men who suffer from hair loss, be it hair loss $from\,hormonal\,reasons, conditions$ like alopecia or from undergoing cancer treatment. A lot of my clients, unfortunately, are undergoing chemotherapy or radiotherapy.

Losing your hair as a result of cancer treatment can be a very distressing side effect. For many, their hair is their identity and losing it can result in low self-esteem and confidence. Hair loss can be a daily reminder of their $illness\,and\,can\,make\,people\,feel$ extremely vulnerable. I strive to help cancer patients regain a sense of normality in an abnormal

In my salon, Cyril Morgan Hair, I have created a private area called Inner Space, which is

predominantly used for wig fittings. Creating Inner Space was extremely important to me when I opened the salon, as I wanted clients to feel as comfortable as possible and have a safe and intimate space for the wig fitting

First off, why does hair loss happen when undergoing cancer treatment? On average, hair grows quickly at around 1cm per month. Unfortunately, cancer cells also reproduce rapidly and chemotherapy and radiotherapy are designed to target these fast-growing cells, which is why hair can be affected.

With chemotherapy, hair usually starts falling out two-four weeks after starting treatment and can fall out very quickly in clumps or gradually, while some treatments don't cause any hair loss. Hair thinning or loss of eyelashes, eyebrows and other body hair can also occur. On the other hand, with regards to radiotherapy, hair loss will only occur in the area where treatment is carried out.

Many people choose to wear a wig throughout their cancer treatment. Initially, I will meet a

client for a consultation and assess the stage of their hair loss and chat through the different options available to them. I normally recommend people bring a trusted companion with them, both for emotional support, as well as a second opinion on potential wig styles. Once we have chosen a wig style, I will order it for the client and they will return within a few days to have it fitted and custom styled.

Wearing a wig for the first time can feel quite different, and many find it overwhelming, which is why I want to make the experience as normal as possible for my clients. Normally clients choose a style and colour similar to their original look. When the client comes in to have their wig fitted, I will remove the excess bulk and thin the wig for a

natural appearance.
There are different options when it comes to selecting a wig, the main two being synthetic fibre wigs and human hair wigs, both have their advantages and disadvantages.

Human hair is slightly more expensive but can be heat styled, coloured and treated like human hair. On the other hand, synthetic hair is pre-styled and can't be heat styled. These wigs are wash and wear, which means after washing the wig, it will revert to its original style. For this reason, synthetic wigs can be advantageous for cancer patients who may not have the energy to style their wig regularly.

After cancer treatment is finished, new hair may start growing back, even starting to grow before the end of treatment. You may have a full head of hair within 3

- 6 months after chemotherapy and 6-12 months after radiotherapy.

The hair that grows back following treatment can be weak due to a lack of keratin, which is the protein that makes up the hair's structure.

The new hair may also have several differences to your hair before treatment, it can be very fine and maybe a different texture, some people even grow curly hair after having straight hair all their life! In most cases, the hair will revert to its pre-cancer treatment condition over time.

As new hair is weak and low in keratin, it is important to care for it properly. Strenuous brushing or heat should be avoided and regular hair cuts will help improve the condition by removing damaged hair and promoting hair growth.

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You too can be a World Cup wonder in a rugby shirt

H rugby, the sport that has everyone getting up earlier/staying up later on the weekend right now. Granted, not all the results have gone our way so far but the World Cup itself has pushed a classic style staple back out to the forefront again.

I am of course speaking of the rugby shirt - the creative out half of a man's wardrobe. Now just to be clear, I'm not talking about the skin-tight rugby shirts made from polyester by Adidas/Nike/ Canterbury – you're on your own on

I'm referring to the classic preppy Ivy League style rugby shirt made by Gant/Tommy Hilfiger/Polo and the like that's now just as happy to play with urban streetwear looks as it is tackling a posh, preppy outfit.

The rugby shirt has come a long way from its creation in the 1830s when William Webb Ellis first ran with a leather ball during a game of football. The sport of rugby grew in the UK's public school system and eventually - as a way to differentiate teams - uniforms were created. The earliest incarnation of the rugby jersey was a collared dress shirt worn with a bow tie, but the tails were deemed to be too easy to grab on to and the buttons would often scratch opposing player's faces. The dress shirts were soon replaced by wool jumpers but they were also deemed unfit for purpose as the cloth became too heavy when wet so the more breathable cotton was chosen as the rugby shirt fabric of choice. The stiff collar remained and horizontal stripes became common, as vertical stripes had already been taken by football shirts. As time went on the collars became less rigid than that of a typical dress shirt in an attempt to prevent a pesky opposing player from clinging onto them for dear life, which brings us to the modern version of the Rugby shirt.

The rugby shirt didn't become a fashion item until about a century later. In the 1950s American teens began wearing rugby shirts as a way of showing off their athleticism while still looking smart and the now timeless preppy look was born. Since then the shirt has dipped in and out of fashion before returning to prominence in AW18.

WORKWEAR MEETS STREETWEAR

In today's menswear landscape, the rugby shirt falls somewhere in between heritage and retro. Heritage wise, the streetwear crowd are currently experiencing a love-in with all things workwear. The strength of cotton and denim together reflects the hardworking industry of days gone by, while simultaneously delivering the kind of quality that many find absent

from high street garments. The trickle-down effect has led to workwear showing up on runways and collaborations between workwear and streetwear labels. However, heritage and Ivy League prep are not one and the same, and that same emphasis on high-quality basics reflect a return to 1950s preppy essentials. Polo shirts, an essential from this era, have been reimagined as a statement piece in recent years and rugby shirts are seen as a long-sleeved version,

In a nutshell, the rugby shirt is now seen as a statement garment. Its bold, contrasting shades and colour-blocking get attention no matter how you style it. A classic rugby shirt worn casually with dark denim or chinos and white leather trainers is timeless. Style the jersey with these points in mind. For everyday wear, keep the rest of your look neutralthat's why jeans and chinos work so well. For a modern take, match the pattern to tan, navy, grey or black

highlighted by a contrasting collar.

chinos or straight cut dark wash denim (with a roll-up at the bottom). From there, a white trainer or lace-up boot will complete the ensemble. Consider throwing on a denim jacket or a bomber when the temperature starts to dip. ATHLETIC WEAR

The rugby shirt is essentially the original athleisure piece. Rooted on the rugby pitch and adaptable enough for everyday wear, these days you are much more likely to see a rugby shirt worn with jogger pants than sports shorts. Differences that are more than skin deep

What is the difference between Beauty Salons and Aesthetic Clinics?

hat is the difference between Beauty Salons and Aesthetic Clinics?

That is the question I am often asked as most people have a skincare regime in

place. Whether it's just washing your face in the morning or bedtime night creams, everyone has something in their daily routine that serves to maintain the health of their skin.

For more professional

treatments, like deep cleansing or problematic skin issues like acne, you might opt to go to a beauty salon or an aesthetic skin care clinic. So what is the difference between the two? And, which is better for you and your skin's health in the long run? To a large degree a beauty salon and an aesthetic skin clinic will perform some similar procedures, but there are some critical variations. To understand the differences we can start by examining what each business does.

Beauty salons concentrate on treatments that serve to pamper your skin – manicures, pedicures and other grooming treatments such as facials, waxing, exfoliation, makeup advice, and massages.

An aesthetic skin care clinic may also offer pampering treatments, but their primary focus is on anti-ageing treatment. They can offer treatments such as botox and fillers, skin rejuvenation therapies, facial and chemical skin peels, laser hair removal and other such services.

A trained therapist in an aesthetic skin care clinic will be able to offer a more comprehensive range of treatments. Generally in an

aesthetic clinic you will be

under the supervision of a qualified technician who has specialised in specific skin issues. Perhaps you would start with a standard facial, and once your skin's needs have been established, the therapist could recommend a course of treatment that would benefit your skin type. Such personalised treatments are not always available in a beauty salon which will have a more standardised approach to the services offered.

At an aesthetic clinic, all treatments are carried out under the auspices of the same therapist/doctor, so there is no confusion as to what has been done and when. More and more people are choosing to go the non-invasive route for skin and facial rejuvenation. Treatments such as botox have become more established in the general public's mind as the benefits are immediate and there is no lengthy recovery period. The subtle

enhancement makes it more accessible for many people, and there is no major change in the way they look. The rejuvenation is gradual, and there is no glaring change, just a subtle freshening that is very

appealing.

It is clear that both of these professions care for the skin, but it is also clear that aestheticians are trained to offer a more exhaustive range of treatments and can treat skin that has been damaged by environmental or other factors. The choice of which clinic or salon that you choose to attend should depend on your personal requirements.

While those requirements may be simple at this point, they may require more advanced treatments as time goes by and it would be beneficial to have built up a history with an aesthetic skin care clinic that can offer more specialised and intensive treatments.

Limerick Chamber has welcomed the news that Metropolitan Area Councillors approved the O'Connell Street Development plans this week with two amendments.

The plan is set to deliver much needed investment into the City Centre.

"Attention must now turn to ensuring that we get the highest quality of finish on the public realm aspects of the scheme and that we deliver this project as quickly as possible for business," said Dee Ryan, Chamber CEO in

response to the news.

'The inclusion of a segregated cycle lane and introduction of a 15km/h speed limit are to be welcomed and should not significantly impact on the progress of the next phase of

work on the project."

The Chamber is pushing for a connected bicycle network, spanning Castleconnell in the East to Patrickswell in the West, covering all the areas where people, work, study, and play.

Although this top-class bicycle lane will not be

 $inputted \, in \, O'Connell \, street, \,$ the Chamber assures this will not affect cyclists' traveling time.

Addressing the concerns about lack of provision for cycle lanes or the need to go for full pedestrianisation, Ms Ryan said, "In our view Limerick is not ready for full pedestrianisation yet, we don't currently have enough footfall or people living in the City Centre to make it an attractive proposition.

There is, however, nothing to prevent us from altering the operations of the four blocks that are being

redeveloped at any time." Ms. Ryan said, "Our vision in the Chamber is for a multi-generational, thriving shared space that is safe and accessible for all. We believe that Limerick has an opportunity to be leaders in thoughtful urban design by putting visitor experience at the center of plans."

The improvements to O'Connell Street, which would be to the benefit of our city trader members, are also strongly welcomed by the Region's largest employers.



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

Limerick FCs case in for mention this month

Limerick examinership process is due to come before the Circuit Court again later this month.

The case is listed for mention on the opening day of the civil sittings of Limerick Circuit Court at Merchant's Quay Courthouse on October 15.

The High Court last month confirmed the appointment of an examiner to League of Ireland First Division side Limerick FC.

At the hearing Mr Justice Tony O'Connor confirmed practitioner insolvency Conor Noone of Baker Tilly chartered accountants as examiner Munster Football Club Limited, which trades as Limerick FC.

The company. represented by barrister Gary McCarthy instructed by solicitor Barry Lyons, had petitioned to the court to place the company in examinership, on the grounds that if certain steps were taken it could survive as a going concern.

The application was opposed by the Revenue Commissioners, which is a creditor of the company. In his ruling, Mr Justice O'Connor said he was satisfied that the legal criteria had been fulfilled that would allow the court to confirm Mr Noone as examiner to the company.

Mr Noone, who was appointed examiner on an interim basis last month, has up to 100 days to put together a scheme of arrangement with the League of Ireland First Division side's creditors which, if approved by the Courts, would allow the company continue to trade.

THE new Energia All-Ireland League season kicks-off this week with two Limerick sides hoping to end the city's 10-year wait for a Division 1 title.

Nine-time champions Shannon, relegated to Division 1B at the end of last season, were the last Limerick side to win the top flight title in 2009/2010.

The All-Ireland League action for Limerick clubs kicks off on Friday night with an intriguing clash of local rivals UL-Bohemian and old Crescent in Division 2A at UL North Campus, 8pm.

Both clubs missed out on making the promotion play-offs in 2A last season, with UL-Bohs finishing fifth and Crescent claiming sixth.

The two Limerick clubs enjoyed decent early season form with Old Crescent reaching the Limerick Charity Cup final while UL-Bohs were edged out of the Munster Senior Cup at the quarter-final stage by Cashel.

This weekend's Division 1A action in the AIL includes the clash of Young Munster and Clontarf at Clifford Park on Saturday, 2.30pm.

Munsters' finished seventh in the 1A table last term, just above the relegation zone, so the Greenfields side will hope that they are contending for the semi-final play-offs this time, rather than fighting for

top flight survival.

Munsters' early season form has been good as Gearoid Prendergast's side has booked their place in both the Munster Senior Cup and Limerick Charity Cup finals.

Munsters' will face holders Cork Con in the Munster Senior Cup final in Cork in December following their semi-final win over Cashel in wet conditions at Clifford Park on Friday evening. The Greenfields' side's Limerick Charity Cup final opponents will be Old Crescent.

Looking ahead to the start of the AIL, Munsters' head coach Gearoid Prendergast said. "We are quite happy with where we are at going into the AIL. We have had two tough games with Shannon in the quarter-final a week ago also. Clontarf will provide a different form of opposition, but look, we are ready for it."

Garryowen lost out to Con' in a highly competitive Munster Senior Cup quarter-final tie 10 days ago.

In Division 1B on Saturday, Shannon open their campaign with a home game against Old Belvedere on Thomond Park's back pitch.

World Cup hangover shrouded 'Thomond'

HE new Guinness PRO14 season kicked off last weekend.

You'd be forgiven if you missed it, however. Every four years the PRO14 comes up against the Rugby World Cup for media coverage and profile. And the league comes off a poor second best.

Take last Saturday for instance. Bleary-eyed rugby fans dug themselves out of bed all over the country at an unearthly hour to watch Ireland's second Rugby World Cup Pool A fixture against Japan.

Those fans were full of optimism – despite the early 8.15am kick-off time – following Ireland's impressive opening day victory over Scotland.

But that joy had turned to despair by 10.15am as Ireland suffered a shock defeat to the Brave Blossoms.

The prospect of making their way to Thomond Park four hours later to watch Munster's opening Guinness PRO14 fixture of the season was well down the list of priorities for the majority of those Irish rugby fans.

The regular Saturday activities took centre stage, the weekly shopping needed to be bought, kids' sports and other pastime activities needed to be tended to, the dog needed walking, granny had to be visited.

Take your pick. The reality is that the vast majority of rugby fans – other than the diehard Munster supporters – weren't about to contemplate devoting an entire Saturday to watching 'egg chasing' on TV that morning in the World Cup and then live that afternoon in the Pro 14.

Just look at the coverage of the

Just look at the coverage of the PRO14 in the national media on Sunday and Monday. Low key is perhaps the most appropriate way to describe it.

Trying to attract a large crowd to Thomond Park on a filthy wet Saturday afternoon as the nation continued with a World Cup hangover from earlier in the morning was never going to be easy.

Although the official attendance at Thomond Park was given as 10,878, that figure included a large number of season ticket holders who chose not to attend the game

for numerous reasons.

The actual number of supporters inside the match venue was perhaps more accurately between 5,000 and 6,000

Munster were shorn of 12 Ireland internationals who are on World Cup duty and minus their household names and given the wet conditions and the profile of the opposition, it was always going to be difficult to attract a bumper attendance.

Then there is the question of the kick-off time, 3pm. It's not the most ideal, to be fair.

5.30pm is perfect. It gives supporters the opportunity to tend to their regular Saturday business and still have time to make it to Thomond Park in time for kick-off.

It also allows Munster supporters travelling to Limerick from outside of

the Mid-West an opportunity to return home at a reasonable hour, especially attractive for supporters with young children.

Thankfully from a Munster perspective their next three home fixtures at Thomond Park scheduled to take place on Saturdays will kick-off close to tea time.

Munster host Ulster in Limerick in the PRO14 at Thomond Park on Saturday, November 9 at 5.15pm. That game is followed by the first two home fixtures in the Heineken Champions Cup, both of which kick-off at 5.30pm.

That schedule includes the Saturday, November 23 meeting with Racing 92 and the Saturday, December 7 clash with holders Saracens. Thomond Park should be hopping then.


