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

What's your idea of a perfect day, or a perfect weekend, in Limerick?

A perfect weekend would start with a gig in Dolans or Pharmacia on Friday night. Saturday morning in the Milk Market - a crêpe from Bon Appétit for breakfast, a hot spiced apple juice from The Green Apron, and just chatting with everyone - it feels like the entire city passes through, it's the place for the weekly catch-up, and I love it. Browsing around town for the afternoon, maybe pick up a book in O'Mahony's, a hurling match in the Gaelic Grounds or a Munster game would be ideal, then catching up with friends over a few pints in the Commercial or JJ Bowles. A relaxed Sunday brunch in The Good Room in Adare followed by a nice walk somewhere like Curraghchase Forest Park would round it off beautifully.

What's your first Limerick memory?

Strictly speaking my first memory would be playing in softball (that's amateur baseball) tournaments in the summers in UL. My longest relationship also started here. But the one I'll tell you about is from when I applied for my current job at Mary Immaculate College. I haven't told this story to anyone in the college! I was working in England at the time, at a university in Liverpool. I was editing and rewriting the application up to the last minute. I really wanted the job, and I started panicking that the English postal service wouldn't get the application here on time. So I made a snap decision, walked downstairs, got in my car, and drove from Liverpool to Holyhead. I arrived about midnight, parked the car there, got on the next ferry overnight to Dublin, then a 6am green bus to Limerick, and delivered the application by hand. When I stepped off the coach in Arthur's Quay, it was a beautiful sunny morning. I walked through the park, up to the edge of the water, and the view of the river and castle was just beautiful. It felt like I'd come home for the first time. I ended up using the photo I took that morning on my election leaflets!

What's your favourite part of the county/city and why?

The Gaelic Grounds! I grew up in Belfast with the GAA - Saturdays playing for the club (Éire Óg Derriaghy, Dad was the club chairman for a bit), Sundays in Casement Park for Antrim matches, and of course the annual trips to Croke Park, starting when I was four years old. I still have all the old tickets, and my U12 and U14 medals. After years living in Britain, being able to go to the league and championship matches here regularly is pure heaven. You just can't beat a senior hurling Championship match, and we get the best here.

What about a favourite local walk or view?

I love the water, so anywhere along the Shannon. I love walking along the boardwalk at Clancy Strand, and through the Westfield wetlands. The river path out past UL is so beautiful, and that's my daily commute on the bike when I'm working at UL. There's so much history there too - especially past UL, where you have the Black Castle, and the old iron bridge over the Mulcair. Or further out the coast, around Foynes, where you can imagine the flying boats landing.

How would you describe the people of Limerick?

There's a lot of resilience - there's no doubt Limerick has had some tough times, but




people here seem determined to make the best of any situation, like there's never any question of giving up in the face of adversity. There's definitely a lot of passion - you can see that most clearly in sport and music, but there's people here who are passionate about everything from politics, the history and architecture of the city, the environment, farming and food, to the Makers night in the Fab Lab. I think that passion permeates almost everything in Limerick, and I've never really felt the same sense anywhere else. Of course a lot of that passion is directed at Limerick itself, there's a lot of pride in the city and county, and I think that's what leads to so $many\,groups\,like\,Liveable\,Limerick, the\,cycle$ $campaign, \#FixLimerickBus, the\ Pedestrian$ Network, LAP, the Georgian Society, Thomond Historical Society, and to places like the People's Museum - people here want to celebrate the shared history and culture, and are passionate about making Limerick even better. And while it's a stereotypical Irish thing, I think Limerick really is such a welcoming place - it really didn't take me long to settle in after I'd moved here.

How important do you think sport is to Limerick?

Oh, it's everything. I mean, you can see the passion most clearly on a Championship hurling or Munster Rugby weekend, but that's only when it's most visible, that passion is always there. You can see that in all the people coming out to help with the teams at U10, U12 and so on. And it extends to every sport. I swear, if you put a Chinese table tennis championship on the TV in a pub in Limerick, you'd have someone yelling from the back to turn it up.

What's the biggest challenge facing the city/county today?

Transport. The city's roads are full, there's just not enough space for everyone to drive to work. It's not just the city centre either, some evenings it can take nearly an hour to get off campus by car at UL. We shouldn't need to be spending hours every day just travelling to and from work. A car should not be a compulsory price of entrance to society.

Destination Limerick: City gets Failte boost

LIMERICK City is to be allocated €500,000 by tourism agency Failte Ireland to develop its potential as a so-called destination town.

The massive project will see tourism clusters developed throughout the city.

It will focus on moving visitors the Georgian between quarter, and medieval introduce trail spurs such as the three bridges experience, each recounting Limerick's rich history.

It can also be put towards food and craft markets, areas for city centre events, public art displays as well as orientation and signage to help visitors explore the heritage.

The draw-down of the funding takes place from January, and has

been welcomed by Senator Maria Byrne.

She said: "The profile of Limerick was greatly enhanced by the very successful year of being the City of Culture in 2014. The new scheme will provide €500,000 to Limerick City and County Council to enhance public spaces in Limerick in a way that will engage tourists and enhance their experience."

She added: "Limerick is a great example of a sporting city and Thomond Park; the Gaelic Grounds and UL's Sporting Campus are famous across Ireland as symbols of our city.

"It is my hope, however, that the council can consider using this funding towards the marketing and promotion of the Medieval Quarter. The Medieval Quarter is the city's


biggest untapped resource in terms of attracting tourists to Limerick City. Limerick City and County Council need to do more to promote and market the area to tourists especially considering the significant investment it has made here in recent years.'

Failte Ireland chief executive Paul Kelly added: "The towns which reap the greatest benefits from tourism and schemes Destination Towns are those where all local tourism players work together - from local authorities and businesses to the communities

themselves, each complementing another's efforts to create a full and appealing offering for their area.

'A core focus of Fáilte Ireland's work is to drive a greater regional spread of visitors and revenue across the country," he added in a statement released this Monday.





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Medical research advances in city

€12.75m: Ribbon cut on Clinical Education & Research Centre

Limerick achieved a significant milestone in medical research this week with the ribbon cut on the €12.75m Clinical Education and Research Centre (CERC) at University Hospital Limerick (UHL).

Minister of State for Mental Health and Older People, Mr Jim Daly TD attended the grounds of UHL to officially open two flagship projects on the hospital campus CERC and the Health Sciences Academy (HSA).

The academy is a three-way partnership between UL Hospitals Group, University of Limerick (UL), and HSE Mid-West Community Healthcare which has the aim of becoming a "global standard-bearer for improving patient care through medical research, education and clinical and community-based practice".

Ahead of the opening, Minister Daly stated: "It is vital that we look to

encourage and support innovation, collaboration and integration in healthcare. The development of the Clinical Education and Research Centre alongside the Health Sciences Academy, are significant initiatives in this regard, that will greatly benefit the Mid-West region and help improve patient care."

that will greatly benefit the Mid-West region and help improve patient care."

The CERC, a €12.75m facility developed in partnership between UL Hospitals Group and -UL, and co-funded by the HSE and UL, is a four-storey building that accommodates and supports the educational, training and research needs of the UL Hospitals Group medical community, and the UL Graduate Entry Medical School (GEMS).

With a 150-seat lecture theatre and tutorial rooms, the CERC also has a library, offices for academic, administrative and technical support staff, research facilities, and a dedicated research area for the UL Health Research Institute.

The CERC building hosts the Health Science Academy which will attempt to establish the Irish Mid-West as "a global exemplar of hospital and community-based health services that are driven by education, research, and innovation and shaped by the needs of patients".

The academy intends to "harness the energies" of all three bodies, including UL's Health Research Institute and its Clinical Research Support Unit with



their focus on research projects that aim to enhance people's health and wellbeing and transform the health environment for the population.

The population of the catchment area of UL Hospitals Group and HSE Mid-West Community Healthcare is some 385,000 residents of Counties Limerick, Clare, and Tipperary.

The Academy's undergraduate and postgraduate programmes will develop students' clinical and research skills.

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Second MRI scanner to tackle waiting lists

A SECOND available MRI scanner will help tackle long-term waiting lists, Senator Maria Byrne said this

The Fine Gael senator who is running in the next General election welcomed the installation of a second MRI scanner at University Hospital Limerick (UHL), which was delivered to UHL on Sunday, following

confirmation by the Minister for Health, Simon Harris.

It is expected that UHL patients will be able to avail of the new temporary MRI scanner unit during the week starting on Monday, December 16.

"This is a much-welcomed development," said Senator Byrne. The new MRI scanner service

will operate Monday to Friday, from 8.30 to 5pm.

The new service is being operated by Alliance Medical Diagnostic Imaging Ltd for two years. There will be the option for an extension by a further two years if needed, according to Senator

The service will provide an estimated 4,500 MRI scans each

According to Senator Byrne the modular unit is a temporary solution as the Health $\rm \bar Service$ Executive (HSE) awaits planning permission for an extension of the Radiology Department at UHL to

include a permanent second MRI unit. "I am looking forward to a long-term solution being put in place to alleviate such issues," added Ms Byrne.

"A second MRI unit has been prioritised by the HSE to progress to design stage in 2020. However, this will take a number of years to deliver.

"I am delighted to announce that the modular MRI service will address this capacity deficit in the

CCTV fitted two years after murder of Rose, 78

Campaign: State-of-art cameras

ALMOST two years to the week that pensioner Rose Hanrahan was murdered, state-of-the-art CCTV has been installed in her community.

Limerick was left in shock in December 2017 when pensioner Rose Hanrahan was found strangled to death at her home in the New Road, Thomondgate.

Now, following a sustained campaign from local Sinn Fein councillor John Costelloe, closed circuit television (CCTV) has been installed at New Road in and Thomondgate nearby O'Dwyer's Villas.

Cllr Costelloe said: "I welcome the fact it's installed. Residents in the area approached me and wanted to see this happen. Most areas are looking for cameras and it's all down to funding."

"These are 360 degree cameras, monitored from Moyross. We had a tour of the facilities up there. It's a state of the art network. I'm delighted they are up and running," the northside member added.

He said: "Many Thomondgate residents are elderly. It's nice for them to feel safe in their homes. If there are cameras there, there must be follow-up if anything happens in terms of prosecution.'

While Ms Hanrahan's killer remains at large two years on with many believing he had fled to Eastern Europe - Cllr Costelloe believes had CCTV been in place at the time, there may have been different results.

Seventy-eight year old Rose was discovered by relatives in her bungalow at New Road, Thomondgate on December 15,

She was killed, gardaí believe, during a botched attempted robbery, when her killer broke in after following her home from a shopping trip.

Gardai are continuing to investigate the matter.

BT broken into with over €20k of goods stolen

GARDAI are investigating the theft of a significant quantity of goods from a flagship store in Limerick city centre.

The burglary occurred at Brown Thomas, O'Connell Street, at around 3am on Monday.

Investigating gardai say the culprits gained access to the premises by smashing a side door.

Once inside, they stole a significant quantity of property – worth in excess of €20,000. It's understood extensive damage was also caused inside the store.

CCTV footage is being examined by gardai and the store has been examined by members of the divisional scenes of crime unit.

Relief for bingo players

BINGO goers breathed a sigh of relief last week, as proposed legislation - described as being potentially "chaotic" to the hobby - was amended in the Dail.

The Ceann Comhairle allowed Sinn Féin to propose a verbal amendment to the bill and it was accepted by and the Minister of State at the Department of Justice, which will now see the bill progress to the Seanad.

"There was a very organised lobby by the commercial bingo operators against this bill, but the main objection being put forward was that there was a cap of 50% of takings at any licenced bingo game being allocated to prizes," said Deputy Maurice Quinlivan.

"The amendment changed that 50% to 75%, leaving it at the discretion of the operators as to how much they give as prizes" said the Limerick City TD.





Fears of 'false dawns' on the Horizon

THERE has been guarded optimism regarding the new €60m plan for the Horizon Mall site on the Dublin Road, which was announced earlier this week.

Paul Keller, a former Limerick City and County Councillor lives in the shadow of the Horizon Mall site, which is currently being demolished. He says that the general feeling of the locals is positive, but with an air of caution, as they have had a number of "false dawns" before.

"We have been at this crossroads before, said Mr Keller, resident of the area for the past 18 years, witnessing the rise and now the fall of the semi-built "eyesore" which stood on the site. "Anything is better than what

was there," he added. Senator Maria Byrne says she is



happy to see the Davy Real Estate proposal for the Horizon Mall site on the Dublin Road take a step forward.

"This is very welcome news, and marks a vital step in realising the full potential of the Horizon Mall site," said Senator

However, she warned that Davy Real Estates need to consult local residents on their plans: "I have written to Davy Real Estate and asked them to host a consultation Images released earlier this week by Limerick Leader show plans for the former Horizon Mall site, which is currently being demolished. The new development will bring residential units, a hotel, office space and community amenities such as a 2.8 acre

evening on their plans for Singland residents."

The development will bring 245 residential units, a 152-bedroom hotel, and over 100,000 square feet of office accommodation. It will also include two drive-thru restaurants, a service station, a building with a creche, community facilities, a multi-use games area as well as a 2.8 acre park.

Fundraiser: Transgender Limerick man raising €10k for his surgery

A YOUNG Limerick man has proved the power of the internet by launching a special fundraiser - the response of which he said has been "emotionally overwhelming".

Will Keohane from Castletroy decided to come out as transgender last month to the wider public in a bid to raise funds for gender affirmation surgery, something which is not currently available in Ireland.

So far, the 23-year-old has raised almost €8,000 of his €10,000 target for top surgery in Canada, a reconstructive surgery performed on the chest for those who wish to alter their overall appearance.

"Obviously I did not want to have to put myself in a position where I had to go so public to fundraise and put myself in a position where potentially I'm vulnerable to any

kind of negative backlash," said Will, who has been trying to secure medical help in Ireland for the past year since coming out to his close friends and family 18 months ago.

"Nobody really wants to talk publicly about healthcare, their experiences in hospitals or with doctors - especially when it's something so personal and took me a long time to come out about. I would not have chosen to come out so publicly recently if I didn't have to fundraise for my own surgery.

"That being said, the response has been truly incredible - I get messages on a daily basis from people I've never met," he explained.

"It's been a moving experience and the outpouring of support has been fantastic. It's very emotionally overwhelming, I'm trying to thank everyone because times are tough, money's tight at this time of the year and people are still willing to help me out. I want everyone to know just how thankful I am for their support."

Will plans to travel to Toronto for the surgery early next year, a location he chose after months of research, and will stay with relatives during his two-week recovery. "The surgery is expensive and no surgeon in Ireland will do the procedure, even though it is essentially a double mastectomy, which no surgeons have an issue with performing.

"Really the only option is to go abroad, but it's important to note that when you go abroad for major operation where your body is healing and you need time to recover, you need social support and people around you to help you and take care of you.

"When Irish people are being forced to go abroad, their healing is impacted and their bodies are going to respond to the lack of social support.

"It's putting the lives of Irish trans people at risk when we send them abroad and that's super serious."

Man robbed at knifepoint near maternity hospital

GARDAI are appealing for information following a knife robbery near University Maternity Hospital Limerick.

According to gardai, a man was approached by two males at around 9pm last Wednesday as he was walking near a green area at Bellfield Gardens, at the side of the hospital.

"One of the thieves brandished a knife and threatened him. He handed over a small sum of cash and they two left on foot and ran towards the Ennis Road," said Garda John Finnerty who said it was a terrifying ordeal for the victim.

Operator of medical centre fined €5,000

Planning dispute: Walk-in clinic is unauthorised

operator unauthorised walk-in medical centre near University Hospital Limerick has been fined €5,000 for failing to comply with an enforcement notice which dates back more than three years.

Limerick City and County Council had initiated legal proceedings against Cabhru Leat Teoranta in relation to the walk-in medical centre which is located at 14 St Nessan's Park, St Nessan's Road, Dooradoyle.

The enforcement proceedings, under the Planning and Development Act, were initiated in August 2016 and the matter first came before Limerick District Court

the following April.

Seeking to have the matter finalised, solicitor Will Leahy said the case had been before the court on nine separate occasions and that there was no sign of the long-running dispute being resolved.

He told Judge Marian O'Leary the medical centre has no planning permission and that the local authority continues to receive complaints about illegal parking.

Solicitor Kevin Sherry said his client has been operating the walk-in medical centre for more than four years and he submitted there has been "no adverse affect in the area" during that time.

He said a retention application was lodged in recent weeks and he requested an adjournment of the case to allow that application to be determined.

Mr Sherry added there appears to be a difference of opinion between the council's rates department and its planning department as to the nature of the premises.

A director of the company, he said, is currently living in Eastern Europe where he is receiving medical treatment for a serious illness

Opposing the application for an adjournment, Mr Leahy said the premises is unauthorised and that the local authorities costs relating to the case were almost €4,000.

In addition to the fine she awarded Limerick City and County Council its costs.

Recognisance were fixed in the event of an appeal being lodged.

Owner of pick-up truck fined over waste

THE registered owner of a pick-up truck has been fined €500 for failing to confirm where waste which was being transported on the truck had come from, writes David Hurley.

Darren Mason of Oliver Plunkett Street, St Mary's Park was before Limerick District Court over his failure to comply with a statutory notice under the provisions of the Waste Management Act.

Environmental Inspector Michael Walsh said while on duty at Oliver Plunkett Street on June 6, 2018, he observed waste being transported on a blue Toyota Dyna

He said the notice required Mr Mason to advise the local authority of the source and destination of the waste as well as the disposal method.

"It has not been complied with,"

Photographs submitted to Judge Marian O'Leary show the waste consisted of pieces of furniture and other household waste.

Barrister Liam Carroll told the court that while the vehicle is registered in his client's name, he does not own it or drive it as he is

currently disqualified.


"He should have responded (to the council), another individual controls and uses the vehicle," he said adding his client in on social welfare.

Noting the submission, solicitor Will Leahy said it is an offence for the owner of a vehicle to allow waste to be transported by a third party and he said he was aware Mr Mason owns a number of vehicles which are being "closely watched".

The defendant was ordered to pay the costs of Limerick City and County Council which totalled €962.50.



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Limerick **TD** warns renters of Dáil vote

A LIMERICK city TD has expressed his disappointment that the motion of no confidence in Eoghan Murphy was defeated narrowly in the Dáil.

Deputy Maurice Quinlivan said it was a "total joke" that Fianna Fáil abstained in this crucial vote, given the seriousness of the housing crisis in Limerick and across the State, and that "the dogs in the street can see the Minister for Housing is the wrong person for this job".

Speaking from Leinster House, Mr Quinlivan said: "This is bad news for renters, for first-time buyers, for adult children living in their parents' home and for people living in emergency accommodation, as this housing crisis is set to continue with Fine Gael

in charge.
"With rents at an all-time high, the number of people in homelessness breaking a new record, and three generations of the same family packed into the same house.

"We need a change of government urgently. We need a new radical approach," he concluded.

Lisa Smith in Limerick Prison

Single cell: Mother-of-one is under a 'special regime'

LISA Smith, who is charged with membership of a terrorist group, is currently being held in Limerick Prison, The Leader can confirm.

The 37-year-old from County Louth was deported, along with her two-year-old daughter, from Turkey last Šunday.

It is claimed that Ms Smith was radicalised while in Ireland and travelled to Syria in 2015 to join the middle eastern terror group, ISIS.

A source from the prison confirmed to The Leader that Ms Smith is being held in a single cell in the prison.

If convicted, she faces a maximum 10-year sentence.

Limerick Prison currently holds 37 female prisoners, including two under "special regime".

A senior security source confirmed that one of the two prisoners being held in the prison is under a special regime due to being a member of a "specialist organisation."

They are entitled to all of the services. But you just have to be mindful, from a security aspect, of what they are charged with. We just have to be mindful of the regime that we have them on," the source added. "We have to go on the Mission Statement that is safe and secure custody for everyone - the safety of

the prisoners and the safety of the staff. We have to look at the secrecy surrounding them, the nature of the charges and all that."

The prisoner deemed to be a higher risk, or at higher risk would be kept separate from other prisoners. This is done at a case by case basis.

Ms Smith has a charge against her that states that between October 28.

2015 and December 1 this year, at a location outside of the State, she did commit an act that, if committed in the State would constitute an offence under Section 21 of the Offences Against the State Act, as amended by Section 5 of the Criminal Justice (Terrorist Offences) Act 2005.

The offence is under Section 6 (1) (b) (i) and 7 (2) of the Criminal Justice (Terrorism Offences) Act 2005.

Riverside city defibrillator installed

A LIFE-saving device has been installed in the city, and is set to aid in the work a vital Limerick organisation.

Limerick Suicide Watch have placed (Automated External Defibrillator) at St Michael's Rowing Club, described as "a huge asset to both Limerick Suicide Watch and the People of Limerick" by a LSW spokesperson.

"An AED is a life-saving

piece of equipment that should be used when someone is in cardiac arrest," said LSW first aid officer Sean Lyons.

"Time is vital when it comes to a cardiac arrest and 71% of out of hospital cardiac arrests in Ireland occur in an urban area, therefore, it is important for Limerick Suicide Watch volunteers to have quick access to AED's should they

An AED is already carried with the bike and foot patrols and the St Michael's AED brings to three the number of AEDs

available to LSW while on

The \overline{AED} is available to the public 24/7 365 days of the vear.

It is registered with the National Ambulance Service and is stored in a cabinet that requires an access code.

The code for the cabinet can be obtained from the 999 call handler. Simply ring 999, state the Eircode of the AED's location and the Call Handler will provide you with the access code.

The Eircode for the AED's location is written on the outside of the AED Cabinet. The AED is equipped with adult and pediatric pads as well as accompanying kit required for the correct preparation of chest and CPR.

"We would like to say a big thank you to St Michael's Rowing Club for their continuous support and fundraising during the Urban Run this summer," the LSW spokesperson added.



LIT sharing in tech funding

LIT gets share of €26m tech funding

LIMERICK Institute of Technology (LIT) has been allocated over €400,000 in technology funding.

The news was confirmed by Fine Gael Seanad Spokesperson on **Education and Skills** Senator Maria Byrne, who announced that €406,520 was received by LIT under the government's Regional **Technology Clustering** Fund.

A great pub steeped in history

MYLES Breen's Select Bar has stood at 18, Shannon Street in Limerick city since 1802. Since the early Nineteenth Century its façade has witnessed disparate archetypes of traffic, not just humans but from horsedrawn wagons to the contemporary motorcar.

Nonetheless, one thing which has survived to remain the same is

its establishment as a public house and as an institution of Munster rugby.

This pub is situated on a street which links Limerick's city centre with the majestic River Shannon. It's neighbouring sites include the place where the world famous Shakespearean actress Ada Rehan was born, or two doors down at the

spot where Adam Clayton called 'the exact point of becoming U2' occurred on March 18, 1978 when the band, performing as U2 for the very first time, won the Limerick Civic Week Pop Group '78 competition.


Myles Breen's interior lends itself to be split into three sections; a top section, middle and bottom. Its snug and amiable atmosphere is created by a combination of contrasting factors: good staff, patterned upholstery, polished mahogany and of course, the red relief wallpaper littered with a framed gallery of precursory sporting events.

When sport is not on the television, the only friendly music

that can be heard is the art of conversation, sounding from mouths and lingering on the ears of each of its customers. It caters for clientele of all ages.

Top tips for a sustainable Christmas

Academics at UCC Environmental Research Institute (ERI), have come together to dream of a green Christmas, writes Eoin Hahessy

1 BUY A REAL CHRISTMAS

Given that it involves cutting down trees, this might at first sound counter-intuitive as a sustainability measure. After all, you could re-use a fake tree year after year, sparing a tree every time. But that would be the wrong way to look at it because your plastic tree will eventually end up in landfill, whereas if demand for real trees continues then they will keep being replanted. (Dr Markus Eichhorn, School Biological, Ecological, Earth Environmental Sciences)

2 GIVE THE GIFT OF A PLANT

Now is a good time of year to take cuttings from your house plants and pot them up as gifts for your nearest and dearest. It's easy to take from many succulents, spider plants or Christmas Cactus and pop

them into some peat-free compost in a recycled or re-usable plant Alternatively, mid-winter is a good time to plant a deciduous tree outside in Ireland as it will need the full spring season to develop a decent root-system for the drier months. – (Dr Eoin Lettice, Plant Scientist at the School of Biological, Earth and Environmental Sciences (BEES) and the Environmental Research Institute (ERI) at UCC)

3 MAKE YOUR OWN CRACKERS

15 million crackers will be pulled in Ireland over Christmas, contributing further plastic waste. Maybe consider making your own Čhristmas home-made crackers with recyclable materials (and better jokes). (Dr Tom Reed, Senior Lecturer in Zoology, School of Biological, Earth and

(BEES), UCC)

4 CHESTNUTS ROASTING ON

If you've been burning coal, peat or wood in your living

room fire, then you have been very naughty indeed. Domestic Solid Fuel burning is one of the largest sources of air pollution in Ireland. Your fire is not only harmful to you in your own house, but also to your neighbours, because 90% of the smoke and chemical fumes end up next door. Burning coal, wood and peat is especially harmful to asthmatics, the young, the old, people with existing heart conditions and the pregnant. And just think what it does to poor old Santa when he tries to deliver your fantastic presents down the chimney. We can only hope that he has good medical insurance! To keep Santa (and us) healthy, wherever you live in Ireland, then put some solar panels on your roof, insulate your homes better and install a heat (John Sodeau, pump. Emeritus Professor Chemistry, UCC)

5 BE A SUSTAINABLE FOODIE

Try to resist buying enough food to feed an army, as much of this will probably end up as waste - instead, try a 'refuse, reuse, rot' approach to your food shopping. Refuse to overbuy, reuse all leftovers and rot or compost what's left. Planning ahead by ordering your fruit and vegetables through a local box scheme, enjoy some social festivities and visit your local farmers market, or buy in bulk (plastic-free, of course!) and batch cook so that you've more time to enjoy family traditions. (Dr Claire O'Neill and Professor Mary McCarthy, UCC CUBS)

6 DON'T FIGHT AT THE DINNER TABLE!

The Christmas family get

together is famed for its fights and fall-outs - all that food, mulled wine, and being cooped up for one day with your nearest and dearest can prove too much. We are always advised to avoid talking about religion and politics at the dinner table. Likewise, if climate change is an issue that raises some hackles at the Christmas dinner table, and one that you feel strongly about, we would recommend that you listen as much as you talk, avoid reciting too many climate change facts, and connect the issue to everyday life such as that local cycle path that could be extended to the community school. Of course, try to avoid gloom and doom and focus on the positive benefits of climate action - it is Christmas after all! - (Dr Paul Bolger, Manager Environmental Research Institute, UCC)

7 LEAVE THE DOOR OPEN FOR

SANTA

An open fireplace with a chimney is very handy for Santa but he can also choose to come in the door if you decide to install an efficient stove or upgrade your heating system. Burning a fuel like coal in your fireplace over the winter produces about 1 tonne of Carbon Dioxide (a heat-trapping gas). This is similar to a person taking a return flight to New York. Heat-trapping gasses are causing our climate to change in ways that are not good so trying to reduce our emissions is the perfect gift for the planet! (Dr Paul Deane, Energy Policy and Modelling Group, MaREI Centre)

8 THINK ELECTRIC

Christmas can be when we mull buying a new car for next year. So look at the electric options, you can now choose from battery-electric vehicles (BEV) to plug-in hybrid-electric vehicles (PHEV) to hybrid-electric vehicles (HEV). BEVs have a motor tax of €120. A HEV, such as the Toyota Corolla, costs about 7c/km and comes with a motor tax of €170.

9 AVOID THE PLASTIC!

Earlier this year UCC researchers found plastic 2,100m under the sea off Co Kerry coast. When buying presents look at their plastic wrapping, try to avoid toys or other gifts that would increase the amount of plastic waste you generate. Why not replace the glossy, non-recycled wrapping with recycled paper? Whenever possible try to buy your gifts and food from local sources and in family-owned shops, to promote local communities and also reduce the carbon footprint of transporting things all over the world. Nowadays we all enjoy internet shopping, but one should take this time of the year to reflect on the environmental and social costs of big online retailers (Dr Rossana Henriques, Senior Lecturer in Plant Genetics at the School of BEES, UCC)

10 THINK OF THE BIRDS!

Climate change is occurring so fast that common birds $such as \, magpies \, cannot \, adapt$ and are at the risk of extinction. This Christmas leave the gift of water and the correct food out for our feathered friends.



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

RELAND needs to think big. Our population is increasing and I personally welcome the diversity. However it's time to get planning.

Business and some political leaders like their 'BHAGs', their Big Hairy Audacious Goals.

The phrase was originally coined by James Collins and Jerry Porras in their book, Built to Last: Successful Habits of Visionary

Essentially, it involves setting a clear, definable target and going for it. the needs to be a stretch to take you out of your comfort zone, where it's out of reach but not out

BHAG encourages businesses to define visionary goals that are more strategic and emotionally compelling. They are in effect are long term goals. I learnt something from my MBA in UCD Smurfit

Examples of BHAGs include:

- US President John F Kennedy: "Land a man on the moon by the end of this decade (the 6os) and return him safely"
- Bill Gates of Microsoft: "A computer on every desk and in every home"

Vision and leadership create optimism and positivity. Our political leaders could take note

However, for me, this notion of BHAG is not just the preserve of big $business\, or\, government.$

This brilliant concept can be adapted for our personal lives. We all need a Big Hairy Audacious Goal in our life. This goal can achieved by consistently working outside of a comfort zone and displaying commitment and confidence.

BHAGs are bigger, bolder and more powerful than regular medium and short term goals.

"Out of reach but not out of sight" — I like this notion when it comes to identifying your BHAG. True vision is a balance between these two ideas. If you cannot picture or imagine achieving your vision, no matter how hard you try, it is likely that it's 'out of sight' or that it doesn't fit your passions, purpose, values and beliefs.

On the other hand, a vision that is easily achieved and can simply be grasped tomorrow, within the

BHAGs are bigger, bolder and more powerful than regular medium and short term goals

next month, or next year, is not really a vision. Your vision needs to be a future-oriented goal that is exciting, inspiring, motivating and challenges you to achieve more and to push yourself beyond your comfort zone.

I believe the bruising encounter with the aftermath of the Celtic Tiger has offered a rebalancing of what a true personal BHAG would look like.

Indeed, I think your BHAG needs to be rooted in your core values or your core purpose as a person. This takes you to the heart of the matter.

For me standing for the Seanad NUI panel back in 2016 was a way to express a vision of a society where wellbeing is fundamental to our actions—in housing, health, tackling inequality and homelessness while promoting positive mental health and suicide prevention which are immediately accessible, comprehensive and compassionate.

Examples of personal BHAGs may

- Having a positive relationship with your children for life
- To be happy, authentic and
- Completing a marathon or Ironman or other fitness goals
- To live by the sea or in a particular location
- To be debt free
- To establish financial goals for retirement
- To attain educational goals a degree, a Masters, a Doctorate
- Seeing your grandchildren
- Being self-employed and being a leader in a field
- Learning a new language and $living\,in\,that\,country$

 Starting a charity that accords your core values

One BHAG that I like is for you to become your real self. That's the person you always wanted to be: positive and confident, unconcerned about the opinions of others, comfortable in your own skin, at peace.

OK, time for some work — think now a big, hairy, audacious goal that you might want to pursue now or later.

Use these questions to figure out whether your big hairy audacious goal is worth it:

- How important is the goal to
- Does this goal fit with your
- How beneficial would its substantial achievement be to yourself, your family, friends, and
 - How likely are you to achieve

the goal, at least in substantial

• If you fail, how big a price would you pay? What's the worst outcome that realistically could occur and is there a way to reduce the risk while still allowing for the benefits?

Right, you have identified your BHAG and challenged yourself to go for it — now it's time to progress it. Your next challenge is to list out five milestones for your goal. These might be five steps you need to take in order to reach your goal, or intermediate goals to reach between now and the end of the

Write your first five small steps toward achieving it. Baby steps can make even scary goals less so.

Building your BHAG on your strengths is a great starting point to personal growth. Your strengths are a mixture of your talents, skills and knowledge. We all have

resilience and personal resources. Using your strengths will help you get to your BHAG as you will engage with energy and engagement.

Achievers spend most of their time using their strengths. They focus on developing strengths and managing weaknesses. They may not have more strengths than the average person, but they have learned to utilise them better and to apply them to their BHAG.

You too can achieve your BHAG. Fire up your creativity and passion and remember the journey needs to be as enjoyable as the arrival. I invite you and Ireland to Dream

She has just launched the first book of the 'Boogawooga' series inspired by a funny mimic her late father Jason would perform for her and Jack, up until his tragic death. She hopes to continue the series.

Sarah, along with her older brother Jack, had to deal with grief at a very young age due to the death of their mother from a fatal asthma attack. Jack was two years old, while Sarah was only 12 weeks old. This was followed by the tragic death of their father, Jason Corbett, a few years later.

Sarah, who was eight years old when her father passed, tells me, "So, some kids have a really gentle fun life. For some of us, we are not so lucky. Mine was kind of not so cool. My birth Mom died when I was 12 weeks old. When I was four, I went to live in America with my Dad to start a new life for us. My Dad was the most important person in my life all my life. He died suddenly when I was just 8 years old and my brother was 10."

Sarah, who has performed for the Voice UK judges and dreams of being an actor, says that reading about other people's hard times makes her "feel less alone". This inspired her to write her own story.

Aimed at kids between 3 and 10, the books will be Sarah's own experiences but told through the characters in the book, and will give a positive look at family life and loss.



Limerick City and County Council: I, Health Service Executive, intend to apply to the above-named authority for retention permission for alterations and permission for proposed changes and completion of works relating to the previously permitted development ref-erence 18-627 (The development of a four storey plus rooftop plantroom extension to the existing hospital to pro-vide a 60-bed ward block along with minor adjustments to the adjacent hospital buildings and associated site works and site services together with develop-ment of 20 public car parking spaces and associated boundary screening) at the University Hospital Limerick Campus, St. Nessan's Road, Dooradoyle, Limerick. The application site is located within an Architectural Conservation Area and there is an existing Protected Structure on the Hospital Campus (Hospital Chapel RPS S.E.30). 

'They can play whomever they want, we'll see them Saturday'

Saracens Test: Munster are relishing the challenge of London visit

THIS week's Munster Rugby press conference was dominated by the potential make up of Saracens team for this Saturday's 3pm meeting in the Champions Cup.

Much was made of Saracens' decision to leave their frontline internationals at home ahead of last weekend's 10-3 win for Munster at Thomond Park and once more attention has turned to who will line up in Black this weekend.

"They can play whomever they want and we'll see them Saturday" was one thought Munster's James

The loosehead prop was attempting to return focus to

his side and what they have to this weekend to go back to back against the European and English Premiership champions.

"We missed a few opportunities last weeknd. Maybe two or three. We know they are a quality outfit. Over there this week we know we miss those opportunities and still win. The onus is on us as a group to get better and convert those chances" he added.

Munster's head coach Johann van Graan is expecting to name a similar strength side to the won that claimed four match points on Saturday.

"We took quiet a few knocks over the weekend. It was because of the weather and there were a lot of

collisions, especially around maul, scrum, tackle and breakdown. A lot of things went on, especially in the tackle. So a lot of guys took knocks, to the head, neck and shoulders. We foresee though that everyone involved last weekend will be available"

Also available this week is South African born backrow Chris Cloete who has returned from a head injury. There is still no return date for long standing injuries such as Tyler Bleyendaal (neck), Dave Kilcoyne (calf) or Joey Carbery (ankle).

With mixed news on the injury front, Munster also have the issue of Arno Botha's red card hanging over them.

The number was issued with a red card during his club's Heineken Champions Cup, Round 3 match against Saracens at Thomond Park.

Botha was sent off by the referee, Romain Poite, in the 81st minute of the match for striking the Saracens replacement, Nick Tompkins, with his arm in contravention of Law 9.12.

Dan White (England), Chair, Frank Hadden (Scotland) and Marcello d'Orey (Portugal) have been appointed independent Disciplinary Committee for the hearing which will take place at the London office of Bird & Bird LLP on Wednesday, December 11.

Sanctions for foul play, relating to striking with the arm carries a sanction scale of - Low End: 2 weeks; Mid-range: 6 weeks; Top end: 10 to 52 weeks.

Should Botha miss out, van Graan admits that the 6-2 forward split on the bench, which has served his side well this season, might need to be rethought this weekend.

"Every week we look at what lies ahead. It has certainly worked for us thus far. You have to look at the possible weather conditions, the pitch, the opposition. We will make that call closer to the game. The biggest difference for us this week is the surface. They have only lost once there in Europe, so we know what to expect" finished the head coach.

Munster's game with Saracens is live on BT Sport on Saturday at 3pm, while it is also on radio on Live95.

CAMOGIE

The promotion up senior was timely with a 2014 All-Ireland minor A title win – three years after an All-Ireland minor B title.

Up senior, Limerick made a break through in 2019 when reaching the knockout stages for the first time in 15 years.

On the club scene, five different clubs won county senior camogie championship titles across the decade; 2010-'19.

Granagh-Ballingarry lead the way with six titles; including a 5-in-a-row from 2013-17. Ahane won in 2018, while there was a title each for Ballyagran and Killeedy at the start of the decade, with Newcastle West winning in 2019.

LADIES FOOTBALL

It was a 10 year period that saw Limerick win silverware in Croke Park at the beginning and end of the decade.

In both the 2010 and 2018 All-Ireland junior championship finals, Limerick defeated Louth.

While Limerick did earn promotion into the intermediate ranks, most of the decade was played in the junior grade.

In league football, Limerick

spent most of the decade in Division Four – reaching four finals 2010 (lost to Leitrim), 2020 (lost to Longford), 2015 (lost to Offaly) and 2016 (beat Antrim).

On the club scene, there were five county senior ladies football champions – Ballylanders and St Ailbes leading the way with three titles each. Monagea won two crowns, while there was a win each for Athea and Mungret at the beginning of the decade.

This Limerick Ladies Football Team of the decade contains players from nine different clubs – Mungret lead the way with four players. St Ailbes have three representatives and Feohanagh-Castlemahon have two. There is one player selected from each of Monagea, Ballylanders Gerald Griffins, Old Mill, Fr Caseys and Murroe-Boher.

The 'Banner men' of Clare are at 12/1, priced the same as Davy Fitzgerald's Wexford.


