WITH so much happening at Christmas time, it is easy for us to forget the real meaning of Christmas and just eat, drink and be merry to excess.

And without trying to sound pious, if you want to do something truly meaningful and feel better for it, visit an elderly neighbour or relative this Christmas.

One of the saddest stories in our paper in recent weeks was the report from an inquest hearing of a man whose decomposed body was found at his home shortly before Christmas last year. He had been dead for several weeks.

What's your idea of a perfect day or a perfect weekend in Limerick?

After my usual breakfast of porridge, fruit, eggs and tomatoes with my wife, Ailish, my perfect day would include a morning in my studio where I'm currently working on a set of illustrations. After lunch, I would enjoy meeting my friends at the Hedge School Cottage in Newtown, Clarina, not far from where I live. To finish the perfect day, I would join with my fellow choir members in our local church as we prepare for the Christmas season.

What's your first Limerick memory?

Walking down from my childhool home in Old Park Road, Corbally, with my father, Martin, to the Shannon Fields where he taught me how to swim.

What's your favourite part of the city (or county) and why?

You don't know your Limerick unless you have taken in the view of the lower Shannon from Newtown Hill in Clarina and then taken a stroll down to see the Sailor's Haggard and the Hedge School Cottage at the bottom of the hill.

What about a favourite walk or view?

As an artist, I think there can be nothing more beautiful in Limerick city than the view from Clancy Strand taking in the Currogher Falls at low tide and looking over at King John's Castle with the Clare hills in the background. The light on this scene after a heavy shower of rain is something that always delights me.

What do you think gives Limerick its unique identity?

Limerick combines a rich historical past with a modern, forward-looking environment. The River Shannon is a striking reminder of its Viking and maritime history, while Georgian Limerick recalls a time of prosperity and gracious living. Nowadays, the University of Limerick, in particular, and other fine educational institutions, along with worldclass industries, are helping to define Limerick as a modern city.

Do you have a favourite local restaurant or pub?

I don't really have a favourite restaurant, but I always enjoyed going to Greene's ofLittle Catherine Street ona Saturday morning. I would head up the stairs and sit under the stained glass window to have a perfectly cooked Irish breakfast served by friendly staff, with Lyric FM playing in the

background.

How would you describe the people of Limerick?

"I never saw a greater number of kind, pleasing, clever-looking faces among any set of people," was William Thackery's view on a visit to Limerick. That about sums it up! In my experience, Limerick people have wide-ranging qualities, from being sports mad enthusiasts to ardent music lovers. They are what makes Limerick the lively, interesting city it is.

How important do you think sport is to Limerick?

Sport is hugely important in Limerick. Just look at the magnificent Thomond Park and the resurgence of hurling in both city and county. Many in my own family have been involved in sport down through the years. My uncle Paddy O'Farrell was national champion in the pole-vault and hurdles, while another uncle, John O, was honorary secretary of Shannon RFC for over 50 years. I enjoyed being a member of St Munchin's senior rugby team in the late 60s and then as a player with Shannon alongside my school friend and, later, mayor of Limerick, Thady Coughlan.

If you could add one amenity to Limerick what would it be?

In recent years, there has been a concerted effort to turn Limerick to the river. I would like to see further development in this area.

What's the biggest challenge facing the city (or county) today?

Limerick city has become a doughnut. Walk around the streets on any Saturday morning and, apart from the buzz at the market, there is relatively little movement of people elsewhere. High parking charges are a major disincentive to people coming into the city. This has the effect of undermining business and making Limerick less vibrant and alive than it could and should be.

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Coroner says suicide verdicts are important

THE Coroner for Limerick says it would be wrong of him not to return verdicts of suicide and to do so would be a disservice to those who have taken their own lives. John McNamara made his

comments following the inquest of a man who drowned after he entered the river Shannon earlier this year.

While members of the man's

family accepted the facts surrounding his death, they commented that he did not want to die and was planning for the future. "He wouldn't have killed himself," said one relative.

Mr McNamara noted the family's views but said a verdict of suicide was appropriate in the circumstances.

He accepted there is a presumption in law against a verdict of suicide and that the evidence to support such a verdict

must be compelling. In the specific case, he noted that gardai had obtained CCTV footage showing the 41-year-old entering the water.

He told the man's relatives that it is important for "statistical reasons" that verdicts of suicide are recorded by coroners across

the country. He said suicide is a problem in Limerick and across the country and that the statistics will influence and inform various State

agencies who have been tasked with dealing with the issue.

"If we were to rule them (and record other verdicts) there would be no suicides in the country," he said the only other option was an 'open verdict'.

Mr McNamara said it is incumbent on everyone to do what they can to reduce the number of suicides in Ireland.

"If we don't face it down, we are doing the people who died a disservice," he stated.

Cyclist abused for confronting motorists

Motorist parked in cycle lane: 'I don't give a s***'

"I DON'T give a s*** was the reply Aidan Hogan received when he told a motorist that he might be killed due to the driver blocking the cycle lane, forcing him to cycle out into traffic.

"When you say to someone that you are worried that you might be killed and they say that they don't care, it's not something you hear in such explicit terms every day," said Aidan

Aidan took to Twitter to share a video that showcases the obstacles that cyclists face while navigating the city. In the video, he comes across a number of cars that are blocking the cycle lane outside Colbert Station.

"When I got to the section directly outside Colbert Station there was a car parked in the cycle lane blocking my path which meant I had to move out into general traffic with the increased risk that goes with that," said Aidan.

In the video, Aidan speaks to the drivers of two of the cars informing them that they are parked in the cycle lane. When speaking to the second driver, Aidan can be heard telling the driver that he could be killed as he pulls out into traffic, to which they reply "I don't give a s***". The motorist also tells Aidan: "We have to stop somewhere, blame the corporation."

One thing I want to make sure you include is that it is my experience that the majority of drivers are considerate and accommodating to cyclists and I did not want a narrative of 'cyclists versus motorists' applied to this issue. The bigger issue is the proper prioritisation, planning, and design of cycling infrastructure in the city and the proper enforcement of traffic and parking rules.

"The powers that be in the city and nationally need to prioritise investment in cycling infrastructure. Currently, any such investment appears to be a box-ticking exercise with

piecemeal infrastructure being built in an ad-hoc manner. There needs to be a change of mindset in political and county council executives that prioritise active travel and public transport and reduces the dominance of private cars."

Despite occurrences such as this, Aidan says that he will continue to cycle.

"Taking up cycling has been a hugely positive change since I started six months ago. Although I have to put up with a variation of this kind of thing most days, the physical and mental health benefits far outweigh the downsides and I've no intention of stopping cycling anytime soon."

No progress on incineration ban just yet

THE INCINERATION ban proposed by Limerick City and County Councill has been hindered by regional and national policy, a situation which has been described as "an erosion of public democracy," by a council member.

At the recent Meeting of the Economic Development, Enterprise and Planning SPC, an update was given to the committee on

the progress of the Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy (RSES), a 12-year plan which was unveiled earlier this

year. During the discussion, it was remarked how the submission councils to $amend \, the \, strategy \, to \, include$ an incineration ban in the county was rejected by the West Regional Mid

Authority. "All along we've been told that we can't propose a ban on incineration in our local planning documents as it has to be consistent with regional and national planning documents," said Cllr James Collins to the Limerick Leader last week.

"When we now try and modify the County Development Plan, it won't be consistent with RSES which they didn't allow us to make a submission to," he added, "they didn't agree with it."

Amendments can only be made to the current County

Development Plan if it is brought forward by chief executive Pat Daly and voted on by councillors.

"Thousands of Limerick people took to the streets to protest against incineration, the vast majority of councillors are against it - as are the public who are asking us as councillors and their public representatives what are we doing about this, they're asking why this is allowed.

"When we try and change local policy we are told we can't as

we need to comply with national policy. But then when we're asked for our submissions on national

and regional policy it's rejected. It's being

imposed own upon us and we're not being allowed to change it. It's an erosion of public democracy.

"The council, when we challenge them on why they granted planning permission for the incinerator in Mungret they said they had no choice and that their application complies with the policies as written at the time. So we said we would change those policies but now we're being prevented from doing that.

"It's very frustrating," he added, "Limerick people are not going to tolerate an incinerator at the edge of their city, it's outrageous."

The overarching purpose of the RSES is to support the programme for change set out in Project Ireland 2040.

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of cars are targeted by thieves

MORE than 2,300 thefts from cars were reported in Limerick over the past three years, new figures have revealed.

Gardai have launched a new Park Smart initiative in an effort to reduce the number of parked cars which are being broken into across the country.

Figures released on Monday show that between January 2016 and the end of last month, 2,329 thefts from cars were reported in the Limerick division.

This is the highest for any garda division outside Dublin and represents around 5% of the national total.

The analysis also shows that the most common location for these thefts are in driveways, and that the most common times are between 12 midnight and 6am.

What is happening now is criminals will go around areas like housing estates and streets where lots of cars are parked up and they will try every car door because they know we are leaving some of them unlocked. Let's not make it easy for these criminals, make sure to lock you vehicle every time," said crime prevention officer James O'Donovan.

Gardai say valuable property should not be left in cars which should be parked in a secure, well-lit location. Keys should also be kept safe and out of sight.

Thousands Commissioner anxious to reduce courthouse numbers

Security: Talks underway to enable gardai to return to core duties

THE Garda Commissioner has confirmed efforts are underway to reduce the number of gardai who are required to carry our security duties at Limerick Courthouse.

Since the new complex opened at Mulgrave Street, gardai have been deployed to perform non-core duties such as manning the custody suite.

A number of politicians have highlighted the matter in recent months after official figures from Department of Justice confirmed that up to 21 gardai can be deployed at the courthouse at any one time

depending on the number of courts which are sitting.

Responding to questions at a meeting of the Limerick Joint

Policing Committee, Drew Harris said it is an issue and that talks are underway with a number of State agencies in the hope of returning some of the gardai to core duties.

"It's a specific project, we are working with the both the Department of Justice and the Department of the Taoiseach in terms of delivery of that but we have to find an alternative means and the Courts Service have to work with us to find an alternative means of securing the courts that everybody is content with," he said.

While no timescale has been agreed, Commissioner Harris has indicated there is unlikely to be change over the next 12 months.

He said the current situation evolved as it was "just convenient" but that it cannot continue indefinitely.

Members of the JPC were told somebody will have to pay for the security and that several options are on the table.

a number "There are of alternatives and I wouldn't want to say it's this or it's that and, indeed, it's for the Courts Service to determine what is the best way of taking this forward together with ourselves,".

Some members of the JPC noted that a private security firm is contracted at the Criminal Courts of Justice in Dublin.



LIMERICK City and County Council has secured judgments against a number of companies over the non-payment of thousands of euro in commercial rates, writes David Hurley.

Proceedings relating to three different companies were before Judge Mary Cashin at a sitting of Limerick District Court.

In each case, evidence was given by a rates collector as to the amount of money

which is outstanding. Judge Cashin was also told that in each case demands for payment have remained unpaid for several months.

Judgments totalling almost €14,400 were granted with the local authority also being awarded its costs and and expenses.

A total of 20 rates prosecutions against more than a dozen companies and individuals were before the court with the

majority being adjourned until early in the new year.

Limerick Prison inmates have Free Voices with book

A BOOK of stories and poems all written by inmates of Limerick Prison has been launched and is available to the public.

Free Voices is a special anthology of creative writing, and was published in collaboration with Limerick Writers Centre (LWC).

The book, available from the Centre, builds on the success of Voices from The Cave, which was created in a partnership between LWC and the Mid-West Regional Drugs and Alcohol Forum.

 $The finished \, product \, is \, a \, result \, of$ workshops that took place in the prison last year, with the prison's English teacher Janet Fulop saying: "It was absolutely brilliant, everyone loved it and people who thought they weren't a bit creative were all of a sudden creating beautiful short stories and poems, it was wonderful.

"As a result they were thrilled to believe they would be in print, they never thought that was possible."

LWC director, Dominic Taylor, said: "We are launching what I believe to be an important book, possibly for some of us, for the first

time we can see the raw reality, the underside of the lives of some of the writers in here.

"I believe that it is important to bring together the individual voices that make up this anthology, as it makes visible what was previously unrecognised."

The book launch, held on Friday, December 13, also saw the donation of various other handmade crafts by inmates to worthy causes such as Limerick Animal Welfare, Milford Hospice and Crumlin Children's Hospital, which also received painted ceramic hearts.

One inmate, who made multiple

quilts to donate, said: "when I came in here first I couldn't thread a machine, now I could spend five or six hours at the machine. These charities, especially Limerick Animal Welfare, are charities that I've always supported - even outside these walls. I try to do one thing every year for them."

Head teacher Anita Dooley, said: "There's an awful perception that when someone comes into prison, that's it - he's on the wrong road. But us teachers recognise potential, and recognise talents that they didn't know they even had and make them feel good about themselves.'



Ross urged to save senior soccer in city

Sport: Task force call to help bring soccer back

SPORTS Minister Shane Ross has been asked to intervene urgently to save senior soccer in Limerick.

At this month's metropolitan district meeting, an emergency motion from Fianna Fail councillor Jerry O'Dea, calling on Mr Ross to act was passed unanimously.

It follows the devastating news last week that Limerick FC is to be wound up and will not compete in division one in the upcoming season.

It comes after the club's holding company failed to come out of an examinership process and ran out of time to source new investors. At the metropolitan district

meeting, members requested the council's chief executive Dr Pat Daly to contact Mr Ross asking him to "explore ways to ensure the continuance of senior football in

Limerick".

The motion also instructed the chief executive to reach out to local businesses, the Market's Field stadium and the wider footballing family to convene a task force.

Cllr O'Dea said: "Since its inception in 1937, Limerick has always fielded a team in the League of Ireland. For the third city of Ireland and a city just this week again labelled Ireland's Sporting Capital by Roisin Upton, it's unthinkable that we as a council would stand by without taking immediate action."

Metropolitan leader, Cllr James Collins added: "It's unthinkable that Limerick does not have a senior football team. If this was a Dublin club, the Minister would have intervened straight away. There is great support for a team in Limerick."

Cllr Daniel Butler, Fine Gael added: "Limerick is a proud soccer

city. It's the volunteers I feel most aggrieved for as well as the supporters who gave the team great support through lean times like this. Football is the lifeblood of the city. The removal of senior football tears the heart out of the city."

"The standard of footballer here in the city is incredible. To see footballers playing professionally outside Limerick is incredible. But we are now in a situation where we are looking at years of recovery," he added.

However, Mayor Michael Sheahan, while welcoming the sentiment of the motion, insisted: "It's not the ministers job to protect every club in difficulty, every club that goes into liquidation." But Cllr O'Dea retorted: "It's

unthinkable this situation has come about. We owe it to the city and the youth of the city to make this happen."

Metro councillors call for €12.30 living wage

METROPOLITAN councillors have unanimously called on government to introduce a €12.30 living wage in 2020.

A motion passed at this month's council meeting by Sinn Fein's John Costelloe will see the local authority lobby the government to introduce this, with appropriate legal protections for small firms which can show they cannot afford to pay this.

The northside councillor's motion received cross party backing, including from Mayor Michael Sheahan, who said: "So many people's disposable income is spent on staying alive. It's high-time we

looked at this." Cllr Conor Sheehan also backed the call, saying it was his Labour colleague Ged Nash who set up the low-pay commission when the party was in government.

Cllr Costelloe said: "I believe every worker across Ireland should be paid at least enough for their labour for them to be able to achieve $a\,minimum\,acceptable\,standard\,of$ living. A national living wage act should be introduced urgently."

He argued this wage could also save the state a big sum in the working family payment scheme, as well as have a positive tax take impact.

Cash and phone stolen in four-minute burglary

GARDAI are investigating the theft of a mobile phone and a quantity of cash from a commercial premises in the city centre.

ONE very special four-legged visitor is raising spirits at University Hospital Limerick.

Eight-year-old labrador Bonnie is a therapy dog who has been a regular visitor to the paediatric unit at UHL for the past two years, visiting and playing with young inpatients and day patients, and brightening the day for those at Children's Ark.

Her handler and owner is Emma Hogan, who works at UHL.

Hogan is a lifelong animal lover who saw her voluntary work with Irish Therapy Dogs as a way of "giving something back".

"The children are here as inpatients, or they might be coming in for day treatments, either of which can involve a lot of waiting and sitting around, which can be difficult for a child. But when they see Bonnie,

their eyes just light up," Hogan explained. "It's incredible what dogs can

"It's incredible what dogs can achieve, and the connections they make."

"Bonnie is very good with children who have learning disabilities or autism, and those who may never talk. When they see Bonnie, you can see a flicker of recognition and a smile, and it's amazing to witness," she said.

"It's one of the best things we've done here. Bonnie makes such a huge difference to everybody in the Children's Ark when she and Emma come in for their visits," said Kris Buckley, the Senior Play Specialist at Children's Ark.

"It's incredible the benefits that assistance dogs can bring. There is a girl here who suffers from anxiety, and she has an assistance dog. She came in for an EEG, and she just froze when the staff went to place the stickers on her. But the dog went up against the bed and buried his head into the girl's lap, and she calmed right down. The staff, who were then able to complete the EEG, had never seen anything like it before and were completely amazed," Kris said.

"Bonnie brightens everyones day," she added.

SVP marks 'most worrying time of the year'

"THERE are people who have to do this every night," said Fr Seamus Enright, referring to the Redemptorist annual SleepOut, which aims to raise funds for their Christmas Hamper Appeal.

The seven hardy individuals who spent the night in a tent on the corner of O'Connell Street and Thomas Street, had to face near freezing conditions and horrid rain.

"Even the cold during the day, just standing out in the streets, gave you a slight idea of what is like to be living out there. It was very tough for those who slept out for the night. The rain got into the tent meaning they couldn't. It gave them an idea of what it is like to live like that, but only the slightest idea. There are people who have to do this every night," said Fr Enright. "It was bleak night, so it was

tough for those who stayed out overnight. I wasn't one of them, I was lucky and took the day shifts. There was a lot of good conversation and a lot of generosity from passers-by," he added.

The money will go towards the Christmas Hamper Appeal, with the Redemptorists setting a massive goal of €200,000. "We have been so busy, we haven't had the chance to count the money, and rain got into the buckets so we couldn't use the counting machines. This means we don't have a figure yet, but I am confident, the people were generous," said Fr

Vigil: Neighbours gather to pray for murder victim

GARDAI have confirmed that 'substantial progress' has been made into the investigation into the murder of Rose Hanrahan, who's life was brutally taken in her home two years ago. A garda source also confirmed that they

were at a critical stage of the investigation. The news comes after a vigil was held on Monday night to honour the second

anniversary of Rose's passing. Speaking at the vigil, Willie O'Dea TD complimented the gardai investigating the murder.

"I want to compliment the Garda Siochana on the way they have pursued their investigation. My understanding is that they have made very substantial progress and ultimately there will be a successful prosecution," said Mr O'Dea

"Rose and her husband Michael were great friends of mine. I had many a cup of tea at their house," she added.

A softly sung rendition of Silent Night could be heard echoing through the candle-lit streets of New Road, Thomondgate, where Rose had lived. The choir, who had gathered despite the cold, was made up of the family, friends, and neighbours of the late Limerick woman.

Cllr John Costelloe was also present at the vigil. "We are here tonight to remember Rose, two years after her brutal murder. It was wonderful to see such a wonderful gathering of her friends and neighbours. People are anxious and they're nervous. We need closure

on this, and we need anyone with any information, no matter how insignificant it is. We need justice."

"There is a due process and we do appreciate that it takes time. We are hoping that the conviction will be soon, and I am very confident in local gardai in the pursuit of this killer or killers.

Pat Murphy, a friend of Rose said: "I am a neighbour and friend of the family. Rose and her late husband were good friends of mine, they were good friends to everyone. It was only right we keep her memory in our thoughts. "What happened two years ago shouldn't be befalling anyone, so in respect to Rose and her late husband Mike, this is the least we can do. www.limerickleader.ie

Sarsfield Credit Union ready to decide on new charity partner

A LOCAL charity is set for a year-long boost as the Sarsfield Credit Union seeks a 'partner' for 2020.

amazing. We find it tough to get funding through applications. Even though we tick all the boxes, there is less money available. I just gave a talk in the University of Limerick with the **Disability Federation of** Ireland last week, because

we work with Headway, people who are referred to us. In order to keep the project going, we have a lot of overheads. Our main source of income is from the shop."

"We are highly dependent on donations," she concluded.

DOCHAS Prize would work wonders for Dochas

THE prize of €1,000 would work wonders for city charity Dochas, which provides a supportive environment for youngsters with autism.

Deirdre Power manages their centre in Parnell Street, which has been renovated to provide a sensory room, and a safe play area for kids with the condition.

It's a far cry from the advent of the charity around a kitchen table in 1997.

"There's definitely lots of things the money could be spent on. The publicity will be fantastic, as it raises the awareness in the public mind around autism. The more people are aware of autism, and what it is, the less it impacts on the general public. One of the things parents struggle with is that their children are overstimulated. Bringing them to shopping centres and places like this can be tough for them, with the noise and the lights. The city

at Christmas can be difficult, as they get sensory overload, Deirdre explained. Dochas runs social clubs

for children with autism, catering for 80 youngsters, with 77 on a waiting list. At present, these set-ups

run Mondays, Tuesdays and Saturdays in the morning. Securing more funding will, Deirdre said, help

Dochas to deliver more. "Dochas is a big space. It gives children an

opportunity to interact

socially and potentially make friends within the environment. It's the space to do that.

We are cognisant of all the sensory issues which come with autism," she concluded.

Donation 'essential' for city addiction charity

ANY donation from the Sarsfield Credit Union would be "essential" to maintaining the service of Saoirse, which operates in Davis Street.

That's according to Alan Galvin, the manager of the addiction treatment centre.

"What we provide is a non-residential day treatment service in relation to drugs, alcohol or gambling. We do that by

providing one-to-one counselling. We have harm reduction and abstinence programme, and we also have family programmes. The services provided are confidential and free. There are no costs associated with using Saoirse," he explained.

Saoirse is not fully funded, meaning private fundraising initiatives are essential for the charity.

"We have to partake in fundraising ourselves. So any money would be more than welcome in maintaining our service and even getting the exposure through the article itself. We're always hopeful,"

Alan added. He also welcomed the fact staff at Sarsfield Credit Union picked Saoirse as a contender for its charity of the year.

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: I've been looking at my credit card, which I have through my bank (Permanent TSB).

I've found that the interest rate on it is nearly 50% higher than what is offered by Ulster Bank for their Black credit card (22.53% vs 16.1%).

The UB card offers 0% interest for 6 months and 0% interest on balance transfers for 12 months.

I would have a balance transfer of approximately €750 if I switched in the coming weeks.

I'm trying to be as sensible as possible, because I normally don't rack up this much on my card, but I treated myself to something last month for which I hadn't budgeted...!

Since it may take me another month or two to clear, I'd like to be saving interest where possible, as well as having lower costs in the longer term. Liam, would you be able to give me some advice please?

A. Thank you for your question, and the saving you will achieve if you switch to the lower rate with UB is about €13.88 each month.

And how I arrived at this amount is as follows:

22.53% (Interest Rate)/365 (number of days in year) = 0.0617% (daily rate charged)

When you multiply the amount owing by the daily interest rate, it amounts to €0.46c i.e. €750 x 0.0617%.

And when you multiply the daily interest rate charge by the amount of days in the month, you get $\epsilon_{13.88}$ ($\epsilon_{0.46}$ x 30 = $\epsilon_{13.88}$.

I hope that answers your question and regardless of whether the saving is significant or not, moving to a provider with a lower rate is always the right thing to do in the short and long term.







Be kind to each other this Christmas: Helping each other with even small domestic tasks, is a way of understanding another's struggle, minimise blame

The greatest gift: Peace and harmony this Christmas



ET'S face it, Christmas is wonderful but there are times during Christmas where there is conflict associated with family dynamics, financial pressures, toxic expectations, fuelled often by alcohol. Consequently it's helpful for partners to get to know not only feelings of stress mounting up within themselves, but also in their partners. Helping each other with even small domestic tasks, is a way of understanding another's struggle, minimise blame and create more time to relax, with a shared sense of accomplishment.

4. Two powerful words – despite the length of a relationship, saying 'love you' and 'thank you' is really important. Some couples assume the other knows they are grateful, but 'thank you' is a

magical phrase that can unlock important feelings of validation and prevents feelings of being taken for granted and creating resentment. It creates a benign cycle between partners, encouraging 'the giver' to repeat a generous act – even if it is just unloading the dishwasher or making a cup of tea in the morning. Regular 'Love you' sprinkles magic into the relationship ensuring its not all about kids but about the

adults as well.

5. Play together – laughing and 'playing' has all kinds of health benefits, from easing stress, countering depression and boosting positive mood: it releases hormones that can increase our sense of wellbeing. Research reveals that most people look for a good sense of humour in their ideal mate and sharing a sense of what's funny affirms an intimate relationship – so watch a funny film together and dust off those long-neglected board games to lighten the mood and increase a sense of pleasure in life and each other. Bring your inner child out to play.

So this Christmas may I wish you a peaceful one and you have health, peace and joy with many moments of pleasure meaning and play

To build self-esteem

1. Empower your child to manage difficulties

Children feel "effective" when they see that good things come from efforts like trying hard, getting close to a goal, or making progress. You can help your child to feel empowered by coaching their problem-solving abilities. Brainstorming and role plays are techniques that helps children think about new possibilities and gives them a chance to practice their problem-solving skills.

2. Monitor self-talk

We often tend to be our own worst critics. Children are no exception. Take notice of how your child talks about themselves. Is it overly negative? If so, they may need help in reframing how they talk to themselves. Teach your children to quietly tell themselves thoughts that help them gain control over or put the situation in perspective such as "I can handle this" or "With more practise, I'll get it".

3. Provide them with acceptance, love, and security

Children who feel accepted tend to have more secure self-esteem. Several research studies have shown that the parent-child relationship is amongst the most significant indicators of self-esteem. Children are more likely to accept themselves if those that are closest to provide them with unconditional acceptance.

Building self-esteem through love and praise

SELF-esteem is how we feel about ourselves. It is personal, it is relational, and it begins in early childhood. As we move through life, school, social activities, personal characteristics, and interactions within the family all shape our sense of self. Positive praise, especially in relation to a child's intrinsic characteristics and efforts, is one of the most effective tools to build their self-esteem.

As children learn about the world, they tend to accept without question most of what they are told about themselves. Developing self-esteem from an early age is important - so a child can draw on this as they grow older.

Usually, we talk about 'high' or 'low' self-esteem. In children, high self-esteem is typically associated with positive attitudes and behaviours, such as happiness, the ability to make friends, ability to overcome difficulties, and positive self-beliefs. In contrast, low self-esteem is usually recognised by a tendency to focus on weaknesses or mistakes, difficulty in recognising positive self-attributes, and blaming oneself for difficulties or failures.

When children receive frequent positive messages from their parents, they are more likely to internalise this form of thinking and use it to strengthen their own confidence. Praise needs to be specific and meaningful. Empty praise does not help, as children won't internalise it.

Self-esteem can also be 'secure' or 'fragile.' Individuals with secure self-esteem genuinely like and value themselves for who they are, rather than for their talents or

accomplishments. These children also tend to recognise both their strengths and weaknesses, are more socially confident, and manage to 'bounce-back' from failures. On the other hand, fragile self-esteem is based on achievements: 'what I do,' rather than 'who I am'. Children with fragile self-esteem tend to seek constant validation, often boasting or exaggerating their achievements. That is why parents can often misinterpret this kind of behaviour as high self-esteem. But beneath the surface, children might be experiencing difficulty accepting their weaknesses, may tend to blame others for failures, and may not respond well to criticism.

Children who receive praise from their parents develop higher and more secure self-esteem. Notice unique, intrinsic, positive characteristics about your child, and tell them. This means the wonderful personality traits that make them who they are, such as kindness or a good sense of humour. Praise their efforts, not just their successes. That way, children understand that it is ok to fail, and they should be proud for trying, regardless of the outcomes.



Christmas energy balls

Make sure you eat healthy fats and cholesterol - these are your friend, not foe. Emerging evidence show that populations with high fat and cholesterol rich foods such as eggs and lamb have lower risk of cardiovascular disease. Low fat diets, processed foods, vegetable oils and sugar are what lead to blood vessel damage, not fat and cholesterol.

On the other hand, cholesterol is needed to repair the body and provide hormone balance - without it your adrenals and sex hormones will suffer.

Take time for self-care and calming exercises. A simple breathing technique you can do anywhere, anytime can calm down your stress hormones, whilst doing what you love, feeling gratitude activate your healing mechanisms. Mind yourself first to be

Christmas Spice Energy Balls * 200g dates

* 220g mixed nuts and/or seeds (walnuts, pecans, cashews, pumpkin seeds)
 * 3 tbsp coconut oil

Once you roll the dough into parchment feel free to freeze this and then you can use whenever you need it, or make an extra batch for the freezer. Do not over mix the mix as this will warm the ingredients and lead to flat cookies.

Makes: 20

Ingredients:

• 100g unsalted butter (room temperature)

- 100g light brown sugar
- 100g caster sugar
- 1 free range egg
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 275g plain flour
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp sea salt

• 100g milk chocolate, roughly chopped

• 50g dark chocolate, roughly

chopped

• 50g white chocolate, roughly chopped

Method:

• Preheat the oven to 200°C (180°C fan oven)

• Beat the butter and both sugars together in a stand alone mixer until incorporated but don't mix too much, add the egg and vanilla and beat again. Combine the flour, baking powder and salt in a small bowl and add to the mixer, beat together and then stir through the chocolate.

• Place the mix in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes. Remove and scoop out 20 even sized pieces onto two large baking trays lined with parchment paper as you go, spacing adequately apart as they do spread a little

• Bake in a preheated oven for 12-14 minutes. Allow to cool for five minutes on the trays before transferring to cooling racks to cool completely.

Munster begin key festive clashes with Connacht tie

Rugby:Much-changed Munster set for top-of-table Pro14 showdown

MUNSTER head into the West this weekend for a crucial Guinness PRO14 date with Connacht, the first of three big interprovincial fixtures over the Christmas and New Year period.

Munster's look set to field a much-changed side for Saturday's clash with Connacht at the Sportsground, 5.15pm, to the one which lost out to Saracens in a bruising Heineken Champions Cup pool fixture at Allianz Park.

With Ireland's World Cup players required to rest for two consecutive weekends over the upcoming Christmas and New Year's run of inter-provincial derbies, Munster look set to be much-changed for their games with Connacht and Leinster, while fielding a strong line-up for the make-or-break Heineken Champions Cup away date with Racing 92.

Munster confirmed this week that captain Peter O'Mahony, who was ruled out of Saturday's defeat to Saracens during the warm-up, sustained a low grade abductor injury.

Tadhg Beirne, who sustained an ankle fracture in the opening ten minutes, now requires surgery, and is facing several months on the sidelines.

John Ryan was forced off with a calf strain in the opening half against Sarries', and the prop will undergo his rehabilitation with the medical department, while winger Andrew Conway departed for a HIA in the second half, and will follow return to play protocols.

return to play protocols. Of more positive news to Munster, loosehead props Dave Kilcoyne (calf) and Jeremy Loughman (ankle) are returning to squad training this week, the province confirmed.

Saturday's derby in Galway is a crucial Pro 14 fixture for Munster. The winner of this clash could well be sitting atop Conference B come the end of the weekend.

Just a point currently separates first-placed Munster from second-placed Connacht and in a conference where there are just four points between the top four, every game counts.

Connacht come into

Saturday's game on an back of a thrilling come-from-behind home victory over Gloucester Rugby in the Heineken Champions Cup last weekend.

Andy Friend's side boast an excellent home record as their Pro14 loss to Leinster earlier this season is their only home loss in any competition since January. Connacht have won three of their lost five meetings

of their last five meetings with Munster at The Sportsground. Munster have won just

one of their last four matches in all tournaments, a 10-3 success at home to Saracens in Round 3 of the European Champions Cup.

Connacht Rugby confirmed this week that they will be installing additional temporary terracing in the Sportsground for this weekend's interprovincial fixture.

Connacht say the decision has been taken due to the high volume of ticket sales and will increase the capacity to a maximum of 8,129.

Meanwhile, 12 Munster players, Joey Carbery, Andrew Conway, Keith Earls, Chris Farrell, Mike Haley, Dave Kilcoyne, Jean Kleyn, Conor Murray, Peter O'Mahony, Niall Scannell, Rory Scannell and CJ Stander, have been included in a 45-strong squad announced by new Ireland head coach Andy Farrell for a 24-hour mid-season gathering at the IRFU's High Performance Centre on Sunday, December 22 and Monday, December 23.

FIVE months after All-Ireland SHC semi final heartbreak against Kilkenny, the Limerick senior hurlers return to competitive action this Friday night.

(Kildimo-Pallaskenry), Brian


O'Grady (Kilteely-Dromkeen) and Mark Quinlan (Garryspillane) all training at present with John Kiely's inter-county panel.

Support sought for Limerick's plight

INDEPENDENT councillor Frankie Daly is seeking to have an urgent meeting with Sports Minister Shane Ross to help establish 'a structure which would lead to the regeneration of senior soccer in Limerick city.'

Limerick FC looks set to face liquidation after an examiner recommended an end to court protection for the club last week.

The company behind Limerick FC, Munster Football Club Limited, entered examinership in September with debts of approximately \notin 490,000. The removal of court protection brought an end to the examinership process. The next step is expected to be the appointment of a liquidator.

It now looks increasingly likely that Limerick will be without a senior team in the SSE Airtricity League for 2020.

Cllr Frankie Daly revealed in a Facebook post that he has written to Sports Minister Ross seeking an urgent meeting in relation to Limerick FCs plight.

Cllr Daly wrote: "I would like to meet urgently for the purpose of establishing a structure which would lead to the regeneration of senior soccer in Limerick City.

"The good news to date is that I am getting tremendous encouragement from people in all corners of Limerick City and County.

"I am eager to progress this for the people of Limerick."

Cllr Daly also revealed that a 'very positive' meeting with representatives from the Limerick FC Academy, Limerick FC Womens team, the FAI and the Limerick FC senior side from last season was held this week with a view to 'putting an in-term committee together to help retain Senior soccer, and underage and women's teams structures in Limerick and for the Mid West Region.

Meanwhile, Limerick Senator Maria Byrne indicated she planned to raise Limerick FCs plight in the Seanad this week.

Senator Byrne said soccer is the biggest participation sport in Limerick city and it was vital 'we do our utmost to keep senior soccer alive via a sustainable future-proof club'.

Fairview sit atop the tree for Christmas

The doubt surrounding Dermot Fitzgerald's eligibility has gladly been put to rest and his return will boost the side further. A point behind Fairview lie Ballynanty Rvs who also have improved significantly on last season.

Level on points with Aisling are Mungret and Janesboro. Mungret Reg are enjoying life in the top flight and play a breezy attacking style of play which is a breath of fresh air.

After a number of years when they were the best in town, Janesboro are going through a painful rebuilding exercise.

They lost the bulk of last season's title winning squad and manager Shane O'Hanlon is forced to call on all his experience to get the side through this. This is only a blip for Boro who no doubt will be back among the top guns in short time.

The two relegation spots will be fought out between four sides, Kilmallock, Nenagh, Coonagh and Prospect. All four are capable of getting wins along the way do the respective games between the quartet will prove decisive.

We made a disappointing exit at the first hurdle in our defence of the Oscar Traynor Trophy but hopes are high that we can compensate with success at FAI and MFA level.

In the FAI Junior Cup, Limerick's hopes lie on the shoulders of Pike Rvs, Fairview Rgs, Regional Utd and Coonagh Utd. Limerick's

representatives in the Munster Junior Cup will be Cappamore, Regional Utd A and Regional Utd B, Aisling Annacotty, Pike Rvs, Geraldines and either Fairview Rgs or Athlunkard Villa.

In the lower Divisions there are some great contests going on and I recommend to anyone who restricts their viewing to the Premier League to branch out. While the standard may not be as high, the commitment and exciting will compensate.

The rivalry endures no matter what the line-ups

UNSTER'S big Guinness Pro14 interprovincial clash with Leinster at Thomond Park on December 28 is one of the traditional highlights on the local sporting calendar over the festive period.

The 'sold out' signs are already up at Thomond Park for the big derby showdown.

Indeed, match tickets for the Round 9 clash were completely snapped up three weeks in advance of the Christmas clash.

Additional goal-line seating has been installed for the Interprovincial derby to increase the capacity to a record-equalling 26,267.

In recent days it has emerged that Munster will be without their frontline Ireland international stars for the visit of reigning Pro14, champions Leinster on Limerick on December 28.

It is not the first time it's happened. However, last season both provinces fielded pretty much full strength sides at Thomond Park for their now traditional Christmas showdown and the game turned into a feisty affair with Munster emerging victorious on a 26-17 scoreline.

It was only the second time in nine meetings that Munster had

managed to turn over their arch rivals in a competitive fixture. Since then, of course, Leinster regained the bragging rights when the provinces faced-off in the semi-final of the Guinness Pro 14 at the RDS.

Munster also ran out 34-24 winners in Limerick in 2017, a victory lit up by Jordan Larmour's stunning solo try. Twelve months earlier in 2016,

Twelve months earlier in 2016, Munster defeated an under-strength Leinster 29-17 at Thomond Park to extend their lead at the top of the then Guinness PRO12 to five points.

The IRFU's player welfare programme has prevented the provinces from fielding the vast majority of their Ireland internationals in several of the big interprovincial fixtures over the Festive period.

In recent seasons, the provinces, when given the option, have tended to field their strongest possible line-ups for their home fixtures over the Christmas and New Year's period and mix and match then for the away games.

Munster's schedule of interprovincial fixtures over the coming weekends see Johann van Graan's side lock horns with Connacht in Galway this Saturday,

5.15pm, before that home clash with Leinster on December 28 and finally a date with Ulster in Belfast on Friday, January 3. Ireland's World Cup players are

Ireland's World Cup players are required to rest for two consecutive weekends over the upcoming festive run of inter-provincial derbies.

As a result, Munster look set to be minus their Ireland stars who featured at the World Cup against both Connacht and Leinster.

Such a scenario would allow Munster field a strong line-up for the New Year's away date with Ulster which comes just nine days before the province's crucial Heineken Champions Cup clash with Racing 92 in Paris.

So how do Munster fans who bought tickets for the Leinster game on December 28 and now know that the home side will not be at full strength for the game feel? Do they feel short-changed?

History has suggested that there is a chance Munster will not be at full strength for this game given when it falls on the fixture list.

For a good chunk of supporters it is all about the result and the opportunity to put one over on their greatest rivals.


