

Lisa Smith expected to be home for New Year's Day

MEDIA gathered outside Limerick Prison this Tuesday as Lisa Smith, the accused ISIS member, was expected to be released.

The mother-of-one was due to be released from the jail on Mulgrave Street in Limerick city after being remanded there since December 4.

"She is expected to be released in the next hour," a source told The Leader at the time of going to press this Tuesdsay evening.

She is due to appear before Dublin District Court on January 8.

The 37-year-old was not released in time to join her family and two-year-old daughter on Christmas Day, despite having her bail granted on December 19.

It is believed that this is because Paul Grimes (50s), a family friend

who put forward her bail money, was not allowed to act as the independent surety due to previous convictions.

It is believed that Mr Grimes has several convictions, with some going back 40 years, including an assault on the referee who allowed the controversial goal which cost

Louth the 2010 Leinster Football Final.

Ms Smith, who denies the charges against her, had been held in a "specialist regime" in Limerick Prison since December 4.

The County Louth native was radicalised while in Ireland and travelled to Syria in 2015 to join the middle eastern terror group, ISIS.

The former soldier returned to Ireland on December 1 with her two-year-old daughter after she was located in a Syrian Refugee

After questioning she was

charged with being a member of ISIS, and initially refused bail by the District Court. Her bail conditions include signing into a garda station twice daily, as well as having to remain indoors from 8pm until 7am the following day, while she also cannot leave the jurisdiction or apply for new travel documentation, after already having lost her passport.

She must provide gardaí with a contact phone number within 48 hours of taking up bail.

Failure rate: 100% of rented homes fail council inspection

EVERY privately rented home which was inspected in Limerick during 2018 was in breach of planning standards or regulations, it can be revealed.

Figures obtained under the Freedom of Information Act show 1,035 homes were inspected

by Limerick City and County Council during the 12 month period.

significant CATHRACH & CONTAE number the properties which Luimnigh were inspected come under the Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) scheme while others come under the Accommodation Scheme (RAS).

While the overall rate of non-compliance was multiple breaches of standards and regulations were found in some properties.

summary figures, shows more than 6,200 individual breaches were detected across a variety of areas such as structure, heating, ventilation, refuse and food preparation.

The local authority has refused to disclose full details of the reports the volume documentation and the time it would take to retrieve the relevant

Overall figures disclosed to The Leader show 1,021 of the breaches related to gas, oil or electricity installations while 1,010 related to

structural issues. A further 1,020 of the breaches related to insufficient

information about the rented property being provided, by the landlord, to the tenant.


issue which can often result in a property failing an inspection relates to the number and location of carbon monoxide alarms.

Regulations require that alarms should be located in every room that contains heat-producing appliance and either inside or close to each bedroom.

The absence of an up-to-date copies of the Periodic Inspection Report relating to the electrical/gas/oil installations is also a common problem which can lead to a property failing an inspection.

Just 16 houses which had been found to be non-complaint became compliant during 2018.

Troubled teenager assaulted workers at care centre

Injuries: Care worker has not returned to work after attack

JUVENILE offender who violently assaulted a number of workers while being detained at Coovagh House will be sentenced later in the year.

Jason Smith, 19, of no fixed abode has pleaded guilty to charges relating to four separate incidents which occurred on dates between December 2017 March 2018.

During a sentencing hearing before Christmas, Detective Garda Eoghan McDonagh said the defendant, who is originally from County Louth, was being detained at Coovagh House, on the grounds of St Joseph's Hospital, on foot of a High Court Order.

"It is a special care unit which deals with juveniles who have difficulties," John O'Sullivan BL, prosecuting told Limerick Circuit

In one incident on December 5, 2017, a care worker sustained soft tissue injuries when he was punched across the back of the head while a second care worker was injured when he was struck while escorting Mr Smith to the

Judge Martina Baxter was told that following the second incident, the defendant had to be restrained as he threatened to stab and kill the care worker.

The worker, Mr O'Sullivan said, underwent a CT scan following the assault and has not returned to work since.

Meanwhile, Mr Smith has also admitted assaulting a security guard on January 26, 2018.

Detective Garda McDonagh said the man was on duty near the entrance to St Joseph's Hospital, when he was confronted by Mr Smith who threatened him and struck him in the face.

The door of a the security cabin was also kicked in and a block was thrown through the window after the security guard retreated.

"It was extremely frightening," said Mr O'Sullivan who told the court that while the security guard sustained minor physical injuries, he was in fear of his life and



continues to suffer from anxiety as a consequence of what happened.

The fourth assault happened on

March 5, 2018.

On that date, Mr Smith grabbed a care worker by the arm and striking him three times. He also attempted to headbutt him and spat in his face.

Barrister Eimear Carey said her client experienced significant difficulties as a child and that he suffers from anger management issues. She said he has been doing well in custody and that realises he has to change his behaviour going forward.

"It is a wake up call for him," she said urging the court to note Mr Smith's age.

Judge Baxter adjourned the matter to early February requesting details of where the defendant will live when released.

First arrest in Rose murder probe

THE PROCESS of the European arrest warrant, which is before the English courts, in relation to the murder of pensioner Rose Hanrahan, could take weeks, according to media reports.

Gardai last confirmed that a person has been arrested in connection

murder of the Limerick pensioner.

In official statement

Garda afternoon, An Siochana said: "Gardaí are aware that an individual has been arrested on a European Arrest Warrant. No further information is available at this time."

Hanrahan

A senior officer in An Garda Siochana press office has confirmed this statement to be correct.

Rose Hanrahan, the 78-year-old widowed pensioner, was brutally murdered at her home on New Road, Thomondgate in the northside of Limerick city on December 14, 2017.

This is the first arrest in major investigation which has been led by gardai at Mayorstone garda station.

community Thomondgate marked second anniversary of Rose Hanrahan's death with an evening vigil outside her home on December 16.

A YOUNG man who was robbed while walking home following a night out has was threatened and warned not to contact gardai about the incident.

The victim's mobile phone and a small amount of change were taken by the culprit who claimed he was armed with a knife and would stab him.

Darragh Moore, 28, of Cosgrave Park, Moyross has pleaded guilty to a robbery charge relating to an incident on the Dock Road at around 6.30am on October 27, 2018.

During a sentencing hearing before Christmas, Detective Garda Cathal O'Sullivan said the 19-year-old victim approached by the defendant who was riding a bicycle.

He told him to empty his pockets, he said he had a knife, told barrister O'Sullivan who added that the youth "was in great fear and dropped to his knees".

Judge Martina Baxter was told the injured party had eaten in a service station a short time earlier and that CCTV footage shows Mr Moore cycling and walking around the store following the injured party.

Following his arrest, the defendant initially claimed he had found the phone and denied any involvement in the robbery. However, he admitted stealing a charity collection box from a

premises in Thomondgate at around 8.30am on the same

Barrister Yvonne Quinn said her client – a father of six – is a chronic addict and has suffered a lot of tragedy in his life. She said Mr Moore has no history of violence and she asked the court to note that no knife was produced during the robbery.

While noting the submission that the defendant is now drug free, Judge Baxter expressed concern she was "being asked to rely on instructions".

Adjourning the matter for sentence, she requested a report from the governor of Limerick Prison and directed that Mr Moore provide regular urine samples for analysis

Workplace accidents rise to more than 330

 $MORE\,than\,300\,work place$ accidents occurred in Limerick during the first nine months of last year, writes David Hurley.

Figures released to The Leader under the Freedom of Information Act show a total 334 incidents were referred to the Health and Safety Authority between January 1 and September 30 2019.

According to the HSA, 324 of these were categorised as "non-fatal accidents" while ten were categorised as "dangerous occurrences".

There were no reports of any fatal workplace accidents in Limerick over

the nine-month period.

The HSA has refused to release further details - citing Section 37 (1) of the Freedom of Information Act.

"Having examined the records at issue, I am satisfied that the records (i.e. all reports relating to incidents) contain information of a personal nature and is therefore exempt under Section 37," stated Gemma Toal, FOI decision maker.



Concerned residents strongly oppose plan for 'monstrosity' on site adjacent to pub

PLANNERS have expressed strong concerns about proposals to construct more than 50 apartments at a site next to the Unicorn pub in Dooradoyle.

Unicorn Bar & Restaurant Ltd is seeking permission for a 'Build to Rent' residential apartment scheme, that will have shared amenities.

The proposed development incorporate eight studio apartments, 37 one-bedroom and apartments eight $two\text{-}bedroom\ apartments\ set$ out across a single block ranging in height from four to nine stories.

There will also be a basement and underground

car parking.

A dozen objections and submissions have been received and Limerick City and County Council has now requested further Information from applicant.

"The Planning Authority has very serious concerns the proposed development as outlined is incongruous to the local area by reason of its height, scale and mass and would be detrimental to the character of the area and the amenity of neighbouring properties," states a letter sent by the council to the applicant.

Planners have highlighted a number of specific concerns and observations

and the applicant has been asked to submit a revised proposal in its response to the request for further information.

Urban Statement has also been requested from applicant as has a full Traffic and Transport Assessment

and Road Safety Audit.

The applicant has also been advised to note and respond to the objections which have been received in relation to the proposed development.

In its submission, the Dooradoyle Estate and St Nessan's Park Residents Association expressed concerns about what it says is the "extremely high density" of accommodation units within the development. This, it submits, "will be $detrimental\,to\,the\,residential$ amenity of the area for existing and new residents".

The Association has also raised concerns about the impact on traffic, the height of the proposed development and the lack of parking spaces for visitors.

In a separate objection, the Gouldavoher Residents Association describes the proposed development as a monstrosity that is totally out of character with the development of the village and its residential area".

Several other individuals and families who live in the locality have also made written submissions to the

council.

that the process to identify the locations of new stations will begin shortly.

"We will start programming within the organisation and asking for, in effect, bids," he said adding that An Garda Siochana will also work closely with the Office of Public Works.

The internal process will see each garda division in the country submitting its requirements to the relevant assistant commissioner for consideration before final proposals are forwarded to Headquarters.

While not giving guarantees, Mr Harris said any new stations in Limerick will have to "fit in" with the Ireland 2040 vision and will have to be supported by a business case.

"The better the case that is made, the more we will get from the overall capital pie," he said adding that any proposals will have to be ambitious and future-proofed.

"The population of small villages and towns have grown exponentially the last five to ten years and the population is set to grow even further over the next ten to 20 years so it would, at least, be nice to keep pace with that," said Commissioner Harris.

Currently, the only new garda station approved for the Limerick division is in Newcastle West while the refurbishment of Castleconnell garda station is a priorty.

Members of the JPC agreed that they should be briefed on the process to secure new garda stations at their next meeting.

Population: Drew Harris says any new garda stations

must 'fit into' Ireland 2040 plan

THE garda commissioner says he is supportive of calls for new garda stations in areas of high-population growth such as Castletroy and Raheen.

However, Drew Harris says such projects take a considerable time to complete as there is a process to have them included in the capital budget.

At a meeting of the Limerick Joint Policing Committee, Commissioner Harris said existing population levels and expected growth are the key factors in deciding where any new stations are to be located.

"I'm very mindful of population growth and I'm very mindful that some towns, in particular, are expanding hugely," he said adding that a number of existing garda stations are no longer in the best locations.

The commissioner told the meeting the new capital plan will be rolled out in 2021 and

Small delay to riverside plan

Planning: Decision due on tower in the coming weeks

LIMERICK Council has requested the developers of a planned new riverside tower in the city to upgrade the lighting in part of a neighbouring street.

As revealed by our sister newspaper, the Limerick Leader, Kirkland Investments has returned to the table with revised plans for an office complex as part of a multi-million euro development at Bishop's Quay.

Bishop's Quay.
Original plans – unveiled in
September 2016 – were for a 14-storey
block, incorporating high-grade
office space.

However, this has since been revised downward to seven-storeys.

Following the lodging of a planning application, the council has sought further information from the developer, in a move which delays the decision date, initially expected earlier this month.

As part of a three-page dossier of requests, council planners have stated that the public lighting in Henry Street from its junction with Lower Cecil Street to the end of the proposed property line should be upgraded at the same time as the development.

They are seeking revised planning details providing for the new lighting.

Meanwhile, the local authority has

called on Kirkland Developments – headed by Rudi Butler, the son of former prominent city developer Robert Butler – to put together a revised maintenance plan and schedule.

"The applicant is also requested to set out the planning rationale for the reduction height of building permitted on site having regard to the policies set out on the Limerick City Development Plan," they added.

And a number of other changes to surrounding footpaths are also being sought for the application to proceed

Sources close to the developer say, it will "set the standard" for building developments in Limerick, and deliver 100 construction jobs, and, in time, hundreds of permanent office positions.

City and county house prices on rise, despite national drop

LIMERICK house prices have risen in 2019, despite average prices nationwide dropping for the first time since the crash.

The average price of a three-bedroom semi-detached house in Ireland has fallen in value by 0.6 percent, while prices are up 3.1 percent in Limerick city and 2.5 percent in the county, the Q4 Irish Independent REA Average House Price Index has found.

The average price of a family home in Ireland €234,704, while a similar home in county Limerick costs €165,000 and €205,000 in the city.

It was also found that a house took on average eight and a half weeks to sell in Limerick.

The survey concentrates on the sale price of Ireland's typical home type, the three-bed semi, giving an up-to-date picture of the second-hand property market across Ireland's towns and cities to the close



House prices are on the rise

of last week.

"Across the board, agents are reporting that the supply of finance to the market has decreased as banks use up their exceptions to the rules in the early part of the year," said REA spokesperson Barry McDonald.

"There is a marked decline in the amount of cash buyers in the market—down from 27% to 19% – and that is increasing the influence of the Central Bank's mortgage lending restrictions on the market.

"There seems to be a direct correlation between enquiry levels and the difficulty in obtaining mortgage approvals, and we have seen time taken to sell rise from five to seven weeks as the year has gone on," he added.

"The second-hand market has become extremely price sensitive across the country and it is the areas with quality housing stock available for under €270,000 that are achieving highest growth.

"Once again there is a drop-off in viewings for four-bedroomed housing in certain areas where they are priced over €400,000, illustrating the influence of the Central Bank rules"

Improved signage to help city tourists

NEW, improved signage to help tourists better find their way around the city are on the way this year.

Now, the local authority is seeking a consultant to manage the preparation of a "wayfinding, orientation and interpretation strategy" for Limerick.

The strategy will include providing signs

for the full metropolitan area, and creating "distinct district" areas in the centre.

Fine Gael councillor D|aniel Butler has welcomed the move.

He said: "It's been on the books for a while. It's taken on a new significance with the moving of the car park, things will start to happen soon. It's a big investment, and it's a big deal, and it is really important for our tourism offering."

Call for ban on cigarette machines

A Limerick Institute of Technology lecturer has called for a complete ban on cigarette vending machines in Ireland.

Dr Frank Houghton has challenged the government to follow the majority of its European neighbours and impose a complete ban on cigarette vending machines from hotels, bars, and other

public places.
Dr Houghton said: "The
Irish Government previously
aimed to ban the sale of
cigarettes from vending
machines in both 2014 and
2016, a move that was never
implemented.

"We are entering a new decade, so it is past time that the Government stood over its previous assertions and simply ban these machines," he added.

Christmas ruined after Castletroy food fight

A GROUP of Limerick students spoiled Christmas for staff at a service station after a food fight broke out in the early hours of Christmas morning, causing more than €2,000 worth of damage.

Around 100 students, who are believed to be secondary school students, had gathered at the Inver and Spar station on the Dublin Road on the night of Christmas Eve.

The incident occurred after five or six individuals, who witnesses say appeared to be heavily intoxicated, then started a "food fight."

Staff, many of whom had young families, stayed in the shop until 6am to clean the shop.

Shane Gleeson, who owns the shop said he has never seen this kind of behaviour before.

"It was a food fight more than anything. They were throwing

wedges and chicken fillet rolls. There was an awful mess and a big clean up. It wasn't very nice for the staff to be cleaning that up on Christmas Eve," he told The Leader.

In a video that circulated on social media, the youths can be seen throwing various items of food at each other, including one youth who can be seen using a soup ladle to fire soup across the shop.

"Using CCTV we have identified the five or six who were the centre of it, and we know their parents. We will have to repaint the walls, and we will be hoping that the parents will pay for that. But so far not one parent has come in to offer to pay," Mr Gleeson said.

"Iwould hope that the young men involved would have the character to come in and apologise to the staff that were affected. Criminal damage is being investigated by gardai. Criminal charges will be brought. It is the first time I have ever seen this behaviour," he added.

City transport could get trackless plan

A UNIVERSITY of Limerick (UL) graduate has produced a blueprint to introduce revolutionary new trackless trams on the city to Castletroy corridor.

Corbally man Fionan
Coughlan, pictured, is to
make a submission to the

Transport Strategy 2020,
calling for the facility to
eventually replace the

only in use in the Middle East, a trackless tram is considered as being

crossover
between a
conventional tram network,
light rail and a bus service.

Unlike trams and light rail, there would be no need for overhead wires, with the electrical vehicles being powered by on-ground sensors.

"It's something which suits Limerick. It's not as expensive as light rail or tramslike the Luas, which are so costly because you need to dig up roads to put down steel tracks and erect poles with electric cables," he said, "We don't have the patronage to be able to fund something as expensive as a Luas."

International business graduate Fionan pointed out the council is already planning a Quality Bus Corridor (QBC) between the city centre and UL, which is

hoped will improve bus times on the 304, as it will prohibit cars sharing lanes.

However, he believes the only way to inspire confidence around this is to introduce new trams in a bid to attract drivers out of their cars and onto a regular, scheduled tram service.

He has already held talks with local authority bosses on the scheme, and has sounded out several councillors.

"My vision is with this trackless team, people will be more willing and supportive of

A trackless tram system, he pointed out, would also speed people getting off and on the vehicle, something which has been highlighted as a major problem on the 304.

"Bus services in Limerick are generally regarded as a second class mode of transport with many people upgrading to a car as soon as they can afford to do so," he said

Planning is ongoing for a tram network in Ireland's second city, Cork.

Fionan believes Adare's hosting of the Ryder Cup in 2026 provides a window of opportunity to develop transport locally.

Traditions and customs of New Year's Eve in Ireland year's ago

ate on December 31 the perennial worries of getting transport home from house parties, pubs and restaurants will see many New Year's revelers make a hasty resolution that the following year they will definitely be staying at home.

For decade upon decade, especially in rural Ireland, New Year's Eve was about exactly that - staying in.

New Year was never truly a big thing in Ireland - especially for farming communities for who the fortunes of the crops were all important.

Irish New Year traditions in agricultural areas, such as they are, are all about the coming twelve months.

One belief was that no water could be drawn from the well after the sun went down on New Year's

All the water required needed to be inside the house before that and none of it could leave the house until the next day. Defying this belief meant that the family would be faced with a drought in the new year

There was also a tradition that no money could be spent on New Year's Day. Nothing could be brought out of a home and anyone visiting should make sure they came bearing a gift. Giving something away meant giving your money away and surely no sensible person would do that.

The stroke of midnight on

December 31 carried traditions of its own. Being the first visitor to a house on New Year's Day was a popular custom but the warmth of your welcome was largely dependent on the colour of your hair.

Unless he arrived empty handed, a dark haired man would be greeted gladly because it was believed that he would bring plenty of good luck.

However, a red headed woman's arrival meant ill fortune even if her arms were weighed down with all the tokens of what was known as 'first footing' - bread and coal. Red haired females apparently tended to stay at home on New Year's Eve.

In fact to prevent bad luck, families sometimes sent out a dark haired member of the family immediately after midnight and had them walk back in though the door. All dark haired boys in the area would visit the houses and be welcomed with gifts of sweets or money.

Anything bad that happened on New Year's Eve was considered more significant the closer it was to midnight.

It was believed that there was only a certain amount of luck in the world and everything that could be done to claim a share of it had to be done.

It was also important to begin the New Year with a spotlessly clean house signifying a fresh start to the New Year.

New Year's Eve was also known as "Oíche na Coda Móire,"- 'the

night of the big portion' since people would eat a larger than normal meal to ensure food in plenty for the coming year. Another way of ensuring plenty was to make a cake which was then pounded against the door of the house three times while a prayer was said by the housewife.

This would chase the bad luck out of the house and invite the good spirits in. After this the family would then gather up the fragments of the cake and eat it.

Many farmers repeated this ceremony at the door of the byre to ensure plentiful fodder for the

People tried to ensure that no food was taken away from the house on New Years Eve and beggars knew better than to approach a house looking for food.

Another New Years Eve Irish tradition was that young girl's put mistletoe under their pillows on New Year's Eve, in hopes of dreaming about their future husband.

On New Year's Eve night, families would remember those who has passed away that year before by setting a place for them at the dinner table and leaving the door unlatched.

Anyone entering the house after midnight by the front door would leave by the back door for good

Well into the evening on New Year's Eve in Ireland there would always be a small group gathered around the fireplace, laughing and joking. Sooner or later, the conversation would turn to reminiscing about Ireland.

The old ones, well on their way with a few glasses of the hard stuff, would get all misty-eyed as they remembered times past and the stories would begin in the light of just the fire and candles burning in the windowsill.

There was also an Irish tradition

of predicting the political future of the country by checking which way the wind blows at midnight on New Year's Eve.

If the wind is from the west, there is a chance that good fortune will reign that year. If the wind is from the east, however, the British will prevail.

And, after the stroke of midnight the man of the house would recite the following verse: "May your nets always be full, Your pockets never empty, Your horse not cast a shoe,

Nor the devil look at you In the coming year."





Hoteliers 'expecting a tough new year'

Jobs: Just one in five hotels plan to recruit more staff in New Year

ACCOMMODATION providers across Limerick are bracing themselves for a difficult 2020, according to the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF).

The Shannon branch of the industry body is reporting that only a third of local hotels are reporting a positive outlook for 2020, as the uncertainty over Brexit, and the high cost of doing business take their toll, leading to a slowdown in visitor growth.

Central Statistics Offices figures

released nationally show just a 1.5% $increase\ in\ overseas\ visitors\ to\ the\ end\ of$ November, compared to a 5.5% increase for the eleven month to end of November

Dermot Kelly, the chairman of the Shannon branch of the IHF says government must put more supports in place to assist tourism businesses.

He said: "We continue to face high costs of doing business, which have been compounded by the Government's decision to increase the tourism VAT in last year's Budget. The threat to businesses posed by escalating



insurances costs is well documented. Our members are also reporting significant pressure from rising local authority rates."

Seven in 10 hoteliers saw a fall-off in business from Great Britain, while over half reported a fall in business levels from Northern Ireland.

Mr Kelly added: "Tourism is a highly competitive business and these costs are making us less attractive as a destination. Decisive action is needed now to mitigate the impact this will have on tourism, especially the regions."

He pointed out that tourism in

Limerick supports 11,500 jobs and contributes €327m to the local economy annually.

Elsewhere, with a slowdown in growth, hoteliers reported that just one in five hotels are planning to increase staffing levels over the next 12 months.

On a seasonal note, Christmas parties continue to be an important source of business for 60% of hotels nationally.

Of those, over a third reported an increase in business this festive season compared to 2018 with a similar number (32%) taking on additional staff for the Christmas period.

In the southern states of the U.S.A one theory suggests that black eyed peas are considered lucky because they were the only crop not eaten by the Union soldiers during the Civil War, meaning that the peas were the only thing that kept the Confederate soldiers alive.



Scandanavia

Often, the Swedish and the Norwegians place a single almond in their rice pudding; whoever finds it is supposed to be prosperous in the upcoming year.



Argentina

In the hopes that it will help them keep their job or find a new, better job, Argentinians eat beans on New Year's Day



Korea

Eating this soup called tteokguk filled with rice cakes, meat, and vegetables is a group activity for Koreans, and is believed to give eaters good luck for the year ahead. 
Turkey



a stage show."


Sheahan said for the show to fully ignite, a full house is optimal.



Thursday (January 2)

Children's storytime is at the Granary Library this Thursday at 3:30pm. Aimed at kids between 3 and 6, it's the one show you can go to this week where falling asleep is a compliment. It's a free event.

We[']re coming to the end of panto season for another year. This weekend is your last chance to catch the outlandish antics, feisty dames and chances to scream "Look out behind you!" at performers who know full-well what's behind them.

Limerick Panto Society's Beauty & The Beast runs at the Lime Tree Theatre until Sunday. You know the story - a mopey hirsute gentleman hangs around in a castle, accompanied only by some talking cutlery, and persuades the world's worst father to sell a daughter into slavery as a live-in maid until she's firmly in the grip of Stockholm Syndrome and sees the hairy guy as dating material. Tale as old as time. 7:30pm on Thursday and Friday, midday and $4\,\mathrm{pm}$ on Saturday and Sunday. Tickets are €20.50 for adults and €18.50 for

Aladdin is also running till Sunday at the University Concert Hall. The titular street rat is a young fella who can't stop rubbing his magical lamp, to the chagrin of his withered laundry-running mother, but finds a princess who's impressed by the size of his genie's powers. Shows are at 2pm and

It's another #WeekendInLimerick — and what a weekend! Seamus Ryan has the lowdown

6:30pm every day, except for Sunday's shows, which are at 1pm and 5:30pm. Tickets are €30 for adults and €25 for children.

Rounding out the Christmas season, this weekend is your last chance to enjoy the thrills and (more often) spills of ice-skating at Limerick On Ice in Arthur's Quay Park. It's open till this Sunday, before disappearing from our lives for another year. Tickets for an hour of skating are €17 for adults and €15, though if you pick out the 8pm sessions you can skate for an extra hour for free.

Friday (January 3) Theres a special storytime for young people aged between 7 and 9 at the Granary Library this Friday at 3:30pm. It's a free event and you can expect the stories to be rather more sophisticated and dark than the ones at the usual library events

aimed at 3-6 year olds.

Saturday (January 4) **André Rieu** is implausibly

popular among people of a certain age who like a wee smattering of classical music but don't want to take it too seriously. His concerts are explosive affairs of dancing, fireworks and a good hour of him waving at the audience and pointing at other people who do most of the heavy lifting. None of that is a crime. As he's hit 70 years of age, there are live screenings of his 70 Years Young concert taking over all three Limerick cinemas this Saturday, with encore screenings on Sunday. It's at the Omniplex in Dooradoyle, the Odeon in Castletroy and Vue on the Ennis Road, so you can pick the suburb that best suits your legs. The live screening is at 7pm on Saturday and all three cinemas

have an encore screening at 3pm on Sunday. Ticket prices are €20 at the Odeon, €22 at the Omniplex and €17.50 at Vue.

Sunday (January 5) There's a **Toy Fair** this Sunday at the **Castletroy Park Hotel**. It's rather aimed at the speciality collector, with dealers selling everything from dinky cars to hand-made wooden toys. It's the perfect experience-style present for an aged relative who knows how to hold a teacup. You hold it by the handle - there you go, now you can all imbibe. The **Castletroy Park** Hotel will slide a three-tiered plate of pastries and a single-tiered glass of prosecco your way from 12:30pm till 3pm for €30 a head, while the Limerick Dragons breast cancer survivors paddling & aquatic group will serve you canapés and champagne in House between 3pm and 6pm for €25. If you really like tiny pastries you could go to both.

Sagittarius Hiberniensis is a new Limerick-based choir and they're hosting their launch concert at **St Mary's Cathedral** this Sunday at 5pm. Yes, it's a convoluted name, translating to The Irish (Male) Archer but all the best band names are taken. Except for "Hitler's Dog", which probably isn't the best name for a choir, though I hear it was a very forgiving dog. The choir is made up of teaching staff and former students of the Limerick School Of Music, as well as members of the St Mary's Cathedral Choir. Their repertoire will concentrate on sacred music, $especially from \, the \, Baroque \, and \,$ Renaissance eras, and this Sunday's concert will include work by the very underappreciated Heinrich Schütz and Tomás Luis de Victoria. It's a free gig.



Seeing these photos pushed me to start working with Tom Ochocki from Perfect Line Coaching which was one of the best decisions I made all year so I guess it's an example of turning a negative into a positive. I'd done several shoots for Littlewoods before this and several more since but this is the only one I'm not proud of but I can look back at it as a starting point as things did get better.

February brought my biggest social media collaboration to date with the mobile phone company Huawei. I'd worked with big brands like Barker Shoes, Happy Socks, Jack and Jones and Selected Homme before this but this was by far my biggest partnership to date. I got to keep the phone too, which was nice.

In March I did some online content for Quigleys with my good friend Esme Wallace. I love these shots and I've re-used them for every dating related article that I've written since. Esme and I did a wedding shoot for Ballykealy House in Carlow in November so there was a happy ending to our pretend social media love story.

April brought more shoots for Littlewoods, Selected and Jack and Jones as well as a team-up with the Irish Independent's online blogging portal Creators.ie. I've been working with Creators ever since and I'm very proud to be part of their team of contributors. I also hosted the men's segment at Sinead O'Brien's workshop in Athlone. I've done everything from singing to trying on Spanx to being a blind date at Sinead's shows. They're always great fun and I never know what to expect.

Things really started to get busy

for me in May. I got the opportunity to shoot for the GANT website $\,$ which was an amazing privilege. GANT are one of the biggest fashion brands in the world and this was a huge boost to my confidence. I also travelled to Kilkenny to judge the Miss Kilkenny and Miss Carlow pageants and to Thurles to judge Miss Tipperary. It was shortly after this that I was approached by the organisers of Miss Ireland about running the Miss Limerick and Miss Clare pageants going forward, an opportunity I felt was too good to turn down. I also had the chance to work with and promote two incredible charity initiatives -Darkness Into Light and The Green Ribbon Campaign.

In June I was invited to chat fashion and dating with Jenny Greene on 2FM. This was one of the highlights of my year and I'm so thankful to have been given this opportunity and to Jenny for making it so easy and making me so relaxed while I was on the air. June also saw me named an ambassador for the Pig N Porter festival, the highlight of the Limerick Summer social calendar. I got to do a second shoot for the GANT website in Killaloe with the incredibly talented Paudie Bourke.

In July I danced down the runway with Celia Holman Lee at the Oxendales Ireland A/W season launch. I also launched the Children's Grief Centre Pro-Am Qualifier at Adare Manor with Limerick Hurler Darragh O'Donovan and fulfilled my duties as an ambassador for the highly successful Pig N Porter festival. The undoubted highlight of July was the Miss Limerick and Miss Clare event held in Bar 101.

This was my first attempt at organising an event so I relied heavily on the expertise of my co-organiser James Hayes and our pageant guru Esme Wallace. We pulled it off on the night and crowned three amazing winners in

His previous single Pick Up Your Phone received support across Irish radio. He is set to release his debut EP The Wrong Ones on January 10.





Ford Focus ST: Latest model blends track performance with everyday use

FORD Ireland say their Focus model is the best car they have ever made but here we're dealing with a different breed of Focus, developed by Ford Performance.

Motorists who like plenty of power in their car when they need it for a blast at weekends, but who also want a good family car for everyday use, can have the best of both worlds with the New Ford Focus ST which blends legitimate track-day performance and practical everyday usability. Luggage space is 541 litres with a full size spare and 575 with a skinny spare.

This nimble hot-hatchback is developed to be as comfortable as it is fun to drive with a very responsive steering system, fast acceleration and with class-leading roominess and excellent refinement of the standard Focus range but with an upscale interior that balances everyday practicality with a true sport driving experience.

The exterior differs from the standard model with special colours to show its strong styling. These include Ford Performance Blue and Orange Fury, alongside Frozen White, Magnetic grey, Race Red, Ruby Red and Shadow Black. You can opt for 18-inch Dark Sparkle and Magnetite Matt alloy wheel designs or a 19-inch wheel in Magnetite Matt as on my review car.

In addition to the sports steering wheel and the snug fitting Recaro sports seats, the interior boosts up the sporty atmosphere with an ST-embossed aluminium gear knob and scuff plates, alloy pedals, some metallic and satin silver decorative elements, and metal grey stitching for the seats, door inserts and centre console soft side pads.

Ford's new C2 platform is enhanced with unique suspension, braking and powertrain configurations for the most responsive and agile Focus ST driving experience ever - on the road or track. The Focus ST 2 has been enhanced with many advanced sports technologies for best-ever performance and agility.

Two series are offered: ST-2 and

ST-3 with a choice of petrol or diesel powertrains and hatchback or wagon bodystyles.

Standard items on the diesel ST-2 include 18-inch alloys with ST design, front lower grille, high gloss black; front and rear parking sensors; FordPass Connect; gauges integrated in a cluster 4.2-inch TFT colour screen; partial leather Recaro Performance seats. The ST-3 (from €43,253) adds 19-inch alloys, painted calipers; fixed full LED headlamps; a rear view camera, full leather Recaro seats; and power 4-way driver/passenger seats.

Ford's SYNC 3 connectivity system allows you control the radio, navigation and climate functions as well as connected smartphones using voice commands supported by an 8-inch colour touchscreen. The system is Apple CarPlay and Android Auto compatible. Ford PassConnect technology turns the car into a mobile WiFi hotspot with connectivity for up to 10 devices.

Power is from a 2.3-litre all-aluminium EcoBoost petrol engine with six-speed manual or a seven-speed automatic transmission (my review car). It is the most powerful engine ever offered for a Focus ST delivering 280hp and 420 Nm of torque with a sprint time of 0-100km/h in 5.7 seconds for the five-door model.


The powerful diesel 190hp 2.0 EcoBlue ST-2 (from €39,595) delivers peak power at 3,500 rpm and 400 Nm of torque between 2,000rpm and 3,000rpm. 0-100 takes 7.6 seconds. Combined fuel consumption is 7.9 L/100kms for the 2.3 litre engine; 4.8 L/100kms for the 2.0-litre version.

Selectable drive modes are a first for Focus ST. They are Slippery/Wet, Normal, Sport and Track.

Iloved driving this car and found the six-speed manual gearbox to have a sportier feel with a short shift throw compared with the standard new Focus. It also delivered a feisty performance when it was safe to do so while being very well-mannered driving through towns and built-up areas. The fact that the ride height has been reduced by 10mm allows very

efficient road-holding and response while the electric power assisted steering system is way faster than that in the standard Focus.

The ST is the first Ford front-wheel drive electronic limited-slip differential that improves traction and stability. Special Michelin Pilot Sport 4S tyres are used.

Driver assist technologies include Active Park Assist 2 with Park-Out Assist, Adaptive Cruise Control, Auto High Beam, Blind Spot alert and Cross Traffic alert, Forward Collision Warning, front and rear sensors, a head-up display, Hill Launch Assist, Pre-Collision Braking/ with Pedestrian and

Cyclist Detection, a rear wide-view camera and a Wrong Way Alert. My car also had a B&O PLAY

My car also had a B&O PLAY Sound System, an electric parking brake, a hands-free tailgate, heated steering wheel, an openable panorama roof, a rotary gear shift dial, SYNC 3 with 8-inch touchscreen and a wireless charging pad.

Ford say this car is the most 'Jekyll and Hyde' yet, able to switch from refined tourer to focussed performance car at the push of a button.

The entry level Focus is from €23,365 (excluding delivery and related charges), my review car was €41,099 including some options like the Performance Pack at €1,500; Head-Up display (€530); rear wide-view camera (€100). The Ford Performance Blue exterior paint is another €1,500. These optional extras took the price of my car, as tested, to €44,729.

The new Focus ST is built at Ford's Saarlouis assembly plant in Germany following a €600 million investment.

'Unfortunately, it looks like we will have more guys out than we will have back which in certain positions is key, but we will take our time, then reassess and take it from

"Obviously Ulster is on fire at this stage, they haven't lost there for a very long time, so a nice challenge ahead."

Munster have a number of

injury concerns ahead of their clash with Ulster who thumped Connacht in their most recent Pro14 fixture.

Hooker Kevin O'Byrne is to be assessed by the medical department for an ankle injury picked up in the defeat to Leinster.

Van Graan said: "Chris Cloete also took a shot, Tommy (O'Donnell) also has got a bit of tightness and then a lot of the guys who came off the field that finished it have a few bangs and bruises and we have a few games coming up, so a lot of guys have had a lot of minutes, so we also have to manage them, so a tricky

made a total of 41 appearances for Limerick between '79 and 1981 and was a key member of their league winning side of 1979-1980.


Johnny Matthews is regretted by his wife Mary Clare, daughters Jenny and Sarah, sister Gloria, extended family and friends.



Christmas Racing Festival proves a winner alright!

HE biggest sporting event in Munster over the Christmas period took place Patrickswell when Greenmount Park hosted the four-day Mr Limerick Christmas

Close on 41,000 racegoers passed through the turnstiles over the week, a very impressive figure.

The overall attendance figure was 500 up on the 2018 figure.

The attendance was no doubt helped by the favourable weather which prevailed over the four days of the event.

The Festival continues to grow year on year. Seven years ago, the total prize fund for the fixture was €350,000. This year the four-day National Hunt horse racing bonanza boasted a total of €575,000 in prize money, a 5% increase on 2018 levels.

Equally, in 2012 the feature race on St Stephen's Day was the €37,500 Grade 2 Greenmount Park Chase. This year, the St Stephen's Day feature was the

Grade 1 €100,000 Matchbook Betting Exchange Novice Chase, the race having been upgraded to a Grade one in 2018.

One of the most interesting aspects from the week was the betting turnover figures from both the on-course layers and the Tote.

The figures show that on-course bookmaker turnover at Limerick Racecourse over the four days reached €777,180. The figure is a €34,000 increase on the total 12

The total figure for Tote turnover was €540,533, slightly down on the 2018 figure.

If the betting turnover is a reflection on the state of the economy and on the amount of disposable income in the pockets of people heading into 2020 then the outlook looks pretty optimistic.

It is also interesting at a time when more and more people who like to have a bet on horse racing have access to an on-line betting account that the turnover for the on-course bookies' held up so well at Limerick.

Leaving behind a decade of fond memories for Limerick GAA

S we roll into a new decade this Wednesday, Limerick GAA supporters can look back on the decade 2010-'19 with

Year by year there were highlights – August 19 in 2018 of course the stand-out memory as Declan Hannon lifted the Liam MacCarthy Cup high in the Hogan Stand to end a 45-year wait for All-Ireland SHC honours.

It was a decade that started with much rancour in hurling circles with Justin McCarthy fielding an under-strength inter-county

senior hurling team.
But that year did see Limerick in a Munster SFC final and a Ladies Football League final - losing both.

Silverware in 2010 went to the Limerick footballers in the Division Four Allianz League final and to the ladies footballers in the All-Ireland junior championship.

In 2011, there was Division Two Allianz Hurling League success and an All-Ireland SFC quarter final appearance.

In $\hat{2012}$, the ladies football lost the Division Four League final. The footballers again tasted

Division Four league success in 2013 but the headlines went to the Munster SHC and MHC winners. Limerick also won a Division Two camogie league title.

In 2014, Limerick retain the Munster MHC title and in Croke Park won an All-Ireland intermediate camogie title. Limerick also won an All-Ireland minor A camogie championship.

In 2015, the U21 hurlers were crowned All-Ireland champions in a year when Limerick lost a Ladies Football League final and also won the Munster Hurling League title.

Limerick ended a run of three league final defeats in Ladies Football in 2016.

Again it was U21 hurling dominating in 2017.

In 2018, hurling dominated with All-Ireland honours for John Kiely's men, who started the year as Munster League winners. The Limerick ladies footballers also enjoyed Croke Park success with a junior championship win.

Ending the decade was 2019 Allianz Hurling League success, another Munster SHC and a Munster MHC.

All in all, silverware most years and all enter the new decade full of optimism.
