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

What's your idea of a perfect day, or a perfect weekend, in Limerick?

The best days begin if I wake up before the kids. No really, the perfect day would be a quiet sunny Sunday morning walk with my wife and kids along the river to feed the ducks. Limerick accounts for 3% of all .ie domains

MORE than 1,300 dot-ie (.ie) websites and domains were registered by businesses and individuals in Limerick last year, new figures have revealed.

However, according to IE Domain Registry, the number of new .ie websites registered in Limerick during 2019 was down slightly compared to 2018.

At the end of 2019,

Limerick-registered domains and websites accounted for 2.88% of the more than 280,000 .ie

While there was a 3.56% reduction in the number of registrations in Limerick during 2019, the number of new domains registered in Munster increased by 7.94% to 47,977. The 2019 profile report shows

ie domains account for half of all domains registered in Ireland. A third of all domains are .com while .uk domains account for 8% of all domains hosted in Ireland.

According to IE Domain Registry, the company that manages and maintains Ireland's country domain, 60.9% of the new domains registered last year were associated with companies and self-employed people compared to 36.8% with individuals.

David Curtin, chief executive of IE Domain Registry, says there was significant growth in the number of new .ie domains over the past

the past decade and that they are becoming increasingly important in the modern world.

'As Ireland becomes more globalised and the internet connects us to more international businesses and institutions, it's essential that our communities, be they parishes, villages, or towns in Limerick or elsewhere, have the means to identify themselves online as familiar, local, and Irish through the trusted .ie brand," he

Martens successfully challenge convictions

Appeal: Father and daughter face retrial for Jason killing

MOLLY Martens Corbett and her father Thomas Martens have won a challenge against their convictions for the murder of Limerick businessman Jason Corbett.

According to reports, they will now face a retrial.

The 39-year-old died in 2015, with the pair convicted almost three years ago of the second-degree murder of the Janesboro man at his home in North Carolina.

However, last January, lawyers for the pair claimed in North Carolina Court of Appeal that they were not treated to a fair trial. Prosecutors told their trial in 2017 that Tom,68 and Molly, 34 beat the businessman and father of two to death as he lay asleep in bed.

Mr Martens, a former FBI agent, claimed he acted in self-defence and alleged Mr Corbett had been attacking Ms Martens.

However, the Corbett family maintained that the Irish businessman was planning to bring his children back to his native Limerick.

According to RTE's Washington Correspondent, Brian O'Donovan, in their appeal, lawyers for the pair argued that the judge in the case had excluded key evidence that would have corroborated their clients'

This included information which is alleged might have explained Thomas Martens' state of mind on the night of the murder.

It was also argued that statements Mr Corbett's children had given to social workers should have been allowed as evidence.

In its ruling, the North Carolina Court of Appeals said both defendants are entitled to a new trial.

The ruling stated: "Due to a number of prejudicial errors apparent within the record, we reverse the judgments entered upon Defendants' convictions second-degree murder and remand for a new trial."

A spokesperson for Jason Corbett's family said: "We are aware of the decision of the North Carolina Court of Appeals in relation to the retrial of Molly and Thomas Martens.

"We will not be commenting on the decision at this time."

Cllr Jerry O'Dea told the Limerick Leader that the Corbett family had the full support of Limerick Council.

"It is disappointing to hear. I don't know the full details of why a retrial has been granted, but Limerick will offer the same support to the Corbett family that was offered at the time of the incident.

'Action must be taken' for special school nurse

A LIMERICK city election candidate has said action "must be taken" on a "critical condition" affecting a special school.

From next September, St Vincent's Special School, Lisnagry has currently no commitment on having nursing support for pupils with medical needs in the school.

Limerick Senator Kieran O'Donnell met with the school principal on the matter and has followed up with the HSE and Minister for Health Simon Harris on this important issue.

"I met with principal Bridann O' Callaghan of St Vincent's Special School, Lisnagry when I visited the school," said Senator O'Donnell, "we discussed the situation unfolding where the school is facing the daunting prospect of having no nursing support from September 2020. The medical needs of many of the pupils attending St Vincent's make it imperative that they have a full-time dedicated nurse at the school.

"Arising from the meeting, I have spoken and written to the HSE as well as Minister Simon Harris and his officials requesting the provision of funding for a dedicated full-time nurse from next September for the school through East Limerick Children's Services. Minister Harris, his officials, and the HSE are actively looking into the matter.

"Action must be taken on this critical issue to provide certainty and alleviate the genuine worries of both parents and staff at St Vincent's special school for the well-being of all students needing nursing support and care from next September."

The school is Ireland's third-largest of its kind, with 117 pupils, five of whom have life-limiting conditions and require full-time nursing supports.

Garda probe into damage of veteran TD's election posters

GARDAI in Limerick have launched a probe into the alleged damage of Fianna Fail TD Willie O'Dea's election

osters.

It comes as the candidate—who is widely tipped to top the poll locally on Saturday—said he has never experienced anything like the "dirty tricks" being played in the 2020 general election campaign.

As part of what he says is a "targetted campaign" against him, the veteran TD said his posters have been "torn down" and "defaced".

"I have met so many people at doors who have been told 'Willie is safe', 'Willie will top the poll' and 'Willie doesn't need your vote'. It's very disappointing that others in

the field are putting out this narrative. It's an age old political trick which is underhand! There is nothing certain in politics and for me to be elected, I need my supporters to come out and vote for me," he urged.

Mr O'Dea claimed dozens of his posters have been taken down throughout the three week campaign.

week campaign.

"I have also had posters defaced with libelous comments painted on them. This has not been caused by a few boisterous students. This is a targeted campaign against me and is a scandalous situation in a democracy," he said, "I have reported the matter to the gardaí and I would appeal to members of the public to alert myself or gardaí if they notice any suspicious activity at any of my posters."

Separately, Mr O'Dea headed to the summit of Thomond Park this Tuesday before abseiling down the home of Munster rugby.

Speaking to The Leader, he said it was a "hair-raising" experience, and one which he admits has been the scariest moment of the 2020 general election campaign so far.

FIANNA Fail leader Micheal Martin says there is no time to "hang around" on solving the problems related to University Hospital Limerick (UHL).

Just two days after thousands of people marched in protest at conditions in the Dooradoyle hospital, Mr Martin was in Limerick canvassing alongside both his party's candidates, Cllr James Collins and Willie O'Dea.

Asked about health, and the problems UHL is facing, Mr Martin said: "We can't hang around. We have an urgent programme for health. We're not going to wait 10 years for Slaintecare to be implemented. We'll put five million extra home care packages in. Why? Because one of the big problems in emergency departments is that people can't leave hospital when they've finished their care."

Candidates bid to resolve higher education 'crisis'

UNIVERSITY of Limerick hosted an election debate on the Future Funding of Higher Education, giving four of Limerick city's election candidates an opportunity to outline their policies for addressing what they have described as a "crisis" within the sector.

A 200-strong audience of UL students, staff and invited guests gathered for the debate on campus on Wednesday, January 29, which was moderated by Professor Stephen Kinsella.

Labour TD Jan O'Sullivan, Fine Gael Senator Maria Byrne, Green Party Councillor Brian Leddin and Aontú candidate Michael Ryan took part.

Jan O'Sullivan said: "I do believe there is a crisis in higher education. The Cassells Report still needs to be acted on and implemented. I think it's a disgrace that there's been no action, as I know the crisis has gotten worse. I believe there has to be more public funding, I don't believe there should be more pressure put on students and families. There's currently €1bn in the National Training Fund to be used as a source of funding."

The Labour TD also outlined her plans to improve workers rights in universities, inclusive access to higher education for all and adjusting the SUSI non-adjacent rate to 24km instead of 45km.

Senator Maria Byrne said: "As a government today we've invested €1.88 bn in terms of higher education, this went up 25 percent over four years. When we went into government the money wasn't there to invest, it's

beginning to come back. Now that our economy is coming back, there's a pledge for higher education funding."

Brian Leddin "Funding here has collapsed, we're spending €8,000 per student per annum at the moment, including student contribution. That's €3,000 less than the UK, who are about to double their investment. The Green Party policy is borrowed from central and northern Europe, where the investment is far greater than it is here. We believe in the power of public taxation to fund public services, we don't make an apology for that."

"There are people who cannot access third level education," he continued, "education is how people reach full potential, and if we create barriers to that then it's deeply unfair and widens

the gap in our society."

Finally, Aontú's Michael Ryan described the lack of government funding in the sector as a "scandal on-par with other scandals in Irish society that the present parties have not tackled.

"I'd go further and say that they're still not getting the message that it's more than a scandal - it's an emergency, issues such as our hospitals and housing and certainly funding of third level."

He continued to say that the lack of funding is "fatally undermining" the contribution of Limerick's third-level institutions to society.

"We must prioritise the development and implementation of a long-term investment model," he added, "at least €100m every year for the next three years needs to be invested, of which Limerick should get a fifth."

Leo turns to economy as election nears end

Politics: Taoiseach highlights investment on the canvass at Crescent SC

AS the election campaign reaches the final furlong, Fine Gael appears to be switching to its old reliable of the economy.

Speaking in Limerick, its party leader and Taoiseach Leo Varadkar has warned that a return to a Fianna Fail government could collapse the economy, and put major capital projects like the M20 and the new 96-bed unit at UHL in doubt.

Just an hour after opposition leader Micheal Martin was pressing the flesh at the Crescent Shopping Centre on Monday, Mr Varadkar was attempting to do the same when he took to the canvass with his party's two candidates in the city, Senators Maria Byrne and Kieran O'Donnell.

Referencing a number of other capital projects, Mr Varadkar said: "We're making the right changes and if we keep the economy strong, we will see it through. There is a risk if we go back to Sinn Fein or Fianna Fail that the economy will go down again, these projects which should have been built years ago will be stalled again.

"That will be really bad news for the Mid-West."

His visit comes in the wake of a mass protest in the city on Saturday, where people demonstrated against the overcrowding at the emergency department in University Hospital Limerick. He appeared to rule out re-opening similar facilities in St John's Hospital,

Nenagh and Ennis.

"When it comes to where we should have our emergency departments, we always listen to the doctors, and the emergency department consultants. What they say to us is medicine has changed, and the only way to provide top class medicine is in specialist centres. I think the mistake made here was to centralise everything in Limerick without providing adequate bed capacity in UHL."

The election takes place on Saturday.

Light rail discussed at hustings

FOUR of Limerick's general election candidates took part in a debate on active and sustainable travel, organised by three key Limerick organisations in the area of transport.

The hustings took place in the city's Central Buildings on Thursday, with Limerick Cycling Campaign, the Irish Pedestrian Network and Fix Limerick Bus inviting candidates to present their vision for the future of Limerick travel.

Sinn Féin TD Maurice Quinlivan was in attendance, along with Labour TD Jan O'Sullivan, Fianna Fáil councillor James Collins, and Green Party councillor Brian Leddin.

This event followed the recent Transport For

Limerick public meeting where over one hundred people attended presentations and discussions ahead of the upcoming Limerick Transport Strategy.

The debate featured topics such as improved pedestrian access to schools, upgrade of cycle lanes across the county, a potential light rail system connecting major suburbs to the city, regulation and improvement of existing bus routes, and reducing the number of drivers on our roads.

"We essentially need to move away from car-centric infrastructure, the objective is to reduce the amount of people who drive and handing the space that they've occupied for so long to active and sustainable transport modes, but ultimately that leads to very hard decisions. A policy shift is required, there's a fundamental flaw here in how we look at transport - it's 1950s stuff,"

said Brian Leddin.
This was agreed by James
Collins, who said people

need to use more public transport systems and mentioned making use of existing underused rail lines to create a light rail system as a long-term solution to the issue

Jan O'Sullivan reiterated this idea and urged that a citizens assembly is needed in Limerick to help put together a strategy to improve the current system.

Ideas such as park and ride facilities were proposed as practical solutions, with Maurice Quinlivan recognising that the city has a "massive problem" with its existing bus networks.

Hospital campaign eyes 'mass' protest

March: Over 1.000 took to the streets of Limerick

ORGANISERS of the weekend's major overcrowding protest in Limerick city are now looking to forge alliances across the country to "mass start demonstration".

More than 1,000 people from Limerick, Clare, Tipperary and Cork took to the streets on Saturday, to protest against University Hospital Limerick's worsening trolley crisis.

Organised by the Mid-West Campaign, Hospitals demonstration saw a significant political attendance, by general election candidates and councillors from all over the Mid-West.

Delivering the first speech at the protest, former councillor, Ms Cahillane said that they will take the protest to Dublin if the Government doesn't act on the health crisis.

Mid-West Hospitals Campaign spokesperson, Conor Reidy said they were pleased with the response, and thanked the gardai and traders "for allowing us the opportunity to make our voices heard in their city".

One of the key features of the protest was the waving of 92 numbered red flags, representing the patients were on a trolley on January 6.

Another member of the campaign, Geraldine O'Keeffe, said that politicians "have failed us and continue to let us down".

"You will have a chance to have your say at the ballot box. If they want our votes they must come up with some strong and urgent solutions. The time for the 'no-quick-fix' excuse has passed. The fix must happen now. This campaign has had an overwhelmingly

beginning and will only grow stronger from here.

Mid-West Hospitals Campaign is this week putting together a formal delegation from across the three affected regions.

The campaign will be demanding immediate meetings between this delegation and newly elected TDs across the three counties, as well as $\,$ the new health minister.

The campaign says they expect that this will be the commencement of an ongoing dialogue that will end with the full and "final implementation of acceptable and humane emergency and mental health services in the Midwest".

There were 1,215 patients treated on a trolley in January, the worst ever January for any hospital since records began in 2006. This is a 25% increase on January 2019 figures, according to the INMO.

A FILE is being prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions following a significant drugs and cash seizure in the city centre, writes David Hurley.


The seizure was made at around 5pm last Wednesday after members of the Divisional Drugs Unit stopped and searched a man who was



Mary's Cathedral. Tourists move along to this street, and I'd hope it will put a bit of life back here. It was vibrant here 40 years ago, and there's no reason it should not be the same again".

"You used to be able to get anything on this street, maybe barring a bag of coal. We've great memories of our youth here," said Brendan, who grew up on the Island.

Mayor Michael Sheahan

said: "Nicholas Street is one of Limerick's most historic streets. It leads people towards King John's Castle, one of our main attractions. Yet it was clear it was neglected down through the

ears."

He said while "a lick of paint" sounds so simple, it's actually involved a lot of work behind the scenes.



Cost of policing final hits €21k

Hurling: Munster Council pays for 'non public' duties

THE cost to the GAA of policing the Munster senior hurling final at LIT Gaelic Grounds last June was more than €21,000, it can be revealed. Figures obtained by The Leader

under the Freedom of Information Act show a total of €21,757 was paid by the Munster Council to An Garda Síochána for "non-public" duties associated with the Munster final between Limerick and Tipperary on

June 30, 2019.

The Munster Council paid a further €28,800 to An Garda Siochana in relation to the round-robin fixtures of Limerick versus Cork on May 19 and Limerick versus Clare on June 9.

Two other fixtures at LIT Gaelic

Grounds also teature 10 events during 2019.

A total of €9,450 was paid
LuthChleas Gael with the All-Ireland senior football qualifier between Galway and Mayo on July 7 while €6,030 was paid in relation to All-Ireland under 20 hurling final between Cork and Tipperary on August 24.

Elsewhere, the figures show the biggest non GAA-related payment – €18,000 – was made by organisers of the Great Limerick Run which took place over the May bank-holiday weekend.

According to An Garda SÍochána, significant payments were also received last year non-public duties from Munster Rugby, Limerick Racecourse and the organisers of the Pig N Porter

The only payment which was not sport-related was made by Cairde Two Films. The production company paid €2,581 to have a garda presence





Teachers picket for end of pay gap

Education: Schools close as union members strike

SCHOOLS and colleges across Limerick were closed this Tuesday as hundreds of teachers took to the picket line over pay inequality.

Members of the Teachers' Union of Ireland (TUI) took strike action over the failure to end a nine-year regime of pay discrimination, which the Union says risks causing 'irreparable damage' to the education system and the service to students.

The 24-hour strike affected many secondary schools in the county, as well as colleges of further and adult education and Institutes of Technology/Technological

The strike comes as a result of teachers who entered the profession since 2011 still being paid at a lower rate than their colleagues for carrying out the same work.

TUI area representative for Limerick city, Maura Carrol, who was picketing outside Limerick College of Further Education, said: "This has been a very long time coming. People are so enthusiastic in their support, I think, because it's dragged on for so long. People are frustrated and there are more and more teachers on the lesser-paid stream coming on every year so there needs to be an end to this soon

"We haven't striked until now, and this is





You may not have to look far to save on mortgage

The chances are good, that you spend very little time thinking about your mortgage. Which is strange because, if you have one, it's likely to be your biggest monthly

And if you don't know how healthy yours is, you could be paying thousands more in interest payments and more years paying it, than you need to.

We can become very complacent with our mortgage - a fact borne out in a study carried out by the Competition and Consumer Protection Commission (CCPC) which discovered that a little under 50% of mortgage holders knew what rate they were paying.

That's pretty shocking, because if you don't know what it is, you have no reference point to measure whether it's good or bad against. And no idea, whether you need to move providers or stay with your existing one and just get a better deal from them.

I was watching Operation Transformation recently, and thought losing weight and reducing your mortgage rate weren't that dissimilar, and we could learn some lessons from the leaders of the programme.

The first being how they begin their weight loss journey, and that's to stand on the weighing scales. It's their starting point and it should be yours as well. If you want to lose interest and loan repayments, you need to step up on the mortgage scale and weigh your interest

Are you in the fit and normal range with a rate of between 2.3% and 3.2%, or is your mortgage mass index (MMI) in the overweight range which is above 3.2% but below 4%, or is it obese at a rate above 4%? Regardless of what range you fall into, now's the time to review your

I heard a radio advert last week from a mortgage broker encouraging people to consider moving their mortgage to a different provider, something they would obviously help them with. In the advert they suggested the process was a very simple one which surprised me because, my experience of moving your mortgage from one lender to another is anything but.

That's not to say you shouldn't - it may make perfect sense, and you could have a very good experience if you do but it's important to know what the process is like, what's involved, what the timeline involved from start to finish is

According to the Central Bank, the number of mortgages being switched as a percentage of total outstanding



private dwelling mortgages is less than 1%. If it's very easy to move providers, why is this number so low?

There are a number of reasons why people see the move as a big complex undertaking, e.g. uncertainty over the savings achieved over the lifetime of their mortgage; time spent involved in the process, like gathering documents, getting their property revalued, employing a solicitor to deal with legal work and so on.

Regardless of whether it's easy or difficult moving lenders, it has the potential to save you thousands of euro and fast-track your ability to become mortgage-free and one you shouldn't discount. I believe your starting point about whether you should stay with your current provider or not, will come down to what they can offer you and how does that match against others?

Yes, you could trim your rate by moving lenders, but your existing lender could also help with some interest rate loss as well, particularly if your rate is a variable one.

If you're one of the c. 227,500 mortgage holders in Ireland who have a standard variable rate you are probably paying more than you need to. And you don't have to look past your existing lender because they probably have much better fixed or loan to value rates.

Let's take an example of one lender -Bank of Ireland. They have a standard variable rate of 4.50% if your loan to value is >80%. But they have a five year fixed offering of 3.90%. The difference in monthly repayments between both on a loan amount of €400,000 over a 25-year term is €205.

That's an annual net saving of €2,460. The difference in total interest paid back between both is €40,202.

DID YOU KNOW?

Elizabeth Warren one of the front runners in seeking the Democratic nomination to run against President Trump later this year, is a bit of a financial adviser. In 2005 she wrote a book called, All Your Worth: The **Ultimate Lifetime** Money Plan. I've read it and it's

excellent.

If you didn't need that saving of €205, because you work a cash flow surplus each month, if the savings were applied as an overpayment each month, you would reduce the term on this mortgage by three years five months, reducing your interest payments a further

By adopting this strategy, you are also reducing the effective rate of interest you are being charged to 3.35%.

So, you're not just reducing your mortgage rate by .60%, you're reducing it by 1.15%, and saving c. €75,772 in interest repayments in the process.

How long will it take to complete a form to move from a variable to a fixed rate and set up a standing order for that overpayment? I'd say about 15 minutes. It's really not difficult.

And if you can save €75,772 by doing something that takes 15 minutes, I think that's time well spent. You're saving €5,051 for every minute it takes you and if you can find a better return than that, please let me know.

There's potentially big savings up for grabs with your mortgage. Your starting point is knowing what your current rate is and seeing if it's fit for purpose or not? And is that purpose wanting to pay your mortgage off faster because of the lower rate, or is it because you need to relieve some cashflow pressure?

Your current lender maybe able to offer you a better rate that satisfies whatever your goal is, and when you know what it is, compare it against other lenders, and run the numbers. Unless there was a significant difference, I don't think you need to go to the trouble of moving lenders and all that's involved with that, but if there is and it's significant enough for you, then take action sooner rather than later.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, I'm 53 years old and I was recently diagnosed as suffering from Coeliac disease. I was told by my GP that I may be able to claim tax relief because of my condition. Is this correct?

A. Anyone who suffers from Coeliac or any other dietary condition (e.g. diabetes) that forces them into altering the type of food they purchase, can claim tax relief on the cost of food at a rate of 20%.

And I think if you ask someone who has been buying gluten free food, they'll tell you how expensive it is compared to food containing gluten, and how important this tax relief is. It probably doesn't even compensate what the difference is. I read one study which stated gluten free food products were 83% more expensive than regular

So, if you're weekly shopping bill once cost for example €80, it's likely to increase to c. €146 and you need to factor this into your monthly budget. By claiming 20% relief, you can reduce this new cost by €29. You're still going to be paying about 46% more than previously, so the tax relief doesn't compensate fully but it's something at least.

To claim it back, you need a letter from your GP or consultant, confirming you are a coeliac. When you submit a claim to Revenue, you can only claim for expenses you have receipts for. So, whenever you visit a shop, keep your receipts because you need to prove you purchased wheat free products.

And please make sure you avail of this tax relief. When you run the numbers, you can see from a financial perspective how important it is. The best and quickest way to make this claim is using Revenues online service, myaccount. When you enter the site, click on complete income tax return, and inside the tax credits section, you'll see health expenses', and this is where you insert your costs.

Roads and transport key, says the Chamber

Election: Business group launches 'manifesto' ahead of polling

WITH just days to go until the general election, the Limerick business community has put together a list of requests of the incoming government.

Among these are a call to fast-track the Northern Distributor Road, develop a reliable bus and cycle network, put more gardai into community policing, and establish a minister for city regions to ensure balanced regional development.

The most important of these priorities, Limerick Chamber chief executive Dee Ryan said, is to fast-track the Northern Distributor Road – approved in 2017 – in order to cut the delays of almost an hour for workers and students leaving the National Technology Park.

Chamber chief economist Dr Caitriona Cahill added: "In tandem with the Northern Distributor Road, Limerick needs a modern, regular rapid bus system connecting all of our county towns and suburbs with our centres of work and learning."

A minister to help progress city regions like Limerick, would the business group says, help that a "progressive urban agenda" takes place and ensure a focus is brought to developing a counter-balance to Dublin.

Dr Cahill added: "Urban place-making, the delivery of a suitable mix of housing and urgent climate action are essential for our next



government. Now is the time to bring a focus to these issues. Limerick is no different to the rest of the country with regional growth being linked to our attractiveness to foreign direct investment."

Meanwhile, William Street shoe shop owner Michael Gleeson has called on the new government to provide a subsidy for parking in city centres to cut the cost to the motorist.

"It would help bring people into all cities. Dublin is privileged to have the Dart and the Luas, whereas places like Limerick and Cork are suffering," Mr Gleeson argued.

Limerick Chamber chief executive Dee Ryan and chief economist Dr Catriona Cahill have set out the business community's priorities for government following the general election In the last year, he claimed 20 family businesses have closed in Limerick.

And to tackle this, he has called on local councillors to hold an emergency meeting

"If these figures aren't alarming, nothing is. It's been caused by the development of out-of-town shopping in all regions. The planning to allow these developments was the death knell of retailing in the city centre. We cannot compete with free car parking," the businessman told Leader Business.

Limerick, and the rest of Ireland goes to the polls this Saturday, February 8.

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
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Knock-umentary presented to the Pope

Breast cancer patients and survivors needed

RESEARCHERS at Lero, the Science Foundation **Ireland Research Centre** for Software, are looking for breast cancer patients and survivors to take part in a workshop at University of Limerick (UL) this weekend.

It's the perfect opportunity to have your watch stolen for entertainment or have your friend think they see a leprechaun for a laugh. 8pm, tickets are €34.

Livin Dred Theatre are in the **Lime Tree** this Saturday night with their revival production of Trad, Mark Doherty's play about a 100-year old man on a search to find his 70-year-old son, cajoling his ancient dad into joining the quest. You could slap an 'After Beckett' label on the poster for this play and it would seem perfectly appropriate. It's an absurdist tour through Irish yearning, stories and begrudgery, backed with a live guitar and fiddle score. The play had a very successful run last year at the Peacock and is heading back there in April, so catch it while it's on tour. 8pm, tickets are €20 / €18 concession.

Sunday (February 9) The **Limerick Philharmonic**

Orchestra are performing at St Mary's Cathedral this Sunday evening. You'll be presented with the delights of Beethoven's Leonore overture, followed by marvellous first oboe concerto by Ludwig Lebrun, and finally finishing with Beethoven's slightly cheeky Second Symphony. The Second isn't Beethoven's finest symphony but it's definitely in the top eight of the nine he wrote. Certainly better than that kazoo minuet you half-composed in the shower last weekend. It starts at 6pm and it's a free gig with a retiring collection.

All weekendElliptical Affinities is at Limerick City Gallery until March, joined by extended exhibitions of State Of Print and the Hollander Workshop until the same date. All free to see. Best Costume Goes To is at the Hunt Museum until April 14 and will cost you €7.50.



Caring for those unwell people - big and small

IT started at 5am on Monday with 'I feel very hot'. The feverish nineyear-old was given Calpol, a hug and brought back to bed, while the toddler decided it was obviously getting up time.

Fast forward a couple of very busy days in work and we end up in a late-night, walk-in clinic where the doctor informs me that the little guy has a strep throat and is 'inevitably in a lot of pain'. Once he was dosed up and safely ensconced in bed, I spent the night berating myself for not paying enough attention, for being a working parent and for just about everything else I wasn't doing as a parent. Somewhere around dawn, I had an epiphany children get sick, it happens. The

important thing is to nurse them and to mind ourselves as parents in the process. In a nutshell, less guilt and more self care.

Being up over a few nights with a sick child can have the same affect as jet-lag, minus the cocktails and sunshine. Your heart goes out to them because you can't make them feel instantly better with a hug and the regular household routine goes out the window. Who feels like cooking when appetites are dwindling so while the cooker is on strike, the washing machine is working over-time. Towels and bed clothes go on hot washes while you dream about throwing yourself into a hot shower. The thing is, all of those things can

wait. Focus on yourself and your child and, I promise, the world won't end.

Your child is probably lethargic from being unwell so take every opportunity to just $snuggle\,together-in\,bed, on\,the$ couch while watching movies, anywhere that works. They need the attention (because illness makes us all needy) and you need the down-time. Stock up on smoothies and frozen ice pops to soothe sore throats and ensure hydration. In between doses of medicine, they can also feel like a much-needed little treat. Whether your child is 2 or 12, being unwell can make them clingy and a little demanding but try to respond without

smothering.


Remember, even babies can pick up on parental stress so try to keep calm.

THEN your system is run down by stress or illness, your unwelcome tenant might also pop up its head.

The herpes virus, once contracted will never leave your system, just hide in the ganglions of your nervous system, waiting for the right conditions to show up as cold sores, shingles - even recurrent meningitis; that is inflammation of the membranes (meninges) surrounding your brain and spinal cord.

The herpes virus is a contagious virus that can be transmitted from person to person through direct

contact. Some people may never have a breakout but might be silent carriers. An estimated 69% of people under age 50 are carriers. Anyone can be infected at any age, women and those with a weakened immune system are more likely so.

Blistering sores are common sight of outbreaks but not necessary at every time. Itching, burning and flu-like symptoms might be the only complaints. As for any viral infections, currently there is no cure for herpes. Åntiviral medications can help people infected with the virus reduce the risk of

transmitting it to others. The medications also help to lower the intensity and frequency of outbreaks.

Long term, the only solution is prevention of outbreaks, which should include lifestyle

modifications and dietary changes. Stress and being run down are common triggers, so you need to learn stress relieving techniques and prioritise self-care. Avoid overwork - or manage your time better and don't

over-exercise. Make sure to get to bed early and turn off screens at least two hours beforehand. When you sleep your immune system can repair your body and fight infections.

The dietary solution is a bit tricky - especially if you are vegan. A healthy plant-based diet is rich in an amino acid called Arginine, which is great for the cardiovascular system, but it also feeds the herpes virus. Grains like wheat, oats, rice and nuts, seeds, beans contain a high ratio of this amino acid. Pork and chocolate have the same issue. Arginine must be way out-balanced by Lysine another amino acid, which suppresses the virus. If you eat a very varied diet you have a better chance of getting it right. You cannot go wrong by filling up on vegetables and herbs first and foremost these will reduce

inflammation and feed your good gut bacteria, which in turn strengthen your immune system. Choose more lysine-rich foods, such as fish, eggs, high-protein dairy products as quark, halloumi cheese, Greek yoghurt and plain whey protein powder.

You could also take L-lysine supplement daily, along with Zinc, Selenium, cod liver oil and probiotics. Your immune system need these nutrients to make natural killer cells which fights viruses and damaged cells. If you deal with a lot of stress, call upon some adaptogen herbs to help you cope better and relieve your immune system. One of the best herbs for this is Astragalus - the great immune and energy booster. As always, check for contraindications and find the root of your weakened immunity!



Limerick's hurling league title defence gathers pace

JOHN Kiely has welcomed a weekend free of competitive fare as a timely boost for the walking wounded in his Limerick senior hurling panel.

Limerick have won all five games in their 2020 season but are free from action this weekend ahead of another run of three games across three successive weekends to conclude the group stages of the Allianz Hurling League.

Defending champions Limerick are already nicely positioned to reach the knockout stages after wins over Tipperary and Galway.

"We only had 24 players togged out today because a lot offellas had flu and fellas have a few niggly injuries and fellas have been playing Fitzgibbon Cup for the last few weeks and the U21 championship has started in Limerick and the Freshers Championship has started and we have two in that with UL," outlined John Kiely.

However, he is optimistic that any new injuries aren't long-term.

"They are not serious," he said of Hannon and English being substituted on Sunday.

"Precaution more than anything. At this time of the year, if in doubt get them out because there are bigger games ahead and we have a panel available and fellas are mad for game time so often it's just a welcome opportunity to get other fellas on the pitch."

He explained: "They are all close but they have little niggly things - Kyle

Meanwhile, the Limerick footballers are in Carlow this Sunday for their round three tie of the Allianz Football League. Division Four side Limerick, along with Sligo and Cork are the only teams in the league with 100% records.

Limerick have out their last two outings against Carlow and will need to maintain momentum for a promotion push in a fourth successive season in the basement division.

LIMERICK Camogie has vowed to seek clarification after the result of Sunday's Littlewoods Ireland League game with Tipperary was "reviewed" and ultimately changed.

At the final whistle in the LIT Gaelic Grounds, referee Andrew White confirmed it was a drawn match on a final scoreline of Limerick 1-7, Tipperary 0-10.

However, members of the Tipperary management, some in attendance in the Mackey Stand and members of the working media felt that Limerick had in fact lost by one point.

Later on Sunday night, the Camogie Association confirmed the result was being reviewed.

On Monday afternoon, they confirmed Tipperary as 0-10 to 1-6 winners in the round one game.

However, Limerick Camogie expressed extreme disappointment at the Camogie Association statement and have vowed to seek further clarification.

"Limerick Camogie Board, players and management are extremely disappointed to learn today that the Camogie Association had declared Tipperary as winners of yesterday's Littlewoods National League tie, 0-10 to 1-6," said a Limerick Camogie statement on Monday evening.

"We left the ground

yesterday having received confirmation from the referee that the game had ended in a draw. We are now looking further into the matter and will be seeking clarification as to how this decision was arrived at in due course," said the brief statement.

The Limerick statement came on foot of the brief statement from the national governing body.

"Upon review by the referee, in consultation with his umpires and match officials, of the scoring in yesterday's Littlewoods Ireland Camogie League Division 1 Group 2 fixture between Limerick Tipperary we can now confirm the official match result as Limerick 1-6 Tipperary 0-10 resulting in a one point victory for Tipperary," said the Camogie Association statement.

"We would like to thank all involved for their patience regarding this matter," concluded the statement from the national body.

All agree that the game was level, 1-3 to 0-6 at half time so some error was made by the referee in the course of the second half, during which there was a long stoppage for an injury to Limerick goal scorer Rebecca Delee.

Away from the boardroom arguments, Limerick's next game in the Littlewoods Ireland Camogie League is a Sunday February 23 trip to Galway, who were 2019 league and championship winners.

No need for a hurling sin-bin if rules applied

T'S not just politicians that are currently on the canvass trail -there is a vote coming down the tracks for the next GAA

Well my support would go to whoever vows to disband all 'playing rules committees' in Croke

There is a time and a place for change and new innovation but within sporting circles and especially the $\breve{\mathsf{G}}\mathsf{A}\mathsf{A},$ it appears that standing still for a little while is

Can they not just let hurling and Gaelic football mature under their current guise for a few years?

Debate still rages on the positives and negatives of the new 'Advanced Mark' in football and now the latest potential change is a sin-bin for hurling.

The introduction of the hurling sin-bin is one of a number of proposals the standing playing rules committee has put to Central Council for approval. Quite simply, it's time for the standing playing rules committee to sit down.

So the basis for the sin-bin would be the eradicate cynical fouling. Yes, cynical fouling is an increasing occurrence in hurling but for me the rules are there but the issue is that they are not

 $implemented \,to \,the \,letter\, of \,the \,law$ or on a consistent basis.

Hurling is a physical and abrasive game and common sense has to be applied by referees in varying situations but by and large I believe the rules of the game are sufficient if fully enforced by the referee, two sideline officials, a fourth official and four umpires.

I can hear the counter argument already - 'oh if the referee did that, there would be no one left on the pitch'. Well so be it, and I can tell you it would only happen once because players want to play not be sent off for two yellow cards or a straight red

Limerick hurling manager John Kiely gave his opinion to media after Sunday's Allianz Hurling League win over Galway.

"No way - the game is fine," said

Kiely.

"The game is absolutely 100% finethere is no body giving out about the game apart from one or two and they are going to be giving out anyway," added the Limerick manager.

His opinion will be supported by many but there will also be a broad chorus in favour of the sin-bin.

Debate is healthy in any walk of life and there are certainly enough media, pundits and sub-committees within GAA circles to keep this

I'm a firm believer that respect for a referee is a key component in terms of the effectiveness of the rules. In this regard, I'm note one of the 78 motions to Annual Congress later this month pertains to just that.

Fair play to the Naomh Eanna club in Wexford who are proposing to limit two players per team with the right to

speak to a referee during games.

It appears anyone else that voices an opinion to the referee would be penalised with a free against them but I would like to see this a yellow card

It's about giving protection and respect to the referee, which in turn affords the official, the time and confidence, to implement the rules that are already in situ.

It is not going to be easy to find that balance, but in the long run, what do we really




