

What's your idea of a perfect day, or a perfect weekend, in Limerick??

A perfect day would include an early walk along the walkway by the Shannon, from the University of Limerick to the city, followed by some prayer and reflection

What's your first Limerick memory?

I have two, not sure which is first. One is with my family driving through Limerick on my way from Dublin to West Kerry, stopping for a meal in a café on O'Connell Street. After passing through a lot of towns, Limerick had a city feel to it. The other would be visiting Ballyhahill with my family to meet with the Cahillane family there.

What's your favourite part of the county/city and why?

I often think that Limerick is completely undervalued from a tourism perspective as there are so many lovely areas, from the Ballyhoura region, to Adare, the estuary, the Shannon itself of course, right out to Castleconnell and beyond. There's the stunning Clare Glens as well. But one of my favourite places would, for sure be, Killeedy, which is associated with St Ita, the patron saint of the area. The Mass Rock there is a special place and it is a lovely part of Limerick, certainly very special to me.

What about a favourite local walk or view?

There's a great view of Limerick city and the distant Clare hills from the brow of Southhill. It gives a sweeping view of Limerick that is under-appreciated, I think.

What do you think gives Limerick its unique identity?

It's a Treaty City. It has the potential to bring the past, present and future into a dialogue. And to do that in so many areas – from sports to culture, from education to business, etc.

Do you have a favourite local restaurant?

I don't eat out much, but I'm often brought to a restaurant or hotel for a meal after Confirmation ceremonies right across Limerick city and county. It would be hard and unfair to indicate a favourite.

How would you describe the people of Limerick?

Realists with a sense of humour.

How important do you think sport is to Limerick?

Major. So many people in Limerick have been formed in all kinds of ways through sport – from building up team skills to keeping hope alive even when there are setbacks, from discipline and focus to camaraderie among supporters.

If you could add one amenity to Limerick what would it be?

I don't know if it's an amenity, but I think it would be great if Limerick could develop its own Camino trail. We have got an incredible collection of religious sites, from Kilmallock to Askeaton, Killeedy, Adare, Limerick city itself and much more. You could put all of them into a necklace and create something very special for Limerick for people to come and get some peace and calm along the way. I think another amenity that would be needed is an open house for drug addicts during the day. There's a place for addicts at night but nowhere during the day and we have to face up to this reality. Finally, something else that I feel we could do with are more public amenities for families to enjoy together.

What's the biggest challenge facing the city/county today?

Housing is the big issue everywhere. But I think Limerick is at a great turning point that will involve many important choices. The biggest challenge for us all is to really work together to let Limerick realise its potential.

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Man headbutted after knocking drink in bar

A MAN who headbutted another man at a pub in the city centre after his drink was accidentally knocked has avoided a prison sentence.

Ciaran O'Brien, 39, of Ardglass, O'Connell Avenue had pleaded guilty to a single charge of assault causing harm relating to an incident which occurred on May 6,

During a sentencing hearing,

Limerick Circuit Court was told the premises was very busy and that the defendant had been socialising on the night.

John O'Sullivan BL, prosecuting, said the accused placed a drink on a table and that when it was knocked he "suddenly and violently" headbutted the injured party - hitting him twice in the face.

Judge Tom O'Donnell was told there had been a

misunderstanding and that CCTV

footage from the pub shows the assault was unprovoked.

The victim, he added, sustained a nasal fracture and the court $heard\,his\,sense\,of\,taste\,and\,smell$ were affected as a result of the

Imposing sentence, the judge noted Mr O'Brien was remorseful and apologetic and had accepted full culpability for what happened.

He said his good work ethic and his previous good record were mitigating factors as was his

guilty plea. Judge O'Donnell said assaults such as what happened are "all too prevalent" and that they are not acceptable in a modern society.


"It was a vicious unprovoked and gratuitous assault - he (the victim) didn't see it coming," he commented.

He imposed a two and-a-half year prison sentence which he suspended in its entirety.

Separate civil proceedings in relation to the assault are ongoing.

No confirmed case of 'Wuhan' coronavirus

Health: Individuals 'in isolation' as cases are tested

THERE ARE no confirmed cases of the Wuhan coronavirus in Limerick, after UHL launched an investigation into three suspected cases at the weekend.

individuals with the suspected cases are understood to have visited China in recent weeks or were in contact with another individual with the virus, and are presenting with flu-like symptoms.

When a facility comes into contact with a suspected case, an activation plan is implemented by staff under national guidelines.

Individuals are kept in isolation as part of activation plans in cases of suspected coronavirus.

Also as part of activation plans, a specimen sample is taken from the patient which is then sent to a lab for

examination. The results take approximately 24 hours.

The Limerick Leader has contacted UL Hospitals Group regarding the matter, and was told to re-direct the query to the HSE, who in turn informed the Limerick Leader that the Department of Health was dealing with the issue. A Department of Health spokesperson

said: "There have been 15 suspected cases of Coronavirus tested in the National Virus Reference Laboratory (as of Monday 3 February. To date, there are no confirmed cases of Coronavirus in Ireland.

No information will provided about individual activations of these plans or about individual cases of novel Coronavirus other than confirmed cases.

Health Protection Surveillance Centre website is updated daily at 13.00 with the latest information about the Coronavirus. Visit HPSC.ie.

So far, deaths associated with the virus have surpassed 1,000, and there are currently over 40 confirmed cases in Europe - including eight in the UK.

The risk of infection for the European and UK population is currently according the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control. So far, just one of the 260 cases identified outside China has resulted in death. If a case is COTONAVITUS confirmed, the Department of Health issue a public statement, confirming the location of the detection.

Corbett family did not expect retrial

THE family of murdered Jason Corbett have say that they are confident that the North Carolina Supreme Court will uphold convictions second-degree murder for Molly Martens and Tom Martens.

"We all know what happened. Jason was beaten around his head with a brick and baseball bat. Molly, pictured,

Thomas Martens continued to beat Jason after he died. His two children were left orphaned result. Jason's children, Jack and Sarah,

had to sheltered by police the from seeing what Martens inflicted on their father," the family have claimed.

"The autopsy has not changed nor have the horrific details of Jason's death. The Martens total lack of injuries at the scene have not changed. The fact that Jason was drugged has not

changed," they said.

The family say they had not expected the decision to order a retrial for the father and daughter who are accused of murdering the Limerick man in 2015.

We had not expected this decision. We fully respect the Court of Appeals process and the law in North Carolina though we are obviously disappointed. We are now confident the North Carolina

Supreme Court will uphold convictions second-degree murder on appeal. We will continue to support the Davidson County North Carolina prosecutors who helped us get justice for Jason in 2017."

Tom Martens, a retired FBI agent, claimed he acted in self-defence and alleged Mr Corbett had been attacking Molly. However, Jason's family claim that not once during the five-week trial did Tom or Molly Martens offer

any evidence of abusive

behaviour by Jason prior to August 2,2015."Tom Martens. who offered evidence in his own defence, is on record as saying never witnessed

or heard any abusive behaviour by Jason towards Molly in the previous four years of their marriage. The children recanted their statements," the family said.

"Molly Martens did not offer evidence in her own defence at her trial - but was perfectly willing to use US television to cast malicious slurs which she did not relate or substantiate from the witness box. She refused to give evidence," the family claim The actions of Tom and Molly Martens orphaned Jason's children by his beloved late first wife, Margaret 'Mags' Fitzpatrick. All of these facts remain the same. Jason is dead. We hope, trust and pray that the North Carolina Supreme Court will now see that justice is upheld," they added.







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Marathon 30-hour count brings change and history in the city

A NEW POLLTOPPER, an underdog Independent, a vanishing TD, a big beast losing her seat, and a bit of Green Party history.

All hallmarks of a marathon 30-hour count, which has seen four TDs returned to serve Limerick City.

It all kicked off bright and early at nine o'clock on Sunday morning, but it wasn't until after lunch on Monday when it wound up. Admittedly (and perhaps mercifully) the count staff did adjourn for the night at 1:30am, with a re-start at around 10am.

By mid-way through day one, we began to see the makings of an early political earthquake, with a dedicated cross-party team of tallymen and women reporting that Maurice Quinlivan was heading the poll in boxes where previously Fianna Fail's Willie O'Dea would have hoovered up the votes.

Areas like Our Lady of Lourdes, Presentation NS, and Our Lady Queen of Peace turned from one shade of green to another, as Sinn Fein's nationwide surge was reflected in Limerick.

Mr Quinlivan's team, while no doubt feeling satisfied, were

playing down the significance of the tallies, preferring to celebrate once the first count proper was announced. They'd have a long wait.

For although counting commenced at around 2pm, it was not until 6:45pm when the returning officer Sean Coughlan confirmed Mr Quinlivan's advance.

He'd smashed through the quota of 9,226 with 11,006 first preference

votes.

It was a chastening election for Willie O'Dea, who had initially hoped to be elected on the first count, becoming one of the few Fianna Fail TDs to achieve this feat.

In the end, he was just 28 off the quota with 9,198 first preference votes – and it was Sinn Feil poll toppers votes which saw him over the line.

For Kieran O'Donnell, Fine Gael,

it was a case of being in suspended animation. He was comfortably ahead of Cllr Brian Leddin in third position, but had to play a long waiting game until he was hoisted shoulder high by his supporters.

While Mr O'Dea secured his Dail return at 9.30pm on Sunday night, it was not until midday on Monday when the Fine Gael man was elected. Even if you're confident, that's still an agonising

wait – especially given the way he lost his seat in 2016.

Following the elimination of Labour's Jan O'Sullivan after 21 years in the Dail, it became a two-way battle for the final seat between Independent councillor Frankie Daly, who was thriving on his underdog status, and Green member Leddin. Cllr Leddin was eventually elected with a total vote of 5,856 at 1:30pm on Monday.

O'Donoghue makes history in big county upset

AS Storm Ciara battered and blustered its way across county Limerick at the weekend, the winds of change were also blowing hard across the political landscape of the county.

In an election which saw seismic changes right across the country, Limerick County had its own mini-quake. The anti-government mood saw outgoing TD Tom Neville's vote slump and lose the second Fine Gael seat opening the way for the big upset of the election: the battle for the third seat between Sinn Fein's Séighin O'Ceallaigh and Independent

Richard O'Donoghue.

The strength of the Sinn Fein surge in the constituency took many by surprise as Séighin O'Ceallaigh powered his way into contention with 6,916 first preference votes. He held strong right down to the last count where his bid for election was scuppered by the distribution of the Fine Gael surplus.

In the end, in what has proved to be a history-making election, Limerick County made its own bit of history, by electing an Independent to the Dáil for the first time ever.

It was a title that Richard O'Donoghue was more than happy to accept. Expected to poll well, his climb to victory began with 6,021 first preference votes, more than doubling his vote from 2016. But he had to endure a long count in which he and Seighin O'Ceallaigh were neck and neck, with just eight votes separating them at one one point.

Sitting TD Patrick O'Donovan, whose party colleagues around the country were being trounced, clutched at a personal victory. He topped the poll, and against the odds increased his first preference vote to 9,228 votes, one of only two Fine Gael TDs in the country to do so. He was elected on the fifth count.

On the first count also, Fianna

Fail's Niall Collins, with 8,436 votes, was safely on track to retain his seat. Following the elimination of his running mate, Cllr Michael Collins, he was the first TD to be declared elected on the fourth count.

Fianna Fail, by running a second candidate, increased its vote share to 30%, quite a bit ahead of the party's national figure of 22%. Cllr Collins, who was a late addition to

the ticket, polled a very creditable 5,150 first preference votes, given his late start.

The slump of over 2,000 in Tom Neville's first preference vote left him vulnerable from the start and he was eliminated on the fourth

This brought to an abrupt end a family history stretching back to 1997 when his father Dan, broke the mould of 50 years of Fianna Fail dominance in the constituency, to take a second seat for Fine Gael.

The Green Party's Claire Keating polled a very respectable 2, 503 votes on her first hustings but was not in contention for a breakthrough. Five other candidates were eliminated after the first count: Aontú's Conor O'Donoghue; Renua's John Dalton; Independents Con Cremin and Robert O'Donnell and Cristín Ní Mhaoldhomhnaigh, National Party. Conor O'Donoghue polled best with 712 votes.

Politics: Role reversal from 2016 as Quinlivan's surplus helps Willie

AMID all the rebel songs and the flying of the tricolour flag, Sinn Fein TD Maurice Quinlivan was thinking of his late father as he topped the poll in the city.

"This is something that would have been a dream for me. I think of my father Paddy, who did hard work. He raised five of us in a council flat. He paved the way for this," Mr Quinlivan told The Leader ahead of his election.

The rise of Sinn Fein, and Mr Quinlivan in the city has been incredible.

It took him three elections to make his breakthrough into representational politics, securing a berth on the old City Council back in 2009.

He failed to secure election to Dail Eireann in 2011, but topped the poll in City North at the local election in 2014, as part of a Sinn Fein surge.

A former travel agent, Mr Quinlivan followed this up in 2016 with an historic first election to Dail Eireann, taking the second seat and outpolling Finance Minister Michael Noonan.

While there was never any major doubt that Mr Quinlivan would retain his seat, it was felt he would be in contention for the second or third place, following his party's disappointing local election result last summer.

Not so; the party's surge helped Mr Quinlivan into a polltopping performance, and he says it was the Mary Lou McDonald factor which played a key role.

"We had a fantastic leader in Mary Lou McDonald. She excelled herself in the debates and we felt that on the doors," Mr Quinlivan told

The Leader.

"The national media attack on our party was awful. It came up on the door but not in the way they expected. There are lessons there for them. I think the [Irish] Independent was an absolute disgrace. RTE need to look at themselves too, they are a publicly funded organisation and they need to realise they need to look after all the people. But the campaign was very good and very positive. People were talking to me about their stories we had to

deliver change to give workers and families a break. That resonated with people," he added.

Mr Quinlivan also thanked his party's supporters who braved Storm Ciara to come out and back him, a move which saw him win 11,006 votes.

With a quota of 9,226, it meant he had 1,780 votes left to share.

The chief beneficiaries were Frankie Daly (525 votes), Mary Cahillane (307) and Willie O'Dea (262).

Pints, interactive maps and history makers: Leader's golden digital day

THE THREE days of the dramatic election in Limerick, from polling to the final count, proved to be one of the biggest hits in the history of the Limerick Leader website since it was launched in the early 2000s.

The three days of intense digital coverage followed two weeks of pre-election reporting, through the newly-launched podcasts and the traditional On The Canvass feature with a modern online twist.

The presence of a 12-strong team throughout the first count day influenced the website's second best performing day in the history of the website, with 339,000 views.

This is a 636% increase on the outreach of the general election in 2016, and a 41% increase on the traffic during the local elections in 2019.

The extensive online coverage included a live blog, which ran from Sunday 9am until 1.30am, and Monday 10am to 3pm; a summary of all the action in the As It Stands feature; a plethora of breaking news stories as the drama unfolded; and an exclusive interactive map, which revealed which candidate topped each polling station in both Limerick

The latter revealed that Fianna Fail, Fine Gael, Sinn Fein and Independents were the only politicians to top polls in each station, according to the tallied votes.

In fact, history-maker Brian Leddin was the only successful candidate in all of Limerick to

not be any polling station favourite, according to the registered tallies.

The most popular breaking news story of the election was the sensational, historic victory of Richard O'Donoghue, who claimed to be Limerick's first Independent TD. However, it was in fact Gilbert Hewson who became Limerick's first Independent TD in the June 1927 elections. He subsequently lost this seat three months later.

One of the highlights of the election coverage was the strong rolling content on social media, predominantly through Facebook, Twitter and YouTube, which now contains an archive of video with the elected and eliminated candidates.

Between Facebook and Twitter, there were a total of 991,000 impressions over the three election days. The most popular social post, unsurprisingly, was Deputy Willie O'Dea's celebratory pint pic in South's Pub on Quinlan Street. Our social media scoop raised a few eyebrows as the Fianna Fail stalwart failed to hang around the count centre for his own election.



Willie exits count centre to toast his election in South's Bar

Rueful: FF man says policies did not 'percolate' to electorate

ONE of the stories of the day from the Limerick Count Centre was the surrendering of the polltopper crown in the city from Willie O'Dea to Maurice Quinlivan.

Before the election, Willie was considered an unbackable favourite to secure election to Dail Eireann, most people not questioning whether he would top the poll, but by just how many votes.

There was a real confidence that he would come close to matching his record-breaking first preference of 2007, when he secured more than 19,000 votes.

It didn't quite work out like that, with Mr O'Dea's vote down almost 4,000 from the 12,999 first preferences he received in 2016, recording a first preference total of 0.108

This meant he had to wait for the second count to secure his return to the Dail, and his old adversary Mr Quinlivan topping the poll would not have gone down well at all.

It's 10 years since Mr O'Dea was forced to resign his job as Minister for Defence after false claims he made over Mr Quinlivan, and it will no doubt rankle with him and his supporters that the Sinn Fein man passed him out.

And in another role reversal from 2016, it was Mr Quinlivan's huge surplus of over 1,700 which put Mr O'Dea over the line.

Four years ago, it was Mr Quinlivanjokingly thanking his old rival for the transfer.

In the count centre, Mr O'Dea cut a frustrated looking figure, sitting behind a counter, away from his supporters. He'd normally be enjoying every minute of his re-election.

By the time the returning officer Sean Coughlan announced the Fianna Fail man's election, he was nowhere to be seen. He'd gone off to South's Pub to have a quiet pint with supporters.

It was a far cry from the celebrations Fianna Fail enjoyed in 2016 in Collins's Bar in Dooradoyle, when the questions



"We're going to be here all night, this is very inefficient. I don't care if I'm quoted on that," said Willie O'Dea as he left the count centre before being officially elected, to head to Souths Bar in Limerick city to celebrate

arose as to why Mr O'Dea did not have a running mate given his surplus.

He did this time, in the shape of the proprietor of that pub, James Collins

This, and the loss of Bilboa, Westbury, and Shannon Banks from the constituency, will no doubt be cited as reasons that Mr O'Dea's vote was down.

Speaking to the Limerick

Leader, Mr O'Dea put a brave face on matters during the short time he spent at the count centre in Patrickswell.

He said: "We all live to fight another day. I will be a member of the next Dail and I will disperse my duties accordingly."

Asked why he felt Fianna Fail did not perform as many people had expected, the former frontbencher added: "We could have done better. What basically happened is that people wanted change and we didn't persuade them sufficiently that we were the party to bring about the change they wanted, even though a lot of the changes, some of the good things done during confidence and supply were forced on the government by us."

"But it doesn't seem to have percolated through to the people," he sighed ruefully.

Maria Byrne to 'reassess' situation after loss

'Proud': First-time runner misses out on Dáil seat

FINE Gael Senator Maria Byrne has failed to secure a seat in the 33rd Dáil, bringing more than 50 years of her family's political representation to an end.

Maria, who polled 2,998 first-preference votes from the Limerick city constituency, was eliminated on the seventh count which took place on this Monday morning.

However, approximately 60 percent of her 3,671 yetes by her final

votes by her final count were transferred to fellow Fine Gael candidate Kieran O'Donnell, who was elected on the eighth count with

9,754 votes.

Maria has said she is "proud" of her performance as a first-time candidate in a landmark general election which saw Sinn Féin support grow tenfold nationwide.

"Obviously there's been a swing to Sinn Féin all over the country, so it's not just here in Limerick. This was my first time running for the general election so I'm very proud. I've had great support from my team. There has been a national swing against not just Fine Gael but Fianna Fáil too for that matter," she stated. On Sunday night, Maria told the Limerick Leader that she thought she would be "in the shout" for the last city seat.

Maria received just 23 of Maurice Quinlivan's supporter's second preference votes during the second count, and her votes increased by just 21 on the third count.

During the fourth count,

Maria's votes increased by 93 with Aountú's Michael Ryan's transfers, while things began to look promising on the fifth with the supply of 118 extra votes.

Following the transfer of Willie O'Dea's surplus of 234 during the sixth count, Maria received the least amount of votes with just 13, while Kieran O'Donnell's figure increased by 15.

increased by 15.

The elimination of James Collins during that count saw Maria's votes bump up by 405 thanks to his vote transfer in

O'Donnell, securing his election while Jan O'Sullivan received 540 of her votes, with Frankie Daly and Brian Leddin receiving 540 and 456 respectively.

After having spent 21 years in politics, Maria said she would have to "reassess" her situation, but is hopeful and determined to continue on her political path.

"I just want to express my sincere thanks to everyone who voted for me and to my team for the help and support I have received over the past few weeks," she said.

Maria Byrne first entered politics as a Young Fine Gael member, age 14, and her father Bobby served as Mayor between 1978 and 1980.

Maria served a Councillor on Limerick City and County Council from 1999 up until her election to Seanad Éireann in 2016, and was also Mayor of Limerick from 2010

THERE was an outpouring of emotion as Fine Gael Senator Kieran O'Donnell claimed the third seat in Limerick City on Monday morning. Back in 2016, Mr O'Donnell had

Back in 2016, Mr O'Donnell had looked nailed on for the last seat in the constituency, until a lazarus-like comeback from Labour's Jan O'Sullivan denied him.

This time, it was something of a role reversal, as Mr O'Donnell secured election, at the same time as Ms O'Sullivan exited the race for the 33rd Dáil.

Following the 2016 election, Mr O'Donnell won a seat in the Upper House.

But his goal was always return to Dail Eireann.

"The party asked me to run for the Seanad, but with one express purpose – to get back into Dáil Eireann," he said, "I enjoy representing the people of Limerick and North Tipperary. To have an endorsement to do it in Dail Eireann at the highest possible representational

level is what I'm really pleased about today."

He added: "We had a fantastic campaign. The public we met on our journey, it's a fitting tribute to them to get their endorsements to go back into Dail Eireann and represent them. We have a lot to do."

Mr O'Donnell pledged to push for the new 60-bed unit at University Hospital Limerick and the M20, as well as extra gardai in Limerick.

We need our fair share in Limerick and North Tipperary. I intend to

continue that work to ensure we get that Limerick and North Tipperary gets its fair share," he added.

Prior to his election, Mr O'Donnell also declined to speak to the media, one of his campaigners telling this reporter that "we've been here before" when their man looked on course for a Dáil berth.

Speaking to the media after being raised shoulder high by his supporters, he admitted it had been a tough election for Fine Gael, but declined to comment on calls for An Taoiseach Leo Varadkar's resignation.

"We as a party and as a group need to reflect collectively as to what message the public have given us as a party," was what he said.

Mr O'Donnell's election looked on the cards from early on, with his first preference tally 6,589 giving him a commanding lead of 3,337 over his nearest challenger.

But it was not until the penultimate count he reached the quota, with a massive transfer of 2,105 from his running mate Maria Byrne taking him across the line.

'There is life after politics', says eliminated Jan O'Sullivan

"IT'S the reality of politics, we have to accept the decision of the electorate."

The words of former Education Minister Jan O'Sulivan who lost her seat in Limerick City after 21 years in the Dáil.

The long-serving Labour TD was eliminated on the eighth count in Limerick City, and she is now considering her future in politics.

She was first elected in a by-election in 1998 following the death of her political mentor Jim

Speaking to reporters at the Limerick Count Centre, Ms O'Sullivan did not rule out running again if there was an election in short order.

But, she added: "If we get a stable government that lasts, I think it's more likely I won't run again. We have three very good city councillors, all of whom are well

capable of running for the Dáil." And she insisted there is "life after politics".

"I spent today with my five grandchildren," Ms O'Sullivan said. She blamed her defeat - which

saw the Labour party sink to just six Dail seats - as the voters still associating the party with its last time in coalition.

"We are still being seen as part of the pain that people suffered and that's the reality of going into government, particularly when the country was on its knees. We have to accept that," she said, "People are angry and want change. I thought we were offering change. We have very good housing policies, very good

health policies, particularly in relation to Limerick where we launched our health campaign. But the reality is we were just not in the running this time around."

She says she is sad to be ending her two decades in the Dail, adding: "You have to be tough enough to accept that. And to accept also that we live in a democracy, and it's the people who decide who wins the seats and not the public representatives.

'I couldn't have seen this coming' says Brian Leddin

Historic: History is made as Leddin becomes Limerick's first-ever Green Party TD

DECLINING the offer of being hoisted shoulder high by his colleagues, Brian Leddin rejoiced in a more humble manner despite making history by becoming Limerick's first-ever Green Party TD. He instead smiled, shared a kiss with his girlfriend Ester, and embraced his mother, the former Mayor of Limerick city, Kathleen.

Speaking after his victory, Brian told the Limerick Leader: "I am really really humbled to be elected. The first Green Party TD in Limerick.

"I was elected to the council last May. I couldn't have seen this coming. It is a fantastic achievement for me, but also the team behind me."

Leddin, who became Limerick's first elected Green Party Councillor in 2019, was in a head-to-head clash with fellow north sider Cllr Frankie Daly from the very beginning of the

"We would like to see a change in how the city is managed. We would like to see it become a city that is easy to get around, that has an excellent public service. A city that is easy to walk and cycle around. Limerick's best future is really a competitive, compact ambitious European city and I think we can get there," said Mr Leddin.

However, it was not a simple win for the Green candidate. With the race going on until the eighth count when Leddin overlapped Cllr Daly, thanks to transfers from the eliminated Senator Maria Byrne this Monday morning.

Before the official announcement, Cllr Frankie Daly approached Leddin with a handshake and a hug, as the day came to a close. Despite the close-fought nature of his success, Leddin reassured Limerick Leader reporters that he was unaffected by nerves.

"No, I haven't been nervous at all. I thought coming into this that we

were going to achieve something big even if we didn't get elected. We knew we were in the hunt, so I said there is no point being nervous because we have already achieved something fantastic and as it happens we crossed the line, so it is really fantastic.

It was Labour's Jan O'Sullivan elimination from the race, and subsequent transfers, that gave Leddin an additional 2,351 votes to see him beat his rival with a total of 8,207.

The independent councillor finished the race, ending his campaign in a tight fifth place, with 6,720 votes.

"It's been a very strange year," said Leddin, noting his dramatic rise in

have just stepped into."


Leddin said that he believes that it is important that the Greens aspire to be in government.

"I haven't seen the national figures. I don't know where we lie. We said at the outset we are a party that's serious about what we are about. In order to drive the change we think is important, then we should aspire to be in government."

One topic of contention for the Green Party in the election was the proposed Čork-Limerick motorway (M20).

"The M20, that came up during the election. Our position is on the M20 is that there is a process underway at the moment that is looking at a number of different routes. It is also looking at bypass options, dual carriageway options, enhancing the rail connectivity between the two cities and also it's looking, I believe, at connecting through to Waterford."

Frankie vows to keep trying for Dáil

Politics: Cllr Daly just loses out to Green candidate

HAVING not spoken to the media all the way through the count, Cllr Frankie Daly broke his silence after conceding the last seat to Cllr Brian Leddin of the Green Party.

After nine counts in Limerick City, the Corbally man, a youth worker by profession, was the last man who failed to be elected.

As it became clear he would not bridge the gap to Cllr Leddin which had grown to over 800 by the end, Cllr Daly, accompanied by wife Kate, magnanimously approached Cllr Leddin to congratulate him.

'I'm just so proud and so thankful to all the people who supported me, the public who believed in me, to give me this opportunity. I'm humbled, I'm really appreciative," he said.

He paid tribute to two people who have passed away - Paddy Quilligan, who recently died, as well as Marcus Costelloe.

"Marcus, this one's for you. We'll come again. I want to pay a huge homage to Eddie Wade, Brigid Teefy, John Gilligan, the public at large. My wife's parents, Eddie Wallace, Anne Wallace, Catherine Daly-Wade, my father Frankie. And on this occasion my director of elections, the great and humble Sean O'Donovan," he

Cllr Daly vowed: "I'm coming back. I'm ready. I'm here to stay.'

A short time after that speech, he was joined by his son Josh, who was celebrating his tenth birthday.

At one stage in long long count, Cllr Daly had an advantage of 600 votes over Cllr Leddin, leading to many worried faces in the Green Party camp.

He made hay from the surplus afforded by both Maurice Quinlivan and Willie O'Dea, as well as the transfer of Aontu man Michael Ryan.

By the penultimate count, his lead over Cllr Leddin had shrunk to just four votes as the later vote transfers from Maria Byrne, James Collins and Jan O'Sullivan favoured Cllr Leddin.

And it was Jan O'Sullivan's vote transfer of 4,667 which saw Cllr Leddin over the line. Some 1,035 votes went to Cllr Daly, but 2,351 to the Green Party man. There were suggestions Ms O'Sullivan would transfer to Cllr Daly given their shared Labour heritage.

Those who didn't make the final cut

WHILE for some, there was plenty to celebrate as the results of the general election 2020 came to light, for others it was time to regroup, lick their wounds or simply be satisfied that they put up a good fight.

Social Democrats candidate Jenny Blake, was eliminated in the fourth count, with 2,650 votes.

"Thank you so much to everyone who voted for me yesterday and my incredible team. I am hugely proud and excited to build on what we've started," said Ms Blake after the results.

Rebecca Barrett of the National Party was eliminated following the second count, with only 380 votes. She was joined on the day by her husband, and National Party Leader, Justin Barrett. Speaking during the count, Mr Barrett admitted that he was disappointed that the National Party failed to secure the "protest

Taking to Twitter after the result, Ms Barrett said: "Thank you so much to everyone who supported me over these last three weeks. Especially those who were out leafleting,

canvassing and postering. It has been beyond humbling to realise just how much people are willing to give their time and energy to the cause we all truly believe in."

Solidarity's Mary Cahillane was also eliminated after the second count. She received 1,008 votes. Taking to Facebook after, Ms Cahillane said: "Thanks to everyone for their support. We will be back. Change is clearly in the air."

Aontu's Michael Ryan was eliminated following the third count with 1,860 votes.

City criminal jailed over pub burglaries

Addict: Judge describes accused man as a 'scourge'

A CRIMINAL figure who broke into a pub in the city centre on three separate occasions on the same night has been sentenced to five years' imprisonment.

Ross Cantillon, 38, who has an address at Denmark Street had pleaded guilty to burglary charges relating to a number of incidents on July 29, 2017.

During a sentencing hearing late last year, Detective Garda Dermot Cummins told Limerick Circuit Court gardai responded to a number of alarm activations at the Red Hen, Patrick Street in the early hours of the morning.

He said a window was smashed

with a rock at around 3.30 am and that Mr Cantillon can be identified in the area on CCTV.

He said he returned to the premises at 4.12am and can be seen helping a woman to gain access to the pub. At 5.20am he was captured on CCTV "crawling around behind the bar using a mobile phone for light".

garda investigation was launched and it was subsequently established that nothing had been stolen from the pub. However, considerable damage was caused at the premises.

Detective Garda Cummins said when gardai called to Mr Cantillon's home sometime later, he refused to allow them in and that members of the armed regional support unit were deployed to assist in his arrest.

Mr Cantillon, who has a large number of previous convictions, also admitted a number of shoplifting offences leading Judge O'Donnell to describe him as a "scourge" to retailers. "He is well known to security personnel at businesses in the city centre," he commented.

The judge noted that Mr Cantillon has chronic addiction problems and has been assessed as being at high risk of reoffending.

"He has an appalling record," he said noting he is making efforts to rehabilitate himself in prison.

He imposed prison sentences totalling five years.

The sentences were back-dated to reflect the time he has spent in custody.

Man charged over seizure of €196k in cash

A MAN has been charged with money laundering offences following the seizure of almost €200,000 in cash at a house in Limerick city, writes David Hurley.

Alan Murphy, 40, of Windsor Court, Castletroy View who appeared before Limerick District

court is facing trial on indictment before Limerick Circuit Court.



It's not the default, it's your fault

-met with a gentleman recently who was coming close to Lretirement (58) and had accumulated a significant amount of money in his pension fund.

Someone was now going to have to manage it for him, and not wanting to do it himself, or knowing who else to ask, he was thinking of just using the company who had previously administered companies fund.

The pension administrators were offering him a choice of default funds to choose from. That was the extent of their help. They had created three of four funds and he was to pick one of them himself. And their advice to him was, pick a fund based on his age. The older he was, the lower risk fund he should

I thought, if that was their approach, God he has a lot to worry about. It was pretty shocking that they didn't ask what his income requirements in retirement were. They didn't even try to find out what additional non-pension funds he had access to which would supplement his income, and nothing about his partner, and her pension.

He was trusting them with his money, for the rest of his life, but they were very light on what he should do. Their advice was, to invest into a default fund they had created, and he'd be fine. Their sales pitch was that he would have nothing to do, the fund managers would do everything, and his portfolio would automatically be re-balanced every year, and he had nothing to worry about.

Make no mistake and be in no doubt, he wasn't outsourcing the management of his fund, to investment managers, he was outsourcing the management of the fund to himself.

The biggest problems with default funds in my opinion, is their one size fits all approach, and their inflexibility.

They don't take into account each investors unique situation. He was being lumped into a fund with other 50 something year olds. Which means you would have people invested in the same fund where they only have one thing in

common i.e. their age.

But, they could, and they will have completely different income needs at retirement, different sources of other income or debt, different health and expectancies, and different risk

One 58-year-old of them might

kids through college and can only afford to retire at 64 and need an income of €3,500 and the other might have no mortgage, no kids, and might want to never work again, retire at 59 and only needs €1,500 to

Two completely different people, with different circumstances, but both are in the same fund just because they were born in the same

They are also fixed and rigid and don't respond to external conditions. And they don't know what age you want to retire at. They assume you're going to work until you're 65 but very few people can predict their retirement date with certainty. It could be forced on them unexpectedly because of ill health, it could be delayed because of income expectations.

There is also a common mis-understanding that default schemes de-risk your portfolio when you're coming close to retirement, but that's simply not true either. Whether you know it or not, and most people don't, their default fund can still have a high % of equity holdings which are high risk, close to or even when they hit retirement age.

And, if you want to retire at 58 for example, default schemes won't recognise this and if there's a crash, the equity content in your fund could still be high, higher than it needs to be, and as a result your fund size could be significantly impacted. Let what happen in 2008 and 2009 be your constant reminder of this, when people retiring discovered to their horror that they lost 30% of the value of their fund, when they thought their fund was low risk, and safe from large market moves, but it turned out they weren't.

If you're being advised to pick a

fund based on your age, and what your basing your income in retirement on, then the very best of luck to you. My advice would be, to start dousing your policy documents and annual benefit statements with holy water and keep a candle lit over them.

 $\hat{\mathbf{A}}$ better alternative, to default funds, in my opinion is to, have your fund actively managed by firms other than your previous pension administrator. Firms who don't take the lazy approach, offering only a limited number of off the shelf type

You need a firm who can choose from 300 different funds, not just three or four, and who take a holistic approach to financial planning, where they'll pay the greatest attention to detail in the specific areas that concern you most.

The firm you need, are those who will create what's called an investment policy statement (IPS) and for people who don't know what this is (that probably includes 99% of financial advisers as well by the way) is an investment plan for your pension and is devised in conjunction with you.

It provides clear guidance which help to make informed decisions. It serves as a roadmap to make sure an individuals' targets are met, and ensures mistakes are avoided along

The IPS sets out how often their fund is reviewed, how much is invested, what other sources of income are available at retirement,

how much is invested in different asset classes, what their risk profile is, at what age the person continuing to work becomes optional, what are the minimum and maximum returns acceptable each year which would trigger a rebalancing of the portfolio, it specifies the benchmarks other funds are compared against, what changes are required if lifestyle, financial or health changes occur etc.

A well, constructed IPS keeps the individual focused on their long term objectives when markets gyrate wildly in the short term, but most importantly in my view, it gives them peace of mind, that there is logic behind their plan.

An IPS does not exist with default

The stakes are high, and you don't want to get this wrong. Not knowing what your future cash flow requirements are, and choosing a default fund, or only what a tied agent can offer is ignoring critical differences in every client's individual needs and is putting their funds and their income in retirement in jeopardy.

Don't let this happen to you.

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q. Liam, I'm wondering if in the future, I ever have to go into a nursing home, how will I be able to finance the cost? I have pension income of c. €24,000 per year, my house is worth c. €250,000 and I have €65,000 in savings. If I applied to use the fair deal scheme, what impact would it have on my savings, income and

A. Under the scheme, you have to make a contribution towards the cost of your care, with the HSE paying the balance. Your care needs are first assessed and then your finances are reviewed to see how much you can pay. And if you are deemed to have enough resources to pay the cost yourself, you'll receive no support, but if your ability to repay are less than the cost of the nursing home, the HSE

will pay the rest.
You will always have to pay 80% of your assessable income, less some allowable deductions, along with 7.5% (3.75% if you are part of a couple) of the value of your assets i.e. home, farm, investment or

If you had a partner and they continued to live in the family home, they will be left with 50% of your income, or the maximum rate of state contributory pension, whichever is the greater.

In relation to savings, the first €36,000 of them are discounted for a single person or €72,000 for a married couple.

The 7.5% taken from the value of your property is only used for the first 3 years', of your time in care, which means the maximum $amount \, used \, against \, your \, home \, is \,$ 22.5% regardless of how long you spend in a nursing home, and this amount reduces to 11.25% if a spouse or partner remains in the family home while you're in care.

So, after 3 years, if you're still in long-term nursing care, you will note pay any further contribution based on the value of your primary residence.

If the cost of nursing home care was for example €1,200 per week, the amount you'd contribute is €771.63 with the HSE paying the balance.

How I arrive at your

80% of your pension is taken which amounts to €369.23 (€24,000 x 80% / 52 = €369.23) 7.5% of your house is taken

which amounts to €360.58 per week (€250,000 x 7.5% / 52)

And 7.5% of your savings is taken which amounts to €41.82 (€65,000 - €36,000 x 7.5% / 52)

You could defer payment of the amount associated with your home i.e. €360.58 per week if you apply for what's called ancillary state support (Fair Deal Loan Scheme). And this means the state will pay their portion and the amount linked to your property. They are effectively giving you a loan which must be repaid to them within a year of the person dying. However, it doesn't have to be paid if a partner or adult dependent or child continue to live in the property.

If you're looking at reducing your assessable assets, your timing needs to be right, because when your financial means are being reviewed, any gifts or transfers made in the 5 years before you make an application will still be

Over 2,000 jobs created in Limerick, says report

Economy: Major new report claims city is set on an upward trajectory

A MAJOR new survey has revealed that 2,450 jobs were created in Limerick in 2019, with the live register down by

The Limerick Economic Monitor, being published for the second year in a row, has seen the EY-DKM consultancy analyse Limerick's economic status across a number of indicators, including employment, enterprise, investment, customer sentiment and commercial property.

The monitor suggests that there has been a 68% drop in the numbers of people out of work from a low recorded in January 2010.

And data for 2019 indicated that foreign direct investment had already matched the level for the whole of 2018 in the first nine months of the year.

Investment announcements came from a number of companies including Johnson and Johnson, Regeneron, Edwards Life Sciences, Cook Medical,

Northern Trust and Nautilus.

The indigenous labour market also thrived in 2019, according to the report, with 561 new start-ups.

In all, there were approximately 4,500 new company registrations between 2013 and Q3 2019, the LEM

Other key figures validating Limerick's status as one of Ireland's leading locations to live and work in was that disposable income was €21,979 – the highest outside the capital. Some other notable milestones achieved in 2019 included securing the Ryder Cup for Adare Manor, the LEM states.

Speaking about the monitor, Mayor Michael Sheahan said the report is both positive and timely.

"We had a fantastic launch of our new brand position, a brand that will promote Limerick both domestically internationally for inward investment across tourism, business and education. To have the economic monitor come out with such positive findings a week or so later reaffirms why

Limerick such has reason confidence," he said.

The report suggests affordability remains a major competitive advantage for Limerick when it comes to attracting and retaining talent and investment. In addition to high disposable income, another key aspect is the relatively lower housing costs in Limerick, with median growing by almost 18% in the year to September 2019 yet they remain 18% lower than the national median. Likewise, rent levels were up 6% but remain 15% below the national average. Rents in Limerick county, while also rising, are almost 35% below the national average.

Vincent Murray, the council's director of economic development added: "This latest report reflects the continued progress of our city and county. 2019 has seen many significant milestones occur for Limerick as we continue our ambitious plans to develop into the future. The statistics speak for themselves. Limerick is very much on an upward curve."



throne early.


Apparently she also put in place a rule that all those women proposing must wear a red petticoat while doing so.

There is a bit of a slump as they naturally get fed up with the cameras in their lives.

Also, this is the time when their stickability' has been questioned. In previous attempts to lose weight they have given up around now.

Perseverance is key in achieving

any goal. I try to instil that with my two boys, but it's a struggle.

This slump will be short-lived as thy excitement of the finishing post is in view — namely the 5k and the grand finale where our leaders will show off all their hard work.

There was strong disagreement between Karl and Aoife, and myself, around Tanya's night out. They held a righteous view that Tanya let loose too much and came off the plan.

For me, her 'date night' when she drank three glasses of prosecco was her first night out in two years and, given the pressures and that she hit her target, a night out, a break, some fun is OK.

Here's how the leaders got on

Shane, 29. Target: 3lbs. Lost: 3lbs

Shane opened up to the nation and they took him into their hearts. Shane has created a warm and nurturing home for his young family and increasingly is more integrated into family life.

I can tell you for the first time on OT I have seen natural smiles and genuine laughs from Shane, and I want to see more.

Clodagh (down 12lbs) is a wonderful warm person who has Shane's back.

Lorraine, 46. Target: 2lbs, lost: 2 lbs

She is a businesswoman, mum to the beautiful Mia and energetic Jodi, and she is also to being burned out by trying to be all things to all people.

Our fitness expert Karl has adapted her couch to 5k back to walking with the buggy as this integrates her young daughter Jodi

into her fitness plan.
This is an excellent call by Karl as it makes the OT plan more integrated and not an extra chore.

I prescribed a week of self-care as I am worried about Lorraine's low energy levels, which are not assisted by Jodi sleeping in the bed! One thing I know and admire about Lorraine is that she is a fighter and has faced and overcome adversity in the past. Little steps will pull her through. Sleep, rest, exercise, self-care, and healthy food will rejuvenate Lorraine.

Barry, 39. Target: 4lbs. Lost: 3lbs

I was down in Cork to see leader Barry and we looked at his previous depression, which he described as a Battle of the Somme that went on for two years.

Upon exploration it turned out that two years prior to this his mood had been dropping.

My intervention was around looking at Barry's unique relapse signature. If you have had battles with depression or anxiety in the past, then I think it's critical that your understand your 'amber' zone that space you enter before the red zone. With greater awareness of the amber zone, your visits to

the red zone may not happen or can be for shorter periods.

For Barry, recognising that sleep disturbance, communication difficulties (ie, suppressing his anger for long periods of time rather than assertively expressing his wishes), negative thinking and, in particular, ruminating are his amber zone signs is critical to

banish bad mood days. He was annoyed for not hitting his weight loss target, but Barry will bounce back.

Andrea, 31. Target: 3lbs. Lost: 5lbs

"Epic" was what fitness expert Karl henry said. Week five of the programme and losing 5lbs

that's amazing.
It turns out that Andrea has Polycystic Ovarian Syndrome. Wrongly, people think that you can't lose weight with PCOS, Andrea is proving that you can.

Aoife, Operation Transformation's incredible

Registered Dietician, indicated that a good food plan for someone with PCOS is that of the OT plan, which is also suitable for a Type II diabetic.

What I liked and complimented is how Andrea and her husband and fellow leader Barry's blended family are a bonded family. Too often, in my clinical practice I have seen children used a pawns in adults conflicts. In this circumstance, I commend the boys' mother, Barry and Andrea for the happiness of all.

Tanya, 33. Target: 2lbs. Lost: 3lbsIt erupted into a row. Tanya lost 3lbs this week but she was given a bit of a telling off by Karl and Aoife because they believed that she could have taken it easier on booze on her date night.

Tanya rarely drinks. In fact, for the first year in many all our OT leaders of 2020 are mostly non to

minimal drinkers. Each week I have asked the

leaders, particularly Lorraine and Shane, if there is fun in their lives. I want to see them having a lot of fun. When Andrea has some fun she is chastised!

Come on, it's OK surely to have a night off, a break and then recharged you can hit the high spots. So from my point of view I am with Tanya.

Like all good disagreements, its important to talk them out and move on even if you agree to disagree.

For you the reader I ask, is there fun in your life? If not, why not? Here my prescription — go have

Top Tips

Keeping your child safe online

Negotiate a clear agreement with your child about how, when and where the internet can be accessed and used, and then stick to the agreement. Respect your child's privacy, but make it clear that this is a two way street. They also need to respect the rules.


Try to keep internet use in shared, family areas so that your child is not using the internet in isolation.

Communicate clearly and regularly with your child about the benefits and the dangers of being on-line. Spend time together navigating the web—help them see what sites are safe and ones they should avoid.

Make sure that your child doesn't provide personal information (name, school, address, phone number) to anyone on-line and that they only interact with people they know. Stress to them that they should never meet up in real life with someone they met online

Keep the channels of communication open—make sure your child knows that they can come to you if they find themselves in a risky situation and that you will support them

Importance of cyber safety

TUESDAY, February 11 was Safer Internet Day (SID). SID is an EU wide initiative to promote a safer internet for all users, especially young people.

Technology has improved the quality of our lives in many ways. It can be a valuable source of education, entertainment and connection. We can easily find ourselves, however, spending too much time online and responding too readily to the ping of the phone $rather\,than\,our\,immediate$ surroundings

Young people, the digital natives, have never known a time when technology was not fully embedded in their lives—the telephone attached to the wall is more like science fiction than reality. When young people spend too much time online,

unsupervised and without any limits, it can have a negative impact on them in many ways—including their physical and mental health, their education, their ability to concentrate and their ability to connect and engage with other people.

Online activity can become addictive—the young person might find it more difficult to engage in other areas of life such as school, regular meal times, after school activities, outdoor activities and spending time with family and

We know that all of these areas are important for positive mental health and well-being in young people, so neglecting them can lead a young person to feel depressed,

anxious or isolated. There are also issues around

safety—by posting online your child is creating what we call a 'digital footprint. This is a trail that one leaves online when posting and sharing content.

The anonymous and instant nature of the internet can also leave young people exposed to greater risks such as cyber bullying and harm from potential sexual predators.

Many parents are struggling to keep up with the rapidly changing nature of technology and to fully understand what their children are doing online. There are a few things that you can do to help keep your child safe online:

■ Talk to your child about their online activity, including what they like doing online, the apps and games they enjoy and what bloggers and vloggers they follow.

■ Explore whether they have any concerns about their online safety and what they could do if they ever felt unsafe or frightened

■ Review your child's privacy settings with them—this can be a good conversation starter about privacy, what is deemed appropriate when sharing and the reasons why one might choose to keep some information offline.

■ Have clear rules and boundaries around the use of the internet and model this behaviour vourself.

In the accident, Amy's hair was caught, and she was fully submerged in water for over 10 minutes. She experienced a cardiac arrest but luckily survived. Unfortunately, Amy suffered brain damage, destroying her sight, speech, and use of her body in the process. Throughout the year, she has regained her ability to see and speak but still cannot move properly. She currently uses a wheelchair for mobility.

A GoFundMe campaign was previously established to support Amy and her family, raising over €30,000. While this was a major

achievement, friends, relatives, and strangers wanted to do more.

'DIY SOS Ireland – The Big Build' is an inspirational and feel-good show airing on RTÉ One, which will see a deserving family facing hugely difficult personal circumstances get a significant home makeover to help improve their quality of life. They are recruiting volunteers to make Amy's dream home a reality. To help Amy and the rest of the Mulcahy family, the people of Limerick and Ireland as a whole have bound together in hopes of creating a practical home for her. Their initiative will lead to a total transformation of Amy's home. Everyone in the Limerick area is encouraged to support the efforts or even contribute in some way. 

Limerick and Waterford in league final rematch

LIMERICK and Waterford meet in a rematch of their Allianz Hurling League final

to play a Waterford side now managed former by Tipperary All-Ireland U21 winning manager Liam Cahill.

This weekend's Limerick-Waterford tie is the first meeting of the counties in a Division One group tie since on Shannonside since 2009 when a Justin McCarthy managed side scored a 2-14 to 1-13 win over the Davy Fitzgerald managed visitors. Current Limerick selector Donal O'Grady was in that Limerick team, of which there aren't any survivors in tonight's panel. There was a league



The FAI indicated last month that the then 'Limerick United', which later had a name change to 'Treaty United', had been accepted into the SSE Airtricity under-age leagues for 2020.

However, Murray confirmed that Treaty United would not now have teams competing in the four under-age national leagues.

"Persistent threats of legal action have been placed upon us for a number of weeks now and we therefore stepped out of the application process, Treaty United stepped back, advised the FAI earlier this week that we were stepping back until such time as decisions were made around the Limerick FC application for a licence for senior football and also for permission to operate an Academy'

At the time of going to print Limerick FC were unavailable for comment.

"I would model myself off both of them, but at the same time I wouldn't want to lose something that is the way I play as well.



The Crusaders head the betting for the 2020 title at odds of 2/1. Next best in the market is another New Zealand side, the Chiefs, on offer at


