

Quinlivan: Government must support workers

FAMILIES and workers must be supported through this public health emergency, Sinn Fein's Maurice Quinlivan TD has said.

According to Deputy Quinlivan, Sinn Féin have been in contact with government departments and various sectors on measures needed to support and assist families, workers and businesses during this public health emergency brought about by the coronavirus outbreak.

"There is huge uncertainty

across society as people begin to come to terms with and plan for the emergency measures introduced on Thursday. It is essential that the government acts quickly to support families, workers and businesses. People are deeply worried that they will not be able to cope financially," Deputy Quinlivan said.

We have been in contact with government departments on the issues requiring immediate attention, including legislation

which may need to be passed at the next Dáil sitting. The social welfare system will have to adapt quickly to support families and workers where job losses, loss of hours or sickness occur. Illness benefit is an important part of this, but it is only one part of what must be a comprehensive welfare response."

Deputy Quinlivan has said that parents, who are out of work due to school and creche closures, must be supported.

"Parents may be forced out of

paid employment to care for children for the duration of the public health emergency.

"These parents must be supported, not penalised. Families and workers must be protected against rent increases and evictions. A mortgage holiday must be provided for, as must an urgent prohibition on utility disconnections such as gas and electricity. The childcare needs of frontline healthcare workers must be met as a matter of urgency."

Production comes to halt at Troy Studios

Delayed: Filming of Foundation halts effecting 300 people

APPLE TV's new adaptation of sci-fi epic Foundation, which was being filmed in Castletroy, has halted production due to the Coronavirus.

Around 300 people were working on the project. The filming of the ten-episode series, which is based on Isaac Asimov's books, has been taking place at the expansive Troy Studios.

writer and executive The producer of Foundation is Blade and Batman Begins producer David Goyer, along with Asimov's daughter, Robyn Asimov.

Chernobyl and Mad Men actor Jared Harris and The Hobbit star Lee Pace are starring in the series, which is said to be the largest-scale

production ever filmed in Ireland. The story centers on a group that become exiled and want to save a Galactic Empire from destruction. Last week Lee Pace posted on

Twitter about how he was enjoying the scenery in and around Limerick. The series was expected to be streamed next Autumn.

Previously, an open casting call for a movie being produced by Troy Studios has been cancelled over coronavirus fears. The casting call for extras was due to be held at the Metropole Hotel, Cork on Tuesday, March 10. In a statement from MovieExtras.ie, a spokesperson

said: "As a precautionary measure due to COVID-19, we have decided to cancel the Open Casting for Film Extras for the Sci-fi Production shooting in Troy Studios and surrounding areas. It was scheduled to take place on Tuesday 10th March at The Metropole Hotel, Cork.

It was announced previously that production would not be affected, ĥowever, this has now changed.

Previously, Troy Studios produced Nightflyers, which was Studios filmed on location.

Hotels close down as **Covid-19 bites**

HOTELS across Limerick have joined pubs, clubs and some restaurants in shutting down due to Covid-19.

With people following medical advice to remain at home where possible, many hotel managers have decided to either close the hotel down, or have it open on a strict basis to guests only.

This Tuesday, it was confirmed The George Hotel, The Savoy Hotel and

Co

Findlater Alex and restaurant, which between them employ 290 people, will close to the public until Sunday,

March 29. Meanwhile, the Limerick City Hotel remains open to guests. But McGettigan's Bar and Restaurant on the same site in Mallow Street is closed.

The Absolute Hotel closed to the public on Tuesday, but remain open offering limited service to existing guests, while No. 1 Pery Square is to close altogether for two weeks.

The Maldron Hotel is open, but only for residents, as is the Limerick Strand Hotel.

However, the Clayton Hotel as of this Tuesday lunchtime, remained open although generally, the leisure centre had closed.

Pery Hotel in Glentworth Street shut its doors until

Sunday, March 29. While the Travelodge branch at Castletroy is

closing until this date, the budget hotel's outlet on the city's northside at Coonagh remains open.

In Adare, the Fitzgerald Woodlands House Hotel is closed. Meanwhile, Adare Manor confirmed they have decided to temporarily and voluntarily close the resort to protect their team and their families, guests and the local community of Adare against the ongoing spread of the Coronavirus.

> Ronan Branigan, pictured, the general

manager of the Savoy Group, said: "In the interests the of health and safety of staff our and

customers, we are going to meet out staff today. We are

going to temporarily close all our outlets until March 29 which is the government advice in relation to this outbreak."

"We operate in a business which would find it hard to institute social distancing, he added.

Mr Branigan said it's hoped to keep Da Vincenzo's open at the George Hotel for an hour each day, for hotel workers both in the Savoy Group and across the city.

"We don't want people to congregate in big numbers, but if they feel they want to come in and catch up, we are going to offer staff food in 12pm to 1pm each day. We'll also extend that to any hotel staff around the city who would like to have a hot meal," he added.

Business: Help given to those most in need

TRADERS across Limerick have shown their true colours, with many affording donations to communities in need across the city.

Sodalicious cafe owner Jane Conlon has made a significant food gift to the Mid-West Simon Community, which supports homeless and vulnerable people.

And the newly opened Spitjack's restaurant, and the Buttery in Bedford Row have given food to St Munchin's Community Centre, which delivers meals on wheels to the elderly across Limerick.

Jane Conlon, proprietor of Sdalicious, which is at the junction of Henry Street and Lower Cecil Street, said she would not have been able to sleep at night if she had not donated perishable food to the Simon community.

"I had a cold room full of perishable foods. So we decided to turn them into goods to donate to the vulnerable and homeless, whoever the Mid-West Simon Community chooses," she explained, "I turned a whole load of chickens into a beautiful chicken casserole. We made potted food, and soup as well."

Ms Conlon, who has lived in

Limerick for 20 years, said: "I would have been awake at night having thoughts about not giving enough food out. I've given staff food, and they've all gone home with boxes. But the other stuff, I couldn't have slept if I didn't do anything with it."

She thinks when life returns to some sense of normality after this outbreak, Ireland will be a much kinder society.

"I think when this is all over, people are going to be better for it, I really do. I think it is the making of our society. There will be huge acts of kindness and love shown throughout the following weeks, months and possibly businesswoman the vears." added.

Meanwhile, with people being urged to self-isolate to delay the spread of the flu-like disease, St Munchin's Community Centre in Kileely is stepping up its meals-on-wheels service.

But, its manager Linda Ledger has revealed, due to the fact the centre as a whole is closed for public safety reasons, it has left a hole in their finances, which the hairdresser, cafe, photographer and other social enterprises would have brought in.

With 26 people employed, it has presented a big problem to the centre boss.

The businesses stepping in

has proven to be vital, Linda added.

"Spitjacks gave us in some of their food and the Buttery gave us some of theirs. It was really nice of them," she said, "It was items like bread, cream and fruitcake. Our local pub, Kinsella's have also helped. They always come up with something."

A GoFundMe internet-based fundraiser has also been launched to help the Meals on Wheels service, and has seen €610 raised as of this Tuesday afternoon.

Centre staff are working with the HSE to identify those who need the meals on wheels the most at thistime.

University of Limerick plan for Covid-19 field hospitals

Covid-19: Action needed and by remaining apart, we stand together, says UL president

A FIELD hospital for coronavirus patients is "likely" to be set up in University of Limerick in the near

University of Limerick in the near future, it was announced this week. The revelation was made by the university's president Dr Des Fitzgereld this week when he said

Fitzgerald this week when he said that he expects it will be mid-Junebefore the campus reopens to staff and students. "UL is closed in the first instance

until March 29. Let me be clear; I expect it to be at least mid-June before we return and after this pandemic hopefully peaks," he stated.

"It is likely before then that UL will play host to a field hospital as our frontline health services are potentially overwhelmed." Dr Fitzgerald also stated that

on-campus accommodation could be used as isolation units.

We are currently working with the co

HSE to develop more sophisticated systems of contact tracing, with the inclusion of testing. This is further to the change in testing criteria in recent days.

"We are also working on a process of using mobile phone geolocation data to map individuals who may have come into contact with an individual with a positive diagnosis."

Dr Fitzgerald, a cardiologist and former Professor of Molecular Medicine at UCD and Chief Academic Officer of the Ireland East Hospital Group, is mounting a campaign over social and traditional media to alert people up to the severity of the COVID-19 crisis and to reinforce the absolute necessity for immediate widespread adoption of social distancing.

The UL president has been in contact with TDs, senior business people, media and civic leaders to ask them to join him in calling for the community of Limerick city and county to change their behaviour now and save lives.

"These are extraordinary times. We are facing the single biggest health crisis in living memory," Dr Fitzgerald said.

"I am deeply concerned that people are not fully realising the severity of the situation and so are not changing their behaviour quickly enough.

"The government and health authorities are doing everything they can and those at the front line facing COVID-19 Coronavirus are performing incredible work.

"Those that are dealing directly with this crisis don't have the luxury to self-isolate and reduce their personal contact - we owe it to those at the coalface to do everything we can to buy them enough time to deal with this crisis," he continued.

"We have a small window of time right now where we can really have an influence over how bad this gets. We still have a chance to flatten out the curve of this deadly virus and help to None of us has ever faced anything like this in our lifetimes UL PRESIDENT

Bishop: Attending some funerals 'enters realms of recklessness'

Coronoavirus crisis Do not attend funerals unless they are immediate relatives or very close friends

BISHOP of Limerick Brendan Leahy has appealed to people not to attend funerals unless they are immediate relatives or particularly close friends.

Doing otherwise would, he said, would be reckless.

"No one should attend funerals unless they are immediate relatives or very particular friends. While I do, of course, understand the desire of others to attend, to do so if not members of immediate family or a very particular friend could enter into the realms of recklessness.

"And, of course, in keeping to the HSE advice, there should be no hand-shaking or hugs regardless. Social distancing must be observed now as difficult as that is. Once this crisis has passed, and it will pass, another ceremony can be arranged for all those who should not now attend.

"They can then gather and pay their respects in that great Irish way and let the family know they share their loss. In the meantime, phone-calls, texts and social media can be used to convey support at this very difficult and extraordinary time."


Bishop Leahy also confirmed that all Masses - not just Sunday Masses - will no longer be held in public until further notice.

"A great saying found in all religions tells us: 'Do onto others as you would want done onto you'. It's the Golden Rule and its application is never more timely than in the face of the radical measures we have to take in stopping the spread of the coronavirus. What we can and ought to do is take responsibility. And we need to start by reviewing our lifestyle completely for the coming weeks in light of the Golden Rule.

"For the sake of a few weeks, we need to make sacrifices. Of course, we are afraid of cutting back in business and services; that's completely understandable but we are at a point where it is now so evident that if we don't take short-term sacrifice, we will hurt long term. We will hurt economically but we will hurt from a health perspective. And people will die."

Bishop Leahy has said that we cannot wait for a government workplace shut down and, must instead, take responsibility on ourselves.

The stakes are, he said, too high with people's lives on the line and the health system unable to

withstand the pressures. So, it is clear that we, as a public, cannot afford to be nonchalant about social gatherings any more, Bishop Leahy said.

"While the Government hasn't yet called for a lockdown, could we not already voluntarily do our part to effectively, as much as we can, reduce our interactions with one another. Ireland is known for its good social cohesion. This is a unique, unprecedented crisis calling for us like never before to pull together to stop the virus spreading."

Gardai roll out 210 new vehicles

AN GARDA Síochána is in the process of hiring up to 210 vehicles to provide additional mobility to stations nationwide to provide increased community support and community engagement across the country.

Speaking this week Commissioner Deputy stated: "As a Twomey community at this time we need more than ever to support the most vulnerable in our society, particularly our elderly and isolated. An Garda Síochána has always worked closely with our communities and we continue to do so in these extraordinary times".

An Garda Síochána continue to urge families, neighbours and community groups to engage with people in line with social distancing guidelines.

As an organisation, Gardaí across the country are being asked to actively identify those persons most at need, particularly those with limited local family or social support. In these cases An Garda Síochána will assist.

These 'contingency' vehicles will be used to maintain personal interactions and where needed to assist and support people, which may include collecting medical prescriptions, attending hospital appointments and other supports they may need. They are not 'primary response vehicles'.

An Garda Síochána will also use these opportunities to link identified people into local, national and state services where appropriate.

AS MANY across the county settle into a routine of homebound isolation and remote work, it can be important to remember why these precautions are necessary, to protect those who are among the most vulnerable.

One of those who is in the most need of protection from the coronavirus is two-year-old Noah Quish.

Noah, who was born with a hole in his heart and has since been diagnosed with severe scoliosis, captured the hearts of Limerick when he was pictured in garda uniform at the Little Heart Warriors Day Out in May of last year.

His mother, Una, explains that due to Noah's immunocompromised state, the family has taken a number of precautions.

"If Noah got this virus it would be fatal. We are indoors since last week and I took Leah (Noah's sister) out of school a few days early for the sake of Noah who already has respiratory and heart disease," said UNA



"He is sick lately with a cough, so keeping him healthy and out of hospital is our priority. It is a frightening time though. As a few times this week, I thought he might need to go to the hospital but the fear of the unknown and going in is putting me off," she added.

Una is also worried that the added strain on the hospital will mean there is a lack of care for Noah. Noah Quish while in hospital recovering from heart surgery "If Noah goes downhill in the height of an outbreak and the hospitals are already at full capacity what will I do.

"These are the worries we have. Noah is immunocompromised due to his underlying conditions and life-saving surgeries he had so its crucial we keep himself indoors. I hope for his sake, elders and other kids like him that people have respect and listen to what they are been told."

Recently, Noah was hospitalised due to a common cold. While in hospital, Noah was placed on oxygen and developed Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), croup and bronchitis, stressing the dramatic nature of his family's current isolation.

"We have cancelled all appointments and stay home to prevent this from happening. This virus hasn't peaked yet and when it does it will be horrendous.

"So staying in now might help it slow down. We need to think of our nurses, guards, all the front line staff who will be affected by this also and cant stay at home to mind their family and some of them have seriously sick kids too," Una finished

Na Piarsaigh give a hurl of a hand to local kids

A NORTHSIDE GAA club has offered equipment hurleys and sliothars to kids in the area who might have nothing to do now as they're off school.

The Caherdavin side posted a notice on its social media channels over the weekend, pointing out to parents that the gear had been left outside the clubhouse.

clubhouse. "Enjoy a few pucks with the kids over the coming weeks Please be mindful when collecting not to allow potential transmission," he said.

Although they were only left outside for one day, club secretary Derek Giltenan said the initiative had proven popular, with children not expected back at school until the end of the month at the earliest.

"It was a club idea, no one person's in particular. There might be some kids who mightn't have a hurley

themselves. Kids are off school, and a lot of people are getting sent home from work. Kids might need a little outlet, parents might need a little outlet to entertain the lads, to bring them down here and perhaps let them puck a ball," he explained.

Like so many clubs across the city and county due to the Covid-19 outbreak, Na Piarsaigh's clubhouse has shut for a fortnight, with only access to the sports fields at Elm Drive now available. Derek fears the

worst is yet to come. "I think they are going to shut down the country before too long. By the end of the week, we'll all be in lockdown," he predicted.

Many committee members of the club have volunteered to be a point of contact to elderly and vulnerable members who may be lonely during the period of isolation.

Derek said they can pick up a phone just for a chat, or request help picking up items if needs be.

A GROUP of innovative university students have proved that catching up over a pint doesn't always require a pub in a bid to encourage social distancing amid Covid-19.



Warning over texts that seek payment for delivery

GARDAI have issued a warning in relation to a scam which has gained traction in recent weeks.

The scam pertains to unsolicited text messages that are forwarded to

people's phones. "The text will state that a courier company wants to deliver a package to your address. It will state that there is a small fee owed on the package as the package has been shipped from an overseas location," said

Garda John Finnerty. "The message will request the Bank Account details of the receiver. If and when same are forwarded,



Finnerty says the texts are not genuine

funds will be extracted from the Bank account almost immediately. Many people may fall victim to this scam as there is now a huge increase in online shopping," he added.

Gardai say authentic courier companies will never request bank details via text message and those who receive such messages should delete them.

Tools stolen from van which was parked up overnight

A VARIETY of power tools were stolen from a van which was parked up overnight.

According to gardai, the white Renault Master was targeted by thieves sometime between 5.30pm last Thursday and 7.30am on Friday.

"There were a number of tools stolen including an orange consaw, two Bosch hammer drills which are green in colour and an orange rotating laser level," said Garda John Finnerty.

The incident occurred at Oakleigh Wood, Dooradoyle and gardai at Roxboro Road, who are investigating, can be contacted at (061) 214340.

Opportunistic thief gained access via unlocked door

City man died from gunshot wound to back of the head

Inquest: Coroner told investigation remains live

A YOUNG Limerick man died after he was shot in the back of the head while attending a family wedding, his inquest has heard.

The inquest into the death of Robert Sheehan was officially opened at Limerick Coroner's Court last week - more than seven years after his killing.

The 21-year-old, who was from Moyross died after he was shot outside a hotel in Bunratty in the early hours of September 2, 2012

Addressing relatives of Mr Sheehan, including his mother Majella, coroner John McNamara indicated that gardai were seeking an adjournment of the inquest as investigations into the murder are ongoing.

He advised them that while he could open the inquest, there were restrictions as to what evidence he could hear.

He added that he could not conclude the inquest given the garda application which was formally made by Inspector Liz Kennedy who said it remains a "live investigation".

"Legally, I am precluded from doing so once the application is made," he said adding that he prohibited from disclosing certain information "to anybody" as it had the potential to "hinder of impact" the garda investigation.

During the brief hearing, Mr McNamara then proceeded to read the findings of a post mortem report into the record.

He said the post mortem was carried out by the then deputy state pathologist, Dr Khalid Jabbar, who found that Mr Sheehan had died as a result of a "penetrating gunshot wound to the back of the head".

No further evidence was heard with the $coroner \ reiterating \ what \ that \ he \ did \ not \ want$ to jeopardise the garda investigation.

When asked by Mr Sheehan's family, he confirmed that the inquest may be adjourned again.

"It can be adjourned – effectively on an ongoing basis until the State concludes its investigation and confirms it is at an end," he said commenting that it is possible new evidence could emerge "ten years down the line".

Apologising for the delay in opening the inquest, Mr McNamara told members of Mr Sheehan's family that he was not the relevant coroner at the time and that there was a "note on the file" when he was appointed to the role.

The inquest was formally adjourned to September when the State will be asked to give an update regarding the investigation.

The opening of the inquest means the death of Robert Sheehan will now be officially registered.

While there have been a number of arrests in relation to the murder of the 21-year-old, nobody has ever been charged with his murder and the chief suspect is understood to be living in the UK.

Gardai at Shannon are investigating the murder.

Rovers return: €1m project is approved

Junior Soccer: Ballynanty Rovers bidding to move

A LEADING junior soccer club's bid to move home has got a step closer after permission was granted for major new facilities.

Ballynanty Rovers hope to move back to their spiritual base of Bateman Park within the next five years, after Clare County Council gave permission for a raft of measures at the site, which is on the border with the Banner county.

As part of a €1m blueprint, a five-stage plan is in place to make the former FAI Junior Cup finalists the envy of the local soccer playing world.

A modern grass playing surface is planned for Bateman Park, as well as the levelling off of the pitch, which slopes slightly from the Clare side.

On top of this, there will be new changing rooms, wrap-around secure fencing with secure entry and exit, plus practice and warm-up group. It's honored at a lator store thou areas. It's hoped at a later stage, they can install floodlighting.

Club chairman Ray O'Halloran said: "It was difficult to get everything together. But we are so proud to have gotten to this point. A lot of people were questioning our capability to deliver this."

He said the development is crucial for the future of soccer on the city's northside.

"It's critical, not just for Ballynanty Rovers as a club, but for the community at large, and the under-age system. It gives us a great platform to build on," Mr O'Halloran added.

It was only in 2018 that Ballynanty

Rovers were given the title deeds to Bateman Park, a move which allowed them to confirm the purchase.

The FAI has helped the process by donating €10,000 to the cause, while Sports Capital grants have also come into play.

"À number of years have gone into this to set us to a pivotal point. The next stage is movement and getting it done. We are ready, we are well

positioned," the chairman added. It's hoped Ballynanty Rovers will be able to move back to Bateman Park in the next five years.

Up until then, they will continue to play at facilities in the Limerick Institute of Technology, adjacent to Thomond Park.

Ironically, it is these lands which the club originally donated to the college to allow it to develop its campus in Moylish.

File being prepared following drugs seizure

A FILE is to be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions following a significant drugs seizure on the northside of the city, writes David Hurley.

Suspected heroin, worth around €42,000 and €3,100 worth of Alprazolam tablets were seized when gardai from the divisional drugs unit searched a property in the Moyross area.

In addition to the drugs, a number of mobile phones, bags and a weighing scales were also seized by gardai.

A man, in his 50s, was arrested at the scene and taken to Henry Street garda station where he was detained and questioned under Section 2 of the Criminal Justice (Drug Trafficking) Act, 1996.

He was subsequently released

without charge.

Gardai have confirmed that a juvenile was also arrested and questioned about the seizure.

The 17-year-old male has also been released without charge and a file will be prepared under the Juvenile Diversion programme.

The drugs seized have been sent. for forensic analysis and investigations are continuing.

Addict had phone stolen from UHL

Addict: Offender has large number of convictions

A DRUG addict who admitted having a mobile phone - a day after it was stolen from University Hospital Limerick – has received a suspended prison sentence.

Darragh Moore, 29, who has an address at Cosgrave Park, Moyross pleaded guilty, at Limerick District Court, to handling the stolen phone on October 28, 2018. After he admitted the offence, Inspector

Ollie Kennedy told Judge Marian O'Leary the phone was recovered after the defendant was arrested in relation to a separate matter and brought to Mayorstone garda station where he was searched.

He said gardai subsequently established the black Samsung phone had been stolen the day before at UHL.

Details of the theft were not disclosed and it was not suggested during the hearing that Mr Moore was involved in the theft of the device, which is worth several hundred euro.

Insp Kennedy confirmed that after it was recovered, the phone was returned, by gardai, to its owner who is not at a loss. The court heard that Mr Moore, who has

more than 110 previous convictions, made admissions in relation to the phone telling gardai that he was aware it had been stolen.

In his submission to the court, solicitor

He had gone completely off the rails **SOLICITOR JOHN** HERBERT



John Herbert said his client - a father of six has a "lot of history" with drug abuse and that he had gone "completely off the rails" around the time of the offence.

He said he is currently serving a two year prison sentence relating to separate offences - all of which cccurred "around the same period".

"He had just lost his partner – his desire to get drugs was always going on in his head," Mr Herbert told the court.

Judge O'Leary was told the defendant is doing well in prison and has "straightened himself out".

He is attending counselling and is taking measures to address his addicton problems, added Mr Herbert.

Judge O'Leary imposed a four month prison sentence, which she suspended for two years on condition Mr Moore stays out of trouble during that time.

Earlier this year, the 29-year-old was sentenced to two and-a-half years' imprisonment after he pleaded guilty to a robbery charge.

That charge related to an incident which occurred near a service station on the Dock Road at around 6.30am on October 27, 2018.

During a sentencing hearing, Limerick Circuit Court was told the 19-year-old victim was approached by the defendant who was riding a bicycle.

"He told him to empty his pockets, he said he had a knife", said Detective Garda Cathal O'Sullivan who added the youth "was in great fear and dropped to his knees".

Judge Martina Baxter said the premeditated targeting of the teenager was sinister and worrying.

Managing cash flow during Covid-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has forced us all to act and behave in a manner that will hopefully stop the virus from spreading, keeping ourselves and everyone else safe and healthy.

These are unprecedented times. Circumstances have changed so quickly. At the beginning of the year, we had record employment, everyone's pension funds were performing great, then bang! Within a very short period of time, everything it seems has changed.

Covid-19 has created so much uncertainty. It feels like we were blindsided by how quickly it spread, and the impact it's had on literally everything. Some are saying that Covid-19 is going to be a game changer, and it's hard at this stage to disagree with them.

The lockdown and the impact it will have on businesses and their ability to pay employees will only add to already high stress levels. People aren't only worried about their health, they're also worried about their finances, and the impact it will have on them

The numbers affected with reductions in their income, I suspect, will be big, and the measures introduced to help by Government, while welcome, won't alleviate the cash flow problems people are bound to encounter

With that in mind, I want to look at what you can do to cope, if you are faced with a loss of income, and how best you can manage your household budget in the weeks and months ahead.

Most people are on autopilot when it comes to managing their finances each month. There isn't a need to constantly monitor and review what they spend their money on each month. But then something happens, a trigger if you like, that forces them to look much more closely; now is one of those times.

You'll probably know if you've read my articles over the years, that I'm a big advocate of setting up and following a monthly budget. It's critical to getting your finances under control and in the times we find ourselves in, from a financial perspective, I'd liken it to washing your hands, it's that important.

Anyone who has ever been faced with a reduction in their income, has always said it was the creation of a monthly budget that got them through those tough days and weeks. So don't second guess this, it works.

And it's nothing more than listing what your monthly income and spending is.

I've created a really good and simple excel document that I use with clients, which lists every category you could ever think of, and I'm happy to help and share it with anyone who wants it. Just email me and I'll send it to you. You'll have a ready-made monthly spending planner and all you have to do is

populate it. It will give you a great starting point to face what you are up against, and what deficit could exist. It will also identify the areas you'll need to focus on if you need to bridge that gap.

Your income may not be impacted right now but running a simulation of what would happen if it was, would be a very worthwhile exercise. Don't wait until it happens and then panic and start making rash, emotional decisions. You need to be calm and knowing what you could be up against before it happens, will help you make rational, well thought out decisions. You're not going to fall into that trap of making it up as you go along.

Whether you use the back of an envelope, an excel doc or some on-line budgeting tool, it doesn't really matter, knowing what you are up against does, so create that monthly spending plan for yourself.

Start by looking at your operating account and what you've spent in different areas over the past six months. If you don't have access to this, take a best guess. It doesn't matter if you're plus or minus €500. They key is getting the numbers down and then reviewing them to see if they feel right. And you and your partner must do this together. Both of you must understand where you spend your money each month.

Be honest with yourself when writing down the amounts you spend. Don't fool yourself by underestimating the amount you spend on certain categories because you're shocked or embarrassed by the amounts. This exercise is for you and you need to know what you are dealing with and up against, and if you need to engage with a bank or other creditors to reduce or suspend payments for a period of time, they'll want to know your numbers as well. So have it in place in the event you need to reach out for help, it will help fast track your request and get you approved much quicker.

Your income may not be impacted right now but running a simulation of what would happen if it was, would be a very worthwhile exercise. Don't wait until it happens and then panic and start making rash, emotional decisions

Okay, now that you've put down your numbers on paper or in your PC, and you know how much you're spending, it's easy to calculate the shortfall based on what your new reduced income is. It's simply your income minus your outgoings.

Carrying out this exercise will also show you how long your savings will last for should you need to use them to bridge any shortfall. If your deficit, for example, is ϵ 650 per month and you have ϵ 15,000 in savings, you know you have 23 months of savings in place before you run out of money. It can be very reassuring to know how long that buffer you have in place will last for. It could also bring reality to your situation because if you have a very small buffer or none at all, it will force you into taking action now, because your numbers won't lie.

Once you know what you are initially up against, you need to take this one step further and see how you can reduce that shortfall if one exists; you do this by separating your outgoings into two different categories i.e. essential and non-essential spending.

The outcome of separating your expenditure this way, is to end up with a list of everything you spend money on, because as we know, not all expenses are created equal. Some need to be paid before others, so you're going to put them in order of priority, from the most important to those you're getting rid of altogether.

What should be on the essential side of your page are things like food, utility bills, transport, mortgage/rent, insurance. On the non-essential side are lunches, hobbies, savings, new clothes.

When it comes to non-essential expenditure, you need to be ruthless. Even the small items you buy each day can mount up, so make a list and start cutting them right away. And remember, you're only getting rid of them for a short period of time. If your deficit is big and cutting

If your deficit is big and cutting back on lunches and the amount you spend on food for example isn't enough, you may need to focus on those areas that account for the biggest percentage of your income, which typically are mortgage or rent payments.

You may need to either reduce the amount you pay towards them, or not make any payments at all for a period of time.

The good news is that banks have indicated their willingness to work with people, so don't worry about contacting them. If we take them at their word, and we should, they will offer interest-only payments and/or moratoriums (no payments) for a period, which will help ease cash flow worries. The same applies to credit card providers and credit unions. They will also work with you and offer solutions like lowering interest rates or temporarily suspending payments.

Utility providers aren't going to turn the lights or heating off on you either. Reach out to them and they will make payments affordable to you during these turbulent times.

But the key is contacting them ASAP.

If you're worried right now or you think you'll be under pressure soon, contact your creditors now and look to adjust the payments you're going to make. Explain your situation, and it won't be one they haven't heard from thousands of others, and they'll offer you new repayment options.

And when that moment comes, and you realise, you'll need to make changes to how you live your life and manage your finances, you can either bury your head in the sand and ignore what is happening or you can be proactive and do something about it. I would advise you to choose the later.

Don't procrastinate. Focus on the problem at hand. If that's a cash flow problem, you need to work through the crisis, and figure out a way of solving it, step by step. You will have to make some difficult choices, and you won't be able to do all the things you did before your income was reduced. But stay focused and know that this is going to be a temporary problem and things will get better.

But, let me repeat, it's absolutely crucial you understand what you are up against, and the key to surviving this setback is creating a plan and taking action based on your new found situation, and knowing what your monthly expenditure is, is your starting point, and the key to getting through this.

Finally, one of the best things any household can do to protect their finances during a crisis like this or any unforeseen emergency, is to build up their savings, which can be called upon in the event they suffer an income shock.

Let's get over this crisis first, and when we do, I would urge people to rebuild their savings and create that emergency fund for themselves.

Having money set aside to meet any cashflow deficits will avoid them having to resort to borrowing money from family or friends, and or miss mortgage repayments.

From a non-financial perspective, it will reduce stress levels and take that weight off your shoulders.

And knowing what your monthly expenses are and having that back up plan in place to pay for them, will mean you'll be in a much better place to cope, whenever the next stressful situation occurs.

Concerned traders urged to get council help

Coronavirus: Pubs and general retailers lose out due to isolation

LIMERICK City and County Council has urged concerned traders to reach out to the authority if they are experiencing difficulties over the Covid-19 outbreak.

Dozens of bars and restaurants have closed temporarily throughout the city, while many retailers are also feeling the pinch, as people follow medical advice to remain at home and reduce social contact.

It has led to an understandable drop in footfall in the centre. But despite this, traders still have to pay rent, insurance, the commercial rate and other charges.

However, a spokesperson for the local authority has urged retailers to contact their rate collection agent, adding: "We are dealing with difficulties experienced by ratepayers on a case-by-case basis".

Local Fine Gael councillor Daniel Butler made representations on behalf of a number of traders to finance bosses at City Hall, and says he has been

assured there are various measures which can be taken to aid business people at this time.

"I have spoken with the finance department and they've informed me they will examine all options. These may include a suspension of rates or a deferral of rates for a limited period. Even if businesses need to do this, by the time we get to later in the year, there may be government supports available,' he told Leader Business.

Cllr Butler said once the coronavirus has cleared, and life returns to normal in Limerick and globally, locals really need to get behind family businesses in the city centre.

"Big retailers have done really well out of this due to stockpiling. But we really need to support smaller businesses. Some traders in the city centre are merely earning a living. This could prove to be a devastating blow to small businesses," he added.

Hundreds of small businesses are already closed on a temporary basis, with pubs following a government

It means publicans have missed out on arguably their busiest day of trading in the year - St Patrick's Day.

Around 2,000 people work in bars across Limerick, and local Vintners Federation of Ireland (VFI) representative Cllr Jerry O'Dea said: "It's a worrying time for the public, their friends and their families."

"Like any business, irrespective of the size of it, people have bills to pay, mortgages to meet. All this worry is difficult. In fairness to the Department of Social Protection, they've come out very strongly and issued good guidelines on their web site," he added.

CllrO'Dea, who employs 10 people on a full-and-part time basis in his Mulgrave Street bar, said the enforced closure once again highlights the important part the pub plays in society.

When we get over all of this – and we will - I hope it will be uppermost in people's minds that the pub is a key part of Irish society," he concluded.

Crowe in call for task force

In a statement, the bank said: "We are following all directions from health officials, the latest guidelines provided by WHO, government and the HSE in relation to the coronavirus and we have put all necessary precautions in place in our offices and hubs. The welfare of all our employees and customers will continue to be our highest priority during this period."

"We continue to support our customers in Limerick through our contact centre, online and digital channels.'

Next pulls sale plans in city stores

FASHION retailer Next has pulled plans to start a mid-season clothes sale in store due to the coronavirus outbreak.

There was huge fear among staff of the retailer after managers at Limerick's two outlets, in the Crescent Shopping Centre and at the Childers Road, were instructed to commence the sale this weekend.

It's understood this was a week ahead of schedule, and workers were concerned for their own safety, with any major price reduction no doubt drawing bigger than average crowds.

However, a spokesperson for the British retailer confirmed to Leader Business this Tuesday that the sale will run on the internet only, and not in stores. In a statement, Next added this was taken in light of the government's announcement and "in order to protect our staff and customers".

"We will however, honour the lower prices in-store. This is a fast moving,

fast changing situation and plans may alter between now and then and if they do we will update accordingly," the spokesperson added.

Limerick Chamber chief executive

Dee Ryan urged people to self-isolate, and maintain a social distance, in order to slow the spread of Covid-19, which had risen to 223 as of Monday night.

It has caused the cancellation of the St Patrick's Day festival, as well as a raft of other events in the next few weeks.

Ms Ryan said: "We had Collette Cowen of the UL Hospitals group on last night in a plea and a rallying call to everyone in the community to take very seriously the next seven days. Our individual actions and movements over the next seven days will have a huge impact on reducing, and flattening the curve of this disease. We are heading into an unprecedented, massive hit on our healthcare system and we need to support the advice, actions and requests of our healthcare community."

The Chamber boss added: "The government has put in measures for anyone who has to be laid off temporarily to get financial support."

Covid-19 is here so it is time to manage the fear



MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS DR EDDIE MURPHY Clinical Psychologist Adjunct Associate Professor UCD School of Psychology

HE reality is that the presence of Covid-19, which is a new illness that can affect our lungs and airways, has arrived in our communities.

It's caused by a virus called coronavirus and its arrival in Ireland is frightening for many people.

In my own family, I can think of individuals who are significantly at risk and I'm sure most people are in the same boat.

It's the 'unknowns' that generate fear, and the absence of control.

Fear & Anxiety

Some individuals will be particularly anxious, for example those over 65 years, vulnerable elderly, those who have a long-term medical condition – for example, heart disease, lung disease, diabetes or liver diseases, cancer and particular mental health presentations e.g. health anxiety and individuals with contamination OCD.

In my experience, fear can be as contagious as the Covid-19! So the challenge is to get some perspective, and before we get perspective let's look at some facts. Not everyone will be infected by

the virus. And of those that are infected, 85% will only experience mild

symptoms. It's the vulnerable groups that are our real concern.

Estimates for the mortality rate vary a little, but it is mostly thought to be 2% or less.

Minimizing The Risk

The risk of catching coronavirus in Ireland is low. This

Thankfully coronavirus has minimal impact on children. Nevertheless children I think are worried and will need reassurance and guidance on facts

will likely change. However, most people may continue to go to work and other public places, as usual. Coronavirus is spread in sneeze

or cough droplets. Anyone who knows they have

been in close contact with a confirmed case in the last 14 days and has symptoms (cough, shortness of breath, fever) should: isolate themselves from other people - this means going into a different, well-ventilated room, contact their GP, and in a medical emergency if symptoms are severe phone 112 or 999.



There is no specific treatment for coronavirus. But many of the



Covid-19: Talking to children and teenagers

CHILDREN and Teenagers will often take a lead from us in terms of how we respond to events, so it is important that we are not overly worried or anxious in their presence.

Every child is different and we all know our children best. We need to trust our own judgment as to what will be best for any individual child.

Children will pick up on things differently at different ages, so as parents we need to tailor our approach.

Younger children do not need to be exposed to a lot of news/ concerning conversations. Think about protecting their time to play freely. We do, however need to take some time with children to find out what they already know from the news or from other children.

They may have questions about

what they have heard which could be anything from 'it's a bug like a bad cold' to 'are we all going to die?' We need to really tune into what the child is feeling and show them than we understand them: 'I get the feeling that this is really scary for you?' Allowing our children to talk about their fears and letting them know we understand will make them feel much more connected and secure.

We can use a calm voice and let young children know that this virus is like a tummy bug or a 'flu and some people will catch it. We can reassure all children that lots of countries are working hard together to stop it spreading. In this way we are letting the child know that there is a new challenge out there but that everyone is working together to be sensible and help each other. We can talk with children about good ways that they can help to stop the virus. With younger children we can make hand-washing a game: 'who can make the biggest bubbles?' or 'Wash hands while we sing Happy Birthday twice!' Encouraging use of tissues and 'sleeve sneezes' followed by hand washing will be an important habit for us to teach.

As schools and early years services are now closed, it can help children if we can frame this positively: 'There are lots of bugs going around so they are going to give the school a really good clean'. Try to help the child see how time at home could be fun and, if it looks likely to happen, we can prepare with about how we might use the time positively.

Teenagers are more likely to be accessing social media so

negotiating less time focussed on Covid-19 on social media for a teenager who is overly worrying may be a useful way to help them get things in perspective. At the same time, they may be getting positive support from their friends and, if schools have closed, their access to some fun with friends through social media will be important.

Creating the space to really listen to them and understand how they are feeling will be extra important at this time. Having a frank discussion with them could help them sift fears from facts.

Children and teenagers are likely to go through the same emotional reactions to their worries as adults although they may show this in different ways. They may be either more withdrawn or challenging than usual and much of this will be stemming from information that has worried them or turned into fears. Helping our children to develop some breathing exercises and relaxation techniques may also be helpful to help them to regulate themselves.

We need to let children know that they can come and talk with us at any time as their questions/worries may change as they hear about or think of different things. Listening to children and acknowledging their feelings will help them to feel connected and understood.

Your child may want to spend more time close to you when they are concerned or worried so try to be available to them, as this is a normal reaction.

As parents it is important to stay informed to help keep perspective and to be honest. While it is normal to feel some concern at this time, settling ourselves and our families as best we can will help us to work together to look after each other.

Stay sane and make gains

ITH everything that's happening in the world right now I really had to think hard about what to write this week.

I was torn between writing something light-hearted that made no reference whatsoever to the "C-word" and writing something relevant and informative that addresses the current health crisis. At the same time I was looking up articles and videos on home workouts and bodyweight workouts as the vast majority of gyms and health clubs across the country have (rightly) closed their doors to ensure the safety of their staff and $\operatorname{customers}$. While there are of course more pressing concerns than keeping your summer body on track, I do fear that the state mandate of social distancing will be most tested by people who want to socialise and people who want to exercise. Which is understandable as isolation isn't good for anyone but we do all need to take extra care to protect our health and the health of others right now so I think it's best to look for solutions and alternatives rather than complaining or worrying about what's to come.

With that in mind, this week's Man About Town is all about working out at home. If we're going to spending a lot more time at home over the next few weeks then let's stay active and get our bodies moving and release some endorphins so we can stay sane and make gains.

Exercising at home is a lot easier than you'd think. I've been doing yoga in my bedroom (not like that) for many years as it helped me to get back to playing sport after a double leg break suffered on the field in 2011. You don't need to trade in the sofa for a bench and you don't need to splash out hundreds of euros on equipment. All you need is a plan. You can burn fat, get fit and feel better all without having to go to the gym.

I'm no fitness expert or influencer so if you're an experienced fitness fanatic you may need to refer to them for some more advanced advice. I'm looking out for the beginners here so I've put together some basic exercises that can be done with little to no equipment at home, standing or laying on the floor. Most of them are bodyweight exercises that can be done without equipment, and to progress in your strength and stamina, simply add weights. If you already have dumbbells, then that's a big help. If you're in a position to invest, then do but if that's not an option then there are things around the house like that can be used instead. You might laugh at that but lighter weights can be used to make a move more taxing by slowing down the tempo and or increasing the number of reps. Make sure you have room to maneuverer as well, you don't want to knock over a flat-screen TV or make bits of granny's prize china while you're doing quadruped limb raises.

While you won't need much equipment, one thing I would recommend is a decent smartwatch or Fitbit. You might need to borrow one but I would do this as they mostly have a real-time heart rate tracking function. We don't need to add to the number of people in our hospitals right now so please don't take any unnecessary risks.

THE BEST EXERCISES YOU **CAN DO AT HOME**

Before you start any exercise, make sure you warm-up. Do 5-10 minutes of cardio first. This can be a stationary run or a light jog around the house/estate, just to get your heart rate up. Listening to music is also a great way to get you in the zone and stay motivated during exercise. So get that playlist ready to go.

1. Squats

The key to a great squat is keeping your knees wide to activate the crucial muscles in your glutes and thighs. Stand with your feet hip-distance apart, and your toes pointing outward. As you squat keep your back straight and core braced. Bend your legs with knees wide until thighs are parallel to the floor, then drive back up, squeezing your glutes at the top. If you're unsure of form or technique then put on a Youtube tutorial to accompany you in beginning (and that goes for all these exercises). You don't have to be perfect at the start but it's worth getting right so you don't hurt yourself. Once you've familiarized yourself with $body weight \, squats, try \, adding$ weight, or give hold squats or even Bulgarian split squats a go.

Muscles worked: quads, glutes, calves, hamstrings, core, thighs. Great for: burning fat, building leg muscles and overall strength.

2. Lunges

Another great exercise for the legs. Lunges work the lower half of your body and since the muscles

there are larger, working the lower body burns loads of calories. Lunges are also one of the few bodyweight exercises that really work the calf muscles. The exercise is pretty straight forward. Stand up straight, take a big step forward and bend your knee so your rear knee comes close to touching the floor. Kick yourself back up with your front leg and return to your starting position. Switch and do the same with your other leg and that's one rep. Lunges will get your butt into shape as they target the glutes better than squats and working one side at a time helps identify imbalances and reduces

the risk of injury. Muscles worked: quads, glutes, calves, hamstring, core, thighs Great for: toning glutes, stretching hamstrings, boosting calves

3. Push-Ups

Possibly the best bodyweight exercise of them all, push-ups (or press-ups) work your arms and chest, toning and strengthening your upper body all at the same time. Compound exercises are great for burning fat because they work many different muscles all at the same time while also building strength. Place your hands shoulder-width apart and lower until it's just off the floor, keeping your elbows tucked into your body. Drive back up to the top to complete the rep. A narrow stance targets your triceps while a wider position is great for chest activation. If you're struggling at the start then try doing knee push-ups so that your arms can get used to the movement. Muscles worked: arms, chest,

shoulders, core. Great for: toning arms,

strengthening chest.

4. Quadruped Limb Raises Strengthening your back

without equipment can be tricky and quadruped limp raises will work your back a lot more gently than doing pull-ups, for sure, but most of us won't have a pull-up bar at home and I would strongly discourage you from looking for alternatives.

Quadruped limb raises work the glutes lower back mostly but will also work your core, traps and thighs. Go down on all fours with your hands on the ground shoulder-width apart. Your back should be straight and parallel to the ground.

Lift one arm and the opposite leg in the air at the same time and hold the position for a few seconds and then lower them back to the ground. Do the same with the other two limbs. Don't reach too high as you don't want to strain your neck or lower back.

Muscles worked: lower back, traps, glutes, core.

Great for: strengthening your back and burning fat.

5. Planking

Planking is probably the least exciting exercise on this list. You literally have to hold your body in a plank position for a period of time. Sounds easy right? Wrong! Planking is one of the most challenging exercises you can do and if you've ever wanted to know just how long 60 seconds can be, planking will teach you.

Again, if you're struggling then start with a knee plank and work from there. If your house is full of hardwood floors then I suggest having some form of a mat underneath you as well.

Muscles worked: core, chest, back and shoulders

Great for: abs and improving posture.

Now that you have five super moves to try at home, try a circuit workout following this sequence.

Squats

- Lunges
- Push-Ups Quadruped Limb raises

Plank

Perform each exercise for 45 to 60 seconds while resting - or cursing/crying – as little as possible between exercises.

Time yourself, so as opposed to counting reps, try and perform as many repetitions of the exercise as you can within the time limit.

Start with three rounds, then move to four, then five and so on.

Stay safe, stay positive and we'll all get through this together.


The EP will be available for streaming on Spotify, Apple Music, YouTube Music, and others. It will be available for purchase on iTunes and Google Play on Friday, March 20.

SKODA has introduced ล plug-in-hybrid to its flagship Superb range.

The car comes in two bodystyles, Liftback (saloon) and Combi (estate), and four specification levels of Ambition, Style, Sportline, and the top of the range L&K.

The Superb iV is now on sale priced from €40,350-€49,850. Prices exclude delivery charges but are inclusive of government grants. At a glance, this hybrid Superb

may seem indistinguishable from any other new Superb; however, it conceals an electric motor with a power output of 85 kW capable of travelling up to 62km on pure electric power, and a 1.4 TSI petrol engine delivering 156bhp (WLTP test cycle). Transmission is 6-speed DSG automatic.

When both power units are working simultaneously, the car has a combined power output of 160 kW (218bhp) and a range of up to 930km without refuelling.

The electric motor acts as an additional boost providing a driving performance and a 0-100km/h time of 7.7 secs. Maximum speed is 224km/h.

Driving Mode Select is standard and allows the driver to alter the car's driving characteristics and comfort settings by varying the transmission steering, and Dynamic Chassis Control.

As well as Sport mode, drivers can also choose E-mode or Hybrid mode. In E-mode, the Superb iV is powered solely by the electric motor and so becomes a zero-emission car - perfect for short daily commutes.

The car can travel almost silently but a special sound generator creates a unique sound to alert pedestrians and cyclists that the car is approaching them.

In Hybrid mode, both power units work together delivering a combined fuel consumption of 1.5 L/100kms of petrol. Co2 emissions are 33 g/km so annual road tax is €170. The default hybrid mode switches automatically between petrol and electric drive so you don't have to be concerned that you will run out of battery charge. All the necessary information you need is provided by the Virtual Cockpit, such as the battery state, aswell as navigation, etc. For peace of mind, you can search for the nearest charging station in your navigation system.

The lithium-ion battery is built into the chassis floor in front of the rear axle of the car. (Superbs are renowned for their big boot space). It stores the power needed for electric drive and also powers the climatronic air-con system and heating, that can be programmed remotely using the Skoda Connect mobile app. It can also show the

touching your phone. Apple the CarPlay comes with SmartLink+ system.

Compared to the standard Superb, the iV hybrid has the Dynamic Chassis Control as well as the most modern MIB infotainment systems coupled to digital dashboard displays.

The Superb iV can be charged in different ways. It can be fully charged in about 3:30hrs using the Mode 3 charging cable and a wall box with a charging output of 3.6 kW. Using the Mode 2 cable with a standard household three pin plug socket, it will take around five hours. Hybrid cars can charge the battery or maintain the battery level using regenerative braking and also power from the petrol engine. City driving with continuous braking in traffic, helps to recharge the battery.

Hybrid and plug-in hybrid vehicles are gaining in popularity in Ireland, evident by sales doubling here in the past two years to 11,540 vehicles in 2019.

Commenting on the launch, John Donegan, Brand Director, Skoda Ireland said: "The Superb iV offers the best of both worlds. The ability to plug-in and charge at home or work means commuters from Naas, Drogheda, Navan or Greystones travelling to Dublin have the potential to commute, powered entirely by electricity." The same applies to those travelling similar distances to work in Cork, Limerick or Galway. He said plug-in hybrid vehicles offer 'significantly advantages over self-charging hybrids including significantly lower Co2 emissions and superior fuel economy'.

The Superb iV is open to orders and Skoda are advising customers to place their orders early to avoid disappointment as availability will be limited to 250 units for this year.

GAA: Chairman says that GAA aren't working towards any definitive return date

LIMERICK GAA will have to look at "all scenarios" to restructure their 2020 Master Fixture list.

That's according to Limerick GAA chairman John Cregan.

"Games have paled into insignificance in recent days but I know there will be a great appetite for games when all returns to normal," said the County Board chairman.

Cregan was speaking after was confirmed that have Limerick GAA postponed all club hurling

and football championship games for the month of April.

Across four weekends, Limerick had almost 60 adult championship games alone scheduled and on top of that are U21 and minor action.

"It was important to bring certainty," said John Cregan.

All players want is clarity and the present deadline is March 29 and even if that were to be the case, players and teams have no time to prepare or train for championship matches," explained the Limerick GAA chairman.

What of rescheduling the games?

"We are now every much

planning for the unknown. We have a format of club championship in Limerick that has worked every well for us but it does take time. Clubs need to be aware that we will have to look at all scenarios and work with the national body and provincial councils and their deadlines," outlined Cregan.

"It's a very moveable feast," he said of a potential return to action.

"We will do the very best we can to ensure we have a championship," he stressed.

Limerick were second county nationally, after Galway, to confirm a full postponement of club games

beyond the current March 29 date. The Limerick

confirmation came via a statement on Sunday night. "It is proposed that we will

engage with the Provincial

Council and National CCC with a view to restructure our Games Programme. This may include the redesign of the current formats. If so, we will engage with the clubs prior to any decision being made," said the statement.

"In summary, the club championships in Senior, Premier Intermediate, Intermediate, all U21 and Minor Hurling and Senior, Intermediate and Minor Football will not proceed in the month of April."

The statement added: "County Leagues will resume when sanction is approved by the Statutory Bodies."

On the inter-county scene,

Croke Park and Munster Council GAA officials will await to confirm their new fixture schedule.

Three weekends are required to finish both the Allianz Hurling and Football League. The Limerick footballers have two group games to play in their promotion push in Division Four.

John Kiely's hurlers await semi final opponents with two quarter finals yet to be played.

And, the provincial championship dates are fast approaching – Munster SFC and Munster SHC set for May 9/10 starts.

Adrian Shine - RIP

Adrian had a long association with Hyde Rangers from underage level right up to Junior Level, both as a player and manager of schoolboy and adult teams.

The decision for the province's senior and Academy players to take a break comes in the wake of PRO14 Guinness the organisers announcement that the current season has been suspended in response to the evolving coronavirus outbreak.

No training will take place Munster's High Performance Centre in UL this week, with players not required to follow an overall official programme.

Rehabilitating players will continue to follow their programmes under the guidance of the medical department.

PRO14 Guinness organisers said last week that it is in the 'best interests of everyone' that games are not played at this time.

"The suspension has been directed by the board of Celtic Rugby DAC and will be remain under constant review," their statement continued.

Munster's last competitive fixture was three weeks ago when Johann van Graan's side scored a dramatic bonus point win over the Scarlets at Thomond Park.

PRO14 had The announced last month that,

in keeping with World Rugby practice, any game that is cancelled with no possible alternative dates found, will be declared a o-o draw with each team receiving two match points.

Meanwhile, a number of Munster players have been among several Irish rugby stars who have called on members of the public to the support HSE's Coronavirus Guidelines.

Keith Earls was among those to plea to the public to listen to the health professionals in relation to the measures being put in place to help tackle the coronavirus on-going pandemic.

Senior health officials have appealed for people to adhere to social distancing guidelines to help slow the spread of the virus.

In a message on social media on Sunday morning, winger Earls said the actions of some people are really starting to worry me.'

Keith Earls wrote: "As a father of a child with a serious respiratory lung condition and many others like her, I urge the public to please listen to the professionals. I will do everything I can to protect her.

"Everyone has a part to play. I'm usually a private person but the actions of some people is really starting to worry me.

"This is an extremely worrying and scary time and we all need to take immediate action. Please."

THE LAST two Monday nights have seen RTE air a documentary about the Republic of Ireland's soccer journey under Jack Charlton.

The 'Boys in Green' was a fantastic trip down memory lane, made all the more poignant by the current sport-less state we find ourselves in.

Italia 90, for me, was the peak of football. Sky was yet to populate our screens with matches every second of the day, from all over the World.

Sunday's in our house were spent watching 'The Match' on ITV. It could be weeks before you saw your favourite team. Some Sundays you had to endure Southampton and Norwich or Fulham and York, before one week, it would be Liverpool.

Their all red, or grey kit, would flash up on the screen. They were

My Dad built us soccer goals, complete with nets from Nestor's Sports store. We had World Cup qualifiers, group stages, knock outs, finals and penalty shoot outs every single day, to the point where there was no more grass in the goals and diving to save shots became optional.

Then there were the kits. The green Ireland kit which had a flicked emboss. The white one, even more amazing.

West Germany wore the greatest jersey ever designed at that tournament, while Holland, Italy and Cameroon stand out in my memory to

I watched every game, every game, in that World Cup from home. Bar one... Ireland's eventual loss to Italy was watched outside the house, in Claughaun GAA club to be exact.

Since then, I do not watch matches outside the home where possible. I have been scared.
