Superb transformation of Fipperary village continues

A €860,000 community development supported by the residents of a County Tipperary village is continuing at a fast pace.

The Rosegreen Community Development Plan 2016 2020 is transforming Rosegreen's Nijinsky Park, with new grass pitches with a lighted walkway around them, an all-weather astro turf surface, a playground and a new car park the highlights of an exciting new dawn for the community.

"The surface is down for

the walkway - a superb smooth tarmac surface surrounded by elegant fencing," says Rosegreen Development Association's secretary Marie Devitt.

"Grass seeds are ready for dispersal on the new pitches. The base is prepared for the all-weather pitch. The pedestrian area at the rear of the community hall and by the store shed has a new layer of tarmac," she continues.

The foundation has been prepared for a new toilet adiacent to the walkway. The entrance to the community hall car park is complete and planting in front of the hall is

underway.

"A lot of progress has been made and these great achievements are due to our great contractors PST Sport who tendered for all their business and great local volunteers who work tirelessly every day to assist, support and complete the extra tasks.

"The marvellous dry summer has been a wonderful benefit to all the works to date on the site and assisted development of the allweather pitch. A little rain

Injured Tipp teenager no longer critical

The 19-year-old County Tipperary youth who suffered serious head injuries in a single vehicle car crash in the Galbally area is no longer in a critical condition in hospital.

A Tipperary Town Garda Station spokesman confirmed that the teenager's condition has improved and his family are now hopeful he will recover.

The youth was a back seat passenger in the car that struck a ditch at Moor Abbey, Galbally, around 4am on Saturday.The car was travelling in the direction of Galbally when the accident occurred. There were three other occupants of the vehicle that crashed.

The injured teenager was initially taken by ambulance to Limerick University Hospital but was later transferred to Cork University Hospital due to the seriousness of his injuries.

Two other male passengers in the back seat of the vehicle also suffered injuries. One was admitted to Waterford University Hospital and the other was admitted to South Tipperary General Hospital.

Council proposal 'a bridge too far' rules planning board

The people of Ardfinnan have secured a significant victory in their bid to restore a two-way traffic system at the village bridge after a three year battle against Tipperary County Council who wanted to make an imposed hated one-way system permanent.

Bord Pleanála have ruled against the controversial one way traffic system in Ardfinnan favoured by Tipperary County Council despite massive opposition to the plan

The decision has been hailed as a victory for "people power" after Bord Pleanala was inundated with objectors to the one way system which they have endured and opposed for the last three years.

180 objections, which included one from Ardfinnan Community Council, were lodged with Bord Pleanála to Tipperary County Council's plan to proceed with the one

way system, in place now for almost three years, on a permanent basis.

The decision opens the way towards the restoration of a two way system on the bridge again once the damage caused to the bridge from flooding is repaired.

Tipperary County Council have an eight week period in which they can seek a judicial review of the Bord Pleanála decision.

Said TD Mattie McGrath: "This was a victory for the people who fought a long battle

"Nobody in Tipperary County Council listened to the community. The one way system that the people of Ardfinnan have had to put up with was unsafe, it posed real dangers to children attending the national school and threatened the future of a long standing local business.

Thank God An Bord

Pleanála has listened to the people and taken their concerns on board".

Deputy McGrath accused **Tipperary County Council of** acting in a "purely draconian manner by ignoring a whole community who were opposed to the one way system.

"Tipperary County Council rode roughshod over the people of Ardfinnan.

"People were completely overlooked. It was the Council way or the highway for three years ,but at last thankfully the law of the land has come down on the side of the people and come out in favour of the restoration of the two way system," said Deputy McGrath.

The decision was also welcomed by Mayor of Clonmel Cllr Richie Molloy and local Ardfinnan councillor Martin Lonergan.



Drop in Tipperary claims involving uninsured or untraced vehicles

The Motor Insurers' Bureau of Ireland believes the strategy they introduced for fighting fraud is impacting on the market, after recording a 6% drop in claims involving uninsured or untraced vehicles in Tipperary

in the first seven months of 2018.

Over the January to July period, the MIBI received a total of 32 claims from Tipperary, a drop of two from the 34 Tipperary claims they had received by the end of July 2017.

The MIBI is a non-profit organisation established to provide compensation to victims of accidents involving uninsured or untraced vehicles.

Last year the MIBI introduced a comprehensive plan to make it as difficult as possible for fraudulent claims to succeed. This included measures to put the full weight of the MIBI's internal and external resources behind investigating suspicious claims, working hand in hand with the Gardaí to look into these cases as well as legally contesting such claims and bringing them to trial to be scrutinised by the full power of the courts.

The MIBI also recorded a national drop in figures during the first seven months of the year, with the number of claims throughout the country decreasing by 144, marking an 8% decline in claims when compared to the previous vear.

In the first seven months of the year, the MIBI has received fewer claims from 18 of the 26 counties. The largest drop in number of claims came from Louth with 34 fewer received by the end of July, followed by Dublin (drop of 33) and Kildare (drop of 17). The largest percentage drop was in Roscommon which had a 41% reduction, followed by Louth (-40%), Leitrim (-38%) and Cavan (-34%).

Speaking about the figures, Chief Executive of the MIBI. David Fitzgerald said: "It is positive to see that the number of claims from Tipperary is starting to reduce. Admittedly these figures represent only a snapshot in time and some of the county by county numbers are too small to draw any significant conclusions from. However, considering these statistics cover over half a year's worth of data, they are a useful barometer of the general MIBI claims' environment and this shows a noteworthy drop in the total number of claims

'Taking a more detailed look at the claims received, we do believe a significant portion of this decrease is because of the increased scrutiny we are placing on fraudulent claims. According to our handlers, since we adopted our 'Fighting Fraud' strategy, which involves a zero tolerance approach to fraud, there has been a noticeable decrease in the number of claims where the evidence does not back up the case being made.

"Fraudsters are starting to get the message that if they want to make a fic-tional claim to the MIBI then they will have to be prepared to have that claim put through microscopic examination. Any such claims from Tipperary or any other part of the country will be thoroughly investigated by the MIBI working in co-operation with the Gardaí. If the evidence still doesn't add up, they will be brought before the courts. The days of easy settlements for nonsense claims are

definitely over.

"The MIBI would like to make it clear that those who have a real claim have nothing to worry about. The MIBI has always been a pro-victims organisation and when the claim is real and justified we support the claimant. However, protecting victims also means reducing fraud as much as possible.

'We want to ensure that malicious individuals who make the roads more dangerous by staging fake accidents find it harder and harder to succeed. That is in the interests of everyone using the roads in Tipperary or anywhere in Ireland and it is a strategy we are committed to pressing in the months and years to come," Mr. Fitzgerald concluded.

Suicide awareness group seeks help to buy its own home

The comfort of having your own home is something a group of volunteers in Clonmel is trying to secure for people who need a support structure in their lives.

Community suicide awareness workers in Clonmel (C-Saw) are appealing to the public to support the group in a bid to provide the stability of a permanent home to people availing of the services it provides at 24 Wellington Street in Clonmel.

The goal is to purchase the house which they have been using for the last three years so that once ownership is secured they can offer more services and they could move on to develop as an organisation knowing they had a permanent base.

C-Saw, founded five years ago, has appealed to local business interests to support their campaign to purchase the house and are actively pursuing raising enough funds to make that crucial step.

It's an open house, a place where everybody is welcome with a friendly group combining to provide a relaxed atmosphere.

"The house is for sale at the moment and we have an agreement to buy it, we just have to raise the money now. We like where we are and the people who call in are very happy here" said Joe Leahy one of the founding members of the group.

Tommy Cahill, one of the volunteers, said they were all trained in counselling.

Initially people who call enjoy a cup of tea and a chat and if they want to avail of counselling or bereavement counselling they can opt for that in a private and confidential setting.

The house is not just for people in Clonmel, with people coming from West Waterford up to Monard.

Patrick is a regular caller to the house and remembers the difficult place he was inwhenhe first called two years ago.

ago. "I suffered a trauma way back and I never went for treatment for it. I went around the town letting on I was fine but I was not.

"It was a struggle to actually take that step to come in but I got over that. I came to the right place, the counsellors are gold and I am in a good place now" said Patrick.

The organisation works to reduce the number of suicides in Tipperary by raising awareness, educating the community and providing emotional and practical support to those in need, as well as those bereaved by suicide.

Its services - all of which are provided free by trained volunteers and volunteer professionals - are provided

at 24 William Street,

Last year, more than 500 people availed of the services provided at C-SAW House.

These include a Listening Ear Support Service, which is totally confidential and held between 6.30-7.30pm every Monday and Thursday evening; bereavement counselling from 2-3pm every Thursday; and a free coffee morning from 11am-1pm every Wednesday.

Take Time to Talk Counselling with qualified counsellors is also available, by appointment. C-SAW has trained more than 200 people in recent years in SafeTalk and ASIST. Both courses are certified by the HSE and equip people with the skills to assess and intervene in crisis situations.

Climate change the focus at major Clonmel conference

Citizens leading Ireland's Energy and Climate transition is the focal point of an upcoming conference which will take place on Wednesday, September 12th, in Hotel Minella, Clonmel.

It forms part of the national dialogue on climate action and will be hosted by Tipperary Energy Agency, a non-profit social enterprise.

The conference 'Citizens leading the Energy and Climate Transition' will see leaders in climate change from across Europe take part.

Key insights into sustainable energy use and implementation will be shared in what will be one of the largest gatherings of representatives from the sector to take place in Ireland.

The event was launched in

Nenagh Tennis Club by CEO of Tipperary Energy Agency Paul Kenny, Vice CEO of Tipperary Energy Agency Paula Gallagher, John Fogarty of Templederry Community Wind Farm and Matt Short, Deputy Manager with Tipperary County Council.

In partnership with the European Covenant of Mayors Initiative the conference will focus on how citizens can lead effective energy and climate transition on a local level and in collaboration with local authorities.

In June, Ireland was singled out as the second worst country in the EU to progress towards renewable energy and climate changes. If these goals are not met by 2020, an annual fine of €500 million will be implemented. "Promoting and sup-

"Promoting and supporting Ireland's energy and climate transition while building on national policy so that Ireland can achieve a low carbon and climate resilient future will be the dominant topic of this conference.

For 20 years, Tipperary Energy Agency has been supporting the reduction of energy demand across the county. Enabling people, communities and the public sector to become more sustainable in their energy use has been key to this." Says Paul Kenny, CEO with Tipperary Energy Agency.

Nenagh Tennis Club is one of more than 50 community organisations who have availed of supports from the agency in reducing their energy consumption. In 2017, $\in 6.5$ million of energy upgrades took place in Tipperary with funding from the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland through their 'Better Energy Communities' scheme.

Tipperary County Council is also one of Ireland's best energy performing local authorities. This was in collaboration with the European Investment Bank Elena Programme.

The county leads the way in pioneering energy projects such as Ireland's only community owned wind farm in Templederry, the country's first Ecovillage in Cloughjordan and a substantial Solar Panel project across 9 public buildings.

Mr Kenny also commented "It is no secret that Ireland must take urgent action to ensure that the 2020 and 2030 goals are achieved. Currently, we are in a worrying position and will struggle to decarbonise by 2050. We must mobilise and empower our

citizens so that everybody can play an active part in achieving these targets."

Key statistics:

Compared to 2016, Ireland is now in a worse position regarding climate targets.

In 2017, just 37 per cent of new homes fitted heating systems which use renewable energy. A staggering 63 per cent used tradition fossil fuel boilers and Tipperary Energy Agency say that these homes will eventually need to be retro-fitted.

Emissions in the country are on the rise by 2 million tonnes per year.

here is a chill to the evenings, and the fire has been put a few times, during the last week. This is probably more for reassurance, as when I look out the door past nine, the darkness surprises me. Along the hedgerows there is a bumper crops of hawthorn and elderberry berries, and flocks of starlings have already been sighted, devouring nature's bounty. My mountain ash berries are still safe, but as autumn progresses, and more winter migrants arrive I am sure they will be eaten.

In the garden or community green spaces, the coming months make the ideal time to sow some bird friendly trees. There is a long list, but some of the best for a small space, are crab apple, hawthorn, blackthorn, Hazel, mountain ash, cotoneaster and Pyracantha. Try and include as many of these as space permits, and leave a few leave a few weedy patches and leaves as

foraging ground for birds, The shops are already starting to sell seeds, nuts and fat balls for birds. Feeding birds is a great way to help them, survive the long winter months, and most people now have a bird table or bird feeders in their garden.

While birds are busy feeding on natures berries and seeds it is a good opportunity to take stock of our own feeding stations. Hygiene is so important to keep birds healthy. Dirty feeders or tables, can lead to birds becoming sick and dying. One prime example is Trichomoniasis that is having a big impact on Greenfinches.

It is transmitted through dirty water in bird baths, and on rotten food left in feeders, and on the ground. This forms a canker that blocks the throat, and causes a slow death by starvation. Symptoms of the disease are listless birds, and in some areas over 35% of green finches are af-

fected. Thankfully by taking a few simple actions we can keep our garden birds healthy. Clean feeders by removing any old seeds or nuts and wash in a solution of nine parts water to one part bleach. Wear strong rubber gloves when doing this and wash your hands afterwards. It might also be worthwhile to invest in a new feeder especially if it is more than a few years old.

For bird tables use the



same method and remove old food and scrub down. If you have space move to a different part of the garden and this also applies for feeders.

I have not seen a Greenfinch (see picture) in my garden for several years and have to travel over a half an hour to see one. Greenfinches natural diet includes rose hips, or itchy backs, and they are one of the few birds that can digest these hairy berries. They also feed on the seeds of wildflowers.

WHAT IS THE FAIR DEAL SCHEME?

The Fair Deal Scheme provides financial assistance for people in long term nursing home care.

Its official name is the Nursing Home Support Scheme, but it is better known as the Fair Deal Scheme.

The basic principle behind the scheme is that the patient makes a contribution towards the cost of care and the State will pay the balance.

WHAT CHANGES ARE BEING PROPOSED?

As explained in greater detail on our information page – if a person is deemed to require nursing home care under the Fair Deal Scheme, the HSE assesses the assets

and income of that person. The assessment decides what contribution the person can make to the cost of their care.

A special designation is given to the Family Home. Its value is factored into the HSE calculations for just the first three years of care.

After the first three years, the family home is ignored in terms of calculating what a person's estate is. This threeyear cap can significantly reduce the level of contribution a person availing of the scheme has to pay after the initial three years.

At present, if you own a farm or business, then these assets are factored into the HSE calculations as if they were any other asset and no similar three-year cap exists. The proposal approved by

The proposal approved by the Government extends the three-year cap (which applies to the family home) to farms and small businesses where a family successor continues to operate the farm or business

for a period of six years.

The change is expected to be introduced into legislation shortly.

Maxi Zoo's guide to fun in the fresh air for small animals

If you have your own garden and enough space, your guinea pigs and rabbits will love spending time in an outdoor enclosure. Depending on the quality of the shelter in the outdoor enclosure, you can either keep them outside for just the summer or for the whole year.

When choosing the location, please make sure that the enclosure is not in direct sunlight.

In summer, your pets should have the option to retreat to a shady spot when it gets too warm. They should also have plenty of space to move about in the run in front of their shelter. Grass and sand are ideal for burrowing, however, do be aware that your busy little diggers are also able to burrow under ground-level fences. You can remedy this by putting concrete palisades into the earth at a minimum depth of 50 cm, flush under the fence.

If you have a movable outdoor enclosure, you'll need to check on your pets at regular intervals to see if they're digging up the ground. You'll need to provide them with a waterproof roof to shelter under so that they feel comfortable in rainy weather too.

They'll also need at least two walls on the windward side of the enclosure so that they're protected from the wind and the cold. If you're planning to build the enclosure yourself, make sure you select fencing with holes that are close together and that is robust enough that your small animals can't bite through and escape. Also, provide your pets with a cover net to keep unwanted visitors, such as birds of prey, from getting too close. If your guinea pigs and rabbits aren't used to living outside, they'll need to become accustomed to it first.

You should start this process at a warm time of the year. Make sure there is definitely no more ground frost around before you let them out for the first time. You should also gradually introduce fresh grass to their diet, plus herbs from the garden, to give their digestion the chance to adjust.







It's strange how accustomed you grow to a threemonth summer.

Losing that extra three or four weeks holidays in the summer of sixth year is really felt when all of a sudden the important dates of the summer have come. The Debs, Results Day and CAO Offers Day, landmarks that seemed to stand far off in the distance not so long ago, have come and gone, in our case, in the space of 12 days. We are left standing at the other end, our minds already focused on starting afresh in another 12 days time.

Stranger still was the night out that followed the results. The mixture of celebration and commiseration made for a feeling of treading lightly, nobody wanted to be too over the moon because there were plenty who weren't. Although everyone stayed in relatively good spirits as the country seemed to converge on The Foundry Nightclub in Carlow.

I'm one of the lucky ones in

that I felt that I had cleared the points requirement for my course and had nothing more to worry about. Others weren't so lucky as they sat on the edge of the points requirement from last year, or worse still, a point or two under it, biding their time until the CAO offers came out on Monday.

So it is looking like Engineering in UCD is where I'm headed, with a handful of my year. Cork is the more popular spot this year, but I don't mind going somewhere with less people - I'll just be forced to branch out a little more. All in all, sixth year was not as bad as they made it out to be, but I'm certainly glad I'm not heading back into it next week.

Leaving Cert results delight for Clonmel students

Smiles, laughter, cheers, relief, and yes a few tears were all in evidence around Clonmel when the class of '18 opened the brown envelopes and studied the results which have been on their minds for many months.

For some, those letters printed on the sheet inside that envelope will go a long way towards determining their future, but for many they are little more than a staging post, a sign pointing to the next small step on the long journey that is career and real life.

How many, in 20 or 30 years, will still be in the same career their Leaving Cert results are suggesting to them? Only time will tell.

In CBS High School a total of 129 young men sat the Leaving this year and principal Karen Steenson reported "exceptional results" from four of those, with "a significant number" achieving more than 500 points.

"What you want is for everybody to get what they want as opposed to results and hopefully they will all get what they need from the CAO offers," she told The Nationalist. "The beauty of the CAO is that you have choices. I congratulated them all on completing their second-level education and we're living in a country now where there's always a way. There are so many options for them." The High School is

The High School is keeping students and parents updated on social media regarding recheck options, apprenticeships and different pathways to their chosen careers.

"We're absolutely delighted with the results and proud of them all and wish them the best," Ms Steenson added.

Over at Gaelcholáiste Cheitinn, it was mostly smiles on Wednesday morning.

"I feel it was pretty fair," said Conor Walsh of the CTI, who said he did "a good bit better than I expected and a good bit better than my mocks".

He worked hard though, and it all paid off. "I'm hoping to do product design, hopefully in UL," he said of the next phase of his education.

His friend Tyson Keane was relieved, although "maths wasn't great,' and he's aiming to start an apprenticeship in September in Newcastle, or start a PLC course in Clonmel. "I'm happy enough."

Gaelcholáiste Cheitinn student Cillian Bates said "it was alright" but seemed satisfied with his grades. "I didn't put pressure on myself, whatever I got, I got," was his philosophical reaction. "I had all my angles covered so I

got my course, psychology in UL is the one."

Also from the Gaelcholáiste, Muireann Boyce, told The Nationalist she did "way better" than expected. "I worked very, very hard, the whole year, and I'm so happy." Next on the agenda is primary school teaching at Mary Immaculate College in Limerick.

That seems to have been a popular choice on this year's CAO forms in Clonmel, with one group of three friends at the Loreto College all plumping for Mary I. Maeve Ryan was "delighted," with her results and thought she'd be okay, Aoife Hayes was "happy" and Orla Keating was "over the moon" and hoping to combine psychology with primary teaching in Limerick.

Abbie Donoghue said her results were "better than I thought" but were a reward for her efforts. "Oh my God, the last year was so tough. It was just so hard." She's now aiming to do a sports and recreation studies course in Cork but, before that, "going out with my friends" was a priority.

Heading out was also mentioned by Hannah O'Keeffe, who was "really happy" with her grades and is hoping to study accounting in UCC, while Clodagh Seamark thought she did well enough to get her choice of English, History and Anthropology at NUI Maynooth.

"I want to be a forensic anthropologist," she reasoned. "It was a TV show I used to watch, called Bones, and I got into it through that. I found it really interesting." Cora Maher said she didn't

Cora Maher said she didn't think she would get her first choice on the CAO form but would have enough for second on the list. "I can relax now and go out tonight. Sitting in there, waiting for the results, was nerve-wracking, seeing people going in and coming out and seeing how your friends did. It's all over now anyway."

A total of 72 girls sat the Leaving Cert at the Presentation in Clonmel and principal Michael O'Loughlin said most seemed happy, although with some it was hard to tell. "Years ago they would all open them in the assembly hall bu now a lot of them go home and open them with their parents... But in general they were very good and we're very happy with them."

At least 90pc of that cohort are likely to go on to thirdlevel education, Mr O'Loughlin said, with quite a few opting for science and engineering courses which were once, a long time ago, regarded as a male-only area. "There's a lot of promotion of those courses now, and the stigma that was around engineering [around the prop-

erty crash] is gone. Engineering is so broad and there are so many opportunities."

The "Pres" will be one of the first schools in the country to teach computer science as a Leaving Cert subject next year, so that trend is likely to continue. "We offer all the science subjects here so it's good to see that carrying on."

Principal of Coláiste Cluain Meala, Charlie McGeever, said the 28 students between the Coláiste and the Gaelcholáiste performed generally well.

"Everybody that we've

spoken to so far seems to have their choices right, regarding progression, and at the end of the day progression is what it's all about. They've worked hard to get where they are and it's great to see them happy with their outcomes."

'Lady Bird is more than just a pretty face'

Picture the scene: a mother and her teenage daughter are driving back home after visiting a prospective college.

What starts out as a normal familial conversation soon erupts into a bitter row about selfishness, work ethic and finance which ends with the daughter whipping off her seatbelt, opening the car door and throwing herself out onto the open road much to her mother's horror.

That's how Lady Bird, the directorial debut of Greta Gerwig, begins. It tells the story of Christine McPherson (played by our very own Saoirse Ronan) who has given herself the name of Lady Bird and demands that everyone around calls her by that name. She lives in Sacramento, California (and hates it), goes to an all-girl Catholic school (hates that too) and



constantly spars with her proud mother Marion (Laurie Metcalf, whom she really loves very much).

Lady Bird wants to go to a college where culture is like in New York or Connecticut. However, her family will barely be able to afford it, especially when her kindhearted father loses his job. This forces the somewhat delusional teenager to take note of the world around her.

But this is no simple coming of age tale. This is a sharply written comedydrama centred on the oftenunstable relationship between a mother and her daughter, how a changing economic landscape affects a family, and trying to be the best version of yourself that you can possibly be.

The observations from the title character are hilarious and astute with perfect timing from the Oscar-nominated Ronan. Metcalf provides the sardonic buffer and the rest of the supporting cast play their parts brilliantly also. The soundtrack and setting evoke a strong sense of nostalgia. The message subtly but undoubtedly hits home. This is a film not to be missed!

'Dramatic drop in respite care sessions since 2017 is unacceptable'

Figures released regarding the provision of respite care to family carers across Ireland have caused major concern for national advocacy group Family Carers Ireland.

The data shows that 1,741 fewer respite care sessions, both overnight and day sessions, were provided in the first three months of 2018 compared to the same period in 2017, despite the fact that there is a greater demand for the vital support.

This resulted in a total loss of 1,588 overnight sessions and 153 day sessions for family carers.

'Carers in Crisis', a special episode of RTÉ Primetime which was broadcast in December 2017 with Family Carers Ireland, depicted the very difficult lives of five family carers.

At the time of filming, all of family carers who shared their stories publicly were struggling due to the lack of in-home services, supports and in particular respite provision. These five families represented the stories of thousands of family carers across Ireland who are in similar crisis.

Minister for Health Simon



Harris promised improved and increased provision of respite care, but Family Carers Ireland say that "Government's response was quick but totally inadequate."


"Family Carers Ireland are appalled and bitterly disappointed to receive confirmation that figures for respite care for the first quarter of 2018 have decreased when compared to 2017. This is despite there being a greater demand for this vital support," says Richie Molloy, area manager with Family Carers Ireland in South Tipperary.

These cuts are in addition to the respite care cuts of 15,000 in 2017. Family Carers save the state €10 billion each year, supporting their loved ones to remain at home but they cannot do it alone. There is an urgent need for respite provision which is flexible to meet the needs of each individual family situation.

"Respite is fragmented, inconsistent and in some counties non-existent due to the current postcode lottery that exists. Emerging figures also show that the South of Ireland and rural areas have taken the biggest hit. Today, 1 in 10 people are required to provide care for a loved one at home. By 2030 this will be 1 in 5. Unless there is an urgent investment in homecare and respite many family carers will be forced to down tools which will result in far higher costs of care on the state," the Clonmel mayor continues.

Family Carers Ireland insist that the Minister addresses this crisis in homecare in the upcoming budget and recognise the contribution of Ireland's 355,000 family carers.

"These figures are unacceptable when the majority of family carers individually provide 45 hours and over of unpaid care to a loved one each week. The impact financially, socially and in terms of their own physical and mental health can be immense. Respite care is an essential resource for carers," he adds.
