

Mullinahone's new councillor Kevin O'Meara maintains family link

A son of the late Independent Cllr Eddie O'Meara from Mullinahone has taken over his father's Tipperary County Council seat and plans to contest next year's local elections.

Kevin O'Meara, aged 42, was unanimously co-opted onto the Co. Council at the authority's September monthly meeting in Clonmel.

The new Independent councillor, who lives in his native Mullinahone, has pinpointed the retention of services like post offices and garda stations in the rural communities he represents in Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District as one of his top priorities as a public representative.

His father's passing following illness in April resulted in his mother, Josephine, temporarily taking over the Council seat in keeping with Cllr O'Meara's wishes.

She has now stepped down from the Council and Kevin will continue his father's work of representing the people of Mullinahone. He was welcomed by all members of the Council on Monday after his co-option was proposed by Cllr Micheál Lowry and seconded by Cllr Louise McLoughlin.

Tributes were paid to his father for his contribution to local government, and also to his mother, Josephine, who was faced with the difficult task of taking over the Council seat for a short time.

Cllr Kevin O'Meara, who canvassed with his father during his election campaigns, told councillors his father was proud to have won four elections and had every intention of contesting a fifth next year.

However, it was not to be and he now looked forward to following in his father's footsteps and representing the people as best he could.

The support of the council was pledged to the new Cllr O'Meara by the Chief Executive Officer, Mr Joe MacGrath who said that he looked forward to working with him

Chairman Cllr Mattie Ryan said it was a proud day for Cllr O'Meara and his family, though a day tinged with great sadness too.



Special Olympics had a silver lining for Eddie Ryan

The summer just ended has been one of major achievement for a young Clonmel man, who was among the medal winners at the Special Olympics Ireland Games.

Eddie Ryan from Cherrymount won two silver medals in badminton, in the men's singles and also in the men's doubles when he teamed up with Nicholas O'Brien from Cork, as they represented Munster with distinction.

The Games, held at Abbotstown in Dublin in June, were

something of a family affair for the Ryans, as Eddie's sister Ciara acted as assistant to the Munster badminton team.

Eddie, who will be 26 in October, is no stranger to the big occasion at the Special Olympics, as he represented Ireland at the World Games in Shanghai, China in 2007.

Eddie works in the Journeyman Programme, a training initiative which is part of the Camphill Community in Carrick-on-Suir.

There he enjoys a wide range of activities including cooking, horse riding, candle-making, golf, Zumba fitness and arts and crafts, as well as walking, which he undertakes for the Gaisce (The President's) Award.

Zumba fitness is one of his favourite pastimes and he takes part in an extra class at the Clonmel Park Hotel, as well as playing soccer in Cahir.

Eddie's parents, Brenda and Eoin, his sister Ciara, relations and friends are justifiably proud of his achievements.

There were smiles, tears and many tired bodies as the athletes, coaches and delegations went home after four days of non-stop action at the Special Olympics Ireland Games.

Athletes competed in 13 sports and motor activities training, including athletics, aquatics, badminton, basketball, bocce (a ball sport related to bowls), bowling, equestrian, football, golf, gymnastics, kayaking, pitch and putt and table tennis.

A total of 2,144 medals

A total of 2,144 medals (959 gold, 667 silver and 518 bronze) were awarded during the Games, and won by athletes from the five regions – Connacht, Eastern, Leinster, Munster and Ulster.



Councillors vote through 10% cut in county's property tax

County Council management is faced with tightening its budgets in a range of public services in 2019 after a majority of councillors rejected a proposal to continue a 10% increase in the Local Property Tax for a second year.

Co. Council CEO Joe MacGrath warned there would be an impact on its public services and employment if it didn't get the green light to collect an extra €1.18m in LPT revenue from the county's householders next year as it did this year.

But despite his appeal, the proposal to maintain the LPT at its 2018 level was rejected by a majority of 21 councillors to 15 at the Council's monthly meeting in Clonmel on Monday with one Fine Gael and six Fianna Fail councillors joining three Sinn Fein members and eleven Independents in voting down the motion

The elected members decision is a dramatic reversal of the 22 to 14 vote taken in September last year approving the 10% LPT increase. It means Council management has been directed by the elected members to restore the LPT to the lower 2017 rates.

For households in the first LPT Valuation Band of houses valued up to €100,000, this will translate to a €9 reduction in the tax. Households in the €100,001 to €150,000 valuation band face a €22.50 levy drop while home owners in properties valued at between €150,000 and €200,000 will have €31.50 less property tax to pay next year compared to this year.

The vote to restore the LPT to its 2017 rate followed a heated debate at the Co. Council meeting.

It began with the Council's Finance Director Liam McCarthy

presenting the Chief Executive Joe MacGrath's nine-page report to councillors recommending the continuation of the 2018 LPT rate next year and detailing where the extra €1.18 revenue would be going. It also reminded councillors where the extra €1.18m funding collected this year was spent.

The Excel Centre in Tipperary Town, Rock of Cashel toilets and car park, arts centres in Clonmel and Cahir and Sean Kelly Sports Centre in Carrick are among the beneficiaries this year.

If the 2018 LPT rate continued in 2019, the report recommended spending half the extra €1.18 m revenue on 11 specific services and projects ranging from the county's 12 libraries and Tipperary's Canon Hayes Sports Centre to the Clonmel to Carrick-on-Suir Greenway, Carrick and Hoare Abbey to Golden Road Pedestrian Way and Cahir Digital Hub and Plaza. The remaining €591,000 was to be distributed to the Council's five Municipal Districts for spending on community groups,

services and projects in those areas.

The report pointed out that maintaining the 10% increase in the LPT next year would cost 93% of the county's property owners on average just 0.36 cents extra per week.

Clonmel WUAG Cllr Pat English was the first to react saying he was very disappointed with the proposal and maintained the 10% increase approved by the elected Council for 2018 was only meant to be a "once off" levy hike. He said central government had starved local government through large reductions in funding and it was high time this Council stood up to the Government

The Council's three Sinn Fein councillors also opposed retaining the 10% hike another year. "It's groundhog day", declared Cashel Cllr Martin Browne.

He said families were struggling in the county and while 36 cent might not seem much extra to spend per week, it was a lot if you don't have anything. Cllr David Dunne from Carrick-on-Suir said his party wanted the LPT to go back to its 2017 levels. Families were under pressure now more than ever before. People were in long term debt and money lenders charging sky high interest rates were common in his home town. He suggested the Council find ways of making savings instead of levying more taxes on the public

Cashel/Tipperary Municipal District Chairman Cllr Michael Fitzgerald (FG), in contrast, proposed the Council continue the 2018 LPT rate next year with 50% of the extra revenue going to support local projects.

He said Tipperary Town had suffered a lot and he gave a commitment to do everything he could to promote the town's development. He pointed to the €40,000 earmarked for the Canon Hayes Centre thanks to the extra LPT revenue. If constituents wanted him to refuse that funding, he invited them to phone him and tell him to vote against the proposal. Tipperary Town's Library was one of the finest he had seen and Canon Hayes Centre's playground wouldn't be there without the LPT.

"I want to keep the facilities we have there open. I don't want the door of the Excel or Canon Hayes complexes to close. That was the fear we had. This will be a life saver for them and I am not going to let it go."

Fianna Fail's Cllr Roger Kennedy also supported retaining the 10% hike. He said 90% of Co. Tipperary's houses were valued at under €200,000 so the county's LPT rate base was low and he noted that 80% of LPT revenues were spent in the county they were collected. This proposal would maintain the Council services and facilities and bring about small improvements that he believed made a big difference in all the municipal districts this year.

He argued the extra funding for the leisure and arts centres was helping to keep them going. If they closed they wouldn't re-open and he didn't want to see Council management coming back to the elected members early next year telling them they have to reduce staff in swimming pools, libraries or anywhere else in the Council.

But FF Cllr John Carroll from Nenagh voiced the concern of several councillors who voted to increase the LPT for 2018. "I rarely have voted against the Council on major issues. I voted for this for one year. I will not dishonour that commitment I gave to the public so I will not be voting for the increase," he declared.

Council CEO Joe MacGrath finished the debate by making a passionate appeal to councillors' support for retaining the tax hike. "I never propose increases unless I believe it is absolutely necessary to do and the right thing to do," he said.

The extra money the LPT raised this year ensured leisure, arts and culture centres in the county, he continued. The Excel Centre was perhaps one of the best examples of this. Staff at the Canon Hayes Centre, meanwhile, were trying their best to ensure it continued their services but they needed the Council's help.

Mr MacGrath said he couldn't magically find the €1.18m shortfall in funding for all these services if the Council didn't support retaining the LPT at its current rate. He warned the Council ran a "very lean machine" after years of austerity cutbacks and he couldn't go back into the Council's budget and take money away without it affecting services and employment.

He argued that householders' 2019 LPT bill would be exactly the same as this year's if the proposal was approved. In relation to how the 10% hike was received by householders, he pointed out that there was 98% compliance with paying the tax in the county this year and no submissions were received when the 2018 10% hike was put out to public consultation.

The reality was that the amount of LPT raised in the county was not sufficient to fund the Council's services. The Council must increase or at minimum maintain its income levels to ensure its services and to enhance them, the CEO added.

The proposal to retain the 2018 LPT level was then put to a vote.



visiting my Mum Tipperary town, and when she offered to mind the kids for a few hours, I was gone before she finished the sentence. The weather was dry but cold, and I headed for the shelter of a hedgerow, bordering the railway line by Glenview Square.

hedgerow planted around the same time, as the building of the railways, and this make this hedge around 150 years old. A high bank, with a deep dyke and over a century and half of growth, has created a rich community of birds, flowers and insects.

The main tree species is hawthorn, and this is one of our best native trees for wildlife. A dense tangle of thorns provide a safe nesting, and roosting location for birds. In May you have the blossoms for insects, and at this time of the year, the blood red haws. These are an important source of foods for birds, like blackbirds and thrushes.

The hawthorn is also known as bread and cheese. Years ago kids would eat the leaves with a berry inbetween, and they don't taste

Climbers are well established, and the bramble has a delicious crop of blackberries. I have to remind myself to leave a few for the birds. Ivy flowers are just blooming, and will be visited by late flying moths, flies and pollinators. Also been evergreen, it is a good source of shelter from the biting winter winds and rain.

As I slowly walked along I heard a wren singing. They are typical hedgerow birds, and eat caterpillars found on the hawthorn leaves in summer. They also hunt for spider's eggs and seeds in winter. Wrens have a powerful song. Nearby a dunnock joins in. His song is low and squeaky, and dunnocks tend to stick to deep cover.

Elderberry is throughout the hedgerow. This has been sown by birds, and there are lush berries hanging from the branches. The berries are on the diet of starlings, foxes and badgers.

The meadow beside the hedgerow has thankfully never been improved or sprayed. In summer there is a profusion of wildflowers, and it is not cut till late in the year. This provides plenty of food for butterflies and bees, and also gives the flowers a chance to set seed.

All that is left by September is a narrow wild edge, by the base of the hedgerow. It is full of interesting plants. Nettles for the caterpillars of butterflies, vetches that clamber up other plants and are food for bumblebees. Bindweed is also another climber, and its white trumpet shapped flowers are often visited by bees. Broad leaved dock leaves are eaten by several species of moth. The larva of the declining small copper butterfly also feed on dock.

Some plants are not native, and I find a few English Marigolds flowering. They have been dumped from a garden container, but have stubbornly clung on, and are now brightening up the autumn hedgerow. A robin gives a continuous harsh "tick tick "call. This is the alarm of the hedgerow, and warns all the other creatures that danger is

There are some gaps in the hedgerow, and these could be filled in with a few crab apple tree. This would provide extra height for singing birds. The crabs will be eaten by birds, insects and animals.

A lone ash tree is growing in the hedgerow. The fruit called keys, are eaten by woodpigeons. Ash is often the last tree to leaf, and the first to lose them in the autumn.

The last bird I hear is a blackbird, as he rustles around in a dense tangle of brambles. I have hardly walked 50 metres, and discovered a host of nature. Our hedgerows are such a precious natural resource and deserve all the protection we can afford them.

Taking a Medical Negligence Case

Medical Negligence cases can be difficulty to bring as they are most often brought by an individual against the State. They are also often complex as they deal with people who are sick before they get to hospital or are suffering from serious underlying illnesses such as cancer.

INITIAL STEPS

One of the first tasks for the Solicitor is to distinguish what the outcome would have been but for the negligent act or omission which took place. To do this, medical records are gathered and reviewed.

A Medical expert specialising in the particular area of medicine involved will then be asked to consider whether or not the treatment received was negligent or substandard and if so the extent of the damage it caused.

how do the Courts decide what is and what is not negli-

Medical Negligence is es-

a health care professional which is below the accepted standard of care and which results in injury or death to a patient.

Interestingly, before the 1950s there were no reported cases of medical negligence in Ireland. In fact, until 1989 the number of cases was min-

You have to prove that the care you received fell below medically acceptable standards. 'Acceptable general and approved practice' doesn't need to be universal but must be approved of and practised by a substantial number of reputable practitioners holding the relevant specialist or general qualifica-

HOW CAN MEDICAL NEGLIGENCE HAPPEN?

Medical Negligence can

happen because of:
Diagnosis – i.e. misdiagnosis or delayed diagnosis.

Treatment - i.e. errors in the medical treatment such as incorrect medication, surgical errors, exposure to infection (MRSA etc.) or;

Statute of Limitations in Medical Negligence

There's also a time scale known as the statute of limitations which is two years from the date of the event but often it can be two years from the date of knowledge.

The date of knowledge is applied when the date the injury/action takes place differs from the date it is discovered. This means that in situations where the injury may not be obvious at first the time limit for actions does not begin until the injured party is aware of the injury.

In Ireland class action suits can't be taken against someone so in cases where many individuals are involved each plaintiff must take their case separately. The first case is called a test case and it sets in motion the manner the cases for the rest of the plaintiffs' cases will be

Proud Mossie Casey celebrates 2018 Royal Ascot Hunt Cup win

Cahir businessman Mossie Casey of Casey Tiles and Wooden Floors Ltd is on cloud nine after winning the 2018 Royal Ascot Hunt Cup with the Settle for Bay.

Chatting to South Tipp Today, Mossie opens up about how a shoestring budget led to this wonderful success.

How did you become the owner of a racehorse?

"My father who was a groom in different stable yards instilled a love of horses in me that has grown stronger over the years. I love being around horses and to this day ride out at any given opportunity

"Four years ago I got a call from horse trainer David Marnane asking if I would have an interest in buying a racehorse. As always, I was willing to explore any opportunity presented to me especially as it was horse related. I purchased him. That horse, named Settle for Red and trained by David Marnane and his team, went on to be very successful for me.

^{*}A year later, David phoned me to see if I'd have an interest in one of five yearlings that he had just brought in from Germany. I went to see them and really liked Settle for Bay because of his straight movement, and my gut told me that he had the potential to mature into a really nice horse. I suggested that I'd like to bring in one other investor to diversify the risk and David introduced Dennis McGettigan to me and we became joint owners of Settle for Bay. That is where the story began".

The significance of the horse's name

"My first horse was a chestnut colour and was called Settle for Red. This, my second horse was a bay colour, hence the name Settle for Bay.

"As a three year old, Settle

for Bay won his first race, fractured his pelvis on his second race, made a very successful return to the race trace and went on to win four in a row before his big win in Royal Ascot.

"Having a horse who qualified for Royal Ascot is every horse owner's dream, but to have a winner at Royal Ascot was out of this world. After the race, we returned to our hotel with the winning cup where finally it hit home what had just been achieved.

"In the hotel, there were lots of owners and trainers. They were astounded when they heard of the shoestring budget that led to this wonderful success. Even though I am only half owner, for me, it was better than winning the lottery. The lottery is a monetary win, whereas with Royal Ascot winnings you also have the horse and all the future potential and enjoyment that entails.

"It was just incredible to hear so many nice stories about the winnings. For ex-

ample, one lady told my about the lovely dress she bought out of her winnings, while another elderly lady was so excited on the first bet in her lifetime winning over €100!


