Miriam Daly strides to Buenos Aires Youth Olympic Games

A "special" Tipperary teenager with the "drive to be the best" is representing Ireland at the 2018 Youth Olympic Games in Buenos Aires, Argentina, next week.

Carrick-on-Suir's Miriam Daly will fly the flag for Ireland in the women's 400m hurdles race at the Youth Olympic Park Athletics Field on October 13.

Miriam joined Team Ireland, made up of 16 athletes competing in nine sports, as they departed for Buenos Aires on Wednesday. Awaiting them are over 4,000 athletes challenging for podium finishes in 32 sports.

With a haul of schools, Tipperary, Munster and national medals in her growing trophy cabinet, hurdles sensation Miriam is relishing the experience.

Miriam said competing against international athletes at the European Under 20 Championships in Italy and the European Youth Olympic Festival in Hungary will fuel her performance at the Youth Olympic Games. "I've learnt to control my nerves more,

relax and focus on what I have to do and not worry about anybody else. My legs used to feel heavy when I got nervous and I still get a bit nervous before races. It's all about putting tricks in place to control them and I've learnt to turn my nerves into a good performance," Miriam told South Tipp Today.

Miriam's training has be-

come "more intense" throughout her teenage years, requiring extra dedication and sacrifice. The 17-year-old trains in a group of four at Carrick-on-Suir AC with other promising young athletes Jake Vermeer, Jack Pender and Rose Ann Fitzgerald.

"Every year we see what works and what doesn't. I'm training harder than ever before, three or four days a week, but the breaks in between really help. The four of us are the older athletes at the club and train together. On Thursdays last year we met up with a bigger group down in Waterford who were older than us and that helped us to improve.

Rockwell College officially open state-of-the-art new pavilion

Rockwell College celebrated the latest addition to its facilities on Saturday with the opening of the Fr. Aidan Lehane CSSp Pavilion.

The modern, single-storey construction comprises of eight changing rooms with shower and toilet facilities, a fitness suite, medial room and referees suite. It was designed by past pupil Richard Rice, of Healy Partner Architects in Limerick.

Speaking at the official opening, Rockwell College principal Audrey O'Byrne noted the "unity of purpose across all the stakeholders. which has driven the project to completion".

She said the project was a collaboration significant between past pupils and parents and that while both parties had been generous supporters of Rockwell College development in the past, the pavilion would stand as a demonstration of what can be achieved when the whole school community stands to-

The Fr Aidan Lehane CSSp Pavilion was formally opened by former international Paul McNaughton, a past pupil of Rockwell College. Coached by Fr Lehane to a Munster Cup win in 1970, Paul is currently a board member of the EPCR, the organisers of the Championship Cup and Challenge

Cup.

The building celebrates the legacy of the Holy Ghost priest who served as president of all five Holy Ghost Colleges - Blackrock College, St. Michael's College, Templeogue College, St. Mary's College and Rockwell College. An advocate of the importance of sport in developing young people as learners and leaders, Fr. Lehane also oversaw the development of an indoor gym and swimming pool at Rockwell College during his presidency in the early 1970s.

The event saw over 500 parents, staff, pupils and past pupils join together in the Tipperary sun accompanied by the St. Patrick's Brass Band, Cashel, who provided a festive musical backdrop for the afternoon. The music and refreshments gave a festival feel to the afternoon, which finished with exhibition matches between the Senior Cup rugby team and St. Michael's College, Dublin, and the junior hockey team against Crescent College.

Principal O'Byrne was enthusiastic in her praise for all involved in the project,

Animal Welfare group to protest outside Leinster House

Tipperary group Action For Animal Welfare Ireland will hold a peaceful protest for animal welfare outside the gates of Leinster House today (Thursday, October 4) from 2-4pm.

They will be joined by animal welfare organisations and horse rescues from across Ireland.

The group formed in response to a series of horrific horse neglect cases and have been campaigning for the appointment of a horse warden, not just for Tipperary but for

every county in Ireland.

The support for this campaign is impressive; over the last few months Action For Animal Welfare Ireland has collected 10,000 handwritten signatures and will present these to the office of Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine Michael Dublin Thursday.

Their aim in holding this protest is to ask the Government to enforce existing animal welfare legislation.

"Horse and dog ownership laws are not being enforced, micro-chipping, passports, land ownership and registered equine numbers are not being monitored," Anne Williamson of Action For Animal Welfare Ireland told South Tipp Today.

The group has invited senators and TD's to meet with them outside Leinster House and called on them to support their campaign for horse wardens, increased funding for local authorities to whom the responsibility for enforcement is delegated, and deterrents and punishments that are quickly and strongly

"Increased incidents of horse neglect and cruelty are not only stretching horse rescue services beyond their capacity but indicate a deep flaw in the current provision. Without the enforcement of the necessary deterrents and appropriate criminal sanctions provided for in the laws, the situation looks set to worsen," Anne added.



Minister for Housing Eoghan Murphy turns the sod on new Clonmel estate Glenconnor Hill

Minister for Housing Eoghan Murphy turned the sod at the site of 26 new social houses in Clonmel recently.

Contractors Semiton are set to commence work imminently on the new Glenconnor Hill estate, adjacent Glenconnor Heights.

In excess of €5 million will be spent on the houses, which have been in the pipeline for a while on the site originally purchased by Clonmel Borough Council over 10 years

Glenconnor Heights was initially constructed on the land and this is the next phase of social housing delivery in the area.

Glenconnor Hill will include five bungalows, but a portion on Council lands at Glenconnor has been transferred to Cluid Approved Housing Body who plan to build nine bungalows for people with a disability. The rest will be two and three bed houses, set to be complete by early 2020.

Mayor of the Clonmel Borough District Richie Molloy started proceedings by welcoming Minster Murphy to Clonmel. Mayor Molloy said Clonmel and towns across the country are "crying out" for houses, praising the minister for launching the new Land Development Agency which will invest €1.25 billion in building 150,000 family homes over the next 20 years. The aim of the Land Development Agency is to use State land that is in strategic areas more efficiently for more social, affordable and private housing.

"Homelessness and the housing crisis is in all our minds as public representat-

ives the last number of years and that's why today is so important. Clonmel and all the towns need initiatives like this," Mayor Molloy said. to Clonmel been cast in doubt

Minister Murphy was at one of the Simon Community's family hubs in Limerick on Friday morning and used the experience to reiterate to the Tipperary gathering that the Government is moving in the right direction in tackling the homeless

"I got the chance to meet a young mother with a twoyear-old kid. She had been living with her boyfriend, they had a kid, that relationship hadn't worked out. She had then got into a tenancy, got into a bit of difficulty and needed Housing Assistance Payments but the landlord

she was with wouldn't take it. When she was negotiating with him to take it and something else, he passed away suddenly and she had nowhere to live. She couldn't find anywhere to live, not because she was a full-time carer for her child but because she was on her own. She was in a hotel for three weeks which isn't appropriate at all and she has been in a hub in Limerick with three months. The hub she's in is one of the best in the country because everyone that was in that hub when it opened up eight or nine months ago are now in homes. The hub programme is working - when families go into hubs they get all the care and support they need. No family that has left that hub has gone back into homeless.

"How do we get them into homes? We build them! And that's what this is about! The massive State programme of building is now currently underway, public and private people working together to deliver homes. We have to provide homes for everyone.

'When we talk about building homes, we are talking about building places in communities as well - build or rebuild places that have been damaged in the last number of years," Minister Murphy continued.

Speaking to South Tipp Today, Minister Murphy said Fine Gael have picked "two of the best people" - Garret Ahearn and Mary Newman Julian-torun in the next General Election in Tipperary. He said that the Government putting taxpayers money into the new Clonmel homes is "really important",

"One of the big things that we did as a Government was Project Ireland 2040 which is a whole new vision for this country that will see 75% of all future growth over the next 20 years outside of Dublin, 50% of all future growth outside of our cities and that means we need to refocus on places like Clonmel to see how we can make Clonmel work for the people who want to live and work here and have the quality of life that they should have because we are a very successful country in many ways.

'We have recovered from the crash very quickly but there are a lot of social issues that we have to cover - houses is one and education is another key one. Education has been a hallmark of our success for decades and we have to continue to have that focus up and down the country and Clonmel," Murphy added.

Prior to the turning of the sod, Minister Murphy was given a tour of Kickham Barracks in Clonmel by Tipgeneral election candidate Mary Newman Julian. "The plans are in place for Kickham Barracks and the objective Minister Murphy's visit was to get more support behind the plan and to act as a catalyst to get the Garda station built, which will in turn be the catalyst for the further redevelopment of the entire site. It is being held up because there are so many parties involved, but Minister Murphy has committed to bringing the matter to the relevant people in Dublin. The site has huge potential and its development will transform the town of Clonmel and be fantastic but we need to get it moving, Mary Newman Julian added.

Tipperary property prices rise €13,000 in the past year

Property prices in Tipperary have risen by €13.000 in the last year, according to the latest MyHome.ie Property Report in association with

The report for Q3 2018 shows that the median asking price for a property in the county now stands at €165,000. This is up 3% from the previous quarter and a rise of €13,000 or 8% from this time last year.

This means that the asking price for a home in Tipperary is now at its highest level since it stood at €165,000 five years ago in Q1 2013.

The rise in prices was reflected in the asking price for a three-bed semi-detached house in the county, which rose by 4% in the last quarter from €138,000 to €145,000. Annually this is also up 3% on 12 months ago when prices stood at €135,000.

Prices reached their highest level in Q2 in 2008 when they stood at €230,000.

The asking price for a fourbed semi-detached house in Tipperary rose by 1% in the last quarter to €177,000. Annual prices were up 12% on this time last year when they stood at €157,000.

The average time to go sale agreed on a property in the county now stands at four months.

NATIONAL PICTURE

Asking prices fell by 2.5% in Dublin in the third quarter and by a more modest 0.8% nationally. The annual rate of inflation for newly listed properties nationally is now 5.9% while it's just 2.2% in Dublin, the slowest pace of increase in two years.

This means the median asking price for new sales nationally is €268,000, down €2,000 from the last quarter, while the price in Dublin is €375,000, down €9,000. Newly listed properties are seen as the most reliable indicator of future price movements.

The report highlighted a pick-up in homebuilding activity. In the 12 months to 2018 completions equalled 16,300, already well ahead of the 14,446 recorded

In total planning permissions for 26,750 units have been granted in the 12 months to June.

Suffering of children captured in thought-provoking image

Artist Anthony Lawless has created another thought-provoking image on the Clonmel streetscape that encourages people to stop and consider the plight of children suffering all over the world

His striking image on the gable end of Gleesons in Irishtown of a distressed child, with the hand of a parent reaching out to console, is entitled 'If I should fall behind', taken from a Bruce Springsteen lyric.

While the inspiration for the work came from within the Clonmel community, it has resonance on a much wider stage for Anthony.

He was moved by the campaign launched in the Clonmel community to support 23-year-old Emma Lacey, who is enduring a sixyear battle with progressive spinal diseases and who underwent brain surgery in August.

"Clonmel people are absolutely fantastic. Life can be harrowing and Emma's situation has really struck a chord

"This is the second time in a year that they have responded in such an incredible fashion to help out young people in the community and their families who are suffering," he said.

Anthony wanted to capture the spirit of the campaign to support Emma Lacey and also to send out a message to people to remember that there are children suffering all over the world.

He hopes the sight of the image on Gleesons will encourage people to consider what is happening to children all over the world, including the tragedy of thousands of child refugees all over Europe without a home and in a growing number of cases without a parent to help them.

Anthony is passionate about the need to rally to help children suffering in Ireland and all over the world, and he has been a consistent advocate for children in direct provision, homeless children and child refugees.

He has visited Calais on a number of occasions and what struck him was the huge number of unaccompanied minors who were desperate for help and support.

"There are kids as young as 11 and 12 with no parents roaming all over Europe.

They have fled the Taliban, the Syrian regime and other horrific situations. I was there in Calais in 2016 and there was between three and four hundred unaccompanied minors there trying to

fend for themselves.

"If there were three or four hundred horses left in a field there would be a massive outcry in the world," said Anthony, whose daughter Amy is working on the ground at the moment in Calais.

His dramatic image on Gleesons wall of the distressed child replaced the painting of the man with a crumbling world in his hands, which was designed to create awareness about global warming.

The new work was finished on the morning of the Clonmel Band Aid event held in Gleesons to support Emma

"I used the Springsteen lyric because nobody should be left behind. People are supporting Emma in a very powerful way, just as they did Evan Hickey and his family before that.

"People in the community are lifted by the response to Emma's plight. Clonmel people do care and they are very kind-hearted," said Anthony.

He is kindly donating the proceeds from a limited print edition of 50 of the images on Gleesons to The Emma Lacey Trust. The 'If I Should Fall Behind' print is available for €50 from Anthony, who can be contacted on 086-3021297.

Coveney talks Brexit at Tipperary event

Tanaiste Simon Coveney outlined to over 200 Tipperary business people on how he envisaged Brexit impacting on Clonmel and Tipperary last week.

He was speaking in Hotel Minella at a meeting organised by Fine Gael election candidate Garret Ahearn and local councillor Michael Murphy.

Tánaiste Coveney attempted to play down concerns of the political parties in Northern Ireland, contrasting the relationship between the DUP and the UK with the Irish government's position that no one political party can hold a veto on proposals for Northern Ireland in regards to Brexit discussions.

"There's a lot of tough talk that the UK can cope with a no deal, and that's really bad news for both Ireland and the UK," offered Coveney.

"We don't have a confidence and supply agreement with any one party in Northern Ireland. We listen to all of them, including the DUP and the UUP and the Alliance, and the SDLP and Sinn Féin".

Tánaiste Coveney continued to provide assurances that his government will not sign anything that does not guarantee British commitment to Northern Ireland. "There will be no withdrawal agreement if there is not a legal backstop," he said.

"The Taoiseach and I will never sign a treaty that doesn't ensure that the commitments that have been given to Ireland by the British government are not followed through on the Irish border."

The meeting heard from Clodagh Cavanagh, CEO of Abbey Machinery, one of Ireland's most successful machinery manufacturing businesses, who spoke about what difficulties and challenges the company face with such uncertainty in the UK regarding Brexit.

Jonathan McMillan, who heads the Brexit Unit at Enterprise Ireland spoke on the supports available from their local enterprise offices.



He also spoke about dedicated measures announced in Budget 2018. Over €450m has been allocated in business supports, including a €300m Brexit Loan Scheme for Business and €25m allocated for the agri-food sector.

Sean Kelly MEP spoke about the long term effect Britain leaving has on Europe.

Clir Michael Murphy, who is also head of the Irish Delegation on the EU Committee of the Regions, said it was great to see such a large attendance, a sign of the deep concern in the county around the challenges that Brexit presents for the region.

"We are now at a crucial stage in the negotiations and the key objective of this week's meeting was to create an awareness around the challenges and opportunities as well information on the supports available at local and national level through Enterprise Ireland.

"I'm very grateful to our speakers, in particular Minister Coveney, who updated those present on the negotiations, and most importantly those that turned up and engaged in such a positive way.

"I certainly think that we achieved our objective on the night."

Garret Ahearn thanked the Tánaiste for coming to Clonmel. "These negotiations were always going to be very challenging and the events of last week simply confirm

"Every business in Tipperary will be affected in some way after the 29th March 2019.

"I want to thank Clodagh, Jonathan, Sean and the Tánaiste for their contributions," Ahean added.

Cashel nurses to step up industrial action due to understaffing

Nurses in the Rehabilitation Unit in St Patrick's Hospital, Cashel, have stepped up their industrial action in protest against chronic understaffing.

From 8am Monday, Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation (INMO) members are engaging in a "work to rule" protest, meaning they will focus solely on patient care, and refuse to perform twelve tasks, including performing clerical duties, attending staff meetings, answering phones, attending non-mandatory training and admitting patients in the morning without safe staffing levels.

This follows a previous, more limited work to rule

protest on September 11 where nurses refused to do four tasks.

The protest was suspended to allow for talks with the HSE and management at the Workplace Relations Commission. The talks did not lead to agreement to fix the understaffing problem.

"We just want to care for our patients in the way we were trained to do. There are simply too few staff to do that and patients are suffering as a result," said INMO Industrial Relations officer Liz Curran.

"The Cashel nurses have been enormously patient but are totally frustrated. They have made very modest requests on behalf of patients and the HSE have not made sufficient progress." Thursday, October 4, 2018 www.southtipptoday.ie

Grant aid secured for Carrick-on-Suir Bog Field

A Carrick-on-Suir community group has received government funding to further develop the Bog Field in Carrickbeg into an amenity for the town.

Carrick-on-Suir and District Lions Club said it was delighted to be approved the

grant aid from Tipperary County Council and the Waters and Communities Office for another phase of improvements to the Bog Field.

The club said the project includes the spraying and eradication of Japanese Knotweed and other invasive species growing along the riverbank and the erection of additional seating and information panels.

Great success for Pulmonary Rehabilitation team at South Tipperary General Hospital

The Pulmonary Rehabilitation team at South Tipperary General Hospital (STGH) recently recorded great success at the 2018 Irish **Healthcare Awards for its** innovative and quality pro-

The team is co-ordinated by senior physiotherapist Angela Radley O'Donovan, with their Pulmonary Rehabilitation project shortlisted in three categories at the awards, including Rehabilitation Clinic of the Year, General Healthcare Centre of the Year and Patient Education and Lifestyle Project.

The team also reached the finals for the 2017 HSE Excellence Awards, which recognises projects and services that have made a real and and social services.

Pulmonary Rehabilitation was launched in STGH back in October 2001. At the time, STGH was the first hospital outside of Dublin to launch this patient programme.

The multi-disciplinary outpatient programme consists of groups of 12 clients of mixed gender who attend twice weekly over an eightweek time scale. The team members include a physiotherapist, respiratory nurse specialist, speech and language therapist, dietician, pharmacist and a patient who has already completed the programme.

Rehabilita-Pulmonary tion is an evidence-based, multidisciplinary and com-

lasting impression on health patients with chronic respiratory diseases. It is aimed at patients who suffer from COPD (Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease) and who have shortness of breath, limiting their daily quality of life and repeated chest infec-

Over 500 patients have completed Pulmonary Rehabilitation since it was established and continue to benefit from self-management and support. The main aims of Pulmonary Rehabilitation include improvement in functional exercise capacity, reduction in breathlessness, to improve peripheral muscle strength and endurance, improvement in health related quality of life, improved knowledge of lung condition and self-manageprehensive intervention for ment, promotion of longterm commitment to exercise, and a reduction in the need for patients to be treated in hospital.

"I would like to thank the Pulmonary Rehabilitation team here at STGH for their continued work and commitment to this programme. It is great to receive national recognition for our work and we will strive to continue and enhance the programme for our patients. I would also like to thank the management at STGH - since the programme was establishment in 2001 they have worked to ensure that the Pulmonary Rehabilitation programme can continue to improve and serve patients," Angela Radley O'Donovan said.

The Sparrowhawk

Wildlife Matters

Albert Nolan

was walking around the track that borders my local football pitch.

I was in good company, as the grass had been recently cut, and a large flock of pied wagtails, had gathered to feed. With their hectic summer over, this normally territorial bird, was in a more relaxed mode.

As I turned the corner for the last time, a large bird peeled off from the hedgerow, flew above my head, and just missed a pied wagtail by fractions of inch. The sparrowhawk did a quick turn, and glided across the pitch, and into a tall line of conifer tree. I waited for a few minutes, and the wagtails started to nervously return, and I am sure that the patient sparrowhawk will try again

Sparrowhawks are superbly adapted to aerial ambush. Ted Hughes poem "Roosting Hawk "vividly describes the sparrowhawk.

"It took the whole of creation to create my foot,

My each feather,

Now I hold creation in my

They have broad wings, with blunt tips, and a long tail for rapid flight. Their body shape is ideal for flying in woodlands, and for twisting turning around branches. Both male and females have barred plumage that helps camouflage the bird, and conceal its approach as it flies along hedgerows. Long legs with sharp talons firmly catch, and despatch and prey.

But hunting can be frustrating, and only one in ten hunts are successful, and that is for an experienced adult. No wonder only a third of any year's sparrowhawk survive their first winter. While some adult training is provided, nothing compares to practical experience. Also if you fail, mum and dad are not around to provide dinner.

Nothing is more thrilling that seeing a bird of prey in action, and having this top predator in your community, is a sign that the natural environment is healthy. Sparrowhawks numbers depend on the availability of good populations of small birds. They have even be seen taken an occasional bat, but these normally nocturnal creatures, must have wondered out due to disturbance or sickness.

During the 1960 DTT the new wonder insecticide, almost wiped out the sparrowhawk. It caused the shells of the egg to thin. When the female set on the eggs they broke. No noticeable increase in small bird populations was noted, during sparrowhawks absence. When DTT was eventually banned and sparrowhawks increased, small bird's numbers did not fall.

The changing agricultural landscape with the destruction of hedgerows, wetlands and meadows, had a massive impact on song birds, and the

venient scapegoat. Cats both domestic and wild, also kill millions of small birds each

Females are around 25% larger than males, and this means that there is no direct competition for food. The female can hunt larger prey, and occasional even the

Sparrowhawks nest in woodland, and will also use mature urban gardens. Chicks are timed to hatch during May and July, and this is the peak of the song bird's chicks. For the first few weeks the male is constantly hunting to feed his growing family. The female stays with the chicks, till they are big enough to be left on their own, and then her to partake in the hunt. Males do well if they survive till their eight birthday, while females may live to see their eleventh.

Sparrowhawks some-times make unannounced visits to my birdfeeders and carry of an unwary, sick or old bird. Sparrowhawks have been used in falconry (using birds of prey for hunting) for hundreds of years and were considered birds that were fit for a

What's the difference between Mutual Wills and Mirror Wills?

WHAT IS A MIRROR WILL?

Many spouses and partners make Mirror Wills, appointing the same executors, having the same beneficiaries and dividing their estate in the same way.
They are in effect mirror

reflections of each other. Whilst the parties to these wills may agree to make Mirror Wills there is nothing to stop them making a different Will at a later stage, thereby revoking their earlier Will.

WHAT IS A MUTUAL WILL?

A mutual Will is defined as joint or separate Wills made as a result of an agreement between the parties to create irrevocable interests in favour of certain benefi-

While the contents of a mutual Will can look like a regular Will, it has one fundamental difference which is that it can be revoked by unilateral breach, provided such revocation occurs before the death of either party, and is made on notice to the other party to the mutual Will.

It is the death of the first to die, without having revoked

agreement, renders the Will of the survivor irrevocable in equity.

THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN **MIRROR AND MUTUAL**

Mirror and Mutual Wills are often confused with each other. This is because the provisions in both types of Wills will "mirror" each other.

There are some key differences between the two types of Wills. Firstly, a Mutual Will is a binding contractual agreement, whereas a Mirror Will can be revoked and changed at a later date.

It is not possible to revoke or vary a Mutual Will without the consent of the other party and can only be rescinded by either party giving notice during their joint lifetime.

To enforce a Mutual Will there must be clear evidence of an agreement to create the Mutual Wills and also an intention that they are to be irrevocable.

This means that if one party dies, the surviving party cannot change their

Will. Changing a Mutual Will after the death of one party would be a breach of contract and may result in committing a fraud.

Changing a Mutual Will is done through an application to the Court to revoke the Mutual Will but the Court will impose a Mutual Wills Trust ("the Trust") over the assets in the Will to prevent any loss to the intended beneficiaries under the Mutual Will.

A similar mechanism exists when a survivor remarries. Here the statute automatically revokes the Mutual Will but preserves the assets in the Mutual Will by creating a Trust that will override any new Will.

There are no specifics as to how the Mutual Wills Trust operates and this does create the potential for litigation. To avoid unnecessary delay or expense it is always best to instruct a specialist who can assess the particular facts and provide advice and guidance.

"Toxic" illegal dumping leaves Clogheen outraged

The dumping of cut tyres and other rubbish in Clogheen has left the village outraged.

Clogheen Tidy Towns chairperson PJ English described the illegal dumping in the area popular with walkers and runners as "toxic".

He told South Tipp Today: "Clogheen is well known all over the country and to have people dumping out here is disgraceful. The dumping around here is at epidemic levels now. We are a tourist area and people come from all over the country and further a field to walk and meet the nice people of Clogheen and

it's not fair on them. It's absolutely toxic."

Cllr Martin Lonergan said the ongoing dumping of rubbish is a "major issue" for many communities across Tipperary.

"In my own area and in particular along the Knockmealdown Mountains, we have witnessed and experienced both domestic and indeed industrial dumping varying from bags of domestic rubbish to electrical and appliances, tyres building rubble and materials, sometimes indiscriminately dumped in many of our most scenic areas.

"In some instances, the dumping was perpetrated by so called un-regulated collectors, unknown to those who had engaged them to dispose of the rubbish or materials in the proper manor," Cllr Lonergan said.

Cllr Lonergan said Tipperary County Council's Environment section needs more resources on the ground such as patrol officers and environmental officers. He called for offenders to be named and shamed publicly if convicted.

'Unfortunately, people have learned to remove any details such as bill heads or information that could connect them to the alleged dumping. The only main option available, I feel, is the broader roll out of further CCTV monitoring where ongoing littering and dumping black spots appear to be. Following on from this - should a conviction be imposed on an offender - they need to be named and shamed publicly in the local press and indeed on the council's website and whatever forum that may be beneficial to deter them and prospective offenders from carrying out illegal dumping. To date, we haven't seen this to occur," he continued.

"In terms of domestic dumping, I feel we need to look at those who may be struggling with various bills, mortgages, may have been made unemployed and simply cannot afford to pay the rates to the various refuse collectors. The county has many Civic Amenity Sites managed by the Local Authority and indeed many are privately managed and can take almost all rubbish. It needs to be gotten out there

that these are available to take rubbish and are an extremely cost effective way of disposing of rubbish. We also should look at the possibility of introducing a community skip in certain areas, paid for by the Local Authority, which could be delivered periodically to estates, villages and towns," Cllr Lonergan added.

Fines for littering

Leaving or throwing litter in a public place is an offence that can be subject to an onthe-spot fine of €150 or a maximum fine of €4,000 if you are convicted of a litter offence in the District Court. Where an offence continues after conviction, the person concerned is guilty of a further offence and liable to a fine not

exceeding €600 for each day during which the contravention continues.

The Protection of the Environment Act 2003 introconviction duced indictment and carries a maximum fine not exceeding €130,000 and a fine not exceeding €10,000 per day for continuing offences.

You can be issued with an on-the-spot fine by a litter warden appointed by the Local Authority or by a member of the Gardai. If you are convicted of a litter offence, you may also be required by the court to pay the Local Authority's costs and expenses investigating the offence and incurred in bringing the prosecution.

businesses if there was a problem with their drinking water supply that was likely to cause an immediate risk to health. Irish Water will continue to do that.

However, the recent Water Services Policy Statement 2018-2025 called for better fected, the Clonmel and Poulavanogue Public Water transparency for people Supply, is still safe to drink. using public water supplies. This direct communication is an important part of helping the public to understand what Irish Water does.

country on 53 different water supply schemes will receive a detailed booklet outlining the issues with their water supply which might vary from elevated THMs, inadequate barriers for cryptosporidium, poor turbidity removal, presence of low levels of pesticides or details of an Environ-mental Protection Agency (EPA) audit of a plant.

 $The individual \, booklet \, will \,$ explain in detail to householders where their drinking water comes from, why Irish Water are writing to them, how Irish Water know that their water is safe to drink, information about regulation and testing, what Irish Water is doing to fix their specific water supply, and where they can get more information.

Clonmel Poulavanogue Public Water Supply is affected by potential issues in relation to cryptosporidium. To address this, Irish Water is upgrading the Poulavanouge Water Treatment Plant. Works are expected to be completed by the end of 2020.

Speaking about the public information campaign, Irish

Water's Duane O'Brien said: "Irish Water has worked closely with the EPA to identify the public water schemes that need a plan or action to improve their water treatment. We are prioritising our investment in these treatment plants. Providing safe, clean drinking water for all in County Tipperary is our first goal.

Everyone we are writing to in County Tipperary has access to drinking water that is safe to drink. We monitor and test our supplies on a continuous basis and if this monitoring indicates a potential water quality issue we consult with the HSE. If there is any potential risk to public health from the drinking water supply we inform the public immediately. If anyone has any questions or concerns they should contact Irish Water."

Dorothea Herbert (1770 -1829) wrote a Jane Austenstyle memoir known as "Retrospections" that inspired huge interest on its rediscovery several years ago. As well as providing us with a vivid picture of life in South Tipperary in the late 18th and early 19th centuries,

Dorothea does not spare us any of the pain that arose from her unrequited love affair with John Roe who lived in what is now Rockwell College. She first met John Roe through her father's work as a Church of Ireland clergyman who was based at the Parsonage in Knockgraffon (this 3-story building still stands today in the village of New Inn). John Roe's rejection of her romantic interest caused her huge personal upset and seems to have been a turning point in her life.

However, aside from being skilful social diarist, Dorothea was a woman of considerable artistic talent. Cahir Social and Historical Society's first lecture of the 2018/19 season will be by Dr. Frances Finnegan who will talk on "The Poetry and Private World of Dorothea Herbert" at 8pm on this Thursday 4th October, in the Great Hall of Cahir Castle.



Cllr Andy Moloney signed 5 Cahir Estates into charge of the council at last week's meeting of Clonmel Muni-

cipal District meeting.

Moloney, who had been knocking on doors over the last number of years to have estates Taken in Charge, said it was a huge step for Cahir and thanked everyone involved in bringing this application to fruition. As it stands, if an estate is not in charge of the Council and issues arise with sewerage, lighting or roads then Irish Water, Air-tricity or the council will not enter the estate.

When a developer finishes an estate they generally apply to have it taken in charge but in the event of the developers absence 51% of the owners could make an application. On this occasion The Oaks, Galtee View, Hillview Crescent, Comeragh Crescent and Lakeview were approved.

All of the remaining estates in Rosemount have live applications with the council and it is hoped that these will get over the line over the next 12 months.

Estates not in charge can be problematic when it comes to selling. However, while the taking in charge of an estate looks after the footpaths, roads as well as sewerage and water it does not cover grass cutting.

This is organised by Residents Committees but there are supports to help in this respect and such committees should log onto the Tipperary County Council site and register with the PPN.

"Sometimes I can't hang out with my friends because of training but it's worth it because not everyone can say they are going to the Olympics," Miriam, the daughter of Ray and Marion, smiled.

The fifth year Scoil Mhuire, Carrick-on-Suir, student spent the last week keeping loose and practising her hurdles and strides. She has the support of her family in Buenos Aires while the country cheers her on from back home.

"I'm pretty much ready to go! I'm looking forward to staying in the Olympic Athletes' Village - there will be four athletes in a room and it will be really nice getting to know them all. I am really going to enjoy the experience and take it all in.

"It's nice knowing that my family will be there to support me, even though I might not get to see them before the race. It's nice to know that afterwards if I need anything they will be there for me," she added

Miriam's coach, Paul O'Gorman, has been instrumental to her success. Paul said Miriam is a "special athlete", praising her parents for their support in helping her stride to youth athletics stardom.

"Miriam has the drive to be the best, never misses training and has a fantastic attitude. I have seen athletes nearly as talented as Miriam but they didn't have her commitment and work rate.

"Miriam is a special athlete and a lot of that is down to her parents. They are very good - everything she needs and everywhere she has to go to compete, there's never an

issue. You need that kind of backing from parents," Paul

Paul said the timing of the Youth Olympic Games will be challenging for Miriam. "Miriam is used to the big occasions now. Doing interviews after events and captaining Ireland have all helped with her development and she has taken the extra responsibility in her stride.

"The Irish athletes are taking on the best in the world and it's not going to be easy for them because other countries are only starting or are halfway through their

season, whereas we are finished our season. We've had a break, come back and topped it up," Paul continued.

Paul said the opportunities to travel and compete at the highest level in athletics are "unreal", but admitted it can be difficult to keep some promising athletes when they hit their teenage years.

"We've had athletes compete in Hungary, Italy, Germany, Belgium and across the world, but we have lost some of the boys in particular to soccer and hurling when they turned 13 or 14. They all find their own sport eventually and athletics training will stand to them no matter what sport they choose. The

grounding they get from athletics training from 10 to 14 years of age - bounding, coordination and balance - is unreal. They are not getting that from the other sports.

"Miriam was just like all the other kids when she first came to the club and wasn't outstanding by any means. She tried all the events, found her event, stuck with it and has progressed gradually every year since under 13. We have increased her training, structured to get the best out ofher, and it's a great sign that she keeps getting better.

"I am very proud of Miriam and the experience at the Youth Olympic Games will be brilliant for her," Paul added.


