Twenty locals will plunge from new heights to raise money for South Tipperary Hospice Movement.

Clonmel's Áine Ryan, Brigid Ryan, Clonmel High School principal Karen Steenson, Kilcash's Richard Murphy,

Ken Horne, Mayor of Clonmel Garret Ahearn, Big Brother star Cian Carrigan, Muriel Cuddy, Phoenix Strength and Conditioning's Danny Connolly, Anthony Lawless, Cllr Máirín McGrath, Three Counties Archers founder Pat McNamara, 72-year-old Mary Cassin, Emmet Askins, Marie Hickey, Trisha

Cooney, Tipp FM presenter Owen Lonergan, Kathryn Stokes along with retired inter-county footballer Declan Browne and Rachel Browne will skydive for Hospice on July 13.

The community specialist palliative care service provides support for people in South Tipperary and West Waterford with an advanced

incurable disease. Clonmel Hospice Support Group member Áine Ryan, who is the brains behind Jump in July, says Hospice's financial cost to providing this service reaches €725,000 annually, with only €220,000 of that sum granted from the HSE.

Ahearn to promote physical and mental health

New mayor of Clonmel Garret Ahearn plans to promote physical and mental health during his term in office.

The first time Fine Gael councillor was elected unopposed as mayor in Clonmel Town Hall.

Also elected unopposed as deputy mayor was Workers and Unemployed Action Group councillor Pat English.

A pact between Fine Gael's two councillors, Ahearn and Michael Murphy, Fianna Fail's Siobhan Ambrose, Cllr English and Cllr Richie Molloy will share the mayoralty between them over the five years of the council.

A move by independent councillor Niall Dennehy to propose an amendment to the election of the mayor failed. He called on the council to elect a chairman, rather than a mayor, and forego the mayor's salary, but it was ruled out of order because it wasn't submitted in time.

He said the last time he

was a councillor, the former Clonmel Corporation had a budget of €17m.

"Now it's a subcommittee of the county council dealing with litter and school wardens. By electing a mayor of Clonmel we are continuing with this masquerade," he claimed.

Cllr Ahearn was nominated as mayor by party colleague and county council chairman, Michael Murphy, and seconded by Cllr Ambrose.

He said that as a first time councillor it was a privilege to become the first citizen but it was an honour he didn't expect.

"Politics is a difficult business, and it can be hugely complicated. I am aware that in the time to come, tempers may fray and disagreements may flare up, but we will work together for the betterment of this town.

"As mayor, I promise you I will adjudicate without fear or favour based on the respect for each councillor's democratic mandate".

Announcing his plan to

put an emphasis on health during his term, he said: "A mayor has opportunities to highlight and work on key topics of personal interest with hopefully positive outcomes.

"I intend to promote physical and mental wellbeing. A healthy community is essential to allow people live their lives to their full potential.

"I welcome the recent announcement of Jigsaw locating in County Tipperary. Jigsaw is the national centre for youth mental health and provide vital supports to young people by working closely within their communities.

"Last year Tipperary County Council launched an initiative in conjunction with Healthy Ireland called A Strategy for a Healthy Tipperary. This was carefully considered and was thus, categorised in areas such as positive ageing, healthy eating to employment and the workplace.

"Our community is no different to any other in terms of demographics. We have the

busy parents, we have single parents juggling two jobs, we have the isolated rural farmer, the struggling business owner, we have the successful entrepreneurs, children struggling through their leaving cert or junior cert, we have the grade A student and the retired couple.

"And for each of these people positive mental health and wellbeing is so important."

Other priorities during the year will include redevelopment of Kickham Barracks, the new sports hub, the Blueway and the Bulmers visitor centre in Dowds Lane.

Cllr Dennehy criticised the pact that will see the mayoralty shared between the five councillors over the five years of the council.

He said that during the 1990s, Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael had excluded Seamus Healy from the mayoralty. "The people of Clonmel were very unhappy with that and we should learn these lessons," he added.

Fitzgerald re-elected chair of expanded council

Poll topper Cllr Michael Fitzgerald (FG) was re-

elected as cathaoirleach to the newly expanded Tip-

perary Cashel Cahir municipal district on Tuesday, June 11, forty years to the day after he first assumed office as a Tipperary county councillor.

The popular Golden based councillor, who topped the local elections in Tipperary with 3,005 first preference votes, was elected with the backing of the four other FG councillors, Mary Hanna Hourigan, John Crosse, Declan Burgess, and Marie Murphy, while Fianna Fáil's Roger Kennedy and Michéal Anglim, and independent Andy Moloney, also backed his candidacy.

Cllr Fitzgerald was proposed by Cllr Murphy and seconded by Cllr Burgess.

Cllr Murphy said it "makes sense to have someone with experience in that position," and with over 3,000 votes, "the people have spoken."

Cllr Burgess said the new municipal district covers "a vast area" and that needs "vast experience."

Cllr Annemarie Ryan (non party/March4Tipp) nominated herself for the position of cathaoirleach, and was backed by Sinn Féin's Tony Black, whom Cllr Ryan proposed for Leas Cathaoirleach.

Cllr Ryan said she could be a "new beginning" and with

new eyes, "could bring a lot to the table." Independent Mairín McGrath abstained in voting for both positions.

Cllr Roger Kennedy (FF) was elected Leas cathaoirleach, having been proposed by Cllr Anglim and seconded by Cllr Hourigan. Cllr Kennedy was elected by the same councillors who voted for Cllr Fitzgerald.

Now incorporating the Cahir local electoral area, this local authority has eleven councillors, up from seven previously, and represents 27.5% of Tipperary Co Council.

Cllr John Crosse raised concerns that the new administration's engineering staff were under-resourced.

He said it was "unfair" to ask senior engineer Paddy Crowley, who recently replaced Aidan Finn, to "come in and take up Cahir and Cashel and Tipp. I'd have con-

cerns that it's not adequately resourced."

Cllr Fitzgerald welcomed all the new councillors, and paid tribute to outgoing district administrator Marie McGivern, who is now replaced by Anthony Coleman.

The last few years have been a "challenging and sometimes difficult time, but I think the outgoing Council faced up to these challenges and we carried out our duties in a way that was always meant to improve and recognise the issues that affect the lives of the people we represent, on a daily basis.

"Over the next five years, we will see many improvements, that we as a team will work to bring about. The towns of Cahir, Cashel and Tipperary are the lifeblood of our municipal district, but it's villages and the rural communities that are the heart-beat," said Cllr Fitzgerald.

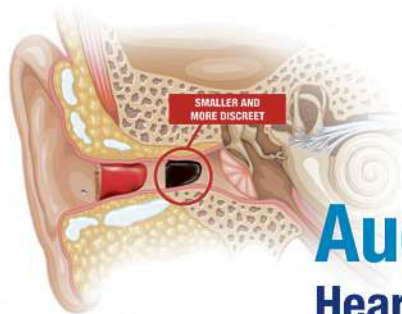

Tom Wood, who has retired from politics, says he understood that in Martin Mansergh's time as Minister of State with responsibility for the OPW, "there was an agreement in principle that the convent lands would be ideal for a visitor/ interpretive centre for the Rock." Mr Wood added: "The

focus then moved to putting a new building on the Rock so it never progressed. I have requested the new Cahir/Cashel/Tipperary municipal authority to put this on their agenda as soon as possible."

May's meeting of the municipal district heard detailed discussions of new plans for the Rock from Frank

Shalvey, principal officer with the OPW.

Following Mr Shalvey's presentation to the Cashel/Tipperary municipal district meeting, Mr Wood says he has raised the matter again with the relevant parties, County Council, Failte Ireland and other agencies. "With Failte Ireland's announcement re-

cently of significant funding for such projects and the fact that the funding is open to public bodies, I hope some progress can be made on the matter and that all relevant parties will get together to facilitate such a development on this appropriate site and at this opportune time," added Mr Wood.

Closure of Tipp town bakery

Brudair's Bakery in Tipperary town is closing its doors.

This well-established business opened 25 years ago next to Kiely's on the Main Street before moving to Kickham Plaza and its current location at Bank Place.

"I remember cleaning the shop on that St. Patrick's Day in preparation for the shop's opening," said proprietor Frank Brudair.

"We've had a good run of it in Tipperary town and it has been an extremely difficult decision for us to close the doors."

The closure of Brudair's Bakery creates the loss of five

jobs - four full-time and one part-time Saturday job.

The news has caused dismay and sadness amongst its loyal customers and citizens of Tipperary who yet again see another shop closing on the Main Street.

Legends hurling fundraiser for Alzheimer Society

Tipperary dementia advocate Kathy Ryan, who was diagnosed with Younger Onset Alzheimer's in January 2014, is calling on the public to rally behind a Tipperary v Limerick legends hurling match in aid of The Alzheimer Society of Ireland.

The fundraising drive was launched at a packed Semple Stadium on Sunday. It will see legends from the Munster titans face-off to raise vital funds and much-needed public awareness of dementia, will be held during World Alzheimer's Month 2019 on Saturday, September 7, at Nenagh Éire Óg grounds at 5pm.

Tickets for the event, which has the backing of both Tipperary and Limerick County Boards, can be purchased via Eventbrite at €15 for adults and kids are free, with all the money raised going towards providing community services and advocacy supports in the Mun-

ster area and beyond.

Mother of two Kathy was diagnosed at the age of 53. The Cashel woman got involved in advocacy work because she wants to break down the stigma of dementia. Last September, she completed part of the Camino to raise funds for the Alzheimer Society of Ireland.

This fundraising initiative was the brainchild of Kathy and Limerick's Kevin Quaid, who was diagnosed with Lewy Body Dementia in 2017. They came up with the idea over a cup of tea when they were discussing ways to give something back to the Alzheimer Society of Ireland after everything the charity has done for them. The inaugural Kevin Quaid and Kathy Ryan Legends Cup was created, which will bring Tipperary and Limerick hurling legends of yester years together to battle it out for the prize come September. Hurling legends such as Joe Quaid and Ciaran Carey have signed up already.

"The vast majority of

people diagnosed with dementia want to live in their own home and stay active and involved in their own community," Kathy, who is vice-chair of the Irish Dementia Working Group, tells South Tipp Today.

"In order for this to happen, we need our communities to become more dementia aware to understand some of our needs.

"This hurling legends match is a perfect way to bring dementia into the heart of the community. When a community is dementia aware, it makes the difference between us living as well as possible or staying at home behind closed doors, which has a hugely negative impact on our health and wellbeing. The funds raised from this match will help people with dementia in the community.

"I am so grateful to the Limerick and Tipperary county boards in particular for getting behind this game and all the warm wishes from both counties and beyond that we have received so far. I

really hope the public will get behind us and support the legends match. I am really looking forward to it. Come on Tipperary," Kathy smiles.

In total there are an estimated 13,746 people living with dementia in Munster. There are 2,013 people living with

dementia in Limerick, 848 people living with dementia in north Tipperary and 1,054 people living with dementia in south Tipperary.

It is estimated that there are 55,000 people living with dementia in Ireland and for every one person with de-

mentia three others are directly affected. The number of people with dementia is expected to more than double over the next 20 years to 113,000 in 2039. There are an estimated 50,000 carers of people with dementia in Ireland.

'Serious issue with suicide and there's little help'

A series of recent suicides in South Tipperary has prompted a Clonmel priest to hit out at the lack of mental health services in the area.

Fr. Michael Toomey, a curate in Ss Peter and Paul's parish, described the

closure of St. Michael's psychiatric unit seven years ago as "a travesty", and called for its reopening.

"Parents are coming to me crying because their children need psychiatric help, but there's a waiting list of between two to three years and it's just crazy", he said.

"We have a serious issue in this area and there's very little help out there," said Fr. Toomey, who has contacted Jim Daly, the Minister of State with Responsibility for the Mental Health Service, about the situation.

Fr. Toomey acknowledged that people with mental health issues could attend the

ED (A and E) department of South Tipperary General Hospital in Clonmel for assessment, but said no long-term services or resources were available.

He appealed to people with suicidal thoughts or mental health difficulties to contact organisations that could help them.

These include The Samaritans (tel. 116-123); Pieta House (tel. 1800 247 247); Childline (1800 66 66 66) and Teenline (1800 833 634).

"There are other local organisations that can also help, including C-SAW, Suir River Rescue and Taxi Watch," said Fr. Toomey.

"Even your best friend could be your best support if people reach out and talk to them," he said.

Following the recent funeral of a young person who died by suicide, he said he had been contacted by three people and had referred them to different services.

Cahir's Bruce the goose victim of hit and run

The knocking down and killing of one of Cahir Castle's geese by a car has greatly upset the flock's many fans in the town. The five-year-old goose called

Bruce was struck by a grey car in Cahir Castle Car Park around 9.10pm on Friday, May 31.

The car drove off without stopping, according to eyewitnesses, who reported the

incident to the gardai.

Independent Cllr Andy Moloney, who helps to feed the flock of geese, was also contacted and arrived at the car park just minutes later and took away Bruce's remains.

He said he hoped it was an accident and "one off" incident. "The goose was named Bruce by a local girl who had taken him under her wing to pardon the pun," he explained. "This never happened before. People are

so protective of the geese. Even the security staff on the doors of local pubs look out for them."

A flock of ducks and farmyard geese were introduced to Cahir Castle grounds about five years ago as part of a wild-

life enhancement plan spearheaded by Cahir Tidy Towns, Cahir angling and gun clubs.

Cllr Moloney said the original flock of 31 geese has now grown to 46 and they are hugely popular with tourists and locals.

Bishop launches pastoral plan for the diocese

The Bishop of Waterford and Lismore Alphonsus Cullinan has launched the pastoral plan for the diocese Go Make Disciples (2019 - 2024).

The plan sets out a programme of development and renewal in the diocese over the next five years.

According to Bishop Cull-

inan, it is "an expression of faith in the power of the Holy Spirit who makes all things new and of our hope that under the guidance of the Spirit our parishes will be alive and hearts set on fire".

The plan has emerged from a process of dialogue and consultation, initiated by the diocesan pastoral council, and conducted in a number of venues

throughout the diocese during 2018.

Bishop Cullinan says that peoples' hopes and dreams for their local church were recorded at the listening sessions. "Parishioners are emphatic that change is needed. It will not do to continue as before if we are to address the many challenges that face the church in her mission today," he says.

"People identified the absence of youth in our churches, the ageing and dwindling congregations, the serious decline in vocations to the priesthood and religious life, and, of course, the enormous challenge posed by the rapid process of secularisation in our society. It is clear that these are issues that need to be urgently addressed in a new pastoral

plan.

"People are proud of their Catholic faith and believe that we have good news to share, but we must read the signs of the times, listen to what the Spirit of God is saying to us, and then plan how we are going to share that good news now and in the future."

Bishop Cullinan identified four themes or core strategic directions to realise this

vision.

These are: 1. Becoming an evangelising Church 2. Creating communities of faith characterised by hospitality, belonging and acceptance 3. Enhancing the quality of our liturgical celebrations and providing opportunities for spiritual growth 4. Remodelling leadership and governance structures to serve the mission of evangelising

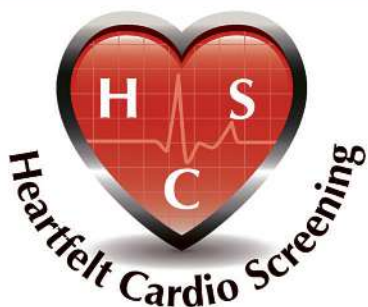

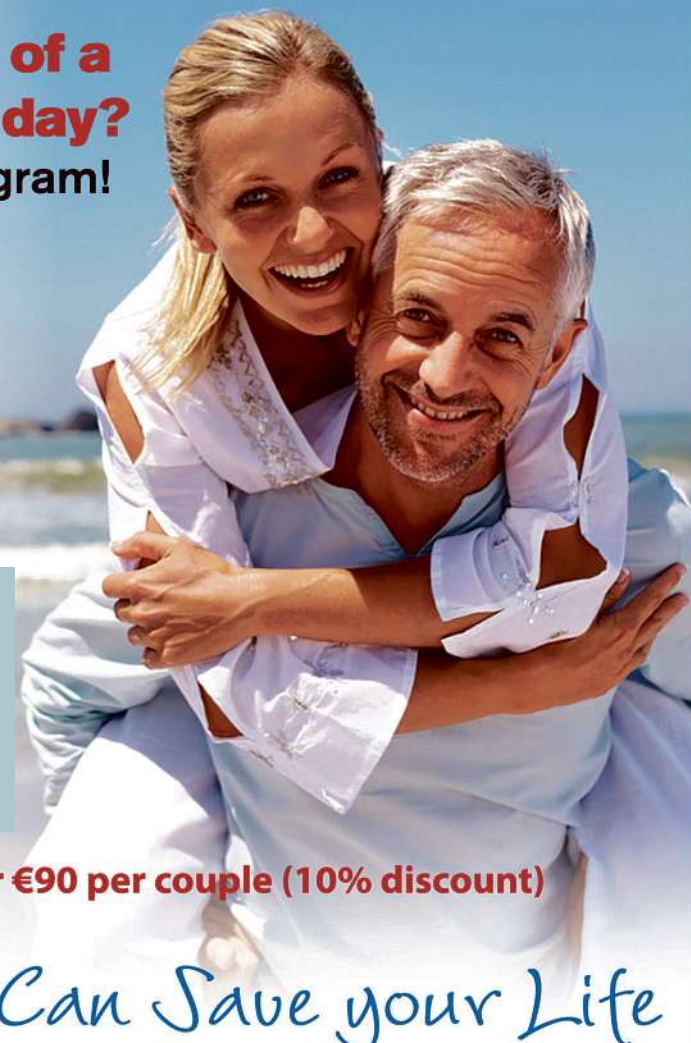

Fethard celebrates bicentenary of Holy Trinity Church in style

The community of Holy Trinity R.C. Parish Church Fethard came together in a joyful celebration of its bicentenary this month.

Archbishop Kieran O'Reilly was present to concelebrate mass to honour the 200th Anniversary. Fr. Liam Everard P.P., Fr. Tom Breen, A.P., Fr. Iggy O'Donovan, OSA, Prior, Augustinian Abbey and Fr. Eugene Everard, P.P. Tipperary Town, were also present on the altar. This Mass was the culmination of various events arranged throughout the year to celebrate the foundation of the church which opened on Holy Trinity Sunday 1819.

Fr. Liam Everard, P.P. welcomed everyone, giving thanks for the gift of faith passed on faithfully over the past two hundred years and expressing the hope that the same faith will continue to nourish and support the church community in the future.

In a ceremony rich with symbolism, the Mass began with the bringing to the altar of gifts representing various aspects of the church's history. Mrs Rosemary Ponsonby and her son Julian brought the keys of the church recollecting the donation of the church site by their ancestor William Barton, the Protestant landlord of the time, who also donated 100 guineas towards building costs. Secondary school pupils Ciarán and Cathal, accompanied by former teacher Mr. Dinny Burke, brought up the

ceramic replicas of Fethard's three medieval wooden statues that they had made during the year. Mrs Mary Carroll brought up the Baptismal register commemorating all those baptised in the church as well as the generosity of the Carroll family who donated the church organ in 1886. Local wood sculptor, David Gorey, brought up the beautifully carved wooden plaque he made, surmounted with the symbol of the Holy Trinity and oak leaves representing Fiodh Árd. The plaque records the names of all the parish priests who served in Fethard in the last two hundred years. Mr. John Stokes brought up a chalice engraved with the name of Fr. Daniel Ryan dated 1893, remembering also early benefactors of the church, Mrs Ellen Coyne who donated the High Altar in memory of her brother Dr. John Stokes in 1883 and Patrick Coffey, Main Street who donated the side altars. Finally, Mrs Margaret Slattery presented the Commemorative Booklet published by the parish committee to celebrate the Bicentenary of Holy Trinity Parish Church.

On this Pentecost Sunday, the Archbishop's address spoke of the need for all to invoke the Holy Spirit in speaking the language of the heart comprising forgiveness, love and understanding. Gathering to celebrate two hundred years of Holy Trinity Church in Fethard he said that while he church of the future may indeed be very different from

that of two hundred years ago, the key to how we rise to the challenges inherent in finding new ways of being church is in trying to use that language of the heart in our daily lives.

Four first Holy Communion children from Holy Trinity N.S. Fethard and Killusty N.S. brought up the gifts of bread and wine at the Offertory.

The choir, under the baton of Ms Ann Barry, comprised the combined forces of the Parish Choir, Fethard Choral group, Abbey Choir and the Killusty Choir. They rose to the occasion with a wonderful performance of a wide and varied selection of church music finishing with the rousing recessional 'Walk in the Light'.

In conclusion, Fr. Liam Everard thanked all those who had contributed to the celebration. He mentioned especially Goldie Newport who has served so faithfully for so many years as the organist in the Parish Church, continuing a long-established family tradition. He also invited the congregation to the Fethard Ballroom for refreshments after the ceremony.

Copies of the Commemorative Bicentenary booklet were distributed free as people left the church. Further copies are available from members of the Parish Committee. The Bicentenary Mass was streamed live on the internet worldwide and is now available to view in the Recordings section at www.parishchurch.net.

WILD ABOUT SOUTH TIPP

Sowing seeds of nature

The clouds were threatening rain and for once I was glad that I was going to be indoors. I was visiting the pre-school in Dundrum, where I would helping the boys and girls, to discover nature.

I arrived early, and paid a quick visit to Marl Bog. This has amazing wildlife habitat, with beautiful walks, to relax the mind and body. The wind was strong, and I was not hopeful of catching any insects.

It was a morning for the migrant birds. Blackcaps and willow warblers from Africa, were in full song. The only resident bird singing, was the wren. I carefully searched through the long grasses, interspersed with wildflowers.

A red tailed bumblebee was too slow, and soon she was safely inside a bug jar. A cuckoo spit or froghopper soon joined her.

Next I spotted a speckled wood butterfly, but it was very stubborn and patient, and would not fly up into the net. I had a quick peek, and it took its opportunity for freedom. I gave a long and futile chase, through nettles and brambles but he deservedly got away.

In the pre-school, I started off with the three and four year olds. I explained that we were going to learn about nature that starts with the letter "B". Butterflies were first, and these nature loving kids, told me all about the butterflies, they had raised from eggs, in their room.

I showed them my butterfly net, and we practiced how to be quiet when trying a catch a butterfly. First we did our loud feet, and then we practiced our tip toeing. This is really important, so that the butterfly is not scared away. We also managed to catch a 'few kids' who had magically managed to turn into butterflies.

Next we passed around a delicate, small tortoiseshell butterfly that had been hibernating in my house. We looked at the different colours and were careful not to wake him up. I got a few of the kids to help me act out the lifecycle of a caterpillar. From a tiny egg, the hungry caterpillar emerges. This then turns into a chrysalis and finally a beautiful butterfly emerges.

Before we finished on butterflies, we chatted about how important flowers are for butterflies and they get

lots of nectar to drink.

A few of the eagle eyed kids had already spotted my bumblebee. I carefully passed her around and each child held the container up to their ear so they could hear the buzzing. Care of insects you are studying is paramount and she had plenty of food as I had put in some bramble flowers.

Bees are vital insects as they pollinate flowers, making the countryside and our gardens pretty. They also give us delicious and healthy food like strawberries. I explained that you can tell if your garden has lots of pollinators by looking at your strawberry.

If the strawberry is full and plump this means it has been visited by lots of bees. If the strawberry is misshapen, it means you need to work a little harder to encourage in more pollinators. Next we played a game, where some of the kids, were flowers and the others

were bees. The flowers had to stand really still and not be frightened by the bees that were there to help them. Bees have no real interest in kids, but can sometimes be curious, about their two legged neighbours.

Birds are busy raising their chicks and I showed the kids a wren's nest. This had been blown down in the recent storm. It was beautifully camouflaged, been constructed from moss, feathers and straw. There might have been up to eight birds, including the chicks in this nest, and as they got bigger, it must have been a tight fit.

Unlike the cereals, sausages, waffles and toast that these children had for breakfast, birds eat worms, slugs, insects and even butterflies. Our finally "b" was bats and we looked at a bat box. We learned the bats are really important creatures, as they eat hundreds of insects each night, on their nocturnal journeys.

I had a great morning, and hopefully the seeds of nature that were planted will be nurtured and encouraged over the coming years.

Changes in Fair Deal scheme for farms and family businesses

The Cabinet has approved changes to the Fair Deal scheme for farms and small businesses.

The scheme provides financial support for those in long-term nursing home care.

The legislation will be examined by an Oireachtas committee before the Dáil recess in July but it is hoped that the changes would be passed in the Dáil and Seanad this autumn.

HOW THE FAIR DEAL SCHEME WORKS CURRENTLY

People using the scheme contribute annually up to 80% of their income and up to 7.5% of the value of any assets held towards their cost of care.

The value of a person's home is only included in the financial assessment for the first three years of their time in care.

Currently, this unqualified three-year cap does not apply to assets such as farms and businesses.

This means that business assets (including farming assets) can be subject to an annual levy of 7.5% of their value for each year a person is resident in a nursing home.

This latest decision will extend the three-year limit to farms and businesses where a family successor continues to operate it for six years.

WHAT WILL THE PROPOSED CHANGES MEAN?

By extending this three-year

cap to farms and businesses, where a family successor continues to operate the farm or business for six years, it is hoped that it will ensure the future of the farm within the family.

Minister of State for older people, Jim Daly, says the aim is to reduce stress and uncertainty for those who would benefit from the change.

In order to qualify for the new terms, the person entering a nursing home must appoint a successor who will sign a legally binding commitment to continue the family business, and young farmers will be tied to the land for at least 6 years.

CONDITIONS?

Conditions include a legal undertaking by the successor that he or she will repay the full amount of the State subsidy if they fail to complete the six-year period.

This is being seen as a way to identify genuine cases of families who qualify and prevent heirs from cashing in on their inheritance.

As part of a commitment to the 'clawback' mechanism, the successor must consent to a charge being applied on land or property if they break the terms of the contract.

Some flexibility will be applied in cases where the nominated successor finds themselves unable to continue working due to illness or death. In such incidences, the family will be

able to select a new successor without being hit by additional charges.

HOW THE CHANGES AFFECT BUSINESS OWNERS

Reform for the business sector has been slow due to the legal complexity of the scheme.

The Department of Health also recently cited Brexit as a reason for the delay.

Although the heads of bill have been agreed, it will be the end of year at the earliest before the necessary legislation to implement the changes is ready.

WILL THE CHANGES APPLY TO PEOPLE WHO ALREADY AVAIL OF THE SCHEME?

The benefits will be applied retrospectively to anybody already in care or who enters a nursing home in the coming months. If a resident has been living in a nursing home for one year, their family will have to pay only the 7.5pc for another two years. Or if a resident is in a nursing home for more than three years, those 7.5pc payments will cease immediately.

They will not be able to recoup contributions they have made beyond the three-year cap period.

Festival brings laneways of Clonmel back to life

As the build-up continues for the Clonmel Junction Arts Festival, there has been a great response to the call for ideas for the Down The Lane project and the panel had a difficult job in whittling the ideas down to the three selected for this year's event.

They encompass a range of different artforms and should fulfil the objective of bringing the laneways of Clonmel to life.

The project is supported by Creative Ireland and is part of the Everybody Out! strand, which aims to encourage people to participate in the arts.

East Lane Project is a public sculpture/installation and outdoor gallery concept.

To bring the mountain to the lane is a starting point for the project, curated by painter John Kennedy and visual artist Maurice Caplice in collaboration with sculptor and floral artist Ali Dietrich, and photographer and filmmaker David Buckley.

The four artists are collaborating using their different disciplines to create ten art pieces to add life to a town centre lane that has much untapped potential.

This project's purpose is to plant a seed in the minds of

the Clonmel public, as to the imaginable uses of the town lanes.

Ghost Anvil xxvii is a sound installation by Danny McCarthy. Having studied at the National College of Art and Design, Danny currently lectures in sound art in the School of Music and Drama, UCC. He has pioneered both performance art and sound art in Ireland and he continues to be a leading exponent exhibiting and performing both in Ireland and abroad.

Danny explains: "For a long time, I've been interested in acoustic ecology and sounds that are disappearing from our society.

"The sound of the anvil was once the loudest and most prevalent sound in every town and village in Ireland. This installation will restore the sound to Sherlock's Lane in Clonmel."

Dream Lane is a participative art project by Lyn Mather, who has a diverse background in art, architecture, town planning and art therapy.

For the past ten years she has combined her interests in art and the psyche with her love for nature, wildlife and environmental concerns. Her work often takes the form of interactive art installations in unexpected or non-traditional art spaces to en-

able a different way of perceiving.

She has devised Dream Lane for Clonmel Junction Arts Festival as an 'opening' / a 'portal' down the lane in everyday life, where the public is invited to bring their dreams and stories.

Dream Lane will catch these and make them visible for all to see in a portal of wonder, symbols and meanings of what our unconscious and uncanny coincidences

might communicate.

Would you be curious to see what a collective of dreams and stories look like when captured down Blue Anchor Lane?

The installations will feature on a public art trail map available during festival week to bring you to the six exhibitions taking place as part of the festival, as well as highlighting several interesting pieces of public art that are permanent fixtures of the

Clonmel streetscape.

Festival director Cliona Maher says: "We hope that you find something to intrigue or delight you. The installations definitely encompass this year's festival motto - Look Up!"

The work of Clonmel artist Des Dillon will be on the map, but audiences will also get the opportunity to see a new piece of his, Nóta Stóta, which he has developed with traditional musician Benny

McCarthy and storyteller/musician Conal O'Grada.

Featuring a host of new puppets, and an original set and costume design by Des with music written especially for the play, Des feels "we're back to doing what we do best."

There will be two performances on Saturday, July 6, at the White Memorial Theatre. Tickets at the festival box office at the Showgrounds or on Eventbrite.

Showgrounds a hub for Junction Arts Festival

Showgrounds Shopping Centre in Clonmel is celebrating its 10th anniversary in style and will be a hub for the Clonmel Junction Arts Festival, which takes place from July 1-7.

The festival box office is open every day from 10am to 6pm for information and tickets.

"Showgrounds has been a wonderful festival partner since the beginning and we really appreciate the support from them and all our funding partners in helping to bring the festival to the next level," says festival director Cliona Maher.

This year, the shopping centre will be transformed into an art gallery with Robert Ballagh's first painted near life-sized photo realist images of people looking at contemporary art in the early 1970s. The series was instantly popular and was well received critically in the art world.

People and a Frank Stella was commissioned for the

inner walkway leading through what was originally the Five Star Supermarket in Gladstone Street, Clonmel, and remained in situ when future stores Quinnsnorth, Crazy Prices and lastly Tesco occupied the location. This bold design was inspired by people looking at art, very much in keeping with the Festival's motto #LookUp. He used fellow artist Frank Stella's notched V, upending it to create a unifying and lengthy composition.

The installation was designed to compete with the wear and tear of supermarket trolleys, bicycles and general traffic coming and going through the shopping centre. It is one of the first collections which lead to Robert Ballagh being sought after for future commissions in the art world and galvanised his status as an artist as well as an illustrator.

The collection was gifted to Tipperary County Museum in 1992 when the supermarket chain owners Power Supermarkets Ltd ceased trading. The project would

not be possible without funding assistance from Tipperary County Council, Creative Ireland and the support of Clonmel Junction Arts Festival, Showgrounds Shopping Centre and Camida.

Great care and attention is going into the project's conservation and Marie McMahon, curator of Tipperary County Museum, hopes that the public will be as fascinated with the piece as museum and festival staff. "We're thrilled to announce that the conservation of the panels can be seen on a daily basis until June 21 at the Showgrounds Shopping Centre. This unique interaction with the installation and the conservators will give an insight into modern art conservation techniques rarely viewed by the public."

Limited edition postcards will be available around town to be sent to family and friends, thanks to support from Camida, another Clonmel-based company involved with the festival from the beginning.

Robert Ballagh will visit

Clonmel to launch the festival and unveil the installation on July 1, and will give a public talk about the piece on July 2.

Another exhibition at Showgrounds will be The Hills on our Doorstep are Green Too. Celebrating Clonmel's beautiful scenery, the top images from an Instagram competition will be framed and exhibited during the festival. Entry details on the website www.junction-festival.com.

To further celebrate local creativity, an Artist's Cabin will be situated on the upper carpark for the festival. Launched in May, the Solar Studio company is the brainchild of Clonmel's Martin Carey and Pat O'Donnell who have designed and constructed Ireland's first Solar powered office/life space. Each Solar Studio provides a work life balance that is truly environmentally friendly, comfortable, convenient and most importantly, cost effective, and both the creators and the festival see it as an ideal artist's studio - although it has many

other applications.

"We're delighted to bring together an innovative Clonmel company and an artist for this year's festival. Clonmel's technical and industrial ingenuity is very much part of our town's story, and the idea of an artist in residence at a local company is something that we'd like to develop further," says Cliona Maher.

People can drop by the Artist's Cabin to see the cabin itself and the artist at work to showcase their art and to answer questions. There will also be an opportunity to pick up a paintbrush as the STAG art group will host morning plein air painting sessions, open to all and meeting at the Artist's Cabin.

Families can participate in daily afternoon art workshops and join in the creative fun. There will be a public piano during the festival, allowing our musical talent to be on show, and the festival staff hope that piano enthusiasts of all ages will drop by to play it.

As part of the Festival's Sense of Place programme,

designed to encourage people to celebrate our beautiful landscape, the festival also offers you the chance to get out of town and into the mountains, in partnership with Peaks Mountaineering Club.

There will be three mystery hill walks where a bus leaves the Artist's Cabin at Showgrounds for a guided walk with experienced hill-walkers. Wear suitable clothing and strong footwear and bring a rain jacket, water and a light lunch.

There will also be two walking events to help us see the mountains from a different angle. The Folklore Walk will leave from Kilcash Castle, offering insight into the fascinating stories and history of Slievenamon and renowned local photographer John Kelly will offer a photography workshop in the mountains, honing insight into composition and using natural light.

BACK IN 5 PARKING CAMPAIGN

The Irish Wheelchair Association, Tipperary Branch, in partnership with the HSE's Tipperary Gold Star initiative, ASPECT Cahir and Tipperary County Council worked together with volunteers and other disability organizations to organize and run the "Back in 5" parking campaign. It took place in Cahir Town Centre on Friday morning June 7 from 10am to 11am.

The campaign is based on the Lisbon Experiment in Portugal in 2014, a protest event designed to show able-bodied people the frustrations people with disabilities face every day when able-bodied people park their cars in wheelchair accessible spaces without a valid parking permit or reason to do so. The campaign was successfully piloted last year in Tipperary Town and it was rolled out in all towns in Tipperary last week.

From 9am until 11am 12 parking spaces in The Square, Cahir had an empty wheelchair parked in it or had mobility aids, rollators or walking frames with a notes pinned to the back with messages such as "Be back in 5 minutes"/ "just gone to the bank", "back in 5" or "just running in for a coffee" on them. These are throw away statements that people with disabilities encounter everyday when able bodied people use disability spaces for no good reason.

The awareness campaign in Cahir is to draw attention to the abuse of accessible parking bays and to highlight the need for more accessible parking bays in the town centre. Accessible car spaces are located nearest to building entrances or lifts to make it convenient for people with limited mobility or those using wheelchairs to access services. It is important that these spaces are not abused in any way.

The Irish Wheelchair Association greatly appreciate the support of An Garda Síochána in Cahir, along with the Tipperary County Council and all disability organizations and volunteers who supported the campaign as well as local businesses who were very sympathetic to the cause and of course people with disabilities and individuals who came along on the morning to show their support.

Many people commented on the day that they would never use a disabled parking space after witnessing the spectacle. Well done to all involved, it was certainly a great way to get the message across loud and clear.

CENTRE & CAHIR LIBRARY

The Board of the South East Regional Craft Centre CLG decided at a Board meeting on May 30, to cease trading on the 29 June, 2019 and to wind up the affairs of the company operating the Cahir Craft Centre in the Granary building.

Following this decision, discussions have taken place with the Department of Social Protection who supply staff on placement to the company, and assurances have been received that all staff will be facilitated on another scheme in the Cahir area.

As a result of the decision to wind up the company, the Craft Granary building in Cahir, which is currently held on lease from Tipperary County Council, will revert to Council control on the 30 June.

The Council is aware that the current Cahir Library premises does not meet the needs of a modern library service and accordingly has been examining if sections of the Granary building occupied by the Craft Centre can be adapted for Library Service use. Preliminary indications are that the building can be easily adapted for this purpose and at a meeting held on the 7 June, the Elected Members from the Cahir area were briefed on the Council plans. The other existing businesses operating in the Granary building will not be affected by the closure of the Craft Centre and proposed changes to the ground floor and first floor areas.

While councillors expressed their disappointment that the Craft Centre would cease operating in the town they also emphasised the

importance of finding an alternative use for the vacant sections of the Granary building. In addition, councillors highlighted the need to find alternative uses for the existing Cahir Library building, when vacated, and the adjacent council building.

Officials from Tipperary County Council informed the Elected Members that refurbishment plans were being prepared in relation to both buildings and that these proposals when further developed will be presented to the councillors with a view to getting the necessary planning consents where required and also applying for funding under the relevant national schemes and programmes in order to implement these plans.

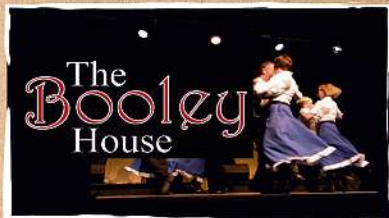

Top running tips to improve fitness this summer

I started off with no real plan or ambition to run races or get involved with an athletics club.

I always enjoyed going to the gym and exercise. My normal routine would have been three or four 28 minutes of resistance training, two LISS training and one HIIT a week. I was following Australian personal trainer Kayla Itsines' programme during this time. My LISS would never have been completed on the treadmill as I found it boring.

How I got into running was down to the local gym closing for long-term renovations and I wanted a new challenge after years in the same gym. My mam was currently involved with the local Fit4Life group, so she encouraged me to give it a go. They train on Mondays and Thursdays for an hour and I was surprised how much I loved it from the get-go, considering I didn't like the treadmill.

The reason I love it and why I would encourage people to run and get involved with a group is:

1. You meet new people through running; the group in Dundrum AC and the Fit4Life ladies are a lovely bunch of people. It gets you involved in a community activity and in the local area. It also motivates you and pushes you more when you are running with a group. The WhatsApp group is great to keep you informed with upcoming races or fun runs. There is such a large group that there is always someone available to go running with you outside of the Fit4Life days too.

2. I also enjoy running on my own sometimes. I enjoy the quiet and solitude on occasion after a day of meetings and being in the office at work all day.

3. It gives you a sense of achievement by running races. I won't lie, during the county races I would often wonder why I put myself through it. I get nervous the day of a race and found them fast and competitive, but on the finish line it was a great feeling and the buns/cake at the end were always a plus.

4. It is also a very versatile and inexpensive hobby. We are very lucky in Dundrum to have great running routes. We have the Duckpond, Bishopswood and the running track so for a small village it really does have everything. To get started all you really need is a good pair of runners. If you travel a lot or want to keep your fitness routine up while on holidays, running allows you to do that.

When I started running the races I really didn't know what I was signing up for. I remember the first race and seeing all the runners warming up and feeling overwhelmed.

Tips I have learnt along the way from races include:

1. My first race was a 3k novice and the warm up was 2k. I remember thinking, '2k warm up? I will be wrecked by the time it starts!'. However, I now realise the importance of warming up and believe it or not the longer the warm up the better I run. My advice would be before a run or a race to arrive in plenty of time so you don't rush a warm up. My warm up would always be a light jog and full body stretches.

2. Also, don't be fooled by the short distance races. I chose the 3k novice as my first as my thinking was the shorter distance would be easier. However, the shorter the race, the faster the pace.

3. Again, ensure you complete a proper cool down. This again was a surprise to me that the girls would want to do another cool down jog after a tough race. I would have considered stretching sufficient. But I quickly

learned that it was my favourite part because not only does it gradually bring your body back to a normal breathing rate, but it was lovely to cool down along with the other Dundrum AC ladies. The warm down always consisted of a chat about the race/run. At that stage we are always on a high after completing the race.

4. Eating prior to a run or a race is always a personal preference. I would always eat about two hours before a race. My go to before a race is porridge with a banana and berries. I normally have porridge and berries for breakfast, but add a banana on a race/run day. Again, everyone is different so you will learn what suits you as you go.

5. Bring something warm to wear before and after a race or a long run. I wore my shorts to my first race and didn't bring leggings/track-suit pants for after and I was freezing. It gets cold quite fast standing around chatting afterwards.

6. When I started Fit4Life I ran two days a week with the pyramid speed interval training drill. I found it helpful and it stands to me

now when running by myself. This involved one minute running at 80% effort, one minute jogging, another two minutes running at 80% effort and two minutes jogging until you reach five minutes and then work your way back down to one minute again. The concept is that you're going up and down a "pyramid" by starting your hard interval at a one-minute segment, going up to a five-minute segment, and then working your way back down to one minute. This can be altered to suit your level of fitness. Even start with one minute jogging, one minute walking and build it up. The time passes very quickly during this exercise.

7. I also found sprint training really good, although much harder and challenging. I do think that it was the best exercise to increase my fitness level. The sprints started at 200 metres around the track, then 400 metres and then lastly 600 metres. For the rest of the track I would just jog normally. I would wait until you build your fitness level up before starting this. Adding hills into the sprints definitely challenges you.

8. Recently I have started completing longer, steadier runs to increase my stamina, mostly at the weekend. I really enjoy this. I started with 8k and have built it up to 10K now. Once you know the areas and loops you are running, you will quickly familiarise yourself with the routes and distances.

9. A great motivational factor for me is my iWatch. When running a race you can see what distance you are at and your time, so it really pushes you throughout the race. Also, it is a great way to monitor your progress throughout your training. It will give you your pace, distance split times and map your run. Any type of fitness watch will do this. I don't think I would be able to run without it now.

10. Something I am bad at is taking a rest day. Since I am now in a good routine, I would get "exercise guilt". It is as important to have a rest day as if I don't my body feels tired and my running suffers.

To improve fitness further:

1. After my runs I have started doing Joe Wicks' abs routine, which consists of five to 20 minutes videos on

core/ab work (available on YouTube). Strong abs have been said to improve your running performance (I am not sure of the science behind it but it can't hurt).

2. I have also started a 12 weeks fitness programme (group class with a personal trainer). This is three half an hour classes first thing on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The trainer focuses on cardio, legs, arms and abs. Classes vary each week and weights are sometimes used. I am hoping this will increase my fitness further and challenge other areas of my body that running doesn't. This is not a necessity. A tip: there is a lot of free really good online workouts and also some really good apps like couch to 5k that will get you started.

3. I am also going to sign up for some longer races during the summer to challenge myself further.

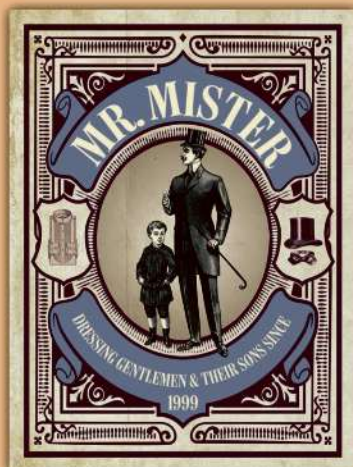
