Dad recalls 'horror' of fatal accident in city

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A VERDICT of accidental death was recorded at the inquest of an 89-year-old woman who was knocked down by a Land Rover driven by Steve Collins, father of murder victim Roy Collins.

Limerick Coroner's Court this Tuesday morning heard further evidence after an earlier hearing in April was adjourned as not all the evidence was available at that time.

Maura O'Brien, of Milford Grange, Castletroy, a mother of four and grandmother of six, died as a result of multiple skull fractures after she was struck by the vehicle driven by Mr Collins at the Ulster Bank car park in Castletroy shortly after 10am on February 17, 2016.

Described as a "dignified and dear lady", the court heard that she maintained her independence at the age of 89, and was living on her own.

Members of the family told the court that they hoped she would have lived for many more years to come as she was in good health, which was supported by medical evidence from her autopsy.

Robin Lee, solicitor for the family, said that the verdict would bring some closure to the family, but added that it will "never erase that unfortunate day for them".

Mr Lee said that the deceased was "no match" for the vehicle, irrespective of the speed it was travelling at, given that the weight of the vehicle was in the region of 2.7 tonnes.

He said there was no evidence that she may have fallen at the scene and fallen out of the view of the driver.

The condition of the road surface also gave no reason to suggest

she suffered a stumble or fall, he added.

Mr Collins, who was accompanied to the hearing by his son Steve Jnr, did not wish to comment publicly after the verdict was brought in by the jury following a brief deliberation.

According to a number of witnesses, Ms O'Brien was walking behind Mr Collins' vehicle, when he slowly reversed back and knocked her down.

Her grandson, Conor O'Sullivan, 26, had driven her to the bank on the day of the accident. He was waiting in the car, while his grandmother intended to arrange her finances to visit her younger sister.

When he observed Mr Collins' reversing and then stopping, he got out of his car and asked Mr Collins if he had hit his grandmother, after he could not find her. He said that he saw his grandmother's hand and then saw that

she was under the jeep.

Ken Stembridge, 34, of Ennis Road, said that he saw Mr Collins "holding his head in his hands" when he saw the elderly woman under his jeep.

Mr Collins earlier spoke of his "horror" at the tragic incident. Halfway through his manoeuvre, he said, he felt a "slight impediment" in his driving.

He said that when he observed his surroundings, he saw a handbag on his right, and thought he had rolled over a handbag.

He said that the "horror started" when he saw a hand and a walking stick. He said that she was "motionless" and knelt down and held her hand.

He said that his car's camera sensor, at the rear of the vehicle, "did not pick up anything".

He told the Coroner's Court that he would have been aware of his "surroundings because of my situation - I have been taught to

be aware".

"I was panicking as I didn't know how to help her. It was a very upsetting scene. It was traumatic," Mr Collins said.

Inspector Michael Reidy examined the vehicle in Castleconnell and observed blood on the rear left wheel.

He said the vehicle was in good mechanical order and found "there were no issues with the vehicle which could have contributed to the collision."

Dr Peter Faul, who performed the autopsy, said that her death was due to multiple injuries, including skull fractures, when she was accidentally struck and reversed over Ms O'Brien.

The jury recorded a verdict of accidental death in accordance with the medical evidence.

Coroner John MacNamara, the jury and members of An Garda Síochána expressed their sympathies with the family.

Extra garda resources deployed to tackle latest gangland feud

A number of shooting incidents, the discovery of a pipe bomb and several assaults have all been linked to the gangland feud which has been linked to the sale and supply of illicit drugs.

While investigations are ongoing, several people are currently before the courts facing charges in relation to some of the incidents.

One man who is charged in relation to an alleged 'slash hook' assault at a house in Kennedy Park last week was

further remanded in custody yesterday pending directions from the DPP.

Chief Superintendent David Sheahan is moving to reassure residents in Kennedy Park that gardai are determined to prevent the feud from escalating further.

"While I can't go into the details for investigation reasons, certainly we are concerned in respect of the activities in that area," he said earlier this week as he welcomed five new garda recruits to the Limerick division.

"We have put extra resources up there to try and quell any kind of disturbances. We are going to come down heavy on this kind of activity now and into the future," he added.

Chief Supt Sheahan says in addition to investigating the

recent spate of incidents, there is an increased presence in the area in the hope of preventing further incidents.

"We have had no option but to take certain courses of action which will be visible in the Kennedy Park area," he said.

HARRIS FILM FEST: FIFTH ANNUAL EVENT GETS 'SIGNIFICANT' IFTA RECOGNITION

International festival reaches new milestone

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ORGANISERS of the Richard Harris International Film Festival have said that the success of the annual event will help it to "drive on for the next five to 10 years easily".

This week marked the launch of the festival, which celebrates its fifth birthday this October Bank Holiday weekend, and features an expanded line-up of quality cultural events.

This year's headline event is a musical performance by composer Brian Byrne, featuring acclaimed actors Stephen Rea and Patrick Bergin, and on-stage vocalists including local singer Kathleen Turner.

Organiser Zeb Moore announced that the festival has received Ifta [Irish Film and Television Academy] accreditation, allowing screened films to qualify for Ifta awards.

He said that the fifth year is "significant", with more than 100 films being screened at two venues, the Belltable and the Millennium Theatre at LIT.

"What is really significant is that we are growing, year on. With the Ifta accreditation this year, that is significant for other filmmakers throughout Ireland. Now, we can present to Ifta what we feel are the award-winning movies," he said at Monday's launch at the

George Boutique Hotel.

"The collaboration with the Limerick Film Festival is significant because it does change our dynamic, but it makes us more structurally viable moving forward."

"We are creating a really, really strong core team that will drive this festival on for

the next five to 10 years, easily."

He said the Harris family is "incredibly proud" of the five-year progress. He added he is hoping Harris' close friend Russell Crowe will attend the festivities in years to come after being introduced to the actor.

He also welcomed the council's €30,000 investment, up from €200 the previous year.

"That is a belief from the councillors really that this is not going away, and they know that it has significant recognition worldwide," he told the Leader.

ACCORDING to new figures published by the INMO on Tuesday morning, there were 28 patients being treated on ED trolleys and on additional trolleys or beds in the wards at UHL.

Social welfare rises as USC is cut in Budget for 2018

FURTHER cuts to the unpopular Universal Social Charge (USC) and increases to various benefits and the pension are all features of Budget 2018.

Finance Minister Paschal Donohoe this Tuesday delivered the second budget of the 32nd Dail - the first set of measures in six years not to be put together by Limerick TD Michael Noonan - with spend topping €60bn.

As of this morning, the excise on a packet of cigarettes rose by 50c, meaning cigarettes will top €12 for the first time. Mr Donohoe announced a series of other tax increases - including notably

a 'sugar tax'.

This tax will be brought in at a rate of 30c a litre on drinks with over eight grammes of sugar per 100ml.

In order to combat cancer cases, the Finance Minister also announced a VAT rate rise of 13.5% on sunbeds up to 23%.

But the VAT rate on hospitality firms remains fixed at 9%, something welcomed by Senator Maria Byrne, who said this will "help protect jobs and create further employment".

All social welfare payments will rise by €5 a week from the last week of March. This year, social welfare re-

cipients can look forward to a Christmas bonus of 85%, the Minister has announced.

There will be no increases in the duty on alcohol, petrol and diesel, although a carbon tax will be discussed next year. A benefit in kind scheme for electric vehicles will be brought in.

Ireland's rate of Corporation Tax will remain fixed at 12.5%, with Mr Donohoe stating: "This remains a core part of our offering".

In terms of take home pay, Mr Donohoe confirmed the top marginal rate of tax on income will rise to €70,044, reduced to 48%. The entry point for the higher rate of income

tax for single earners will increase from €33,800 to €34,550.

The rate of Universal Social Charge will drop from 5% of income to 4.75%.

Mr Donohoe pledged €1.83bn to housing in 2018 - a move which will see 3,800 new social units developed by local authorities and approved housing bodies.

In addition to this, €75m will be provided to support local authority delivery of affordable houses, a move being made in an effort to tackle Ireland's spiralling housing crisis.

Minister Donohoe said potentially 5,000 new homes

could be delivered under this investment by 2021.

The Finance Minister sanctioned an increased spend of €685m in health, bringing funding to €15.3bn for 2018.

He promised 1,800 new staff across front-line HSE services.

There's going to be more investment in An Garda Síochána - 800 new officers will be taken on in 2018, with 500 civilians also recruited.

Mr Donohoe confirmed €20m extra to support a range of childcare measures. The Universal Childcare Payment for the under 3s will continue into next year.

PURSUIT: DISQUALIFIED DRIVER ADMITS DANGEROUS DRIVING

Arrested after engine caught fire

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A MOTORIST who drove the wrong way around several roundabouts while being pursued by gardai has been jailed for three months.

Michael McCarthy, aged 28, of Kilmurray Halting Site, Castletroy, pleaded guilty to charges of dangerous driving relating to an incident on July 30, last.

Inspector Helen Costello told Limerick District Court that gardai encountered the defendant on the Dublin Road while responding to another incident.

She said the defendant, who was disqualified at the time, tried to evade gardai by driving off at speed.

While being pursued, he travelled the wrong way around the Kilmurry Roundabout and the Annacotty Roundabout before travelling back towards the city on the wrong side of the road.

Judge Marie Keane was told the defendant, who has a number of previous convictions, was arrested after he was forced to stop when the engine of the car he was driving caught fire.

He was banned from driving for seven years in 2016 and was further dis-

qualified after he was convicted, last November, of driving without insurance.

Solicitor Tom Kiely said his client – a father-of-two – accepts his driving was unacceptable and that he should not have been driving.

He said every garda in Limerick “knows” his client and that he realised he cannot get behind the wheel of a car again.

“He is willing to change his ways for the sake of his children, he will do anything”.

During the same hearing, Mr McCarthy admitted drink-driving at Childers Road shortly after midnight on January 31, last.

A number of separate counts of dangerous driving relating to an incident on February 3, last were struck

out as gardai were not in a position to offer any evidence relating to the facts.

Imposing sentence, Judge Keane said the defendant’s previous record was an aggravating factor and that she had to impose a custodial sentence.

The three month sentence is to be served consecutively to an eight month sentence which McCarthy is currently serving.

Young man was punched and robbed at bus stop

GARDAI are appealing for information following an incident during which a young man was punched in the face at a bus stop in the city.

After hitting the man who was standing at the bus stop at Arthurs Quay, the culprit stole his rucksack and mobile phone.

Cyclist stole teen’s phone

GARDAI are seeking to locate a cyclist who stole a mobile phone from a teenage boy.

The culprit approached the youth who was walking at Ellen Street at around 7.15pm last Sunday, October 8.

“He asked for a loan of his phone so he could make an urgent call. The teenager handed over his phone and the male cycled off with it,” said a garda spokesperson.

Information sought after attack on young man

GARDAI are renewing their appeal for information after a young man sustained facial injuries when he was assaulted in the city centre.

The victim – whose aged in his early 20s – was walking at Parnell Street at around 5.15pm last Thursday when he was ap-

proached by another male who struck him in the face.

According to investigating gardai the youth sustained minor injuries in the assault.

Gardai believe there were witnesses to the incident which happened at a busy time of the evening in what is a busy part of the city.

Drunk driver has now ‘settled down’

A DRUNK driver who was stopped after he was observed driving on the wrong side of a busy road has been disqualified for two years, writes David Hurley.

John Connors, aged 20, who has an address at Clondrinagh Halting Site pleaded guilty to a number of charges relating to an incident on May 9, 2016.

Inspector Helen Costello told Limerick District Court the defendant was arrested at

Condell Road at around 9.40am a short time after gardai were alerted to reports of a silver Volkswagen Golf being driven erratically on Northern Ring Road.

Following his arrest, Mr Connors was taken to Henry Street garda station where he provided a sample of blood to gardai.

An analysis of the sample showed a concentration of 135 microgramms per 100 millilitres of blood – the legal

limit is 50.

Judge Marie Keane was told the defendant, who has been convicted of separate drink-driving and no insurance offences since, was not insured and did not have a driver’s licence.

Solicitor John Herbert said his client, who was married earlier this year, accepts he was “very foolish” and that he should not have been driving.

He said he became a father

recently and that this has “settled him down”.

Imposing sentence, Judge Keane noted it was the defendant’s second conviction for drink-driving.

In addition to the two-year driving ban, she fined Mr Connors €250.

An additional €250 fine was imposed in relation to the no insurance charge while a change of dangerous driving relating to the same incident was withdrawn by the State.

Spate of thefts from cars

CAR owners are being warned to be vigilant following a spate of break-ins over the past week.

The thefts occurred outside private houses across the city and county as well as at public car parks including at the University of Limerick.

“In some of these thefts the cars were left unlocked and in others property was left on view. The items taken included handbags, power tools, a





child’s buggy, cash, sun glasses, a dash camera and jewellery,” said Sergeant Ber Leetch.

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

41,000 patients on waiting list

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MORE THAN 41,000 patients have been left waiting for appointments and treatment in Limerick hospitals, a new national report reveals.

According to figures published by the National Treatment Purchase Fund, there were 41,090 people on inpatient and outpatient waiting lists in September. This is another monthly

increase in waiting list figures. In August, there were 40,963 patients on the register, an increase on July figures when there were 40,539 patients waiting for appointment and treatment in Limerick.

Between University Hospital Limerick, St John's Hospital and Croom Orthopaedic Hospital, there were 10,720 people waiting for an appointment for more than 12 months.

At UHL, there were 2,905 inpatients and 28,799 outpatients on a waiting list. UHL saw a 61-person increase on

the inpatient waiting list, and a similarly slight increase on the outpatients register, the figures show.

The largest waiting list was in ophthalmology (medicine of the eye) at the Dooradoyle hospital, with 3,837 patients waiting for an appointment.

All three hospitals had patients waiting for more than 15 months and 18 months for appointments. In total, there were 5,398 patients waiting for appointments between UHL, Croom and St John's.

There was a large waiting

list at UHL in the field of dermatology, otolaryngology (ears, nose and throat medicine), general surgery, gynaecology, maxillo-facial, neurology, respiratory medicine, and urology.

The UL Hospitals Group, which covers the Mid-West region, is the best-performing hospital group in the country in NTPF data, with 45,234 patients on a waiting list. It is ahead of the Children's Hospital Group, which had 46,045 patients on a waiting list. There is no data for University Maternity Hospital Limerick.

New seating has also been installed at locations along the route which will allow people to take a rest while

New wi-fi spots in city form part of digital strategy

A NEW digital strategy being developed in Limerick will see 20 public wi-fi zones, ten digital displays, and 14 new live cameras in the city.

Dr Mihai Bilauca, the council's head of digital strategy unveiled the blueprint at this week's economic

committee meeting.

Measures also planned include a €500,000 investment in smart CCTV in towns and villages across the county.

There will also be a Georgian innovation district, comprising of four digital quarters, councillors were

told, while the local authority will provide podcasts through its web site.

Fianna Fail councillor James Collins welcomed plans for a Georgian digital district, and 20 wi-fi hotspots across the city.

This welcome was reflected by Cllr Elenora

Hogan of Fine Gael, who trades in William Street.

Economic chairperson, Cllr Vivienne Crowley said: "The only concern I would have with any digital strategy is that the modern four-year-old is more computer savvy than a 40-year-old. I am concerned we are shutting off

other services to people who may prefer not to use the web."

In response, Dr Bilauca told councillors: "We are digital first, but inclusive. It does not mean people will be shut off from accessing information in other ways at all."

MOTION: COUNCILLOR ANNOYED BY STAMP FOR 'BRUTAL CHE'

An Post urged to stamp out Guevara

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A LIMERICK politician has described the commissioning of a stamp marking the 50th anniversary of the death of Che Guevara as a "national embarrassment".

Cllr Emmet O'Brien is calling for support from his fellow councillors for the removal of the An Post-issued stamp from national circulation.

"I will be asking for the Mayor's approval to put an emergency motion on the council's meeting agenda for next Monday, calling for the Council to support the removal of these stamps from national circulation," he said.

The one euro An Post stamp, which has caused much controversy since it was launched this week, features a famous image of Guevara as designed by

Dublin artist Jim Fitzpatrick. Guevara, who had some Irish ancestry, helped Fidel Castro overthrow dictator Fulgencio Batista. Many describe him as a "terrorist" and "murderer," while others have said he was "freedom fighter" and a "hero".

"I think it's outrageous that a mass murderer, terrorist and Marxist who has no connection to this country would be on a stamp of this country," said Independent councillor O'Brien.

The stamp commemorates the 50th anniversary of the revolutionary's death on

October 9, 1967. Guevara visited Limerick in 1965 to explore his Irish connections and stayed at the now defunct Hanratty's hotel in the city, and the story featured in the Limerick Leader.

Cllr O'Brien believes that the decision to commission this stamp is a sign of "cultural Marxism" that needs to be prevented.

"It sends out a mixed message to American investors who employ over 9,000 people in the Shannon region from foreign direct investment. I know it's very trendy and counter cultural to be fan of Che Guevara but when you investigate what he did, he was a very brutal man who executed people."

Dental clinics to receive findings of investigation

ALL DENTAL clinics in Limerick will be issued findings of an HSE investigation into the "unfortunate" incident where drain cleaning fluid was instead of an approved dental product at a surgery in Clare.

Last week, the HSE issued a statement that it contacted the parents of 43 children, who may have been affected after the cleaning product was used in the water at the dental clinic in Bindon Street, Ennis.

According to a report by journalist Pat Flynn, the product used is believed to be potassium hydroxide, at a low concentration of 5%.

The incident occurred on Wednesday and continued until Thursday when the fluid was detected.

All surgeries at the clinic were closed for "corrective action".

It reported that 16 children required follow-up treatment. Their symptoms included a burning sensation in their mouth, blistering and an upset stomach.

HSE Mid-West chief officer, Bernard Gloster said that the incident was "so regrettable and unfortunate. I want to apologise for any concern or upset caused to the

children and their families.

"We are taking all of the necessary steps to ensure they are supported and have adequate information. We will be conducting a full review to establish all of the facts. I am grateful to all of our management staff and clinicians who worked very hard late into last night to respond to this incident," he added.

A HSE spokesperson told the Leader this week that all dental staff have been aware of the incident and of the information that it has to date.

All HSE dental services in the Mid-West are overseen by a principal dental surgeon in Limerick, Clare and North Tipperary.

"Once the review of the incident is completed, the learning will be shared across all services to ensure any further actions required to mitigate the risk of such an incident occurring again," the spokesperson stated this week.

In an earlier statement, the HSE said that "early indications, yet to be confirmed, suggest that a drain cleaning product got mixed with the water used during treatment when normally the water would be mixed with an approved dental product".

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Limerick city centre is in need of a design for life

There was an article in the Journal.ie last week that focussed on the regeneration of Westport.

The word regeneration is one we have become very accustomed to using here in Limerick over the past decade. It is a word that has become associated with knocking houses, relocating communities and attempting to solve issues of social exclusion and unemployment.

In Westport's case it is a word that is associated with design, public realm and placemaking.

The article noted that the work done in Westport has resulted in the town now boasting 90% commercial occupancy and one of the few western towns that has witnessed a population increase over the past number of years.

Westport was voted the best town in Ireland in 2012 and this year was named Ireland's Tidiest Large Town at the annual Tidy Towns awards.

Mayo County Council architect Simon Wall has worked closely on the 'regeneration' of Westport. Speaking to Paul O'Donoghue at Fora.ie he said: "Instead of celebrating the millennium by creating a sculpture of etching the town's name on a piece of stone, we commissioned an intellectual gift for the town: a town design statement which sketched out all the future development for the next 20 to 30 years."



Limerick city is at a crossroads and needs to focus on how it is designed to be a more people-friendly space. This was one of a number of designs for O'Connell Street drawn up by Nick Bradley in concert with John Moran during the debate about its future earlier this year

Limerick could take a lot of inspiration from the Westport case study. Ok, we are bigger than Westport but there are certain principles from the Westport story that might serve us well.

We all know the work being done in Limerick to deliver the 2030 project. We have key inner-city sites. We have a plan. We have a vision.

What is possibly missing

is a focus on the importance of design as a key part of the 2030 project. We are hearing a lot about the provision of job creation. Limerick is determined to deliver enough commercial space to attract thousands of new workers into our city centre.

The provision of such space is, of course, a crucial need. The presence of well-paid employees in the city will have an impact on

other areas. Footfall will increase. Retail offering will improve. Private developers may then consider providing quality (and much needed) residential. The evening economy will see a boost.

All of this would make a massive difference to how Limerick city feels by day and by night. But what about how Limerick city looks?

The Opera site is looking

like it will have little or no residential, very little retail or ground floor public use and will have a public plaza that looks set to become a dead space at night.

Nicholas St, the oldest street in the city, is a classic example of how 'regeneration' has ignored the potential of quality design interventions.

Johnsgate is an example of a new urban 'village' that once had great poten-

tial but has now become a no-go area.

Our key access point at Colbert Station witnessed a multi-million euro cosmetic overhaul but the finished product is arguably bland, grey and lacking vision.

Cruises St was once deemed to be an addition that would breathe new life into the city. However, it lacked above the shop residential. It's shop units were limited in size. The number of post 6pm restaurant, bar or cafes on the street were minimal.

Bedford Row gave us a new pedestrian retail street. It has struggled to capture footfall.

The work that has been done in Westport has clearly worked.

Any case study which has been done on that town always mentions the county architect and the work he and his team have done to place design and quality public realm at the centre of everything they do.

Good design attracts people. The creation of a place that feels good makes people feel safe. Safe places attract people to live there.

Limerick is at a crossroads in terms of the decisions we make that will shape how our city looks and feels. Of course, we will want people to work here but we will also want those who work here to feel they are part of a modern, attractive and vibrant urban environment.

I would now like to start hearing more talk about the importance of design in terms of Limerick's future.







St Patrick's Athletic, Galway, Finn Harps, Sligo Rovers and Limerick FC were all involved in games that would impact their seasons massively.

Limerick's Saturday was rescued when Shane Duggan

volleyed superbly to the net to rescue a point with the last kick of the game against St Pats.

A goal which, with Sligo winning and Galway missing a last minute penalty but still taking a point off Bray, could prove to be what keeps this team in the division.

Limerick are currently not blessed with a strong enough squad from which to pick and alter games.

This is especially when the opposition is dominating play and this was the case on Saturday, a situation I did fear in the build up to the game if there wasn't a change in the shape of the Limerick team to deal with, what I described prior to the game as, The Conan Byrne Factor.

Any side preparing to play

St Pat's will, I am sure, discuss how to cope with, who is in my opinion, one of the best players in the league.

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MUNSTER Director of Rugby Rassie Erasmus issued an upbeat report on the chances of both Simon Zebo and Jean Kleyn recovering from injury in time to play in Sunday's Champions Cup opener in France.

Munster open their Pool 4 campaign against the French Top 14s eleventh-placed side Castres Olympique at Stade Pierre Fabre this Sunday, 1pm Irish time, live on Sky Sports.

Munster were without the services of experienced second row Kleyn, due to a neck injury, and utility back Zebo, troubled by an infected knee, for Saturday's Pro14 defeat to Leinster at the Aviva Stadium.

However, Erasmus is confident both players will be fit for this weekend's trip to France.

He said: "Simon looks good. I think he will be available this weekend. Last week he came through two of the training sessions and did

pretty okay, so I think he's good to go.

"Jean Kleyn is positive. I think there is a 70 per cent chance if he gets through the whole week, he will be good to go. There is doubt still but I think he will be good to go."

Erasmus was adamant that Munster's failings in Saturday's interpro derby with Leinster was mainly due to discipline issues rather than a lack of intensity.

Munster flanker Peter O'Mahony bristled when he was asked about the team's

intensity levels during a TG4 post match interview with former Leinster player Reggie Corrigan after Saturday's game.

Rassie Erasmus said: "I also saw the clip afterwards (of the interview). I did not know the line of the question was at the moment."

"But, look, that is the way Pete feels, most teams go to Leinster - Northampton got 50 put on them last year - they smash most teams there, so for us to go there, we experimented with a few things in

the game, we lost by six points, conceded 11 penalties, I really don't think it was a matter of intensity, it was maybe a matter of discipline."

"Obviously, if Pete feels that way about it, we look at our GPS stats and we look at the effort the players put in and it was definitely not through a lack of intensity."

Captain Rodrigo Capo Ortega and experienced scrum-half Rory Kockott are expected to return for Castres on Sunday following a Top 14 defeat to Brive.



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
